Margie's not one to mask her feelings

"Wouldn't have them in the shop if they were available," Margie says. "If someone wants to be Monica Lewinsky they needn't come to me."

It's three weeks to Halloween weekend, and Davidson's costume shop is beginning to get more customers.

"I haven't had a call yet from anyone wanting to be Monica Lewinsky or Bill Clinton on Halloween," Davidson says. "We do have two Clinton masks from last year. And two of Hillary. And look, here's one of Al Gore. I doubt we'll be selling that one."

Apparently, the nation's major mask makers have taken a pass on Monica S. Lewinsky this Halloween. An aide to Lewinsky says no one had asked permission to license a mask - hinting there would be some big trouble if they did. No masks, berets or stained dresses.

Davidson says that she has heard there were new Clinton masks with Pinocchio noses. She did not have these new masks. "The ones we have here has a regular size nose," Davidson says. "If you want a Bill Clinton mask here, you get the regular size nose. If you want a big nose you get a Pinocchio mask."

Sometimes, customers can improvise with a mask. Davidson says, "You can paste a mustache on our Michael Dukakis mask and it becomes a Saddam Hussein mask," she says. "That's quite remarkable, isn't it." The Dukakis mask sells for \$29.95 just as the Clinton with a regular size nose.

Davidson is grateful she dumped all her O.J. Simpson masks a few years ago. Word is some costume shops have O.J.'s piled up.

A bar in Washington, D.C. just had a pre-Halloween party with prizes for Linda Tripp look-alikes. "They bought blonde wigs and took black Magic Markers to the roots," Backstage, Inc. manager Sandra S. Duran says.

Davidson says that Richard Nixon masks were popular for a number of years. So were Jimmy Carter masks with the big teeth and Ross Perot masks with the floppy ears. She says she suspects the Bill Clinton masks with the Pinocchio noses will be around, too. But not at A Second Image.

"A year from now, I don't think anyone will remember Monica Lewinsky," Davidson says. "She's nobody anyone would want to be."

Sanford personnel director leaves - city seeks successor

SANFORD - Personnel Director Tim McCauley applied for and has been granted disability retirement from the city of Sanford. He was given eight-weeks severance pay in one lump sum and will be eligible later for retirement benefits.

City Manager Tony VanDerworp said today that a search has begun for McCauley's successor. Sabrina Benton, an aide to McCauley, is the acting personnel director.

"My philosophy is to look inside and out for a new director," VanDerworp said. "We want to get the best people wherever they are. We've advertised over the Web and in government publications."

McCauley, 51, earned \$60,330 and had worked for the city for more than 10 years. In his latest review, he received a 4.85 "outstanding" mark.

In 1995 and in 1996 he was called on the carpet for being the commissioner of a

"Fantasy Football League" during City Hall working hours. McCauley was suspended from Oct. 25 to Oct. 31, 1995 because of his involvement in the football betting pool. The Sanford Police Department was called in to investigate.

There were no further incidents in 1997 or this year.

McCauley took sick leave last month and then requested disability retirement. His retirement papers indicate he had retired for personal reasons, "family medical."

Under terms of the retirement, the city and McCauley are prohibited from making any "negative" comments. There can be no "acrimony or hostility" associated with the retirement.

Neither VanDerworp nor Mayor Larry Dale would offer further comment today. No mention was made of McCauley's resignation at the City Commission on Monday. All that was left behind was closed a personnel file on McCauley.

Body of man found in lake is murder suspect

SEMINOLE COUNTY - The body of a man fished from the waters of Lake Jesup on Saturday has been identified as that of a suspect in a murder committed in Orlando last week.

The man, identified as 45-year-old Harry Deureling, was found by recreational boaters on the lake not far from the County Road 417 (Greenway) Bridge in the eastern portion of the lake.

Though Seminole County sheriff's deputies called to the scene determined the body had been in the water for several days, it had been untouched by the alligators which infest the waters in that area, deputies said.

He was identified through dental records, according to Deanna Brown, public infor-

mation officer for the sheriff's office.

The sheriff's office, Brown said, had an idea of the identity of the body and worked with Orlando Police to make a positive identification. She said the investigation was quick and needed only confirmation of the findings.

Brown said the body was shipped to Volusia County where an autopsy was performed. The medical examiner's office in Seminole County has closed due to lack of funding so all bodies to be autopsied must be shipped north across the county line.

The medical examiner determined that Deureling died as the result of a self-inflicted gunshot wound to the head.

Investigator John Parks of the Orlando Police Department said he was not involved in the case. Please see Body, page 3A

City plans tighter clean-up codes

SANFORD - Haul away that 30-year-old refrigerator in the front yard with forgotten fish.

On Nov. 1, the Code Enforcement division of Sanford's Community Development Department plans to implement a zone-by-zone clean sweep of the city.

Charles Rowe, community development director, briefed the city commission Monday on plans to divide the city into code enforcement zones. Not every Sanford resident faulted with a violation will be

pleased with operation clean sweep.

"What we define as flagrant may not be what the resident considers flagrant," Rowe said. "We're not going after marginal cases, measuring grass to see if it's 12 inches tall. We're going after the flagrant cases."

The Code Enforcement division will divide the city into four zones and a series of sub-zones. Code enforcement efforts will focus on each zone for a period of time, moving in a thorough sweep of the city.

School speed limit

SANFORD - A resolution to reduce the speed limit on Airport Boulevard, from 45 to 30 mile per hour, near Wicklow

Elementary, is part of the Board of County Commissioners' agenda today.

A traffic study determined that a regulatory speed reduction necessary during school hours, one hour in the morning and one hour in the afternoon, while a crossing guard is present.

A flashing amber light will indicate the reduced speed zone.

Bob Zaitooni, county traffic engineer, told Commissioner Daryl McLain, in a memorandum, that traffic volumes at the intersection of Airport and Placid Lake Drive, which serves the elementary

school, "do not currently meet the minimum requirements to warrant a traffic signal at this time."

The average vehicular speed on Airport is 36 m.p.h.

SANFORD - The Sanford Rotary Club gave Danny Hunter, an 11-year-old hearing-impaired child living in Sanford, a new bike last week. His old bike was damaged by mildew and poor weather.

"One of my neighbors called Brady Lessard," said Danny's mother, Cindy Hunter of 2481 Palmetto Avenue. "Danny was feeling bad about his old bike, so Brady went right to work. They bought him this bike, and gave a great presentation over lunch. It was really nice, Danny's so happy."

Lessard was planning to personally split the cost of buying Danny a new bike, until his fellow Rotary Club members stepped in with the gift.

"You don't get too many chances in your lifetime to do something like this," said Les-

sard. "The one thing about this is that I told his mother I should thank Danny. This is special to me. Danny's a neat kid, and I'm thrilled we could set this up for him."

Danny is one of four children of Cindy and Charles Hunter. His siblings are twins Andrew and Chelsea, both ten years old, and Joe, who is 12 years old.

Cindy Hunter said Danny is a "great kid," currently going to home-school so he can receive extra attention in learning. The hearing impairment

makes Danny's life "a little tougher," said Hunter, but "Danny works really hard."

"He's a normal kid," she said. "But, he's a doll. He's so lovable, he's just a great kid."

partment described Deureling's death as the "second half of a murder-suicide."

According to Parks, Deureling had admitted to killing his girlfriend of five years after she broke off the relationship.

"These sorts of domestic dispute seem to end up as a murder-suicide," Parks said.

The Orlando Police investigator said Deureling called his ex-girlfriend's sister on the morning of Oct. 7 and told her that he'd "had a bad day" and that he'd killed her sister. A warrant was issued for his arrest, but he was not found.

Investigators believe he must have committed the murder, made the telephone call and then gone to Lake Jesup to shoot himself.

"I just called and canceled the warrant," Parks said this morning. "It's done. This case is closed."

Orlando Police and Seminole County Sheriff's Office divers will search the murky waters of Lake Jesup today for the gun which they believe may have been used for both killings. Deputies said that will conclude their investigation into both cases.

"It's sad," Parks said. "But this is it."

six intervention and a 24-hour hotline to victims of domestic violence and their children.

Safeshouse can house up to 38 victims and their children with an average stay of six weeks.

With a reported yearly operating budget of \$280,000, Safeshouse receives government funding, but relies on grants, foundation and private donations to fill the approximately \$65,500 gap in needed funds.

this effort will bely citizen concerns of selective code enforcement.

"The community's going to have to buy into this," said City Commissioner Whitely Eckstein. "Starting with concerns about this being arbitrary and capricious, we're going to have to publicize this and get the word out."

The program is expected to cost \$30 for each code violation case, although commissioners worry that the costs could rise. The commission asked for further investigation of the estimated costs of the program.

Mayor Larry Dale emphasized the importance of a "standardized approach" to code enforcement.

"This is an old town," Dale

said. "You've got problems that have been ignored. We're taking a standardized approach, but we need to be prepared."

Commissioner Kerry Lyons said he expects most people will be "very happy," as the concerns of what he calls the "silent majority" are addressed.

Operation clean sweep is part of an overall agenda to beautify Sanford, the commission said, adding that the city would also like to improve the area around the Auto Train, concentrating for now on Persimmon Avenue, a block past Thirteenth Street.

"A lot of people live in that area who we should be concerned about," said Commissioner Velma Williams. "Plus, Auto Train would get much more business if we clean up the area."

Edema is causing swollen legs

DEAR DR. GOTT: I've been a faithful reader of your column for 10 years. I've never had a health problem before, but now I need your help.

Although my legs are normal every morning, as the day progresses they become swollen — sometimes to the point that I cannot wear shoes. This has been a problem for more than three years. My doctor says it's nothing to worry about. I'm about 40 pounds overweight and take Vasotec for hypertension.

DEAR READER: Edema, the term for fluid accumulation in a part of the body, has many causes, ranging from heart failure and varicose veins to abnormal salt-retention and the effects of medication. Edema of the feet and legs is usually minimal in the morning because, while we are lying supine, the fluid is not pulled downward by gravity, as it is during the day when we are standing.

Your basic problem is a tendency for excess fluid to enter the tissues of your lower extremities. The cause may be difficult to identify. To begin with, you are overweight. This, by itself, can cause edema. So one of your options is to go on a diet, lose a few pounds and see if the swelling improves.

Second, you have high blood pressure. The cause of hypertension is not well understood, but what is known is that hypertensives almost always retain excess salt — and, therefore, fluid — in their tissues. Without a doubt, you should be on a low-salt diet.

Third, hypertension can weaken heart contractions, leading to edema. Known as "congestive heart failure," this complication is serious and should be aggressively treated with diuretic pills and other medication.

Fourth, some patients taking Vasotec (and other ACE inhibitors for hypertension) will develop edema caused by the drugs themselves. The reason for this is not known. But the fluid accumulation can be helped by switching to other anti-hypertensive drugs.

I don't agree with your doctor. If I were he, I would worry about your edema and take steps to correct it. Show him my answer to your question and note what he says; his response may tell you a lot.

In the meantime, adopt a low-salt calorie-restricted diet, consider changing from Vasotec to another drug and, definitely, urge your doctor to prescribe a diuretic, which may not only improve the edema but keep your blood pressure in check as well.

friend has been diagnosed with Creutzfeldt-Jakob disease. What is the prognosis?

DEAR READER: This serious neurological disease is a rapidly progres-

sive, rare and fatal brain degeneration that experts believe is due to a "slow virus" infection. According to the theory, the virus enters the nervous system and remains dormant for years, only to cause horrendous damage many decades later. Recent efforts to link Creutzfeldt-Jakob disease with "mad-cow" disease in England have been inconclusive.

I'm afraid your friend's prognosis is grim. The disease typically begins in middle age and progresses to muscle-wasting, uncontrolled movements and dementia. Because it is untreatable, it usually causes death within a year.

WIN AT BRIDGE

From the old to the new

By Phillip Alder

Yesterday, we looked at the old-fashioned immediate cue-bid. Your opponent opens one of a suit and you overcall two of the same suit to show game in your own hand. However, this cue-bid suffers from two major drawbacks. First, it comes around as often as Halley's comet. Second, you can start with a takeout double and show your power on the next round.

So, nowadays most tournament players use the Michaels Cue-Bid, devised by Mike Michaels. If the opening bid is one of a minor, the cue-bid overall shows at least 5-5 in the majors. Alternatively, if the opener bids one of a major, cue-bidding two of the same major shows at least 5-5 in the other

major and either minor. Let's look at the former first.

North has just 17 high-card points, but only three likely losers. (If partner doesn't have the spade king, it will surely nestle in the opener's hand.) So, North took a shot at game. (Agreed, after West's strength-showing double, perhaps East should have bid. Five clubs doubled costs only 200 with best play.)

West defended well, starting with two top clubs. Yet South ruffed with dummy's heart 10, then called for the heart king. After winning with the ace, West led the club queen, but declarer ruffed with dummy's heart jack, cashed the heart queen, and overtook the carefully preserved heart eight with his nine, finally getting to his hand. As West was much more likely to have king-third than king-singleton of spades, South continued with the spade 10, picking up that suit. He won 10 tricks via five spades, four hearts and one diamond.

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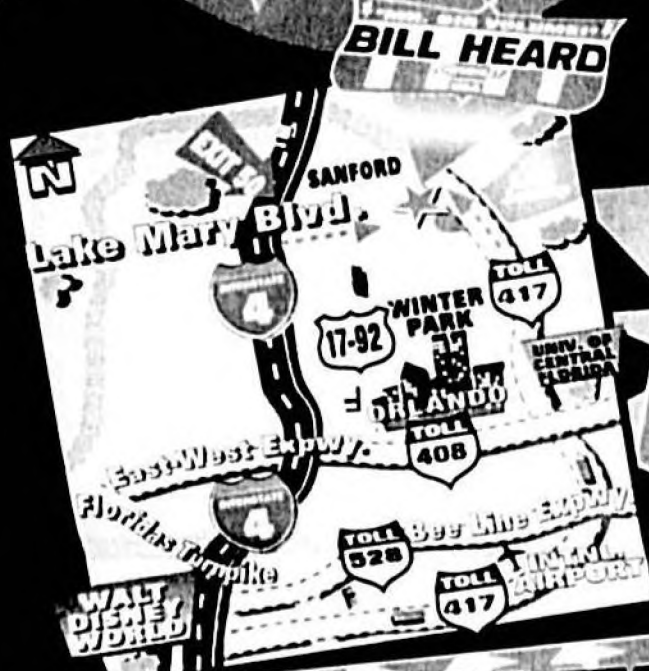

Lake Howell football team still displays a lot of heart

DeLAND - As what must have felt like the longest 12 minutes in the history of Lake Howell football, a few hardy souls on the sidelines weren't ready to let go of the season just yet.

The Hawks had to listen to the DeLand marching band play the school fight song over and over.

They watched touchdown after touchdown as DeLand, the only district team that doesn't play in Seminole County, ran up the score.

And the Bulldogs weren't even trying. DeLand benched its quarterback and most of its skill-position players soon after halftime when the score was 31-0.

As the seconds and minutes ticked agonizingly off the scoreboard, though, the team that refused to give up, Lake Howell, kept fighting.

It's tough to fight when you're losing by over 40 points in an important game with playoff implications, but a few Hawks were imploring their teammates on.

They never stopped, even when DeLand picked up a fumble and rumbled in with 11 seconds to go to make it 51-0.

It's been a tough stretch for the Hawks who are in a rare down period for the program. Last season, Lake Howell went 3-7 with a team that had tons of talent and zero chemistry.

Players admitted in pre-season that last year's team wasn't typical and that things would be different this year.

An early loss, followed by a win over Oviedo, had everyone excited. Shoot, the *Seminole Herald* picked the Hawks to win the Seminole Athletic Conference.

(Actually, I picked Lake Howell over the objections of other staff members, but I'll be happy to share the blame).

The Hawks looked great in the spring and had plenty of offensive and defensive weapons, not to mention the best kicker in the county.

What they didn't have then and don't have now is size.

The Hawks were simply outmanned against DeLand which features what may be the district's biggest line units, not to mention an option offense that rivals Lake Brantley's.

The weaknesses all came out Friday when the Bulldogs sent wave after wave of linemen at quarterback Jesse Hannon who was mercifully given the rest of the night off in the fourth quarter.

To their credit, the Hawks actually moved the ball early, but continued to suffer turnovers, allowing excellent field position for DeLand all night.

DeLand took advantage and ran through highway-sized holes, scoring on seven of its first eight possessions.

After the game, Lake Howell coach Mike Bisceglia pointed out his team's faults in an almost relieved manner that it wasn't a bigger blowout.

The upside is the Hawks still are 1-1 in districts and can sneak into playoff contention with an awful lot of help.

The downside is that even Bisceglia was wondering if things would get better before they got worse. Friday, Lake Howell takes on Lake Mary in a game canceled last month by Hurricane Georges.

Lake Howell, small enough to begin with, will be without at least nine players, including four starters who had already scheduled vacations for the fall break week.

A win over Lake Mary keeps the Hawks' faint playoff hopes alive. A loss means the Hawks play out the rest of the season.

It's not a situation the folks over in Casselberry ate familiar with.

Hot Oviedo boys volleyball team defeats Lake Mary

OVIDEO - The defending champions have come alive.

Daytona Double in the works for Earnhardt?

DAYTONA BEACH - After 20 long years of near misses, anxious moments and endless frustrations, earlier this year Dale Earnhardt finally reached his dream of driving to Daytona's Victory Lane following a Daytona 500.

But, can he do it again in October? Glen "Fireball" Roberts did it in 1962, followed by Cale Yarborough in 1968 and LeeRoy Yarborough in 1969. Most recently, Bobby Allison did it in 1982, but no one has since.

If Earnhardt is victorious in the Oct. 17 Pepsi 400, he will join this elite group as one of only five drivers in Daytona International Speedway's 40-year history to turn the "Daytona Double," winning the Daytona 500 and Pepsi 400 in the same year.

Earnhardt's name is already mentioned among the greatest drivers of all time, but adding his name to this short list would

mark another significant achievement attained during his storied career.

As speedways go, Earnhardt has owned Daytona. The seven-time NASCAR Winston Cup Champion holds the record for all-time victories at the "World Center of Racing" with 31.

Along with his historic 1998 Daytona 500 triumph, his victories include two Pepsi 400's (1990, 1993), seven NAPA Auto Parts 300 (1982, 1986, 1990-94), 11 Gatorade 125-Mile Qualifying Races (1983, 1986, 1990-98), six Bud Shootouts At Daytona (1980, 1986, 1988, 1991, 1993, 1995) and four IROC Daytona titles (1992, 1994-96).

Although the significance of winning motorsports' biggest event and being mentioned as a former Daytona 500 champion is not lost on Earnhardt, he realizes a victory at Daytona in February doesn't guarantee anything in October.

And he also realizes the historical importance of putting his name into the record books as the first driver to win

Daytona's inaugural nighttime running of the Pepsi 400.

"Leave it to the France and NASCAR family to do something bigger and better," said Earnhardt. "They're always doing something exciting to figuring how to do something more exciting."

"Adding lights to Daytona is a pretty exciting venture. Racing under the lights is where I started. When I came to Daytona for the first time in 1978, I never imagined I would be racing here, much less under the lights. I never dreamed of it. It's going to be great for the fans and is going to be a great event."

The green flag will fall on Earnhardt and the rest of the Pepsi 400 competitors at 8 p.m. on Saturday, Oct. 17.

All Pepsi 400 reserved seating has been sold. However, the inaugural nighttime running of the Pepsi 400 will be preceded by two nights of practice and qualifying.
