

Collins Asks Bi-Racial Board To Seek Racial Tension Solution

 Florida Gov. LeRoy Collins asked his new state bi-racial commission today to "seek out ways in which progress can be made" in eliminating racial tension in Florida.

Collins, the first southern governor to create such a commission to deal with a Negro campaign against all forms of segregation, picked four white men and two Negroes Thursday as members. "We should not expect miracles from the commission," he said. "Problems in this area are highly complex and difficult, as everyone knows. It will be the job of this commission to provide leadership not only at the state level but to assist by advice and counsel wherever possible similar bi-racial committees in the cities and towns throughout the state."

Negroes over the South continued their drive to abolish racial barriers at lunch counters of drug and variety stores. Three more Negroes filed application papers to enter the all-white University of Alabama Extension Center at Montgomery.

Frank Stewart, Alabama superintendent of education, was reported today on his study of a request by Montgomery Police Commissioner L. B. Sullivan that Alabama State College for Negroes be closed.

Sullivan charged that the college president and faculty have no control over the students at Alabama State. Thirty-five students

were recently arrested for anti-segregation demonstrations.

Four Negro women tried Thursday to obtain service at the lunch counter of a bus station in Columbia, S. C., and Negro students renewed sit-down demonstrations at white lunch counters in Charlotte, N. C.

At Rock Hill, S. C., local NAACP President C. A. Ivory refused to answer questions in recorder's court about an anti-segregation rally last week which resulted in arrest of 70 Negroes. One of the 70 was sentenced Thursday to pay a \$35 fine or serve 30 days in jail.

Eighteen Negro students filed suit in federal district court at Roanoke, Va., for immediate admission to the white high school at Pulaski, Va. Their applications were twice rejected by the State Pupil Placement Board. Rep. John Hart asked the South Carolina Legislature to withdraw the state's 1868 ratification of the 14th Amendment to the Constitution.

Population Up Over Florida

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The number of people in Florida over 65 jumped from 235,000 in 1950 to 483,000 in 1959, the Census Bureau reported Thursday.

The 93 per cent increase boosted the number of senior citizens to more than 10 per cent of the total state population.

Despised Killer Starts Life Sentence

BIRMINGHAM, England (UPI)—"I just like beautiful women," said 28-year-old Patrick J. Byrne. And in his own way, he probably meant it.

Girl friends pictured him as the overprotective type. In particular, he always was worrying about whether some dark, lonely night a sex fiend would get hold of them.

"Paddy used to say he wanted to escort me home at night because I might be attacked," is the way Jean Grant, a girl who used to date the husky laborer, explained it.

"He never once kissed me good-night in all the times he took me home and never made any advances to me," Jean, a rather buxom blonde of 19, was quick to add.

Byrne today began serving a life term for the sex slaying of a woman.

Other people who knew Byrne used to rib him as being "Paddy the Peeper." The press called him Britain's nastiest murderer since Jack the Ripper. The judge who sentenced him to life in prison Thursday described him as a man under "the influence of overwhelming, violent and perverted lust."

For Byrne, the night before last Christmas Eve, had gone to the

YWCA room of an unemployed 23-year-old secretary named Stephanie Baird. When he left, a little while later, she was lying dead on a bed, beaten, strangled, mutilated and headless.

The defense lawyers argued vainly that Byrne was insane and guilty only of manslaughter. The jurors found him sane and guilty of first degree murder. British law prohibits capital punishment for murder except in certain cases, such as the slaying of an unarmed policeman.

Byrne trembled and shrank the jury.

"I'm sorry. I just like beautiful women," he said.

Suspect Suffers Heart Attack

MERIDIAN, Miss. (UPI)—A 47-year-old man suspected of being a member of an interstate drug-peddling ring involving nude teen-aged girls who posed for obscene pictures was in critical condition in a hospital here today.

Jesse Cox, a barbiturate wholesale dealer from Tusculum, Ala., suffered a heart attack shortly after he was arrested in Lauderdale County, Miss. Meridian Detective Mike Nichols said drugs valued at more than \$10,000 were found under the hood of Cox's car.

Man, 72, Heads Back To College

ATHENS, Tex. (UPI)—Seventy-two-year-old Cliff L. Frazier, the father of four children, retired from the insurance business five years ago.

Recently he started leaving home every day and wouldn't tell his family where he was going. Frazier finally disclosed his secret — he was going to college.

"Ever since I quit Louisiana State University in 1908 after one year I have wanted to return to school," Frazier said.

"This year I got tired doing nothing," he explained, "and just couldn't resist the temptation to go to school."

The University of Missouri is the oldest state university west of the Mississippi River.

Bryant, Carlton Pledge Reapportionment

Farris Bryant came to Sanford Saturday and said he would make fair reapportionment of the legislature the first order of business if he is elected governor.

Bryant spoke at the corner of First St. and Magnolia Ave. and at the Civic Center. In both places he stressed the value of good schools for Florida youngsters.

He urged voters not to let the federal government take over the purse strings and control of Florida public schools. Bryant said it would be very easy to let the federal government pay more and more of state school costs. But he warned that the consequences might be federal domination of Florida's public school system.

He urged the taxpayers to put their shoulders to the wheel and support good schools for Florida.

Later on, in the Civic Center, Bryant said that nothing touches the lives and future of Florida's children like good schools.

"Sputnik doesn't bother me as long as our children have the opportunity to get the learning which has made the United States great," the Ocala attorney said.

Bryant scored Florida's death toll on the highways and said Florida must cut its traffic death toll in half, pointing out that more than 100 persons died on the state's highways last month.

Bryant promised that if elected, he would see that penalties against traffic lawbreakers are enforced.

Switching to the financial side of government, Bryant said nobody believes politicians when they

say they want to save money. Bryant said that as governor he can save more than \$100 million in taxes in the next two years, by turning this money to things the state needs, like more schools and junior colleges.

He said that if voters wanted to know whether he was economical they should look at his record in the Florida House of Representatives. Bryant pointed out that when he served as speaker of the house in 1953-54, House operations cost only 40 percent of what they cost during the previous two years.

"I want to be the symbol of your determination that Florida tomorrow will meet some of its problems," were the Ocala attorney's closing words.

Starting today, Bryant will use

television to reach the voters. He scheduled a talk on the recent spread of efforts by Negroes to integrate lunch counters in stores. His headquarters advance release of the speech termed the subject "a problem so crucial we must take immediate steps to meet it intelligently and decisively."

Bryant was the second candidate for governor in two days to make an appearance in Seminole County. Doyle Carlton Jr. preceded him Friday and talked with voters in the communities from 9 a. m. until 8 p. m., when he capped his tour with a speech in Ft. Mellon Park.

Carlton told his Sanford audience that he would continue to work, as he had in the past, for "fair apportionment," which would give Seminole County and Brevard a senator each instead of sharing

the current upper house seat.

He repeated that he had proposed a highway program — and stressed that he had proposed a way in finance. He referred to a \$250 million proposal he made earlier last week at Daytona Beach.

"All this growth in Florida makes it imperative that we keep up with our road program," he said.

Carlton, who issued a strong statement on the racial tension problem last week, stressed again here that he would use the powers of the governor's office to "preserve the right of a store owner to operate his store so that he serves his own clientele in conformity with the customs of his community in order to stay in business for himself."

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Hoodlums Tightening Grip On U.S.

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Senate Rackets Committee warned today that a "criminal syndicate" of underworld hoodlums has tightened its grip on the U. S. economy.

Its findings were unanimous, but the committee split 4-to-4 along strict party lines over proposed establishment of a national crime commission to help combat the growing menace.

The committee, in another report on its investigation of infiltration of management and labor by racketeers, accused Teamster President James R. Hoffa again of "gross abuses" of union power and an "unconscionable betrayal" of union members.

The new attack on Hoffa said he "gained power with the help of racketeers and hoodlums" and, despite a promised clean-up drive, has shown "no inclination to make against a variety of thieves, robbers, burglars, arsonists, white slavers, extortionists, dope peddlers, and even murderers who are holding office in teamster affiliates."

The suggested crime commission would have served as a federal clearing house for nationwide data on crime. Unable to agree on the proposal, the committee voted instead to recommend immediate study by an "appropriate" congressional committee on how to best cope with the problem of syndicated crime.

The committee split over the proposed crime commission had more than the usual partisan overtones.

Sen. John F. Kennedy (D-Mass.) a candidate for the Democratic presidential nomination, spearheaded the drive for its adoption. He drew support from the other three committee Democrats—Chairman John L. McClelland (Ark.) and Sens. Frank Church (Idaho) and Sam J. Ervin Jr. (N. C.).



Hundreds Left Homeless; Floods Hit Four States

CHICAGO (UPI)—Flood swollen rivers surged over their banks in four states today, driving hundreds of persons from their homes and isolating several communities.

The Weather Bureau blamed a fast spring thaw which melted mountains of snow accumulated by record breaking winter storms.

Snow-fed rivers washed over their banks in Missouri, Iowa, Kansas and Nebraska.

Countless roads were closed by the rising water. Police urged motorists driving in the four-state area to be on the lookout for washed out highways.

National guardsmen helped police in rescuing stranded families. This was the state-by-state picture.

Nebraska: At least three communities remained virtual islands; 40 families were driven from their homes; authorities said the worst was yet to come.

Iowa: The Nodaway River was expected to crest four feet above flood stage at Clarinda this morning, causing some flooding.

Kansas: The Highway Patrol reported many roads closed or soon to be closed, flood waters were two feet deep at Frankfort "and coming in fast."

Missouri: The Weldon River went on a rampage with a six foot rise in one hour at Mercer; the Chariton River was expected to crest at seven feet above flood stage by evening.

McCarty Names A. B. Peterson Jr. County Chairman

John M. McCarty, candidate for governor, has named A. B. "Tommy" Peterson Jr. as chairman of the McCarty for Governor organization in Seminole County.

Peterson, a resident of Locklow, is a real estate consultant and civic leader. His appointment spurred activity in the already busy campaign to elect McCarty.

McCarty, Fort Pierce attorney, businessman, citrus grower and former circuit court judge, has been touring to bring his "work program" to the people. He said he has formulated a step-by-step work program on Florida's needs rather than the customary campaign platform. He said he feels the "work program" will let the voters know where he stands on every issue.

Reds Turn Cold Shoulder To Disarmament Plan

GENEVA (UPI)—The West handed Russia a detailed blueprint today for a veto-free watchdog organization to prevent cheating on a proposed disarmament agreement. But the Soviets quickly dumped cold water on the idea.

The Western proposal was laid before the 10-nation disarmament conference by Italy's deputy delegation chief Francesco Calavetti on behalf of all five Western powers represented here.

One of the chief functions of the new disarmament organization, Calavetti proposed, should be to set up machinery to ban nuclear satellite warfare from outer space.

The West suggested that the international disarmament organization should have a 14-member executive committee, some permanent and some rotating as in the United Nations Security Council. It also would have a council of states and a director general.

There would be no veto, such as the Soviets have used to hamstring the U. N. Security Council.

But Russia's Valerian Zorin criticized the Western plan without actually rejecting it. He insisted agreement on disarmament steps must come first.

U. S. Delegate Frederick M. Katon told Zorin that "if we cannot agree on a simple first step, it is useless to go on to others."

Orange-Seminole Drainage Dispute Breaks Out

A little dispute over who gets who's flood waters threatened to start in south Seminole County Sunday when Seminole residents chased Orange County drainage workmen.

District 3 County Commissioner Lawrence Swofford said that crews from Orange County trucks and a grader were trying to pump water from flooded Lake Charity, in Orange County, into Long Lake or Spring Lake in Seminole County.

Both Long Lake and Spring Lake are also flooded. The Orange County workmen said they were working for county Commissioner Jack McDowell and Engineer Fred DeWitt. They were trying to pump the water through aluminum pipes, Swofford said.

One irate Seminole County resident decided to take matters into his own hands and chopped the Orange County line in two with an axe. Other residents took a more peaceful course and came to Swofford with a request that he stop the drainage crew.

Swofford told the Orange County men they would have to get permission from the Seminole County Commission before they would pump water across the county line.

"We have enough water to take care of in Seminole County. We don't want theirs," Swofford said.

Police Recover Body From Lake

After a week-long search, police Sunday recovered the body of a Sanford Negro in Lake Monroe who was in a fatal auto accident over the Osteen Bridge that took the lives of three other Negroes.

Police found the body of Eddie Lee Washington floating in the southern portion of the lake.

Washington was the driver of a car which crashed through the bridge on March 10 carrying three other Negroes to their death.

Deputies Probe Grocery Holdup

The Sheriff's office was kept busy this past weekend investigating a holdup Sunday night and a murder Saturday.

Deputies reported that late Sunday night two men walked into the Little Giant Food Store in Forest City and demanded that the clerk hand over all the money in the register.

The clerk told deputies that the men had sawed off-shot guns.

The Sheriff's office is still investigating the case and has not as yet determined the amount of money taken.

A large scale man hunt is on in the south end of the county for the two men.

The Sheriff's office reported also that Catherine Doe, a Negro woman of Altamonte Springs was found murdered in her home Sunday night.

Deputies apprehended a 48-year old Negro, Willie Duke, who admitted slitting the Doe woman in the head after an argument.

Duke is being held in the county jail without bond.

Tax Deadline Slated Friday

Tax Collector John Galloway reported today that this is the final week to pay county taxes without being penalized.

Failure to pay taxes on or before Friday will result in a minimum penalty of three percent on real estate taxes and one percent on personal and intangible taxes, Galloway added.

He also pointed out that the tax laws require the additional charge of cost of advertising the property as delinquent.

Galloway also explained that tax certificates will be sold at the tax sale June 1 on each parcel of real estate on which the 1958 taxes have not been paid.

Galloway said that thus far \$1,452,625.00 has been collected in taxes.

New Plan To Aid Farm Industries

Steps have been taken to aid cattlemen and the county's three and a half million dollar vegetable industry, county officials reported today.

Harold Kastner, a member of the U. S. Fruit and Vegetable advisory board, returned today from a na-

tion-wide meeting of the group in Washington, D. C.

Kastner said that a committee has been set up with a meeting for June to give additional help to terminal markets strung out across the nation.

Sanford vegetable produce men

would be able to get better prices for their products with terminals closer to the city.

Instead of shipping to places as far as Chicago and New York they could ship from Jacksonville or Tampa and save on freight, Kastner said.

County Agent Cecil Tucker reported that cattlemen will also get some aid soon with a reduction in freight when shipping hay. Tucker said the reduction could amount to an almost 50 percent cut. He added that the Railroad commission and ICC is presently studying the proposal.

Farmers will also get some relief as a result of the U. S. designating 12 counties in the state as disaster areas for emergency production loans as a result of the recent floods and abnormal rains in central Florida.

One of the areas designated was Seminole County.

The USDA advised farmers who have suffered losses in the stricken counties to apply to the Farmers Home Administration for emergency production loans.

Farmers in Sanford and the county should apply to the local FHA office at Curtis Green in the Sanford Atlantic Bank Building. Farmers in the county are eligible for emergency funds from FHA at a three percent interest.

Tucker, County Engineer Robert Davis and County Red Cross Director Col. J. O. Gregory attended a state meeting in Tampa of representatives from stricken Florida areas to study long range plans to control flooding.

Tucker said that the county was given the assurance that in case of any serious threat to the area they would be eligible for flood relief.

Judiciary Group Gets Rights Bill

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Senate Judiciary Committee, being a cold storage for civil rights bills, took a forced look at the House-passed measure today with orders to send it to the Senate by Tuesday night.

The committee, headed by Sen. James O. Eastland (D-Miss.), scheduled a morning meeting to discuss the five-point bill, which includes a provision for court-appointed referees to safeguard Negro voting rights.

Although liberal members said they would seek to strengthen the bill, the committee's split lineup made prospects slim for any major action.

Eastland, an avowed foe of the bill, invited Justice Department officials and Charles J. Bloch, prominent Negro G. A. attorney, to meet with the committee and give their views on the voting referee plan.

Regardless of what the committee does, congressional leaders hoped the House and Senate could agree on a bill within a week or so without need for a time-consuming conference to work out a compromise.

Beards, Bonnets

Cotton Use Up—U. S. consumers stepped up their use of cotton last year for the first time since 1948, but the rate of increase was considerably under that of synthetic fibers.

Boat Plant Burns—COCOA (UPI)—Fire destroyed the Bervard Boat Works here Sunday and for a time threatened to spread to a nearby residential block. The fire started in the paint storage room. Loss was estimated at \$70,000.

Drivers Strike—TAMPA (UPI)—Bus drivers and mechanics of Tampa Transit Lines Inc. went on strike at 2 a. m. today after three weeks of negotiations that broke off about midnight. The company halted operations indefinitely.

Africans Mourn—JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (UPI)—Heavily armed police stood guard in native townships throughout South Africa today to watch the black man mourn his dead. It was one week ago today that police bullets killed 72 and wounded 200 during riots in Sharpsville and Lange.

Junior Miss—MOBILE, Ala. (UPI)—Maureen Sullivan, a lovely 17-year-old Irish lass who wants to teach retarded children, reigned today as America's Junior Miss of 1960. Miss Sullivan, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Sullivan of West Haven, Conn., won over 42 other high school girls Saturday night at the climax of the week-long America's Junior Miss pageant.

Drivers Strike

Both southern opponents of the House bill and liberal forces seeking to strengthen it have served notice they will try to amend the measure on the Senate floor.

If the southerners launch a filibuster, leaders were confident they could muster the necessary two-thirds margin to invoke cloture and cut off debate.

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Ike, Macmillan Open Nuclear Talks

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Eisenhower and British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan began talks today at secluded Camp David, Md., on a counter proposal to Russia's plan for banning nuclear weapons tests.

The two leaders were reported willing to accept on a limited basis Russia's demand for an unpoliced moratorium on small test blasts to be linked with a formal ban on larger explosions.

But Eisenhower was said to be ready to agree to the moratorium only for the remainder of his term in office—about 10 months—while Macmillan wants one of at least 18 months. Russia demanded a moratorium of four of more years.

Herter Made Unfriendly Remark, Cubans Charge

HAVANA (UPI)—A formal protest accusing Secretary of State Christian A. Herter of making an "unfriendly" statement about the Fidel Castro regime threatened today to trigger another round of sharp diplomatic exchanges between Cuba and the United States.

The Cuban protest, delivered to Ambassador Philip W. Bonsal Sunday night, denounced as "far from true" Herter's recent statement that Communist sympathizers hold high positions in the Castro government.

Castro himself, in two major speeches Sunday, renewed charges of open aggression against Cuba by the U. S. government.

As he has done repeatedly in past weeks, Castro hinted that an outright military invasion of Cuba may be in the planning. But he said Cuba was strong enough to defeat invaders "even should."

The Cuban note marked the latest in a bitter series of diplomatic exchanges with Washington which started with the government's seizure of American-owned business properties in Cuba. Protests and counter-protests followed over Castro's accusation that U. S. officials plotted the sabotage of a French merchant ship in Havana harbor.

"Large segments of the North American press, numerous legislators and responsible officials in other branches of the U. S. government have pressed inaccurate and even painful opinions of the Cuban revolution," the note said.

It added that Cuba had dismissed many of those attacks over the past year as coming from "partisan interests," but was "intensely wounded" when they came from Herter, a person named only in the President's responsibility for U. S. foreign policy.

United Press International—The indignant urban resident who finds his state controlled by rural legislators may have relief in sight.

A United Press International survey of all state capitals today showed a strong, if still inconclusive, trend to put power back in the hands of the population majority which by now has switched to the cities.

Klan Starts Protest Move

By United Press International—Ku Klux Klansmen in Alabama and South Carolina burned scores of crosses over the weekend in acts of defiance against Negro demonstrations protesting segregation in the South.

Dozens of flaming crosses were seen along highways in the Anniston, Ala., area Saturday night, and a fire bomb was thrown into the yard of a Negro home.

Witnesses reported seeing a white man throw the home-made bomb into the yard, but no damage resulted because the bomb failed to ignite.

Police said they received at least 100 complaints about the cross burnings in Alabama. Twelve men were picked up by police in connection with the incidents. Five were charged with obstructing a highway and later released, along with the others.

The cross burnings coincided with a huge Ku Klux Klan meeting in Monroeville, Ala. Hundreds of klansmen, many of them robed and hooded, held a rally at the regional Coliseum. Then they formed a motorcade to a home where a 20-foot cross was burned and new members were initiated.

Odham And Tudor Planning New Lake Ada Development

Odham and Tudor developers will add to a multi-million dollar home building career when they start the College Park Project on Lake Ada.

The firm directed by J. Brailey Odham will soon start a 260 home development just south of the new Seminole High School. Construction Manager Arthur Harris said Friday. The homes will be on 80 acres divided into lots 80 by 120 feet, Harris said. Some of the houses will front on Lake Ada.

Since Odham and Tudor built its first home in Pinecrest Heights in March, 1955 the developers have put up nearly \$16 million in housing in Seminole County. The firm has built about 1,200 homes on 400 acres in Grove Manor, South Pinecrest, Sunland Estates, Bel Air and Rose Court subdivisions. All but Sunland Estates are in Sanford.

Odham and Tudor home prices range from \$17,000 - \$26,000 in Grove Manor to \$12,000 - \$18,000 in Sunland Estates. All have three or four bedrooms. Grove Manor homes on Melonville Ave. have big General Electric kitchen centers, built-in kitchen equipment, good terrazzo floors, excellent drainage and brick trim. Harris said. G. E. equipment is also being used in Sunland Estates and South Pinecrest.

Housing For 'Senior Citizens' Is Goal Of New Development In Sanford

Sanford is proposed as the location for an apartment-type building to provide housing for "senior citizens" and the ground-work has been started on the project by a new corporation headed by Cecil Ozier, Illinois builder who has been in home care development here during the past several years.

The building would be built under a new FHA enactment which provides for building housing specifically for elderly residents. The law requires that such buildings be "designed 100 percent for elderly residents," and further requires that at least 75 percent of the occupants be more than 62 years of age.

Ozier, a veteran of 30 years in the construction business in Illinois, Florida and Puerto Rico, said today "I have dedicated my efforts to senior citizens and hope to make this the first of such projects to house them."

The proposed location here would be behind Seminole Memorial Hospital. This would be handy to the medical center, city recreation facilities, downtown shopping and all the other requisites of elderly residents, Ozier pointed out.

Ozier Florida Enterprises is the new Florida corporation formed to handle this project. Robert F. Drabik of Chicago has been named a vice president of the firm and general manager of the senior citizens development.

Mrs. Donnelle Ray, well known for her work as a social and recreation director, will join the firm to organize a program of activity for residents of the apartments.

She will attend a conference in Washington in January, 1961, with Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare Arthur Flemming and other government leaders to discuss plans for an active program for the senior citizens.

Plans here include extensive gardening and other hobbies and recreational activity suited to the elderly. The apartments will be designed with safety features and tested methods of making life less strenuous for those in their later years.

"If the response to the idea warrants, we will continue to build similar buildings in Florida and elsewhere," Ozier said.

WORRY CLINIC by Dr. G. W. Crane

They show one of the chief dangers in giving your child an allowance. Both get money and have the bad attitude of the prodigal son. And it also encourages a child to gamble, for money has little value when it is increased. "Easy come, easy go," is the usual outlook of "allowance" children.

CASE #113: Tony R., aged 11, is growing quite rebellious. "Dr. Crane," his mother began, "Tony is angry at his daddy and me, for he says we don't treat him fairly."

"We have been giving him an allowance of 75 cents per week, but he argues all the kids in his class get at least \$1 or more to spend as they please."

"So he is now pouting and hating. How should we handle this problem?"

Don't give your child an allowance!

Instead, pay him on a piecework basis for the jobs he does around the house.

Then he will get developing this mental "do-it-for-pay" psychology. And he cannot grow into a person who is not a money addict. He will be in his hands if he has no money in his pocket.

Then, you parents will avoid this common problem of quarrels with your youngsters over money.

Just see that there are plenty of "pay" jobs available around the house or lawn and garden.

Then your boy or girl will have "earning unguilt" as regards their income, for they can room it from 75 cents to \$6 per week if they care to work enough for that high amount.

The "allowance" plan is entirely obsolete in child psychology so get up to the facts!

Obviously, children need money. And you parents should quit giving a child a big allowance from which he pays for his shoes, school books, etc.

But fare to school, as well as school lunches and other necessities are a part of the parental budget, so don't try to flatter a child's vanity by giving him \$10 per week, out of which he must

buy his needed clothes, etc. They are your responsibility.

But as regards his own private spending money, which he can use on amusement, candy and sodas, comic books, etc., you should assure him a liberal amount via the pay-for-work plan.

Then he will learn that money means sweat and work and often deprivation of play time.

This is the proper attitude all people should have toward money, but if you simply hand over "free" cash in the name of a weekly "allowance," you simply cultivate the prodigal son's attitude.

Earning money is used far more shrewdly. Kids seldom gamble at slot machines if they sweat for those dimes and quarters!

So outline a number of household chores for which you will pay. And fit them to the mental ability of your child.

Even a kindergarten tot can make his own bed! And polish his daddy's shoes.

Remember, too, that kids like a quick pay-off, so don't defer their money till Saturday or the month's end.

We used to stick a nickel or dime on each window sill, so when our Crane children washed the window, they were entitled to the reward and AT ONCE.

The same goes for piano or other music practice. Place the coins on the piano, to be taken by the child at the end of his 15-minute session.

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TAMING OF THE SHREW

WASHINGTON — The fact that "no reporters are present" at certain press get-togethers with high government people hasn't been present at the dinner.

It's not that the voluntarily deaf and dumb guests violated their vow to stay the hell out of the press. It's the other way around.

These speeches have slipped some earth-shaking tidbits to reporters who were present — on the outside.

It was in this way that newspaper readers learned the tremendous news that Dwight D. Eisenhower was backing Richard Nixon for president. A day later, readers learned by the same method that Democratic National Chairman Paul Butler had predicted to some nose-peeking reporters that Sen. John Kennedy would win the Democratic nomination.

Now, poor boxed-in Butler could neither deny or admit it. To admit publicly that he himself favored

Gridiron dinner to a point all the way across the Atlantic — is the London Times which, as far as anyone knew, had no reporters present at the dinner.

The message was also sent by a Washington lady reporter who, it was obvious, wasn't there either, since the affair is stag.

The boomerang on Butler came out of a cozy off-the-record luncheon he had for a few correspondents at the National Press Club.

They were to be trusted. But you can't say the same for those grem-lins. The guests, by prearrangement, identified Butler merely as "someone high in Democratic circles." However, a New York newspaper which had no representative at the meeting identified the source openly as Butler himself.

Now, poor boxed-in Butler could neither deny or admit it. To admit publicly that he himself favored

one Democratic candidate over another, in a job that carries no official title, could mean the end of his chairmanship.

But President Eisenhower wiggled out of it deftly when confronted at his press conference about his Gridiron adulteration for the vice president. Without admitting directly that he was even at the Gridiron dinner, the president endorsed anew the only candidate the Republicans have.

There have been other times when the "Don't-tell-a-soul-1-666-you" press meetings backfired. Most noteworthy, perhaps, was several years ago when Nixon tried to maintain off the record his views on sending troops into Indo-China. The views don't stay off the record long, for they were aired before one of the greatest nose-for-nose groups in the country — the American Society of Newspaper Editors.

Unattributable background briefings often play a useful part in the preparation of good interpretive writing. But one of the greatest off-the-record debacles was the sincere experiment of President Eisenhower last year to chin informally with White House "regulars" over dinner.

Uninvited members of the working press waited outside the gates to interview the departing dignitary. But the session was so "secret" that some of the guests even declined to admit who they were.

To top it off, the president's guests attributed their stories to a mysterious "high source in the White House."

Needless to say, that experiment didn't work.

Collecting First Lines Of Speeches Is One Hobby Not Recommended

WASHINGTON (UPI) — I trust no one will be offended if I comment that the pack rat instinct runs deep in the home American.

We are all of us collectors by nature. I couldn't begin to name all the things we collect because the list could include almost any concrete noun between autograph and zither.

If it weren't for this I pluries unum aspect, the feeling of being a part of the game, I might have been worried about myself recently when I began collecting first lines of congressional speeches.

Let's face it, an isolated case of this sort would not stand up in court as evidence of mental stability. But I don't think they can come after me with a butterfly net as long as a lot of my fellow citizens are collecting butterflies.

My new hobby grew out of my line of work, which requires that I spend considerable time listening to speeches in the House and Senate. In each case, the speaker developed a knack of telling from just the first few words whether I should continue to listen.

Then I fell into the habit of saving some of the more notable introductory phrases for a collection of "speeches I never finished listening to."

Most of us like to show off our collections and I offer for your inspection some of my prized specimens. In each case, the three dots (...) mark the place where I tuned out.

Sen. William E. Proxmire (D-Wis.) — "Mr. President, in Shakespeare's Julius Caesar, Cassius accuses the difficulty with Democratic liberal senators in this 96th Congress..."

Rep. Robert L. F. Sikes (D-Fla.) — "Mr. Speaker, previously I have called to the attention of the Congress some of the very fine poems..."

Rep. Robert W. Lovring (D-Ohio) — "Mr. Speaker, Abraham Lincoln said..."

WASHINGTON CALLING by Marquis Childs

MILWAUKEE — With the battle lines now clearly drawn, nothing happens from here on out is likely to alter the nature of the contest in the Democratic primary. It is a contest that may well determine the party's choice for the presidency.

Almost anyone, whether Republican or Democrat, will tell you that Sen. John F. Kennedy is sure to win over Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey. But, beneath the calm and even indifferent surface, forces are at work that could alter the result. And, moreover, prophecy has always been risky in this politically volatile state.

Humphrey is trying hard to get the wayward voter to concentrate on issues and on his record in behalf of farm and labor in contrast to Kennedy's more conservative record. More or less openly he is saying that only a Democrat who comes down strong on the issues in the tradition of Roosevelt and Truman can win in November.

By implying that Kennedy is modeled after Vice President Nixon, a somewhat synthetic candidate with "an overdose of public relations," he is risking a division in the party that alarms some Democratic leaders. One piece of proof the senator from Minnesota cites is the allegation of a commentator close to Nixon that Kennedy's father, Joseph P. Kennedy, has given the vice president an informal assurance that his son will not attack him and received in turn an informal pledge that Nixon would not attack the young Kennedy.

It is something like a plot that Humphrey sees in the buildup the press has given his rival. He is their favorite now and the great lords have contributed mightily to his pre-eminence, in the Humphrey view, but after the nominating conventions they will go all out for Nixon and fear Kennedy to pieces if he is the Democratic nominee.

As for Kennedy, he is using the technique he employed so successfully in Massachusetts when he ran for the Senate for the first time in 1952. Poor Henry Cabot Lodge Jr., whom he defeated, complained bitterly that he had been the victim of a second Boston Tea Party. The test that the Kennedy family held in every nook and cranny of Massachusetts had cost in catering bills alone at least \$100,000, the unhappy Lodge complained.

The technique relies heavily on personal appeal and organization. Members of the Kennedy family have been deployed through every city and town to exert the family charm for Jack. Curiously, alone would turn out numbers of people to see a class so widely advertised for its success in every department of life. But formal invitations sent well in advance give the occasion a special touch.

The pleasure of your company is requested on such and such a day at such and such an hour to meet Mrs. Peter Lawford. . . . This has the glamor of Hollywood and the high-style fashion magazine. Its appeal to Midwestern small towns can't be imagined. Besides the three sisters with their charming tumbled hairdos, the candidate's mother, Mrs. Rose Kennedy, has been invited.

Porsche Takes Sports Car Honors In Sebring Race

SEBRING, Fla. (UPI)—Olivier Gendebien, the Brussels businessman who drove a Porsche to its first victory in the 12-hour Sebring sports car endurance race Saturday, said today he will return to his old job behind the wheel of a Ferrari.

Gendebien and Hans Hermann of Stuttgart, Germany, outlasted the favored Maseratis in the 12-hour race to give Porsche eight points toward the world's sports car championship. They averaged 84.927 miles per hour.

Other Porsches finished second and ninth, and privately-entered Ferraris took every other place in the top 10. Not a one of the favored Maseratis finished the race.

For Gendebien, 38, it was the second straight victory here. Last year he and Phil Hill of California won in a factory-entered Ferrari. This year, neither the Porsche nor Ferrari factory teams entered because of conflicting motor fuel commitments. But the privately-entered cars scored points for both factories this time.

Ferrari's third place finish, by Jack Nethercutt and Pete Lovely of Los Angeles, gave the Italian factory four points and a total of 12 points for 1960 in the car championship standing. Ferrari had scored eight points in Argentina.

The second-place Porsche was entered and driven by Americans, Bob Hubert, Warrington, Pa.; Roy Schechter and Howard Fowler of Miami.

Tragedy marred the 10th annual running of the race when a Lotus car ran wild at a hair-pin turn and struck down a newspaper photographer. Both the photographer, George Thompson of the Tampa Tribune, and the driver, Jim Hughes of Napa, Calif., were killed.

United Press International Vinegar Bend Mizell and Larry Jackson may at last give the St. Louis Cardinals the sturdy 1-2 pitching punch they need.

The Cardinals' 4.34 staff earned run average was the poorest in the National League last season but Manager Solly Hemus already has had two nine-inning pitching performances this spring—a statement no other big league manager can make.

Jackson turned in a complete game Saturday and then Mizell followed Sunday with a five-hit, 3-1 victory over the Detroit Tigers. Mizell long hindered by wildness, walked only one man and permitted only one base-runner to advance past second.

The victory was the eighth in nine games and the ninth for the Cardinals, who finished seventh last season. Stan Musial contributed a double and a single to Sunday's eight-hit attack.

Jim Brosnan of the Cincinnati Reds also pitched a complete game and the Pittsburgh Pirates stretched their winning streak to 11 games in other key developments Sunday.

Brosnan yielded six hits, including a homer by Joe Adcock, in giving the Reds a 4-3 win over the Milwaukee Braves and become the first Cincinnati pitcher to go the distance. Lee Walls clubbed a homer off rookie Don Nutschert with two out in the ninth for the Reds' margin of victory.

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The NCAA wrestling title was Oklahoma property today for the 26th time in the 30 years of the championships but the trophy had a new landlord.

The University of Oklahoma Sooners won the title away from 1934 and 1939 champion Oklahoma State Saturday on the strength of three individual winners and a strong supporting cast.

The Sooners took their fifth championship before a crowd of 6,800 in the University of Maryland fieldhouse, believed to be the largest number ever to view a single NCAA wrestling performance. A record total of 22,800 saw the three-day championship

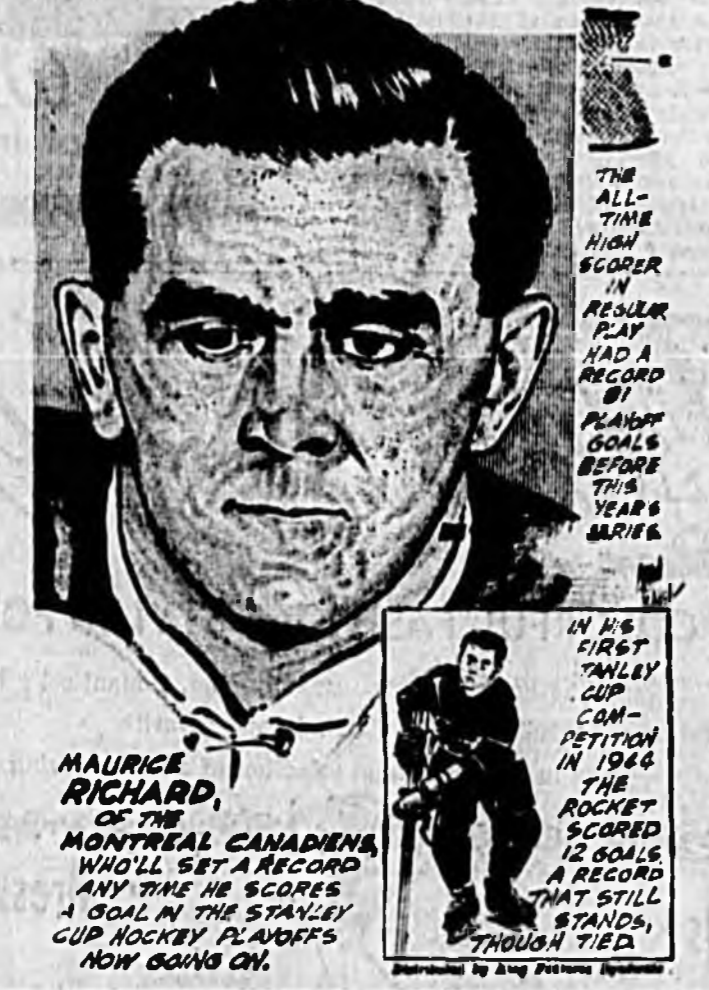

Breaking in a young horse is considered a man-size job, but to 17-year-old Sandra McKinney it's part of any ordinary day.

Sandra, 5 foot, 3, with red hair and blue eyes, makes a pretty picture, too, astride a horse. For special occasions she mounts her registered palomino stallion, Gold Fellow, wearing a black embroidered western outfit trimmed with white fringe and complete with white hat, boots and gloves. And Gold Fellow is in his fancy regalia of saddle, martingale and bridle, all in shining silver.

A senior at Seminole High School Sandra became a lover of horses when she was vacationing in Colorado at the age of three. But it wasn't until her sixth birthday that she received her first pony, a shetland named Pepper, that is still among 40 horses at the Ride-A-While stables operated by Sandra and her mother.

She said Pepper now, however, is just content to scoop up plenty of ice-cream and cake as he entertains at birthday parties around town. It is Gold Fellow which is in the limelight and carried Sandra to the championship in the parade class in the Gainesville Horse Show. At the same show, she also won the blue ribbon in the Barrel Racing event. When Sandra got the golden horse with flaxen tail and mane, around four years ago, she was warned that he was mean. But she said, "I never laid a stick to him. Kindness has made him gentle."

Since she usually participates in the Sunshine Cup, a series of horse shows throughout the state, she stays a very busy teenager. Two weeks ago she rode in a 100-mile endurance contest through the Ocala National Forest - and this week at Southern Florida N. C. she rode a thoroughbred in the Stonybrook Hunter trials where horses all over the country compete in fox-hunt jumps. Jumpers appeal to Sandra and on her next free weekend she will go to Tampa in search of a good one to add to her string of horses.

When not in shows, Sandra saddle-trains and cares for horses at her stable west of Sanford. She also has made "high school" horses out of many of them which

But, although she has had other offers to become a professional, Sandra says she is serious about wanting an education first. After teaching riding again this summer at Camp Ocala in Umatilla, she hopes to enter college. Her ability extends into the business field, too. Last fall while her mother was in the hospital, Sandra conceived the idea of a western shop. So, "on her own," she had the feed room converted

into a shop - placed an order with a salesman - and now is the operator of "Wear-A-Western" - which carries a line of men's and women's attire, she specializes in square dresses as they are called out West - here, she said they might be better known as "patio dresses." Also she has gingham that look to be "just right" for square dancing night.

And, as if all these interests were not enough, Sandra finds time to take an adult education course in psychology every Monday night at the High School. 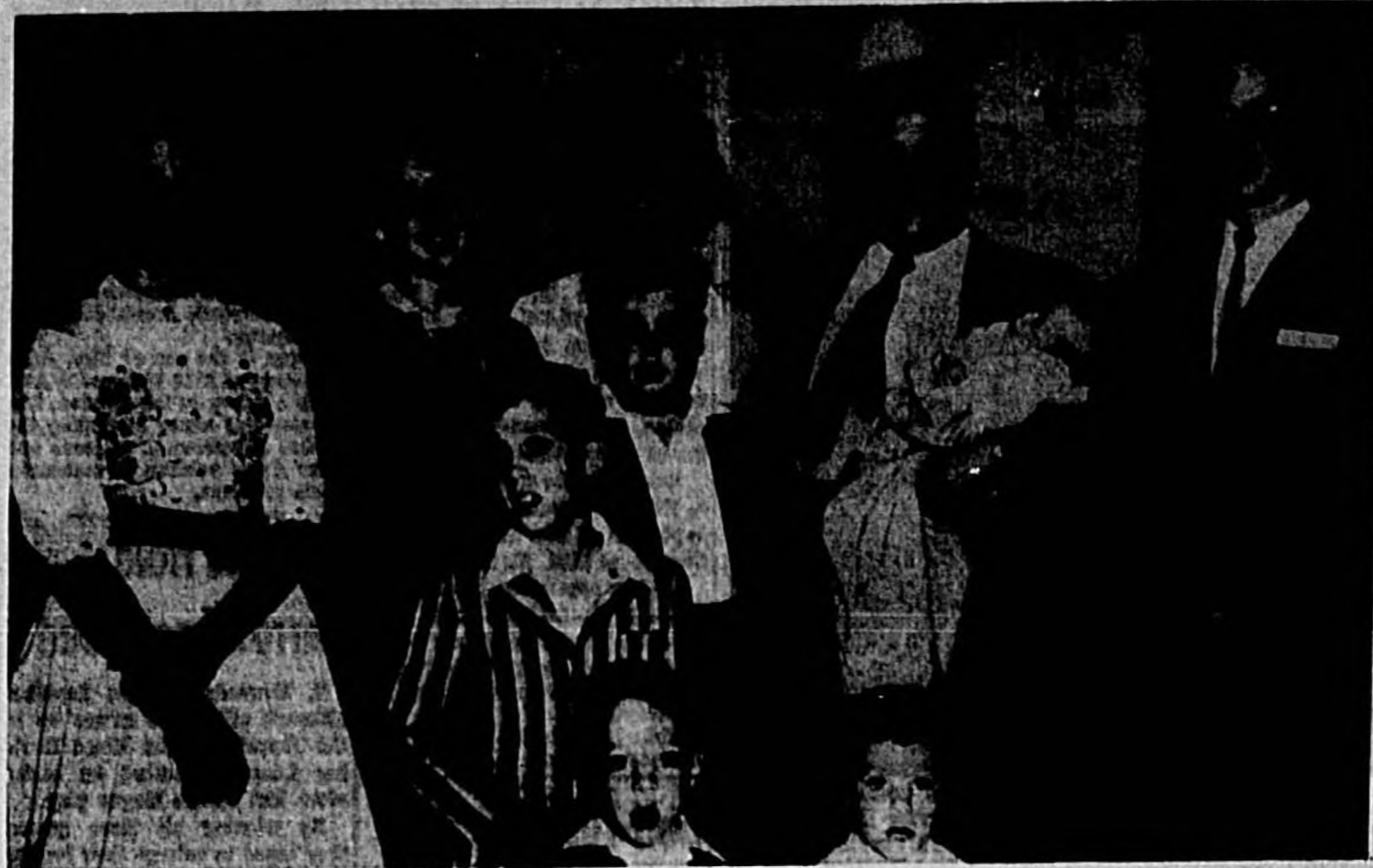

Larger Output Of Citrus Seen

The county agent's office forecasts a bright outlook for citrus production this year in Seminole County, predicting an even greater output than last year.

County Agent Cecil Tucker predicted that the 1959-60 Seminole orange crop would approximate million boxes, and said indications are that the 1960-61 crop, if weather conditions are good, should surpass that.

Production in 1959 exceeded the previous year by more than a million boxes, Tucker said.

Tucker estimated the grapefruit and tangerine crop also would be "good" and that the size of this year's fruit would be above normal.

The last good year for Seminole citrusmen was the 1956-57 season when 3,067,000 boxes were produced valued at \$4,618,000.

One of the important events in the field of citrus production each year is the annual tour to the citrus experiment station in Lake Alfred.

In February, some 70 citrus growers, caretakers and others journeyed to Lake Alfred to be brought up-to-date on the latest research developments at the citrus station.

The tour contained more information on tangerine production problems—a subject not covered in previous tours.

Highlights for citrus during 1959 by the county agent's office included organization of the Citrus Advisory Committee which studies citrus production, the county's expansion program for citrus growers and makes suggestions for improvements in the program.

Democratic Wisconsin Battle Nearing End

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Kennedy-Humphrey contest in Wisconsin moved into its final week today with both candidates trying to devote all their spare time from the Senate to the campaign windup.

The candidates — Sens. John F. Kennedy (D-Mass.) and Hubert H. Humphrey (D-Minn.) — are battling for 31 national convention votes in the first major presidential primary clash of 1960. The vote comes a week from Tuesday.

It turned out to be perfectly harmless: just their way of getting into a "70th birthday salute" to Whiteman on the CBS-TV Revlon hour.

I guess "Pops" couldn't fit into a mere 30-minute "This Is Your Life" format.

Anyhow, for the first 45 minutes, the salute was a rather desultory, limp little party. Only the final 15 minutes managed to give us a satisfying taste of the fabulous Whiteman career.

The symphony-size orchestra then was conducted by Whiteman as it played "Rhapsody in Blue," thereby closing out the show in beautiful style.

Before this portion perked it up, the show consisted of trombonist Jack Teagarden singing and playing "Basin Street," some old photos of young Paul, a ballet number, and sultry Peggy King in a medley of songs made famous by Whiteman's first girl singer, Mildred Bailey.

A comedy sketch featuring Buster Keaton was worked into the proceedings. While it had nothing to do with Whiteman, it offered a few cleverly timed pratfalls.

Keaton's moves to some musical chords were masterful, but I don't see what it all had to do with Whiteman.

This often happens on so-called TV salutes to a celebrity. Bits of disconnected business are shoehorned into a format while we sit and wonder where the guest of honor disappeared to.

Macmillan, Ike Talks May Mean New West Offer On Nuclear Ban

By PHIL NEWSOM UPI Foreign Editor London observers expect Prime Minister Harold Macmillan's hurry-up trip to Washington to result in a new Western offer designed to keep the nuclear weapons-ban talks in Geneva going at least until the summit meeting in May. These observers say the Western proposal will be a compromise suggestion, countering a Soviet Union plan banning all

above-ground nuclear tests providing at the same time the West agrees to a long-time moratorium on underground tests as well. No final agreement is expected in the Geneva talks but they might progress to the point where agreement could be reached at the summit.

Experts on the sidelines of the main Khrushchev-DeGaulle talks in Paris have been conducting separate negotiations in a number of different fields where closer Franco-Russian relations may be expected. There is said to be no likelihood of a renewal of the Franco-Soviet "friendship" treaty renounced by the Russians in 1953.

City Hall Vast Renovation Plan Nearly Completed

A vast renovation program on the second floor of Sanford City Hall will be completed within the next two weeks, City Mgr. Warren Knowles said today.

Knowles said that city work crews are just about finished turning the second floor auditorium into a new courtroom to handle city criminal cases and additional space on the floor will house three city offices, a police supply room and judges chamber.

In the past, the city commission chamber has been used to hear all criminal cases. Knowles said the city manager reported also that the city will open bids soon on \$20,000 worth of new equipment.

New equipment to be purchased will be a street sweeper for \$18,000 and a refuse packer.

City crews today are installing a traffic signal on 25th St. and French Ave.

Knowles said that at least eight accidents have occurred at that dangerous intersection since Jan. 1.

If You Want A Gamble, Shake For Snake Tails

KILLEEN, Tex. (UPI) — Want to try your hand at rattlesnake hunting? It's big business in Cooke County, Texas.

Last spring the county set a 50-cent-per-snake bounty and Warden Raymond Taylor said it was enough for some persons to turn professional snake hunters.

Best hunting time is in the fall and early winter months when the snakes have gone into their dens.

Taylor said one hunter collected \$700.50 from October through December. This man, he said, found and killed 62 rattlers under one rock and in one day took 268 sets of rattles. Another day he got 251 sets.

The county paid a total of \$3,921 to hunters in 1959.

Taylor says hunters drive the snakes out of their dens during cold weather by spraying the dens with gasoline. Then, as the snakes crawl out for fresh air, hunters chop off their heads with sharp hoes.

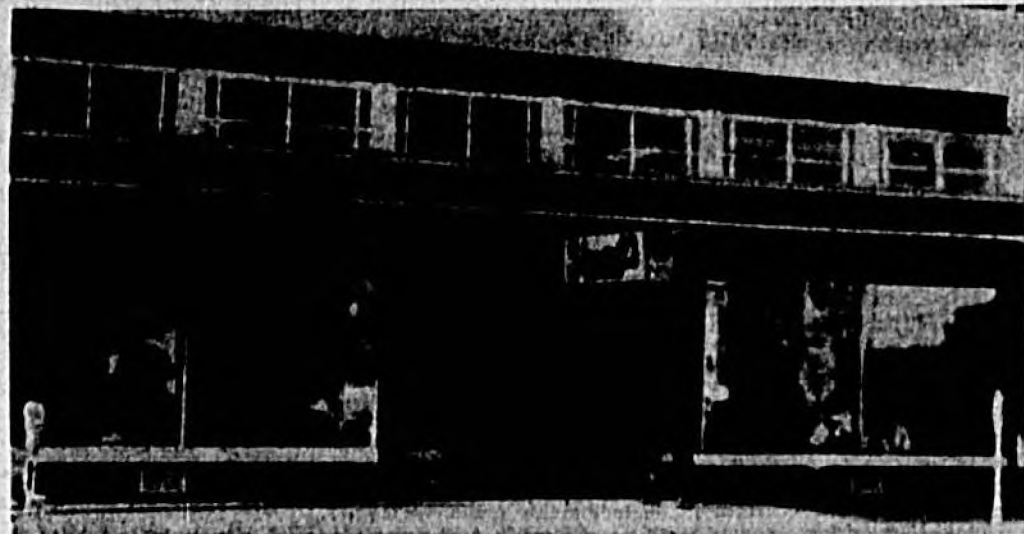

municipal progress, more civic organization activity and more building, including homes, was noted in Sanford during the past 12 months than in any previous year. This section describes parts of all these activities.

City Grows, Plans To Double

The City of Sanford grew in area and population, expanded all municipal facilities and programs during the past 12 months and outlined plans for doubling in size.

Civic organizations, schools and churches kept pace, with increased efforts in the public interest and cultural groups initiated new community programs.

Building was a key word — permits valued at \$1,498,396 were issued during the fiscal year by the city. Most of them were for new homes, but increased commercial construction also was listed.

The city, operated by its commissioner-manager government, was cited by another Florida city, St. Augustine, for the efficiency of its operation after a tour by St. Augustine officials. Other state municipal leaders studied several programs undertaken by Sanford for possible adaptation to their needs.

City Manager Warren Knowles pro-

posed a 21-point program to take care of the anticipated growth. Prominent among them are:

Expansion of the fire department and police department personnel and facilities. Development of a new water supply field, with water treatment plant.

An annual program of street resurfacing and rehabilitation.

Construction of a boat marina, with docks and berths on the Lake Monros front.

Increased public parking downtown. Additional recreation parks and facilities.

A barge terminal, contingent on construction of the proposed Sanford-Titusville Canal.

A sewage treatment by 1970.

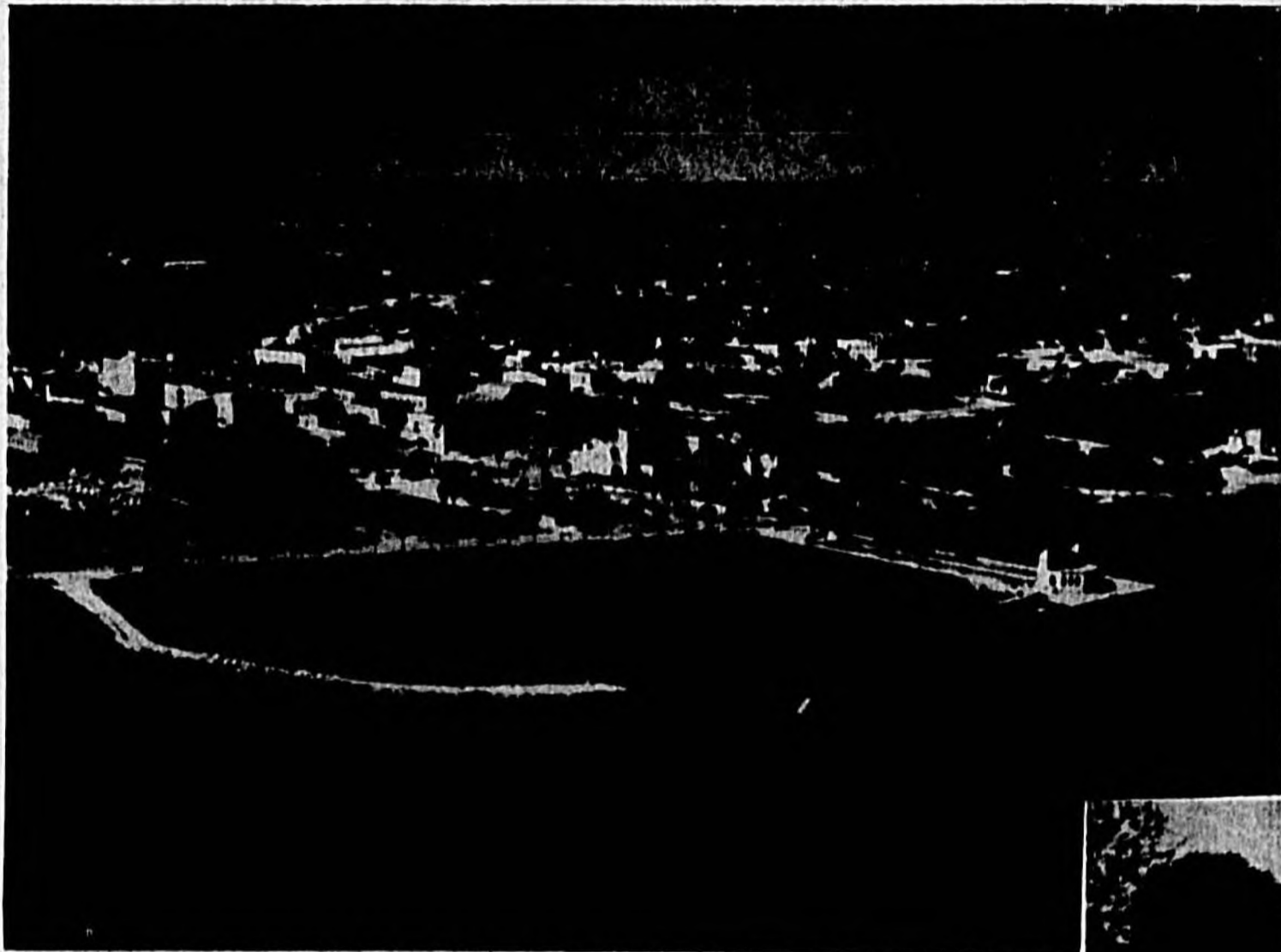
The planning follows a line of solid accomplishment—the city operated within its budget for the past fiscal year and had some surplus funds while all the year's growth was being handled.

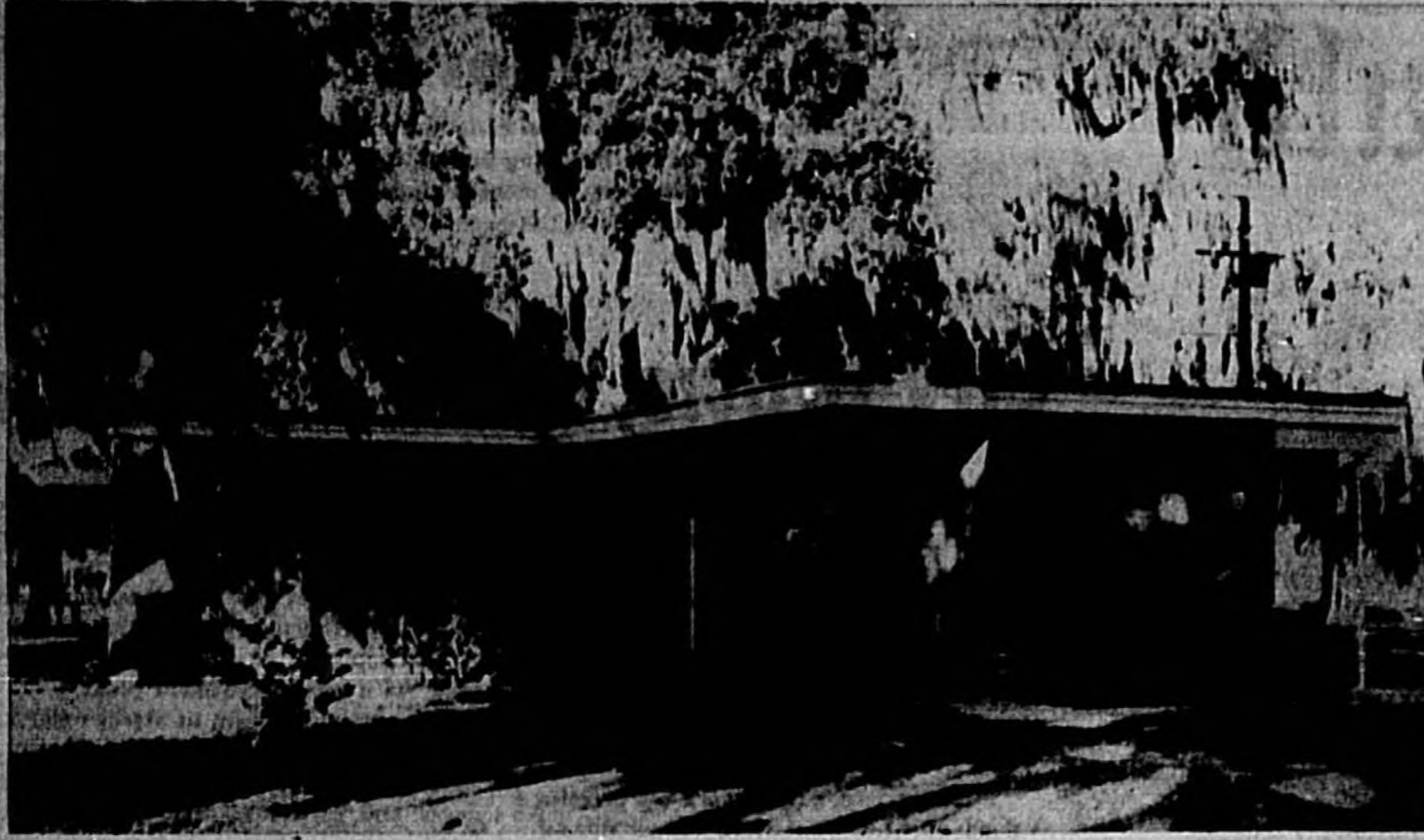

Sanford Completes Year Of Progressive Expansion

Sanford will get a boost in population within the next six months as the city plans to take two additional areas inside the city limits.

City population is now 18,900 and will double in size within the next 20 years, according to City Manager Warren Knowles.

Sanford was able to complete annexation of several new sections during 1959 and provide all city services the same day the annexation becomes official.

The city ended its fiscal year in fine shape, Knowles reported that there was a surplus in the general operating budget carried over from the previous year.

The operating budget was \$602,000 and approximately \$80,000 was spent.

Looking over the last fiscal year, Knowles said that the city had met all its schedules and did not go over the budget.

Over the last year, city officials have pointed with pride to a variety of projects which were completed.

One of the biggest was the entire reconstruction of Seventh St. from Mellowville to Sanford Ave.

Another project of importance was the construction of three public parking lots built out of funds from the budget.

The city also recently completed a big \$200,000 resurfacing project. Streets paved were W. Third St. from French Ave. to Parrishman Ave., E. Ninth St. from Park Ave. to Sanford Ave., Mellowville from 20th St. to 25th St., Parrishman Ave. from First St. to Third St. and E. Second St. from Mellowville Ave. to Sanford Ave.

The city also is moving forward in its playground construction program.

Work crews early this year completed a new neighborhood playground in Lake Green Park in the Wynwood section.

Playground equipment, including swings, merry-go-round and other recreational equipment and picnic tables, were installed.

The city has also taken steps to prevent traffic congestion in Sanford.

City Planner Gerald Dake said the plan would create a giant

perimeter around the city whereby a combination of roads would be built. Dake said the plan would decrease the volume of traffic on French Avenue by by-passing that area.

Dake said the plan could be put into effect within two years.

The city has also made improvements on its No. One tourist attraction.

Late last year, crews finished the first stage of an improvement program at the Sanford Zoo. A new "bird fly" to house all the zoo's assortment of birds and farm animals was completed.

The city plans to eventually replace all the old cages with new ones. This is rated as one of the finest small city zoos anywhere.

The city also boasts one of the finest police and fire departments in Central Florida.

There are 20 officers in the department and plans call for additional men later in the year.

The fire department also plans to add more men to increase fire protection.

Recommendations have been made for a new post office to handle increasing mail service demands.

Garden Club To Stage State Show

The Garden Club of Sanford is composed of 18 circles with a total of 375 members. Two of these circles were organized this past year.

Kiwanis Motto Is 'We Build'

The Kiwanis Club of Sanford was organized 28 years ago and the motto is "We Build." It is a service club with high ideals and worthy objects.

Among the projects of the club is to furnish a scholarship to a local boy at Florida State University. The club has also contributed to the local high school band uniform funds and sponsors a youth at Boy's State in Tallahassee each year.

One of the newer projects the club has undertaken is the sponsorship of a foreign exchange student. In other aid to boys and girls, the club has worked with the Marianna School for boys and also sponsors a Key Club at Seminole High School.

Yield from Florida's 37 principal crops in 1959 reached 8,200,000 tons, five percent more than the previous year.

Jaycees Among 'Most Active'

The Sanford-Seminole Junior Chamber of Commerce is one of the most active organizations in the county.

During the past year the Jaycees have sponsored many events, programs and awards.

To put emphasis on the activities of young people, they give awards annually to the outstanding young man, teacher, farmer and sailor in the county.

Another outstanding project was the sponsorship of polo shots for the public at the cost of \$1 each.

They also sponsor fishathons for kids and play an important part of aiding needy children at Christmas.

The main purpose of the club is civic betterment and leadership training for young men.

The Jaycees are also responsible each year for introducing Santa Claus to Sanford youngsters. This past Christmas over 2,000 persons attended the parade. During the parade Jaycees were busy selling balloons in order to finance a shopping tour for the children at the Lutheran orphanage. The Jaycees accompanied the children and aided in the selection of gifts.

Utility Business 'Booming' Here

The utility business is booming in Sanford and Seminole County. Southern Bell Co. officials report that in 1959 it had 3,400 telephones in operation while this year it is servicing 12,000 customers over the county and Sanford.

The Florida Power and Light Co., as of the end of February serviced 9,818 homes in Sanford, an increase of 754 for the same period last year.

Woman's Club Activity Center For Groups

The Sanford Woman's Club has 123 active and two associate members this year. All minister's wives are courtesy members. The club owns its own building and rents it to other organizations for wedding receptions, recitals and other social functions.

The club is divided into four departments, American Home, Civic, Fine Arts and Social. The chairmen of these departments, seven officers of the general club (all elected) the immediate past president and two appointed chairmen comprise the executive board of managers.

The club is active in many civic affairs. This year it sponsored and served in Seminole County's cancer survey of about 300 families. Each year it participates in the Christmas Seal sale, United Fund canvass, Salvation Army Christmas Kettles, Humane Society, Mental Health, Handicapped Children and various other drives.

The building has recently been painted and the grounds landscaped. The general business meeting is held the first Wednesday in each month and each department also meets once a month. Many interesting and entertaining programs are presented by the various departments, including musical programs, art exhibits, hobby displays and talks by local civic leaders and officials.

The social department meets once a month for card games and sponsors a Valentine luncheon and May breakfast, each followed by bridge and canasta games. The American Home department assisted a handicapped child this year and each year opens the season with a dinner party for all Sanford teachers and their wives and husbands.

Anna Miller Circle also sponsors many social events at the Elks Club including an annual Christmas dinner-dance and Valentine dance.

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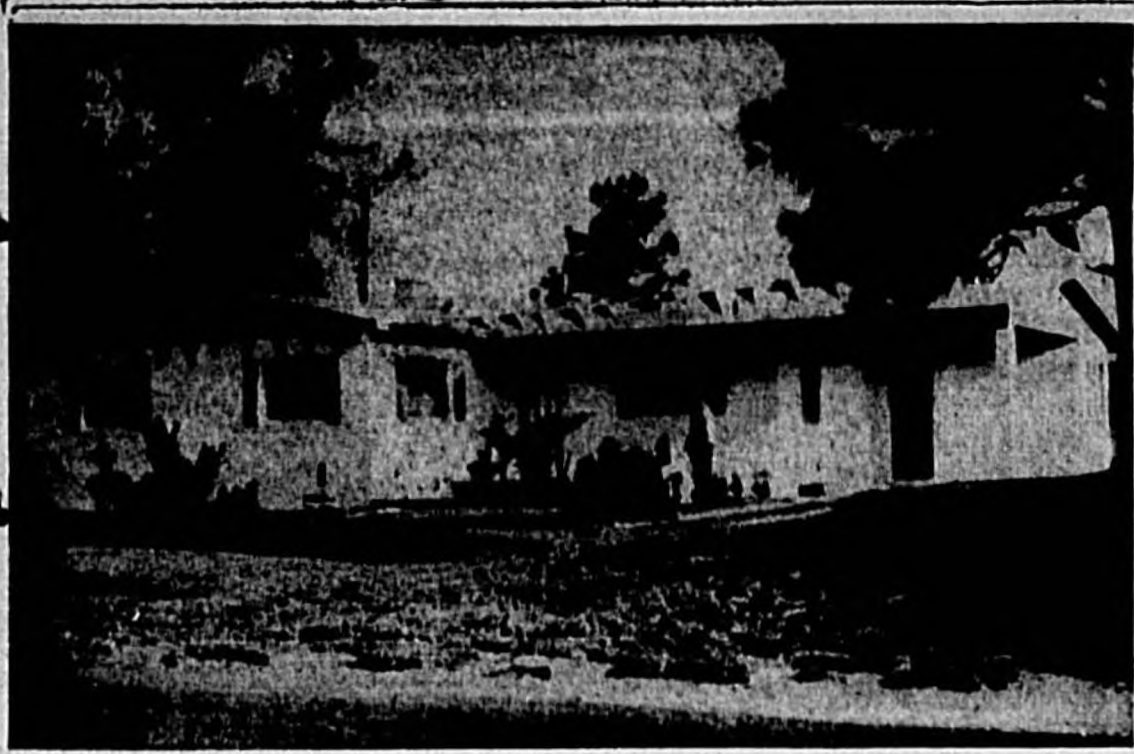
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Country Club Manor Homes Now Total More Than 300

The three bedroom homes in the new group sell for \$9,890 with \$340 down and monthly payments of \$64.

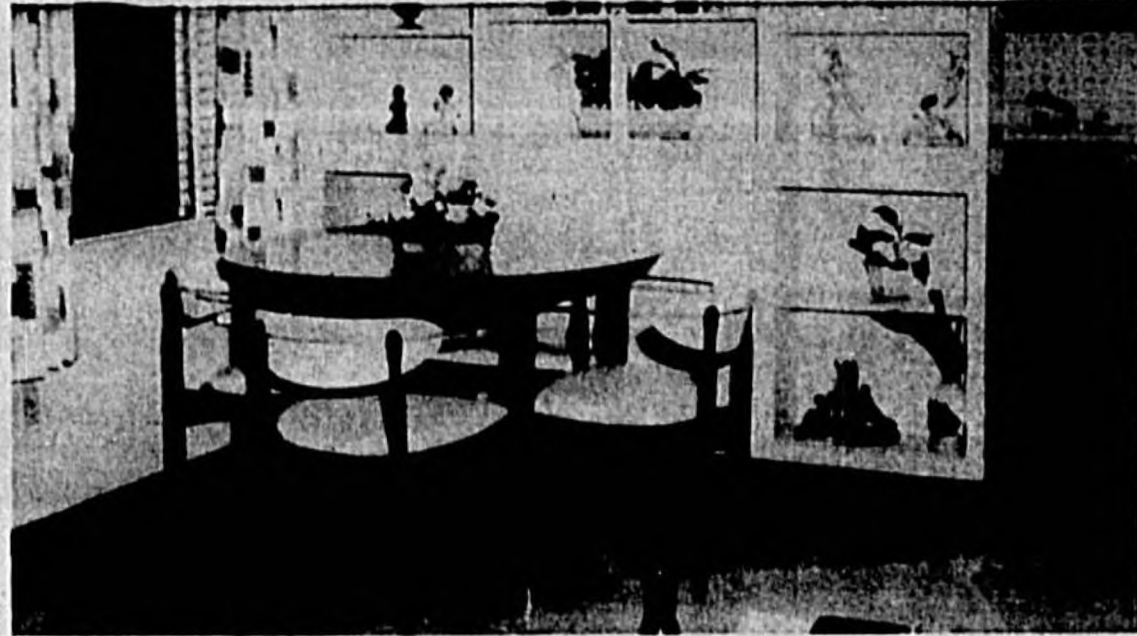

Piver's firm studied possible Seminole County development areas for two years and made county surveys before making definite plans.

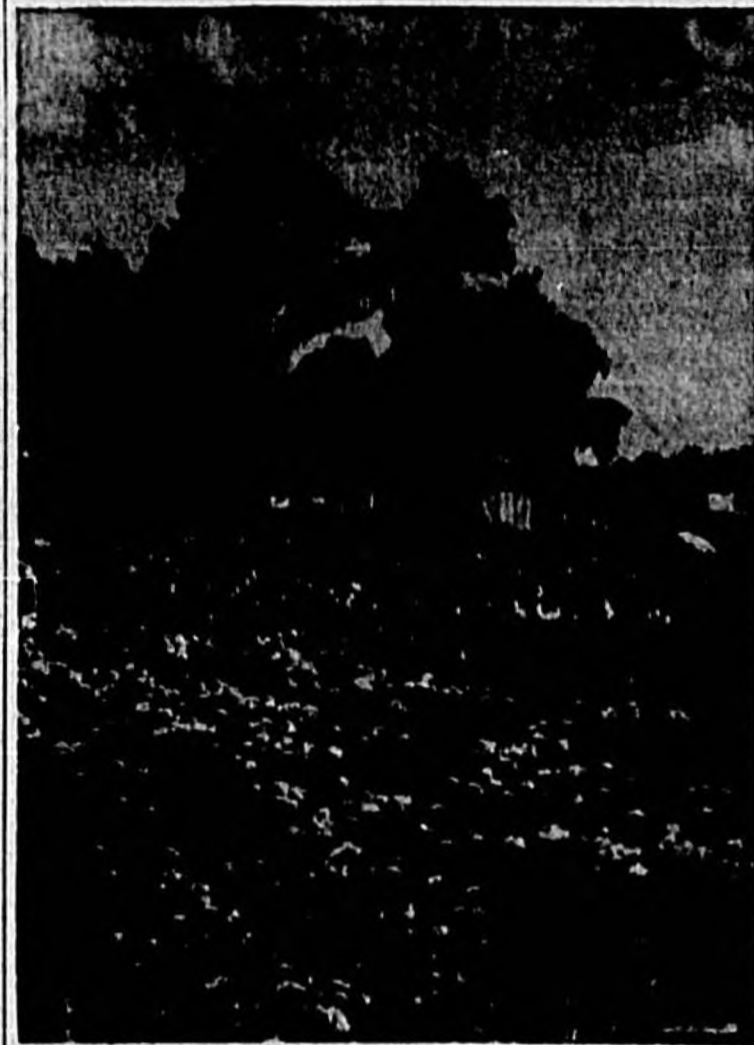
"The growth of the county definitely requires increased home building and there are several sections which we expect will show considerable more expansion as far as home construction is concerned," Piver said.

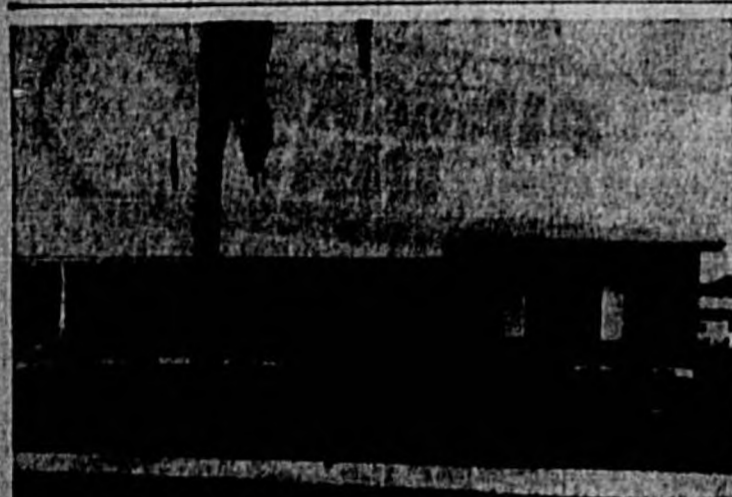


Art Association Began Ambitious Projects

All a guy has to do in Seminole County is get up in the morning and he is right smack dab in the middle of whatever sport that might be to his liking—whether he takes part or just spectates.

Without traveling more than 15 miles, he can go shad, bass or perch fishing, hunting, boating on a famed waterway, swim, water ski or go skin diving, see minor league baseball and major league exhibitions, bowl and play shuffleboard.

Taking a deep breath, he can watch harness horse training, join a sports car club or an archery club, see greyhound racing, play tennis or enter a golf tournament.

And if he feels like driving 37 miles, he can go to the beaches on the Atlantic coast of Florida and engage in a little salt water bathing or fishing or see races at the International Speedway.

He doesn't have to pick the season either, because most of these are going on all the time, with the exception of baseball, racing and hunting.

Most of the water sports on the hundreds of lakes and the winding rivers have become family affairs and the boats are crowding the automobiles out of the car-

ports. Sanford is on big Lake Monroe and the St. Johns River. Every town and community has myriad fresh water lakes.

There are four golf courses in the county and many more nearby where amateurs are welcomed to tournaments weekly and the pros appear regularly.

There are fish camps with equipment, guides, boats, bait and sleeping accommodations.

Many organized programs are sponsored by the Sanford Recreation Dept. and other community groups. These include activities for people of all ages, from Little League baseball to shuffleboard leagues for the less active oldsters.

The Seminole High School stands out in Orange Belt Conference competition, winning the football title trophy in 1958 and tying for it in 1959. The basketball team won the conference crown in 1959. These teams have been called the most exciting to watch in the history of the county and they added a lot to the sports viewing.

And for the less energetic, there's always just sitting in the backyard soaking up the Florida sun. Some say you can't beat it.

Plenty Of Good Fishing Can Be Found In County Rivers, Lakes

Sanford is the shad fishing capital of the world.

That's the word from an expert in the field—J. M. Crowe who has seen as many shad hauled out of the St. Johns River as anybody.

"And I ain't just talking—it's a fact," Crowe said yesterday, pulling out the latest government survey results to back up his statement.

Crowe, who has operated his fishing camp on the river for years, said this fishing season has been real good and figures up to Feb. 14 show that it will surpass last season, when an estimated 68,100 shad were caught in the river.

A total of 45,547 shad have been reported caught from Dec. until Feb. 14 through government survey cards which anglers are asked to fill out at the various fish camps.

The survey estimated that 36 per cent of the fishermen who entered the river through Crowe's Camp reported catches. These reports at this one camp totaled up 23,185 shad, the Bureau of Commercial Fisheries office at Beaufort, S. C., said.

That makes Sanford the world's shad capital, Crowe calculated. Average catch per boat from Crowe's was 8½ shad, the report showed. The survey showed that al-

ready this season more shad have been taken than during all of the 1956-57 season, when 35,000 to 40,000 were taken.

It also pointed out the increased interest in shad fishing in the St. John's evidenced by the jump from 12,953 anglers in 1956-57 to 17,380 in 1958-59.

This season about 13,000 fishermen already had been on the river as of Feb. 14. These numbers include only those who register their catches. There are other thousands who do not report them to the survey.

The government bureau of fisheries attributes the increase in fishing and in catches to the opening of new areas not previously fished heavily and increased knowledge of the habits of the shad.

The survey reported a five per cent increase in fish caught and 30 per cent more anglers trying to land them last year.

The fish camp operators believe that both these percentages will be larger this season.

The government surveyors call interest in the sport "phenomenal!"

Some of the best fishing camps in the state are located in the county including Camp Seminole, Muse's fish camp, Wekiva Haven, Crowe Camp, Lemon Bluff, Hiley's Camp.

These are just a few of the popular camps strung out along the St. Johns and Wekiva Rivers and Lake Jesup.

Seminole fishermen are also only 37 miles away from some of the best salt water fishing in the U. S. on the East Coast.

Bass may be taken all year and strike artificial lures, flies or live bait.

Most speckled perch are caught in the large lakes and the best

seasons are fall and winter. Trotting with small lures or live minnows is a good way to land them.

Bream bite almost all the time and are found in deep holes in creeks and other streams. The Florida bream is of the large variety and is an excellent pan fish.

A number of sponsored fishing contests liven up interest in the sport during the peak seasons.

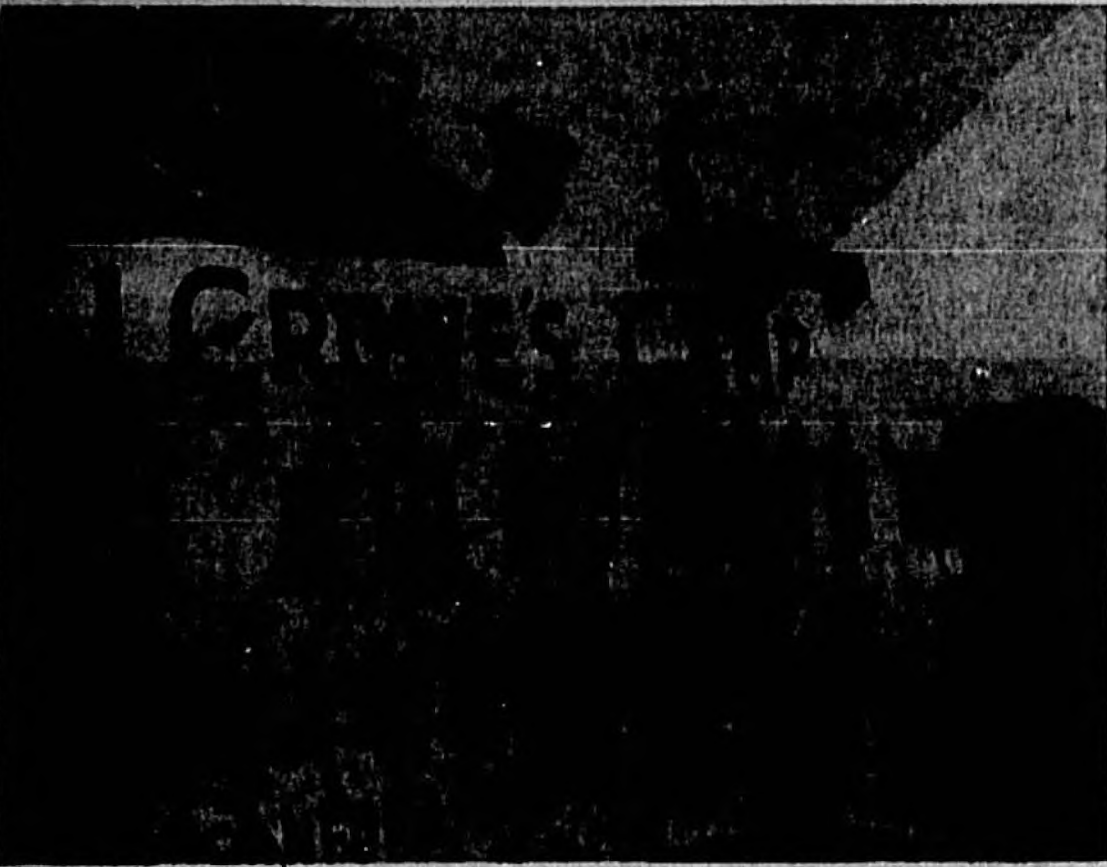
Fishing License Cost Reasonable

Seminole County, with its many fresh water lakes and the St. John's River, is an Isaak Walton paradise.

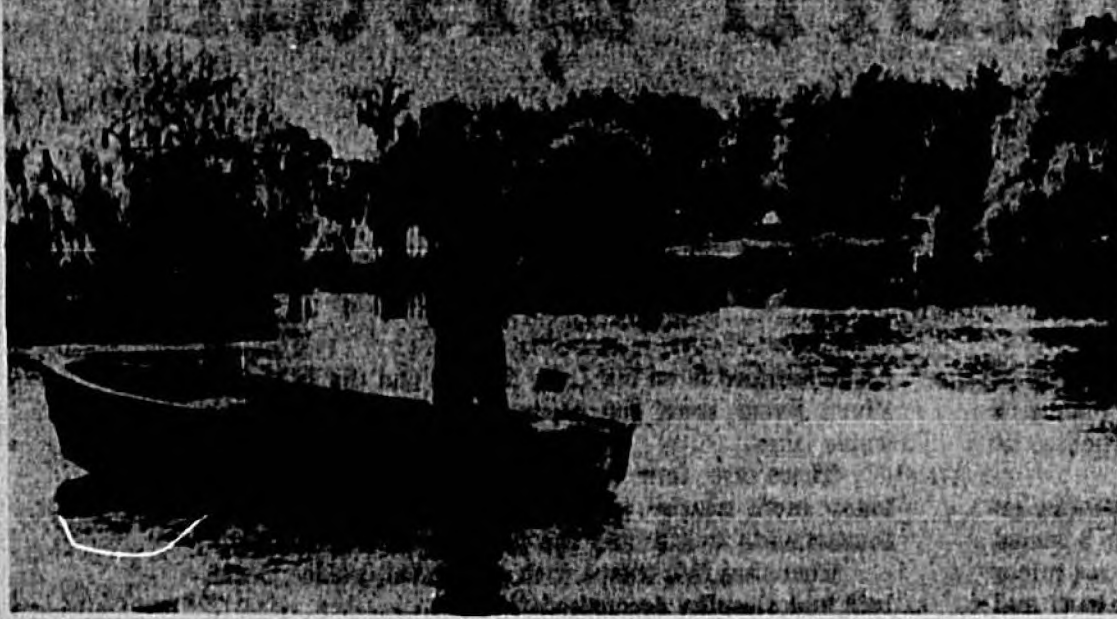
Licenses are required for all except residents over 65 and children for fresh water angling with the equipment other than cane pole. They can be obtained at the county courthouse and at many fishing camps. Fees are: Annual resident, statewide, \$2; annual non-resident, statewide, \$10.50; 14-day statewide non-

resident \$3.25; 3-day statewide nonresident \$1.25. No license required for salt water fishing.

Sanlando Springs is a spring-fed swimming area 12 miles from Sanford. A large pool is formed by 1,500,000 gallons of water flowing into the area daily. The water is always 72 degrees. Swimmers can use a diving platform or a slide to enter the pool which is surrounded by a park.

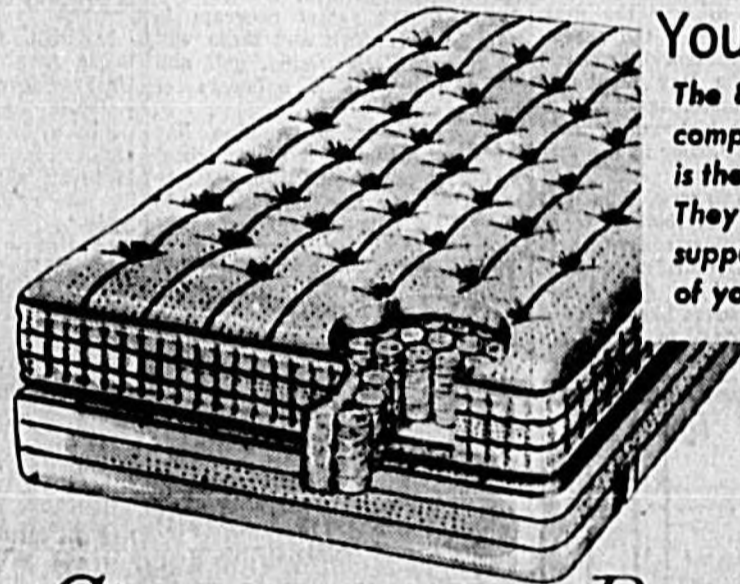

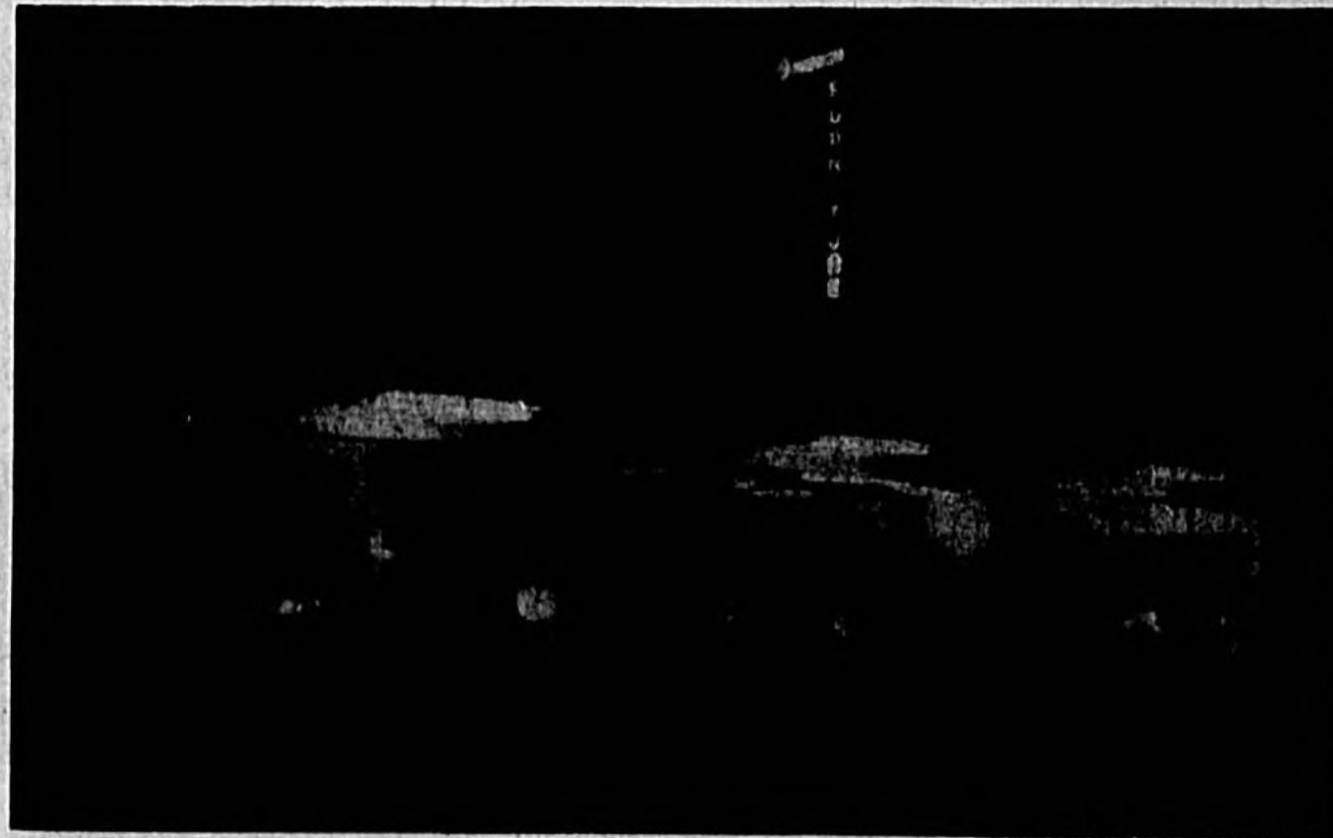

There is a well rounded program of prep activities provided by Seminole High School and in recent years they have become one of the powers in the tough Orange Belt Conference.

The local high school now offers football, basketball, baseball, golf, track, and swimming.

Athletic Director Fred Ganas heads up what has been called the finest coaching staff in the entire state. Jim Pigott, who came here three years ago from High Springs, has built the local school into a real football power and the ex-Florida athletes has brought the local school two bowl championships and two conference titles in his three years as head man. Pigott also serves as track coach during the spring.

In the past five years he has served as JV basketball coach and Allen came on to fill his shoes very well with a respectable .500 season.

The man who received the most recognition this year was Coach Bud Laver. For years SHS has been the dormat around the bas-

ketball loops but Laver and his squad changed all of that this season. His youngsters gave a large following of fans thrill after thrill as they continually won. They gave the school its finest record in history as they finished the season with a great 19-3 record and the OBC tournament championship. A fine winning tradition has been established at the local school and with a fine coaching staff to direct our youngsters, this should be just the beginning.

Sportsmen Unit Spearheads Conservation

The Seminole County Sportsmen's Association has worked hard for the past 10 years making hunting and fishing here the best in the state.

The main aims of the organization is to conserve wildlife and natural resources in the county and to aid law enforcement officers crackdown on illegal hunting and monkey fishing.

At the present, there are approximately 100 members in the local organization and a new membership drive is underway for 1960.

Last year the organization under the leadership of President Jack Wilber, helped set new hunting laws for the state when they sent delegates to the state convention.

Their action helped closed many lakes in the area to trolling fishing and the organization has help maintain and improve parks over the country.

Through its membership, the association has cited the necessity for maintaining stricter law enforcement measures to keep abundant the share of wildlife in the county.

They have alerted wildlife officers when hunters have laid traps for animals and have sent out notices to county fish camps to be on the alert for illegal fishing.

Another important job the association has is to keep the legislative delegation up on what measures to pass to insure more game fish in the county.

Two such bills were recently passed to make the black bass and snook game fish instead of commercial fish.

Drew Massee of Polk County was named president of the organization and promptly reported that his group has high hopes of obtaining a parimutuel license to conduct horse and harness racing.

New officers elected with Massee are Willard Grate, vice president; Dr. H. M. Zweig, secretary; Earl Higginbotham, treasurer; Directors are Randolph Matheny, Ralph Woodbury and James Benjamin.

The track plans major improvements with a new one half mile track complete with a modern grandstand and facilities. The new track will be built for both training and racing purposes.

According to racing officials,

more winners of the classic Hambletonian race, the acme of the sport, have been trained at Seminole than any other training track in the business.

Each morning from 7 a. m. on, there is a constant thunder of hooves around the track as the pacers and trotters are put through their training routines. This might consist of a jog around the nine oval for several laps. Or it might be an all out time trial.

The training program differs with each horse, and depends on his native ability, temperament, past performance and numerous other factors. But it is always a slow gradual process designed to work the horse up to his physical peak by the time the racing season begins at the northern tracks.

New System Aids Trolling Speed

Every outboard motor, no matter what its horsepower rating, is almost certain to be run frequently at trolling speeds, and at very slow rpm the fuel-air mixture entering the motor lacks the turbulence to keep it atomized, according to Bill Smale, division engineer at Evinrude Motors.

Slip Clutch Adds More Boat Power

The propeller slip-clutch, introduced on outboards some 35 years ago, but common to most motors only recently has finally won out over the shear pin, according to the Evinrude Boating Foundation. The important advantage of the slip-clutch to most boatmen is not that it eliminates a nuisance (which it does) but that it provides the means to power clear-of-dangerous reefs and shoal waters—places where a dead propeller resulting from a sheared pin, could lead to serious trouble.

On almost every outboard-powered planing hull there is a maximum economy range that occurs somewhere between the planing speed and the maximum speed of the boat, according to research by the Evinrude Boating Foundation.

A few runs with varied loads will normally allow the owner to determine with fair accuracy the speed at which his boat will get maximum economy in miles per gallon of fuel consumed.

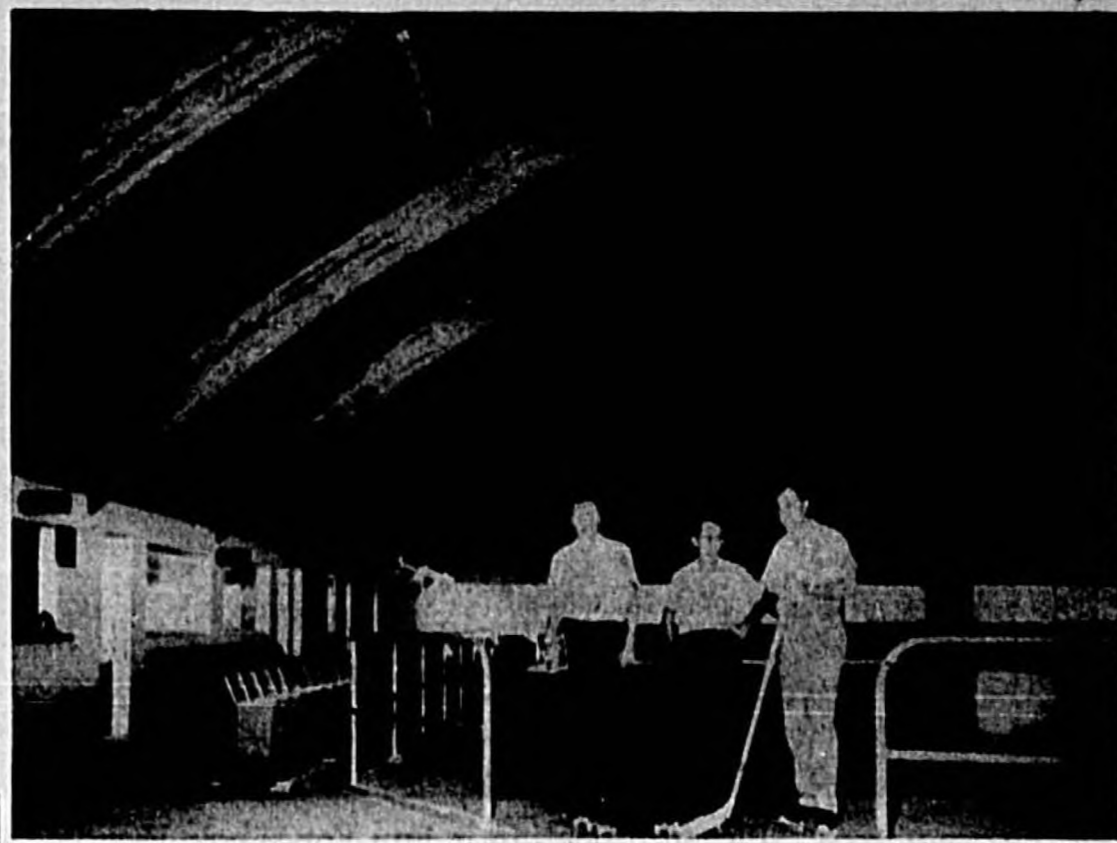
Interest in skating has been revived in the county, thanks to the new facility.

Skate City is located between Sanford and Orlando on Hwy. 17-92 on the dog track road.

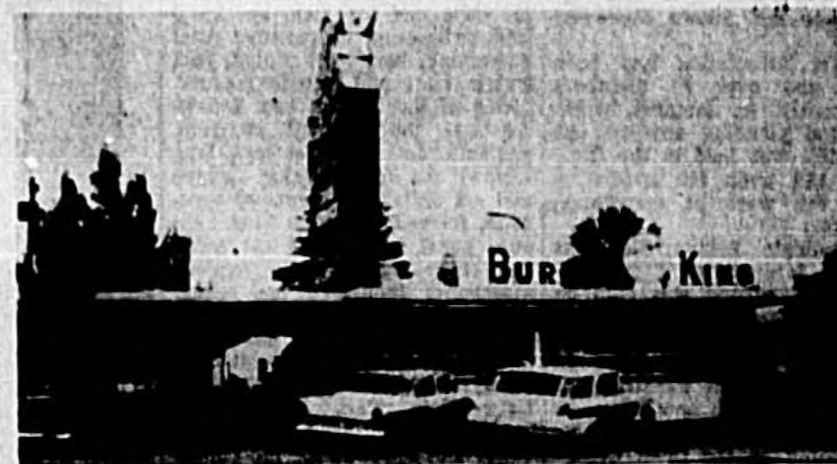

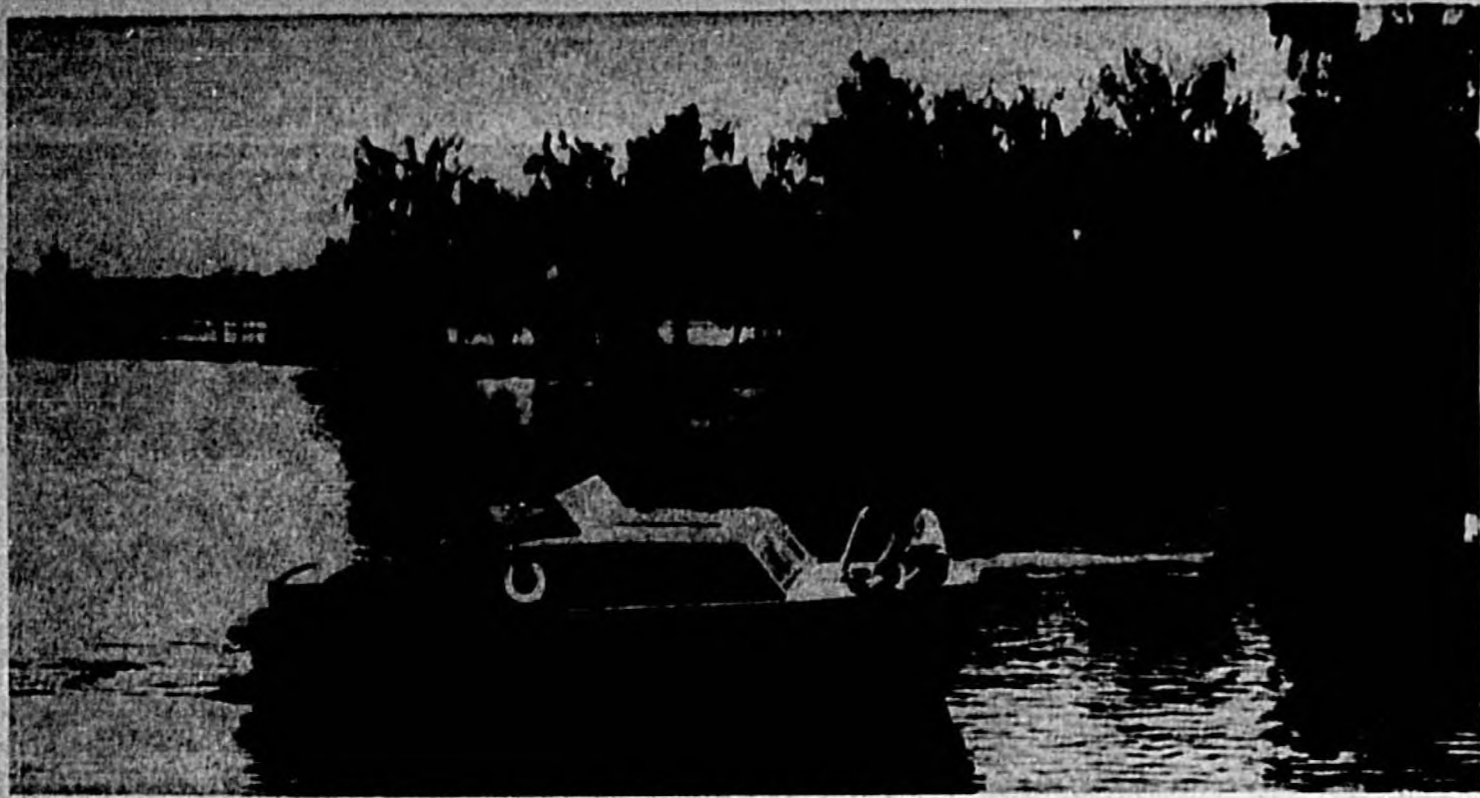

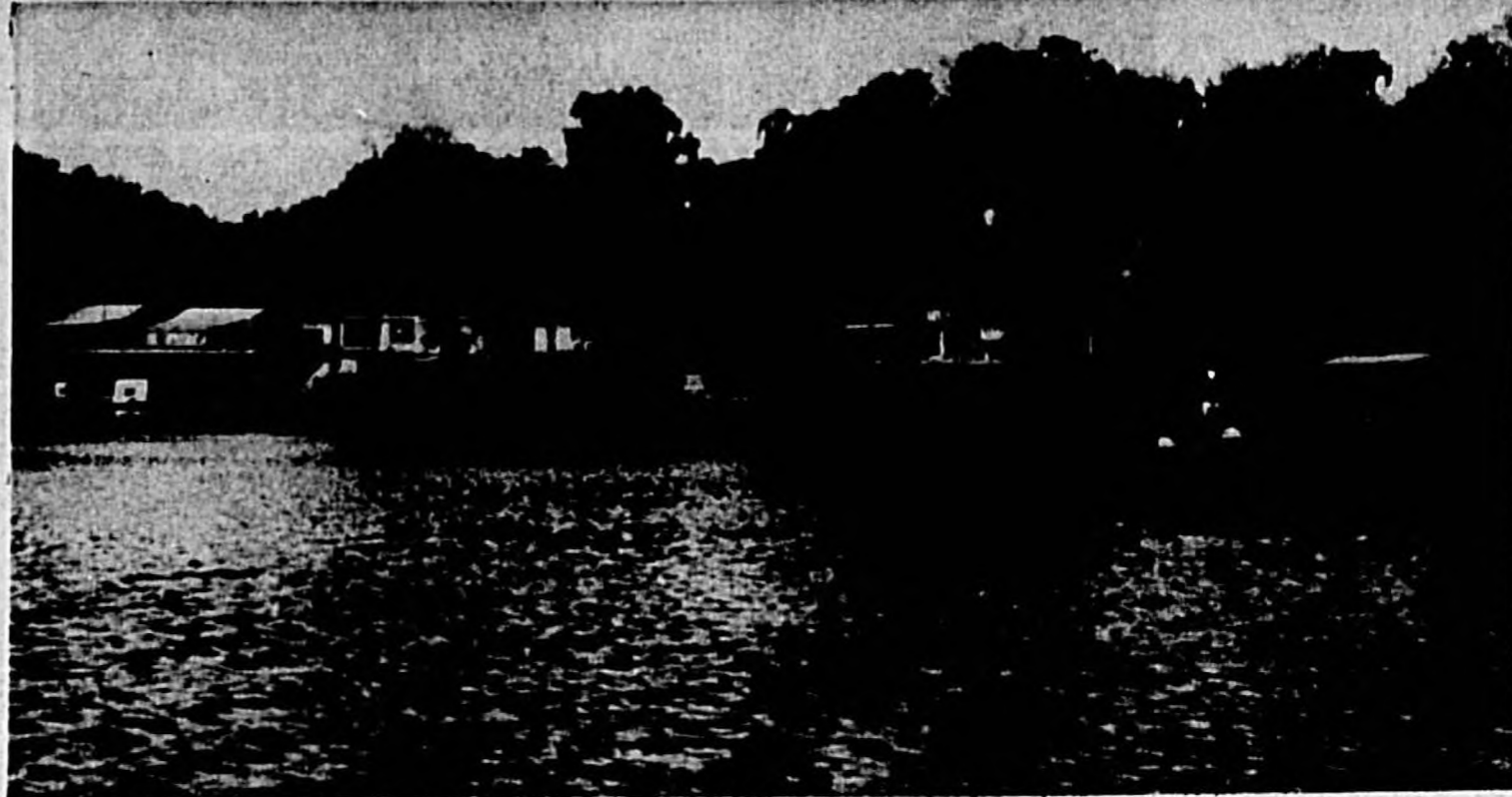

Department Continues To Expand Sanford's Recreation And Parks

The Recreation and Parks Department has continued to expand in services and facilities since its organization in June, 1938. At the present time there are nine clubs sponsored by the department including several new ones since last year's Midway report.

An Art Association has been formed and over 70 members meet weekly for lectures, workshops and planning sessions. An art exhibit was held in the Civic Center and over 700 spectators viewed the work of association members.

A Duplicate Bridge Club has just been formed and a good reception has started this club on the way towards being highly popular.

The older clubs continue to grow. The Starlight Promenaders Square Dance Club now has over 100 people dancing each Wednesday evening on the Civic Center patio or indoors in the Civic Center itself.

The Shuffleboard and Tourist Club is at its highest membership and has been host to tournaments drawing players from over 60 cities in Florida for competition on the local courts.

The youth wing of the Civic Center which is the haven for over 1,000 teen-agers, is the focal point of the youth program. Dances, ping pong tournaments, special event activities all are designed for the teen-age resident of our city.

New programs this year include a charm school, ballroom

dance instruction and tennis lessons. Some of the favorites from last year are baton twirling, bowling, youth concerts of the Florida Symphony, baseball leagues for boys, 8-16, basketball for boys and for men, synchronized swimming, competitive AAU swimming, horseback riding, golf, water skiing and softball leagues.

One of the biggest new activities was the baseball program. Six uniformed teams of boys, 8-12, formed the Little Major League and six uniformed teams of boys, 13-15, formed the Babe Ruth League. Local civic clubs sponsored the older league while Sanford merchants sponsored the younger league.

The parks division has completed the first of several proposed neighborhood playgrounds. Lake Gem Park has swings, merry-go-round, sand box, castle tower and see-saws for the youngsters, picnic tables and flowering shrubs for the family. All this is developed around a small lake.

A new junior size baseball diamond with lights and dugouts was completed in time for last summer's baseball program.

The zoo division has completed the last of the wooden cages for birds. This 3,000 dollar addition has added much to the zoo's appearance. Several thousand people are constant visitors to the City Zoo each weekend.

The plant employs 13 persons and hopes to expand in the near future. The company makes a high quality line of paint products for Florida climatic conditions.

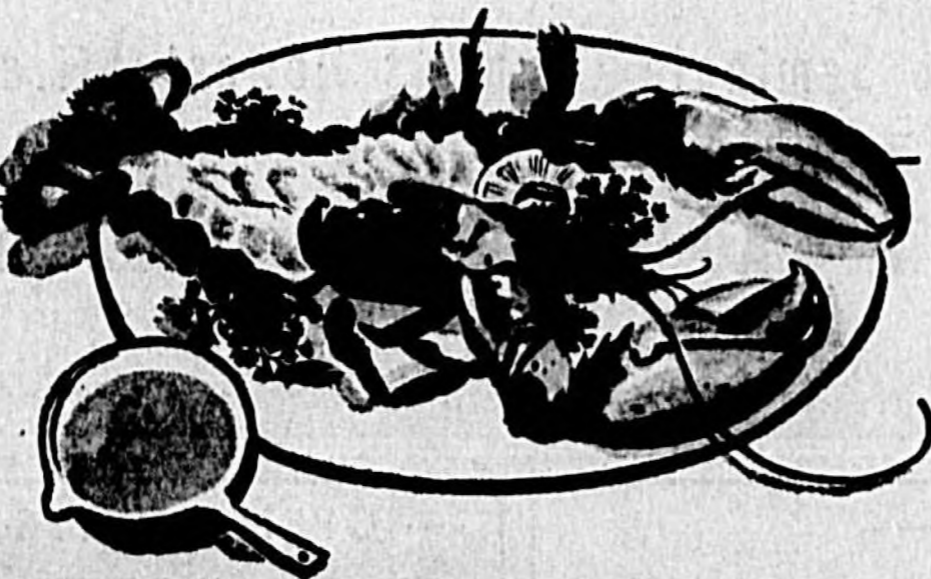

Sanford-Orlando Kennel Club today ranks as one of the most talked-about greyhound racing tracks in America after five years of operation by General Manager Jerry Collins and his associates, Jack Ledoux and Jack Collins.

The track presents 92-days of colorful racing action every winter, starting in December and lasting through March. During the season many of the nation's outstanding greyhounds show their speed during six nightly and three matinee programs each week.

Only five years ago, the Sanford-Orlando racing strip was just another track, handling a little over \$3 million through the mutuel windows and drawing about 75,000 fans.

But the SOKC has grown by leaps and bounds, along with fabulous Central Florida, under Collins operation. This season attendance jumped over 200,000 and mutuel handled soared to \$8 million for a gain almost tripling the former figures. This increase is recognized as among the most sensational in greyhound racing history.

In the past five years, the Sanford-Orlando racing plant has virtually been rebuilt at an expense of several hundred thousand dollars. The track's finest improvement is a \$135,000 Clubhouse built three years ago. Many new improvements are planned in the coming years and approximately 21 acres of new ground have been purchased to handle the expansion program.

This past season the Sanford-Orlando track was fortunate to boast the finest array of young greyhounds in the world. Wealthy, a young star owned by Orville Moses, was selected by the Greyhound Writers of America as the top juvenile performer in the nation.

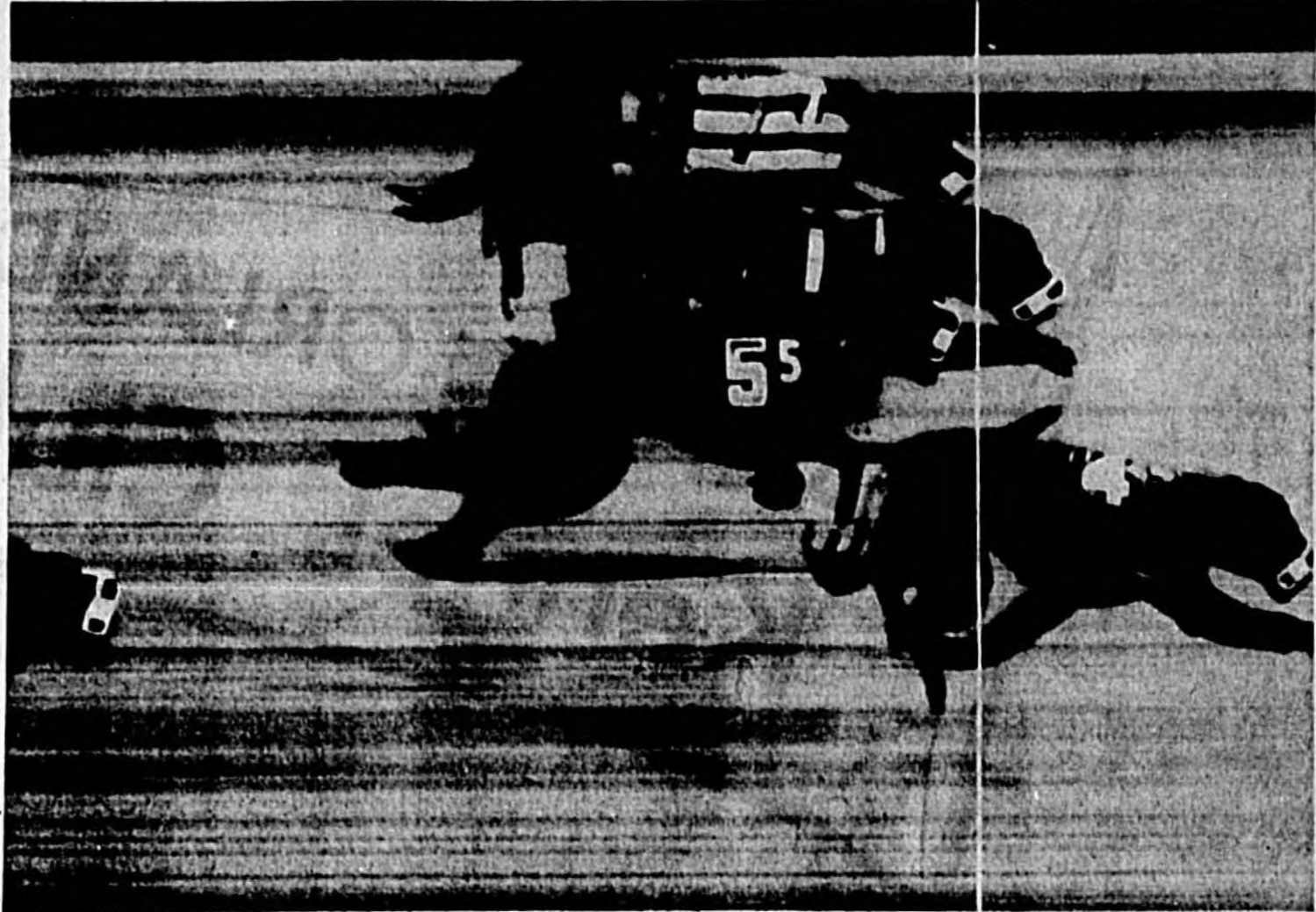
Andale, another Sanford-Orlando product, won the richest race in greyhound racing history, the \$50,000 Phoenix Futurity, on March 12, 1960. Mike Castellani's champion got his start this winter at the SOKC.

Five Sanford-Orlando greyhounds were among the eight landing in the finals of the rich race from among several hundred entries sent in from throughout the country.

Flah Rock and Rocky MacDuff, a holder of several national titles, recently swept a special home and home match race series with Sarasota stars in another of the many special features on the SOKC racing calendar.

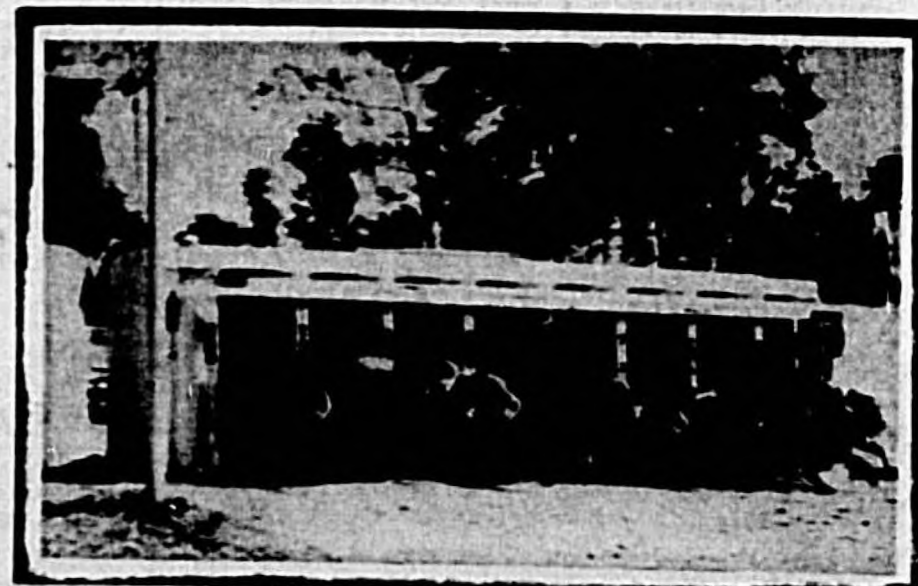

In the past, businesses were bearing the brunt of the taxes. Now, according to Krider, all that is reversed and "we have a high level of assessments and low millage."

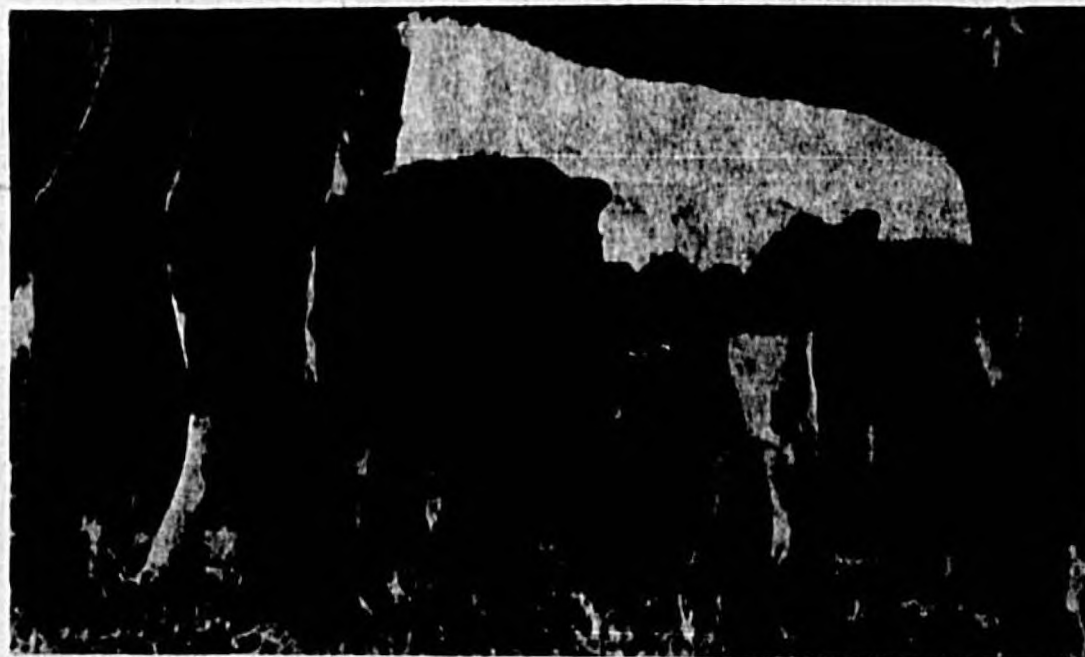
"It won't be long before all sections of the county will house new industry and structures," the Chamber of Commerce manager emphasized.

Seminole County is ranked 13th among Florida's 67 counties in the total of crops sold, with a value figure of \$12,559,260.

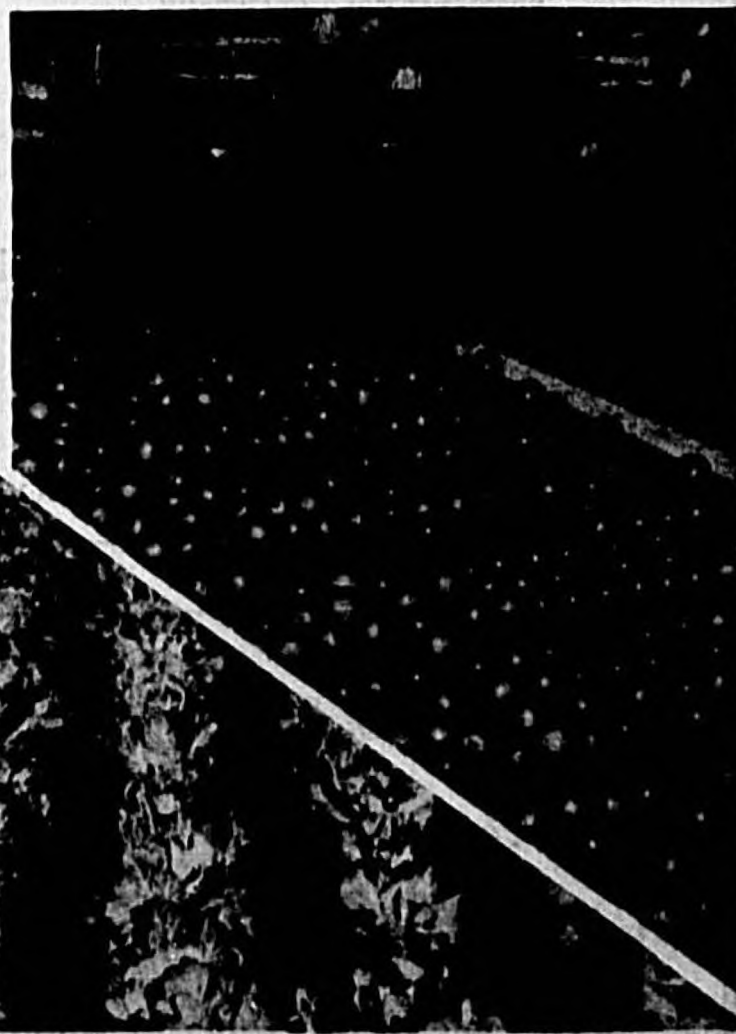
Agriculture in the county is big business. In spite of the fact that the county is small in land area, ranking 16th in the state, production is extensive and high in the field of agricultural production.

Not only does Seminole County receive recognition in the state for its production, but the census ranks it 11st in vegetable production and 87th in fruit production from the 3,069 counties in the U. S.

The total value of agricultural production in the county has increased during 1959 and these figures are based on reports from the end of 1958, County Agent Cecil Tucker emphasized.

The same surveys show that in 1958, the value of vegetable production was \$5,228,884; fruit and nuts, \$4,299,625; horticultural specialties, \$1,715,904 and field crops, \$15,526.

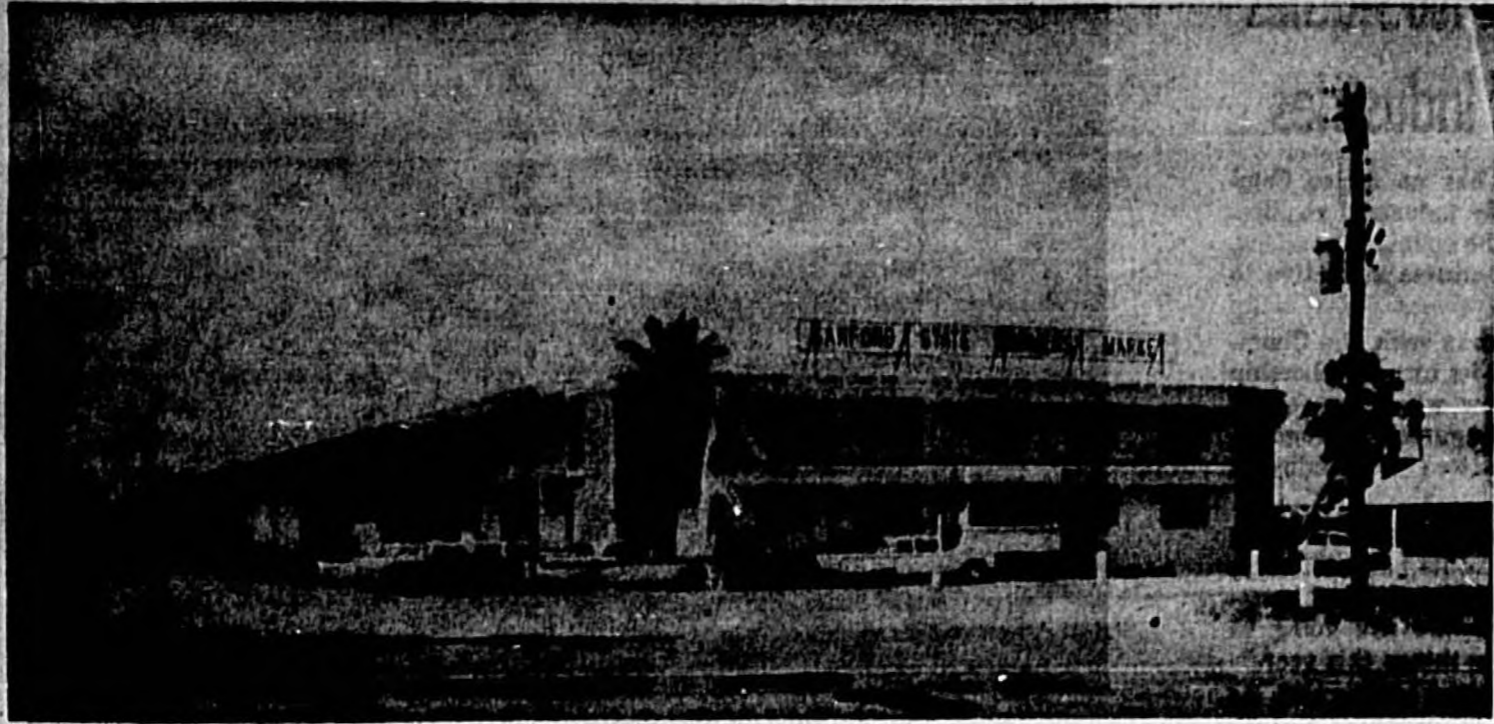
Livestock and livestock products totaled \$1,253,885 in 1958 and total forest products sold were worth \$17,365.

Beekeeping Proves 'Honey' For Funds

Investors looking for a "honey of a business" in which to plunk their excess funds might try beekeeping.

While relatively small, Seminole beekeeping is important not only for its financial return but because of its tremendous impact upon agriculture through the side effect of cross-pollination.

Honey production in Seminole exceeds 300,000 pounds, valued at more than \$30,000 a year. The Seminole area is unusual in the production of honey for it grows

a wide variety of honey-producing type plants and a favorable climate.

Dairy Outlook Good

The real estate situation in the Orlando milkshed area is causing many dairymen to look toward Seminole County and surrounding areas, according to County Agent Cecil Tucker II. Seminole County's good pastures should be another factor to bring dairy growth here, he added.

"Terminal market men took action to meet their problems more effectively by setting up machinery for a new terminal market division.

"Recognition of the problems and needs of the industry, and an easily apparent determination to move forward with unified effort to improve the competitive position of fresh fruits and vegetables, ran through all activities at the convention."

This action was taken to resolve any problems similar to the cranberry scare of 1959.

Citrus Output High

Seminole County placed eleventh in the ranking of the 35 citrus producing Florida counties in the 1957 State Plant Board census. This was figured from the total number of citrus trees in commercial groves. Seminole County is the fourth smallest county in land area in the state.

Robert Lee Is Outstanding Young Farmer

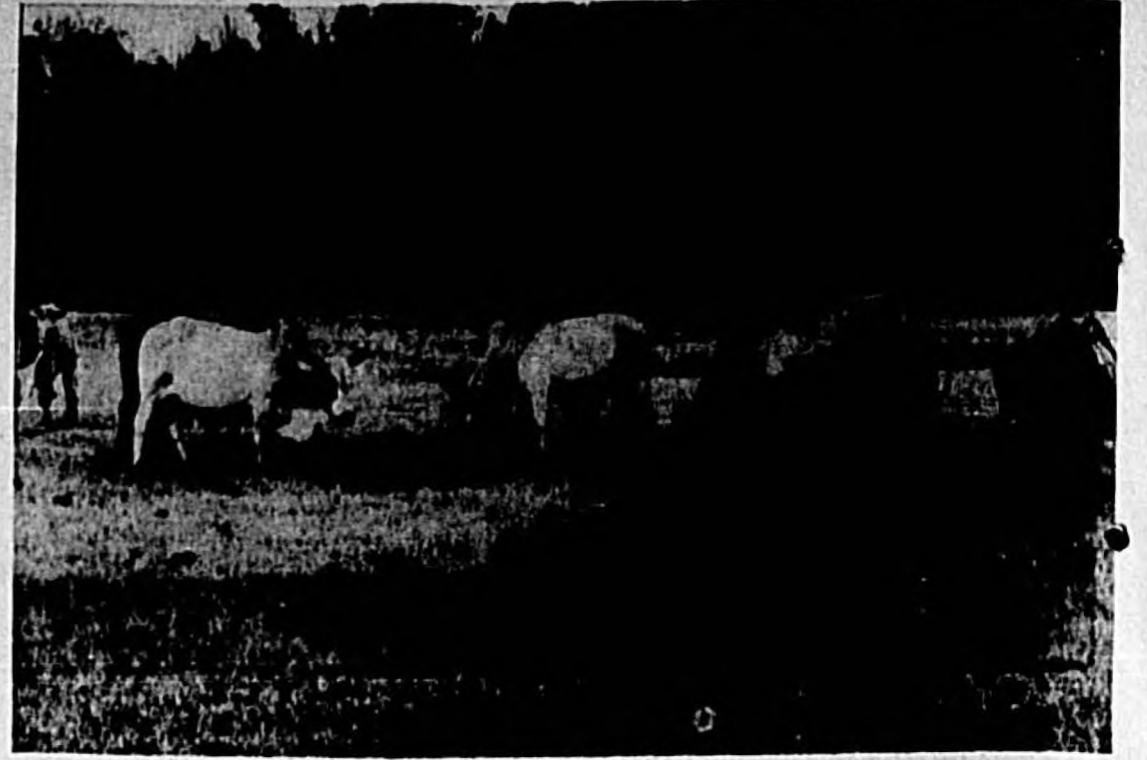
Robert Lee of Oviedo was named the outstanding young farmer of Seminole County for 1959 in the honor award selections by the Junior Chamber of Commerce.

Lee, a graduate of the University of Florida and president of the Seminole County Cattlemen's Assn., was presented a plaque at the Jaycee awards dinner and praised for his work in improving pastures, irrigation methods, progress with herds and with contributing to the promotion of the cattle industry in general.

The Lee family has cleared and improved more than 1,000 acres of land for pastures and more is being cleared in the east end of the county between Chuluota and the St. Johns River.

One of Lee's noteworthy accomplishments is the irrigation system which has been worked out with flow control gates which send water wherever it is needed on the pasture lands. Various grasses and clovers have been planted and Brahman and Angus bulls are used for breeding.

As head of the county cattlemen, Lee is working for a strong statewide organization to promote the industry. The Seminole County group was the first this year to pay its dues into the state association and has taken a stand in favor of hiring a highly qualified man to be full-time secretary of the statewide group.

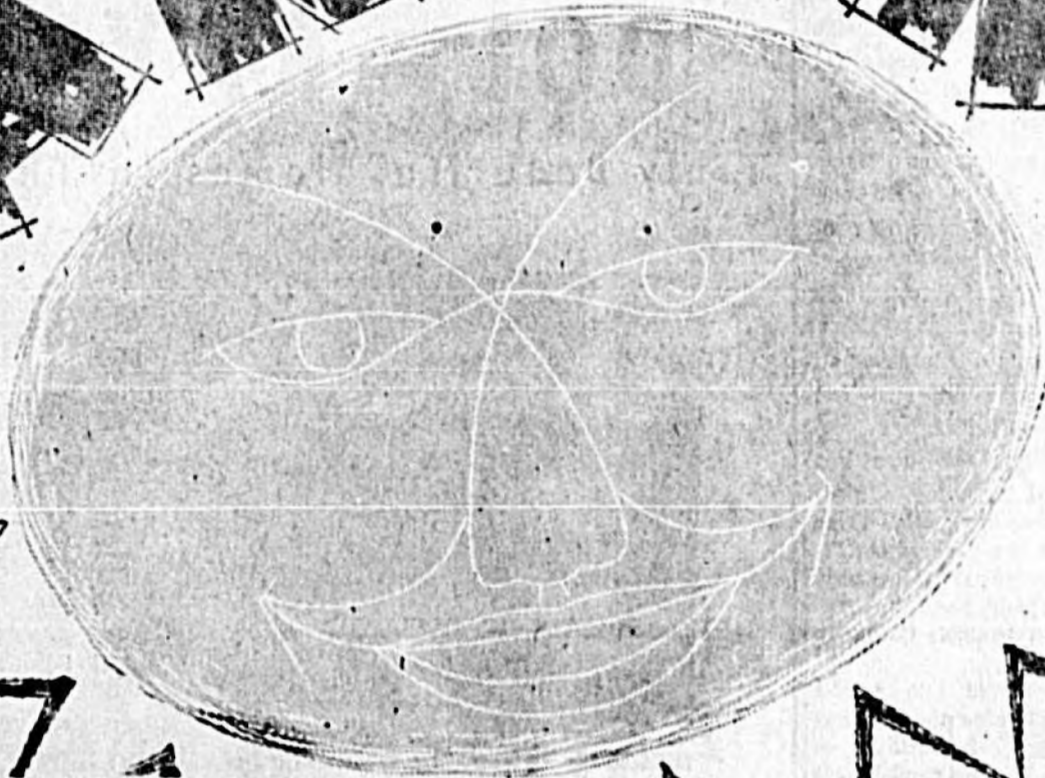

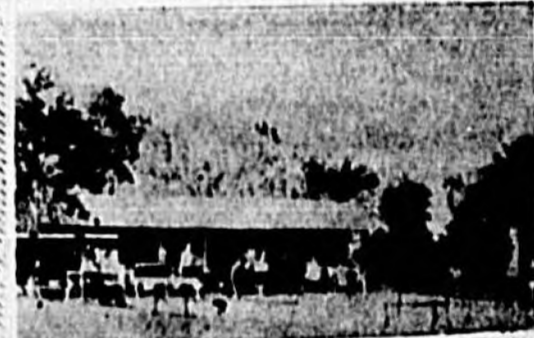

Dynatronics Expansion To Double Size Of Plant Building Designed And Built By Seminole Firm

Area Becoming Electronics Center With Plant Payrolls In Millions

It won't be long before Seminole County is a large-scale contributor to the electronics segment of the Space Age.

The county's largest electronics plant, Dynatronics, is now in the process of doubling its size, while Dearborn Electronics plans to start expanding its facilities by early summer.

Work started in February on a 20,000 square foot Dynatronics plant addition to cost \$148,000. It will be connected to the plant located on Hwy. 17-92.

The expansion means the firm will add another 160 employees to its present crew of 160.

Work being done at the plant consists of construction of space tracking electronics equipment.

Dynatronics projection is 650 employees in two and a half years and more than 1,000 in five years.

The new building and increase in personnel will give the plant a payroll of \$2 million per year.

Officials said the corporation has doubled in personnel and quadrupled its dollar volume in each of the last two years.

Dearborn Electronics Plant Manager Joseph Balvo reports the firm, located adjacent to Dynatronics, will double its size by early summer.

The planned 15,000 square feet addition to the plant will pave the way for employing 60 additional persons.

Dearborn manufactures capacitors for the electrical circuits and has a large research engineering division.

Another Seminole manufacturing plant, Johnson Electronics, helped put the first U. S. weather satellite into the sky; produced a transformer so small it made possible

manufacture of hearing aids that fit into ear pieces of glasses, and to make possible installation of transmitters, receivers and tape recorders in space satellites the size of a grapefruit.

The experience of the company in electronic research, development and manufacturing is impressive. It has done work in the fields of airborne communications systems, ground control system for aircraft, computers and radio and television equipment, inertial guidance and telemetry.

Among the customers of the Caselberry firm are Bell and Howell, Pan-American World Airways, Remington Rand, RCA, Hughes Aircraft, Redstone Arsenal and Westinghouse.

E. S. Johnson, president of Johnson Electronics, and his able staff constantly work at increasing the scope of the firm, and continued expansion is assured as the Space Age advances.

Florida leads the nation in the production of cabbage with more than one-quarter billion pounds produced annually.

Manufacturing Forging Forward

Manufacturing is taking rapid steps toward becoming a strong contender for the No. 1 industry rating in Seminole County.

Chamber of Commerce statistics show there are 29 principal manufacturing plants in the county producing products ranging from ice to sports shirts and with more than 2,000 persons on their payrolls.

Seminole plants turn out fish nets, concrete products, can conveyors, aluminum windows, boats, pajamas, shirts, fertilizers, brushes and electronic components.

Garment Plants Big Business

The "pajama game" is better than ever in Sanford.

Two of the largest plants in the county manufacture pajamas and sports shirts and both plan to expand in the near future.

The plants are the Pierro Manufacturing Co., located on E. Commercial Ave. and employing 65 persons, and the Sanford Manufacturing plant on W. First St. which employs 100 persons.

The Pierro company turns out all kinds of pajamas for men and boys, ladies and girls.

Its new building, constructed last year, contains 10,000 feet of floor space and more is expected to be added before the year is out.

Sanford Manufacturing has been expanding rapidly since the company came to Seminole County in 1935.

The firm moved into a new building in 1957 after the company began to outgrow its facilities on Sanford Ave. It now employs 100 persons and plans to increase its size by the end of the summer to employ an additional 100.

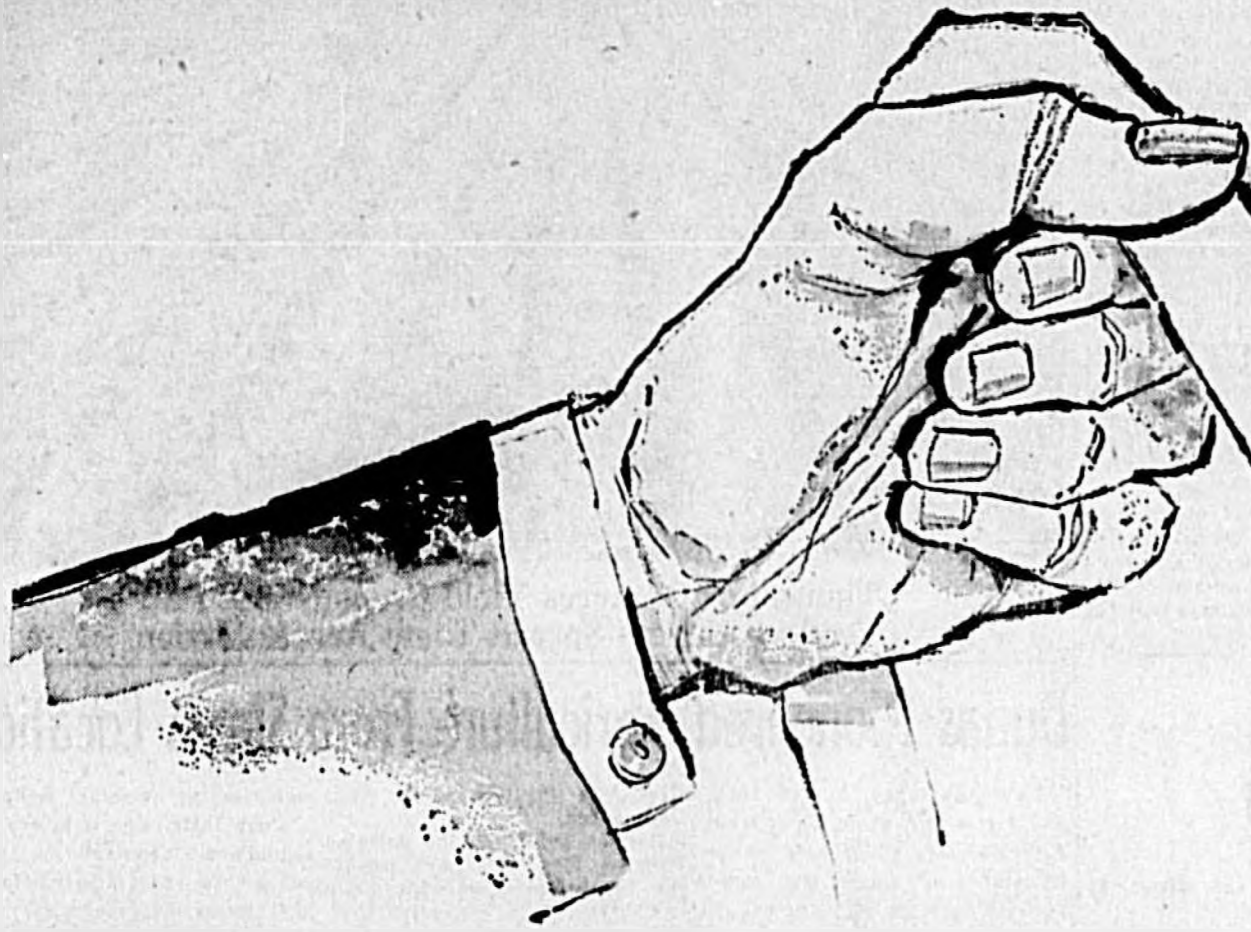

Seminole County is in the main an agricultural center. At present approximately 6,000 acres are in cultivation of vegetables; 13,000 are in improved pastures and over 15,000 acres are in citrus. There are 133,000 acres in commercial timberland, considerable commercial fishing and some mineral resources, including peat and mineral water.

Celery and cabbage are the principal crops, with corn, beans, cauliflower, lettuce, peppers, squash, eggplant, escarole and other vegetables making up the balance of truck crop acreage. Seminole County also produces fine citrus. Inspected shipments of oranges, grapefruit, and tangerines for the 1956-57 season from the county are 1,582,360 boxes. The Sanford State Farmers Market, third largest in Florida, handles produce and citrus sales each year amounting to over \$5,000,000.

Bulbs and ferns, flowers and nursery stock are raised on a commercial scale.

Trade in farm machinery, seeds, insecticides and fertilizer is an important adjunct to the agricultural industry of the county.

In Seminole County is located a frozen juice concentrate plant which also manufactures marmalades, jellies and other citrus delicacies, and converts citrus residual into cattle feed.

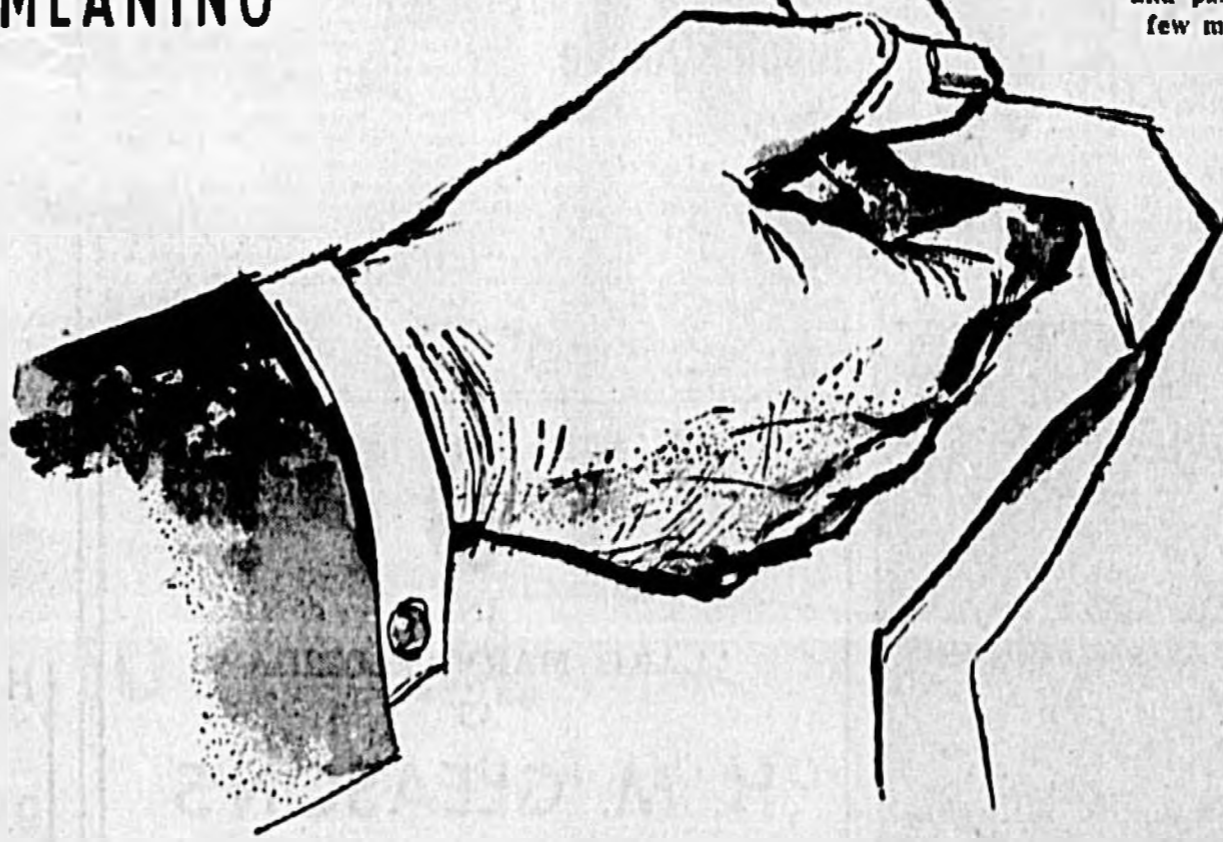
A number of small diversified manufacturing operations are now located in Seminole County. Included among these are: manufacturers of electronic components; aluminum jalousies, awnings and other items used in the building trade; metal hardening and processing plants, manufacturers of boats, sport shirts, gowns, pajamas, swim suits, insecticides, fertilizers, insecticide impregnated floorwax, concrete blocks, septic tanks and pipe, and a number of smaller miscellaneous manufacturing operations.

The Naval Air Station at Sanford is important to the economy of the county.

U. S. Highways 17 and 92, and Florida Highways 46, 415, 418, 419 and 426 enter the county. Rail service is provided by the Seaboard Airline Railroad and bus service is available by Greyhound Lines. A private airport is operated in the county, and plans are near complete for establishing a county-owned commercial airport. A large metropolitan airport, providing transcontinental freight and passenger service lies just a few miles outside the county.

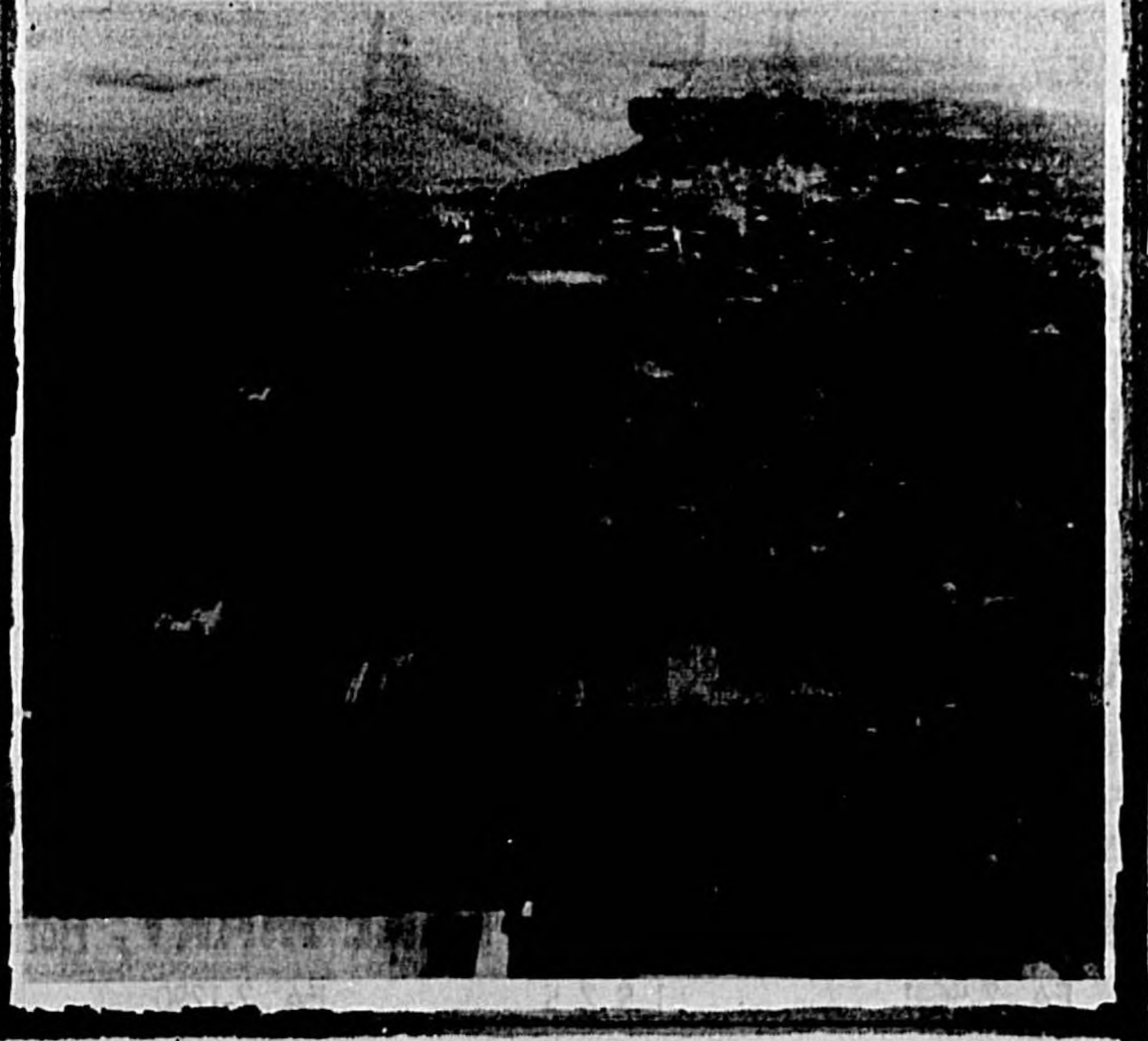

Chase & Co. Serves Markets From Sanford

Sanford's Chase and Co. just keeps on expanding.

The agriculture supplies company, which observed its 75th anniversary last year, is putting finishing touches on a new insecticide building. Machinery has just gone into the building which has more than 20,000 square feet for producing and storing insecticide.

Chase and Co. serves 350 markets in most of the U. S., in Canada and parts of Europe. Chase's citrus and vegetable production runs over two million packages yearly. The produce comes from more than 5,000 acres and brings a gross income of more than \$4½ million per year. Chase and Co. employs more than 900 persons.

Cabbage, celery, lettuce, escarole and cauliflower are the vegetable staples the company sells to northern customers. The firm sells about 750,000 packages of celery alone annually. Celery is still Chase's main vegetable commodity.

Chase vegetables come chiefly from the Sanford-Oviedo-Zellwood area, with celery also coming from Pahokee.

The company employs 200 persons in its citrus operation. The citrus industry at Chase includes growing, picking, packaging and marketing. Citrus production has always been a Chase mainstay except for a short time after the 1894

freeze. The company also markets peaches at Marshville, Ga.

Chase also supplies wholesale building materials to retail dealers in 11 counties. Cement, paints, brick, fencing, pipe, nails and roof-

ing materials are handled through the Sanford firm. Chase is the second oldest firm now in Sanford. Only Hill Lumber and Supply Co. now in its 87th

year, is older. Sydney and Joshua Chase founded the company in 1884. The firm packed the first trainload of celery to leave Sanford.

Sydney Chase's sons, Randall and Sydney, are president and vice president of the corporation.

Chase and Co. started out selling fire insurance, fertilizers and growers' supplies. The Florida State Bank now stands where the first Chase office rose.

The freeze of 1894-95 almost knocked out the Florida citrus industry. But Chase survived a low point in agricultural fortunes and received William R. Harney as a partner just before 1900. The company opened a Jacksonville office in 1904 and became incorporated in 1914.

Just before World War I the insurance business was sold so Chase could devote its full time to agricultural and growers' supply interests. Chase sold most of its citrus just before 1930 and marketed the rest through the Florida Citrus Exchange for the next five years. After that Chase resumed its own citrus marketing. The fertilizer and growers' supply business also developed during this period.

Randall Chase said in an anniversary statement: "Believing that honesty begets honesty, and trust begets trust, the personnel has created a way of business that has served well."

Girls 4-H Program Stresses Homemaking

The countywide girls' 4-H Club dress review April 29 will be only one of the varied activities staged each year by Seminole's Junior homemakers.

Girls from six Seminole County 4-H clubs will show their home-made finery at the review to find who wins a dress making short course in Tallahassee.

The 4-H girls put on a homemaking demonstration at the County Home Demonstration Council Center and took part in National 4-H Club Week March 5-12.

The 70 4-H girls in Seminole County are eligible for the 4-H camp in July if they complete their

homemaking projects and turn in their record books. This Seminole-Volusia 4-H camp is held each summer at Camp McQuarrie in Ocala National Forest. Both boys and girls from 4-H clubs attend the camp.

County girls' 4-H clubs are located in Lake Mary, Slavia, North Orlando, Sanford and Lake Brantley. Women supervise club activities under the leadership of the county home demonstration agent, Miss Myrtle Wilson. The girls meet in their leaders' homes.

The clubs are organized every year after school opens. Junior membership is for girls between

10-13 years old and senior status is for girls 14-21.

Paints, Plastics Supplies Ample

One of the major suppliers of paint and plastic products needs in Florida is the Peninsula Paint and Plastics Manufacturers, Inc., Sanford, which distributes its supplies throughout the state.

Located on the Old Orlando Highway, the firm was formed by businessmen who have wide experience in the paint and plastics business. It distributes through its own retail stores.

4-H Club Activity Flourishes In County; 218 Boys Enrolled

Four-H Club activity in Seminole County is flourishing, with approximately 290 projects carried out during 1939.

Last year there were 218 4-H members organized into eight clubs in the county, with 130 of the 218 completing requirements for the year.

The annual statistical report showed that 51 members came from farm homes, 86 from rural,

non-farm homes and about 81 from urban homes.

A study of the enrollment showed 52.7 percent of the members are in the first year of 4-H work; 23.7 percent in the second year; 14.7 percent in the third year; 4.1 percent in the fourth year; and 2.8 per cent in the fifth year or over.

Enrollment showed 13.3 percent of the boys in 4-H Club work in 1939 were 10 years old or under.

Projects for the year included participating in various club shows in the state and members represented the county at the annual 4-H short course at the University of Florida.

Dudas Pioneered Agriculture From Slavia Location

Many years ago, Andrew Duda and his family came south from Cleveland, O., and settled in the community of Slavia, just south of Oviedo in the southern end of Seminole County.

Using strong backs and keen minds, he and his three sons John, Andrew Jr., and Ferdinand, began to clear the rich mucklands for space to grow celery. From this small beginning, the company of A. Duda and Sons has grown into one of the largest and most modern farming operations in the state.

While they still farm a large acreage of muckland in the Slavia area, they have expanded to other areas of the state. They have beautiful farms in the Zellwood muckland area and in Belle

Glade on the shores of Lake Okeechobee.

Besides being in the farming business they also have one of the finest Brahman cattle herds in the country. Their prize stock are constantly bringing home blue ribbons from fairs all over the country. Their cattle ranch is located in the Cocoa area.

The administrative office and their shops are located in Slavia and all of their sales are handled from that point. Due to the vast spreading of their various operations in the state they have a twin-engine airplane ready at all times to carry them from Slavia to the different operations.

While the Dudas are well known for their great farming operations they also are well known for their invention of time-saving and

labor-saving farming equipment.

John Duda, who is in charge of equipment manufacturing, realized several years ago that to combat increasing labor costs a machine must be invented to speed up the old method of harvesting celery.

He went to work on the drawing boards and came up with a gigantic 16-wheel device that is now commonly known as a "Mule Train." This machine did away with the old method of "house packing" and now the celery is cut, washed, sized and graded, and packed right in the field on the machine.

The company has patented the machine and there are many celery growers all over the country using it with great success.

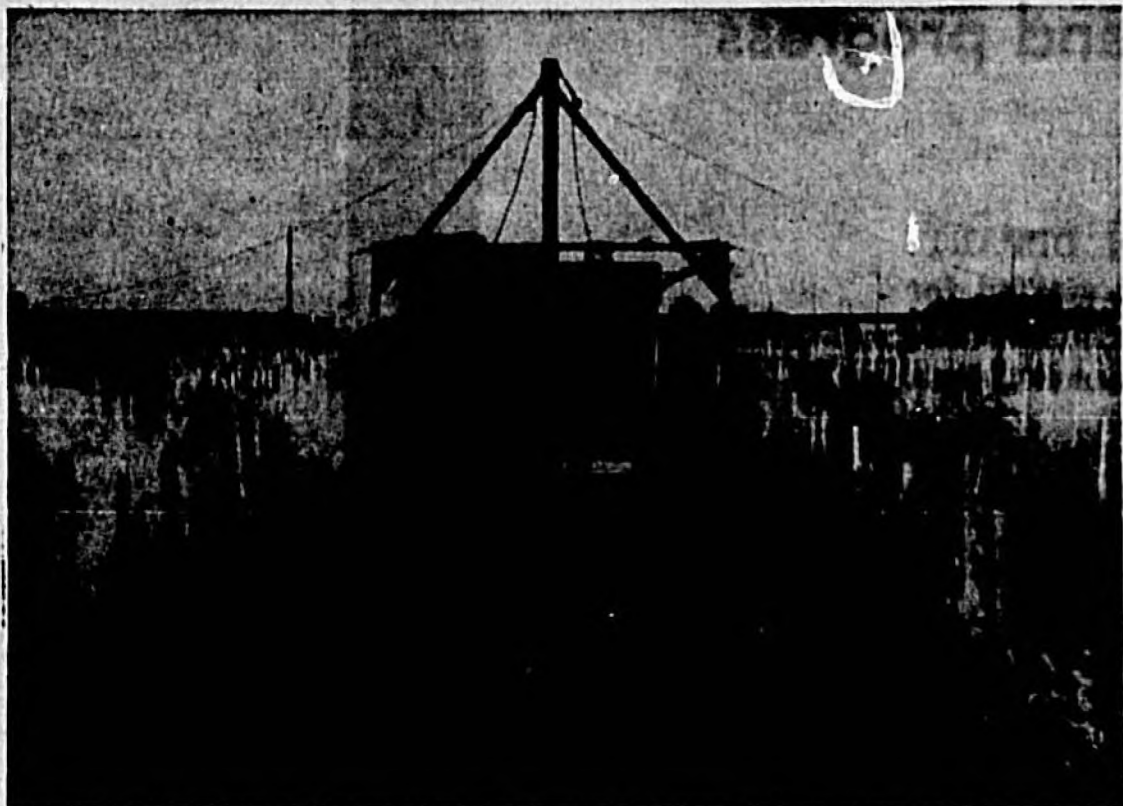

County Agent's Office Expects More Agricultural Activity During 1960

The Seminole County Agent's office is looking forward to one of its biggest years in 1960. Citrus and vegetable production is expected to increase over the preceding year and County Agent Cecil Tucker will be getting additional manpower for his program. Activity in the field of poultry husbandry is expected to pick up in 1960 as compared to previous years and Tucker is hoping to get an assistant with a varied background in poultry.

Probably the biggest program the county agent's office has undertaken in the past year has been eradication of the screw-worm fly. Since the initiation of this program by the state and federal governments, not a single case of screw-worms has been reported by Seminole County livestock producers.

In connection with the program, the agricultural agent joined efforts with the program information officer from Sebring to line up a number of public relations programs for the various groups in Sanford.

The Seminole County Cattle-men's Assn. has been active throughout 1959 and membership has almost doubled over the previous year.

The area's production in citrus and horticultural crops exceeds that of any other section of its size in the state and southeast. Tucker also said that poultry and dairy farming has gained in production in the county due to dairies moving out of the Orlando area.

The 1959 agent's annual report shows also giant gains in soil and water inventory projects.

The report shows that the county agents office dealt with problems as wide and varied as pipeline problems, re-evaluation of farm lands and drainage needs.

The report showed 3,295 personal contacts were made individually or through meetings by the agent in 1959.

The county agent's office gave assistance during the year in such varied fields as pasture production, farm equipment, forestry and 4-H club activities.

Growing Of Ferns Big Business In Seminole Area

Ferns for florists throughout the nation are grown in Seminole County.

Casselberry and Fern Park are the centers for three companies which grow the famous plumosa fern, the low plumosa being preferred by florists to larger ferns. The fern-growing business started in Seminole County in the late 1920's and the county is an ideal area for growing ferns, according to Casselberry Ferneries, Inc.'s Manager Paul Bates. Farther north it is too cold and farther south the plants often turn yellow.

Lath houses cover acres of ferns in Casselberry and Fern Park. The shelters give the necessary half shade, but due to the expense of lumber, Casselberry Ferneries is changing to natural tree shade which is better, according to Bates. Trees provide more protection against cold weather than sheds, he added.

Decorative plants are replacing many of Seminole's County's ferns, Bates said, but fern-growing has been a good business for the past 30 years.

Fern Park's Vaughan Fernery employs 85 persons. Its operations are strictly concerned with wholesale distribution. Vaughan now has several greenhouses growing decorative plants to complement its fern production. But Vaughan does not raise flowering plants.

This largest of Seminole County ferneries has fern production centers in Altamonte Springs and Oviedo, as well as Fern Park, utilizing a total of 30 acres.

The rapidly expanding market for decorative plants has owner Earl Vaughan keeping 10 acres of nursery stock under shade. The stock supplies the cuttings from which new plants are grown in the greenhouses.

The greenhouses cover two acres. No matter what the weather outside, temperature and humidity inside the glass houses is always constant. German-grown peat moss is used as a bed for the young plants.

To supply customers, Vaughan also maintains greenhouses in North Carolina. A truck and semi-trailer carries plants to the companies northern depots. Vaughan greenery goes to Virginia, West Virginia, North and South Carolina, Tennessee, Georgia, Alabama, and Mississippi. Mail-



No Let Up Seen In Seminole Growth As County Gets Up Steam For Future

There are more businesses, more people and more activity of all kinds this year in Seminole County than ever before, and the county is getting ready for even greater expansion.

The county government, presided over by the Board of County Commissioners, made some impressive changes during 1959 and is making plans to handle the business of a population expected to reach 150,000 in a few years.

Completed at year's end was a county-wide property revaluation for assessment of taxes which added millions of dollars to the tax roll and left the county with the lowest tax levy in Florida—11 mills. This was designed to spread the tax burden more equitably.

Expansion of county operations include plans for the biggest road improvement program ever, improvements to the courthouse, a new \$100,000 health center, a big Memorial Hospital expansion, a new jail, a survey of the needs for improvement or building of a new county home for the aged and indigent, and a big school construction program.

Comprehensive zoning has been adopted on a countywide basis for the first time and a series of public meetings scheduled to explain the program to residents of each district of the county.

This zoning plan protects restricted residential areas and allows prospective commercial or industrial site purchasers to get an exact picture of how property is classified.

Building permit values in the county during 1958 and 1959 were in excess of \$34 million, with an increase of \$7 million in 1959 for a total of \$20,588,074 that year alone. Building included more than 3,000 new homes.

County population is now more than 52,000 and Seminole is listed as fifth in growth and eighth in population density per square mile in Florida. Two telephone companies had 3,750 phones in 1950—now they list 15,600 customers.

Fortunately, Seminole County has room to grow at a rapid rate and still remain the tropical location of comfortable living which first attracted people to the state.

Employment Gains Keep Pace With County Growth

More people were engaged in non-farm jobs as 1959 ended than ever before in Seminole County, according to Dan Hahn, manager of the state employment service.

While the December record level was largely the result of seasonal influences, substantial growth in the region's economy was also strongly evident.

Hahn said his office made 276 more placements in 1959 than in 1958.

Hahn pointed out that the trend in December rose to 41.0 hours—boosting employment in the county an increase of 0.4 over the previous month and 1.1 hours over the same month in 1958.

The biggest employment gains in the county were noted in the manufacturing and construction industries. Hahn said agricultural

employment remained steady throughout 1959. The average factory work week

of \$1.66 indicated a two-cent increase over November and a four-cent rise over December 1958. Transportation companies in the county added workers as freight and holiday passenger traffic increased. Gains in school employment were also noted.

Chamber Spreads Word On County Progress

The Seminole County Chamber of Commerce is looking forward to one of the biggest years in its history.

Working closely with the Committee of 100, the Chamber is hoping to bring many new industries here during the year and is looking forward to December when the \$7 million tourist attraction, Okeahoe, opens.

Circusland construction is expected to start in May and will employ from 1,000-1,200 persons, 90 per cent of them from the county.

The giant tourist attraction will be located on Hwy. 17-92 near the Movieland Drive-in.

The Chamber has just completed one of its most successful years, according to Manager John Krieger.

During 1959, the Chamber coordinated all contacts for Dynatronics and Dearborn Electronics to locate here. The two plants are now planning expansion moves which will necessitate the employment of 800 additional persons.

Other industries that relocated here in 1959 were the York Manufacturing Co., Pizzo Manufacturing Co. and Nohl Bottling plant.

Chamber activities during the year included joint participation in Navy Appreciation Day and other naval events.

In publicity work, the Chamber furnished brochures for the Day of Information booth, Central Florida Exposition, Florida Development Commission welcome stations at Millard, Yulee, and Panama and to various chambers and northern automobile clubs.

The C of C published new maps for Sanford and Seminole County, furnished pictures and materials for magazine and newspaper articles and informative books on Florida and arranged for a Seminole County display at the Central Florida Fair.

The Chamber organized the retail merchants division to promote retail trade in the county and handled all merchant polls, contacts with individual merchants and mailing to merchants for the group. The organization also solicited funds for the annual Christmas parade.

The Chamber also did its share

to help road work in the area. Members met with Lake County officials regarding improvements to SR 46 and met with SRD

Board Chairman J. Rolfe Davis, to discuss primary roads for the county including a new Okeahoe Bridge, four-laning of Geneva

Ave., and improvements and realignment of SR 436 from Altamonte Springs to the Orange County line.

Oviedo Busy Expanding Schools, Civic Services

Oviedo is getting its share of Seminole County growth.

This year, park and pool, sanitation and street committees were appointed by the city council and plans made to extend Oviedo civic services.

Oviedo High is getting seven new classrooms, an administrative suite and cafeteria. Oviedo Elementary will have three new classrooms, an administrative suite, library and cafeteria. The combined cost of these projects is \$681,000.

Oviedo's population now numbers more than 2,000, an increase of about 600 in the past year. The town in southeast Seminole County has access to nearby citrus groves, cattle ranches and vegetable farms and in its most shaded homes.

City council has started a move to number town residences. The city physician, Dr. E. W. Steiner, is planning to take over the Oviedo clinic, expand it, and get another doctor to help him.

The Oviedo postoffice moved to a new site recently. It will get new equipment, including 800 new letter boxes and a new counter.

Last year city council had maps made of Oviedo, and voted to

charge \$100 for trailer park licenses and a \$10 per year fee to park a trailer inside the city limits. The council also moved to have dogs in Oviedo inoculated against rabies.

In other actions of 1959, the council donated five acres to Oviedo's First Methodist Church for cemetery use, placed Constable George Kelley on social security and adopted a \$60,000 budget. Principal budget income is from cigarette, utility and pool and personal city property taxes.

Oviedo is governed by a mayor and five councilmen. The city boasts two lakes within its limits and 16 miles long Lake Joseph nearby. The First Baptist and First Methodist churches of Oviedo are open to worship.

Oviedo's Southeast Seminole Chamber of Commerce welcomes new residents and preclaims the town's virtues.

Rich meadows surrounding the town yield deep green fields of famed Seminole County celery. Atlantic Coast Line railroad cars carry produce from the area all over the nation.

A volunteer fire department protects homeowners.

There is good fishing in nearby lakes and the city maintains a swimming pool.

County's Road Department Is Well Equipped

The Seminole Road Department, embarking on its greatest road improvement program in the county's history, will have plenty of equipment to carry on the work.

County Engineer Robert Davis reported that four large dump trucks were purchased in 1958 and the county commission recently approved the purchase of two additional pickup trucks.

With these purchases, Davis estimates that many county roads that needed paving and were side-tracked because of lack of equipment will be done this year.

Road work in the county got another boost early this year when the department purchased a loader and mixer at a total cost of \$28,000.

Other equipment used by the road department are a sand spreader and tamping machine.

The road department also plans to buy a dragline in the near future, and Davis was authorized recently to purchase a spray machine to carry on a weed control program.

Cost of the county's giant road improvement program, which will include paving and resurfacing, will be approximately \$200,000.

Education Prime Seminole Feature

The school system in Sanford includes all grades through the 12th year, and a vocational school which offers both day and night classes. There is no charge for tuition. Hot lunches are served in all school cafeterias, and buses transport children who live in out-lying areas.

A parochial school established by All Souls Catholic Church includes kindergartens through the ninth grade. Bus service is provided. A school operated by the Seventh Day Adventist Church includes first through the eighth grade. There are a number of private kindergartens and nursery schools. Day nurseries are operated by competent and reliable persons.

'Community Service' Is Byword In Chuluota

Community service is the byword in unincorporated Chuluota.

There are approximately 1,600 persons in the southwest Seminole County community and about 600 are members of the Chuluota Community Club which is the closest thing to town government.

Besides the Community and Teenage clubs, Chuluota also has a Women's Club, Retirees Club and a newly organized Sportsmen's Club. There also is a Baptist Church and a non-sectarian Community Church.

Community Club dues are \$5 a year.

Recreation is a prime facet of Chuluota life and the Community Club has authorized installation of shuffleboard and horseshoe facilities at the club house and

purchased more than \$1,200 worth of children's playground equipment.

The Community Club and the Youth Club also are trying to obtain a baseball field with hopes residents will start a Little League and an Adult League.

In other civic activities, the Women's Club has a "friendly file" fund to help Chuluota's needy. Led by Mrs. Virginia Chadwick and Mrs. Joe Armstrong, Chuluota ladies collected about \$200 for the United Fund in October and November.

Chuluota enjoys the charm and quiet of a rural community but is connected directly with more populous Sanford and Orange county towns via SR 419.

Midst tall palms, new homes

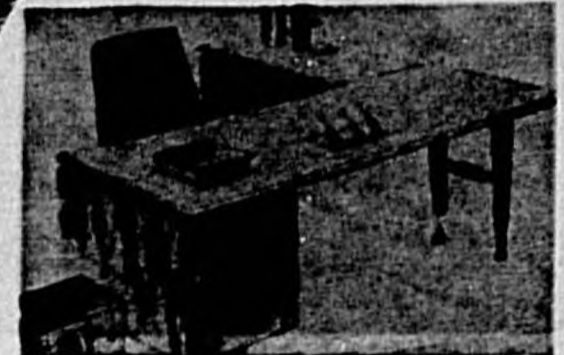
are dotted around Lake Catherine, Mills and Horseshoe Lakes. The community site covers a 2 1/2 square mile area, and Chuluota developers have about 11 square miles over which to expand. Plans already are underway for development of two divisions.

The county levies the only taxes, but Chuluota has its own water supply and some areas have sewage systems.

Sanford's Fort Mellon Park has a recreation building for card parties and games, an outdoor tennis court, a 150,000 gallon, 100-foot long swimming pool and a supervised children's playground.

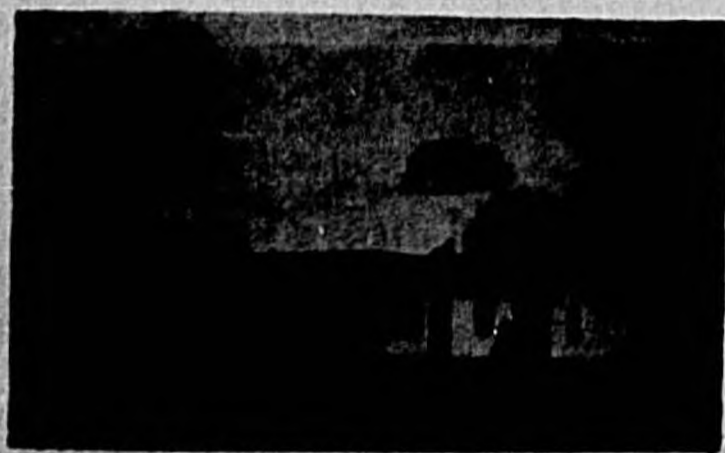
Greyhound Bus Lines maintains a terminal here and Sanford Trailways is establishing additional express and local service.

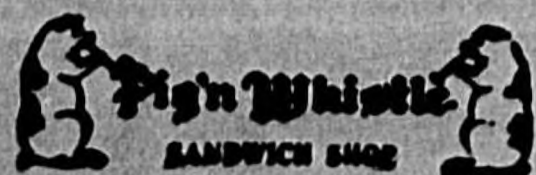

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Chuluota Recreation Centers Around Lake
Plans Call For Beach Development

North Orlando County's Newest Town

A whole new town spring up in Seminole County in 1959 when North Orlando was incorporated. Just a few miles south of Sanford, the 187-home village was incorporated by the state legislature June 20, 1959. Located in the middle of Seminole County, North Orlando has 3,620 acres within its limits.

Individual developers build on land bought from the North Orlando Co. The village has its own water and sewage systems. Right now a group of 36 more homes is being completed. Master Builders Inc. built the first 187 houses.

Miami and Ft. Lauderdale developer Perry Willets recently bought 500 lots and is putting up 244 homes in the \$10,000 price range. Mayor Roy Liddicott said that the greatest problem with this new development will be meeting the need for schools. However, a new school will be ready by fall in neighboring Longwood. This fourth addition to North Orlando will be near the SR 684 and 419 intersections.

Land north of Edgemont Ave. is being cleared for recreation. Men of the town have asked the North Orlando Co. about having Little League and Babe Ruth League baseball play this spring. This site may answer the need, since, according to councilman

Frank Fasula, it eventually will have a baseball-softball diamond, tennis courts and shuffleboard alleys.

Plans are being discussed for establishment of a day nursery, grocery store, a post office sub-station and laundromat in the village limits. A refuse collection service has been contracted.

Memorial Hospital Planning \$500,000 Expansion Next Fall

Work on a \$500,000 addition to Seminole Memorial Hospital is expected to start in the fall, giving the hospital 30 additional beds.

Sanford architect John Durkin reported recently he is working on preliminary plans for the addition.

Money for the addition will come from the federal government Hill-Burton Act matching funds.

A. B. Peterson Sr., chairman of the hospital's board of trustees, emphasized the hospital's financial condition is such that the expansion program can be initiated without cost to the citizens of the county.

Members of the governing council are Mayor Liddicott and councilmen Frank Fasula, Joe Jackson, Reginald Webster and Dominic Terebo. Fasula also is fire and police chief.

Women of the area have formed a garden club and other social and civic activities are getting started.

Peterson said the board of trustees does not contemplate any requests for additional county bond issues or indulge in any financial campaigns to produce the amount of money needed to match federal funds in financing the program.

The expansion also will provide for additions to the X-ray and laboratory departments.

The current hospital budget is \$693,840 and contributions are expected to total \$5,000. Anticipated revenue is expected to be \$285,400 plus \$34,000 from tax receipts.

Longwood Is A Town Really On The Go



Longwood Mayor Lormann Deposits \$70,000 Check For Bond Issue, Councilman R. C. Carlson Looks On



Dignified Longwood Hotel Attracts Visitors For Quiet, Comfortable Winter Vacations

Longwood is on the go, an annual checkup shows.

The south Seminole town of just over 1,400 population had \$611,646 worth of building and two acts passed by the legislature last year.

A nationally known ice machine company is looking at Longwood as a possible factory site and the Jaycees put up a new civic building in January.

Mayor A. R. Lormann reported that developers are selling their buildings as fast as they put them up.

The state approved alternating the terms of councilmen and permitted an act letting Longwood extend its limits by annexation.

A fire marshal was appointed during the year to command the reorganized fire department. The volunteer firemen have weekly drills and mutual aid agreements with Casselberry and Altamonte Springs departments.

The Town Council authorized a cemetery and named two of its members to supervise maintenance and sale of the plots. In the water department, service increased 25 percent and 122 water meters were installed.

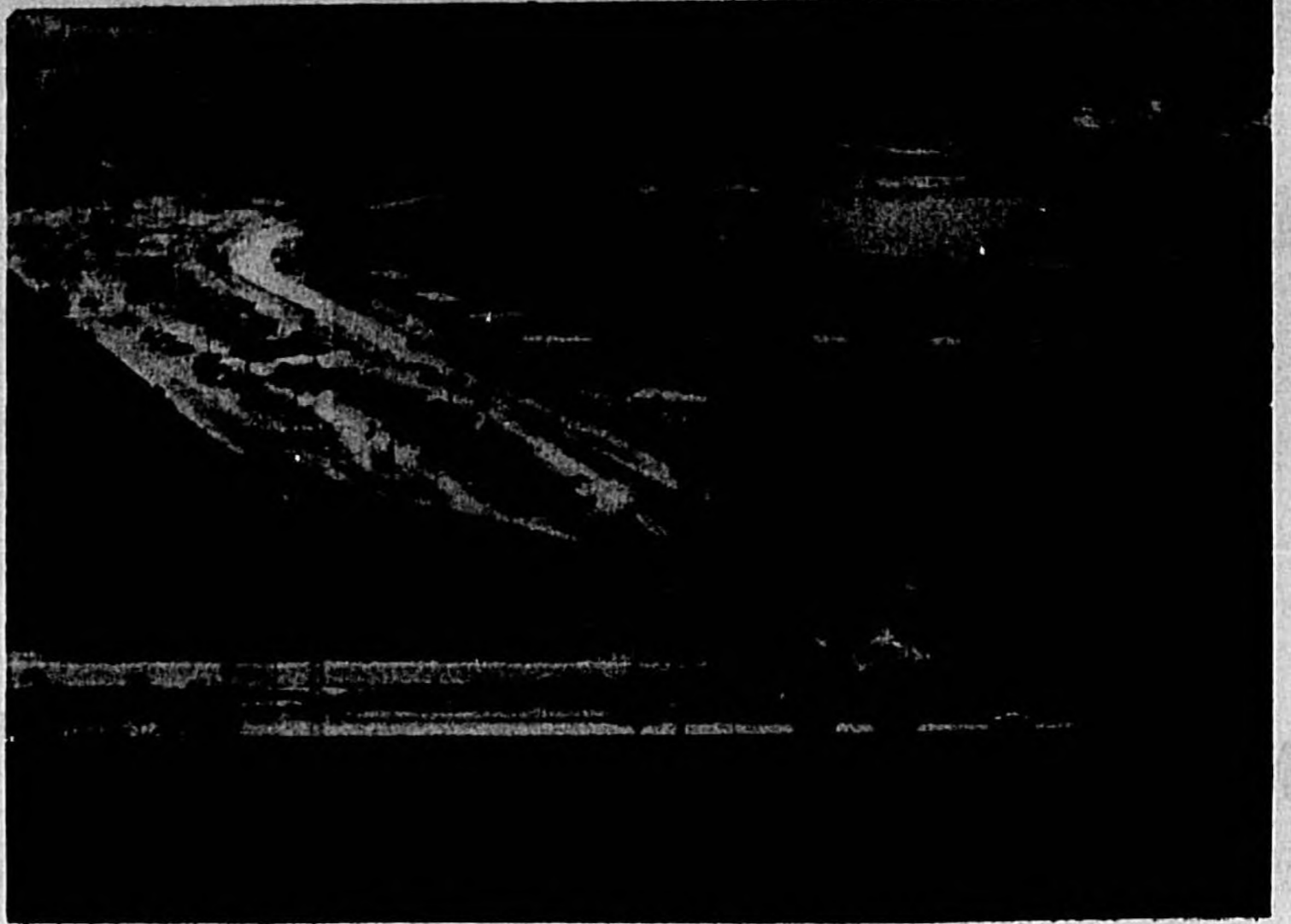
The machinery for a \$70,000 bond issue was started last year and the issue was approved by the circuit court in January. The issue was sold in February. The bonds were issued to pay for paving three streets and to extend the town water system. The paving covers Grant St. from Wildmere to George Ave., Palmetto St. from E. Lake Ave. to Grant Ave. and Wilma St. from Markham Rd. to Molnar Ave. The council also negotiated to give one refuse collection service the exclusive right to collect refuse in Longwood.

Working in their spare time, the Longwood Jaycees built a cement block youth center on Grant St. The center will provide facilities for youth dances as well as for Jaycee activities.

Longwood has more than 1,900 acres within its limits. Lyman School serving that area is the largest in Seminole County. More than 1,600 children are enrolled in Lyman's grades 1-12. A new Longwood elementary school will be ready by fall. A new town medical center was finished last year.

Longwood's churches include Christ's Church, Episcopal; First Baptist Church, First Pentecostal Church and the Church of Christ. The last two were built recently and the first two have made new additions.

Besides the chamber of commerce and Jaycees, Longwood's civic organizations include the Civic League, the Home Demonstration Club and Tourist Club.

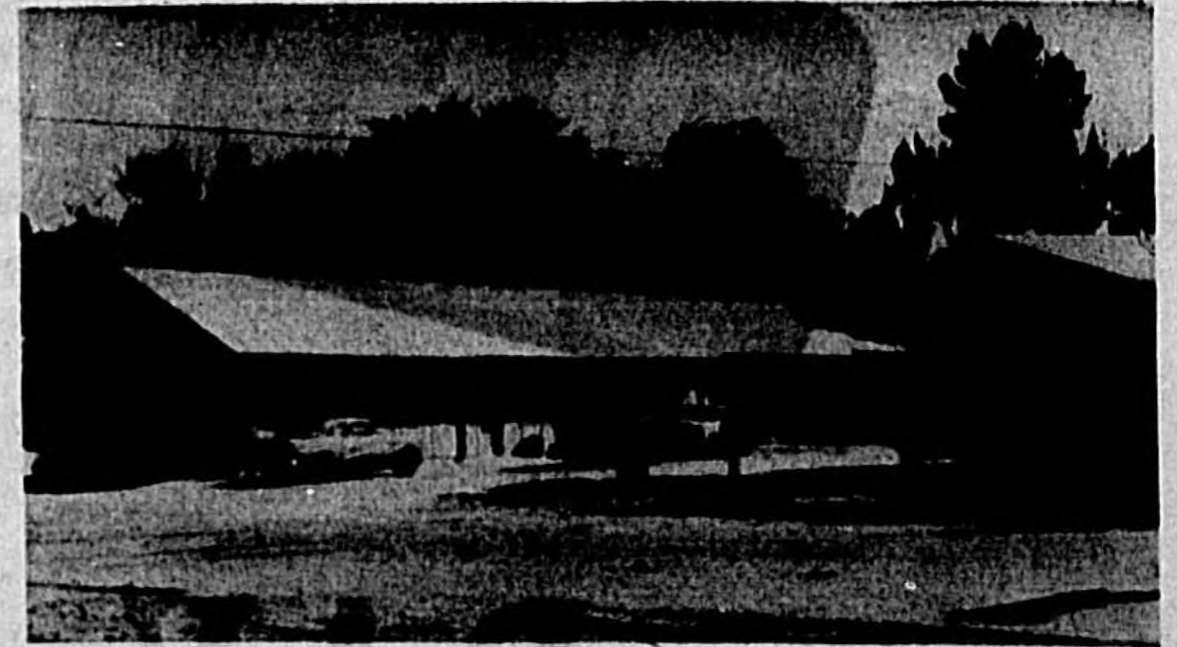

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Lake Mary Is One Of Busiest Communities

Lake Mary, one of the nearest large communities on the outskirts of Sanford, has grown by leaps and bounds in the past year and now is considering becoming incorporated itself.

Its growth for the past year included such achievements as the building of a local fire house with all volunteer labor; cultivation of a Boy Scout Park and a modern Boy Scout Hut, built and furnished by local effort; a modern new store building in the center of town which is occupied at present with a restaurant and drug store combined, a real estate office and TV-Radio Repair Service.

Work on the new Lake Mary elementary school is progressing rapidly and it will be ready for use before the next school term begins.

Road improvements were started in 1958 and several city streets have been semi-hard surfaced as well as the old main road from Lake Mary to Longwood. Many new homes have been built in and all around Lake Mary. Plans have been made for a new building development just a few blocks from town and on the way to Sanford. This will include 225 new homes all with lake front privileges to be built around Crystal Lake.

Last year saw the completion of a new wing on the Lake Mary Baptist church which includes three Sunday school rooms and a nursery. With the help of many donations, new pews have been placed in the church.

The Lake Mary Community Presbyterian church observed its 65th anniversary, Oct. 14, with a covered dish dinner by the members, dedication of an aluminum cross atop the church bell tower, and a memory table of portraits of many of the weddings which have taken place during the history of the church.

Lake Mary has its own Home Demonstration Club for the women of the community and they have many instructive meetings during the year with guest speakers included on their programs. There are two very active 4-H groups.

The community is most proud of the work and accomplishments of the Lake Mary Boy Scout Troop 242 under the leadership of H. J. Demers, Scoutmaster.

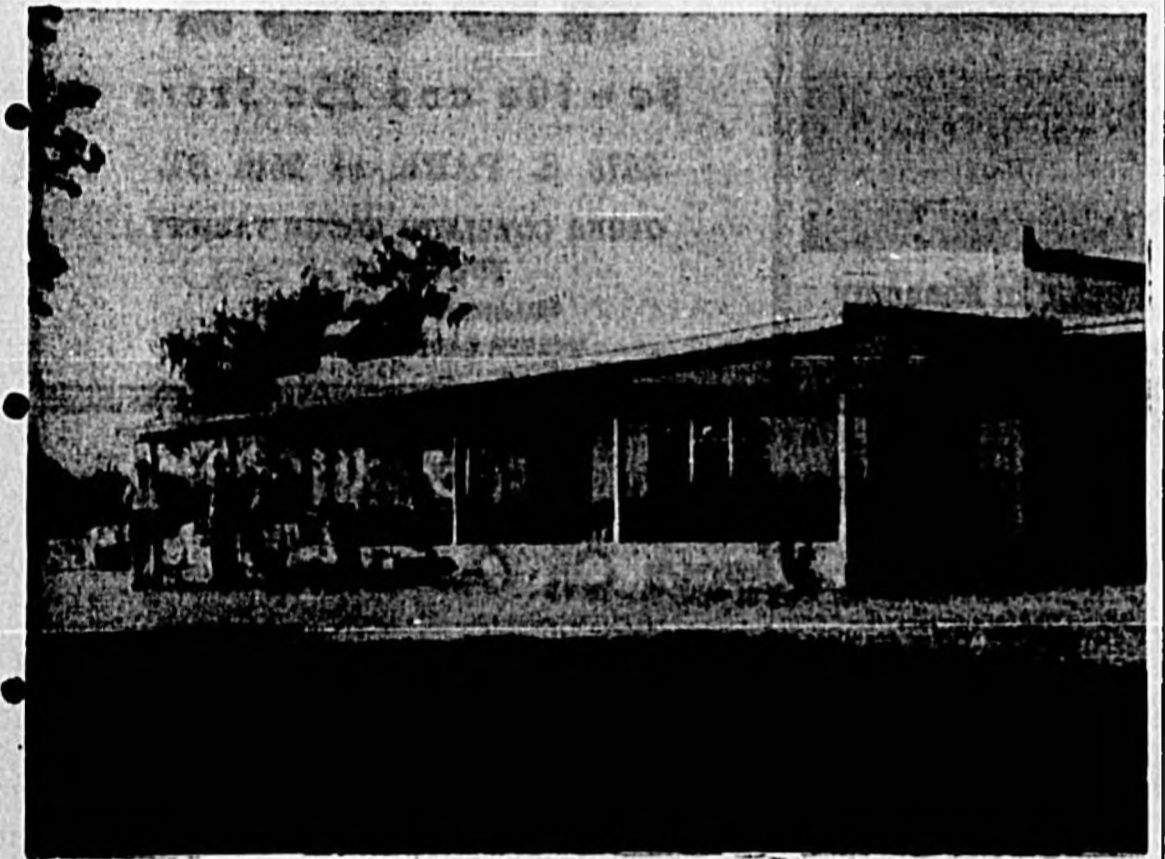
The Chamber of Commerce reports great progress in 1959 in beautification and improvement around Lake Mary as well as in civic growth.

Casselberry Has Industry, Lakes — No Property Tax

Casselberry, in the south end of Seminole County, is a town of light industry, 3,000 people, 32 lakes and is one of the two county towns without a property tax.

The board elected to draw up new town charter, decided that the town wouldn't have a property tax. Casselberry income is from utility and cigar taxes and from building permit fees.

The town, started by developer Hibbard Casselberry more than 20 years ago, covers 17 square miles. It was incorporated by court act in 1940.

In the past year, about 350 homes were built in Casselberry, six miles of street paved, eight miles of water line laid and a new \$12,845 fire truck bought—with cash. A new boat works plant that builds and sells boats also moved into the town.

There soon will be a new shopping center on the corner of Lake Triplett Dr. and Hwy. 17-92 according to the mayor. Water has been pumped from land there and plans made to bring soil from a neighboring hill. Hwy. 17-92 is one of the most travelled roads in Florida.

Casselberry's Republican Club turned out in full strength for its dinner meeting this year with 200 members present. The club has over 300 members. The club executive committee invited members to change their county voting registration from Democratic to Republican.

A Veterans of Foreign Wars unit was organized in the town in 1959. The nine hole golf course will be enlarged to 18 holes before the summer is out, Mayor Benson said. Hibbard Casselberry owns the present course land as well as the land to be used for expansion. The course is self sustaining.

A United Presbyterian Church is planned and the Catholic Diocese

of St. Augustine has bought 14 acres in the Sunset Dr.-Seminole Blvd. area. The Methodist Church now is a community church.

During the year new Cub Scout and Kadets of America units were organized.

A new sewer line was finished in 1959, giving sewage access to many homes and businesses that had used septic tanks. The town council recently passed a town ordinance prohibiting ill function-

ing sewage systems, including septic tanks. Persons owning these faulty systems must repair them.

Growing ferns for florists is Casselberry's chief industry. There are three ferneries in town, Johnson Electronics manufactures electronics components.

Town recreation facilities include public and private beaches at its lakes and Seminole Raceway for harness horses. There is a Lions Club and a Casselberry Civic Club.

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Sheriff's Office Increasing Staff

The sheriff's department hopes to increase its law enforcement staff by adding two more deputies later in the year.

Sheriff J. L. Hobby said the department now has nine deputies covering the county, working around the clock.

As part of an expansion program, Hobby said his office also plans to purchase two additional cars this year. The office now has six autos in service.

The office also has three radio operators and two office workers.

Hobby said Seminole County has the lowest crime rate of any county in Central Florida and one of the lowest in the state where major crimes are concerned.

Expanding Altamonte Springs Shares Growth Of Two Counties

Altamonte Springs shares the growth of two counties.

Location of the youth Seminole County town is such its residents can work in the Orlando-Winter Park area of neighboring Orange County, or can join in building south Seminole.

Altamonte Springs will be the telephone exchange center for south Seminole when the \$104,600 Terrace exchange building goes into operation in November. Completion of the new Winter Park Telephone Co. building is scheduled for mid-April.

The 2,000 lines of motor switch equipment to be put in the building will cost \$300,000. J. M. Galloway, president of the telephone company, has said that ultimately the Terrace office will house 20,000 lines of central office equipment. The Terrace office, replacing the Valley and Temple

exchanges, will serve Altamonte Springs, Casselberry, Longwood, Fern Park, Forest City and surrounding areas.

In the spiritual field, Altamonte Springs will be the site of a new \$100,000 Catholic church and school this year, located on Malliland Ave. and Spring Lake Rd. It will replace St. Mary Magdalen's which was converted from the old Seminole Club. The present church building will be used as a meeting hall.

Town council actions this year included installation of street lights on Newberryport Ave., Holly, Cherry and First Sts. and Tropic Hill, consideration of a swimming pool for the town and donation of \$100 to the town's Little League.

The council also appointed Tracy Sullivan to succeed Gray Hall as police chief.

Altamonte Springs has a new elementary school built as part of a countywide school expansion program.

The town's 800 citizens being taxed are expected to yield \$13,399.42 in the 1959-60 tax revenue from real property.

Club Activities In Area Many

tal Auxiliary, and Jaycees Wives; American Legion, Disabled Veterans, Fleet Reserve Assn., World War Veterans, United Spanish War Veterans, Veterans of Foreign Wars; Boat and Ski Club, Men's Golf Assn., Tourist Club, Sportsmen's Assn., Gun Club, Archery Club, Shutter Club and Sports Car Club.

Customs of the Old World and the new meet in Slavia.

Surrounding St. Luke's Lutheran Church, focal point of the community's social life, are lush farms with modern equipment.

Driving down SR 450 in southeast Seminole County, you will see St. Luke's, its Christian Day School, children's home and old people's home, looming like some medieval manor.

Just north of the church you will see the tall water tower and sprawling outbuildings of the Du-da co-operative ranch, which has holdings in Zellwood and Belle Glade and is conducting farm experiments in the Carolinas.

Efforts of Slavia citizens are not confined to the community. John Eibler and Shealy Best opened State City on Hwy. 17-92 last July.

Slavia was founded as result of combined religious, ethnic and agricultural interests. Slovak workers and their families left Cleveland in 1912 and bought 1,200 acres of farmland in Seminole County.

St. Luke's now numbers more than 200 in its congregation. About 200 are communicants and 100 are children.

St. Luke's Christian Day School, which started with 12 pupils 13 years ago, now has 141. Another teacher will be added to the faculty of five this year and another kindergarten room is planned. The school has eight grades.

Within St. Luke's there is a parent teacher league which collected more than \$500 for the school last year, a Ladies Aid Society, a Missionary Guild, 4-M club, a school chorus and a church chorus.

Lutheran church membership is a requisite for living in the home for the elderly. But with

certificates from the proper authorities, children of all faiths are admitted to the children's cottage.

St. Luke's has broadcast its church service over an Orlando radio station each Sunday for the

past eight years. The 6:45 a. m. Sunday service reaches listeners within a 150 mile radius.

Feb. 14-18, St. Luke's joined in Lutheran Open House Week, conducted throughout Florida and in part of Georgia.

VAH-3 Man Gets Jaycee Award In Sailor Group

Selection of an Outstanding Young Sailor of the Year was a new feature for 1959 in the Jaycees annual awards to the county's outstanding young people.

The award was presented to Verlin Arnett, AQ1, of VAH-3, who was highly praised for his devotion to his military duties and for a wide range of church and civic activities.

Nominated by a board of officers in his squadron, Arnett later was selected by the station board as the outstanding enlisted man for the year under 35 years old, a Jaycee requirement.

Father of three girls, Arnett is active in Boy Scout work, in which he is a Scoutmaster. He is president of local Fleet Reserve Assn. chapter, and president of chairman of the board of trustees of the Ebenezer Methodist Church, where he also teaches Sunday school.

His commanding officer, base officials and associates describe Arnett as "a truly outstanding man in all respects."

Tax Collections Gain \$400,000

Tax Collector John Galloway reported that by the tax deadline April 1 approximately \$1,600,000 will have been collected from county property owners on their 1959 taxes.

Galloway said this would represent a gain of \$400,000 over the previous year in taxes collected.

One prime reason for the increase was the giant reappraisal conducted in 1959.

The work was conducted by the Dowling Appraisal Company, which inspected 31,000 items of property in the county, measured each parcel and applied the value on a countywide equalization basis.

Tax equalization meetings were held at the end of 1959 and adjustments were made by the County Commission serving on the board of equalization when they felt appeals were deserving.

Approximately 150 appeals were heard and small percentage of property owners were given adjustments.

Accommodations

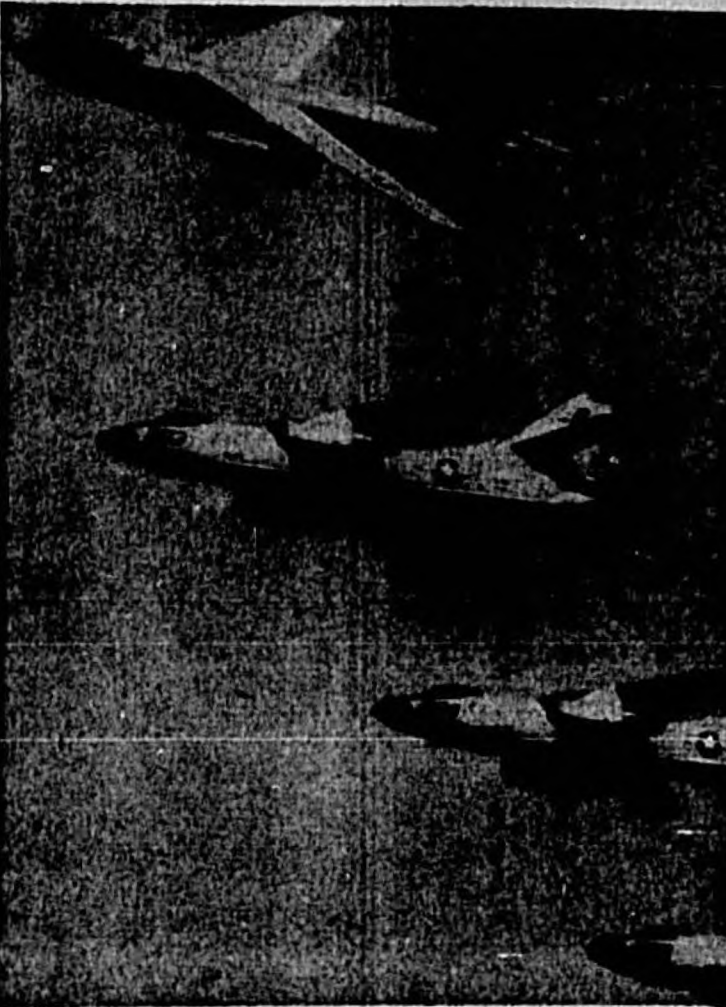

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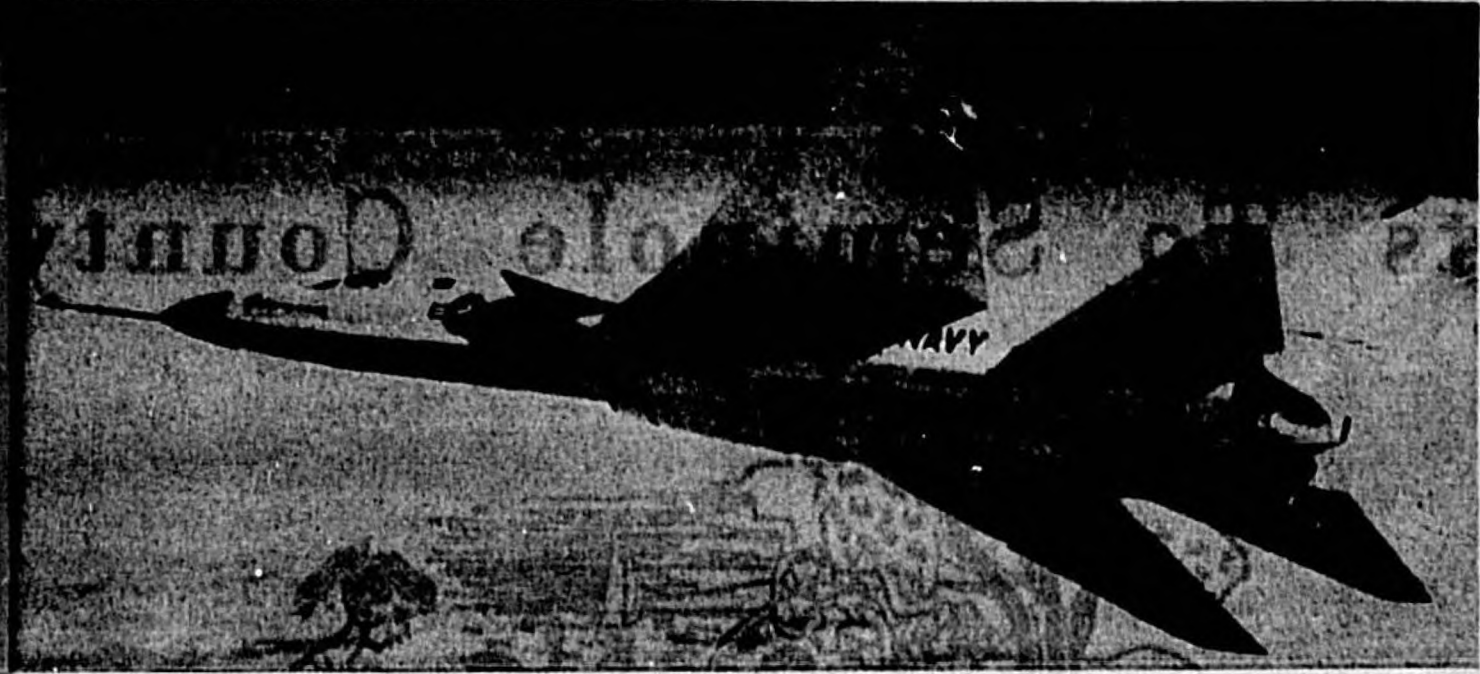

Naval Air Station Is Part Of Community

Through what is regarded as an outstanding example of military-civilian co-operation, the Sanford Naval Air Station has become a community much like the others in Seminole County.

Except for the necessary military restrictions, the station is included in most activities in the county and its personnel is active in churches, civic clubs, and social groups.

Adm. Arleigh Burke, chief of naval operations, has praised the manner in which the base has been taken into the county's life.

A recent report of the naval inspector general gave the NAS an excellent rating in efficiency and utilization of manpower and resources.

The new commander, Capt. Robert W. Slye, said the report credited the base with "getting a dollar's worth for every dollar spent." Slye took over the command in December from Capt. Lionel Arthur, who was transferred to Puerto Rico.

Shortly after the inspector general's survey at the station, an official word was received that the newest supersonic jet bomber, capable of delivering nuclear loads, probably will be introduced into service at Sanford. This will be the second time a new Navy jet has been used here for

the first time. The A3D bomber was the first and the latest aircraft was the A3J Vigilante.

Highlight activity of the year is the annual Bombing Derby in which the squadrons compete for trophies. Heavy Attack Squadron 5 won the loft bombing competition, the commander's trophy and the operation flight safety award last year.

VAH-3 and VAH-11 won weapons loading awards and VAH-7 was tops in attack missions. VAH-1 was first in high altitude radar bombing and VAH-3 was awarded the carrier airmanship award. Squadron 11 was presented the Conover Trophy for outstanding radar bombing.

A continuous training schedule is in operation and the crews are rotated on carriers for tours of sea duty.

Boat Basin

Sanford boasts a conveniently located basin on Lake Monroe (where the St. Johns River widens near the heart of the city) that is adjacent to the municipal pier. It is within easy walking distance of hotel, restaurants and shops. While it has no overhead protection there are gas, oil and storage facilities near by.

Improved Fire Protection Chief's Goal

Improved fire protection in the county is one of the main goals of Sanford Fire Chief Mack Cleveland Sr.

Cleveland said he is striving to have fire districts set up in all areas of Seminole County.

Once a fire district is set up, the county commission can levy taxes in that district for needed

fire fighting equipment and manpower.

So far, there is only one fire district in the county and that is in Lake Mary.

However, Cleveland said he plans to ask the legislative delegation to push for an enabling act so the districts can be established.

The Sanford Fire Department also is planning to increase its own fire fighting protection by hiring an additional six men in the fall. There are now 21 firemen on duty in the city.

The Sanford Fire Department now has six pieces of equipment including four 750 gallon pumpers but Cleveland hopes to get

the authorization for more equipment in the not too distant future.

Cleveland also said present plans call for a new centrally located fire station to be built within the next two years.

There are now two fire stations in the city, one on Palmetto and the other on French Ave.

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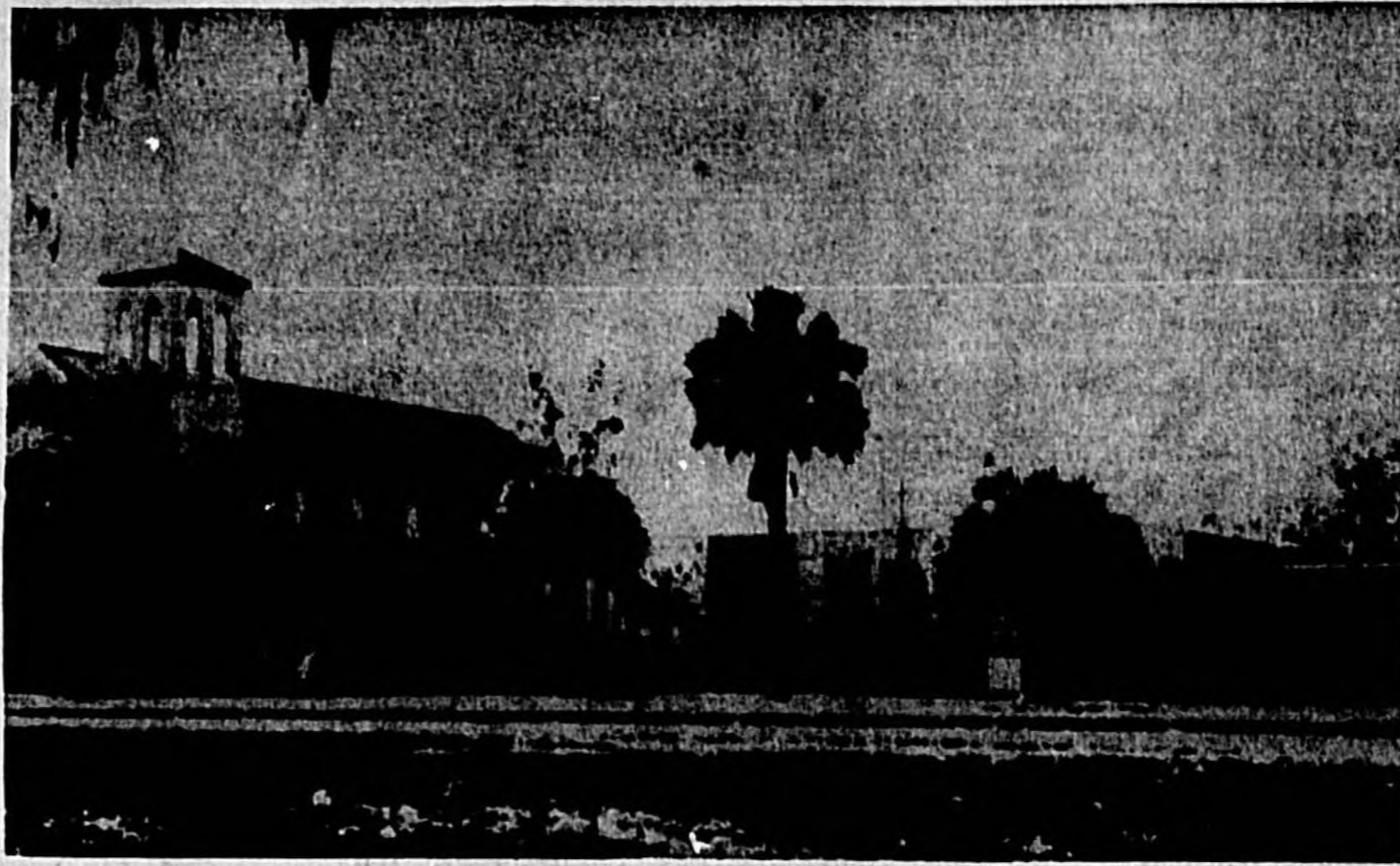

\$3 Million Goes Into Building New Schools As County Registration Continues Increase

The 1958-59 school population increased more than 1,000 over last year, with 10,634 registered on opening day, as Seminole County continued a \$3 million construction program to provide facilities for present needs and future growth.

A new \$1 1/4 million Seminole High School now being built next to Lake Jennie will lead off the new county schools and school additions being readied for fall.

The new high school built in a campus style will accommodate 1,000-1,200 students in its 30 classrooms. As a senior high it is meant for grades 10-12, according to Walter Teague, county school administrative assistant. Science, homemaking, library, diversified cooperative training, music, band and art rooms, a gym, auditorium, and cafeteria will be included in the school's facilities.

Junior High School students now attending the Pinecrest

School will attend the present senior high, which will house grades seven through nine. The Pinecrest School with a capacity of 1,000 children will then house grades one through six.

Additions to Midway and Rosen-

wald schools to be ready by the fall include a cafeteria, library, administrative suite, storage room and lavatories for each plant, with six classrooms for Midway and three for Rosenwald. Fifteen classrooms are being added to

Lake Mary Elementary plus a cafeteria, storage and lavatory facilities. The present Lake Mary school building is being renovated to house a library and administrative suite. The three additions are being built by J. Hilbert Sapp of Orlando for \$798,940. The Lake Mary School, grades one through seven, will accommodate children from Sunland Estates, Little Venice and Loch Arber who are now attending Sanford schools.

A new South Seminole Elementary School also is scheduled for completion in the fall. The \$878,417 plant similar to the new Altamonte Elementary School will have 18 classrooms, a library, cafeteria and administrative suite. J. Hilbert Sapp also is building the South Seminole school. The new Longwood Elementary School will have the same facilities as South Seminole.

Total \$6 Million

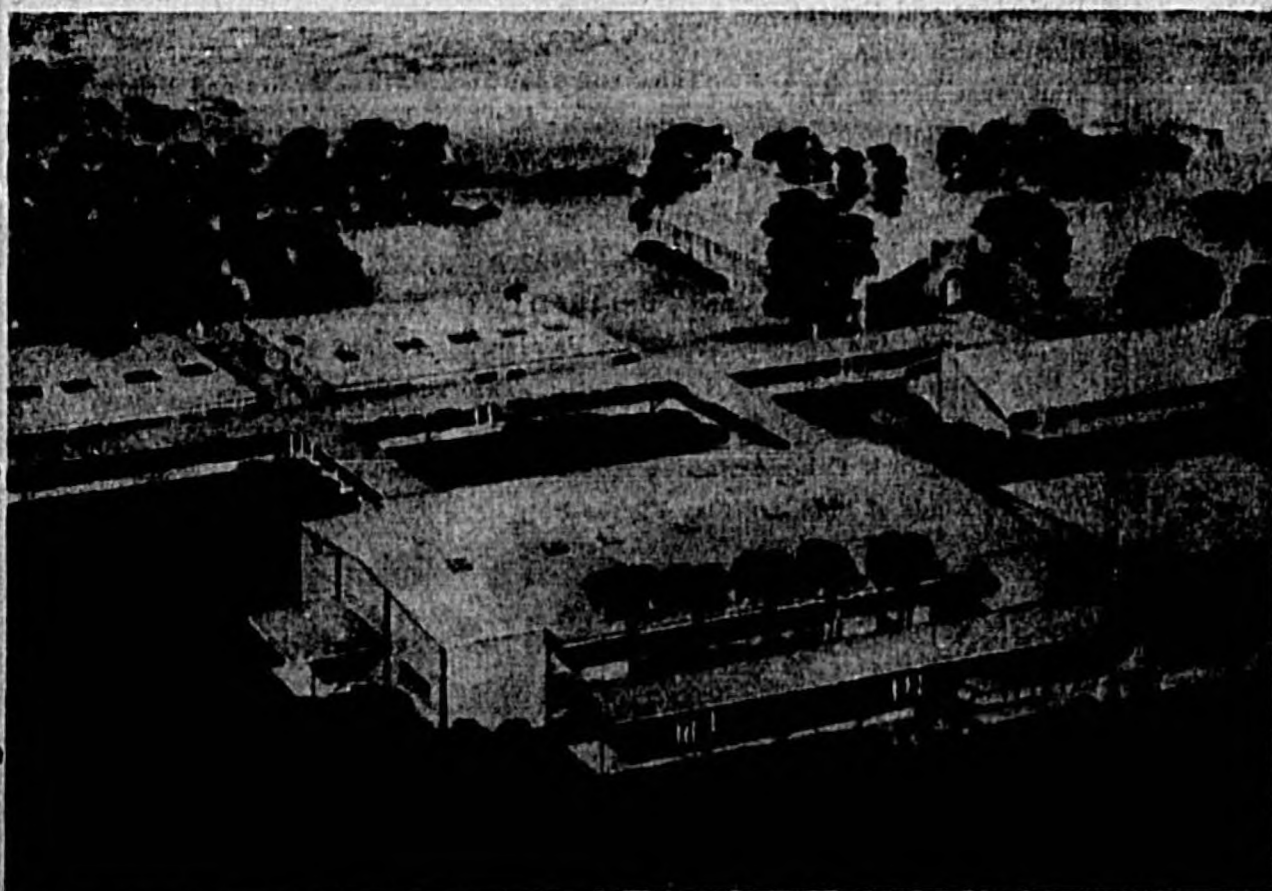
Seminole County's school budget totals over \$6 million this year.

County schools are receiving \$1,903,828 in state and federal funds for the July 1959-July 1960 fiscal year, \$307,800 in county taxes, \$461,700 in district taxes and \$6,750 from other sources.

This school support and maintenance budget requires \$1,869,000 expense on faculty salaries, \$86,350 for transportation, \$340,614 for capital outlay, \$60,224 to pay off debts and \$770,843 for reserves and other expenses.

The school board is using \$370,500 of last March's bond issue to build and add to school buildings. This will leave \$308,942 left from the issue by next July. Interest and principal to be paid off on the bonds this year totals \$244,051.

The \$708,500 from county and district taxes is gained through a five mill property taxation. Two mills are used for county current taxes, two for the district taxes and one for the district building and bus levy.

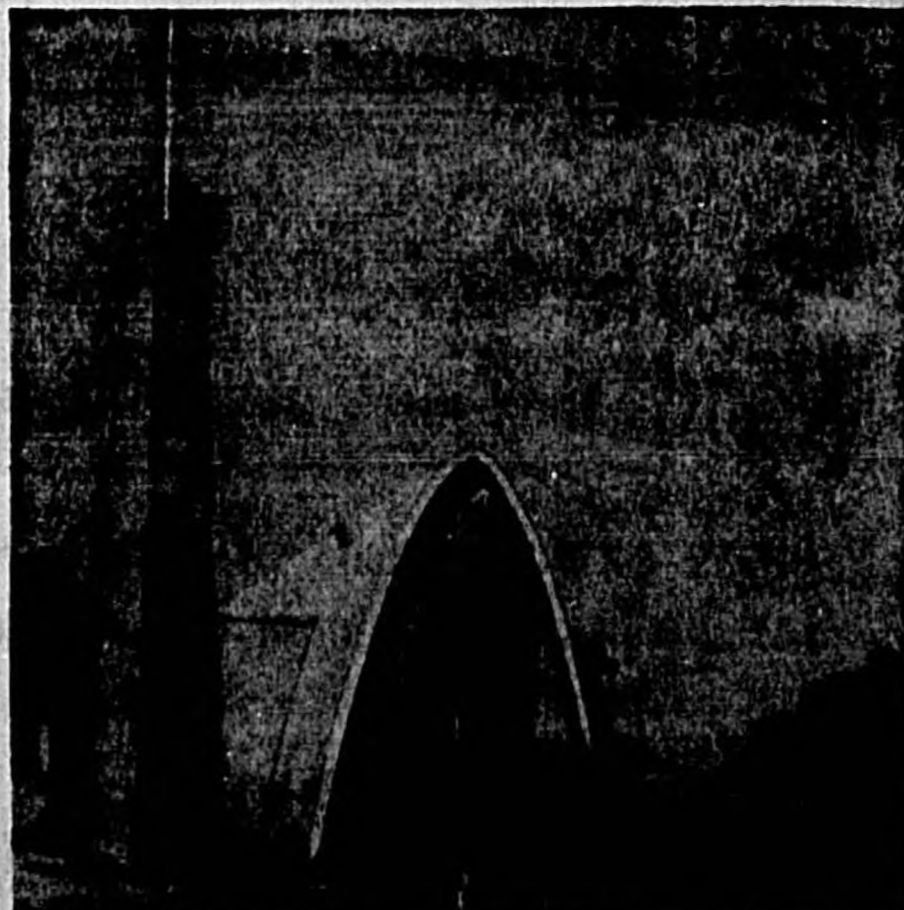
Some of the church groups in the area have been established for many years. Among those of historical standing are the Holy Cross Episcopal Church, which dates from 1872, the Congregational Christian Church dating back to 1890 and the Lake Mary Community Presbyterian, founded in 1894.

With an expanding economy and a proportionate growth in population, many new churches have

come into existence in recent years. Old buildings have become inadequate to house growing congregations. New church construction of additions to existing buildings and the erection of completely new plants can be observed throughout the county.

A most important role is performed by the many Navy families from the Sanford Naval Air Station who have affiliated themselves with local churches. Their contribution in time, energy, and financial support have given many congregations a healthy incentive to improve and expand their ministries.

Newcomers to the communities of Seminole County find a most cordial welcome awaiting them in the churches.

Sanford's First Baptist Church Begins Its 76th Year Of Service

The First Baptist Church of Sanford observed its 76th anniversary on Feb. 1.

This is the 31st year that the church has been served by the present pastor, Dr. W. P. Brooks Jr. Dr. Brooks is much interested in the young people of the church. He stated that the church seeks to win young people to Christ and to

develop them as Christians. It strives for a well-balanced church social program for young people through the Training Union.

The church was founded at its present location, 519 Park Ave., in a wooden building by Rev. Butts, a pastor who alternated Sundays here and in Orlando. It had a charter membership of 19 people from seven states. Today finds the church greatly enlarged with a membership of 1500 and a Sunday School enrollment of 1300.

In 1918 the front part of the building was added and in 1920 the present auditorium. Money is being raised for a new educational building.

The church has been cited by national and state offices in Nashville, Tenn. and Jacksonville, Fla. for its advancement in the training of Sunday School workers during 1958. Of the nearly 1200 Baptist churches in the state the local organization ranks fifteenth with a total of 384 training awards earned by its workers.

DCT Program Gives Jobs To Students

In Sanford, students are choosing a profession through the services of the Diversified Co-operative Training program.

Students who are at least 16 years old may enter. They must be able to graduate with their classes, and still maintain a satisfactory position for nine months.

Training agencies are available in secretarial, mechanic, banking, record shop, credit work, book-keeping, women's apparel, men's shops, automobile shops and other business firms.

The boys and girls work after school and sometimes on weekends. Four hours are spent in school and four on the job, making three credits a year for DCT work.

The program is in its fourth year at Seminole High School. Enthusiastic members have gone on to their own businesses, or have reached executive positions in local firms. More than half have retained their jobs after graduation.

Students who work as they learn are now employed in drug stores, grocery stores, by attorneys and abstract offices, the Sheriff's Department, radio stations and many other firms.

The DCT program has met with the same excellent reception from employers as from the students.



ALTAMONTE ELEMENTARY SCHOOL is typical of new school construction in Seminole County under its expansion program. Located on a 20-acre tract in the southwest section of the county, this new school is functional in design, with 18 classrooms to accommodate 600 pupils. It cost \$337,000.

Episcopal Church Improvements Noted

Since its formation in 1872, Holy Cross Episcopal Church in downtown Sanford has had an interesting and varied history.

With its first church building blown down by a hurricane, and its second one destroyed by fire, the congregation has come through times of discouragement to its present size of just over 500 communicants, with a total of around 900 baptized persons.

Under the rectorship of the Rev. John W. Thomas for the past three years the present church has been put in good shape and many improvements added. Before coming here, Father Thomas was in Avon Park for three years, and seven years in Minnesota.

During the past year a house was purchased across the street from the church to provide living quarters for an assistant priest and also for Church School classrooms. The Parish House has been painted outside to blend with the church, and a program of refurbishing the inside is being studied.

A great step was taken with the assistance of a church fund raiser, in more than doubling the giving of the congregation. The increased pledging of the congregation will permit the vestry to carry out extension plans long needed.

Under the direction of Paul Jenkins, organist and choirmaster, both the Junior and Senior Chorus have increased in size and proficiency. The Parish Day School Kindergarten, whose teacher is Mrs. J. B. St. John has had a full enrollment with a waiting list, and the need to expand the parochial school is evident.

Donald Thompson has taken charge of the Acolyte Guild, and new boys are being trained to serve at the altar for all services. Harry Cannel, the Church School Superintendent has an overflow enrollment with Jack biggest problem.

The Vestry of the parish, with Mr. Gordon Bradley as Senior

Warden, and Jack Horner as Junior Warden has had a full year in handling the business affairs, which included plans for establishing a new mission church between Sanford and Longwood, and an extensive plan for a home calling-campaign-on-every-family-in-the-parish. This visitation program would be to get the ideas of every member in planning parts of the activities of the parish.

Recognition was paid during the year past to all young people leaving for college and for the armed forces. In a special service, the rector blessed each one before the congregation and assured them of the continued interest of the parish.

As Sanford has grown, so has the parish of Holy Cross. The church has welcomed new comers and the Navy folks as they have come into the community and has stood for faith in God in the tradition of the Anglican Communion.

Varied Lunch Program Stressed

A varied school lunch program plays an important part in the total education program over the county.

Students are taught the basis of a good nutrition diet and the school lunch program makes available a wholesome well balanced noon meal to most of the school children in the county.

Menus follow the Type A lunch pattern and size of servings are geared to the age and needs of the child. The program attempts to provide approximately one-third of the child's daily food needs.

The school lunch program offers a food rich in vitamin C each day and a vitamin A rich food twice weekly.

Sanford has water access to all eastern seaports through a 15-foot government maintained channel in the St. Johns River from Jacksonville to Sanford. Three oil companies with bulk stations in Sanford move fuel oil and gasoline by water for distribution throughout Central Florida.

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Monroe School Started In Church

The Lake Monroe School was first started back in 1916 with the first sessions held in the community Church.

In March of 1918, the school moved to its present site and classes were held in one room. The second addition to the school came in 1925.

When the school became accredited, there were 200 pupils enrolled. At the present time over 165 pupils are entering the school.

Federal Highway 17-92 and state roads 46 and 415 are main auto thoroughfares through Sanford. One of the heaviest travelled highways in Florida, 17-92 averages more than 15,000 autos driving between Sanford and Orlando each 24 hours.

St. Johns River Forms Two Lakes

The St. John's River winds through Seminole County to form three large lakes. Each of Lakes Monroe, Harney and Jessup are about seven miles long. The river forms hundreds of back-water sloughs and many tributary creeks. The Wehve River, which forms the county's western boundary, is a tributary of the St. John's. Ramps and fishing camps are found near bridges and main highways. Boats and motors are available at most camps.

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EACH SECTION OF SEMINOLE COUNTY produces scenes like this of school construction this year as the program is pushed to get added school rooms for

registration rosters which increased by about 1,000 last term and are expected to grow more than that during 1960-61.

First Presbyterian Church Was Established In Sanford In 1882

The ivy-covered sanctuary at Third Street and Oak Avenue, the adjoining Educational building and the Youth Center building backed up to it but facing on Park Avenue make up the worship center for the First Presbyterian church, a pioneer in the religious life of the community. It was established by St. Johns Presbytery in 1882.

The congregation of more than 900 persons is organized in a truly democratic plan of control, and they have elected 27 elders and 39 deacons to oversee the spiritual and material needs of the church. Clifford McKibbin is chairman of the Diaconate and Arthur DeYoung is Clerk of the Session.

A Sunday School of over 700 members provides instruction classes for all ages. A fellowship program is set up for young people of Junior, Pioneer and Senior High group age. The Junior and Pioneer fellowships meet every Tuesday afternoon and evening. The Senior High Fellowship meets for supper and choir practice on Wednesday evening and supper and vespers on Sunday evening. The young people are active in work of the St. Johns Presbytery Young People.

Four choirs in the church are under the direction of Mrs. George Touhy, minister of music. These are the Chancel Choir, the Senior High Choir, the Junior Choir and the Intermediate Girls' Choir.

The choirs present music for the Sunday morning services. The Chancel Choir gives special all music services at Christmas and Easter.

The Men of the Church is an organization designed to bring together all the men of the church once a month on the fourth Tuesday for fellowship and inspiration. Joe Baker is the president.

The Women of the Church, under the leadership of Mrs. Harry Woodruff, president, have an executive board meeting the first Monday in the month. Every woman in the church belongs to one of the 13 circles which meet in the homes of the women on the second Monday and Wednesday of the month. On the third Monday

all of the women meet together at the church for prayer, inspiration, and business.

A two-week vacation church school is conducted every summer. All leaders and teachers in the Sunday School departments and other areas of church work attend training classes to further their work in Christian Education.

An outpost at the Beardall Chapel is maintained by the Church. Sunday School services are conducted every Sunday afternoon and a Vacation Bible School is featured in the summer. There is also a circle of Women of the Church.

Scouting programs for boys and girls also are sponsored by the First Presbyterian Church.

Lutheran Church Shows Large Membership Gain

A net increase of 30 percent in membership has been the experience of growth in the Lutheran Church of the Redeemer during the past year.

With new highs in attendance in church services, the Sunday School, kindergarten, and Vacation Bible School the congregation has taken steps toward an all-purpose educational building. The building committee has been instructed to proceed with the architect, Hal Harris in preparations for the second unit of the Church of the Redeemer.

The new building will join the present unit to form an L-shaped edifice. In it there will be ten large classrooms which will be divided by folding doors. Also included in the plans are the church office, a library, kitchen, and lavatories. The present church building will be enlarged with the addition of a narthex. Construction is expected to begin early this year.

The Sanford Zoo occupies a city block overlooking Lake Monroe. It features bears, lions, tropical birds, fish and Florida alligators. Admission is free.

Under the direction of Joe Senkarik the choir has contributed much to the regular Sunday and weekday services. Mrs. Eddie Mossman is the accompanist for the choir.

The Ladies Aid has been working on a wide variety of projects throughout the past year. Mrs. John Senkarik, president, has effectively led the ladies in giving valuable support to the efforts of the congregation and the world-wide endeavors of the Lutheran Women's Missionary League.

The young people of the Church of the Redeemer enjoy a program of interesting activities, including topic discussions, Bible classes, and social outings.

The men of the congregation join together each month for informal programs with their guests at supper meetings.

In addition to supporting the world-wide mission program in 29 countries—where the Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod is working, the congregation locally is sponsoring "The Lutheran Hour" over radio station WIOD in Sanford. This program may be heard each week over more than 1,400 other radio stations. The church

also provides a "Prayer-for-the-anyone at any time of the day or night" service which is available to night over the telephone.

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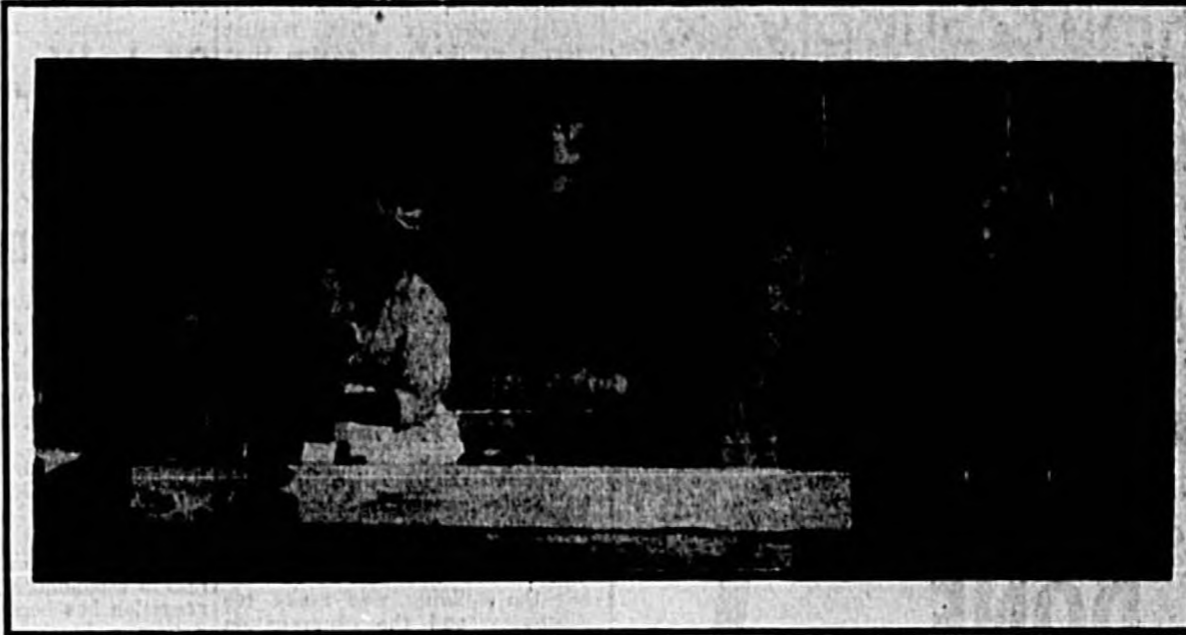
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Federal Aid Earmarked For Schools

The \$10,000 in federal funds given to Seminole County schools for 1960 is earmarked to pay for scientific, mathematical and modern foreign instructional aids. The federal "Title Three" grant is matched by an equal county contribution aimed at better teaching of scientific, mathematical and foreign language principles, county director of instruction Stewart Gatchel has explained.

The schools are getting equipment which will better demonstrate through study aids, the physical and natural phenomena about us, Gatchel said. In the lower grades insects, reptiles, fowl, and physical wonders will be explained using aquariums and demonstrations of mechanics of forces and elements of electricity. Demonstration desks for experiments, microscopes, and micro-projectors are being added to

basic scientific materials for upper grade use. Charts and audio-visual aids will help math students learn basic principles. The aim is to have students understand math principles rather than just learn a formula to be applied from memory, Gatchel explained.

Though emphasis has been placed on science and math until instruction needs have been filled in these subjects, foreign language teaching aids also are coming into their own. Record players, tape recorders and language manuals are on the requisition list for use in language courses. In a year or so schools hope to get into the "language laboratory" approach, Gatchel explained.

Sanford Junior High already has received microscopes and has started an advanced reading class. Students in the class progress in reading at their own

rates, going from text to text, each one a little more difficult than the one before.

The school has ordered a manual inquisin for use in seventh grade anatomy classes, a galvanometer for eighth grade science, new maps, a film strip projector and film strips. The advanced mathematics classes which let children progress at their own rate were resumed for this school year. They have been on an experimental basis for the past two years. More than \$1,000 has been allotted the

school library. A full time music teacher, Leo Compton has joined the faculty.

Sanford Grammar School has ordered six new volumes of the Columbia one volume encyclopedia for classroom reference libraries and a complete set of picture encyclopedias for the fourth grade classroom. A plastic torso has been ordered for the sixth grade advanced science classes and a micro-projector to project microscopic objects on a screen is available for instruction.

Enterprise School Serves Wide Area

The Enterprise School serves a wide area including children from Osteen, DeBary and North Monroe. A music supervisor, teachers and the principal compose the school's faculty.

Students at the school participate in basketball, baseball, 4-H Club and Boy Scout activities. Each year students of the eighth grade sell magazines to raise funds for additional teaching aids for the home living department. The school also has an active PTA organization.

Alliance Church Stresses Missionary Program

A church with an active emphasis upon the work of foreign missions, The Christian and Missionary Alliance Church, like many of its sister organizations gives nearly 25 per cent of its annual budget to missionary work. Locally, the church is known simply as The Alliance Church. It is connected with the international society of The Christian and Missionary Alliance which now supports almost 500 missionaries in lands where Christianity is just now making inroads.

The missionary work is primarily done in pioneer areas. As soon as converts are established in the Faith and trained to administer their own churches as well as conduct Christian services, The Al-

liance encourages the establishment of self-supporting, self-governing, and self-propagating churches. Missionaries then move on to other unevangelized areas, while retaining an association with the native church for advice and counselling.

In Sanford, The Alliance Church is located at Park Ave. and 14th St. The congregation worships in a spacious Old English design Church building. Sunday School meets at 9:45 a. m. each Sunday with classes for every age group. Morning worship begins at 10:40 and the evening service is held at 7:45 p. m. A growing Alliance Youth Fellowship meets each Sunday at 6:30 p. m. There is also a Mid-Week Prayer Meeting and

Bible Study each Wednesday at 8:00 p. m.

The Ladies' Missionary Society meets three times monthly in the interest of the church's varied missionary endeavors. The principle activity is to pray for the missionaries and their work. Also, the ladies supply various items for missionaries going to the field and the sewing circle prepares rolled bandages and other useful materials for the missionaries to use in medical work among lepers and other needy natives.

The Sanford State Farmers' market each year handles produce and citrus sales amounting to more than \$5,000,000.

Elder Springs Baptist Church Believes In 'Old Time' Gospel

Elder Springs Baptist Church is one which still prides itself in standing for the "old-time" Gospel. It believes that the answer to life's questions, the solution to life's problems, the satisfaction of the hunger of men's hearts and the longing of the soul of man can be found only in the Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

This church began as a mission project of the First Baptist Church of Sanford. At the first meeting Jan. 19, 1944 in the home of Mr. and Mrs. E. E. Soderholm there were 13 persons present. Three weeks later the group moved to the home of Mrs. Sally Johnson, which still stands on the present church grounds.

Homer L. Osburn of the First Baptist Church was chairman of the Missions Committee and instrumental in moving the young work toward maturity.

Griffin received his training at Stetson University of Deland and Bob Jones University in Greenville, S. C. He has served as pastor, teacher, counselor, and revivalist in a number of other churches.

The church happily counts 15 Navy families now affiliated with the church and active in its varied ministries.

Paola Wesleyan Methodist Church Aids Community

The pastor of the Paola Wesleyan Methodist Church is eager to welcome all who attend the services of the church. Worship services are held each Sunday at 10:45 a.m. and 7:30 p.m.

The church is located west of Sanford about five miles on Route 86. The Rev. Cecil W. Shaffer is the minister.

During the past year the church has experienced encouraging progress in a building project. The congregation has begun to worship in a new auditorium erected to replace the old wooden frame building.

One of the most important features of the ministry of the church is the Sunday School. Curtis Lee is the superintendent under whose leadership the school has seen considerable growth. Largely because of Lee's zeal and desire to see the Sunday School go forward there is a pressing need for expanding the facilities to provide additional classrooms.

The mid-week prayer meeting leader is Mrs. Ella Davis.

A cordial invitation is given to all who would join this service of prayer and praise each Wednesday beginning at 7:30 p.m. It is an opportunity to meet with the people of God for blessing and spiritual strength.

One Wednesday evening of each month is under the leadership of the Women's Missionary Society. The president, Miami Kelly conducts the service with special stress on foreign missions. The church believes strongly that where there is no vision, the people perish.

Willard Elderidge is the leader of the Wesleyan Youth organization. His efforts are in conjunction with those of Clifford Rathel, the chairman of programming. Together they have promoted a program designed to train youth as laborers in the harvest of the Lord. There is a firm conviction among the congregation that the youth are the life blood of the church.

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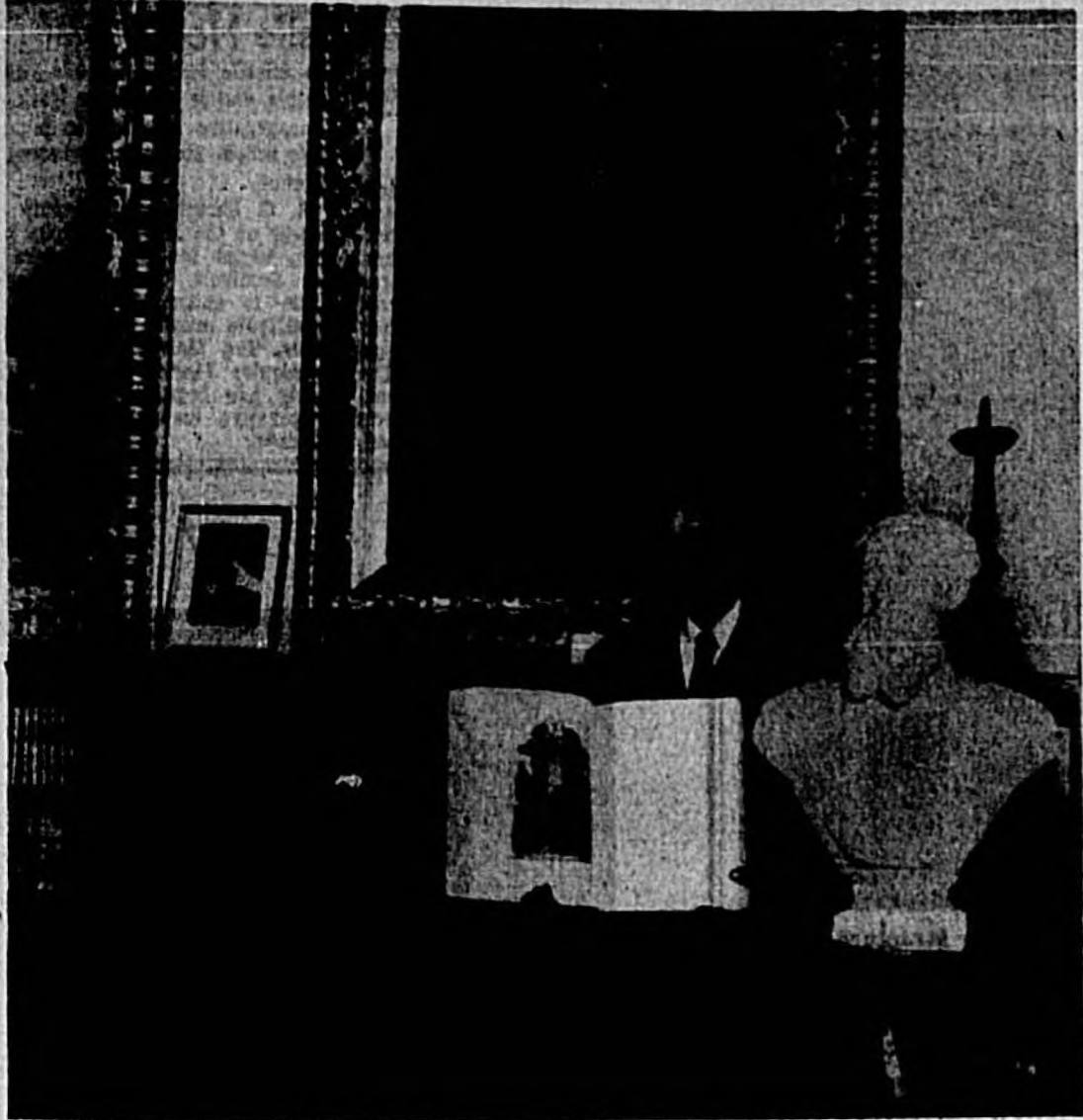
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Playhouse Navy Aids In Bringing Culture To Area

Playhouse Navy is composed of a group of local thespians who organized in September of 1957 to present play productions in Sanford. Since that time they have staged a few plays and several TV and radio shows.

Chief Jack Horner who organized Playhouse Navy is still an active member as are several other charter members who are Mrs. Winifred Scott, Mrs. Helen Mills, Mrs. Ogilvie, Larry Fosmark, Mrs. Jack Horner, Frank Holmes, Mrs. Polly Shields and Mrs. Cathy Stowell. This is a remarkable number considering that the greatest obstacle of the group is keeping members together since they are subject to Navy transfers.

Lyman School Growing Fast

The Lyman School, with an enrollment of over 1,500 students is one of the fastest growing schools in the state.

A 42 percent increase in enrollment was noted in the school compared to the previous year. The school includes grades one through 12 with a faculty of 53 members. Principal of the school is Ralph Diggs.

Lyman serves a large and rapidly growing area in the southern part of the county. It includes students from Altamonte Springs, Bear Lake, Forest City, Fern Park, Casselberry and Sanlando Springs.

Present plans call for additions to the school which will help eliminate the overcrowded conditions there.

Fishing's Good

Large mouth bass, speckled perch, bream and shad are the most plentiful fish in Seminole County. Bass may be taken all year by artificial lures, flies or live bait. They average three to four pounds. Speckled perch are caught mostly in the large lakes during the fall and winter by trolling with small artificial lures or live minnows. Bream bite all year in deep holes and in creeks. Shell crackers are good in spring. Shad come into the St. Johns River to spawn as early as December through March. They are heavy with roe and weigh two to eight pounds.

Vocational School Aiding Industries

During this year the Seminole County Vocational School has sponsored in-plant training to provide workers for industry.

"The Electronics Assembly" course at Dynatronics is given when interest and need demands, William L. Merritt, Dynatronics personnel manager, said.

Twenty-three women graduated from a recent two-weeks course under the instruction of Joseph Zavoyny, a licensed teacher and employe of the firm.

The free course is for women only because they have the needed finger dexterity. Because of the need for individual instruction, the course limit is 25. E. S. Douglas, county director of Adult Vocational and Veterans' Education reported.

The training may be used in any electronics plant. Application should be made at the Florida State Employment Service in Sanford. Tests for ability to read simple instructions, coordination of eye and hand and manual dexterity are given. A tenth grade education is needed for the course but persons not having this can take a test to see if they have equivalent knowledge.

County's Adult Vocational Program Has Wide-Range Business Courses

During the year approximately 500 people are benefitted by the Adult and Vocational Training program offered in Seminole County according to E. S. Douglas, county director.

The vocational school offers day and night courses in such subjects as bookkeeping, typing, shorthand and business English. One program known as distributive education is for students who reach the 11th grade of high school and receive instructions while engaged in part time employment.

Four divisions in the vocational field are agriculture, home economics, trade and industrial and distributive education. One of the biggest enrollments is in the railroad courses for locomotive engineers and firemen. Two classes are conducted also for railroad trainmen. Numerous short courses are provided during the year for lunch room personnel and school bus drivers.

The adult non-vocational courses offered weekly at the Seminole High School include art, Russian, Spanish and Physiology as well as general education courses. Spanish is taught in the Lyman school which also has a commercial training program. Crooms Academy has a large

training program under way for Negro service veterans. For non-veterans the school offers classes

for those who cannot read or else read poorly. Courses in bookkeeping and typing are now in pro-

cess. General education courses are taught also at Rosenwald in Altamonte Springs.

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Church Of Latter Day Saints Organized By 20 In 1950

In 1950 a small group of about 20 persons gathered together in Sanford to organize a Home Sunday School and a Relief Society for the ladies of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints. Ten years later, the church is now preparing to launch into an ambitious building program which will see in the near future a \$100,000 structure erected on the church property at the corner of Park Ave and 24th Street. This building will be the first two phases of a four-phase expandable church edifice, providing classroom space and a chapel.

Personnel of the Naval Air Station from Mormon background have become faithful active workers in the local organization, which began to grow immediately upon its inception. In less than two years the meager beginnings had increased sufficiently to establish a branch work under the auspices of the Orlando Branch. In August of 1956 the Sanford Branch became independent of the Orlando group. At present the Sanford group has 110 members.

On Feb. 23, 1956, the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints purchased a large tract of land in Brevard, Osceola, and Orange Counties of some 332,000 acres. A stake was organized in which

the church has invested tremendous sums of money. This was the second such organization in Florida and the 257th in the church domain. These steps of progress have been the cause of more rapid growth in all the central Florida branches, including the Sanford Church.

The local church is now meeting in the Sanford City Hall. James G. Brooks Sr. is the presiding officer. There are several functioning church departments: The Mutual Improvement Association for the young people, a Priesthood Class, Junior Sunday School Choir, genealogy committee, and an active welfare program.

A building fund committee was organized three years ago by the branch presidency. In order to raise funds the group has built and sold a house, put on several chicken barbecues, and collected contributions through the various church departments.

Sanford is on the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad's main line, 124 miles south of Jacksonville and 114 rail miles northeast of Tampa. Air service by Eastern and National airlines is available within 20 miles of the city.

Teachers Told Of Missile Need

Seminole County teachers were told at a meeting last term that

the missile industry needs young people and is willing to work out a cooperative program to include high school students interested in science.

Added Industry

Seminole County's trade in farm machinery, seeds, insecticides and fertilizer is an important addition to its agricultural industry. Sanford and Seminole County have plants which wash, grade, crate and pre-cool produce for shipment. A frozen juice concentrate plant is located in the county. The plant also manufactures marmalades, and jellies, and converts residual citrus into cattle feed.

R. C. Shreckengost, deputy engineer on the Martin Bullpup project, urged teacher members of the Seminole County Education Assn. to encourage students to investigate missile and electronics fields. The Martin Co. is trying to employ Florida people and already has begun a high school cooperative training program in Orlando.

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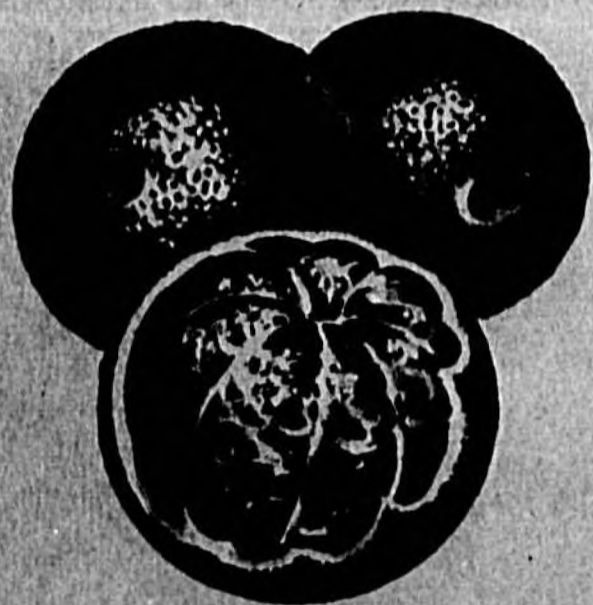
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Enterprise Methodist Children's Home Serves Well

The Florida Methodist Children's Home, formerly known as the Methodist Orphanage, celebrated its 51st anniversary this past year.

At first only children who were full-orphaned were admitted, but as the orphaned population decreased and broken homes increased, the policy was changed to admit children who needed a home away from their own home, whatever the reason.

The children's home now has a capacity of 82, and usually there is a long list waiting for admission.

Service for the children is on a

non-sectarian basis, though full by Florida's 650 Methodist congregations.

The church was formed in 1890 and the building at the top right was built. That location in downtown Sanford is now occupied by a business building and the Spanish type structure above houses the congregation on Park Ave.



Congregational Christian Church Now Celebrating Its 70th Birthday

The Sanford Congregational Christian Church came into being in 1890—seventy years ago. Its members bought a large tract of land in downtown Sanford, now occupied by a service station at Park Ave. and Third St.

A revival held in the Opera House where the Ritz Theater now stands added a number of new members to the group from among the families of business, civic, and professional people and early Sanford settlers. A frame building, which later became the parsonage and afterward was used as the Parish House, was the first meeting place. This was later replaced by a tall gothic-type church building with high tower, large stained glass windows and pipe organ. Many community affairs were held in the natural block structure. Chautauque lectures and Christian Endeavor

Society rallies were often conducted there.

In 1938 the building site was sold and the edifice, which had suffered damage from a hurricane was taken down. For a while after that the church met in the commodious parsonage at 811 Palmist Ave. until the new mission-style church was finished. The new building is now located on four spacious lots at the corner of Park Ave. and 24th Street nearer the center of the rapidly growing community. It was occupied in 1934. Shortly after moving to the new location the church trebled in size and strength.

From 1938 until September 1950, Dr. J. Bernard Root served as the pastor of the church. The Rev. Mr. Root came from the pastorate of one of New England's oldest churches, the First Congregational Church of Lynn, Mass. Upon assuming his ministry in Sanford, Dr. Root became a leader of young people's church work and interested many of the common concerns of the community. His preaching ministry in Sanford was notable for its ability and finish. During the past 12 years, Dr. Root taught English literature in Seminole High School. In September he concluded a third of century of service to Sanford and became professor of English in a Georgia College.

Dr. Fred Ensminger, who joined the church in 1931 as a charter member, had been associated with Dr. Root for the past six years. At present the Rev. Richard Carter, an Air Force Chaplain, is the interim pastor. He will serve until after Easter, 1960. The Rev. Joseph E. Stock of Interlachen, has been called to be the permanent pastor of the church.

The Rev. Mr. Stock will assume his duties in June after graduating from the School of Religion of Vanderbilt University in Nashville, Tenn. He is also an alumnus of the University of Florida.

The local church is united and eager to press forward in Christian witness and service under the leadership of its newly chosen pastor. It is a member of the United Church of Christ of the United States which is striving to be like the United Church of Canada in the belief that federation with other self-determining groups in this time of schism is Christlike and important to the progress of the Kingdom of God. At present this group is comprised of the Congregational, Old Church, Evangelical and Reformed Churches, with an open door for other interested denominations. Fellowship is the watchword.

Output Is Varied

Seminole County small industries manufacture electronic components, aluminum jalousies and aluminum items for the building trade, boats, sport shirts, gowns, pajamas and swim suits. Insecticides, fertilizers and a nationally advertised insecticide floorwax are made here. Several plants make concrete blocks, septic tanks and pipe.

Grace Methodist Is New Church Which Quickly Won Friends

Grace Methodist Church is a new church in Sanford organized May 18, 1950 and located on Onora Road at Woodland Ave. in the Pinecrest area south of Sanford. Two years ago the land was purchased by the First Methodist Church and plans were laid for the development of the new church.

The Rev. W. Thomas Parsons, Jr. was assigned as the first pastor of the church shortly after it was organized. Under his leadership the membership has increased from 25 to more than 800 in a year and a half. The congregation, after meeting in a temporary location for several months moved into the new building, valued at nearly \$60,000, August 9th.

Giving sacrificially of time and money, the congregation watched their dream of a new church come to realization. They were assisted not only by the First Methodist Church but also by the District and National Board of Missions of The Methodist Church.

Much of the work has been done by the members of the church. Any Saturday, a group of men will still be found working to complete the painting and other finishing work. At the same time the women of the church will be found inside cleaning up the hall and rooms preparing for Sunday services. They are justly proud of the new building which

includes a Fellowship Hall or all-purpose room, offices, and classrooms, as well as a kitchen and rest rooms.

As the worship and Church School services have grown, Sunday evening family fellowship programs have recently been added. These are held once a month under the direction of the chairman, Wight Kirtley. This informal type of fellowship program is meeting a special need and has been well received by members and friends alike.

Under the leadership of James Talmadge, the adult choir has grown in size and talent until they are now noted as one of the truly outstanding choirs in the community. Talmadge is also directing a youth choir. A junior choir is being organized by Mrs. Harry Echelberger.

Grace Church has become known in the community for its friendly atmosphere. Visitors are quickly made to feel as though they belong. It is a church where civilian and service families alike have joined together to worship and serve God and their fellowman. In so doing they have gained spiritual strength that enriches and sustains them in their own individual lives.

Officials and friends are delighted at the reception and interest of the community in the new church. They are confident that in the immediate years ahead it will become one of the leading churches of central Florida.

Sanford Recreation Activities Fill After School Hours

The Recreation and Park Department has a well supervised program in action the year round in Sanford.

Ronald W. Perry, recreation director, said that the department is sponsoring a number of clubs this winter. Among those meeting regularly at the Civic Center are the Camera Club, the Archery Club, the Radio Riders (a sports car club), Model Airplane Club, the Sanford Art Association and a Square Dancing group called the Starlight Promenaders.

Instructions are given in ballroom dancing for children and adults. For the sports-minded there is tennis lessons for the young set, a city league of eight basketball teams, the Biddy Bas-

ketball League for youngsters under 13, the Junior American Bowling League, the annual city tennis tournament and baton lessons for girls.

During the Summer great attendance is drawn by the youth wings, the summer playground program, Little League baseball games, square dancing, Babe Ruth and city and church baseball games and baton lessons.

The recreation department brought the Florida Symphony orchestra to Sanford for two concerts on January 19. An afternoon performance was given for children. Another highlight of the year was added for the first time on December 17 when Christmas caroling was enjoyed at the Civic

Center. Perry said that this may be an annual event.

The Civic Center is open six nights a week with planned activity for the youth of Sanford. The Friday night attendance is usually around 300 with many more present on special occasions.

Between August 1, 1950 and July 31, 1950 attendance at the Sanford Recreation and Park Department facilities reached 508,000 and expenditures by the recreation department for the two city swimming pools, the stadium and one were more than \$42,000. Income was nearly \$9,000. Visitors at the new numbered 21,000, the Municipal and Goldsboro pool had 20,800 and the stadium recorded a total of 29,476 in attendance.

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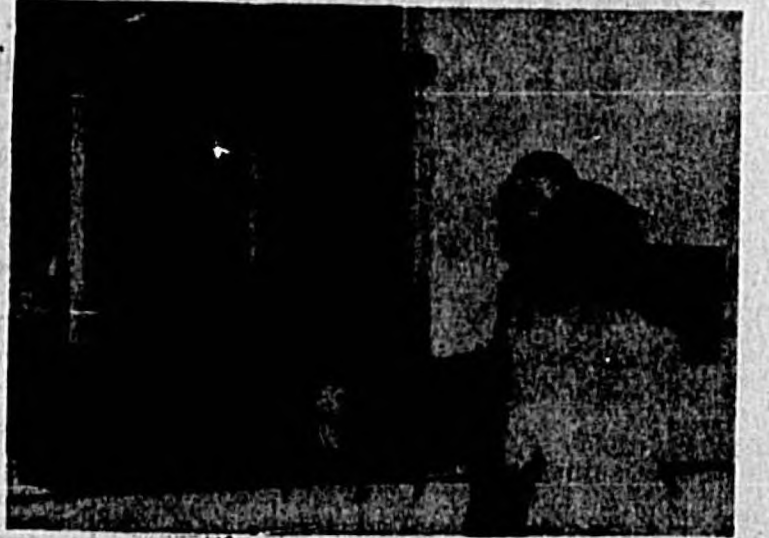
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U.S. Offers Reds Slash Arms Pact

GENEVA (UPI) — The United States offered Russia an agreement today to slash American and Russian troop strength to 2,100,000 men each provided the Soviets accept controls against cheating.

But Russia's Vsevolod Zorin demanded agreement first on "general and complete disarmament."

"Let's not tie ourselves up here with paper measures," Zorin said.

The U. S. offer was made by Frederick M. Eaton at the end of another three-hour session of the 10-nation disarmament conference, almost in exasperation after Zorin continuously sidestepped all Western attempts to get him to discuss guarantees against cheating.

Eaton reminded Zorin that the United States already had offered to freeze U. S. and Russian armed forces at 2,500,000 each and then reduce them to 2,100,000 men.

"We are prepared to accept these measures immediately," Eaton declared, "so long as they are accompanied by the verification machinery we consider essential."

But the session broke up with each side further rump from Zorin. Zorin went to lunch with French Delegate Jules Moch, continuing the informal diplomatic conversations begun last week.

Moch had also tried to get the conference off center by proposing that experts get to work to study concrete techniques for various disarmament measures. The Russians withheld a reply.

Russia today's session, authoritative sources said, the United States may soon offer to give advance notice of missile launches if the Soviets promise to do the same.

They said the offer probably would be made in an effort to get the 10-nation disarmament conference, now in its third week, started on something concrete.

Seminole Census Starts Next Week

Sanford and Seminole County doorbells will start ringing next week.

The bell pushers will be some 100 enumerators beginning the job of counting heads for the 1960 census.

The local tallies will be a unit of a 100,000 member-census army which will go throughout the nation to enumerate an estimated 180 million persons.

The mammoth counting job in the county is expected to be completed during the latter part of April.

The second stage — the gathering in of the detailed household questionnaires which will be left at every fourth house — is slated to be finished by mid-May.

An unofficial announcement of the results of the tally will be made by the local census office as soon as the tabulations are finished.

No U. S. Manned Moon Shot Set Until After '70

CLEVELAND, Ohio (UPI) — Dr. Y. Kwoh Glennan, head of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, says that the United States will not send a man to the moon until after 1970.

Glennan, president of Case Institute of Technology on leave to the NASA, made his prediction in the March issue of Engineering and Science Review, the school's undergraduate scientific publication.

Civil Rights Bill May Be Strengthened

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Some backers of civil rights legislation predicted today the Senate Judiciary Committee would strengthen the House-passed bill which it must act on by midnight.

Sen. Kenneth B. Keating (R-N.Y.) told reporters he was confident "we will have a bill out" by midnight and predicted it would be stronger than the five-point House measure.

Another committee member, Senate GOP Leader Everett M. Dirksen, said "there could be some changes other than technical amendments." Sens. Thomas C. Hennings Jr. (D-Mo.) and John A. Carroll (D-Colo.) also foresaw some changes.

Judiciary Chairman James O. Eastland (D-Miss.) said Charles J. Bloch of Macon, Ga., a special Georgia assistant attorney general, and Deputy U. S. Atty. Gen. Lawrence F. Walsh would testify today at the committee's second day of closed-door sessions.

In 6 1/2 hours of testimony Monday, Walsh and Atty. Gen. William P. Rogers defended the House bill as it is, including the administration-backed provision for court appointed referees to guarantee Negro voting rights.

Sewage Treatment Plant Demands Renewed By State

Sanford's sewage treatment plant problem with the state Board of Health came up again Monday night in connection with a subdivision being developed here.

The Board of Health sent a letter to Lefter and Bush, engineers for developer Philip Zeul, saying that the board couldn't approve a Sanford sewer extension into Zeul's new development because Sanford doesn't have a sewage treatment plant.

"As you are probably aware, the City of Sanford does not have a sewage treatment plant, though it does have a fairly extensive sewage collection system which discharges raw sewage to the receiving waters. In view of this fact, this agency does not feel that we can consider the approval of further extension to the system serving the City of Sanford," the letter said.

One commissioner said he couldn't see why the board was so demanding about a sewage treatment plant when a recent test of Lake Monroe showed that its waters are not made a menace by sewage.

City Commissioner J. H. Crapps said he would have a hearing on the matter Monday night.

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Plans Requested

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Flood-Swollen Prairie States Face New Threat

By United Press International The first big warmup of the season melted some of the heaviest snows in a half century and sent rivers surging over their banks in a wide area from the Dakotas to Kansas and Missouri.

Rain falling today across the country's mid section promised to send the rivers to even new heights.

Many families driven from their homes in low lying areas found shelter in municipal buildings. Other refugees were housed in private homes situated on higher ground.

Entire communities were isolated and tens of thousands of acres of farmland were under water. Property damage could not be estimated.

Three deaths were blamed on the floods — one each in Kansas, Nebraska and Missouri.

At Sioux City, Iowa, officials removed 300 residents from the Springfield district in advance of an expected major flood crest on the Floyd River.

Volunteers sandbagged entrances to stores and offices in the Springfield district which was hit by a wall of water 10 feet deep in a 1958 flood. Weather observers did not expect today's flood to be as bad as the one seven years ago.

But forecasters predicted the Big Blue River would crest 16 feet above flood stage at Blue Rapids, Kan., and Burlington, Neb., which would equal the highest flood stage since 1951.

Red tide? TAMPA (UPI)—State conservation authorities made another aerial check today of an area in the Gulf of Mexico where floating carcasses of dead fish have been sighted recently. Dr. Robert Hulston, chief of the State Marine Laboratory at St. Petersburg, said it was not yet known if the "red tide" caused the fish to die.

Church Service, Political Rally Requests Denied

The City Commission Monday denied requests for use of the Civic Center for church services and political rallies.

One petition came from the Seminole County Memorial Assn. which wanted to hold Easter Sunday services in the center. The other request came from the County Democratic Executive Committee which wanted to hold a political rally there, with all county candidates present.

The requests were denied after discussion of the original rules laid down when the Civic Center was opened.

Commissioner Robert B. r. a. n. pointed out that use of the rules formulated when the Civic Center was opened were that its chairs were not to be borrowed and that church services were not to be allowed there.

Another factor in the discussion was the possibility of having integrated audiences at such meetings. The city has taken a positive stand on keeping the facility completely segregated.

Castro Declares War On Anti-Reds HAVANA (UPI)—Premier Fidel Castro declared war today on Cuba's anti-Communists, charging that they "weaken faith" in his revolutionary regime.

In his third television in two days, Castro lashed out specifically at Luis Conte Aguiar, a college friend whose daily television commentary has become the nation's leading anti-Red forum.

Castro's appearance on the Telemundo Preguntas TV show was presented in the form of a press conference, but the newsmen on the panel had an opportunity to ask only one question: "What is your opinion of the current controversy over communism in Cuba?"

The Premier's reply took four hours, ending at 1:25 a. m. Conte, who has not been heard from since a Communist-led mob barred him from the studio Friday, was expected to seek asylum in one of the foreign embassies here.

Board Approves Lights Request

Sanford's Salsanda residents pulled a petition to the City Commission last night.

They asked the commission to let them keep their old street lights on Phumosa and Valencia Drives and on E. 14th St.

Floyd Palmer of 838 Valencia Dr. headed a delegation of nearly 15 Salsanda subdivision residents who preferred the old poles for their greater beauty. They also thought the old system would give more light.

"The people are very serious about keeping the lights we have," Palmer said, and he presented a petition from 50 persons to prove it.

A round of applause greeted Mayor Earl Higginbotham's motion to take the new lights out and put the old poles back.

The city was replacing the lights because it would be cheaper to put in the new poles with overhead wires rather than replace three quarters of a mile of the old damaged underground wire system.

Arson Believed School Fire Cause

The old Rosenwald Elementary School which burned down Feb. 17 was probably set on fire by District Fire Marshal Mark Cleveland Sr. said Monday.

The Sanford fire chief said he was "pretty sure it was arson" which destroyed the four room brick school. The culprit has not been found but cases of this type are never dropped, Cleveland said. The company which insured the Negro school has not yet made its report, County School Administrative Assistant Walter Teague said Monday.

The 28-year-old school was built of brick and heart pine and would cost about \$10,000 to build today, Teague said.

Liaison Board Member Named

Wight Kirtley was appointed temporary liaison member between the Sanford Zoning and Planning Board and the Board of Adjustment Monday night, and engineer William F. Bush was made a temporary member of the Zoning and Planning Board.

Lake Waters To Recede Soon

Lake Monroe is still rising, but very slowly, Sanford Public Works Director S. M. Richard said today.

Richard said he thinks the water will start receding by tomorrow or Thursday. This morning's readings show Lake Monroe 6.81 feet above sea level. This is the highest point the lake has reached since 1953 when the waters went to 9.41 feet above sea level.

Richard said the lake has gone over the sea wall at Ft. Mellon Park and at the French Ave. and Seminole Blvd. intersections. The waters are fast on the grass there and Richard does not expect them to reach the street pavement which is higher than the grass. The waters could harm the pavement by softening it if they reached the street, Richard said.

However, to do real harm to Seminole Blvd., the lake waters would have to float the pavement, he added.

The high waters could also damage sewers leading into Lake Monroe by backing up and exerting pressure within the pipes, Richard said. Damage to sewers will not be known until the lake has gone down.

The lake has risen a little over four inches since Saturday. This shows a leveling off, since last Tuesday the waters were rising about 4 1/2 to five inches per day. The high water mark last Tuesday was 3.4 feet above sea level.

Richard said the lake usually has its highest waters in October when they vary from four to six feet above sea level.
