City Grows, Plans To Double

The City of Sanford grew in area and population, expanded all municipal facilities and programs during the past 12 months and outlined plans for doubling in size.

Civic organizations, schools and churches kept pace, with increased efforts in the public interest and cultural groups initiated new community programs.

Building was a key word — permits valued at \$1,498,396 were issued during the fiscal year by the city. Most of them were for new homes, but increased commercial construction also was listed.

The city, operated by its commissioner-manager government, was cited by another Florida city, St. Augustine, for the efficiency of its operation after a tour by St. Augustine officials. Other state municipal leaders studied several programs undertaken by Sanford for possible adaptation to their needs.

City Manager Warren Knowles pro-

posed a 21-point program to take care of the anticipated growth. Prominent among them are:

Expansion of the fire department and police department personnel and facilities.

Development of a new water supply field, with water treatment plant.

An annual program of street resurfacing and rehabilitation.

Construction of a boat marina, with docks and berths on the Lake Monroe front.

Increased public parking downtown. Additional recreation parks and faciltties.

A barge terminal, contingent on construction of the proposed Sanford-Titusville Canal.

A sewage treatment by 1970.

The planning follows a line of solid accomplishment—the city operated within its budget for the past fiscal year and had some surplus funds while all the year's growth was being handled.

Slip Clutch Adds More Boat Power

The propeller slip-clutch, introduced on outboards some 35 years go, but common to most motors only recently has finally won out over the shear pin, according to the Evinrude Boating Foundation. The important advantage of the slip-clutch to most boatmen is not that it eliminates a nuisance (which it does) but that it provides the means to power clear of dangerous reefs and shoal waters --places where a dead propeller resulting from a sheared pin, could lead to serious trouble.

Boat Owners Can Save On Fuel Costs On almost every outboard-powered planing hull there is a maximum economy range that occurs somewhere between the planing speed and the maximum speed of the boat, according to research by

One reason for this, according to Chamber of Commerce Manager John Krider is that the county has the best financial structure in the state for prospective industrialists.

Many industrial plants are now undertaking giant expansion moves that will create new jobs for many residents in the county.

In the past, businesses were bearing the brunt of the taxes. Now, according to Krider, all that is reversed and "we have a high level of assessments and low millage.'

"It won't be long before all sections of the county will house new industry and structures," the Chamber of Commerce manager emphasized.

Krider said five new industries "are on the line now and we believe they will settle in the county." Already in production are electronic components,

clothing, brushes, metal plates, paints, plastics, netting, swim suits, fertilizers and other chemical products.



Agriculture Big

Seminole County is ranked 13th among Florida's 67 counties in the total of crops sold, with a value figure of \$12,559,260.

Agriculture in the county is big business. In spite of the fact that the county is small in land area, ranking 16th in the state, production is extensive and high in the field of agricultural production.

Not only does Seminole County receive recognition in the state for its production, but the census ranks it 41st in vegetable production and 87th in fruit production from the 3,069 countles in the U.S.

The total value of agricultural production in the county has increased during 1959 and these figures are based on reports from the end of 1958, County Agent Cecil Tucker emphasized.

The same surveys show that in 1958, the value of vegetable production was \$5,228,884; fruit and nuts, \$4,299,625; horticultural specialties, \$1,715,904 and field crops, \$15,526.

Livestock and livestock products totaled \$1,253,885 in 1958 and total forest products sold were worth \$17,365.

Seminole County is in the main an agricultural center. At present approximately 6,000 acres are in cultivation of vegetables; 13,000 are in improved pastures and over 15,000 acres are in citrus. There are 133,000 acres in commercial timberland, considerable commercial fishing and some mineral resources, including peat and mineral water.

> Celery and cabbage are the principal crops, with corn, beans, cauliflower, lettuce, peppers, squash, eggplant, escarole and other vegetables making up the balance of truck crop acreage. Seminole County also produces fine citrus, Inspected shipments of oranges, grapefruit, and tangerines for the 1956-57 season from the county are 1,562,360 boxes. The Sanford State Farmers Market, third largest in Florida, handles produce and citrus sales each year amounting to over \$5,000,000.

Casselberry and Fern Park are the centers for three companies the centers for three companies which grow the famous plumosa fern, the low plumosa being pre-ferred by flosists to larger ferns. The fern-growing business start-ed in Seminole County in the late 1920's and the county is an ideal area for growing ferns, ac-cording to Casselberry Ferneries, Inc.'s Manager Paul Bates. Farther north it is too cold and far-ther south the plants often turn

yellow. Lath houses cover acres of ferns in Casselberry and Fern Park. The shelters give the necessary half shade, but due to the expense of lumber, Casselberry Ferneries is changing to natural tree shade which is better, ac-cording to Bates, Trees provide more protection against cold wea-ther than sheds, he added.

Decorative plants are replacing many of Seminole's County's ferns, Bates said, but fern-grow-ing has been a good business for the past 30 years. Fern Park's Vaughan Fernery

is a matter of fact in Seminole County, but the county has not omitted continuation of its comfortable way of life from future planning. This section is about some of the communities and what is happening in them.

There are more businesses, more people and more activity of all kinds this year in Seminole County than ever before, and the county is getting ready for even greater expansion.

The county government, presided over by the Board of County Commissioners, made some impressive changes during 1959 and is making plans to handle the business of a population expected to reach 150,000 in a few years.

Completed at year's end was a countywide property revaluation for assessment of taxes which added millions of dollars to the tax roll and left the county with the lowest tax levy in Florida-11 mills. This was designed to spread the tax burden more equitably.

Expansion of county operations include plans for the biggest road improvement program ever, improvements to the courthouse, a new \$100,000 health center, a big Memorial Hospital expansion, a new jail, a survey of the needs for improvement or building of a new county home for the aged and indigent, and a big school construction program.

Comprehensive zoning has been adopt-ed on a countywide basis for the first time and a series of public meetings scheduled to explain the program to residents of each district of the county.

This zoning plan protects restricted residential areas and allows prospective commercial or industrial site purchasers to get an exact picture of how property is classified.

Building permit values in the county during 1958 and 1959 were in excess of \$34 million, with an increase of \$7 million in 1959 for a total of \$20,588,074 that year alone. Building included more than 3,000 new homes.

County population is now more than 52,000 and Seminole is listed as fifth in growth and eighth in population density per square mile in Florida. Two telephone companies had 3,750 phones in 1950-now they list 15,600 customers,

Fortunately, Seminole County has room to grow at a rapid rate and still remain the tropical location of comfortable living which first attracted people to the state.

Tax Collections Gain \$400,000

Tax Collector John Galloway re-ported that by the tax deadline April 1 approximately \$1,600,000 will have been collected from county property owners on their 1959 taxes.

Galloway said this would represent a gain of \$400,000 over the previous year in taxes collected. One prime reason for the increase was the giant reapprasal conducted in 1959.

Typical New Seminole County Elementary School Rosenwald School Is One Of Seven Projects year, with 10,434 registered on opening day, as Seminole County continued a \$3 million construction program to provide facilities for present needs and future growth, A new \$1% million Seminole High School now being built next to Lake Jennie will lead off the new county schools and school additions being readied for fall.

The new high school built in a eampus style will accommodate 1,000-1,200 students in its 30 classrooms. As a senior high it is meant for grades 10-12, according to Walter Teague, county school administrative assistant. Science, homemaking, library, diversified cooperative training, music, band and art rooms, a gym, auditorium, and cafetorium will be included in the school's facilities.

Junior High School students now attending the Pinecrest grades seven through nine. The Pinecrest School with a capacity of 1,000 children will then house grades one through six. Additions to Midway and Rosen-

Seminole County's school budget totals over \$6 million this year. County schools are receiving \$1,-903,828 in state and federal funds for the July 1959-July 1960 fiscal year, \$307,800 in county taxes, \$461,700 in district taxes and \$6, 750 from other sources. This school support and main-

tenance budget requires \$1,869,000 expense on faculty salaries, \$86,-350 for transportation, \$340,614 for capital outlay, \$60,224 to pay off debts and \$770,943 for reserves and other expenses.

Churches, Old And New Serve Communities

Sanford and Seminole County have long been noted for the religious tenor which characterizes the area. There are many fine churches representing all sectarian tenents, including Protestant, Catholic, and Jewish. More than 50 churches are listed on the church directory page of The Herald.

Some of the church groups in the area have been established for many years. Among those of historical standing are the Holy Cross Episcopal Church, which dates from 1872, the Congregational Christian Church dating back to 1890 and the Lake Mary Community Presbyterian, founded in 1804.

With an expanding economy and a proportionate growth in population, many new churches have come into existence in recent years. Old buildings have become inadequate to house growing congregations. New church construction of additions to existing buildings and the erection of completely new plants can be observed throughout the county. A most important role is per-

formed by the many Navy families from the Sanford Naval Air Station who have affiliated themselves with local churches. Their contribution is time, energy, and financial support have given many congregations a healthy incentive to improve and expand their ministries.

A 42 percent increase in enrollment was noted in the school compared to the previous year. The school includes grades one through 12 with a faculty of 52 members. Principal of the school is Ralph

Diggs. Lyman serves a large and rapidly growing area in the southern part of the county. It includes students from Altamonte Springs, Bear Lake, Forest City, Fern Park, Casselberry and Sanlando Springs.

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U.S. Offers **Reds Slash Arms** Pact

GENEVA (UPI) - The United States offered Russia an agreement today to slash American and Russian troop strength to 2,100,000 men each provided the Soviets accept controls against cheating.

But Russia's Vaerian Zorin dehanded agreement first on "general and complete disarmament." "Let's not tie ourselves up here with paper measures," Zorin said. The U. S. offer was made by Frederick M. Eaton at the end of another three-hour session of the 10-nation disarmament conference, almost in exasperation after Zorin continuously sidestepped all Western attempts to get him to discuss guarantees against cheat-

Eaton reminded Zorin that the United States already had offered to freeze U. S. and Russian armed forces at 2.500,000 each and then reduce them to 2,100,000 men.

"We are prepared to accept these measures immediately." Eaton declared, "so long as they are accompanied by the verification machinery we consider es-

But the session broke up without any further reply from Zorin. Zorin went to lunch with French Delegate Jules Moch, continuing the informal diplomatic ponvorsa-Mons begun last week. Moch had also tried to get the
