Deputy Court Clerk Suspended Pending Outcome Of Probe

A Seminole court deputy clerk was suspended without pay today pending the outcome of an investigation by the State Attorney's Office of allegations that the clerk illegally prepared a woman's divorce papers and pocketed \$180 cash which she charged for the work.

Mary A. Knight, a deputy clerk and clerk's office Microfilm Department supervisor, was suspended without pay from her job today because the investigation "could result in your being charged with misdemeanor and felony offenses," Arthur H. Beckwith Jr., clerk of the court, stated in his memorandum to Ms. Knight.

Beckwith is Ms. Knight's supervisor.

"At the recommendation of our labor attorney, we suspended her without pay pending the outcome of the investigation, and subsequent judicial proceedings, if any," Beckwith said. "At the conclusion of their investigation, depending on the outcome, we will also independently review the matter to determine if action should be taken against her in connection with her duties as a clerk's office employee."

While Ms. Knight, an 8-year employee of the clerk's office, has repeatedly denied charges that she helped anyone prepare legal documents or pocketed money charged for the service, Consumer Fraud Division Investigator

Douglas Huth said he will give her an opportunity to make a statement on her behalf today.

"She's coming to my office this morning with her lawyer but it is doubtful she will make a statement at this time," said Huth. "However, we want to give her the opportunity to speak if she so wishes."

Huth began probing the allegations last week after Circuit Judge S. Joseph Davis Jr. informed his office of claims made by Beatrice Lee Baker of 2411 Granby St. during divorce hearing proceedings that a woman, whom she identified as Ms. Knight, helped her prepare her divorce papers. Mrs. Baker added she paid the clerk \$180 for the work, Davis said.

According to Beckwith, no one except a

licensed lawyer is permitted to offer legal advice or prepare legal documents on another's behalf for profit. Ms. Knight is not a licensed lawyer, Beckwith said.

"She did my (divorce) papers and she did the papers for my daughter in Longwood," Mrs. Baker said. Mrs. Baker said that even though her daughter decided not to go through with the divorce, "she still had to pay the \$180."

"She also wrote out these notes for me to read in court before the judge," Mrs. Baker said, concerning two hand-written notes which she brought with her to The Evening Herald.

"These notes give me and another daughter, Mary (Daugherty) in-

structions on what to tell the judge," Mrs. Baker said.

"I hope to have the investigation wrapped up in about a week or a week and a half," Huth said. "I'm still trying to get some experts to review some of the information in the case, like handwriting analysis, logistics and that sort of thing."

Huth is also looking into claims by Mrs. Baker and Mrs. Daugherty that Ms. Knight offered them a \$50 bribe to destroy the hand-written notes and to disavow their claims of her alleged wrongdoings.

Mrs. Baker said she and her daughter were approached by Ms. Knight last week near the courthouse and the clerk allegedly offered her \$50 to "forget the

whole thing and tear up these papers.

"Momma wouldn't take the money but I did," Mrs. Daugherty said. "I figured she took enough from momma and she owed us something."

Huth said Mrs. Daugherty turned the money over to him as evidence in the case along with a piece of paper allegedly torn from Ms. Knight's personal check bearing her unlisted home telephone number.

"We were supposed to call her at home that night and let her know that the instructions on the two papers had been destroyed," Mrs. Daugherty said.

Ms. Knight and her lawyer, James Golden, could not be reached for comment concerning the investigation.

'He Lied On Me...'

Woman Kills Man; Workers Are Horrified

A Sanford woman drove onto a construction site early this morning, got out of her car and began shooting at one of the workers as several of his colleagues watched in horror.

After shooting him at least twice as she faced him, she chased her victim when he turned to run. The woman, according to different eyewitness accounts, continued shooting, hitting the man at least twice more, maybe several more times in the back. After her victim dropped to the ground, the woman looked around to see several construction workers lying face down in the dirt, and others scurrying in different directions.

The woman, witnesses said, got back into her car and attempted to speed off, but a crew foreman, a Lake Mary Vietnam veteran, jumped into his pickup truck and gave chase. As the woman's car neared the exit of the construction site, another man operating a front-end loader, attempted to block her vehicle with his heavy equipment. However, witnesses said, the woman drove her car around the front-end loader. The foreman in pursuit, drove his pickup around the other side of the heavy equipment, and rammed the woman's car broadside.

Her victim was dead on arrival at Central Florida Regional Hospital. He has tentatively been identified as Byron Brooks, 21, of 850 W. First St., Sanford.

Moments after he was pronounced dead, the woman who is accused of shooting him, Susie M. Davis, 24, of 105 Olive Ave., Sanford, was brought into the hospital for treatment of cuts

she sustained when her car was rammed, according to Sanford police.

The shooting occurred about 9:30 a.m. at the site of Sanford Landing Apartments at 1801 W. First St.

The crew foreman who pursued the woman, Keith King, 39, gave this account of his involvement:

"I went over to where Byron was lying on the ground. I had my own gun and I had it out. I figured when she got in her car, that she was going to drive over to him and start shooting him again, and I wasn't gonna let her do that. I've been in Vietnam and saw a lot of people killed, but that was legal. I can't say killing someone because he lied to you."

King was referring to eyewitness accounts that when the woman first drove onto the construction site from First Street, she got out and yelled "He lied on me. He lied on me," and fired two shots into the man.

"She fooled me, though. She drove her car around us and headed for the exit leading onto West First Street. That's when I jumped into my pickup truck. I was angry. I chased after her car, and when she drove around the front-end loader, I drove around the other side and rammed her car in the side, her side. She couldn't get out of her side, and had to slide over the front seat to get out on the passenger's side. I jumped out and pointed my gun at her and told her, 'Get out of the car without a gun, or I'll kill you.'" King said he saw two weapons in her car, one on the seat and one on the floor. He said one looked like a .22 caliber, the other a .38.

Neiswender Quits County Post

Seminole County Administrator Roger Neiswender, in a surprise announcement Monday night, said he will leave that post to work for a consulting firm in Orlando.

Neiswender said he will leave the \$50,400 annual position to head the Orlando office of Post, Buckley, Schuh and Jernigan Inc.

He will not leave the county payroll for several months but he made the announcement Monday because the firm's contract as a county sewer and water consultant is up for renewal this month.

"I didn't want the negotiation process to be colored by the fact I was going to work for the," Neiswender said.

Neiswender, who became county administrator when Seminole County commissioners established the position seven years ago, said he would probably leave the post in December. He has accumulated leave time which would allow him to be on the payroll through February, Neiswender said.

"When I took the job as county administrator I didn't want to stay in government," he said. "I had become convinced that government couldn't get anything done."

Neiswender said the county commissioners who have served since he was appointed to the post have given him the opportunity to provide "professional advice" with a minimum of political influence.

"I'm a little scared. Private business always has been held up as the acid test," he said.

Neiswender praised the quality of the staff the county has assembled over the past few years. He

said several of those people are probably qualified to succeed him.

Neiswender said commissioners would probably have the opportunity to consider people from around the county because of the fine working environment the county has established.

But he added the hope that staff personnel would be considered for the post as well. "I hope some of your in-house people beat the door down trying to get in here," he said.

Commissioner Bill Kirchhoff said perhaps the county should consider asking Neiswender to sign an agreement pledging not to raid the county staff for employees. But Neiswender said he had too much pride in the staff to do that.

Commissioner Sandra Glenn said she was "shocked and surprised" at Neiswender's announcement.

"Many years ago Roger and I had a conversation out in a parking lot when I was a city official thinking of making the big step of running for county office," she said. She said his professionalism has made Neiswender a "hell of a guy to work with."

Commissioner Robert Sturm said he has mixed emotions about Neiswender's departure.

"There's pleasure that someone with his expertise is going into private industry," Sturm said. He added there is sadness because the county is losing a fine administrator.

"I'm really surprised he has stayed in the county administrator's post as long as he has," Sturm said. Private industry is the next step for someone with the management and business expertise that Neiswender has, Sturm said because there are very few government jobs which pay as well as the administrator's job.

County attorney Nikki Clayton said, "It has been a real privilege to work with him. I'm happy for the opportunity he has. I hope we can find someone with as strong a character and honest intentions as he has."

"There are very few good guys in the world," Ms. Clayton said. "He's one of the true good guys."

Kidnapper Begins 30-Year Sentence

A 27-year-old Lake Mary man has begun serving a 30-year prison sentence for abducting a teen-age girl from her father's Sanford used car lot in July 1981.

Darrell Lynn Theophilus of 163 Frederick Ave. was sentenced Friday to 30 years in the state prison by Circuit Judge Kenneth M. Leffler for kidnapping Angelina Lash, now 18, from her father's used car lot — Jim Lash Blue Book Cars, at 414 S. Orlando Ave.

Leffler also sentenced Theophilus to serve 30 years probation after he pleaded guilty to armed robbery charges in conjunction with the kidnapping charge on Sept. 28, 1981. Theophilus will be required to serve at least three years in the

state prison before he can be considered eligible for parole, Leffler said. Leffler also retained jurisdiction over him for 10 years, providing that any attempt to parole Theophilus during the next 10 years must be cleared through Leffler.

Theophilus was formally charged by police with kidnapping, armed robbery, grand theft of an automobile, carrying a concealed weapon and aggravated assault in connection with the abduction after he turned himself in to Decatur County, Ind., on July 13, 1981, about a week after the kidnapping occurred.

According to police, Theophilus rode into the dealership on a bicycle at about 3:30 p.m. July 6 carrying a blanket in which he had hidden a .22 caliber semi-automatic rifle. After taking a test drive in a 1973 Oldsmobile Cutlass valued at about \$1,300,

police said he pulled the rifle and said, "I'll just take it for free."

Theophilus stole a wallet from Ray Lash, Angelina's uncle and a salesman at the car lot, forced the 17-year-old girl into the car and sped away. Nearly seven hours later, Miss Lash was released unharmed in downtown Tallahassee.

All other charges against Theophilus were dropped by prosecutors.

In addition, Theophilus was sentenced in June 1982 to five years in the state prison on a Seminole County burglary charge by Circuit Judge S. Joseph Davis Jr., according to court clerks. The five-year sentence will be served following the 30-year prison term imposed for kidnapping by Leffler.

Graham: U.S. On Road To Economic Recovery

LAKE BUENA VISTA (UPI) — Gov. Bob Graham says congressional passage of the \$98.3 billion tax bill, the largest peacetime tax hike in the nation's history, is a signal America is on the road to economic recovery.

"Passage of the tax bill was the necessary thing to do," Graham said Monday following his keynote address to the 21st annual National Conference of Lieutenant Governors near Walt Disney World.

"Even with this increase, we are looking at a federal deficit in the range of \$150 billion. That's a hemorrhaging of federal fiscal irresponsibility that we can't tolerate."

If Congress had not approved the tax increase, Graham said, the deficit would be "almost \$200 billion." Both the Senate and House narrowly passed the Reagan-backed bill last week. It will bring in an estimated \$98.3 billion in new revenue over the next three years.

Graham said the recent rally on Wall Street indicates investors "feel economic times are going to get better. I don't think this would have happened if Congress had turned down this tax increase," he said.

"It is a signal that the national government is prepared to take some tough stands to begin to bring our national deficit under control."

Sheik Makes 'Em Happy

SOUTH PASADENA (UPI) — Sheik Mohammad Al-Fassi took his open-pocketbook policy on a tour of Florida Monday, making residents of three communities happy with donations totalling \$80,000.

The billionaire Saudi Arabian sheik was accompanied by an entourage that included Indian activist Russell Means and former world heavyweight boxing champion Muhammad Ali as he jetted from Key West to Tallahassee and South Pasadena.

His biggest donation was in Tallahassee where he gave a \$30,000 check to Turn About Inc., a program to treat teenagers with alcohol and illegal drug problems. While there, he also presented the city with a \$10,000 check for youth programs and a \$10,000 check for beautification projects.

Al-Fassi gave the city of South Pasadena two checks for \$10,000 each, one for youth programs and one for beautification, and in Key West he gave a \$10,000 check to a neighborhood improvement association of black businessmen.

Armed Robbery Suspect Is Caught

A 35-year-old Longwood man was being held in the Seminole County jail today as a suspect in Monday night's armed robbery of a Longwood pizza restaurant after witnesses gave deputies a detailed description of the gunman and his getaway car.

Lee Mack Thomas of 519 Peachtree Lane was charged with armed robbery and using a firearm in the commission of a felony shortly after deputies were notified of an armed robbery at the Pizza Hut restaurant at State Road 436 near Interstate 4 in Longwood at about 10:50 p.m.

Witnesses told deputies that a man walked into the restaurant, approached the front counter and ordered a cup of coffee. When the cashier opened the register, the man walked behind the counter, put a gun against her back and said, "give me all the money," deputies said.

The man took an undisclosed amount of cash and fled from the restaurant, making his escape in a white-over-blue Pontiac Lemans, deputies said. However, restaurant employees followed after the gunman and were able to jot down the number of the car's license tag.

Witnesses relayed the information to deputies concerning a description of the gunman and his car. Deputies then radioed to area police patrols to be on the lookout for the suspected robber.

Shortly after the announcement, Casselberry police told deputies they had stopped a vehicle and motorist, matching the description of the gunman along Melody Lane in Casselberry. Deputies responded to Melody Lane, with witnesses who said the man matched the description of the man who robbed the restaurant.

Thomas was placed under arrest and transported to the county jail where he was being held under \$10,000 bond.

Deputies said they also discovered a chrome-plated gun and some cash under the front seat of the car Thomas was driving.

Cuba To Offer New Investment Incentives

MIAMI (UPI) — The Cuban government has decided to make a major policy change and join a growing number of its Caribbean neighbors in seeking to attract foreign financial investment by offering tax breaks and other incentives.

The move by the Communist island-nation to aid its troubled economy is the first time since Fidel Castro came into power that such efforts to entice foreign investment have been made.

There are 20 to 30 foreign offices in Cuba, but no foreign companies are involved in manufacturing or the service industry, Antonio Villaverdes, secretary general of the Cuban Chamber of Commerce, told the Miami Herald.

Tears, Bacon And Eggs

LONDON (UPI) — Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher remembers Britain's Falkland Islands war against Argentina as a time of loneliness, tears and constant refueling with bacon and eggs.

"Some of the times were terrible," said Mrs. Thatcher in a magazine interview released Monday. Asked if she had ever wept during the 10-week war with Argentina in which more than 200 British soldiers died, she said, "Oh yes, you can't help it. They just come. But you pull yourself together very quickly. You have to."

Mrs. Thatcher returned to No. 10 Downing Street Monday following surgery to remove varicose veins at a private London clinic.

Poland Protests Radio

WARSAW, Poland (UPI) — An official Polish newspaper accused underground Solidarity leaders of trying to incite "bloody rebellion" and the government protested Western radio broadcasts it said encourage demonstrations.

Official Polish media Monday lambasted Western Polish language radio broadcasts it said have told Poles where and when to assemble for Aug. 31 rallies commemorating the founding of independent trade union Solidarity.

The official Polish news agency PAP announced the Foreign Ministry has lodged a formal protest against the radio stations with senior diplomats from the U.S., French, British and West German embassies.

PLO Vows To Go On

Guerrilla chief Yasser Arafat urged Palestinians sailing today from Beirut to continue their struggle for a homeland and one of his top military aides defiantly vowed "to liberate Palestine" with stepped-up terrorist attacks.

A fourth group of about 1,000 guerrillas prepared to set sail from west Beirut for Yemen, one of eight Arab countries where an estimated 7,100 Palestine Liberation Organization fighters will be dispersed.

"The world will see, in the very near future, actions in the occupied territories that will make Begin's hair stand on end," said Salah Khalaf, the No. 2 man in Arafat's Al Fatah force.

Raiders Sign 6-3 Smith, Holland Twin Towers Arrive

Kevin Jerry Smith has signed a basketball scholarship to play for Seminole Community College, coach Bill Payne announced Tuesday. Smith played at Mainland High School during his prep career. He played at the University of Florida two years ago. The 6-3, 160-pounder is an excellent leaper, according to Payne. "K. J. signed Monday and the boys (Twin Towers) 6-9 Rudy Kuiper and 6-8 Ronald Koldenhof from Holland are here, so we're all set," said Payne. The Raiders will open practice Sept. 1 or 2.

DeLand's Chavers Hurts Knee

TALEAHASSEE (UPI)—Florida State starting nose guard Lenny Chavers injured his knee Monday during a night practice and was rushed to the hospital for X-rays.

The seriousness of the injury was uncertain pending the results of doctors' examinations. Chavers, a sophomore from DeLand, was to start in place of James Glebert, who graduated last year.

"Sometimes you feel like you can't win," head coach Bobby Bowden said. "Nose guard was one of the big concerns on this club and now the possibility of Chavers being lost happens. He was playing pretty good this fall and it would be a hard loss."

If the 5-foot-11, 240-pound sophomore must undergo surgery, Bowden said he would be replaced by either Isaac Williams or Gerald Nichols, both freshmen on the Florida State squad.

Shavers To Fight Gardner

MILWAUKEE (UPI) — Earnie Shavers, who once fought World Boxing Council champion Larry Holmes for the heavyweight title, will be fighting unknown Chuck Gardner Sept. 5.

The 37-year-old Shavers will meet Gardner in a 10-round staged in an area set up behind the Kettle Moraine High School in Wales. Shavers said he is still fighting because he wants another chance at the title.

"Larry promised me another shot," Shavers said Monday. "The big problem is promoters like Don King and Bob Arum have the say who gets the title shots. If you're not under contract to one of them, it's almost impossible."

He fought for the title three times, the last coming Sept. 28, 1979, against Holmes, who defeated him. Since then, he has gradually disappeared from the big money fights — but he still hopes.

"I still think I could fight for a couple more years. I'm a puncher," he said.

But, Shavers said, age has taken its toll. "It takes me eight or nine weeks to get into shape when it used to take me three or four."

Galloway To Miss 6 Weeks

ST. LOUIS (UPI) — The St. Louis Cardinals say rookie defensive lineman David Galloway will miss the next six weeks because of a dislocated right elbow.

Galloway, the Cardinals' second-round draft choice from Florida, was injured in the fourth quarter of St. Louis' 16-13 exhibition loss to San Francisco Saturday night.

Galloway's arm is expected to be in a cast for about 2 1/2 weeks.

"It's really a shame because he was really starting to come on," said Coach Jim Hanifan.

Galloway will not be placed on the injured reserve list until after the final roster cut Sept. 6 so the Cardinals will be able to recall him without having to put him on waivers.

Husted Holds Command

SARASOTA (UPI) — Dave Husted stood only one game away from his second Professional Bowlers Association championship of the year Monday night as he led the top-seeded position and headed into the finals of the \$95,000 Sarasota Open.

Husted, from Milwaukee, Ore., averaged 203 for his last eight games, but was never seriously threatened, finishing 176 pins ahead of Marshall Holman of Medford, Ore.

Dave Giles of Miami qualified at third, with Tom Baker of Buffalo, N.Y., in fourth and Guppy Troup of Jacksonville, Fla., in the fifth and final position.

Nick Tjotjos of Cleveland finished at sixth missing the finals by 25 pins, and will serve as an alternate.

The 22-year-old Husted had a match play record of 14-9-1 with a 219 overall average. He took over the lead in the fourth round Sunday night and built his margin to nearly 300 pins at one point.

Husted will await a challenge from one of the four lower qualifiers to shoot for the \$12,000 first prize. He won the BPA U.S. Open earlier this year and stands fifth in the yearly money standings with \$76,070.

Biles, however, said the mistakes of the team and the slow start of the offense, particularly running back Earl Campbell, who was held to 13 yards rushing, did not overly concern him because play is still in the preseason stage.

"When you go into preseason, you look at different things and go into different things. We're still making adjustments," Biles said. "Our mental mistakes, missed assignments and lack of concentration are all correctable."

Biles said in this Saturday's game against the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, the starters, including quarterback Gifford Nielsen, will play at least half the game and possibly three quarters.

Allergies Affected By Several Factors

DEAR DR. LAMB - I have had allergic reactions for years. My inhalant reactions are primarily nasal and be controlled with many available drugs. Food reactions are more severe for me and include stomach upset, bowel distress, blurred vision and severe headaches.
Often the inhalant symptoms disappear when I have an upset stomach with nausea that wasn't caused by an allergy. Recently simple surgery was followed by a total remission of my nasal symptoms while the wound was healing. Apparently when my body is busy healing it is too busy to bother with an allergic reaction. Has anyone come up with a non-traumatic way of diverting the attention of the system from allergic responses?
My inhalant allergies were treated with injections for a number of years, but I was told the only solution to food allergies was abstinence.
DEAR READER - There are many factors that influence a person's susceptibility to allergy. To illustrate, a person who has a food allergy that produces only mild symptoms with a modest intake of the food item may have such a severe allergic reaction after a small amount of alcohol that he requires emergency medical treatment. Never drink alcohol and consume a food you have any tendency to be allergic to at the same time.
And the way an allergen enters your body does not always determine the symptoms you have. You can have nasal symptoms and even allergic asthma from eating a food you are allergic to.
Incidentally, all those symptoms you mentioned can be caused by food allergies. I think of allergies as the great imitators because they can produce the symptoms of almost any disease.
The symptoms depend upon where the antibody (IgE) is fixed in your tissue. If you are

allergic to milk and the milk antibody is in your lung tissue, you may have asthma when you drink milk. The allergen from the milk gets to the lungs via your circulation.
To help answer your questions I am sending you The Health Letter number 19-12, Food Allergies. Others who want this issue can send 75 cents with a long, stamped, self-addressed envelope for it to me, in care of this newspaper, P.O. Box 1551, Radio City Station, New York, NY 10019.

DEAR DR. LAMB - During the past year I have been having some upsetting experiences while asleep at night. I wake up in the early hours, and find myself completely paralyzed. I lie there a few minutes unable to move, although I can hear the alarm clock ticking. Eventually I can turn my head and the rest of my body.

Is this some form of palsy or brain damage? It seems to be happening more often all the time. I am a 43-year-old woman and take medication for arthritis, including gold injections, Palqueul and Clinril.

DEAR READER - That sensation normally happens on rare occasions but if you have it frequently it should be investigated. It is sleep paralysis and is commonly one of the features of narcolepsy. What is narcolepsy? A tendency to have short frequent attacks of sleep.

Tell your doctor about it. It is just possible that it could be a reaction to one of your medicines. If changing them is possible and doesn't help and you continue to have them you might want to see a neurologist. I don't think you have palsy or brain damage.
