

### Orlando UDC Leader Condemns New Klan

ORLANDO (AP)—A daughter of the Confederacy objected strongly today to an "American Confederate Army" which a Ku Klux Klan leader said has been formed.

Mrs. Frank Cullen, publicity director and past president of the UDC in Central Florida, said in a statement:

"Certainly no thinking American would subscribe to bearing arms against the federal government and certainly the Sons of Confederate Veterans and Sons of the Confederacy will condemn this action of renaming the Klan the Confederate Army of America."

"We are all good Americans, North and South, and our love of the brave men of the Confederacy is a hallowed memory, not to be bandied about for political or public purposes."

The Klan leader, Bill Hendrix, said at Tallahassee Tuesday the KKK is sponsoring the "American Confederate Army" and that it might be ready to bear arms in defiance of any Supreme Court order banning racial segregation.

"There was no fever at all this morning," Short told newsmen. "There's a possibility there may be a little today, but he is getting very close to complete recovery."

The President left the White House at 6:40 a. m. EST and entered the hospital 20 minutes later. He was accompanied by Maj. Gen. Wallace H. Graham, presidential physician.

White House reporters could not recall that Mr. Truman ever entered a hospital for as long as two or three days since he became President more than seven years ago.

Mr. Truman was admitted to the Presidential Suite at the big military hospital in Northwest Washington.

This marked the first time the suite was used by the President since it was prepared for him several years ago.

It has been used by others, including Gen. George G. Marshall and Premier Mohammed Mossadegh of Iran.

Short said the President was well enough to shave and dress himself before going to the hospital in his big black limousine.

Instead of two-thirds of the Senate's membership as it now required.

He said the present cloture rule has allowed the threat of filibusters to block votes on civil rights legislation.

Lehman is a member of the Platform Drafting Committee and a supporter of Averell Harriman for the Democratic presidential nomination. He told newsmen: "We are not going to pull punches on civil rights, on foreign policy, on civil liberties, on labor, on agriculture, or on immigration."

Meanwhile in New York two Democratic presidential aspirants and a spokesman for a third gave varying answers Tuesday night to a radio program question on whether the federal government has too much power.

Averell Harriman, mutual security director, described the federal government as "a community of 150 million people" and said it can "give a helping hand to all."

Sen. Robert S. Kerr of Oklahoma said the American people have firm control over the government and they have granted it "great power because it has rendered great service."

## Plane Crash Into 2 Houses Takes 4 Lives

### Second Accident In As Many Days Occurs In Metropolitan Los Angeles Area

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A light plane, taking off in heavy fog, plunged into two houses today, setting one afire and killing the two men and two women aboard the plane.

No one was injured in the houses. Occupants of the one most badly wrecked are on vacation.

One neighbor, Mrs. May Palmer, said: "I was looking out the window to see if it was going to rain. I heard a terrific crash, and saw a body go flying by."

The plane had scraped the roof of the home of Sam Caldwell on May El Segundo Boulevard, then cartwheeled into the living room of the house next door. But it tore right out again, and spread debris into the street. The engine was 75 feet from the fuselage.

Caldwell, his wife and baby, were in their house but escaped injury. The next door neighbors, Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Corley, left last Saturday on a vacation trip to Mesa, Ark.

The sheriff's office identified the victims as:

Dale E. Baker, 38, Portland, Ore. (He carried another address: Graham, Ore.)

Muriel Joyce Jones, 21, Fresh-

— Florence Joyce Jones, age unknown, same address.

The second man was unidentified.

It was the second instance in as many days of a plane hitting a residence in the metropolitan area. In Santa Ana Wednesday afternoon a Navy jet lost a wing and ploughed into a residence, wrecking it while its owners were out shopping. Witnesses said the pilot could have bailed out, but stayed with his craft in a desperate effort to bring it down safely.

In Santa Ana, horrified watchers said the Navy plane had been disabled from away from a residential district.

In Oviedo, Paul Mikler, coach at the Oviedo School, is in charge of county recreation, and he is assisted by assistants supplied by the Oviedo P.T.A. and the local Women's Club.

The Negro program in Oviedo is under the supervision of Lilly R. Hall, teacher at the Oviedo colored school, who is assisted by student helpers.

The entire program is supported enthusiastically by the children of the county, Mr. Lawton said, and a very good attendance has been reported throughout the county. So successful has the program proved that it has been extended to six weeks from the four weeks originally planned, he added.

Judge Criswell said Wednesday the girl was married to a 16-year-old dairy hand at Folkston, Ga., about two weeks ago.

The two were held on a complaint by the girl's parents. Judge Criswell said a hearing has been set for Monday when he will enter an order in the case.

"I'm going to write to Gov. Tammidge, send him pictures of these children and ask him to investigate the ordinary (minor official) who married them," Criswell said.

The girl was described as five feet tall and weighing about 95 pounds.

Criswell said the boy's parents took the couple to Folkston for the marriage ceremony. "They told me the children were in love and wanted to get married," the judge said.

After the girl's parents reported the wedding to juvenile authorities, the youngsters were taken into custody. They had set up housekeeping in a 3-room shack on a dairy farm where the boy works.

## Zerrenner, Back From GOP Meet, Says Party United Behind Ike

Just returned from the Republican National Convention in Chicago where he acted as sergeant-at-arms for the Florida state headquarters, Fred Zerrenner, west side farmer, reported today that he feels the party is now united behind the candidacy of Dwight D. Eisenhower for the presidency of the United States.

### Iranian Premier Resigns Post In Row With Shah

### Aging And Emotional Leader Led Battle Expelling British

TEHRAN (AP) — Premier Mohammed Mossadegh, emotional chief of Iranian national unity, signed unexpectedly after a dispute with Shah Mohammed Reza Pahlavi and Parliament today to choose a successor.

The resignation, which plunged Iran into a new period of political uncertainty, was announced at a closed session of Parliament this morning by Hossein Ala, the minister of court representing the Shah.

One deputy and the message from the Palace disclosed that the 72-year-old Premier quit Wednesday night after the Shah refused to agree to let him become minister of war, a post Premier had proposed during a conference between Mossadegh and the Shah.

Some observers speculated it was unlikely — although still possible — that Mossadegh would again be reappointed by the Majlis, which has less than two weeks ago voted that he remain head of the state.

Mossadegh, himself, was reported at his home "back in bed."

The aging, emotional leader, who resigned his post of premier last year, had been expelled from office in a coup by the Shah and his supporters.



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

SILVER SPRINGS (Special)—Every team will be represented, and leaders in every department will play will be in uniform in the Florida State League's first annual "North-South" All-Star game to be played in beautiful Memorial Stadium in Sanford, Friday night, July 25, starting at 8:15 o'clock. So said 2,439 fans who cast ballots around the league last weekend.

Voting was evenly divided, with fans in Jax Beach, Palatka, Daytona, and DeLand, the "north" supporters, casting 1,100 votes to the 1,210 votes cast by fans in Sanford, Orlando, Cocoa, and Leesburg.

Fans normally selected Orlando's Arnold Sewell as one of their two right-handers, but Sewell was called into the Army earlier this week, and his place will be taken by promising young rookie, Virgil Frazier. Sewell got 208 votes for second spot on the South team right-handers, while Frazier got 202.

Closest races were those for outfield posts on the North team for not until the last votes came in it was revealed that Tesnow had nosed out Mike Kassaban of Palatka by 91 votes, and Buster Kinard of Jax Beach had topped Ken Braeske of DeLand by 86 votes.

Levy polled more votes than did any other player, 1,567—in the race for a position, while DeLand's Red Roberts got 1,450 for second high for a position. Having selected their teams, fans assured themselves of seeing, on the North team, the league's top three sluggers, best base stealer, winningest hurler, and South team will offer the league's home run champion and runner-up, three rookie hurriers, and three managers.



### State Plant Head Resigns After 33 Years In Service

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — Arthur C. Brown will retire as Florida state plant commissioner at the end of this month after 33 years state service.

The State Plant Board announced Brown's retirement today and named Manatee County Agent Ed Lee Ayers, Bradford, to succeed him in the nation's largest horticultural division of the state. Brown, 64, has been plant commissioner since 1920, when he succeeded the late Dr. William R. Newell. He had been "well" assistant and had a major role in brooding the Mediterranean fruit fly.

The plant commissioner is the administrative officer of the agency which has charge of controlling horticultural diseases of the state. It operates with a budget of \$442,000 a year under the plant board, which is made up of members of the State Board of Control.

Brown is a native St. Louis, Mo., and a graduate of the University of Missouri. First went to work for the Florida Plant Board, which is a state board of control, in 1920. He was introduced as an act ratifying and confirming the Civil Service system for Sanford, Fla., in 1915 as a R inspector in the citrus canker eradication project. Then he moved a foreign plant quarantine station at Jacksonville until military service in World War I.

He returned to Sanford in 1919 and has been with the state ever since except for three years in which he was in the private farming business in the Everglades.

He was in charge of Mediterranean fruit fly eradication program in the Orlando in 1929 and 1930.

He added that since rates have not kept pace the rising costs of hospital and for this reason the hospital itself caught in a difficult situation.

A great deal of it, he said, is due to the hospital's inability to respond to challenge presented by these qualities.

once a month to give attention to City employees who may require it.

He pointed out that men under Civil Service feel more secure in their jobs, as the City cannot "fire them without good cause." All City department heads, and workers, including firemen, policemen and truck drivers, are under the Civil Service, he said.

Mr. Lee had high praise for the faithful work of L. F. Boyle, who unlike the other two members, is elected by the workers. Hugh Wheeler is the other member of the board, and a good man for the job, said Mr. Lee.

Asked whether the City Commission can legally remove a member of the Civil Service Board, A. Edwin Shihnsler, City attorney, declined to give an answer, stating that the City had not asked him to rule on the matter.

Mr. Boyle likewise declined to render an opinion on the legality of such action, pointing out that the matter is one within the jurisdiction of the City Attorney.

He revealed, however, that the Civil Service Board had met on Thursday, July 10, following Mr. Lee's re-appointment by the City Commission, and had re-elected the latter, chairman. Senator Boyle said that Senate Bill No. 303, which he introduced as an act ratifying and confirming the Civil Service system for Sanford, was passed and adopted by the State Legislature on Feb. 14, 1945.

In 1949, when the Legislature approved the new City Charter, the Sanford Civil Service system was included in the approval, he said.

Hugh Wheeler, Mr. Boyle said, was appointed to the board several years ago by the City Commission, following the resignation of Harry Tooke, an original member.

The law governing removal of members of the Civil Service Board is contained in section No. 4 of City Ordinance No. 349 and states: "The members of the Civil Service Board shall have the right to expel any member thereof for feigning, malfeasance or non-feasance in office, upon a majority vote of the members of said Board and the City Commission or head of any department or any member or members of the Civil Service or any citizen or taxpayer shall have the right to prefer charges against any member of the Civil Service Board and on said charges being filed with the Secretary of said Board, said Board shall proceed to hear and determine said charges, after reasonable notice to the member of said Board against whom charges have been made and to the party or parties making such charges, and if the charges are sustained, said member shall be removed. ## Steel Seizure Under Draft Act Foreseen

### White House Is Said To Be Seriously Examining Avenue For Taking Over Plants

WASHINGTON (AP)—The White House is reported today to be seriously considering a plan to seize part of the steel industry under the Selective Service Act.

This word came from a high administrative source who said Justice Department attorneys were instructed Thursday afternoon to prepare papers leading to possible partial seizure of the industry.

The critical situation which has resulted from the 47-day steel strike was discussed Thursday at a White House meeting, presided over by Acting Defense Mobilizer John B. Starnes.

The Selective Service Act gives the President power to seize only plants which fail to produce under contract with procurement agencies.

The act says that "if any such producer of steel or other re-usable metal or other material, or any such producer of such material, refuses to comply with such requirements, the President, through the secretary of defense, is authorized to take immediate possession of the plants of such producer."

President Truman seized the entire steel industry last April 8, but on June 2 the Supreme Court ruled that he lacked authority to do so and ordered the mills returned to private ownership. The April 8 seizure was based on no specific law but rather on what the Justice Department said were the President's inherent constitutional powers.

Former Solicitor General Philip Perlman told both the District and Supreme Courts in the seizure case that the government had considered seizure under the Selective Service Act but had decided the method was too cumbersome and too difficult to pursue.

## Truman Gets Last Tests And Plans To Go Home Saturday

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Truman's doctors gave him the last of a series of medical tests today while Democratic politicians waited impatiently for his dismissal from the hospital.

After nearly a week's bout with a virus infection, the President's temperature had returned to normal, but Democratic presidential aspirants could not boast as much with the Chicago National Convention opening Monday.

Truman expects to return to the White House Saturday, but there is no indication that he plans to make known his choice of a successor in advance of the balloting. There is a move on his part to be the deciding factor in selection of the Democratic nominee.

Most of the people around Mr. Truman profess to be in the dark. Even Cabinet members are button-holing reporters asking them, "What is the boss going to do?"

And Mr. Truman's own alternate to the Democratic convention, the man who will cast his vote, has been unable to see the President during a trip to Washington this week.

Tom J. Gavin, Kansas City, apparently was an iron horse without getting an audience with the President because of Mr. Truman's illness and his subsequent trip to the Army's Walter Reed Hospital for a complete checkup.

The President was stricken Sunday. While he has shown steady improvement since Monday, according to the White House, he was hospitalized for the first time since he entered the White House for a checkup on orders of Maj. Gen. Wallace H. Graham, his physician.

Mr. Truman plans to fly to Chicago next week to address the closing session of the convention.

## Pullman Company To Hike Minimum Rates

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Pullman Co. received permission today to raise its minimum charge for sleeping car accommodations by about 25 per cent.

The Interstate Commerce Commission said the company could put the increase into effect on July 22.

The new schedule of rates will establish a minimum charge of five dollars for a lower berth in a standard Pullman car. The present minimum is \$4.05 for that type of accommodation.

Since all sleeping-car charges are tied to the basic lower-berth fare, all other types of sleeping accommodations will take a proportionate advance. Thus, the minimum charge for a lower berth in a tourist sleeping car will advance from \$3.90 to \$3.95.

The upper berth minimum will become \$2.00 in a standard Pullman and \$2.05 in a tourist car, with roomettes priced at a flat seven dollars.

### Southern Bell Co. Asks Nickle Raise In Pay Station Call

TALLAHASSEE (AP)—Southern Bell Telephone Co. wants to charge a dime, instead of a nickel, for a local pay station phone call. It also is asking the State Utilities Commission for permission to increase its charges for service connections, restorations of service, moves and changes, private home exchanges, key equipment, wiring plans, miscellaneous equipment, Teletypewriter inter-exchange connections and out-of-town connections to local numbers.

J. B. Kincaid, Florida manager for the company, said the increased revenue would raise the \$1,117,000 a year needed to pay for a general employe wage increase which the Wage Stabilization Board has granted.

He said it would do no more than that. His petition to the state board said he wage increases were retroactive to June 1 and June 8 and the company "is already suffering a substantial daily decrease in the entire East Coast, some of the income" to meet the added payroll.

The company did not ask for any increase in regular business and residential telephone rental rates, nor long distance toll charges. Southern Bell serves about 80 per cent of Florida's telephone subscribers. Its exchanges cover the entire East Coast, some of the interior and the northwestern tip of the state.

Bill Signed Keeping Farm Price Supports

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Truman signed into law today a bill continuing government support of prices for cotton, wheat, corn, rice, tobacco and peanuts at 90 per cent of parity through 1954.

The President said in a statement that the new law "is a valuable addition to the agricultural legislation which has been so important in maintaining a strong and stable farm economy and which has contributed so markedly to a much-needed increase in the American standard of rural living."

The law provides that parity for these six crops will be determined, through 1953, by whichever of two present formulas gives the higher price. The controversial "folding scale" parity program was set aside for the 1953 and 1954 crop years.

Parity is a price determined by the government to be fair to farmers in terms of things they buy. Secretary of Agriculture Brannan already has announced the six crops will be supported at 90 per cent of parity this year.

## New Premier Vows To Solve Oil Squabble

### Iranian Head Pledges Solution In Bid To Reestablish British Economic Relations

TEHRAN, Iran (AP)—Premier Ahmed Qavam extended a peace bid to the British today in the long bitter dispute over nationalization of Iran's oil. He also promised to resign if he fails to solve the nation's oil problems.

In a communique broadcast to the entire world, the newly appointed Premier declared: "The solving of this problem will be one of my most important efforts, so that the moral and material interests of Iran will be completely secured without the slightest rift in good relations between the two countries."

"Obviously this is a difficult job but it is not impossible. Good sense will definitely bring about peace. If not I will leave this post."

The nationalization of the billion-dollar British-operated Anglo-Iranian Co. was accomplished during the regime of Mohammad Mossadegh. Loss of revenues because of the oil refineries has brought Iran to near bankruptcy. British-Iranian relations hit their lowest point.

Qavam's promise was his first public announcement since he took over Thursday as Premier, succeeding Mossadegh.

Qavam's appointment followed an economic and policy and turning a legal question into an equity between two nations.

Government troops cracked down earlier on supporters of Mossadegh and occupied headquarters of two political clubs backing the emotional oil nationalist chief. Police arrested several persons when they tried to demonstrate in the center of the city against Qavam.

Police said the demonstrators, led by Kazim Hassabi oil consultant to Mossadegh, crowded to the streets, shouting "Death to Qavam" and "Down with Qavam." He has parliamentary immunity.

Qavam, whose designation as Premier surprised Mossadegh's supporters, was expected to present his new Cabinet in the Majlis chamber of Parliament in a day or two.

Qavam, who headed the government in 1946 and 1947 and brought the nation safely through two Iranian general elections, was nominated for Premier by the Majlis Thursday. A vote by the Majlis would be necessary, since the Senate is in recess.

## Telephone System As Fire Alarm Is Shown In Tampa

TAMPA (AP)—Demonstration of a device designed to convert a conventional telephone system into an automatic fire alarm system was scheduled for a Tampa hotel today.

The inventor, Thomas J. Tate, St. Petersburg, Fla., will conduct the demonstration at the Tampa Hotel. The only hotel in the country with the Tate device.

About 100 hotel, insurance, telephone and government executives are here for the demonstration.

The invention consists of a relay connected to the telephone in each of the hotel's 250 rooms and leased telephone lines.

The device is designed to detect fire in any room which will transmit a signal which causes the hotel switchboard to ring the fire alarm.
