Canadians Anxiously Await Tuesday's Vote In Quebec

QUEBEC (UPI) - Canadians today awoke on Queen Victoria's birthday, a national holiday, quietly anxiousabout the possible results of Tuesday's referendum in Quebec that national leaders say could lead to the disintegration of the country.

More than 4.36 million persons out of a 6.2-million Quebec population are eligible to cast ballots in the \$10

The long-awaited referendum asks residents on Canada's second most populous province to grant the Parti Quebecois government a mandate to begin negotiations that would lead to Quebec's independence, coupled with an economic association with Canada's

other nine provinces. Premiers of the other provinces and Prime Minister Pierre Trudeau have vowed they would not negotiate soverignty-association with Rene Levesque, premier of the French-Canadian province.

Pessimists speculate a majority "yes" vote predicted by the most recent public opinion poll could lead to a replay of the November 1970 crisis, when the federal government sent troops into Quebec to suppress terrorist activities by radical separatists.

Korean Students Defy Law

Former Peru Leader Wins

LIMA, Peru (UPI) - Former President Fernando Belaunde Terry, toppled by the military coup in 1968, swept to an unexpected and overwhelming victory today in Peru's first presidential election in 17 years. Television projections based on reliable polls gave Belaunde an average of 43 percent of the vote, seven claim the presidency.

Belaunde, candidate of the moderate Popular Action Party convincingly defeated Armando Villanusva del Campo of the American Popular Revolutionary

Iran Navy Shows Strength

TEHRAN, Iran (UPI) - Iranian Naval units conducted exercises in the waters around the Strait of Hormoz today in a show of strength described by the state radio as "the largest since the Islamic

The exercises, witnessed by President Abolbassan Bani-Sadr from the deck of a warship, followed vague reports in Iranian newspapers that unidentified "flying objects" and aircraft were sighted over the Iranian coastal area off the Persian Gulf and that U.S. Navy ships in the area had launched their own maneuvers "to frighten Iran."

NATIONAL REPORT: Southwest Louisiana residents, under the shadow of still more rain clouds, endured their worst flooding in 40 years which left three persons dead and damage in the millions of dollars. "We can't take any more rain," said Calcasieu Parish deputy Malcolm Campbell. "It hits people hard." But the National Weather Service reported thunderstorms and flash flood warnings would remain on the horizon until late today. Rainstorms and tornadoes that battered the Gulf Coast during the past week were blamed for at least seven deaths. Louisiana officials feared more rain today would cause a repeat of weekend floods because the ground was already saturated by more than 20 inches of rain in some

Allies Disappoint U.S.

NAPLES, Italy (UPI) - The European Common Iran affecting only a tiny fraction of its trade with the oil-producing Islamic nation in a direct rebuff to a U.S. call for a full embargo.

Foreign ministers of the nine-nation community also ended their two-day meeting Sunday by refusing to consider reducing the estimated 600,000 barrels of oil the community imports daily from the Persian Gulf

The ministers called the meeting to strengthen Washington's demand for the speedy release of the 53 Americans but rather than back the full embargo sought by Washington, they limited the sanctions to trade contracts signed after the Americans were taken

Those contracts represent onl, a small fraction of the community's annual \$7 billion trade total with Iran. A full embargo would have excluded all exports except

Dr. Perez Chosen As AMA Delegate

Sanford physician Dr. Luis M. Perez has been elected by the Florida Medical Association as delegate to the American Medical Association. The Cuban-born cardiologist and internist, who became a U.S. citizen in 1961, says he is the first

He and his wife, Maria, also a physician, have lived Perez, who has been the recipient of many awards for hi nmunity service against drug abuse and communism received an award Saturday at the Florida Medical Association meeting in Hollywood for his contributions to

As a delegate, Perez will attend the AMA meeting in Chicago in July and one elsewhere in December. He expects to continue his year-round work on the AMA's Medical Education Committee, which deals with the training of foreign doctors in the United States and American medical students abroad as well as training and medical conferences for U.S. doctors.

He says because of the paper work involved, it costs the doctors more to bill Medicaid patients than they collect. cause of this, some don't even bother.



Therefore, Perez proposes premiums for health insurance, whether issued by the government or private companies, be ensessed on the besis of 10 percent of the individual's gross ennual income. "It would be a guarantee that they wouldn't have to pay more than 10 percent of their income no matter how high their medical costs are and nobody gets wiped out," he said. "If someone dozan't want to participate, they must be

"This would eliminate a lot of bureaucracy, too, so the Why does a doctor with a busy practice concern himself with civic affairs? Perez explained that when he was a doctor in Cube he thought he should stick to practicing medicine and not concern himself with politics and what was going on. "I was naive and innocent, but after seeing what happened in Cube, I'm not going to sit back and let it happen here if I can help it."

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (UPI) - Firefighters who walked picket lines last week will vote this week on a contract containing a 16 to 22 percent pay raise. However, those firemen and paramedics who left their jobs during the eight-day strike face disciplinary suspensions for participating in the illegal walkout. The tentative contract is expected to be explained to the rank and file union members no later than Tuesday with two full days of balloting required in the ratification vote. Marvin J. Kelly, 50, of Cocoa, Fla., shot and killed his wife, Berenice, and sister-in-law, Hazel Bouillard, at Lincoln Park, where three other families were holding birthday parties. Each woman was shot several times.

Kelly's 7-year-old niece, who was not identified, witnessed the shootings, but no one else was injured Kelly then fled to his room at the Lin-Oaks Motel where he shot himself in the head. His body was found on a driveway outside the motel.

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The per capita' personal income of residents of Anchorage, Alaska, in 1978 was 51 percent above the national average, the Commerce

Department said today. In a listing of per capita personal income levels for 273 Standard Metropolitain Statistical Areas and another 3,141 counties nationwide, the agency said the national average per capita personal income in 1978 was \$7,840. In the SMSAs it was \$8,343 and in the

The fuel economy figures are based on Environmental Protection Agency and industry test results that "do not take into consideration many variables affecting on-road fuel economy," the committee said, quoting from a report by the Subcommittee on the Environment, Energy and Natural Resources.



Canada's **Big Test**

The crises in Iran and Afghanistan, the presidential primaries, and new waves of immigrants from Cuba have turned American eyes away from Canada with which we share 3,000 miles of tranquil border, a common language and cultural bonds. Yet Canada may be facing the severest constitutional test in its 113-year history when citizens of Quebec vote May 20 on their French-speaking province's future, perhaps as a sovereign state.

An affirmative vote by Quebecers would, at the least, put further stress on a federal system already strained by the diverging interests of eastern and western provinces. At its unthinkable worst, it might fractionalize the nation, setting up an independent state in its center. Quebec's demand for more autonomy - or even outright sovereignty, if Provincial Premier Rene Levesque has his way - is based upon understandable cultural and economic grievances. French-speaking Quebecers have long resented their minority status in English-speaking Canada.

They smart under what they perceive as discrimination. Provincial sovereignty for many is the answer. But Canada would be plunged into controversy if French-speaking dissatisfaction led to a mandate for Levesque's carefully modulated proposal to discuss with the other provinces Quebec sovereignty within an economic association, transforming Canada into a sort of Common Market.

The discussions would be acrimonious, and perhaps unproductive. English-speaking Canadians are already testy about federal efforts to make French a national language, and they resent Quebec's claims to a larger share of the

There is danger that a failure of the talks might push Quebec into secession — even against the wishes of the nation - an eventuality Prime Minister Pierre Elliott Trudeau has said he will neither activiesce in nor oppose with force. Nevertheless, he has warned Quebec there will be no economic concessions should it leave the confederation, a warning calculated to chill enthusiasm for independence.

The chain reaction from Quebec's departure could be devastating. Serious differences between the backward eastern maritime provinces, industrialized Ontario, and the West where oil-rich Alberta is already asserting economic independence, would inevitably assume larger importance once the union was breached.

The best hope now is that the fear of the economic consequences of independence will outweigh its emotional appeal to Quebecers. I not, there remains latitude for Trudeau to arrange some sort of compromise, perhaps reshaping the Canadian federation to accommodate the separatist pressures of Quebec and thus containing them.



9 Dead, 21 Missing As Volcano Erupts 1,300 feet of its top off Sunday in violent eruptions that sent hot mud, ash and gases raging down its slopes. Nine fatalities

at least 21 others were missing. Heavy ash boiling out of the mountain to elevations as high as 10 miles drifted eastward today, blotting out the sky and Weight Watcher, 10 a.m., Asscension Lutheran leaving gritty, slippery deposits on roads as far east as

Montana and Wyoming, 500 miles away. National Weather Service officials said because the finer particles of ash had been blown into the stratosphere by upper evel winds, the dust could circle the globe for up to two years,

possibly having an effect on world weather patterns.

Among the missing were David A. Johnston, a volcano expert for the U.S. Geological Survey, and Reid Blackburn, on assignment for National Geographic and the Vancouver Columbian. Both were at work on the mountain when the gigantic explosion occurred.

Highway and air traffic came to a standstill in most of eastern Washington and schools were closed as far away as Missoula, Mont.

Despite the new violence, Bob Christiansen, USGS geologist,

said no lava had emerged from the mountain and that the volcano's history indicated any lava flow would be confined to the slopes of the mountain. In addition to the nine bodies found Sunday, authorities said 21 people — including stubborn 83-year-old Harry Truman who

refused to leave his lodge on Spirit Lake on the mountain's north side - were missing and feared dead. An Air National Guard spokesman estimated between 30 and 50 injured people were airlifted from the Toutle River Valley northwest of the volcano. Mudflows sent walls of water up to 12

feet high crashing through the valley at speeds of 30 mph. Mount St. Helens had been threatening a major explosion since March 27 when it roared to life after a 123-year slumber. The mightiest blast of all, heard 150 miles away, occurred without warning at 8:32 a.m. Sunday. Minutes after the eruption, officials ordered the evacuation

of about 2,000 people from the base of the mountain. Jim Unterwegner of the U.S. Forest Service said the shock wave blew down all timber and vegetation in a fan shape extending 15 miles out to the north and west of the peak. "The face of the mountain has virtually disappeared,"

Unterwegner said. "It's totally devastated. It's like being next to ground zero in an atomic bomb blast." The eruption sent huge plumes of dark gray ash up to 60,000



NEW YORK (UPI) - OK, suppose there is a baseball strike this coming Friday, what will happen then? To reassure all those with any apprehension about it, the world won't come to an end.

Those 800 million people in Communist China aren't the least concerned whether the ballplayers go out on strike or not. They're going to keep playing pingpong one way or the other. Similarly, it's a fairly safe guess that while a good number of the inhabitants of this country will despair over the absence of major league baseball for awhile, they will adjust to it in time the same way they did to the passing of such former pleasures as the six-day bike race, convertible coupe and good old five-
