

County Reaps 'Bonanza' In Rail Crossing Improvements

Fifteen Amtrak railroad crossings in Seminole County will get new or upgraded signals and gates this year in a program that amounts to a "bonanza" for the county and its municipalities, according to County Engineer Bill Bush Jr. The Florida Department of Transportation, Amtrak and the Seaboard Coast Line Railroad will spend about \$50,000 per crossing in a partially federal funded program that will eventually upgrade crossings from Tampa to St. Petersburg, Bush said.

In the unincorporated areas of Seminole County, eight crossings are slated to be improved at an estimated cost of \$400,000.

These crossings are located on County Road 427, County Road 15, North Street, O'Brien Road, Airport Boulevard, County Road 66A, Southwest Road and 18th Street.

In addition, three crossings will be improved in Longwood, two in Sanford and one each in Altamonte Springs and Lake Mary.

Under this program, Bush said, the aim is to install or upgrade signals and gates at all crossings that carry passenger trains.

The county already pays half the maintenance costs of crossing equipment and the increase, estimated to be \$2,345, "is almost peanuts," Bush said.

Bush said he believes all the work in the county would be performed this year, since when the work crews begin work in a county, they don't leave until they finish all of the jobs in the county.

As for crossings that don't fall under this program, Bush said some are being improved under other programs and those that cross state roads are handled by the Florida Department of Transportation.

2,500 More Troops Sent To Riot Area

MIAMI (UPI) — Another 2,500 National Guardsmen armed with M-16 rifles were called up today to try to avert a third night of rioting that has left 19 known dead in the nation's worst racial disturbances since the mid-1960s.

Authorities said hundreds were injured and more than 400 were arrested. Property damage was expected to run into the billions of dollars.

Schools were closed today and bus service was canceled.

It was early today before state troopers and local police were able to start quelling the burning, looting and sniping by armed blacks who broke into pawnshops and stripped them of rifles, shotguns and pistols.

Officials had hoped an 8 p.m. to 6 a.m. curfew imposed by Gov. Bob Graham would work.

It didn't, at least not until dawn was beginning to break over a city famous as a vacation mecca for millions, and more recently for the thousands of Cuban and Haitian refugees seeking freedom and a better life in the United States.

The rioting erupted Saturday night after the black ghetto areas of the city learned that an all-white jury in Tampa, Fla. had acquitted four former policemen from Miami, all white, in the December beating death of black insurance agent Arthur McDuffie, 33. Showcasing "McDuffie, McDuffie," a crowd of blacks took to the streets and the pillaging began.

The riot had moved to Tampa from Miami because the judge feared the racially-insensitive juries in Miami was a "time bomb" ready to go off.

The acid stench of burning buildings and debris hung in the damp air. Guardsmen diverted thousands of morning rush hour motorists around the riot area, a sprawling ghetto area called "Liberity City" located in northwest Miami.

The last riot occurred when the 1968 Republican National Convention was held at Miami Beach.

By late morning, fire fighters — protected by police and guardsmen — had managed to extinguish all fires. Fire officials said there had been hundreds during the night, including 30 to 50 major ones.

Dade County Public Safety Director Bobby Jones, put in command by the governor of all police and national guard troops, said the situation by late morning was stable.

Witnesses Lacked Credibility Jurors Offered Police Protection

TAMPA, Fla. (UPI) — The six jurors who acquitted four former Dade County police officers in the beating death of Arthur McDuffie have been offered police protection after at least one received a telephone threat.

The jurors originally agreed not to comment on their deliberations but after violent rioting broke out in Miami over the weekend, some did talk.

The Tampa Tribune, in a copyrighted story Monday, quoted foreman David Fisher as saying the jurors were split when they first began deliberations.

"The jury was not in agreement from the beginning," he said. "It was pretty well split."

Another juror, not identified, told the St. Petersburg Times the state did not prove its case.

"They just paraded a string of immunized witnesses up there and I have a hard time believing any person or persons lying to protect their own skin," he said.

"I'm sure the blacks in the community think we're racists," he said. "There was a tragedy. A crime was committed. It's too bad some people were overzealous," he said. "The prosecutors bungled some of the elementary investigation procedures. You couldn't convict these guys on that. It seemed to me early on, a lot of questions weren't being answered."

Fisher said he believed the prosecution was prompted by pressure from the Miami media and said once the investigation began officials "grabbed the first people they could and some of the culprits are still up there."

He said investigators made too many errors and that had the investigation been handled properly the verdict might have been different.

French President Meets With Brezhnev

WARSAW, Poland (UPI) — Soviet President Leonid Brezhnev met today with French President Valery Giscard d'Estaing in surprise, secrecy-shrouded talks on Afghanistan.

The hastily arranged meeting was Brezhnev's third major trip in 10 days, coming after his attendance at the Warsaw Pact summit meeting in Warsaw Thursday and the funeral for Yugoslav President Josip Broz Tito in Belgrade May 8.

The announcement that the two leaders would meet came only Sunday evening as Giscard was landing in Warsaw — less than 12 hours before the start of the talks hosted by Poland's leader Edward Gierek in the 18th century Wilanow Palace outside the capital.

Brezhnev, grinning broadly, had to be helped from his limousine but otherwise appeared fit as he joined Giscard to be greeted by Gierek on the steps of the palace. Gierek then led the two leaders to the palace's "white room," where a round table had been set up.

A spokesman for the French delegation said both sides agreed the meeting would be informal with no final communique.

The spokesman said the planned one-day meeting was in the nature of bilateral contacts and Giscard had not come to meet Brezhnev as a spokesman for the West.

But the spokesman said Giscard would present France's views on international problems — especially Afghanistan, where the Soviets have approximately 80,000 troops that the United States and its NATO allies want withdrawn.

A spokesman for the Giscard in Paris said the French president would emphasize France's firm desire for the Soviets to withdraw their troops and would stress NATO's solidarity.

Secretary of State Edmund Muskie last week told Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko that the obstacle of Afghanistan had to be removed before Washington would resume its dialogue with Moscow.

French sources in Paris said Brezhnev requested the meeting, explaining it was set up Friday in talks between Gromyko and French Foreign Minister Jean Francois-Poncet in Vienna.

A city police spokesman confirmed just before dawn that "the curfew is working for us right now. I hope we can keep it that way."

A Miami fire operations dispatcher reported, "All the major fires are under control. They are rekindling and resetting some of them, but we're getting in to fight them."

Until 1 a.m., firefighters stood helplessly on the perimeter of the riot areas and watched hundreds of fires burn supermarkets, warehouses, and stores to the ground. Police were unable to provide protection from snipers and gangs of rock-and-bottle-throwing looters.

Police units clad in flak jackets and riot helmets began moving into the ravaged areas soon after a curfew. Among those arrested were 42 whites, including four men and a woman who roared through the restricted area in a Jeep-like truck firing carbines.

During the curfew period, police said up to 200 people were taken to hospitals with the injuries.

The violence was the worst domestic rioting since the 1967 riot at Detroit that left at least 40 dead and nearly a billion dollars in damage. Police compared the Miami violence to the 1965 Watts riots in Los Angeles that killed 34 people.

"They're not going to know how many are dead until this has been over a long time," one officer said.

"Some of these fools believe they're at war," said another policeman at a roadblock near the Miami International Airport late Sunday night.

Canadians Anxiously Await Tuesday's Vote In Quebec

QUEBEC (UPI) — Canadians today awoke on Queen Victoria's birthday, a national holiday, quietly anxious about the possible results of Tuesday's referendum in Quebec that national leaders say could lead to the disintegration of the country.

More than 4.36 million persons out of a 6.2-million Quebec population are eligible to cast ballots in the 110 million vote.

Korean Students Defy Law

SEOUL, South Korea (UPI) — Fifty thousand students and residents of a major city south of Seoul today defied a law forbidding parades with rocks and sticks for a second straight day today, defying the proclamation of full martial law and a ban on political activity.

Reports from Kwangju, 170 miles south of Seoul, said there were numerous injuries, but no exact figure was immediately available.

Former Peru Leader Wins

LIMA, Peru (UPI) — Former President Fernando Belaunde Terry, toppled by the military coup in 1968, swept to an unexpected and overwhelming victory today in Peru's first presidential election in 17 years.

Television projections based on reliable polls gave Belaunde an average of 43 percent of the vote, seven percentage points more than the minimum required to claim the presidency.

African Hotel Floor Seized

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (UPI) — Three men claiming to be armed with explosives seized the 15th floor of the Carlton Hotel in Johannesburg today, a police spokesman said.

Iran Navy Shows Strength

TEHRAN, Iran (UPI) — Iranian Naval units conducted exercises in the waters around the Strait of Hormuz today in a show of strength described by the state radio as "the largest since the Islamic revolution."

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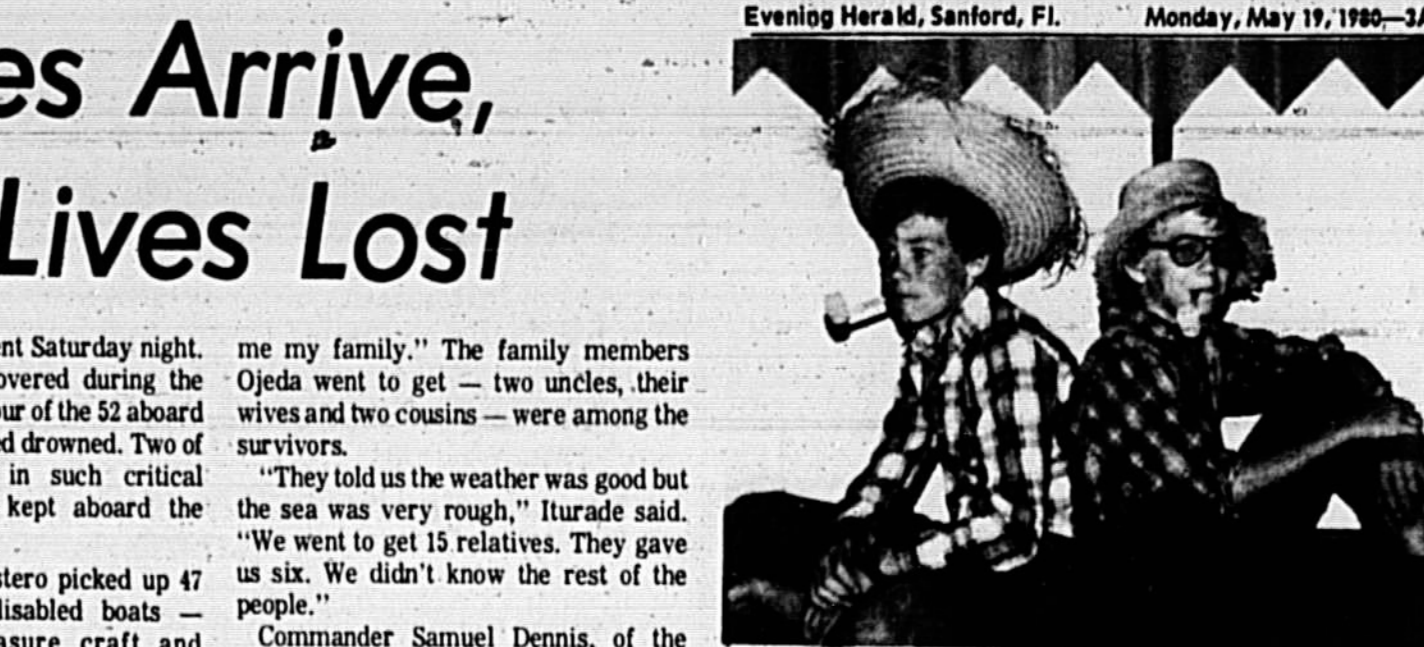

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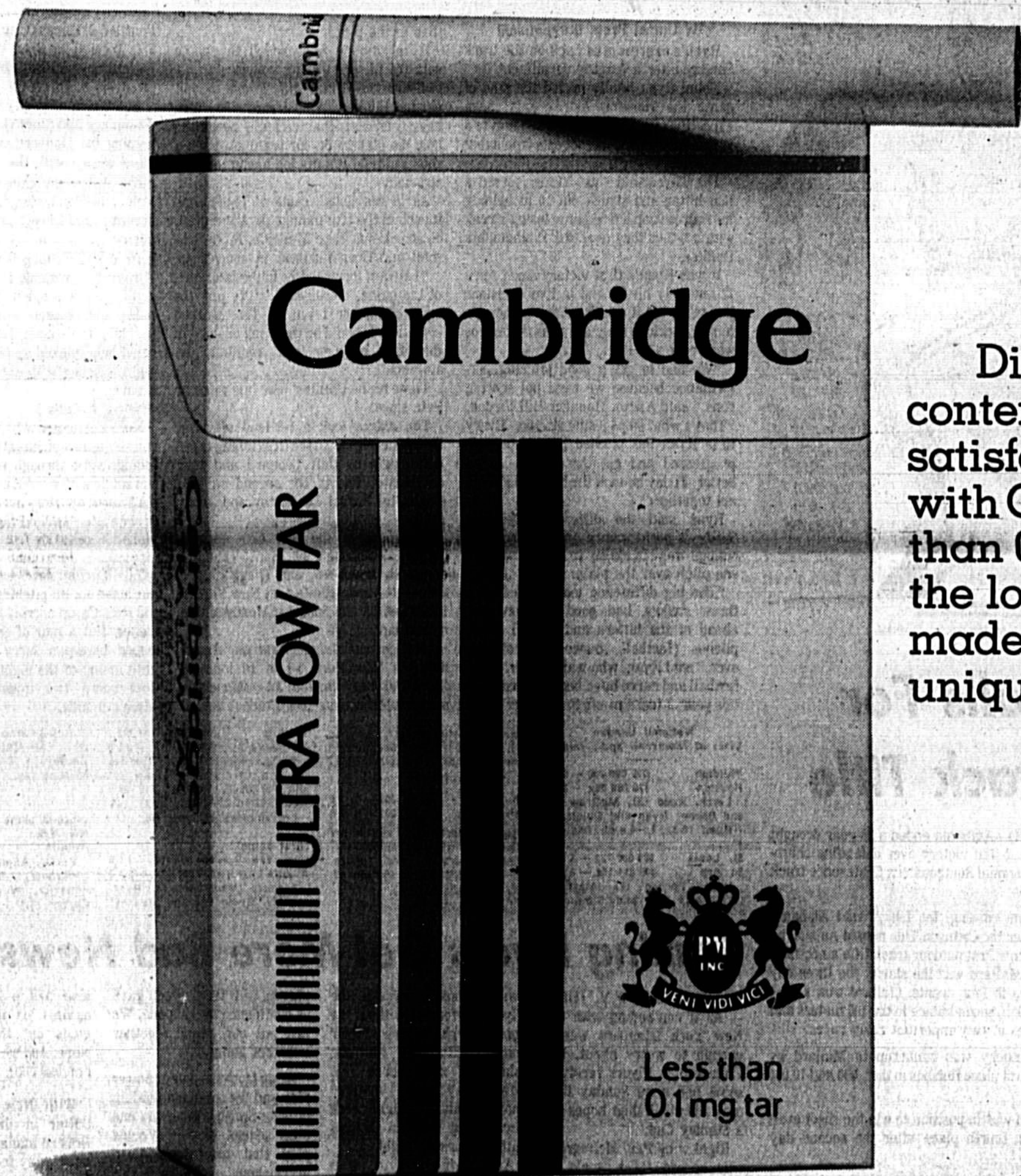
