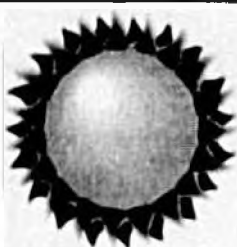

### Police search for bank robber

Altamonte Springs police are searching for a suspect in a pair of bank robberies.

On Monday at about 11:45 a.m., police responded to Washington Mutual Bank, 931 North State Road 434, in reference to a robbery.

According to witnesses a black male entered the bank, walked up to the teller window, displayed a handgun, and demanded money.

The man was then seen running east from the bank on foot. There were no injuries and an undetermined amount of cash was taken, police said.

Police believe that the same suspect may have also been involved in a Jan. 31 robbery of the Washington Mutual Bank at 500 East Altamonte Drive.

The suspect is described as a black male, 6 feet 2 inches tall, 180 pounds, wearing a white baseball cap, maroon-burgundy long sleeve shirt and dark colored pants, armed with a handgun.

The robbery is still under investigation, police said.

## Pan Am adds flights to Pittsburgh

**SANFORD** — Pan American Airways is expanding its service in Sanford to include Pittsburgh.

Daily flights between Sanford and Pittsburgh began Monday. In about one month, the airline is also expected to begin daily service between Sanford and St. Louis.

The first flight from Pittsburgh arrived at the Orlando Sanford Airport Monday at 3:15 p.m., after departing Pittsburgh at 1 p.m.

### Airline says response at Sanford airport is 'exceeding expectations'

Starting today, the daily schedule will include flights departing Sanford at 9:45 a.m. and arriving in Pittsburgh at 12:15 p.m. Flights will then depart Pittsburgh at 1 p.m. and arrive in Sanford at 3:15 p.m. The new Pan Am flight will be priced at \$138 each way.

The service was originally slated to

start on May 1. It was moved ahead in response to a request by the Pittsburgh International Airport as well as numerous passenger requests, said Dan Fortnam, director of marketing for Pan Am.

"The reaction by passengers has been excellent," said Fortnam. "Our service in

Sanford is exceeding expectations." Fortnam said that Pan Am will add service between Sanford and another city by the end of April. However, he declined to name the city.

Airport officials said that flights between Sanford and St. Louis will probably be added within one month, although Pan Am has not finalized the decision.

"Pan Am's flights are carrying a heavy load everyday," said Ray Wise, director of marketing for Sanford's airport. "We

### I-4 Wreck backs up traffic for 10 miles

Traffic in both directions was blocked, with westbound traffic backed past the Deltona exit.

## Pay to park policy appears likely to pass

Employees at the courthouse may pay at least \$40 per month to park

**SANFORD** — It appears likely that the Sanford City Commission will approve the use of centralized parking meters within the City Hall and municipal parking lots.

During discussions held Monday with private consultants, the majority of the members of the City Commission said they favor the use of centralized parking meters to generate revenue for the city.

Visitors and non-city employees would have to pay to use the municipal and City Hall parking lots serving the Seminole County Courthouse.

"It gives the city kind of an oversight over how the county

uses the building in the future," said Commissioner Brady Lessard. "I think it would be nice for the city to have control over the parking."

The meters would carry a charge of at least 60 cents per hour. Non-city employees would be charged at least \$40 per month for permits. City employees would not be charged for parking.

"That's cheap compared to other cities like Orlando," said Mayor Larry Dale. "I think we should charge more."

Meanwhile, City Commissioners said they do not wish to place parking meters along First Street and in the downtown business district. Business owners rejected a proposal to place parking meters in the area 10 years ago, saying it would decrease visitors.

"Our merchants would want some input," said

City Commissioner Whitey Eckstein. "I just don't want to do anything to hurt our downtown business people. But, at the same time, we've got to

## Grace asks BCC for help

**SANFORD** — Two years ago Kevin Grace lost his job when former Seminole County Manager Gary Kaiser eliminated one of two deputy manager positions. Grace, who returned to the county to replace Kaiser as manager, now wants to add a deputy manager's position. He'll ask for Board approval

today to reinstate the position, which he says is needed because of the "extremely heavy workload" for both himself as manager and for Cindy Coto, the deputy manager.

"This situation has been exacerbated by the elimination of the Community Information Coordinator since these duties have largely been absorbed by the Deputy County Manager," Grace said.

The anticipated budgetary impact of this proposal is estimated to be \$50,548 for the remaining fiscal year. Grace recommends the funds be transferred from the General Fund reserves.

Commissioner Grant Maloy said that if Grace believes the additional position will lend itself to more positive county

## Disney honors local students as Dreamers and Doers

Three students selected from Seminole County schools will be among nearly 600 students from throughout Florida to be given special honors at the 17th annual Dreamers and Doers ceremonies, sponsored by Walt Disney World Co.

From Seminole County, those named are Timothy Bird of Spring Lake Elementary, Rachel Zerkowitz of Rock Lake Middle School and Jeffrey D. Streep of Lake Howell High School. The three were among 53 selected by each public, private and church school in the county.

Judging for the winners were based on the "Four C's": curiosity, confidence, courage and consistency. Students, one from each school level, were selected by the Superintendent of Schools.

Several awards ceremonies have been scheduled. A Four-County Program will be held at 9 a.m. Wednesday, April 12, to include students from Seminole, Osceola,

and part of Lake and Polk Counties. The events will be held at Disney's Wide World of Sports field house.

The state program will be the preceding day, April 11, at 2 p.m. The three Seminole County students are expected to be on hand for both events.

The awards ceremonies will be hosted by Wayne Brady, one of the stars of "Whose Line is it Anyway?" Brady, who attended Dr. Phillips High School in Orlando will talk about his path to landing a prime acting role on ABC.

What about the teachers? Disney has announced another competition, on Saturday, August 12. This time it's the Disney's Teacheriffic Awards. One Central Florida teacher from Seminole, Lake, Orange, Osceola or Polk County, selected as the winner will receive \$15,000.

In addition, there will be four other categories that include more than \$200,000 in

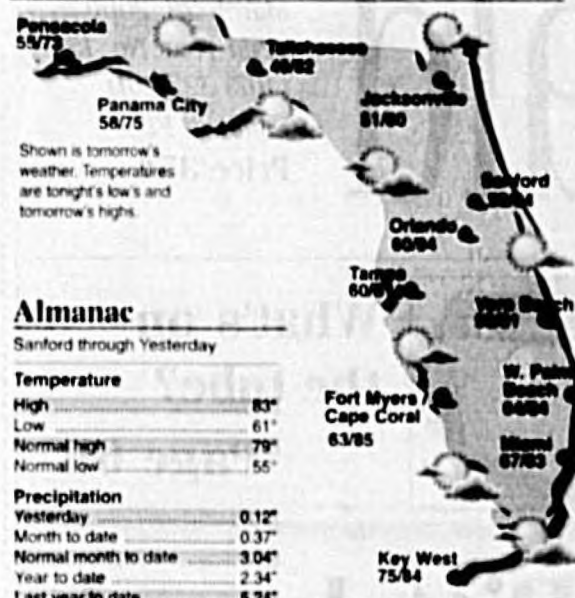

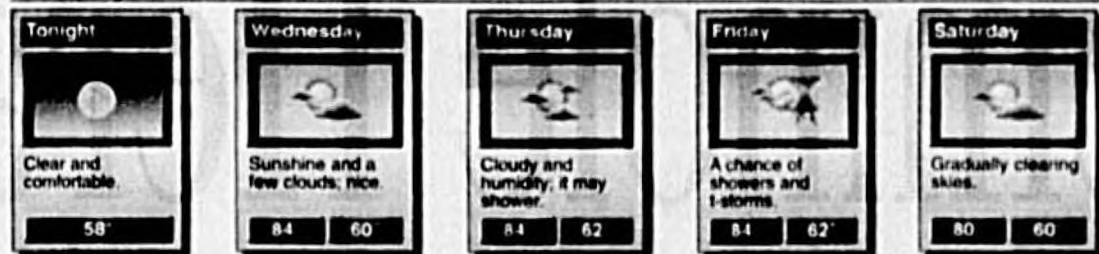

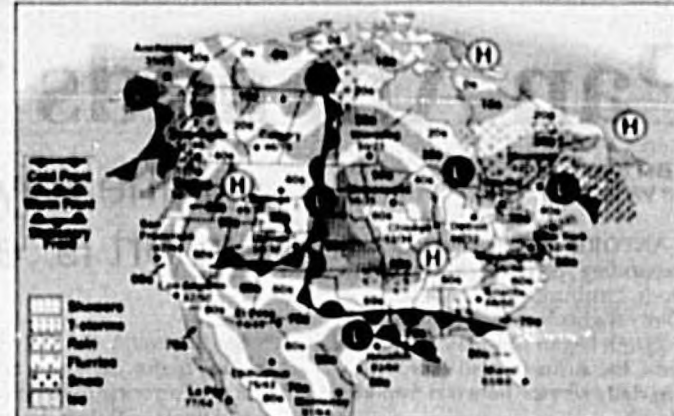

course. Keep it clean under the little fellow's nose. And let's not mess with Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs.

## 'Spectacular' blooming tree has many uses

The genus *Tabebuia* contains some of the most beautiful flowering trees of the American tropics.

Out of about 75 species in cultivation, the best known trumpet-trees in Florida are the silver trumpet tree or tree of gold from Argentina and Paraguay and the golden trumpet tree that grows from Mexico to Venezuela. Both trees produce magnificent yellow funnel-shaped flowers.

Other species produce pink to purple flowers. Most of the *Tabebuia*s are considered valuable timber trees and all of them produce spectacular trum-

pet-shaped flowers. *Tabebuia*s belong to the plant family Bignoniaceae that includes the native trumpet-flower vine or cross vine and the beautiful jacaranda.

**The Tree**  
The golden trumpet tree grows about 15 to 25 feet high and has a spread of 25 to 35 feet. The tree is considered an evergreen but it is most often deciduous. The trunk is usually crooked and rough, with a light gray, corky bark. Leaves are silvery with tan, fuzzy undersides, palmately compound and opposite with oval-shaped leaflets 2 to 4 inches long.

Flowers are very showy, funnel-shaped and fragrant, and they form in dense terminal clusters. Individual flowers are 2 to 3 inches long. Blooms are produced in late winter or early spring when trees have no leaves.

The fruit is an elongated pod, 6 to 12 inches long, brown in color, dry and hard, with many winged seeds. It remains on the tree for many months.

**Culture**  
The golden trumpet tree grows best in full sun in almost any well-drained, fertile soil with moderate moisture. It will grow in acid to alkaline soils, but prefers pH between 5.5 and 7.0. Once established it is quite drought tolerant. Young trees need support and training. The

tree should be protected from frost and wind, as the wood becomes brittle with age and can break easily in strong winds. The trees freeze at about 28 degrees. It is propagated mainly by seeds and layering.

**Pruning**  
The tree should be grown with a single leader and will require some early need pruning to develop a strong structure. The trunk will droop as the tree grows and will require pruning for pedestrian clearance beneath the canopy.

**Uses**  
The tree can be used as container or above ground planter, in large or medium size parking lot islands, as a specimen, residential

street tree or planted near a deck or patio.

**Pests and diseases**  
No serious pests or diseases affect these trees, but leaf spots, dieback and rust diseases have been reported.

**Other tropical *Tabebuia***  
**The pink trumpet tree** — This tree grows at a moderate rate from a slim pyramid when young to a broad silhouette 20 to 40 feet tall.

The palmately compound, green leaves are evergreen throughout most of its range but may be briefly deciduous as the new leaves emerge.

The bell-shaped flower blooms throughout the spring and summer and are followed by the pro-

duction of long, slender seedpods.

**The purple *Tabebuia*** — This briefly deciduous tree reaches 15 to 20 feet in height and has a fairly open canopy. The dark green, palmately compound leaves are joined in late winter or early spring by the showy, trumpet-shaped blooms, appearing in dense, rose, pink to purple, terminal panicles.

Trees will have a better form if trained in a single leader and staked until they are 6 to 8 feet tall.

**The Rose Trumpet Tree** — This tree is also known as the Pink Pina, Ruble Blancet, and white cedar.

It bears handsome, darkish-pink leaves and may trumpet flowers in profusion at many times of the year.

expect the Pittsburgh service to be successful, just as the Portsmouth and Chicago-Gary flights have been. We couldn't be more overjoyed."

All scheduled service will use Pan Am's Boeing 727-200 reconfigured Clipper Class aircraft. The new Pan Am flight will be priced at \$138 each way.

Pan Am, which resumed regular service in October, 1999, currently serves Sanford, Portsmouth, N.H., Pittsburgh, and the Chicago-Gary Airport.

The first scheduled passenger flight for Pan Am since February 1998 provided Sanford's airport with its first regularly scheduled domestic service.

Pan Am is owned by Guilford Transportation Industries, a Portsmouth-based railroad operating and owner of passenger

mills.

The original Pan Am filed for bankruptcy in 1991, and the second Pan Am also filed for bankruptcy. This is the third incarnation of the airline.

Daily service is available between Sanford and the Gary-Chicago Airport as well as Portsmouth six days per week. Portsmouth is located 50 miles outside of Boston. The Pittsburgh service will operate seven days per week.

The airline is considering adding service from Sanford to perhaps four more cities.

However, no decision has been made on which cities will be added, and Pan Am has not announced a timetable for expansion.

Pan Am President Dave Fink said that the airline will expand into smaller airports such as the Chicago-Gary airport and the

Orlando Sanford Airport, where passengers will face less commuter traffic.

Cities that Pan Am is looking into serving include Atlanta, St. Louis, Philadelphia, as well as San Juan and Aguadilla, P.R.

Destinations in Canada being considered include Montreal, Toronto and Halifax, according to Pan Am officials.

In preparation for expanded domestic service, construction on the \$24.5 million, seven gate domestic terminal expansion began in December. It is expected to be completed in January of 2001.

Sanford's airport handled about 1 million passengers in 1999, primarily from British charter flights.

The airport served as a Naval Air Station from 1942 to 1946, and 1951 to 1968, and regular international service began in

1996.

The success of Pan Am is key to efforts by airport and Sanford officials to attract additional domestic service.

Pan Am began local service in October with flights departing Portsmouth at 8:30 a.m. and arriving in Sanford at 1:10 p.m. The flight then departs Sanford at 1:20 p.m. and arrive in Portsmouth at 4 p.m.

Flights from the Chicago-Gary Airport arrive in Sanford at 12:20 p.m. every day except on Tuesdays. The flights depart Sanford for Gary-Chicago at 2:20 p.m.

enhance our assets by the courthouse."

Eckstein said that centralized parking meters would not be necessary had Seminole County decided to expand its courthouse downtown, generating increased revenue for the city. Instead, the county is building a Criminal Courthouse extension at the Five Points complex along U.S. Highway 17-92.

"We need to get some revenue out of our facility," Eckstein said. "We have the expenses of upkeep."

Because of concerns that visitors and employees and the courthouse would park in the downtown area for free rather than pay parking meters, the city would also increase enforcement of time limits for parking downtown.

An additional two parking

enforcement specialists would be hired for the Sanford Police Department to handle increased enforcement of time limits. Fines would be up to \$15 per day, with a boot placed on a car tire for excessive violations.

There are 491 available parking spaces in the municipal and City Hall parking lots, plus another 417 on-street parking spaces within a quarter-mile radius.

The combined estimated costs for instituting centralized parking meters in the municipal and City Hall lots are \$45,000 to \$60,000.

Meanwhile, the combined estimated revenue from installing centralized parking meters in the City Hall and municipal lots is \$234,288, not including revenue from increased parking enforcement in the downtown area.

Visitors and employees of the Seminole County Courthouse utilize the Sanford municipal and city hall parking lots. Both lots are currently free, and in the municipal lot there are no limits on who can park there and for how long.

City staff reports few operational problems, except for temporary capacity limitations on Mondays when people are screened for jury duty.

The goals in charging for parking would be to raise revenue, while minimizing capital and operating costs.

Should the city begin charging fees, there are several options available. A variety of revenue collection methods exist, including exit cashiers, centralized parking meters and individual parking meters. City Commissioners on Monday favored the use of centralized

parking meters.

The centralized parking meter is the best choice based on its low capital and operating costs and ease of use, said Jay Mander, director of engineering and planning for the city.

The possible form of management varies from lease arrangements with private parking management firms, contracted management, or self-management by the city.

A review of revenue collection methods performed by the city shows that in Florida courthouses, only those counties with parking garages currently charge for parking. These counties self-manage their own garage and use exit cashiers to collect revenue.

All other courthouses have parking lots or on-street parking, which is provided without charge.

Connelly has eight years of broadcast engineering and production work in the Central Florida market. She's worked at

Disney, Epcot, Sea World and Universal Studios. She graduated from Curry College in Boston.

She is a member of the Society of Motion Picture and Television Engineers.

## Navy memorial proposed at airport

Editor's note: At the March 21 Community Development Committee meeting, a proposal was made to erect a memorial at the Orlando Sanford International Airport to honor the men and women who served in the Navy at Sanford. The following article by Nick Heifaut is excerpted from the *Seminole Herald* with their permission.

Alexis Clarke, curator of the Sanford Museum passed the ball to the Sanford-Seminole County Chamber of Commerce, and the chamber is running with it. The team is made up of chamber members and veterans of the U.S. Navy. The goal line is at the Orlando-Sanford Airport, and a touchdown is expected.

Clarke said the concept of a Navy memorial is nothing new. "Gerald Bohm with the Fleet Reserve brought it up during last year's Navy reunion and it apparently drew a great deal of support," Clarke said. "But wives of veterans who served at the base have been discussing a memorial for 10 to 15 years. Only now have we started actually working on it." The special memorial would be built at the airport, which served as a Navy Auxiliary Air Station as well as the Naval Air Station from 1942 to 1967. March 21, Clarke officially turned the project over to the Sanford-Seminole County Chamber of Commerce. She pointed out that it was befitting to have the project kicked off at the Chamber building.

"This building was built because of the Navy," she said. "It was originally the USO for the sailors."

## OSI passenger count up; expansion underway



Domestic passenger counts for February at Orlando Sanford International Airport were a record high of 12,181 passengers — a 1165 percent increase of February 1999. Pan American Airways' new service between Boston/Portsmouth, N.H., Chicago/Gary, Ind. and Sanford are responsible for much of that boost. "We continue to be impressed with the loads of our flights into OSI. Bookings appear very strong," said Dave Pink, president of the airlines which recently added service between the above cities and Bangor, Maine. Flights between these destinations are offered six days per week.

The airport's \$25 million terminal expansion project will provide Pan Am and other domestic carriers with a two-level terminal and seven jetbridges.

Victor White, executive director of Sanford Airport Authority said the project is being funded through public and private sources and once completed, will be essentially debt-free with no impact to the airport's current rate charges.

"Pan Am's success in serving the Orlando market through Sanford validates the need for a modern domestic terminal capable of offering scheduled airlines and their passengers a very high level of service," said Larry Gouldthorpe, president of Orlando Sanford International Airport Management. Completion of the first wide-body international gate position is expected in June with total project completion December.

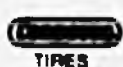

### Last-minute tax reminders

Don't forget these changes in tax filing since last year:

- Medical savings accounts can be set up and contributions made to them through April 17
- If you're self-employed, you can deduct 60 percent of your health insurance costs (up from 45 percent in 1998)
- You can contribute to your self-employment retirement plan up until the due date of your tax return
- The first-year expense limitation for equipment purchases has increased to \$19,000
- The IRS has lightened up on recordkeeping requirements for expenses - a fairly recent change. Receipts are now required for meals, entertainment and some of your travel costs only when items cost \$75 or more.

And finally, if you use independent contractors in your business, don't forget to file Form 1099-Misc. to both your contractors and the IRS.

### You're still taxed for 102-year-old war

Seems like this issue comes up every year, but good news may be on the horizon. In case you didn't know it, you're still paying a 3 percent tax that was enacted to finance the 1898 Spanish-American War. Members of Congress and the phone industry are trying to repeal the tax, which costs consumers about \$5 billion a year.

### Senate OKs \$5 billion for roads

The first bill approved by the Senate this legislative session was a major road-building package that could improve Central Florida's traffic gridlock. The legislation would allow \$5 billion in road projects over the next decade. Fifteen projects in Central Florida, with a combined price tag of \$750 million, could become a reality. At the top of the local list: \$138 million to replace the I-4 St. Johns River Bridge. The House will look at the package in the next few weeks. Work on the project could begin next year.

### DC lawmakers propose IRA increase

It hasn't happened yet, but lawmakers are considering proposals to raise the 20-year-old limit on IRA contributions from \$2000 to \$5000 per year. "What we should be trying to do is to encourage people to establish private retirement accounts and help them take the pressure off the Social Security system," said Rep. Dennis Moore (D-Kansas) who has proposed a bill increasing the limit.

## FWC opens meetings in Tallahassee this week

TALLAHASSEE - The

Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) will convene for a three-day meeting at Tallahassee's Henry W. MacMillan National Guard Armory beginning Wednesday.

Among the first items requiring action on the Wednesday agenda are establishment of five new fish management areas (FMAs) .....

including Pellicer Pond in Flagler County and Bear Creek Park, Cane Marsh Park, Shupe Outdoors Kirkman Pond and Starke Lake, all in Orange County.

Also, the Commission will consider proposals to delete Lake Beauty, Lake Cherokee, Lake Estelle and Lowbush Bay FMAs from the system.

Other establishment orders on the agenda include re-establishing the Florida Keys Wildlife and Environmental Area (WEA) and adding 38.9 acres to it and re-establishing the Lake Wales Ridge WEA with a 118.31-acre addition.

In addition, Commissioners will consider whether to re-establish the Aucilla Wildlife Management Area (WMA) with 38,445 acres deleted, the Babcock Webb WMA, adding 319.7 acres and the Richloam WMA with 481.13 acres added.

Commissioners also will consider establishing the 590-acre Blackwater Carr Unit WMA and the 38,445.13-acre Flint Rock WMA, which formerly was part of the Aucilla WMA.

The Commission also plans to establish harvest units for this year's public waters alligator harvest and to delete wild hogs from the list of game animals on the Blackwater WMA. If passed, the measure would legalize hog hunting during small game season, as well as during general gun, archery, muzzleloader and archery/muzzleloader seasons on the area.

Regarding other wildlife issues, Commissioners will consider a new rule to clarify the definition of a bow to prohibit the use of devices, during archery season, which mechanically hold the bowstring in the drawn and ready-to-release position.

Another proposal would provide for new caging requirements, buffer zone requirements and space requirements for facilities which obtain permits to keep dangerous animals in captivity after July 1.

Another rule change would establish recreational use permit fees at \$140 per year and establish a quota of 325 permits for Champion International WMA. It would also establish a \$98 permit and quota of 600

# Rams get back on track

## Lake Mary baseball team completes sweep with win over National Champions

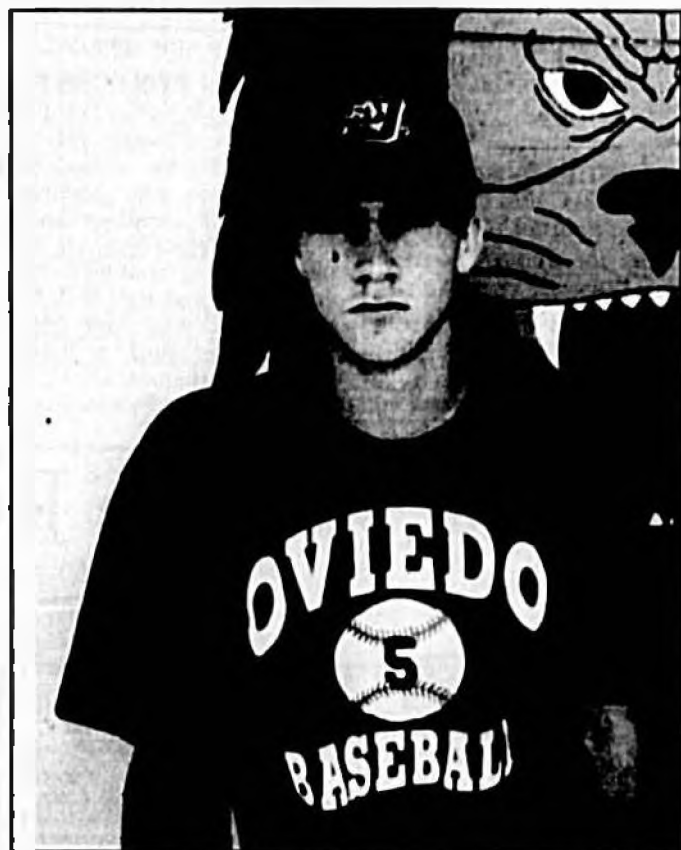
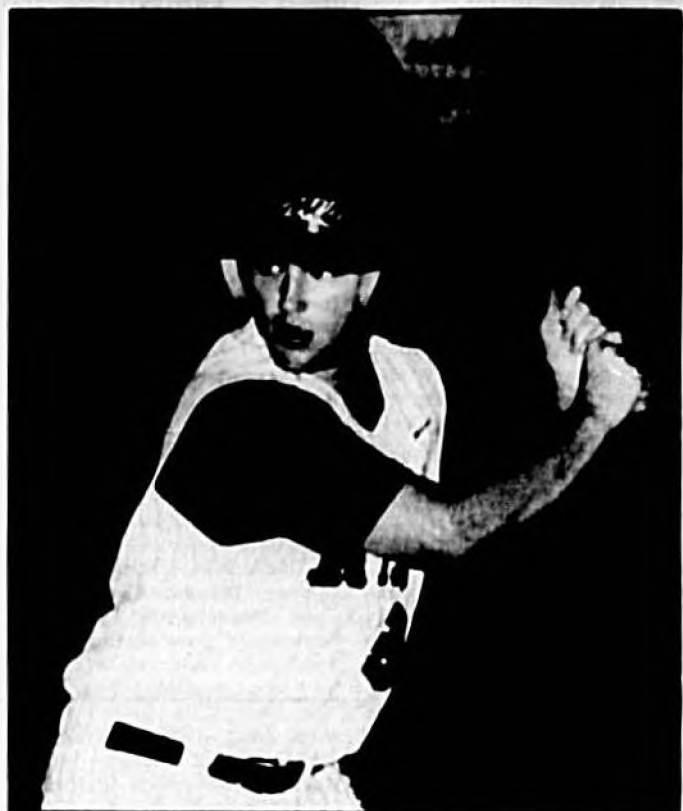

permits for the Flint Rock WMA.

Also, Commissioners plan to establish or revise rules for special-opportunity hunts and general regulations and quotas for wildlife management areas.

## SHUPE'S SCOOP

The FWC will hold a final public hearing on proposed rules for spotted seatrout that would establish 15 inch minimum/20 inch maximum size limits and a five-fish daily bag limit statewide for recreational

fishermen (the allowance for persons to harvest one spotted seatrout larger than the maximum size limit would still apply.)

## FISHING FORECAST

River action is red hot due to super-low water levels. Bass are easily located in staging areas and ambush spots. Creek mouths, sandbars, and deep bends are all likely places to hold fish. Use small lures and light line for pure action. The river from Puzzle Lake south to Lake Winder has the best action. Sebastian Inlet has good

catch-and-release snook action. A few flounder, redfish, bluefish, and seatrout round out the action.

Captain Jack at Port Canaveral reports that high seas have kept boats in Port.

Inside the Port, look for flounder and sheepshead. Trout and redfish are scattered in the Banana and Indian rivers.

Port Inlet has been a little rough with high seas. Sheepshead, drum, bluefish, redfish are all hitting live or dead shrimp. Trout and redfish are rated as good in Mosquito Lagoon.
