**Nixon Cuts Fuel To Protect Economy**

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Nixon says he is cutting 15 per cent from deliveries of gasoline and home heating oil to save off severe fuel-shortage damage to the nation's economy.

The move will mean homes six degrees cooler than normal this winter and not enough gasoline to go around.

To start saving gasoline, Nixon asked filling stations to stop selling it on Sundays, and pledged he would order such a ban once Congress gives him the authority.

In a radio-television address Sunday, Nixon said deliveries of airline jet fuel also will be cut 15 per cent, industries will be denied 10 per cent of their oil wants and commercial buildings must do without 25 per cent of their heating oil.

These and other measures announced Sunday would reduce an expected 17 per cent petroleum shortage to perhaps 7 per cent, Nixon said, but the remaining shortage will require additional measures to close the energy gap and avoid economic damage.

Nixon continued to hold in reserve, as a last resort, the possibility of direct consumer gasoline rationing or high fuel taxes.

Under existing authority, Nixon announced these steps:

—Publication, due Tuesday, of regulations to take effect next Jan. 1, ordering heating-oil dealers to sell householders 15 per cent less heating oil than they got in 1972, commercial establishments 25 per cent less, and industries 10 per cent less.

This move imposes consumer rationing, but without the complications of issuing fuel coupons.

Proposal of regulations in December to impose controls on distribution of gasoline to wholesale and retail dealers, cutting deliveries 15 per cent below the anticipated demand for the first quarter of 1974.

Refineries will be asked to start making such cuts immediately on a voluntary basis, the White House said.

—Government-controlled allocations of jet fuel to airlines will be cut Dec. 1, limiting international lines to their 1972 fuel consumption and domestic lines to 95 per cent of their 1972 levels. All airlines will be cut back 15 per cent below last year's supplies starting Jan. 7.

—Final regulations were scheduled for publication Tuesday, to take effect Dec. 7, forbidding coal-burning power plants from switching to oil.

Nixon pledged to take the following steps as soon as Congress passes emergency legislation authorizing them:

—A ban on gasoline sales from 9 p.m. on Saturdays to midnight on Sunday nights.

Nixon asked filling stations to adopt such a ban voluntarily in the meantime, beginning Dec. 1.

**Albert Charges Nixon 'Coverup'**

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Nixon is trying to deceive Americans about the real causes and severity of the energy crisis, House Speaker Carl Albert has charged.

The Oklahoma Democrat also asserted that the President has failed to take steps "to avert a major recession."

In a 7,000-word statement issued Saturday, Albert accused Nixon of promising more than can be delivered, and conservation measures are our only hope of riding out the difficult winter just ahead and the difficult years which will follow," Albert said.

He argued that Congress was working on energy problems well ahead of the administration.

Congress must choose "between cooperating with an administration which is intent on deceiving the American people with regard to both the severity and the causes of our energy shortages and being honest with the people by telling them that we are living on borrowed time, on our reserves, and that far more stringent allocation, rationing and conservation measures are our only hope of riding out the difficult winter just ahead and the difficult years which will follow," Albert said.

**County Has Fuel 'Crunch'**

The gasoline crunch is "nothing" compared with the diesel fuel crunch, Seminole County Roads Chief J. C. Lavender warned today, saying the county must either be prepared to cut back services or pay at least another \$10,000 for diesel fuel — if it can be found.

Lavender said he has been told by Gulf Oil representatives, the county supplier, that only 110,000 gallons will be available to Seminole, while the county had "budgeted" 300,000 gallons for the next fiscal year.

This means, Lavender said, that commissioners must face the possibility of having to purchase the extra fuel at gas stations for 29 cents or 30 cents a gallon (assuming prices hold), which is 10 cents more per gallon than is presently being paid.

And, Lavender said, the Gulf representative has put him on notice that the fuel may not be available anywhere, much less from the gas stations.

The county's diesel allocation from Gulf, based on 1971 usage figures, while the county has doubled gallonage used since then, Lavender said. "We'll be in trouble come Jan. 1 — we'll have to cut somewhere."

While not wanting to predict which county services may have to be cut back, Lavender said departments using gasoline vehicles will have a better chance of switching to service station fuel than will road department and other diesel fuel vehicles.

Commissioners have been wrestling with the cutback problems for several weeks, and have set up a committee with Port Authority officials to find a supplier of bulk fuel.

Lavender last week warned the board the Jan. 1 fuel allocation program will leave the county at least 5,000 gallons a month "short" for gasoline operated vehicles.

**Job Claim 'Premature'**

LAKE MARY — Larry Dale, a candidate for the city council has apparently prematurely released his appointment as temporary chairman of the city's planning and zoning board.

The board will hold its first public meeting tonight at 7:30 at the city fire hall to consider officially appointing a chairman, vice chairman, meeting dates and times for the board.

If elected to the commission, the city's charter does not specify whether Dale would have to give up his post on the P. & Z. Board. A new board, however, will be appointed Feb. 15, a city spokesman said.

Dale, vice president of the city's chamber of commerce and a member of H.A. Dale Realty Inc., Winter Park, is using the title of ex-board chairman in his campaign literature.

According to a city spokesman, the board met privately in Lake Mary to review rules and procedures for its function.

At that meeting, Dale was "unofficially" tabbed chairman by fellow board members, but later Mayor Donald Jackson said the appointment must be made official at a regular public meeting.

According to Dale, his appointment came with the approval of city attorney Tom Freeman.

However, Freeman said today he had no knowledge of the appointment.

"No, I did not advise them they could appoint a chairman, but I'm sure it's all right to do so. They made up an agenda, didn't they?" he said. Freeman said there was a public meeting at the city fire hall to discuss the meeting times, dates and Dale's post.

"I don't know why they're going to make a second announcement on all this," he said. "Dale was duly elected at the fire hall with the mayor, city clerk, Margie Hess (a mayoral candidate in the city's Dec. 4 elections) and several residents attending."

**Sanford Truckers Say Limit Won't Save Fuel**

President Nixon's plans to save fuel are going to hurt, say local truckers and public transportation managers.

The Sanford man-in-the-street believes the president's plans outlined in his Sunday night address to the nation will definitely help. But they will have to be strictly enforced.

Doing away with the large cars and jet airplanes used by the White House would help more, suggested one man.

"I'd rather see a change in attitude toward the Arab nations would be a step in the right direction."

"Nixon's made a big mistake reducing the maximum speeds of trucks to 55 mph," said W. W. Horne of Horne Distribution Inc., Sanford.

He explained most 10 to 15-speed diesel trucks are geared to operate at maximum efficiency when doing 60 mph.

"Operated at a lower speed than the efficiency point of the engines the trucks will consume more fuel," said Horne.

He said closing fuel stops over the weekend could cut back the economy one day.

"But the way I interpret it the gas stations will close over weekends, but not the fuel stops," said Horne. "I certainly hope so, because we're having trouble getting enough gas as it is."

"It'll hurt if trucks can't get fuel over the weekend," agreed Dan Brickley, manager of the All-States Service Inc., Sanford.

"Reducing the speed limit won't save fuel for trucks," he said. "When trucks run in a lower gear they burn as much fuel as in top gear doing higher speeds. For a truck with a 15-speed transmission in 13th gear and you'll be going slower, but burning as much gas," he explained.

"We've got to try some way to conserve what fuel we have," said Victor Johns, a traveling salesman from Winter Park. **Boston Strangler Dead, Found Stabbed In His Cell**

WALPOLE, Mass. (AP) — Albert DeSalvo, who confessed to being the Boston Strangler of the 1960s, was found stabbed to death in his prison cell today, corrections officials reported.

Although DeSalvo confessed to killing 13 women in the Boston area between 1962 and 1964, he later retracted the confession and was never convicted of any of the 13 deaths.

The former handyman was serving a life term at the maximum security prison for assaults on four other women said DeSalvo's body was found about 7 a.m. in a cell in the prison's hospital section where DeSalvo worked as an orderly.

DeSalvo, 42, died of multiple stab wounds in the chest. No weapon was found and there were no suspects, the spokesman said.

During DeSalvo's assault trial in January 1967, his lawyer, F. Lee Bailey, attempted to get the confession to the stranglings entered into evidence. He was able only to present such testimony from psychiatrists whom DeSalvo had told he was the strangler.

DeSalvo was convicted of burglary, armed robbery and sexual molestation.

State authorities have long maintained they did not have evidence to prosecute anyone for the stranglings.

The case of the Boston Strangler caused a worldwide sensation. The victims ranged in age from 19 to 73. Most had been associated with health care, either as nurses, hospital volunteers, workers in physicians' offices, or friends of nurses and doctors. All lived within a 35-mile radius of Boston.

The biggest manhunt in Massachusetts' history was touched off on Feb. 24, 1967 when DeSalvo and two other inmates escaped from Bridgewater State Hospital a month after DeSalvo's assault trial.

DeSalvo, who had been at the hospital awaiting an appeal, was captured 1 1/2 days later in a Lynn, Mass., clothing store, where he had asked to use the telephone.

DeSalvo was at the hospital before the trial, undergoing observation for an alleged sexual molestation offense, when his cellmate, George Katar, persuaded Bailey to represent DeSalvo. Bailey at first resisted but agreed to do only a day before detectives arrived at the hospital to question DeSalvo about the stranglings.

Bailey tape-recorded DeSalvo's story under an agreement with the state attorney general's office that it could not be used against him. Detectives were said to have found that most of what he said tallied with the evidence of the crimes.

NEW YORK (AP) — The Children's Television Workshop, producers of public television's award-winning "Sesame Street" and "Electric Company," says it is thinking about commercial TV ventures to help finance its public television efforts.

But a spokesman for CTW, a non-profit corporation heavily supported by federal funds, emphasized the idea is neither a certainty nor is it even under heavy consideration right now. CTW officials aren't giving it "any higher priority at the moment than any one of a number of things we're considering," said Robert A. Hatch, CTW's vice-president for public affairs.

Another factor, he said, has been a sharp reduction in financial support from private foundations for CTW's two children's shows.

The question of CTW producing shows for commercial TV — either on a regular or an infrequent basis — was prompted by a Julie Andrews special on ABC-TV. "Julie on Sesame Street," the program, taped in London and aired Friday night.

Ford Veep Nomination Draws Fire

WASHINGTON (AP) — A California congressman plans to renew his attack on Vice President-designate Gerald R. Ford for his 1970 effort to impeach Supreme Court Justice William O. Douglas.

While Ford faces a fourth day of questioning today at his confirmation hearings before the House Judiciary Committee, the Senate is scheduled to open debate on his confirmation, which was approved unanimously by the Senate Rules Committee.

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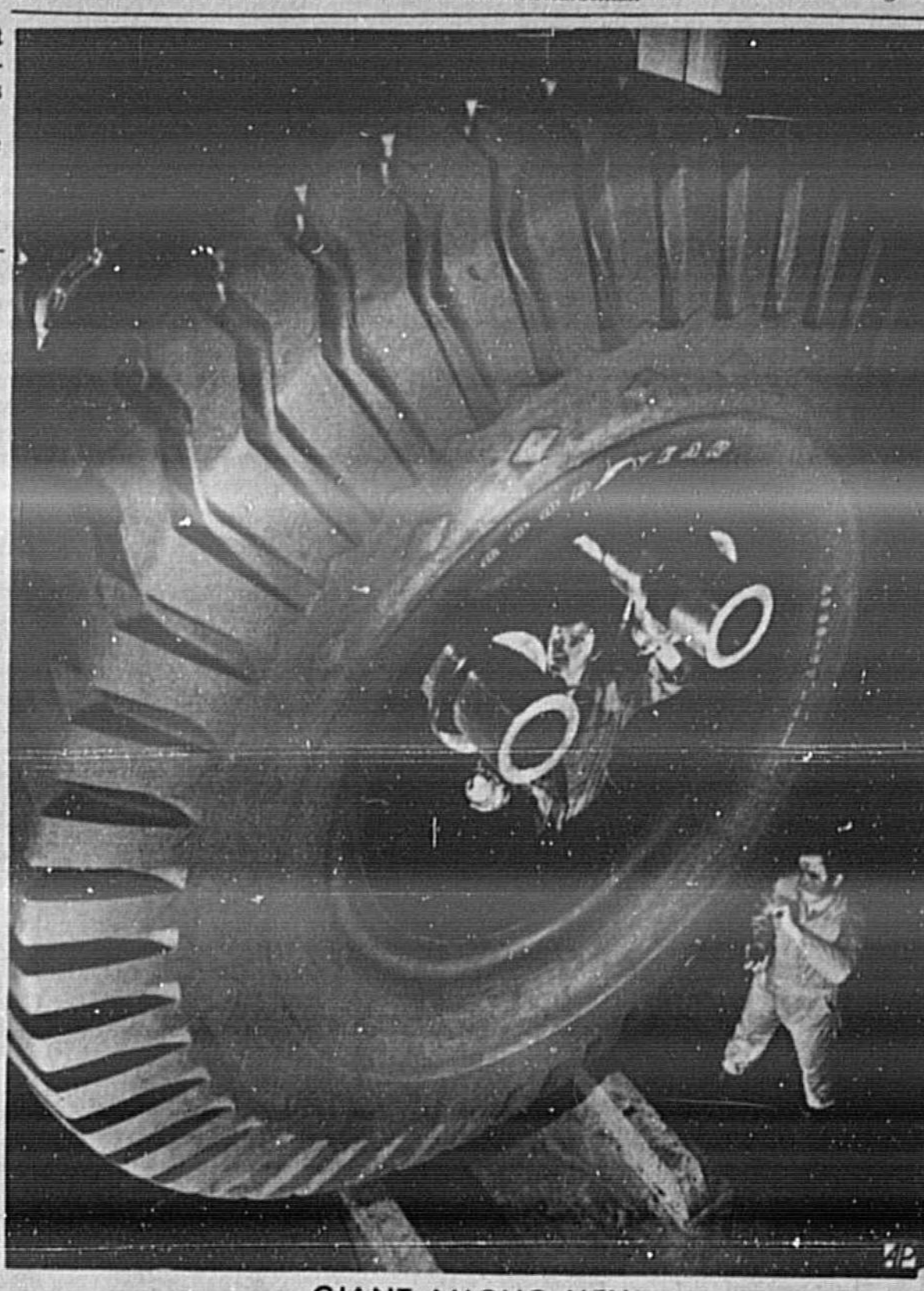

Greek Army Coup Called 'Successful'

ATHENS, Greece (AP) — Greece's new military rulers pulled most tanks and extra troops out of Athens today, indicating firm control of the country, and began removing pictures of ousted President George Papadopoulos from public buildings.

# Detroit Red Wings Prospering

The Detroit Red Wings in general and Nick Libett in particular continue to prosper under New Coach Alex Delvecchio.

The Wings beat the California Golden Seals 3-2 Sunday night for their sixth straight home victory and their seventh in nine games overall since Delvecchio took over the National Hockey League club Nov. 7. Considering they've won only nine games all season, that's not bad.

Libett has been the Detroit sparkplug lately with seven goals in the past five games. He got the winning goal against California with less than six minutes left, taking a pass from Bill Collins and beating Seals' goalie Gilles Meloche on a sharp angle shot from the right boards.

It was Libett's 14th goal of the year and his fourth game-winning score. He had only 19 goals all of last season.

In other NHL games, Boston dumped Los Angeles 3-1; The New York Rangers blanked Vancouver 5-0; Atlanta edged Buffalo 4-3; and Montreal downed Chicago 5-4.

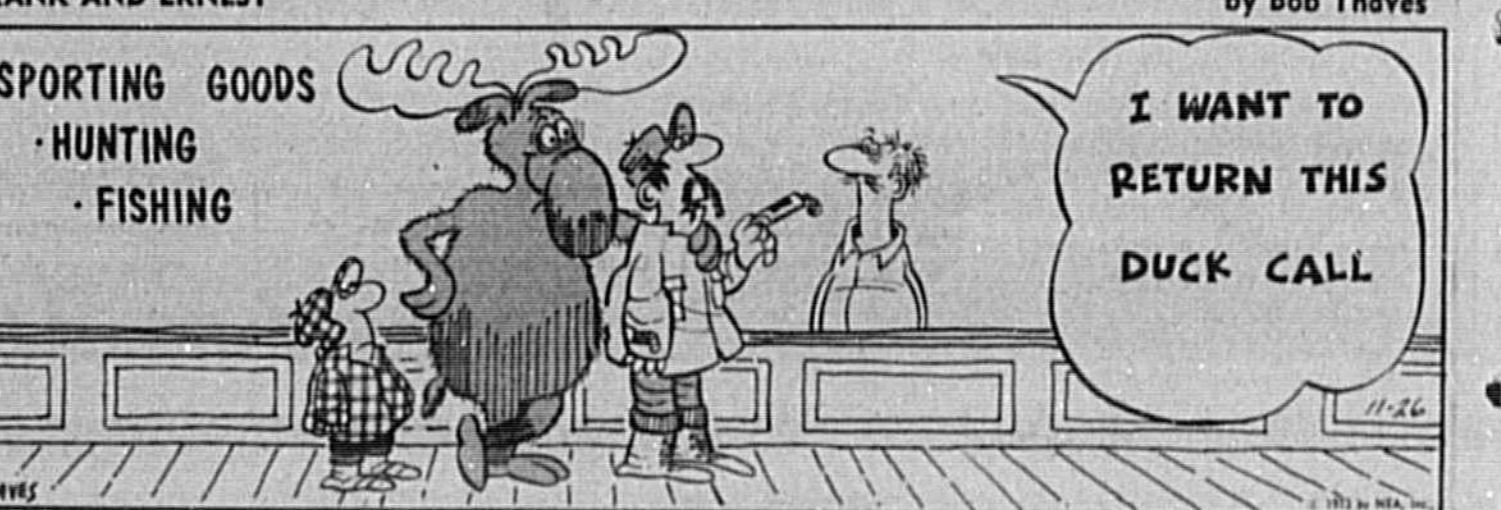

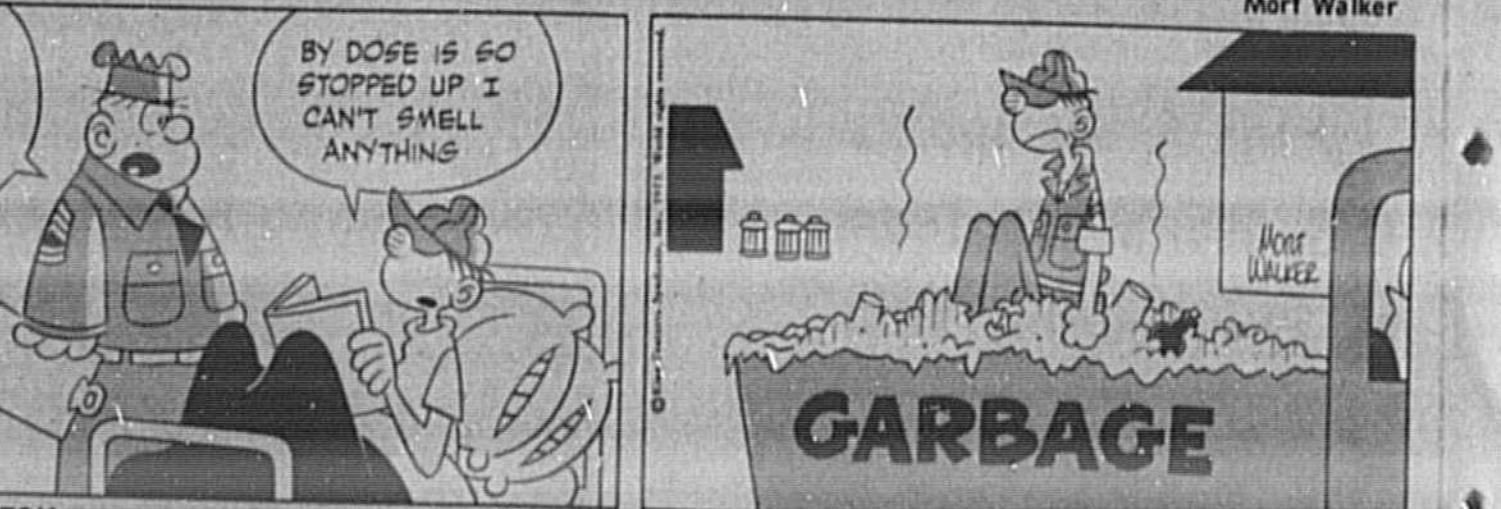

## Cane Boss Happy Despite 14-7 Loss

MIAMI (AP) — Pete Elliott's hopes of giving the University of Miami its first winning football team in six years were all but quashed by Florida. But Elliott says he's happy with his first season as field boss.

The 14-7 Saturday night loss to the Gators dropped Miami to 5-5 with unbeaten Notre Dame invading the Orange Bowl for the season finale this weekend.

Elliott isn't conceding defeat to the Irish but says, "If we lose and end up 5-6, I won't say we've done badly because the record isn't always the measure of a team."

"If we had a 5-6 record against a bunch of mediocre teams, then I'd be unhappy. But we played some great teams. I believe you'll find our record ranks No. 1 in toughness."

Florida closes its season against winless Florida State at Gainesville this Saturday. The game should result in a respectable 7-4 slate to take against unbeaten Mid-American Conference champion Miami of Ohio in the Tangerine Bowl game on Dec. 22.

The Gators had a lot of anxious moments against the Hurricanes. The Gators could not get a first down after going ahead 14-0 — both scores following Miami fumbles — early in the second quarter.

Miami finished the game with 17 first downs and 250 yards of offense to six first downs and 142 yards for the Gators.
