



Continuation, Not Increase

Our Committment Is Retaining 4 Mills

Seminole County is the fastest growing community in America today, and as such it is incumbent upon all of us to prepare for the shocks attendant to such growth.

Tuesday, freeholders will decide whether we will retain the 4 mills we accepted two years ago to aid our schools' progress, or discard it.

We feel there is only one choice-to approve retaining that responsibility which we shouldered two years ago, and not leave our children educationally stranded.

We point out to every voter that Tuesday's election is not an increase in taxes. It is merely our re-committment to continue carrying a necessary obligation for two more years.

We must disregard false hope of getting more school money from the state because no one can say now how much cash will flow into Seminole from Tallahassee's coffers. We must look after ourselves.

The growth has been, for the most part concentrated in the south end of Seminole County, and has just recently begun encroaching into the central part of our county. Even in the Greater Sanford Area, we are feeling our county's explosive expansion.

How can we, as responsible citizens and parents, deny our children, and also postpone until later the inevitable problems every expanding community has to face, by rejecting the millage issue?

We feel we cannot reject the 4 mills. The school system, its administrators, teachers and elected officials, have not done as good a job with the funds at their disposal as was possible. For instance, have you taken a look at Oviedo High School recently?

We wonder how much money could have been saved by eliminating all of the "frills" in that school, and others in our county?

School personnel claim they will realize \$5,120,000 by retaining the 4 mills for the next two years. This amount put with \$5,040,000 in state bond sales; \$568,000 in revenue from capital outlay and debt services during 1972-72; and \$362,000 in capital outlay and debt services during 1973-75, comes to a hefty \$11,090,872.

School officials promise they will spend the funds this way: air-conditioning 12 schools for \$1,476,364; and building seven new schools, at a cost of \$9,600,000. The new schools will be built in the south and central parts of the county which is all fine and good, because that is where they are needed most now.

We urge school officials to remember that

Although the fairer sex is usually rather reticent when it comes to revealing their age it is no secret that when the Girl Scouts of America celebrate their collective birthday this week they will be 61 years old.

No, you won't see any little old ladies in green beanies pushing cookies on your block because Girl Scouts are forever young with a fresh crop of bright eyed, freckled faced, pony-tailed beauties clamouring to join the ranks as

Last year there were 17,300 Girl Scouts (Brownies, Juniors, Cadettes and Seniors) registered in Citrus Council, which comprises the area of Seminole, Orange, Osceola, Flagler, Volusia and Brevard, and 4,000 adult leaders in various capacities. There were 1,500 registered in Seminole in 74 troops. The county is divided up into six service units (formerly known as neighborhoods.)

There is a new emphasis in the Council's Girl Scout program this year as leaders are encouraged to develop new ways to help the girls on all levels perform adult roles as decision makers. The Scouts are taught skills to allow them to make better decisions and develop their own initiative. Leaders are learning to stand back while the girls under their guidance do the troop planning and make their own mistakes. Not an easy task as any parent knows. An active Girl Scout program is always contingent on recruiting enough adult leaders and there are many areas

where girls are ready and eager to join a troop, but leaders

are not available The Girl Scout program is geared to help a girl develop social skills, musical, artistic and homemaking talents, citizenship, service skills, and physical skills, such as swimming and horseback riding. In addition pampered and protected city girls learn a knowledge of nature and skills

needed to feel comfortable camping in the out-of-doors. Today's Girl Scouts have a deepening awareness of the importance of protecting our invironment and serving others. Two Senior Scouts - one from Sanford are heading up a project in conjunction with the Audubon Society in a continuing study of the ecology of the Big Econlokhatchchee River in an effort to save the wild river. Almost \$15 Billion Spent

Poverty War Needs New Strategy

IN THE EIGHT years that have passed since the late President Johnson declared "war on poverty," thousands of administrators have spent almost \$15 billion, benefiting supposedly millions of people. But poverty has not been

Now President Nixon has branded the effort a failure and has begun dismantling the Office of Economic Opportunity, where poverty war strategy was mapped. And despite the crescendo of

outraged protest from congressional supporters of social programs, from welfare organizations and from workers in imperiled projects, there is little rebuttal to charges that the antipoverty campaign has been a

"TOO MUCH money has been going to those who were supposed to help the needy," he said, "and too little to the needy themselves." Mr. Nixon, however, has been reticent in previewing his own plans for aiding the poor in such areas as health, education, welfare and other human concerns.

Presumably some projects conducted under the administration of cities, but utilizing federal funds will be continued under local option through an expanded program of revenue sharing.

Other worthwhile programs may be revived in the President's version of reform, which will be revealed to Congress in a message on human



WASHINGTON (NEA) Swedish Prime Minister Olof Palme, who likened last December's U.S. bombing offensive against North Vietnam to Nazi and other historic atrocities, may be on the way out - in part because of his intemperate remarks about the United States. Swedish national elections are due in September. The

word arriving here is that Palme is in trouble. If his socialists lose ground, and can form no coalition large enough to provide a majority in parliament, their 40-year-rule will end. They would be supplanted by a more moderate coalition of "bourgeois" parties - centrists, middle-of-the-road liberals and conservatives. Palme's Social Democratic Labor Party, though the

nation's largest, has only 163 of parliament's 350 seats. t holds power thanks to a voting alliance with the Communists, whose 17 seats provide a bare majorityand this only because voting discipline is strong. Until the past few years, the Social Democrats could depend on support from some middle of the roaders. But no more. Palme has been becoming more extreme to appease the extreme leftists. The three moderate groups, which now control 170 seats in parliament, have

grown wholly disenchanted. Though they found it

difficult to unite in the past, reports indicate they may

now be resolving their differences in a strong attempt to defeat Palme. For several years, Palme had found that criticism of U.S. Vietnam policy paid off politically and cost him little. But when he compared Americans to the Nazis, causing a rift in relations with the United States which most Swedes admire, the reaction was quite strong. Worse yet for Palme, it was only a short time after his attack that Mr. Nixon did in fact "sign" a cease-fire and withdrawal agreement with North Vietnam. This made Palme look silly indeed to numbers of Swedes.

But politics in Sweden, of course, is not dominated by Vietnam. Palme has been in trouble of late for other reasons. There is growing dissatisfaction with the cost (and the results) of Sweden's social programs and with heavy burdens Palme's party is putting on the middle class to achieve his social objectives. It is reported of late that in public opinion polls, Palme and the Social Democrats are averaging a bare 40 per cent support on a number of important issues.

Answer to Space, Ecology Problems 6 By DON OAKLEY

We are living in the most bountiful age ever, says noted scientist Athelston Spilhaus We are healthier, better educated and better nourished than ever before. In fact, so good is the living that we can now afford to be concerned with a relatively new aspiration—a clean environment.

But there is a real danger, he warns, that we could destroy the very productivity we need to achieve this goal. "We used to balance our concern for ecology (the harmony of organisms with their environment) with a concern for economy (the management of affairs in order to maintain productiveness) "This is what I call 'ecolibrium'.

There is no such thing as zero effluents, he points out. What we need to do is to learn how to turn them into Water and air are commodities that we must use, clean

and reuse. But to give people the things they need to live comfortably and at the same time preserve the environment will take more energy per person, not less. As an example of the kind of danger he sees, Spilhaus notes that oil refineries are being banned from the coast lines of various states on the East Coast and elsewhere. Even where they are not banned, environmental restric tions, he claims, are making it economically impossible for industry to go ahead with the urgent plan to supply the energy we need, not just for our ease but to accomplish

the environmental cleanup By 1980, the United States will need 58 new refineries, costing an average of \$150 million apiece and requiring three years to build. Yet only one of these is currently

The sea offers man space-space close to the crowded coasts, space close to the majority of the world's cities. space close to the principal terminals of world trade. What he envisions is nothing less than "cities in the sea." containing not only refineries and tanker harbors but airports, which now occupy huge tracts of land near the cities that people need for other purposes, hotel accommodations for travelers built within huge floats or pylons beneath the sea surface, recreational facilities and underwater parks and fish farms.

"This," says Spilhaus, "is where we come to the sea."

Minerals could be extracted from the seas in these complexes. Waste heat from power plants could be used in aquaculture to regulate the temperature of water for fish

One exciting research project at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology is investigating the irradiation of sewage with electron beams to destroy viruses and bacteria. Sewage could then be returned to the land or the ocean as a fertilizer rather than a pollutant. Actual work in the direction Spilhaus talks about is going on. There is a proposal to float nuclear plants three miles off the New Jersey coast. The Japanese plan to

build a floating city. European nations are building offshore harbors and industrial islands in the North Sea. "Ecolibrium" and "cities in the sea"-two concepts we will be hearing about more and more in coming years.





For green cabbage, trading activity and prices fell sharply this past week. In the Sanford, Oviedo and Zellwood area Monday, the price per crate of good quality cabbage was weaker at \$4.00. Demand at this price level was slow and by Thursday the price had declined and ranged from \$3.00 to best this season. Size has also been desirable, ranging mostly from 18-24 head size per crate. Price has fallen more from increasing supplies from other shipping areas in the County,

Monday, but increased later in the week at lower prices. On Wednesday the price per crate of 2 dozen size was \$2.50. Other sizes were: 21/2 dz. \$3.00, 3 & 4 dz. \$3.25 and 6 dz. \$3.75.

Volume of carrot loadings has increased over the past two weeks. Trading has continued fairly active and prices were lower on Wednesday. 48-1 lb. film bags of medium-large size carrots sold for \$4.50. Larger sizes, packed in 50 lb. bags. were in light supply and priced at \$3.50. Quality is very good







After all the district is in Longwood and apparently will reflect the Longwood of the 1880's period. It would seem that at least as great an effort should be undertaken to save a Longwood historic structure as is being given to saving an Altamonte building. At least Longwood's history should be given equal consideration.

Industrial Sites Needed

Frank Dailey, head of the Seminole County Industrial Development Authority this week answered statements made by the county's Planning and Zoning Commission toward a request for rezoning of a parcel to light industry. The board in recommending denial of the petition for rezoning said sufficient land in the county is already zoned

The applicant said the Florida Forest Service will provide the protection. Chairman Sidney L. Vihlen Jr. said looking toward the Forest Service fighting a blaze at warehouses (which are planned for construction on the tract) would be like "fighting a forest fire with a water gun."

Route In Doubt?

One lone citizen, in addition to Mrs. Dick Williams, was present during the lengthy discussions among officials of the Orlando-Orange County Expressway Authority, the Board of County Commissioners and representatives of five of Seminole's six cities.

The citizen, who did not identify himself, indicated he was present due to concern that CALNO is pushing for a collector street from the Altamonte Mall on 436 through Rolling Hills to SR 434.

Winter Springs Mayor Granville Brown, chairman of the CALNO Council, insisted his organization has not determined

Within an hour after Brown made the statement, County Engineer William Bush, in a work session with the County Commission at which the Winter Springs mayor was present, pointed out it may well be necessary to have a four-lane street between 436 and 434 and the Palm Springs-Aldus Street route appears to be the best one.

The rationale behind this system of court proceedure, although not necessarily subscribed to by Brock, is that such bargaining i beneficial both to the state and to the defense.

The state saves the taxpayers the trial expense and the defendant often receives a lighter sentence or perhaps



The small Victorian building that housed Longwood's barber shop and confectionery from 1886 until 1911 when its owner, Charles B. Wright died, may be destroyed to make room for the Bradlee-McIntyre Mansion unless someone claims the building and moves it from its original Warren

The building will be given to any responsible taker willing to move and restore it, said Miss Betty Jo McLeod, president of the Central Florida Society for Historic

Miss McLeod said the society hopes the barber shopconfectionery will not have to be destroyed. She quotes William Thurston, preservation officer for the State of Florida in saying that value judgments are often forced when the logical location for a major structure in a historic restoration district necessitates the removal of a lesser one. "Establishing the history of the smaller Victorian structure has been useful, although the building may not be

kept," she said. Constant publicity over the past many months has been given to the plans for the historic preservation district of Longwood since it involves moving the old Grant house to the city to save it from destruction and the probable move of the "inside-outside" house from Altamonte to the city.

historical structures should not be razed to make room for an Altamonte Springs historical building. After all the district is in Longwood and apparently will

reflect the Longwood of the 1880's period. It would seem that at least as great an effort should be undertaken to save a Longwood historic structure as is being given to saving an Altamonte building. At least Longwood's history should be given equal consideration.



cases, for example, the studs are 24 inches apart. However, once you have determined how far apart two studs are, you may be able to find the re mainder simply by measuring. With many walls, knocking on them with the heel of your clenched fist will reveal the presence of the studs. When you rap your fist on the wall, you will get either a hollow or a solid sound. A hollow sound means you are knocking between studs; a solid one tells you a stud is underneath. If a wall is paneled, a close examination may reveal the presence of tiny nail heads in a vertical line, which tells you the stud is there. But if the paneling was applied only with an adhesive, this won't do you any good. Sometimes the nails are there but have been covered up. in which case you will be able to locate them with an in-

If the wall you are working on is to be covered with a new material or anything else, there won't be any harm in making a few holes in the old surface. Drill a hole where you think a stud might be. If the drill bit goes through quickly, it's be tween studs. If it hits solid wood, you have located a stud.

Dear Mrs. FRH: All right, let's see if we can clear this up for you. FHA loans are obtainable from mortgages companies and are insured by the Federal Housing Administration. For this insurance the home buyer pays a monthly premium. VA loans are not insured. Instead, they are guaranteed by the Veterans Administration, a VA loan may be made to the buyer by a mortgage company or it may be made by the VA itself. FHA loans require a low down payment. VA loans to veterans who are qualified do not require down payments.
