Do You Need An FTC Nanny?

There may be no clearer example of empire building by government regulators than the Federal Trade Commission's current crusade to dictate the content of television advertising aimed at children.

To save us from the menace of pre-sugared cereals, candy bars, and toys that fail to meet a bureaucrat's arbitrary standard of suitability, the FTC is considering:

- Banning all television advertising directed at children under eight years of age.
Prohibiting commercials for sugared products that might contribute to tooth decay in children under 12 years of age.

Has it occurred to the commission that even children who have never watched an hour of television in their lives might still favor a breakfast of ice cream and lollipops?

Admittedly, the FTC staff report on which these proposals are based does mention parents. The report suggests that parental disapproval of a child's television-induced gastronomic fantasies fosters "alienation" and "child-parent conflict."

Bunk. Any responsible parent finds it necessary to say no to a child a dozen times a day, and does so without producing neurosis.

As for tooth decay, even the FTC doesn't pretend that there is a direct correlation between watching television commercials and the incidence of dental cavities.

All this is not to say that the FTC should relax its enforcement of existing law against false and misleading advertising. But we do think the agency should give parents a modicum of credit for common sense in raising their own offspring.

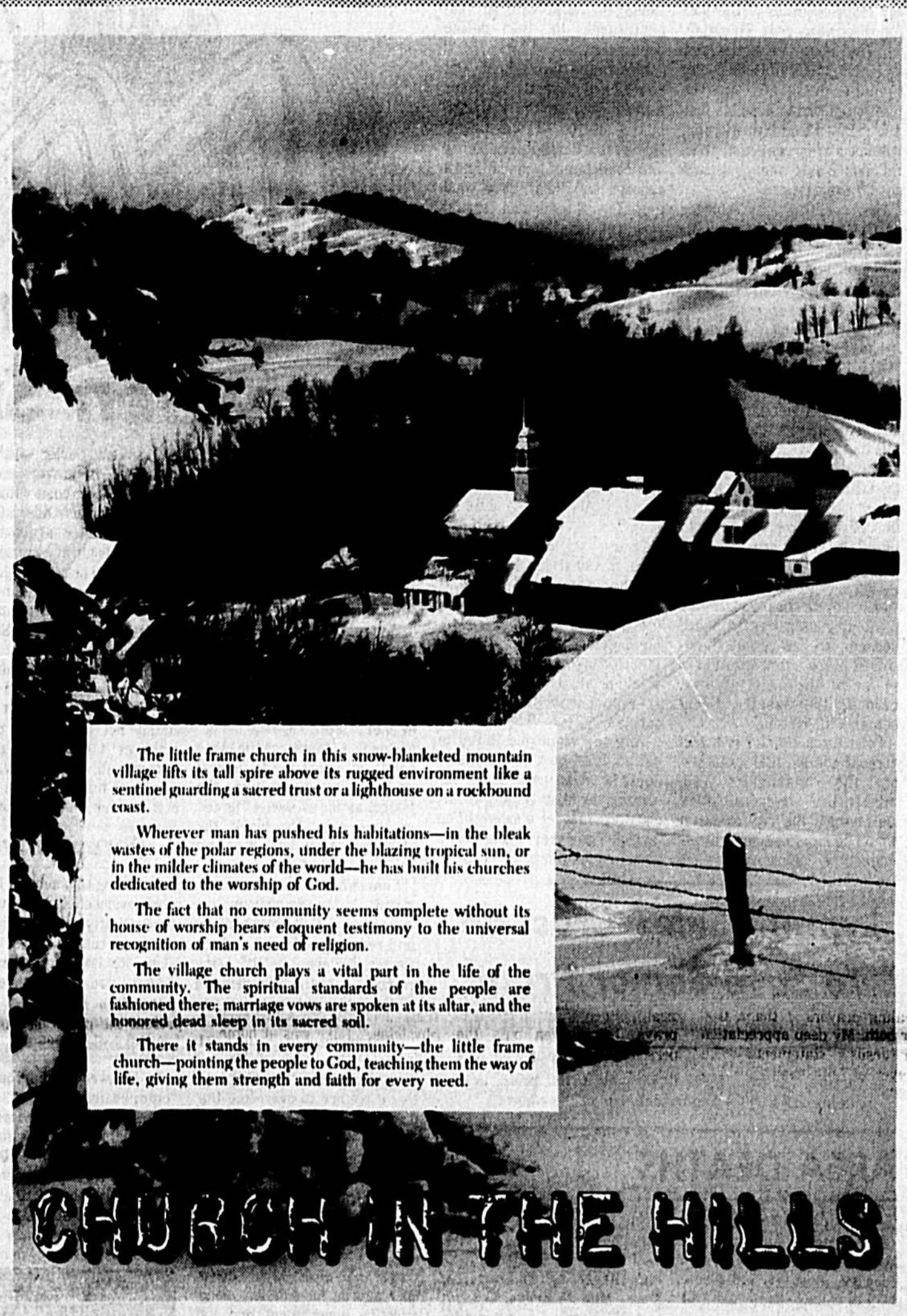

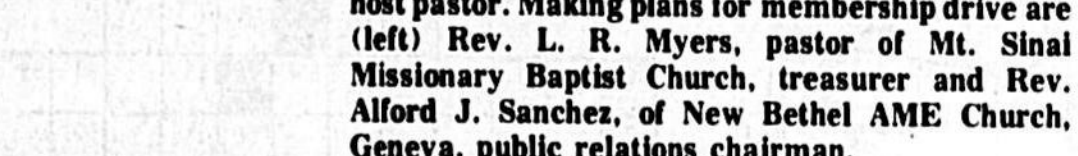

Oral Roberts

When I read the gospel of St. Luke and the Acts of the Apostles which St. Luke wrote, I better understand the relationship of Jesus and doctors, and I see how both natural and supernatural healing powers work together for the healing of people.

When Luke, a Greek doctor, joined St. Paul, an evangelist, they became a healing team. Luke didn't quit practicing medicine when he joined Paul. He was still a doctor. Paul didn't refer to him as a "former" doctor — but a "beloved physician."

God utilizes many methods or delivery systems to bring His healing power to bear on our ailments. He is the source of all healing.

Surprising as this sounds, it was a principle well known to Jesus when He walked the earth. "God loves you more than anything else in Creation," He kept telling people. "You are the Light of the World, the Salt of the Earth!"

The amazing thing was that, at the end of the year, they were the ones who showed exceptional progress. Why? I suspect it was in the attitude of the teachers. Every conversation, every facial expression, every gesture conveyed to the pupil that his teacher expected great things from him. Each one responded with superior performance.

'Corn Is Green': It's A Delightful Romp For Kate

NEW YORK (UPI) — Katharine Hepburn has now made her own the role created on the stage by Ethel Barrymore and on the screen by Bette Davis. That's the part of the strong-willed bluestocking spinster in "The Corn is Green," which CBS presents Jan. 29, 9-11 p.m., Eastern time. Miss Hepburn has a romp through lush Welsh scenery as she founds an unorthodox school for miners and

polishes a dirty, rough lad named Morgan Evans into an Oxford scholar. The surprise in the beautifully acted drama comes from an unknown, Ian Saynor, as Evans. Saynor's performance

would come as no shock in his native Wales, where he has toured in the Emlyn Williams play, but the 26-year-old actor was thrilled to be working in the television drama. Not only did he have the awesome Miss Hepburn as his co-star, but the director was George Cukor, one of the greats of the golden age of Hollywood. The Cukor-Hepburn team produced 10 films, starting with "Bill of Divorcement" in 1932 and including "Philadelphia Story," "Holiday" and "Keeper of the Flame." "When you think you're working with two people like that — very famous people, with incredible reputations, people who are legends, it can be nervous making," Saynor said in an interview. "At first you might think because of their greater age, maybe they are settled in their ways — but the two of them are so flexible, and especially Mr. Cukor has this great elasticity of mind.

"And they were so enthusiastic — they had so much energy. I was the one that got tired." Saynor's slight build wasn't the burly diamond in the rough that Cukor and Hepburn had in mind for the Welsh miner. What do real Welsh miners look like? "Like me," Saynor said with a grin. He gained 25 pounds for the film — although on the screen he certainly doesn't look it — to appear hefty. "Miss Hepburn bought me some weights to build me up — I asked her to sign them. She was very determined that I put on more bulk."

In another category completely is the CBS drama "And Your Name is Jonah," to be aired Jan. 28, 9-11 p.m., Eastern time, and starring Sally Struthers (with hair toned down from the blond brassiness of "All in the Family") and James Woods, who played the artist son in "Holocaust."

The real star is Jeffrey Bravin, a 9-year-old deaf child who plays Jonah, deaf from birth and institutionalized for three years after being misdiagnosed as retarded. The story begins when Miss Struthers and her husband, Woods, bring Jonah home. They must come to terms with

the reality of his deafness — no matter what he learns (at this point he does not understand even the concept of words) he will never be "normal," he will always be deaf. Although the script lacks plausibility of detail, the performances and the plight of the child makes this a moving three-handkerchief drama.

'Needles Are Free'

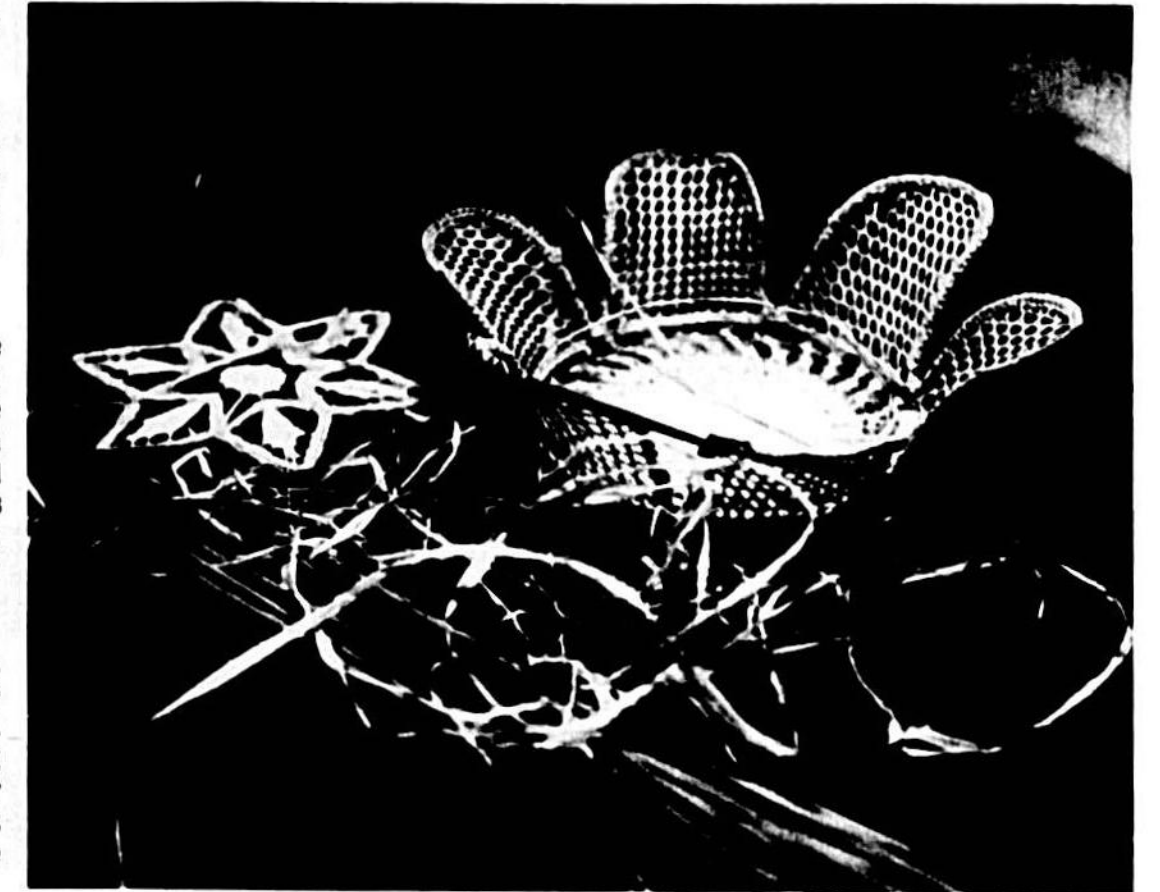
Hobby From Trees

Looking for an inexpensive hobby?

Betty Dimitry of Longwood has one whose raw material literally grows on trees. She makes baskets and other items out of pine needles.

By sewing and weaving the needles together with raffia — strips of string-like material from a type of palm which can be purchased inexpensively at craft shops — the items one can make are limited only by the imagination.

Mrs. Dimitry, a bookkeeper with the Seminole County School Board, has been making items for two years after taking a course in the craft from Mary Behrman at the agriculture center.



FROM PINE NEEDLES TO DECORATIONS

"I'm interested in nature and outdoors," said Mrs. Dimitry, and she liked the idea of working with natural materials and their low cost. "It's inexpensive... can't be much less. Needles are free."

Most items are started by sewing the raffia around a metal ring and then sewing the needles to it with a

variety of stitches which have the appearance of crocheting.

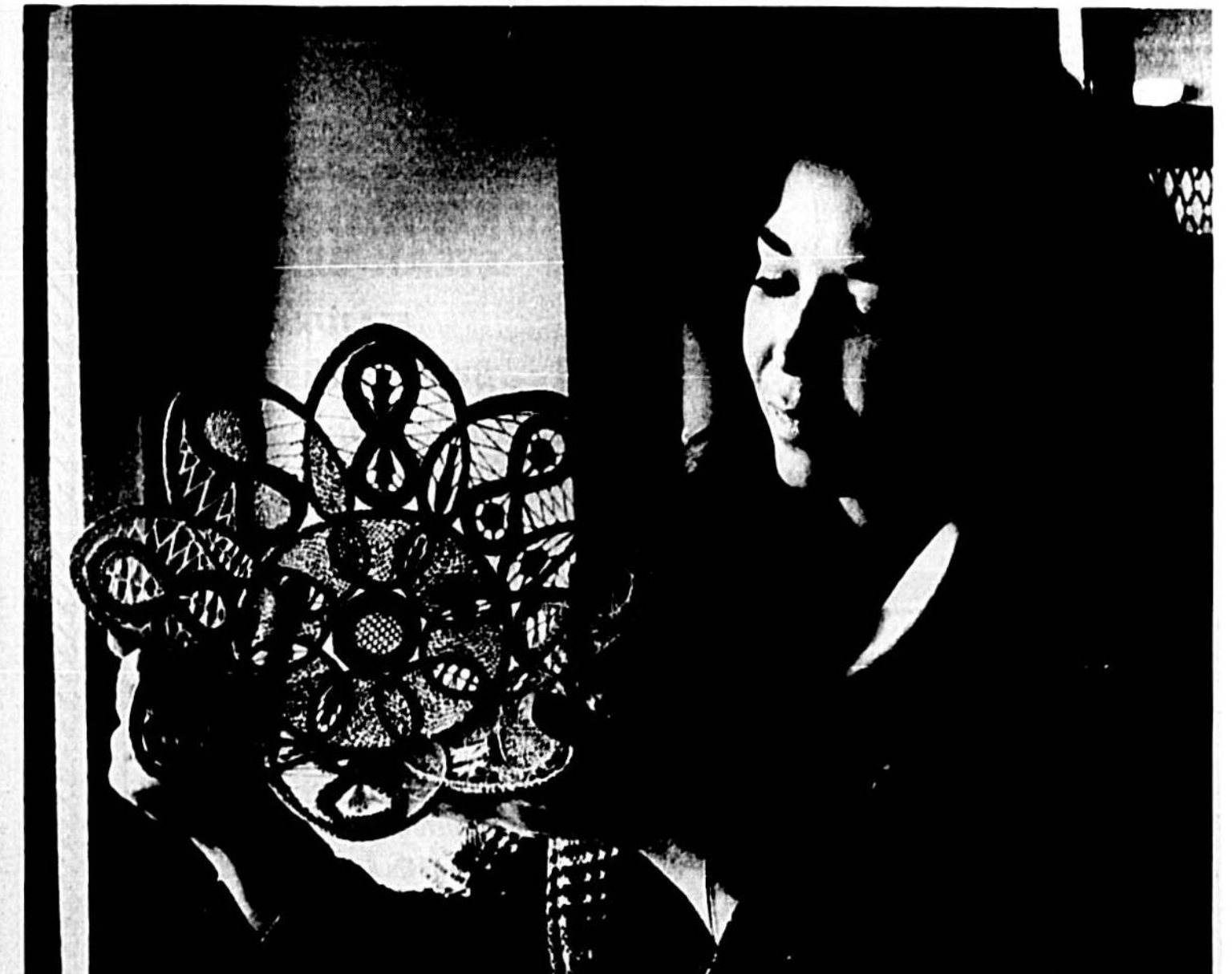
"Once you learn the stitches, then you can use your imagination to create your own work," said Mrs. Dimitry.

She has made baskets from a number of patterns and her own designs.

Napkin holders, pendants, bracelets, earrings and even bird cages are some of the other items she has made or has in the works.

Most of her projects have been given to friends and relatives, but she plans to hang on to more items now that she is redecorating the kitchen — she plans to incorporate many of the pine-needle pieces.

Baby-Face: Don't Let It Fool You

By VERNON SCOTT HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — Kathleen Beller, who costars with George C. Scott in "Movie, Movie," is a petite, baby-faced actress who lives with two boa constrictors and a platonic Polish saxophonist in a one-bedroom Hollywood apartment.

At age 22, Kathleen says she may be eccentric but not kinky. It's a bit difficult for her boyfriends when they call for dates and the saxophonist answers the telephone. They wonder how Kathleen can share bedroom and bath with the handsome musician without emotional involvement.

Kathleen said, "His girlfriends get shook up when they call and I answer the phone. Actually, we're like brother and sister."

Born and reared in New York, Kathleen became an actress at 14 doing television commercials. From age 16 to 18 she was a regular in the soap opera "Search for Tomorrow." She arrived in Hollywood four years ago and has worked steadily. "I took a lot of TV roles away from kids 14 to 18," she said, giggling. "I look so young that producers cast me in children's roles to get around the California child labor laws. Producers got an

experienced actress who was believable in juvenile roles." Kathleen is 5-foot-3, fine boned but with a large bosom which must be strapped down for her kiddie roles. While her body is fully adult her delicate face is that of an innocent teenager. But there is little innocence about Kathleen, who believes in free and uninhibited sexual relationships.

Two and a half years ago Kathleen walked away from her career to take a job as a shampoo girl for six months at a resort hotel in Cancun, Mexico, at the tip of the Yucatan Peninsula. She drifted back in Hollywood and was given the title role in "The Betsy," the movie version of Harold Robbins' novel. "I left because I hated acting," Kathleen said. "I'm

still not crazy about it. But it's a living. A lot of unemployed actors will think I'm crazy and they'll resent me for saying it, but I don't like to act.

"I don't study or take lessons but I keep getting work. 'The Betsy' was a rotten sexist picture and I'm glad it died. It was in theaters about six weeks.

"I took the part because I couldn't pass up a chance to work with Laurence Olivier and director Dan Petrie who is terrific. But it wasn't the sort of picture I'd care about seeing even if it was well done.

'Hunter' Odds-On Choice

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (UPI) — Although not all the critics can agree on the virtue of the movie "The Deer Hunter," the film is a 6-5 favorite in Las Vegas gambling circles to win the best picture Oscar.

Woody Allen's "Interiors" and "The Boys from Brazil" were running 8-5 in the same category for the Academy Awards, which will be presented on April 9 in a nationally televised ceremony in Los Angeles.

"Heaven Can Wait," starring Warren Beatty was 7-5 and "Midnight Express," a film about an American in a Turkish prison, was 2-1.

Other betting odds in the best picture category were "The Children of Sanchez" and "California Suite," both 12-5.

Odds for best actor were 6-5 both for Gregory Peck in "Boys From Brazil" and Robert De Niro in "The Deer Hunter," while Ingrid Bergman, who appeared in "Autumn Sonata" was a 6-5 pick for best actress.

Oscar nominations will be announced Feb. 20.

"Backstairs at the White House," NBC's nine-hour miniseries, is the compelling drama of eight presidential families — from the Tafts through the Eisenhowers — as remembered by a mother and daughter who, between them, served as White House maids for 52 years.

The miniseries will be broadcast on four consecutive Monday nights, premiering with a three-hour segment on Monday, Jan. 29. Books Two, Three and Four will be presented on Mondays, Feb. 5, 12 and 19.

The all-star cast, which has won 28 major awards, will take the viewers into the White House living quarters for an unusual "keyhole drama," an unprecedented dramatization of the personal lives of the presidents and their families during unguarded moments and showing their effect on the flow of American history.

Olivia Cole stars as the servant, Maggie Rogers, and Leslie Uggams stars as her daughter, Lillian. Louis Gossett Jr. portrays their friend and fellow-worker, Levi Mercer.

Other members of the "Backstairs" staff include Cloris Leachman as the officious housekeeper, Mrs. Jaffray; Lealie Nielsen as Chief Usher Ike Hoover, and Robert Hooks as doorman and presidential barber, John Mays.

Paul Winfield portrays Maggie Rogers' hard-luck husband, and Barry Sullivan appears as Attorney General Harry Daugherty.

The first families include Victor Buono and Julie Harris as President and Mrs. Taft; Robert Vaughn as President Wilson, with Kim Hunter as the first Mrs. Wilson and Claire Bloom as the second Mrs. Wilson.

George Kennedy and Celeste Holm appear as President and Mrs. Harding; Ed Flanders and Lee Grant as President and Mrs. Coolidge; Larry Gates and Jan Sterling as President and Mrs. Hoover.

John Anderson and Eileen Heckart are President and Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt; Harry Morgan and Estelle Parsons are President and Mrs. Harry S. Truman; and Andrew Duggan and Barbara Barrie are President and Mrs. Eisenhower.

touching and revealing looks into the intimate family lives of eight first families, also tells the powerful story of Maggie Rogers as she struggles to support her two young children while moving back and forth between her tiny, sparse home and the world of grandeur and glory in the White House.

The servants, who think of themselves as "the only permanent tenants of the White House," must learn to adjust to the style and temperament of each new president and first lady, and those styles range from the calm to the calamitous.

They move with history as William Howard Taft, a man who didn't really want to be president, is urged on by his ambitious wife, to the austere administration of Woodrow Wilson, the "school teacher" president who had to face suffragettes, World War I and death in his family.

The family-oriented Wilson is followed by the flamboyant and scandal-ridden Harding administration, and then by the "not-so-silent" Calvin Coolidge. Coolidge proved to be a prankster who brought dogs, chickens and even a raccoon to the White House.

Suppose It Was 1998 And No Oil Was Left..

By DICK KLEINER HOLLYWOOD (NEA) — If all goes well, and it seldom does, "Americathon" may turn out to be 1979's most controversial film.

That's because it tries very hard to offend a couple of our national sacred cows — the automobile and the oil companies.

It tries to do it with satire and, as the saying goes, "satire closes Saturday night," but maybe this time it'll work.

"Americathon" is an unusual idea for a film.

The premise is that by 1998, the year the movie is set, the oil has run out. Everybody uses skateboards or just jogs, and the country is deeply in debt (that, of course, is hardly unusual) and, to get even, the president (John Ritter) proposes a gigantic telethon to raise \$400 billion.

Most of the film takes place during the telethon, which Harvey Korman emcees. They are shooting it at the Hollywood Palace, and, if a building can have a swan song, this is it for the Hollywood Palace.

Once the film crew leaves, the wreckers will take over,

and what was once the famed Hollywood Palace will become a disco. Sic semper entertainus.

On stage is a line of patriotically garbed chorus girls. A huge Statue of Liberty (gold) and a huge eagle (gold) dominate the background. There is a gigantic Uncle Sam (red, white and blue) and a flashing sign that pleads, "GIVE!" in glorious neon.

Director and co-writer Neil Israel says that \$400 billion sum wasn't chosen arbitrarily.

"That figure," he says, "is actually the current figure of the U.S. debt."

So there is a lot of truth, and more possible truth, in the plot of this movie.

And all those involved hope that they are making a film that both entertains and, simultaneously, awakens.

"Our picture," Israel says, "isn't exactly going to make the auto lobby and the gasoline lobby happy. Its basic premise is that by 1998 we are out of fuel oil and everybody gets around as best they can."

One of the big scenes shows that happening—the freeway jammed with skateboarders, bicyclists and joggers.

The national costume has become the jogging suit or variations thereon.

In his scenes as emcee of the big telethon, Korman wears an outfit that is a hybrid cross between a jogging suit and a tuxedo.

"Behind the humor," Israel says, "we are very, very serious. We all feel that the Mideast oil bloc and the internal combustion engine are the biggest problems this country faces today."

"I am optimistic that we can overcome these problems, but the biggest problem with the problem is to get everyone to realize that it is as serious as it is."

Thus, "Americathon," which the filmmakers hope will wake the country up to the dangers as they see them.

It is being done with a humorous approach because they believe that humor is often a stronger weapon than a straight sermon.

Besides, humor seems to be commercial on movie screens these days. Israel says it is the recent success of certain youth-oriented film comedies (like "Animal House" and "Up In Smoke") that convinced Lorimar to invest \$3 million in the project. He has been trying to get it made for several years.

Korman says his part as emcee Monty Rushmore is "the best part I've ever had in my life."

"It's really a tour de force," he says. "I even have a spot where I break down, something like the breakdown Peter Finch had in 'Network.'"

The telethon itself, which goes on for weeks, is wild. Or so they hope. They have gotten acts which are so bad they make "The Gong Show" look like the Metropolitan Opera.
