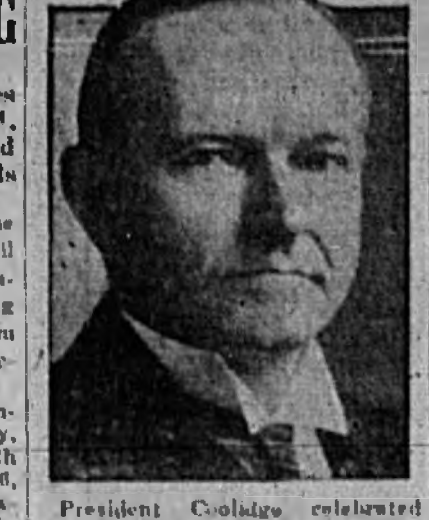

We Grow Better

The Fourth has come and the Fourth has gone and while we don't live on forever, we do live on, and that's some improvement over what the Fourth of July used to mean.

Time was when this great national holiday would leave about half the population of the country in hospitals, if not in morgues. The impression seemed to have prevailed that because our forefathers, by the signing of the Declaration of Independence on July 4, 1776, paved the way for the wholesale slaughter of themselves, their sons and brothers, and also of their cousins across the sea, the fitting celebration of that day must be a similar reduction of the population.

Every conceivable device which could legally be employed in the removal of fingers, arms, legs, or the blinding of eyes, was brought into play. Every child, above the age of crawling, fell immediately into the spirit of the occasion and proceeded to blow the crust off the earth's surface, in order to better facilitate his operations in raising hell. If anyone escaped it was because he was a man of destiny and immune to gunpowder.

For some reason or other—we don't know whether it's because boys have better learned the science of fire-crackers, or because they have come to prefer the sunburn of the beaches or the thrill of a triple play to reverberating explosions—the world grows better in this particular field of lunacy. There were, of course, some fireworks, and no one objects to well managed Roman candles, but there wasn't a single instance, brought to our attention yesterday, of a cannon cracker being set off under grandfather's chair.

This is an improvement, and as long as we can see some progress, no matter how slight, in the realm of civilization, we have no right to complain. We can now see the possibility that the time is sure to come when Independence Day will be celebrated in the manner that it should, by a thoughtful consideration of the aims and ideals of our fathers who made this nation a reality, rather than by a concerted effort to blow them out of their graves.

On a recent visit to a local merchant we happened to witness an incident in his store involving an employee and a prospective customer. The pleasing manner with which the clerk endeavored to be of service, his apparent desire to understand and satisfy his client and his generally affable demeanor made a deep impression on us and we were moved to envy the owner of the establishment for having in his employ one who must have been such a valuable asset.

Yet few people, we believe, realize the importance, in the business world, of practicing the art of making one's self agreeable. Some are inherently disgruntled and will always be doing something to make the day's work unpleasant. Others are so impressed by the importance of their jobs that they believe it would be an insult to their dignity to extend a felicitous hand or to give a cheerful smile. These are the individuals whose attitudes militate against the success of their employers.

On the other hand there are certain fortunate beings who seem to have the happy faculty of evincing a friendly spirit and a willingness to render service which are so necessary in arriving at the goal which business men seek. This type of person is greatly responsible for one of the most essential elements of large patronage, good will. They are so rare, also that they shine forth like a bright star and are as valuable in luring customers as the biggest electric sign. Finally, they help to arouse in customers that feeling of buoyancy which makes people feel the world is not such a bad place after all.

A STIRRING CALL TO ACTION

We have never read a "keynote speech" made at a party national convention that equals the one delivered at Houston yesterday by Claude G. Bowers, for patriotic fervor, verve, phrasing or inspirational appeal for party unity and zeal for victory. Mr. Bowers, who is an editorial writer for the New York World and also an author of wide repute, was the place as official "keynote" by his speech at the last Jackson Day dinner. It is not often that a newspaper writer is chosen for the oratorical rostrum or for presiding officer of a great convention. Mr. Bowers justified his selection by the power and appeal of his speech. It constitutes a stirring call to action, and at the same time furnishes the party, its campaign speakers and writers, with a remarkable fund of fact and argument, which may be used with wonderful effect between now and November 6.

The keynote of Mr. Bowers' keynote speech is "the restoration of the government to the people," the return of the party to the fundamental principles of Jefferson, Jackson and Cleveland, and a rebuke to the idea of Hamilton that "governments are strong in proportion as they are made profitable to the powerful." He unhesitatingly scores the "Black Horse Cavalry of privilege and pillage" which paraded on Pennsylvania avenue during the days of the Harding administration and pours the sticky oil of the Sinclair muss over the entire Republican party and its leaders' past and present. Mellon is assailed and Coolidge is censured. No direct reference is made to Hoover but the Republican machine is arraigned in words that sizzle and sting.

Mr. Bowers produced potent epigrams:

For instance: We stand for the restoration of the government to the people who built it by their bravery and cemented it with their blood.

The little gilded group that now owns and controls the government. The brilliant record of our eight years of power is as a splotch of glorious sunshine against the smutty background of eight years of privilege and crime.

The invisible government now feels strong enough to take on visibility.

While the little group represented by Mr. Mellon has found fine backing in the viscerated of the state, there have been nothing but

thorns and thistles for the tillers of the soil.

One day the head of the state by a scratch of the pen increased the tariff list of the pig iron industry by 50 percent; and the next day he delivered a homily to the farmers on the wickedness of expecting profit from a governmental act.

We are interested in the Rabbit and they in the Balls and Bears.

The Wilson administration is a green spot bounded on one side by the Mulhall mess and on the other by an oil tanker flying a pirate's flag.

We go forth to recover the government from those who pillage by law as well as those who steal by stealth.

They hope to drug the conscience of the nation with the doped soothing syrup of a fake prosperity.

Mythical prosperity, mythical economy, mythical facts, mythical figures, and mythical men, the last eight years may well be treated as the mythical age of American history.

Their verile foreign policy is an anemic outcast stumbling blindly in the darkness of No Man's Land.

Our principles have been written in the triumphs of the people and baptized in the blood of our bravest and best. Jefferson paraded them, Jackson vitalized them, Wilson applied them, and we go forth to battle for them now.

Mr. Bowers' tribute to Woodrow Wilson, which brought the convention to its feet, was a beautiful bit of word-painting:

What a majestic figure was he who led us in those fruitful years! The odd even light of his superb intellect played upon the most intricate problems of the times and they seemed to solve themselves. He lifted the people to such heights of moral grandeur as they had never known before; and his name and purpose made hearts beat faster in lowly places where his praise was sung in every language in the world. And when at length, his body broken, but his spirit soaring still, he fell stricken, while still battling for his faith, there passed to time and to eternity and to all mankind the everlasting keeping of the immortal memory of Woodrow Wilson.

The National Committee chose well when it picked Claude Bowers as the keynote speaker. His speech should be "played up" in all our campaign literature. It is timeless and unanswerable.
