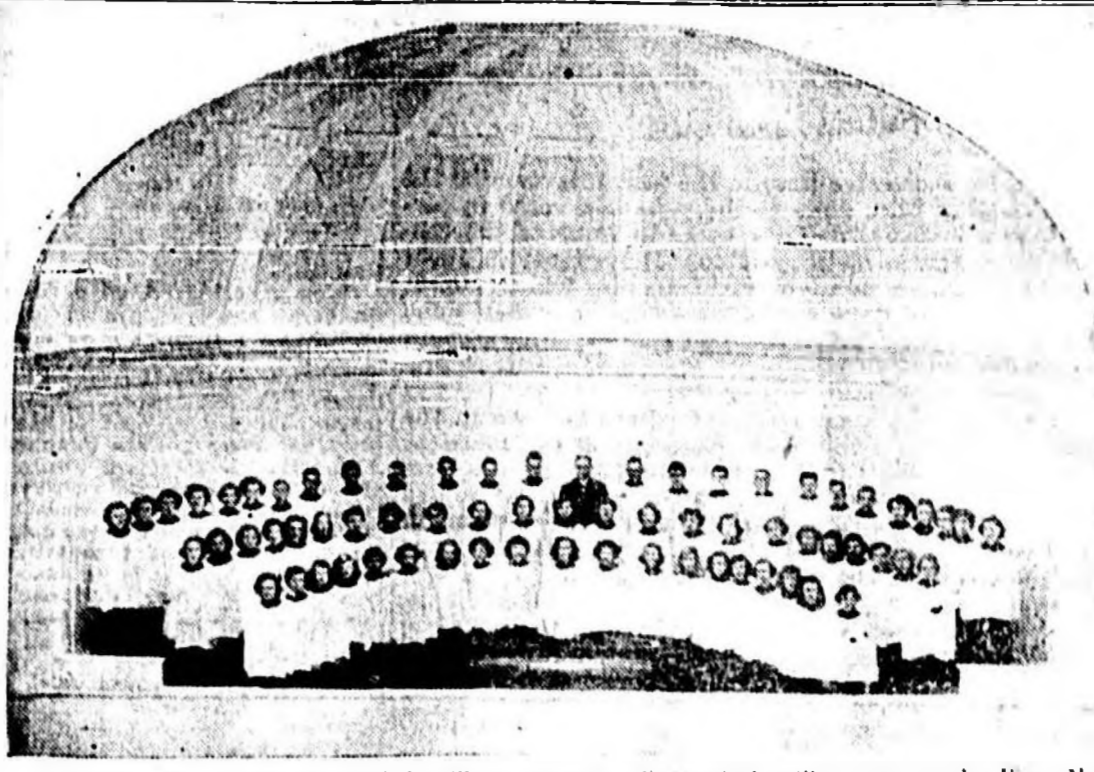

Fleeing Criminal Is Recaptured By Michigan Police

GAYLORD, Mich., Mar. 10.—State police engaged in an on-again pre-dawn chase on northern Michigan roads today to recapture a fleeing criminal.

Cop killer Alvin Karpis, life termer who figured in one of Michigan's cruelest crimes 18 years ago, set off the chase.

The 36 year old convicted murderer fled from a police convoy carrying out a transfer of prisoners.

Although handcuffed, Benoit stole a police car about 2 A.M. and raced 20 miles along a dark highway before another officer's car overtook him.

Meanwhile 30 patrol cars cordoned the roads in the search and blockaded the Oksego county area.

Later Hammond, shackled to a tree, was found shot to death. Benoit went to prison on a first degree murder conviction.

With other prisoners, he was being transferred from the northern branch state penitentiary at Marquette last night to southern Michigan prison near Jackson.

It is a trip of about 300 miles. At the halfway stop Benoit made his break.

Sgt. Harold W. Moore, commander of the Gaylord post, said officers were standing beside the car for refueling, Benoit suddenly leaped from his rear seat, seized the wheel and sped off.

The police broadcast an alarm on the news, and the blockade system went into action.

At 3:10 A. M. troopers Kay, Cooper, Rosinski and Lambert Rayner, in one patrol car, spotted the fugitive. It was overtaken, and he was promptly put under heavy guard for resumption of the trip.

Molly Goldberg Draws Plaudits Where Scintillating Lana Fails

NEW YORK (AP)—Women usually can develop a fondness for anything in the world except another woman.

One of the few women of our times genuinely popular with her own sex is Mrs. Gertrude Berg. Ladies who would give Lana Turner a sub-zero glare just melt and swoon in Gertrude's lap whenever they see her.

"Ooooooh, Molly, you're so wonderful!" they gush. And Gertrude gives them a patient Mona Lisa smile and an autograph, and the ladies feel they have had a victory that day. They even go home and give their husbands a kind word.

The reason they call her Molly is that for nearly 25 years Mrs. Berg has authored and played the leading role in the radio serial, "The Goldbergs," whose heroine is Molly, a plump Bronx wife.

For these two decades, she has represented the Han-fran trim-plump in an era when career women have been winning most of the plaudits. And she knows that in the past few years, the women wouldn't like me at all," sighed Mrs. Berg contentedly over the ruins of a luncheon chunk of lemon chiffon pie.

The pie was only a symbol of Mrs. Berg's philosophy of taking life as it is.

"I always diet tomorrow," she said. "I don't mind being regarded by the public as a fat wife, and she doesn't mind looking like a wife who has gone the way of all flesh that enjoys good food."

But big, plump and comfortable as she appears, she is one of the most talented, astute and determined career women of her generation. But she has made a success of both her home and her career without getting excited about it. And Gertrude has managed to stay just as warm and friendly in her private life as Molly has in public.

Since 1923 Mrs. Berg has written about eight million words—100 good-sized books—and acted in some 6,000 radio and television programs.

She used to write and star in six 15-minute programs a week. Today, at 50, she still turns out two

half-hour programs a week, one radio, one video. She gets up at six in the morning, and by noon of the same day she has written an entire show at a single sitting. She writes in longhand with a pencil.

"I can't keep up with my thoughts on a typewriter," she smiled.

Television has disturbed her way of life because now wherever she goes people recognize her.

"I can't go to Coney Island any more," she complained mildly. "And I always liked to do that."

When she was on radio alone, she used to go about the East Side talking to housewives and pushcart peddlers to get the shrewd homely observations that stamp her style. Her face is too well known now for her to do that.

"But I never have to grope for material," she said. "You live with people, and that's where stories come from—people. They don't have to come from someone who speaks a dialect."

Mrs. Berg has never lost her serenity or become neurotic, as many successful writers and actors do.

"I sleep very well," she laughed. "because I like my work."

And she said she also liked these things:

"Talking to people, walking to the rain, good books, eating good food, having dinner at my daughter-in-law's, and redecorating my own home—and everybody else."

When asked her what she did not like, she said:

"I don't like big parties at anybody's home but my own. I don't like dust in my house, and—I don't know what else in life I don't like unless it's that there are only 24 hours in a day."

**BROILED COCONUT PEACH CAKE**  
(Recipe)

Ingredients for cake: 2 eggs, 1 cup sugar, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1/2 cup milk, 2 tablespoons butter or margarine, 1 cup sifted self rising

cake flour. Topping: 1/4 cup butter or margarine, 1/2 cup firmly packed dark brown sugar, 1 package (about 1 1/2 cups) coconut, 2 1/2 teaspoons heavy cream. Filling: sliced peaches, whipped cream.

Method: To make cake put eggs in a mixing bowl and beat with rotary or electric beater until very thick and pale; add the 1 cup sugar gradually, continuing to beat well add vanilla. In the meantime put the 2 tablespoons of milk or butter or margarine in a small saucepan over low heat until butter is melted—do not boil. Add milk to egg-sugar mixture and using water, beat in quickly. Add flour 1 at a time and beat in quickly again, but make sure there are no lumps of flour unmolten. Turn into a lightly buttered 8-inch square cake pan and bake in a moderate (375F.) oven for 25 minutes. Insert on cake rack, but do not remove from pan. When cool add topping: Melt the 1/4 cup of butter or margarine in a 10-inch skillet over low heat; add the brown sugar and stir. Add the coconut and the 2 tablespoons cream. Mix well with a spoon until sugar is no longer lumpy and coconut is a light tan color. Sprinkle over top of cake with a spoon and fork and place low down under broiler; using low heat broil about 5 minutes or until top is delicately toasted. When ready to serve cut in squares in pan remove and split; fill sandwich fashion with peaches and whipped cream. Makes 9 servings.

(Recipe for Starred Dish Follows)  
**DARK COCOA CAKE**  
Ingredients: 1 1/2 cups sifted cake flour, 1 1/2 cups sugar, 1/2 cup cocoa, 1 teaspoon baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon soda, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 cup butter or margarine or vegetable shortening, 2 medium or large eggs, 1/2 cup boiling water, 1 teaspoon vanilla.

Method: Mix and sift the flour, sugar, cocoa, baking powder, soda, and salt into a large mixing bowl. Add the butter or margarine (at room temperature) or the shortening and the eggs. Stir with a wooden spoon until ingredients are mixed. Add the boiling water and the vanilla and beat 3 minutes with a rotary beater until smoothly blended, or 2 minutes with an electric mixer at high speed. Turn into a buttered 8-inch square a knife or spatula and turn out on cake rack. Frost as desired.

Ingredients: 1 ten-and-one-half-ounce can condensed tomato soup, 1 cup salad oil, 1/2 cup cider vinegar, 1 teaspoon sugar, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon dry mustard, 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce, 1 clove garlic, 1 small white onion.  
Method: Put the tomato soup, salad oil, cider vinegar, sugar, salt, dry mustard, and Worcestershire sauce in a quart jar with a tightly fitting cover. Peel the garlic clove and cut in two. Peel onion, cut away ends, and slice into thin rounds. Add garlic and onion to dressing; cover jar and shake hard. Allow to stand in refrigerator to blend flavors. Garlic should be discarded but onion rings may be used on a salad. Shake thoroughly each time before using. Makes about 2 1/2 cups.

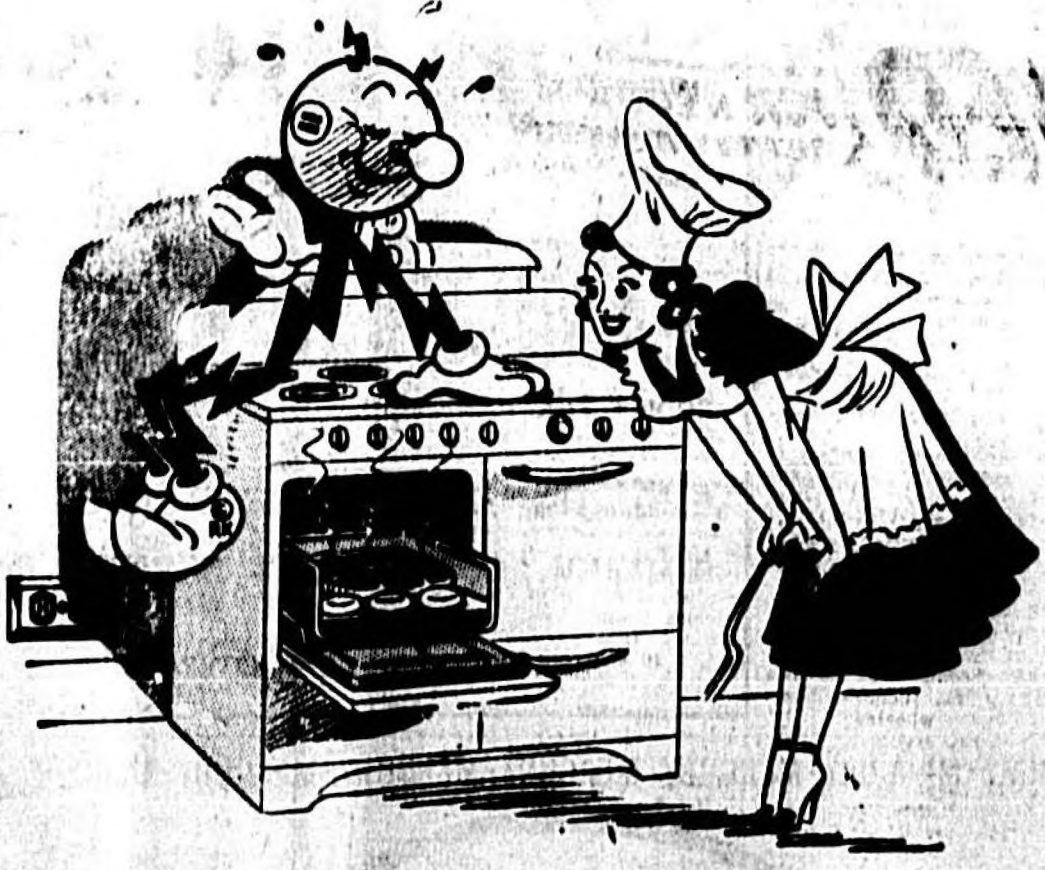

### Rape Is Subject Of New Picture Made By Lupino

SANFORD, Fla., Mar. 10. — Having treated the problems of unwed mothers and pull on the screen, Ida Lupino is now tackling the subject of rape.

The actress discussed the question in a rare moment of leisure during the filming of "Outrage," which she is directing. She relaxed at lunch with Collier Young, with whom she is still on friendly terms as co-producer but not as husband. They are separated maritally.

"Our picture," said Mrs. Lupino, "deals with the psychological effect of rape upon an average American girl. We are treating the subject not in a shoddy or sensational way, but with a clinical approach.

She related that the heroine is the daughter of a college professor and the fiancée of a normal young man. She is attacked by a rapist who has been eyeing her for some time.

"That was our only trouble with the censor," the actress-director said. "Originally we pictured the rapist as mentally deranged. We had to change it so the act was premeditated."

The rest of the picture will show the effect of the rape on the girl. She slams her boyfriend and flees to a small community. There she comes under the influence of a minister, who tries to treat her mental instability.

All goes well until a boy tries to kiss her at a country dance. She chouts him senseless with a farm implement. A trial determines whether or not she should be punished.

"Outrage" will be treated with the same realism that distinguished other pictures. Mrs. Lupino helped produce "Not Wanted" and "Never Fear." She and her partners are on the lookout for other controversial topics to film. Their next one should cause a sensation in the ranks of amateur athletes.

It is called "Loving Cup." The title is ironic, because it's really a biting view of the big business aspects of amateur sports. The story concerns a young girl who is pushed by her mother into becoming a tennis champion. In the end, all she has is a bitter heart and a few dozen loving cups.

The producers are seeking new film subjects and new methods of selling movies, too. Young said that their latest stunt is advertising by mail.

"We are sending postcards from Ida to 30,000 people in Charlotte, N. C., where 'Never Fear' is opening," he said. "We think this personal approach might help interest the public in the picture, which is a highly personal one to Ida. She went through much the same experience."

Capsule review: "Perfect Strangers" (WB) tells the story of ten people who fall in love while serving on a murder trial jury. Both are married to other people. The premise is good and it's carried out with judgment and an eye for creating top characters. Ginger Rogers and Dennis Morgan show admirable restraint in the leads, and Thelma Ritter supplies some fine comedy.

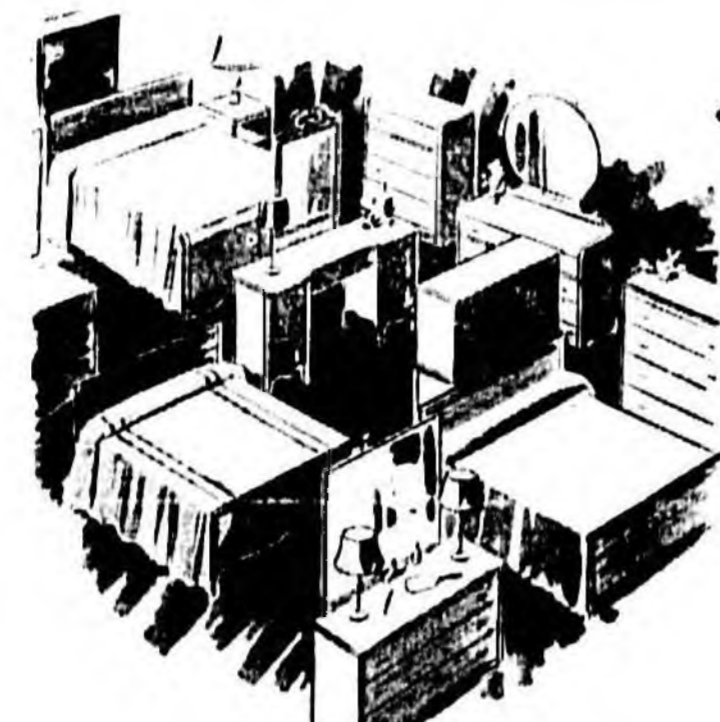

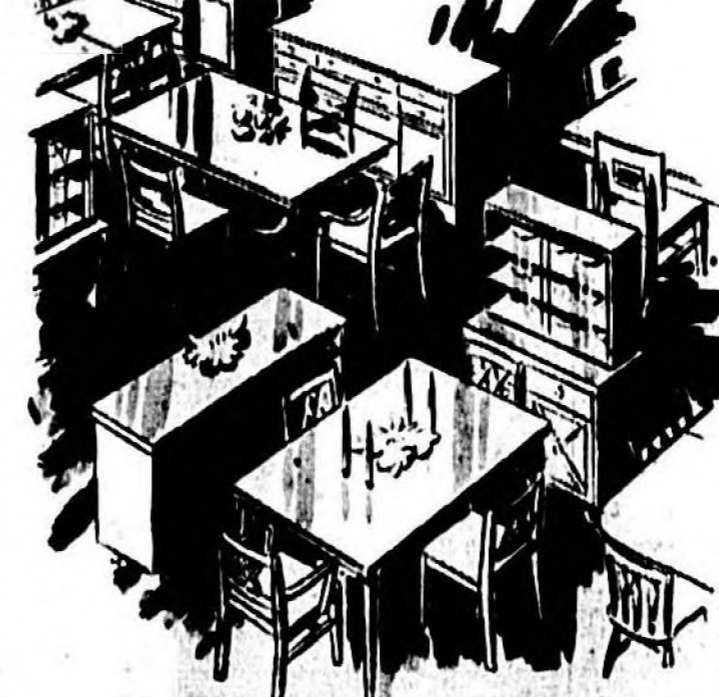

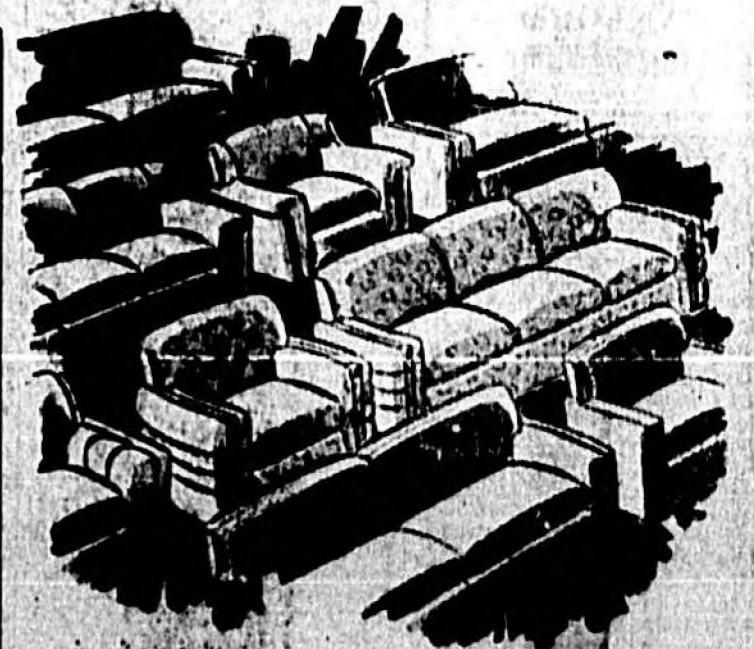
