Fifth Sweep In Months Allies Open Assault

SAIGON (AP) — Another 3,000 South Vietnamese troops joined massive sweep operations in eastern Cambodia today under an umbrella of U.S. helicopter gunships, jet fighters, bombers and B-52 stratofortresses.

The new drive was the third by Vietnamese troops in Cambodia in a week and the fifth this month. All are designed to push North Vietnamese forces back from the border to keep them from disrupting the South Vietnamese elections in late August and early October.

Veng for the new operation. The other 1,600 were already in Cambodia.

They encountered no enemy resistance initially, Esper said. But sharp fighting was reported on Tuesday about 25 miles to the northwest. South Vietnamese headquarters said ground forces and air strikes killed 35 North Vietnamese, while six Saigon troops were killed and 25 were wounded.

South Vietnamese helicopters lifted 1,600 troops to the area between Svay Rieng and Prey Vieng from the new operation.

They were to be used to take to July 26 north of Highway 7 and adjacent to the area north-east of Saigon known as War Zone C.

In approving the rezoning the commissioners denied a request by L. D. Plante to establish minimum "buffer zones" between his rezoning plan and the soon-to-be-erected homes.

At a previous meeting the commissioners had suggested Plante and Goodman meet in an effort to "iron out" the difficulties.

In two separate votes the Commission voted 5-0 on rezoning the second addition but it was a 4-1 vote with Chairman Greg Drummond opposing on rezoning the third addition.

Bryant said her mind was not made up yet on the teacher pay raise but she indicated she had wanted to keep the 7.5 mill off the taxpayers.

On the pay raise question, Mrs. Bryant said some of the highest paid educators do not live in Seminole County but are employed by this system.

Teachers' pay increase will run the starting teacher base from \$6,300 to \$6,400 and add .54 cents a day to the salary of a starting teacher.

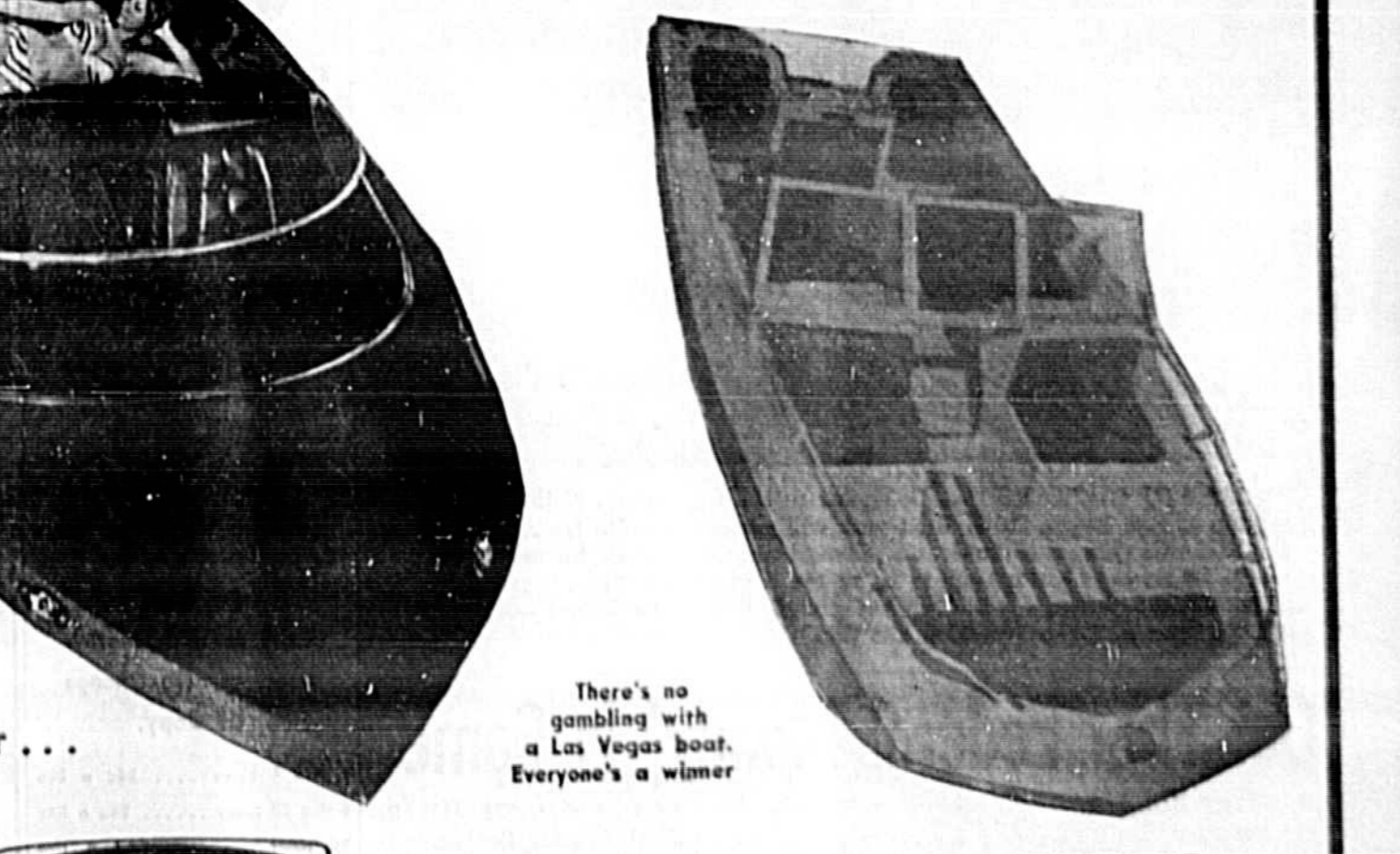

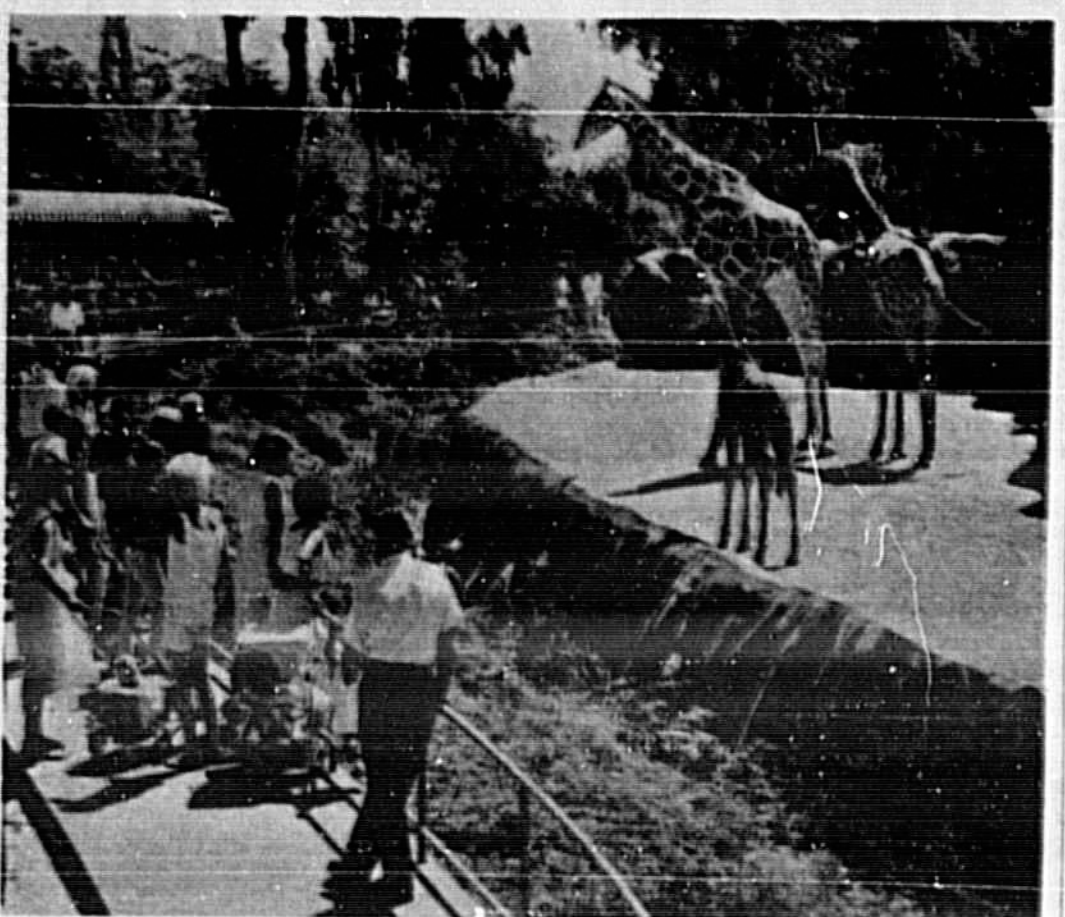

'Get That Federal Money' Is Game

By KATHY NIBLACK
CASSELLBERRY — "The name of the game" today is get that federal money," said Willard Bledley, of the State Department of Transportation as he briefed the council on the new Federal Aid Urban System. The system, which will be worked out in cooperation with towns and cities involved in urban systems, will replace the Highway Trust Fund, which is being phased out in 1976, and which is currently taking two cents of the gas tax.

According to Bledley, the DOT and the Bureau of Public Roads believe that the greatest need today is to relieve traffic congestion in urban areas. This is the goal of the new Federal Aid Urban System, which will designate aid on a 70/30 basis, rather than on the current 60/40 basis (the federal government will pay 70 per cent). Thus, the new program will be obtaining more federal money for cities.

The council was presented with some recommendations by the DOT in cooperation with length by the council.

Swedish Ham, Potatoes

Those with Scandinavian ancestry probably are familiar with Flakskake med Hasselkpotatis or Swedish Roast Ham with potatoes. Hasselkpotatis gets its name from a restaurant in Stockholm where they prepare potatoes in this manner.

SWEDISH ROAST HAM WITH POTATOES

1 whole ham of fresh ham (about 2 pounds)

2 teaspoons salt

1/4 teaspoon pepper

1/4 teaspoon ground ginger

4 or 6 medium baking potatoes

3 tablespoons fine dry bread crumbs

3 tablespoons grated Parmesan cheese

Score fat and skin of ham in two directions to make a diamond pattern. Mix together 1 teaspoon salt, pepper and ginger. Rub cut areas with mixture. Insert most thermometer in fat side - that the point reaches center of the largest muscle, but does not touch bone. Place ham on V-shape rack in roasting pan, leaving room for potatoes in bottom. Roast in 325-degree oven for 39 to 45 minutes per pound (about 4 hours) or until thermometer reaches 185 degrees. Two hours before time roast should be done, prepare potatoes. Peel one potato and place beside, but not on, a thin chopping board or wooden spoon handle. Slice into 1/4 in slices, making cutting all the way through potato. The board or spoon handle keeps the knife from slicing through. Place in a bowl of cold water and continue until all potatoes are sliced. Drain and dry with a towel. Using a hull baster, baste each with dripping; sprinkle with remaining 1 teaspoon salt. Continue roasting, basting potatoes frequently, for 45 minutes. Sprinkle bread crumbs over potatoes, baste again and continue roasting 15 to 20 minutes or until potatoes are tender and roast has reached 185 degrees. To avoid overcooking, if roast isn't finished, remove potatoes and keep warm. When ready to serve, remove potatoes to platter. Sprinkle potatoes with cheese and return to oven for 10 minutes. Serve potatoes with roast ham. Makes 4 to 6 servings with leftovers on the bone.

1 envelope unflavored gelatin

1/2 cup plus 1-2oz. cup sugar

1/4 teaspoon salt

3 large eggs, separated

1 cup buttermilk

1 teaspoon grated lemon rind

1/4 cup lemon juice

9-inch crumby pie shell

In top of double boiler thoroughly stir together the gelatin, 1/2 cup sugar and salt. In a small mixing bowl beat together the egg yolks and buttermilk until combined; add to gelatin mixture. Cook over (not in) boiling water, stirring constantly, until gelatin is dissolved and mixture thickens - about 8 minutes. Remove from heat; cool. Stir in lemon rind and juice. Chill until mixture mounds slightly when dropped from a spoon. Beat egg whites until stiff; gradually beat in 1-2oz. cup sugar until very stiff. Fold into gelatin mixture. Turn into pie shell; chill until set.

1/2 teaspoon garlic salt
1/2 teaspoon oregano
1/2 teaspoon pepper
4 thick hamburgers
Yellow rice

Parsley strips
Thinly slice unpeeled nectarines. Melt butter in saucpan, mix in tomato, chopped parsley, garlic salt, oregano, pepper and nectarines; heat thoroughly, stirring gently. Broil, barbecue or pan-fry hamburgers. Spoon sauce over. Serve with yellow rice. Garnish with fresh parsley strips. Makes 4 servings.

Try A Dill Fish Grill

Skewered seafood and fish vary the usual barbecue barbecue theme. A Dill Seafood Grill is a classic. Fill with haddock, shrimp, sea scallops, tomatoes, onions and green peppers. Serve with rice and a chilled Pickle Dressing.

DILL SEAFOOD GRILL
1/2 cup salad oil
1/2 cup dill pickle liquid
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper
1 pound fillet of haddock, cut in 2-inch pieces
1/2 pound sea scallops
1/2 pound raw shelled shrimp
2 ripe tomatoes, cut in sixths
3 medium onions, parboiled and quartered
3 green peppers, parboiled and cut in squares
Pickle Dressing*
Mix oil, pickle liquid, salt and pepper in large bowl; add all ingredients except Pickle Dressing* and toss lightly until ingredients are coated. Alternate seafood with vegetables on 6 long skewers. Cook on outdoor grill or broil 3 to 4 inches from source of heat for about 3 to 5 minutes on each side or until lightly browned. Serve with pickle dressing.

*Pickle Dressing—Makes about 1/4 cup. Blend 1/4 cup mayonnaise, 1/2 cup dill pickle liquid, 1/2 cup chopped onion, 1/2 cup chopped dill pickle. Chill several hours.

ORANGE MARMALADE
3 cups prepared fruit (3 medium oranges, 2 medium lemons, 1 1/2 cups water, and 1/2 cup teaspoon baking soda)
5 cups (2 1/2 lb.) sugar
1/2 bottle liquid fruit pectin
First prepare the fruit. Remove skins in quarters from 2 oranges and 2 lemons. Lay quarters flat; shave off and discard about half of white part. With a sharp knife or scissors, slice remaining rind very fine, or chop or grind. Add 1 1/2 cups water and 1/2-teaspoon baking soda. Bring to a boil and simmer, covered, 20 minutes, stirring occasionally. Strain or chop peeled fruit; discard seeds. Add pulp and juice to undrained rind. Simmer, covered, 10 minutes longer. Measure 3 cups into a large saucpan.
Then make the marmalade. Thoroughly mix sugar into fruit in saucpan. Place over high heat, bring to a full rolling boil and boil hard 1 minute, stirring constantly. Remove from heat and at once stir in fruit pectin. Skim off foam with metal spoon. Then stir and skim for 2 minutes to cool slightly and prevent floating fruit. Ladle quickly into glasses. Cover at once with 1/4-inch hot paraffin. Makes about 7 medium glasses.

Pungent Sauce For Chicken

The peasants from Eastern Asia who first put a chicken in the Sunday pot, so to speak, started an eating trend that builds each year. Chicken prepared in hundreds of different ways, has become the most popular eating bird in the world. Today a scientifically bred poultry descended directly from the wild jungle fowl of eastern Asia, was domesticated in ancient Greece and bred by the Romans. Since this is our best barbecue time, a new pungent sauce is in order. Here is one that goes well with chicken grilled outdoors or in the grill.

PICKLY GRILLED CHICKEN
3 tablespoons salad oil
2 tablespoons butter
3 cloves garlic, crushed
1/2 cup finely chopped onion
1/2 cup chopped sweet pickles
2 tablespoons sweet pickle liquid
1 tablespoon Worcestershire
1 teaspoon chopped capers
2 dashes Tabasco pepper sauce
1 teaspoon dry mustard
1 cup catsup
1 pounds broiler-fryer chicken pieces

Heat oil and butter in medium saucpan; add garlic and onion and saute until lightly browned. Stir in all remaining ingredients except chicken; simmer, covered for 10 minutes, stirring occasionally. Set barbecue sauce aside.

Cook chicken on outdoor grill, or broil 4 inches from source of heat 10 to 15 minutes per side or until crisp and browned. Grill or broil chicken 2 to 3 minutes longer on each side, watching carefully to prevent burning. Serve any remaining sauce with the chicken. Makes 4 servings, 1 1/2 cups barbecue sauce.

Food Fad Flourishing

The food editor of a great western paper believes that the current passion for unadorned and fresh foods among the young will upgrade everyone's diet.

"Admittedly, many are enthusiasts. But their demand that cauliflower, peas and beans, cabbage and beets, etc., be raised without chemicals is forcing the industry to pay attention," says Jeanne Voltz, of the Los Angeles Times and author of the prize-winning "California Cookbook."

"The rising demand for honest food flavor, free from artificial stimulation, will force frozen manufacturers to improve methods of growing, processing, shipping and selling. We can't of course grow enough organically for everyone. That demand is contrary to the drive of our technological century. But technology can be geared to produce more natural-tasting foods," she adds.

Youth's preoccupation with whole grain food is also a healthy sign.

"Fresh baked wholewheat or cracked wheat bread is a California hobby these days," editor Voltz says. "The custom of home baking is spreading all over the country. The passion to select packaged meat at the supermarket, which explains why so many small butcher shops are opening. Many drive home after work, sit around the pool, cook on the outdoor grill and are certainly willing to pay the price for good foods."

"No, you don't find California restaurants serving as much fresh foods as are served in homes. There are a few exceptions, but most restaurants use frozen products, avoiding the cost and trouble of serving fresh. So, many people eat at home instead, and enjoy life much more," Miss Voltz says.

1 1/2 pounds lean ground round or chuck beef
4 slices firm white bread, soaked in milk and squeezed dry
1 1/2 teaspoons salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
2 tablespoons chili sauce
3 to 5 tablespoons mayonnaise
Place meat in a bowl. In container of electric blender place bread, salt, pepper, onion, chili sauce and mayonnaise; run on low speed from 15 to 30 seconds or until onion is pureed and everything is well mixed. Add bread mixture to meat and mix thoroughly with hands. Pack into a well greased loaf pan (8 by 5 by 3 inches). Spread top with extra chili sauce. Bake in a preheated 350-degree oven from 30 to 45 minutes. Allow to rest for at least 5 minutes. Pour off any liquid in pan. Turn out; turn right side up. Serve hot or chill and serve cold.

CHEESE BISCUIT
1 1/2 cups sifted flour
1 teaspoon salt
Dash of cayenne pepper
3 teaspoons baking powder
1/4 cup finely grated sharp cheddar cheese
1/4 cup butter
1/2 cup milk
In a medium mixing bowl sift together the flour, salt, cayenne and baking powder. Add cheese and toss well to mix. Cut in butter with a pastry blender until particles are fine. Make a well in center and add milk. Stir quickly until ball of dough is free of sides of bowl—about 1/2 minute. On a floured pastry cloth, knead 2 or 3 times. With a floured stockinet-covered rolling pin, roll out to about 1/4-inch thickness. Cut into 2-inch rounds. Place, about 1 inch apart, on lightly greased cookie sheets. Brush lightly with extra milk. Bake in a preheated 425-degree oven about 16 minutes; do not over-brown. Makes 2 1/2 to 3 dozen. Biscuits may be split, buttered and filled with rounds of cooked ham.

Don't work hard when you are making muffins. Easy does it. If you mix the batter too vigorously your muffins will be riddled with tunnels, on the tough side and peaked. Their exterior, too, is likely to be smoother and paler than that of muffins made by stirring gently.
The following recipe produces a pleasant hot bread that's a little different from the usual variety. That's because cinnamon raisin bran, a new ready-to-eat cereal, is added.
Muffins should be served as soon as they have finished baking. Although for convenience sake we have reheated many a muffin, we must confess that this way they aren't quite so good as when they are eaten fresh from the oven.

RAISIN BRAN MUFFINS
1 cup unbleached flour, stir to aerate before measuring
2 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons sugar
1/2 cup butter or margarine
1 large egg
3/4 cup milk
1 1/4 cups cinnamon raisin bran
Butter 10 muffin-pan cups each 2 1/2 inches across top and 1 inch deep.
In a small mixing bowl beat thoroughly stir together the flour, baking powder, salt and sugar. With a pastry blender, cut in butter until particles are tiny.
In a small mixing bowl beat egg until thickened and lemon juice, add milk and beat to combine. Add to flour mixture; stir only until dry ingredients are moistened. Fold in cinnamon raisin bran.
Fill prepared muffin pan cups about 2/3 full. Bake in a preheated 400-degree oven until a cake tester inserted in center comes out clean and muffins are lightly browned—about 20 minutes.

American Cookery Proved A Challenge To French Chef

Every form of cooking is enjoyable for me," declared Max Chantreau, a chef with a Gallic stick of his hand, "but I am a specialist in making sauces, decorating aspics and such."

"I can make decorations like flowers and trifles which resemble birds on the wing," said the volatile chef of New York's Four Seasons Restaurant.

Chantreau, 39, decided to start a career of cooking at the age of 13 when he resisted his father's efforts to steer him toward the barbering profession. He took a job as apprentice in the kitchen of a restaurant in Grenoble in his native France. Chantreau learned his craft the hard way, working from 5 a.m. to midnight seven days a week.

Two years later, he went on to Paris to become an assistant cook at the famed Restaurant Premier Trucier and found life a little easier. By the time he was 15, he had become chef sauce maker at a hotel in Nice and now had a day off each week.

A fighter in the French underground during World War II,

Chantreau wound up in a German prisoner of war camp. He remained imprisoned for two years until Allied troops liberated him in 1945.

For the next two decades Chantreau ruled as chef of some of France's finest restaurants and served a number of noted patrons. They included a queen of Greece and France's late President Charles de Gaulle.

"I discovered that nothing was really impossible to cook, provided you had the proper training," he recalled. "Take soufflé. It is very difficult to make well, but perfection is still possible."

In 1968, the French government sent Chantreau to San Antonio, Texas, to direct the kitchen of the French pavilion at the HemisFair. The following year he went to the Four Seasons.

American cookery proved a challenge to Chantreau, both an inspiration and a disappointment.

"Take your beef, for instance," he said. "It is fantastic in quality generally, especially sirloin. But your filets are dry and small compared to those in France. Our French beef filets average 14 to 15 pounds, while the maximum size in the United States seems to be about 8 pounds."

One of Chantreau's specialties at the Four Seasons is a veal cutlet served with morels in a mushroom swimming cream. Here is his recipe:

Six large, thin slices of veal, about 6 ounces each

Salt and pepper to taste

Flour for dredging

1/4 cup butter

4 ounces dried black morels, mushrooms, soaked for 1 hour in warm water or 1 pound fresh morels

1/4 cup white wine

1 1/2 cups heavy cream

2 teaspoons lemon juice

Sprinkle veal with salt and pepper and dip into flour. Heat butter and oil in large skillet

put in veal and cook three minutes on each side. Put cutlets on platter, keeping warm. Put morels into the skillet and saute a few minutes. Add wine, reducing a little. Add cream. Pour by 1/3rd, add lemon juice. Pour the morels in cream over the cutlets. Serves 6. Good with a cold rose wine.

Regional Special: Crab Cake

Years ago a chef at a Maryland inn gave a friend of ours, as a special favor, his pet recipe for crabmeat cakes. She's been hoarding the recipe ever since.

But recently she decided to part with the secret and turned over the recipe to us. We tried it at once and found it ever so good.

One change we've made. The chef used half crab flakes and half crab claw meat when he made the cakes. For economy's sake, we tested the recipe with just the crab flakes and that's how it's given below.

CHEF'S CRAB CAKES

2 thin slices bread, crusts removed and diced fine

1/4 cup mayonnaise

1 large egg, separated

1/4 teaspoon salt

Dash of paprika

Dash of nutmeg

1/4 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce

1 tablespoon minced parsley

1 pound cooked fresh blue crabmeat flakes, picked over

In a medium mixing bowl mix bread and mayonnaise and let stand about 5 minutes so mayonnaise moistens bread. Add unseasoned egg yolk, seasonings and crabmeat. With a fork mix lightly but well.

Beat egg white until stiff, fold into crabmeat mixture.

Shape into 12 cakes, using about 1/4 cup of the crab mixture for each.

Brush a large heavy skillet with butter; add crab cakes and over medium heat, turning once or twice, cook until browned on both sides and heated through—about 10 minutes. Do this in 2 batches if necessary. Serve at once.

Makes 4 servings, 3 cakes per portion; or 6 servings, 2 cakes per portion.

Quick way to make this specialty of Italian cuisine.

1 package (8 to 9 1/2 ounces) refrigerated buttermilk biscuits

1 quart (about) corn oil

This Molded Cold Salad Comes From Georgia-way

A New York friend of ours, visiting her home state of Georgia, brought back a regional cookbook. It's called "From Savannah Kitchens" and was compiled by the Women of Christ Church in Savannah. They've contributed some delightful re-

cipe to their small spiral bound volume.

On testing and adapting one of them, Cold Broccoli Mold with Sour Cream Dressing, we found it quite worthy of being passed along to you.

When we served the salad recently we accompanied it with rounds of cooked ham and

wiched between cheese biscuits and with iced tea. Tea is the appropriate beverage because this is a southern menu and the South is the largest tea-consuming region in our country. Here is a standard direction for making the tea:

For 9 servings, pour a quart of cold water into a saucepan

and bring to a full rolling boil. Remove from heat and at once add 15 leahogs of 1-3rd cup loose tea. Stir, cover and let stand 8 minutes. Stir again and strain into a pitcher holding another quart of cold water. Let stand at room temperature until ready to serve because refrigeration may cloud the tea. At

serving time, pour into tea-filled glasses and serve with lemon wedges and sugar.

COLD BROCCOLI MOLD

1 package (3 ounces) cream cheese

2 packages (each 10 ounces) frozen chopped broccoli

1 can (10 1/2 ounces) condensed chicken broth, undiluted

1 envelope unflavored gelatin

1 cup mayonnaise

2 hard-cooked eggs, chopped

7 Tabasco sauce to taste

Sliced greens and radish roses

Sour Cream Dressing, see below

In a medium saucepan cook broccoli according to package directions; drain. To hot broccoli add cream cheese and stir until it melts.

Into a small saucepan pour about half the chicken broth; sprinkle gelatin over it and allow to soften—about 5 minutes. Stir over low heat until gelatin

Sanford Can Cut Taxes - Knowles

Sanford City Manager, meeting with the City Commission at Wednesday night's second budget session, disclosed that the city's millage levy can be reduced from present 16 mills to 13 because of added revenue coming into the city.

W. E. Knowles stated three mills could be lepped from the present city assessment due to funds coming into the city centers from cigarette and gasoline taxes recently passed by the state and additional revenue above the amount brought in last year from property taxes.

The city manager estimated that an additional \$146,000 in new money will be coming. Of this amount \$128,000 from the cigarette and gasoline tax and \$18,000 in additional property taxes due to higher county evaluation.

This amount could be applied toward a \$193,000 deficit in the budget, which is that much out of line with expected city expenditures and projected revenue for the 1971-72 year.

If the Commission votes to fund the zoo operation for another year, then the deficit would be increased by additional \$20,000 to total \$213,000 but the city fathers are expected to trim some of the "fat" from the budget proposed by the city manager.

Municipal Judge Roger Berry attended Wednesday night's session to seek a pay raise from \$1,200 to \$7,200 a year. City Prosecutor Robert Morris also was on hand and requested a pay increase from \$150 to \$300 a month for the next time position.

Judge Berry proposed changing the fine system, which he said is "too low" and indicated his preference for a maximum \$200 fine and 90 days in jail instead of present \$200 fine and 90-day jail sentence.

Commission took the judge and prosecutor's request under consideration.

Next budget session was scheduled for 8 p.m. Aug. 4.

Nixon Administration Piles Up Historic Back-To-Back Deficits

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Nixon administration is on the way to piling up the worst back-to-back deficits in federal government operations since 1945-46.

But administration officials shrug off the two deficits, expected to total more than \$19 billion in fiscal 1971 and 1972, saying they are fiscally responsible because returned.

The reason, they say, is that the budget spending is pegged to the amount of tax revenues the government would expect to receive in times of high prosperity.

In fiscal 1965, the federal deficit, ballooned by wartime spending, was \$15 billion. As peace returned, the deficit dropped to \$18 billion the following year.

The treasury department reported Wednesday the deficit for fiscal 1971, which ended June 30, climbed to \$23.2 billion, second highest one-year deficit of the post-World War II era.

Officially, the White House says, the deficit for fiscal 1972 will be \$11.6 billion. But already administration officials have acknowledged publicly it will be closer to \$18 billion. (Continued on Page 5A, Col. 1)

State - U. S. Support Vowed For Council Of Four Cities

CASSELBERRY — The South Seminole Council of Local Governments, a dubbed CALMO by the four member cities last May, received assurances from a state official Wednesday night of full cooperation and assistance from the state Department of Community Affairs in gaining federal funding.

Joseph Mooney, director of technical assistance of the state organization, said funding in the amount of \$25,000 can be gained as an outright grant from the federal government for a state and national pilot program to study possible areas of cooperative services among Casselberry, Altamonte Springs, Longwood and North Orlando.

In the interim period from now until July Mooney pledged to give all aid possible through providing technical assistance and personnel through his office.

The state official urged the Council to adopt by-laws as its next step and said resolutions passed by the governing bodies of the four individual cities have, in fact, formed the council of local governments.

He added, in answer to a question, that it is not necessary for the council to be county-wide. Attorney S. Joseph Davis Jr. agreed to prepare the group's by-laws.

Altamonte Springs Mayor Lawrence Swafford was unanimously elected temporary chairman of the organization. Representatives of other cities present included Mayor Granville Brown and Councilman Charles Rowell, of North Orlando; Council Chairman E. E. Williamson and Councilmen Eugene Jaques and Agnes Weber, of Longwood; and Mayor Curtis Long, Councilman Harry Sambrook and City Manager Ron Bergman of Casselberry.

Mooney commended the four municipalities for forming the organization and pointed out many areas of cooperation could be found from police and fire protection, mass transit, water and sewer service, sanitary landfills, garbage service and mass recreation.

He added the federal government since 1965 has been encouraging such organizations believing them to be the answer in a many ways to local problems.
