



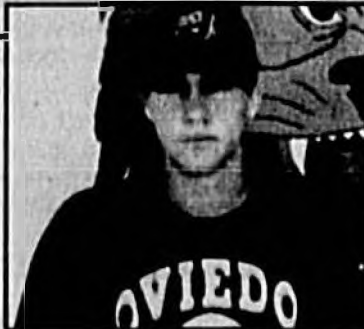

Rep. Bill McCollum of
Longwood made it official on
Monday. He's going to make
a run at the U.S. Senate after
serving since 1981 in the
U.S. House of Representatives.

Transferring \$750,000 in
unused campaign funds into
the campaign, McCollum is
eager to capture the Senate
seat being vacated by Sen.
Connie Mack. Mack announced
Saturday he would not seek
re-election in 2000.

A number of other candidates
are lining up to oppose
McCollum. Former Lt. Gov.
of Florida, Rick Dantzler
said he is interested as is
Rep. Bob Wexler. Charlie
Crist, a former state senator
who was the GOP's unsuccessful
candidate against Sen. Bob
Graham last year, says he
also is running.

Florida Senate President
Toni Jennings - who also
may run - joked on Monday
that she wanted everyone
who was running for Mack's
seat to stand in the front
row. "But then we said
there'd be no back row."

Seminole County public
safety officials ordered a
controlled burn today
around a lake in the Geneva
Wilderness Area. The burn
began at 9 a.m. near the
shoreline covers about 10
acres of land in the county
preserve on State Road 428,
between Snow Hill Road and
Seminole Woods.

Jim Duby, the county
natural lands manager, said
the burn should be finished
in the early afternoon. If

burning on Wednesday and

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Twin dies, other critical as pregnant woman's car is struck

LAKE MARY - A Lake Mary
woman carrying twin children is
recovering in stable condition at
Orlando Regional Medical Center
after her car was struck by a
Sanford man who ran a red light
on Monday. But, one of her twin
boys died, and the other is in
critical condition.

Violetta Bernauer, 30, was
pulling out of the Manderley
Subdivision with a green light
onto Rhinehart Road in a 1991
Honda Prelude at 10:57 a.m.
when Kenneth Hinson, 48, ran a
red light in a 1984 full-sized
Dodge pickup and struck her car
on the driver's side, police say.

Hinson is being charged with
one count of vehicular homicide.
When police tried to make the
arrest this morning, Hinson was
not at his Sanford residence, ac-
cording to police.

Park group wants second referendum on hotel issue

Group needs 2,700 signatures to force the city to vote again on whether to pass an ordinance to preserve Fort Mellon Park.

SANFORD - The Society for the Preservation of Fort Mellon Park, formed to fight against the construction of a hotel/conference center in the park, is "within striking distance" of forcing the matter to come before the voters again, according to co-chair Millard Hunt.

Voters approved a referendum to allow "a city park and hotel-conference center on Fort Mellon Park" by a margin of 55 to 45 percent in November. The Society is hoping to force a second referendum.

The group needs 2,700 signatures of registered voters on petitions to force the City Commission to either vote again on the issue or adopt an ordinance to preserve the park. The Society so far has more than 2,000 signatures, according to Co-Chair Millard Hunt.

"We already had well over 2,000 signatures some time ago, before the first referendum," Hunt said. "We got a couple hundred signatures on election day (March 2). We're definitely within striking distance."

Members of The Society collected signatures

during the city's elections on March 2. Society members say the first referendum, to allow a city park and hotel conference center on Fort Mellon Park, was confusing.

"It seemed to a lot of people that it was a vote to save the park as well as build the hotel/conference center," Hunt said. Hunt said the Society wants a second referendum to include language that would allow the voters to keep Fort Mellon Park for only public or semi-public use.

"This would by implication keep development out of the park," Hunt said. Hunt said he believes many people in Sanford who voted for the hotel/conference center have changed their minds.

"The thing that makes people wonder is what is the real intent of the proposal," Hunt said. "No one has yet done a feasibility study."

The City Commission placed the development at Fort Mellon Park before the voters in November after the Society's petition drive in 1998 that called for the city to preserve the park.

"It's obvious this was the City Commission's referendum," Hunt said.

The Society is appealing the state's approval of changes made to Sanford's land-use plan.

"We don't feel the city dealt at all adequately with the question of traffic," Hunt said. "Many people are turned off by (US highway) 17-92 in rush hour, 25th Street, and (State Road) 46-A. Plus, First Street itself. The congestion in downtown is amazing."

Before the election, the commission voted to change Fort Mellon Park's zoning to allow development. Society members say that if the hotel-conference center proposal fails, the zoning change would permit other development.

Rabun must travel to be witness at Suber trial

SEMINOLE COUNTY - Former County Manager Ron Rabun, now the city manager of Richland, Wash., soon will be headed across country to be one of the witnesses in the Joyce Suber vs. Seminole County trial beginning March 29 in Fort Myers.

Suber, who was fired from her job as land acquisition coordinator for Seminole County in 1968 is suing her former employer for false termination, age discrimination and sexual harassment. She is asking for \$20 million in damages.

Rabun appears on the witness lists for the plaintiff (Suber) and the defendant (Seminole County). He said Monday that he had not yet re-

ceived a subpoena. "I'll be there when I'm subpoenaed - but it's not something I particularly relish," Rabun said.

One of the finalists in Sanford's recent search for a manager, Rabun has been in Richland - part of what is known as the Tri Cities area of S.E. Washington State - for the past six months. He was the Seminole County Manager from 1990 until late 1996.

Rabun lost his county job in the midst of a public works department (land acquisition) scandal that is still under investigation by the FBI and the FDLE (Florida Department of Law Enforcement). Suber's dismissal was followed by a number of resignations or firings.

The county contends Suber was fired because of insubordination, misuse of county property, improper time reports

and for accepting gifts and gratuities from the private sector.

Suber says claims several county commissioners and officials sexually harassed her. Suber said she told former assistant county manager Kevin Grace of the sexual misdoings, and that he advised her to back off and not cause a stir.

Grace, like Rabun, is on the witness lists for both the plaintiff and defendant in the case which was originally planned to be heard by Orlando Judge Anne Conway but was transferred last week to Fort Myers. Grace told the Seminole Herald last summer that Suber was "lying" about coming to him with the harassment charges.

The case is causing an interruption from the ordinary workload in the county. County Engineer Jerry McCollum and assistant Frank VanPelt will be spending considerable time in Fort Myers at the trial which could last from one to two weeks.

Assistant County Manager Cindy Coto and Deputy County Attorney Lonnie Groot are on the witness lists for each party as are commissioners Daryl McLain and Randy Morris and

ex-commissioner Win Adams. Suber may call on commissioners Dick Van Der Weide and Carlton Henley.

The Suber trial will begin as Gary Kaiser ends his two-year term as county manager. Kaiser succeeded Rabun and is credited in taking the county through a very troubled period of its history.

A nation-wide search has begun for a new manager. How this process is affected by the Suber trial is anyone's guess. It doesn't figure to make it smoother and it could cause a major embarrassment.

One manager who isn't at all interested in the county position is Ron Rabun. "I'm very happy right where I am in beautiful Washington," he said Monday. As for Seminole County, he said he had been there and done that.

Safe at home**

A half dozen years ago when Orlando had high hopes of getting a major-league baseball team, one of the city's biggest boosters was Senator Connie Mack.

Mack didn't want one team for Florida - he wanted three. Miami, Orlando and St. Petersburg. He said baseball belonged throughout the Sunshine State.

His granddaddy - baseball's legendary Connie Mack - once played for the Washington Statesmen, the first big-league team to conduct spring training in Florida. Mack was a catcher for the Statesmen when they trained in Jacksonville.

Sen. Connie Mack has a portrait and a ball signed by his granddaddy at his Senate office. Mack, 58, likes to show them to guests, especially those who have traveled from Florida to visit the Capitol Building.

No one can put it into words any better than Florida Senator Bob Graham regarding Mack's retirement from the Senate: "He is friendly, humble, generous, and always quick with a kind word or a smile."

Although Graham is a Democrat and Mack a Republican, the two worked together as U.S. Senators, providing the citizens of this state outstanding leadership in Washington. Both are fine statesmen and legislators.

It thrilled me three years ago when Connie Mack was mentioned as a possible running mate to Bob Dole. I believe a Dole-Mack ticket would have fared much better than Dole-Jack Kemp. It was not Mack's wish to run, however. And now he says he will relinquish his Senate seat in 2000.

Connie Mack and his wife, Priscilla have both defeated cancer and are eager to spend time together away from politics. No one can fault them for that. They deserve time to be with their family and friends. Out of the political arena.

Selfishly, I don't want to see Connie Mack leave office. I wish he would have been vice president and one day be President of the United States. There would be little to attack a President Mack. Integrity not scandal would spill out on Pennsylvania Ave.

I've got a feeling, too, that Washington would get itself another baseball team if Connie Mack were president. The Senators moved out in 1972 and eventually were owned in Texas by a man named George Bush, who now has his eyes on the White House.

Banana pie wins prize in Lake Mary

LAKE MARY - In conjunction with Olde Lake Mary Days held recently, the Lake Mary Historical Commission held a pie contest. Rather than judging it themselves, they went out into the community and found help.

There were three judges for the contest. Chad Frank is the owner of Appleton's in Lake Mary. He has been in the restaurant business for 10 years.

so he knows a good pie when he tastes it. Gayle DeBoer is the founder and co-owner of Mel's Diner in Sanford. She personally bakes all the pies she serves in her restaurant. The final judge, Helen Glatt, has been named the best non-professional baker by everyone who knows her. A Lake Mary resident for 22 years, she is a member of the Presbyterian Women.

Being a judge for any contest can be difficult. But for a pie contest, there are delicious re-

wards. The winner of the contest was Nikki Norman for her Original Banana Split Pie. Judge Chad Frank called it "amazing". Second and third place went to Christine Dietz. Her Calamondin Dream Pie came in second and her Super Strawberry Pie came in third.

After the judging, slices of all the pies entered were sold to hungry festival goers. None of the pies lasted long. Next year, the commission plans to hold a cake contest.

Nikki Norman's Original Banana Split Pie

Crust:

- 1 c. graham crackers, crushed
- 1 c. chocolate wafers, crushed
- 1/2 c. sliced almonds, crushed
- 1/2 c. sugar

In a medium mixing bowl combine above ingredients and mix well.

Add:

- 1/3 c. unsalted melted butter
- 1 T. dark rum
- 1 T. vanilla

Combine and press mixture into a 10-inch pie pan.

Filling:

- 4 bananas, sliced 1/4-inch diagonally (dipped in juice of 1 lemon)
- Place half of banana slices evenly over bottom of crust. (Reserve the rest.)

Chocolate Layer:

- 1 can (14 ounce) condensed milk (chocolate flavor)
- 1 (8 ounce) package cream cheese, softened
- 1/2 t. vanilla extract
- 1/2 t. almond extract

Combine all ingredients in a food processor and blend until smooth. Pour gently over bananas. Refrigerate 30 minutes. Cover with reserved banana slices.

Strawberry Layer:

- 1 pkg. unflavored gelatin

- 1/4 c. Knotts Farm strawberry flavored syrup
- 2 (3 ounce) pkgs. cream cheese, softened
- 1 cup fresh strawberries, coarsely chopped
- Combine gelatin and syrup. Set aside. Puree cream cheese until smooth. Add gelatin and syrup mixture. Process until blended. Add strawberries and process for 1-2 seconds. Pour mixture gently over chocolate and banana layers.

Vanilla/Pineapple Layer:

- 1/2 c. milk
- 20 large marshmallows
- 1 (8-1/4 oz.) can crushed pineapple in heavy syrup (do not drain)
- 1 c. granulated sugar (1/2 c. reserved)
- 1 T. arrowroot (or cornstarch)
- 1 c. heavy whipping cream

Heat milk and marshmallows in a heavy saucepan until melted, stirring frequently. In another saucepan combine crushed pineapple, 1/2 c. sugar and arrowroot. Stir constantly and boil for 1 minute. Combine marshmallow and pineapple mixtures. Cool completely. Whip cream until slightly thickened. Add sugar gradually and continue beating until stiff. Fold pineapple marshmallow mixture into whipped cream. Cover pie with this mixture.

Garnishments (if desired)

- 1 c. frozen whipped topping, thawed
- 1 (10-oz.) jar maraschino cherries, well drained
- 1/4 c. coarsely crushed peanuts.
- Freeze pie and serve frozen or slightly thawed.

 curding to Lake Mary Police Department Lieutenant David Guildford.

"He may be on the run," Guildford said. "We don't know where he's at. He has a lengthy criminal history."

Hinson, who lives at 205 Margaret Road, has a criminal record that includes two DUI's and charges for cultivating marijuana, possession of cocaine, and multiple charges for forging drug prescriptions, police say.

Bernaer was airlifted to Orlando Regional Medical Center. She suffered a ruptured uterus, and the twins had to be removed by Caesarian section. She also suffered lacerations to her left arm and left leg.

Baby Brian, who weighed two pounds, five ounces, died just before midnight Monday at the neo-natal care unit of Arnold Palmer Hospital for Children & Women.

Baby Joshua, who weighs two

pounds, nine ounces, is in extremely critical condition as of 8:30 a.m. Tuesday. The babies were in about the 28th week of gestation, Orlando Regional Medical Center spokesman Joe Brown said.

If baby Joshua dies, police say Hinson will be charged with a second count of vehicular homicide.

"They were both in very critical condition at the onset," Brown said. "In addition to being very early in the pregnancy, they also suffered the trauma of a ruptured uterus. They were placed in incubators and on respiratory assistance from the start."

Doctors have yet to determine how much blood supply was interrupted to surviving baby Joshua at the time of the impact. Doctors are concerned about how the accident will affect the development of Joshua's lungs, brain, and other areas, Brown said.

This was the first pregnancy for Violetta and David Bernauer of Samantha Lane, who have

been married for about a year and a half, Brown said. Violetta Bernauer is in stable condition in the intensive care unit at ORMC.

It took rescue workers 30 minutes to cut off the remove Bernauer from her car.

"Doctors have said that if it wasn't for the fast response (of rescue workers) the babies would have died much earlier," Brown said.

Witnesses told police that Hinson, who was pulled from his pickup and suffered a bruised chin, was gunning a yellow light as the light turned red.

"He hit her right in the driver's door," Lake Mary Police Department Lt. David Guildford said.

Hinson was cited Monday for running a red light. Additional charges were depending on the health of the infants. Hinson was given a blood test for alcohol or drug use, although police at the scene did not believe he was intoxicated.

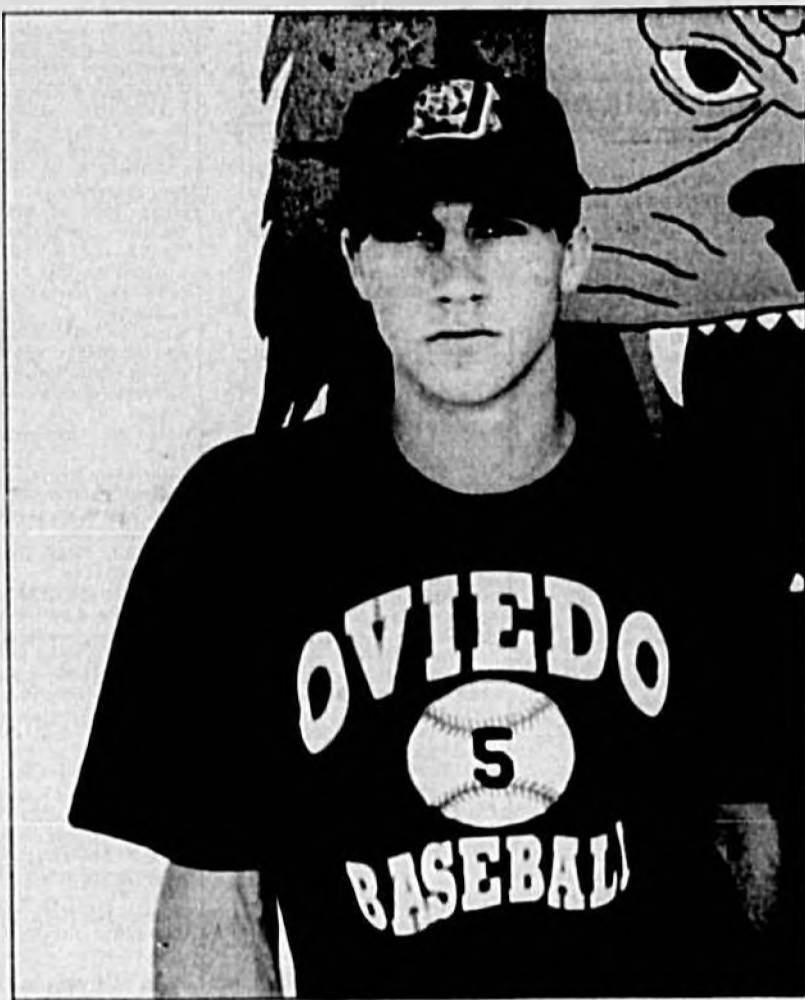

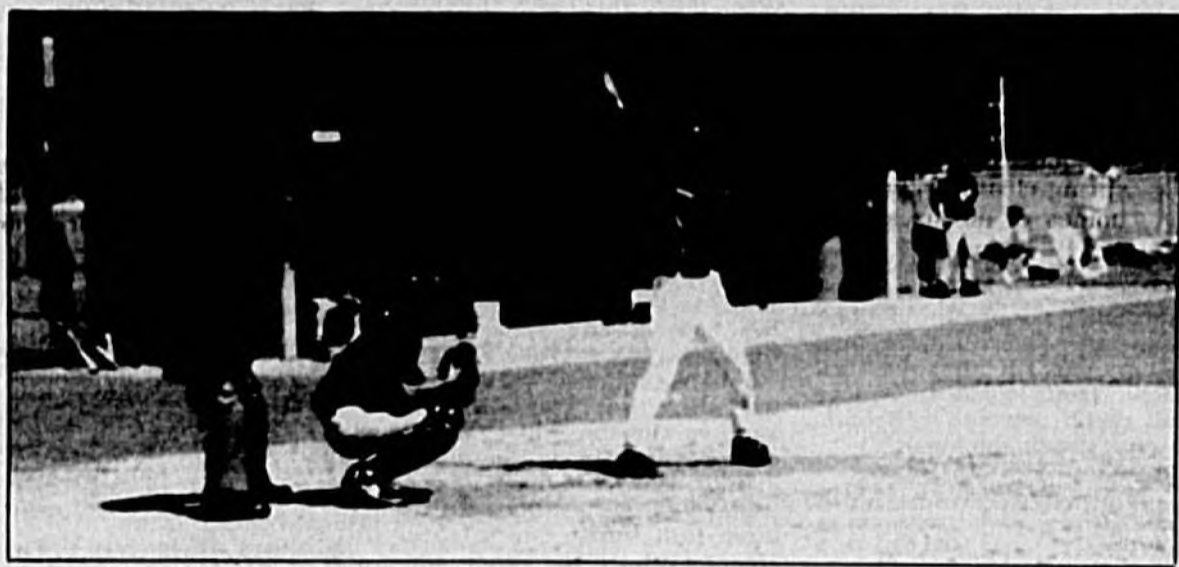

Gardening

Red Maple, also known as Swamp Maple, is one of four native maple trees that can be found in Florida. It is a tree of swamps, hammocks, and floodplain woodlands across the state. The red maple is the most interesting of them for its showy leaf colors in the fall and their beautiful red flower and fruit colors in early spring. The newly emerging leaves, red flowers and fruits signal the arrival of spring. They appear in December and January in Florida. Blooming is short lived, followed by masses of boomerang-like shaped fruits known as keys. These are formed by two seeds or samaras, each with a single wing. The seeds of the red maple are quite popular with squirrels and birds. The buds and fruits are a primary source of food for gray squirrels in late winter and early spring. Seedlings are a favorite food for deer.

Uses: Can be used as a Bonsai, wide tree lawns, medium-sized tree lawns, for buffer strips around parking lots or for median strip plantings in the highway, near a deck or patio, reclamation plant, screen, shade tree, or residential street tree.

The tree: The red maple is a fast growing tree, reaching a height of 60 to 75 feet. Leaves

slightly acidic sandy soils. They tolerate well-drained soils or those with extended periods of flooding. Irrigation is often needed to support street tree plantings in well-drained soils. The tree makes the best growth in wet places and has no other particular soil preference except that chlorosis or yellowing may develop on alkaline soils where it grows poorly.

Varieties: Due to graft-incompatibility problems which cause the tree to break apart, preference should be given to plants produced on their own roots. Choose varieties with regional adaptation. Armstrong, Autumn Flame, Bowhall, Gerling, October Glory, Red Sunset, Scanlon and Tilford, are some of the best known varieties.

Pests: Leaf stalk borer and petiole-borer cause the same type of injury. Both insects bore into the leaf stalk just below the leaf blade. The leaf stalk shrivels, turns black, and the leaf blade falls off. The leaf drop may appear heavy but serious injury to a healthy tree is rare. Gall mites stimulate the formation of growths or galls on the leaves. The galls are small but can be so numerous that individual leaves curl up. Galls are not serious and usually chemical controls are not

needed. If borers become a problem it is an indication that the tree is not growing well. Controlling borers involves keeping trees healthy. Chemical controls of existing infestations are more difficult.

Diseases: Anthracnose is a fungus problem in rainy seasons. The disease resembles, and may be confused with, a physiological problem called scorch. The disease causes light brown or tan areas on the leaves. Anthracnose can be controlled with fungicide sprays as the leaves open in the spring.

Scorch may occur during periods of high temperatures accompanied by wind. Trees with diseased or inadequate root systems or trees that do not get enough water, will also show scorching. Scorch symptoms are light brown or tan dead areas between leaf veins. Tar spot and other leaf spots may cause some concern among homeowners but rarely require control.

Nutrient deficiencies: Manganese deficiency is the most common nutrient deficiency found on maple trees. Symptoms of this problem are yellow or yellowish-green leaves with darker green veins. Plants exposed to week killers may also show similar symptoms.

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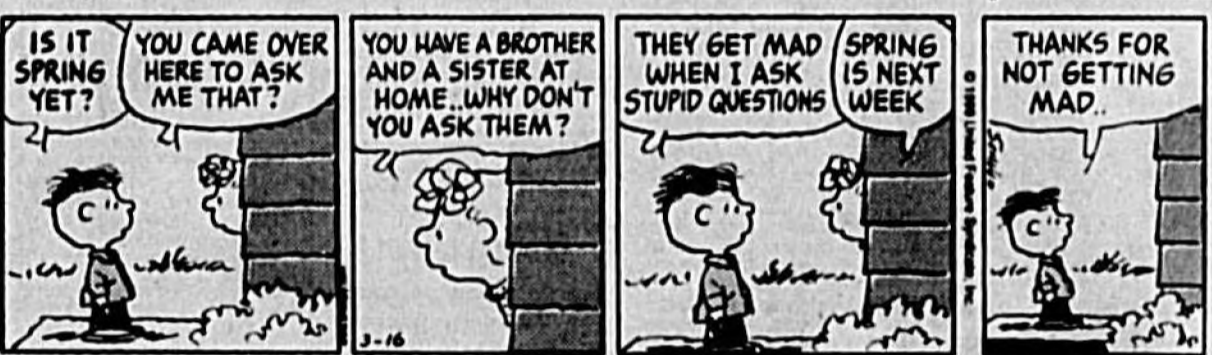
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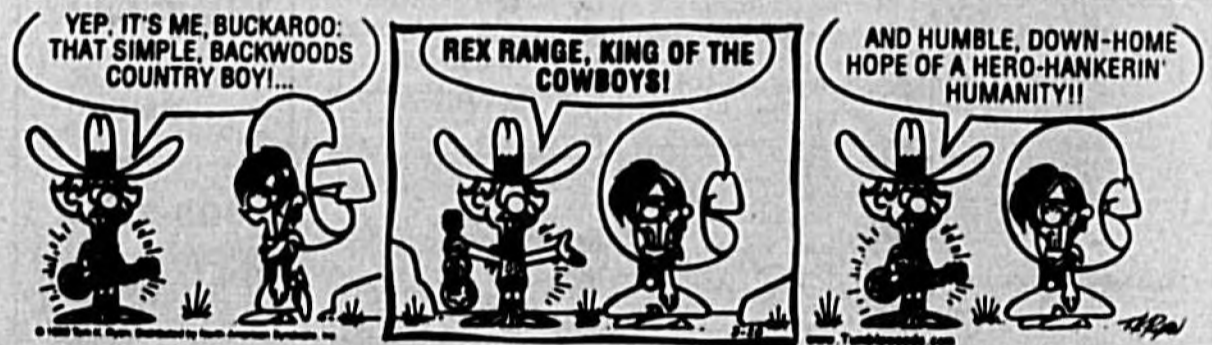

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WIN AT BRIDGE

A second trip around the block

By Phillip Alder

About what was Stanislavski writing when he penned these lines? "Our type of creativeness is the conception and birth of a new being — the person in the part. It is a natural act similar to the birth of a human being."

Today's deal looks remarkably like yesterday's, but it is a new being. Having reached six spades, how should South plan the play?

Yesterday, we discovered that it is correct to start with the club finesse. If it loses, declarer must play the trump suit for no losers — he should finesse the queen.

Here, though, the club finesse wins. Now South can afford one trump loser, but not two. There is a safety-play to

avoid two losers whenever it is possible. You should cash the ace. If an honor drops, you will know how to continue. Or, if you collect only the two missing low cards, you go into the dummy and lead a low spade toward your queen. Everything is under control. Unless very unlucky, you can even accommodate all four trumps in the East hand.

The wrong play is to take a first-round finesse. For example, suppose you play the queen and lose to the king. You get back into the dummy and lead another trump. East following low. What do you do? If West started with the doubleton king-jack, you must go up with the ace. But if West had the singleton king, you must finesse the 10. The odds slightly favor playing West for the king-jack. Yet it is still a guess that you didn't need to face.

ASK DR. GOTT

Meningioma can become serious

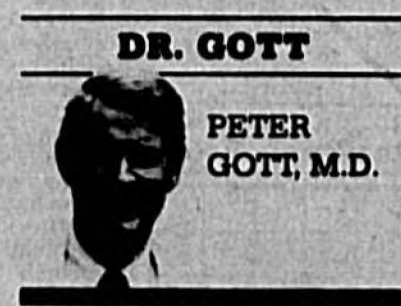
DEAR DR. GOTT: What is a meningioma? My mother was diagnosed with one but refuses to share with us what her doctor told her.

DEAR READER: A meningioma is a slow-growing tumor involving the membrane that covers the brain and spinal cord. As it enlarges, it causes compression of nerve tissue, leading to a host of unpleasant and serious consequences. Surgical removal is necessary.

DEAR DR. GOTT: A year ago, I was hospitalized for tests because of amaurosis. My doctor said that I had a small stroke. Since I'm still having visual difficulties, I wonder what the next step should be.

DEAR READER: The term "amaurosis" refers to visual disturbances, including black spots and loss of certain visual fields, from causes outside the eyes themselves. For example, the affliction can be related to diseases of the optic nerve or brain from alcoholism, diabetes or kidney diseases; it has also been reported to occur after emotional shock. Some forms may be inherited.

If your doctor diagnosed a stroke, you probably had amaurosis fugax:



Visual problems stemming from blood clots that were carried to the brain or the optic apparatus. In this instance, treatment with anticoagulant drugs is indicated.

You may need to have a magnetic imaging arteriogram, which enables doctors to assess whether you have arteriosclerotic plaque in the arteries of your neck. Significant arterial blockage can be the source of blood clots that can break off, be carried to the brain and cause stroke or blindness. With such a scenario, your doctor should refer you to a vascular surgeon who may be able to clean out the narrowed segments and prevent devastating consequences. If your blockages are more modest, however, you

would be a candidate for anticoagulation therapy.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I take a variety of herbal and mineral supplements daily. Many of the directions state that several pills need to be taken each day, spaced several hours apart. I don't want to spend my time taking pills all day long, nor do I want to spend the money that would cost, so I just take one a day. Am I getting any benefit this way or am I wasting my money?

DEAR READER: I don't know. What is your body telling you? In order to be effective, any medicine — prescription, herbal supplement or vitamin/mineral — must be taken in a therapeutic amount. One or two herbal remedies a day won't do any harm, but probably won't help you much either. I suggest that you ask your doctor about this. Perhaps he or she can hit on a compromise that will meet your needs in a convenient manner without destroying your budget.
