

Enriched At U. of F. 93 World War 2 Vets

GAINESVILLE, Dec. 1. (Special)—Ninety-three World War 2 veterans enrolled as students at the University of Florida gave an average of 18 months service to their country before separation from the Army and Navy. Analysis of personal cards revealed today.

Two of the men served more than two years each, both in the Army. Minimum time was one month, served by each of four persons in the Army, Navy, Naval Reserve and the Marines.

Most of the veterans, who are studying in the university under federal veterans' legislation and, in the case of 23, on their own

resources, are natives of Florida. Seventy-eight give Florida home addresses, Jacksonville for 10, and Tampa and Gainesville for six each.

All sections of the state are represented, the addresses showing 43 Florida cities and towns.

As to services, 50 served in the Army and 32 in branches of the Navy. One served 13 months in the Royal Canadian Air Force.

The university is not a strange place to 32 of these veterans who are former students and alumni of the University of Florida. Twenty-three withdrew from the general college to enter the services while six withdrew from the upper division as juniors and seniors to enter. Three had graduated before going to the

American Farmers Are Expected To Invest More Money In 6th War Loan

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 1. (Special)—A prediction that American farmers will invest more money in bonds during the Sixth War Loan than in any previous drive was made today by the War Finance Division of the U. S. Treasury.

Farmers bought \$1,250,000,000 worth of War Bonds during 1943, according to the Bureau of Agricultural Economics. In 1944 it is believed they can and should purchase a total of \$2,000,000,000, Ted R. Gamble, national director of the War Finance Division said.

Income at Peak

The Sixth War Loan starting November 20, comes at an ideal time for agriculture, he pointed out.

This is not only the time when farm income is at a seasonal peak, but 1944 marks three years of record breaking farm income, he said.

Based on information obtained from the 1943 Agricultural Section of the War Finance Division estimates the 1944 cash farm income at \$20,600,000,000, compared with \$20,000,000,000 in 1943.

Although net farm income, due to higher operating costs, may not be greater than in 1943, most farmers now have reduced their debts and consequently will have more money to put into War Bonds, the division reports.

In the twelve months ending January 1, 1944, farmers reduced real estate mortgages alone by \$650,000,000.

Wilson and Hills both earned letters with the 1943 Engineers. Holsinger is a Naval transfer from Duke.

A seventh member of the Tech squad, Halfback Jack Bill, is the son of J. T. Bill, Miami radio news editor and commentator. His home town is listed as Dallas, however, on the roster.

Bank Deposits Gain

After paying all operating costs and necessary family expenses, farmers will have left this year for investment and debt reduction over \$5,000,000,000 the Agricultural Section also estimates.

Because of the fact that new machinery is not obtainable, farm deposits are piling up in rural banks. Demand deposits held by farmers in these banks are estimated at \$4,500,000,000 and time deposits at \$2,000,000,000.

Since the new method of redeeming Series E Savings Bonds make them as liquid as a dollar bill, it is no longer necessary for the farmer to maintain a large bank account to meet possible emergencies, Mr. Gamble stated. Therefore, he believes, farmers will convert part of these deposits into War Bonds.

Tokyo Is Given Worst Blitz Of This War

Bombs Unloaded With Pinpoint Accuracy On Engine Plants Despite Jap Flak

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4. (AP)—American submarines have bagged six Japanese ships, including a light cruiser and destroyer. The others were medium cargo vessels, one tanker, four medium cargo transports, three small cargo ships. The Navy's announcement increased the total of Japanese ships sunk by submarines to 874.

Tokyo lay in fresh ruins and flames today after a sizeable force of Superfortresses, striking in mid-afternoon yesterday, made the most successful of four raids on Japan's capital city. They unloaded bombs with pinpoint accuracy for an hour and a half, despite an intense attack by anti-aircraft fire interceptors.

The results were reported as good. The prime objective was the Mitsubishi engine factory in the Makuhara district. Tokyo claimed 14 Superfortresses were destroyed and seven others probably.

Japanese spearheads, making their deepest penetration of China, advanced to within 74 miles from Kweiyang on the Burma Road after driving 25 miles into Kweihsing province. In the Philippines area a U.S. bomber sank four ships and damaged 13 other craft.

In Chungking the Chinese government underwent a further shakeup today when Foreign Minister T. Y. Seng's appointment as acting vice president of Yuan Province, succeeding his father-in-law H. H. Kung, the first time.

Sgt. Stevens flew 40 missions as a B-24 Liberator crew member on the China-Burma-India theater of operations, for which he was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross with oak leaf cluster and the Air Medal with oak leaf cluster. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. P. Stevens, 900 Elm Avenue.

Joseph Cameron Oil Man Declares Pioneer Rancher Oil Bearing Strata Died On Friday Exist In Florida

Eighty Year Old Resident Succumbs After Long Illness

Friday evening marked the passing of one of Seminole County's oldest pioneers, Joseph Cameron, 80, whose life was historically intertwined with that of Sanford and the large cattle and celery raising industries of this section. Mr. Cameron died at his home at 610 Oak Avenue after an illness of seven months.

Funeral services for Mr. Cameron were held Sunday afternoon at 4:30 o'clock at the First Baptist Church with the Rev. W. D. Brooks and the Rev. Dr. E. D. Brown officiating. Interment was in Lakeview Cemetery. Acting as pallbearers were Fred R. Wilson, W. A. Luff, S. F. Doudney, R. H. White, R. W. Deane and Judge J. H. Sharkey.

Mr. Cameron was born at Americus, Ga. July 11, 1864, and when but a lad of eight, came with his family by boat on the St. Johns River to the settlement of Ft. Reed, located south of the present site of the Sanford Naval Air Station, at a time when Sanford was known as Ft. Mellon.

For a time he helped his father, Henry S. Cameron, in the raising of cattle on the huge ranch that stretched from Celery Avenue to Lake Jessup. He then served for 10 years in the coal capacity of town marshal and tax collector of the new town of Sanford. Later he took up celery growing and moved back to the old home place on Miller Avenue, aided by Joe Whitner, his neighbor and partner in the celery business, which he operated across bounds by Erison Avenue, Celery Avenue, the St. Johns River and Lake Jessup.

He gave rights of way for and promoted the coming here of the Sanford and Everglades Railway. In 1913, with others he journeyed to Tallahassee to aid in the separation of Seminole from Orange County. (Continued on Page Four)

Greek Premier Says Radicals Plan Civil War

General Strike Follows Killing Of 21 By Police In Athens In Athens Sunday

ATHENS, Dec. 4. (AP)—General Katsaris, acting military governor of Athens, today gave the armed EAM formations 72 hours notice to quit the area.

ATHENS, Dec. 4. (AP)—Greek Premier George Papandreu charged today that left wing factions are deliberately fomenting civil war as a general strike left Athens without electricity, gas or communications. A two-day riot toll was 1 dead and 110 wounded.

The government is unable to communicate with the resistance due to the radio being out. Martial law has been declared in Athens and a strike was threatened earlier by the left wing EAM (National Liberation Front) after failed police firing on EAM demonstrators.

British Sherman tanks, scout cars and armored cars patrolled the streets of the Greek capital, and RAF and British air force and U.S. transport planes circled over the city this afternoon.

Large crowds assembled outside the U.S. Embassy in Athens. A. H. Hays, U.S. ambassador, was heard to say that the United States is not taking sides in the Greek civil war.

The crisis arose out of the EAM's refusal to accept the Papandreu plan to organize the demobilized and disarmed EAM fighters for a scheduled EAM Communist demonstration Sunday. The EAM refused to accept the plan, nevertheless called one for 11 A. M. and ordered a general strike on Monday.

By 10 A. M. the city had been paralyzed and the streets were filled with British armored cars. British troops were seen in the square.

The shooting began when British troops fired on a crowd of a few hundred, the crowd moved forward before the front of the unknown warrior with their banners unfurled. Although the Communist flag and blue and white tricolors carried by the demonstrators waved the stars and stripes union jack.

As the crowd moved forward, British police headquarters in the corner of the square shot at the demonstrators. The crowd and stream of the order to fire a spokesman said.

The policemen hesitated in pulling back the bolts of their guns and the crowd tried to fire over the heads of the demonstrators, women and children among them.

Senator Pepper Is Against Compulsory Military Training

Senator Claude Pepper introduced a bill after the war, according to a letter recently received from him by The Sanford Herald.

"I would not like to see us inaugurate compulsory military training after the war as a peace measure," he wrote. "Undoubtedly, our goal after the war is to set up the kind of an international organization which will eliminate the necessity of constantly preparing for war."

"That does not mean that we are not going to keep an adequate force to control our interests and our part to restrain the 'gangster' nations, but military training breeds militarism, and I am sure that we can obtain, through volunteers, a force adequate to our needs. I do, however, believe that military training is excellent discipline and physical education for those who take it."

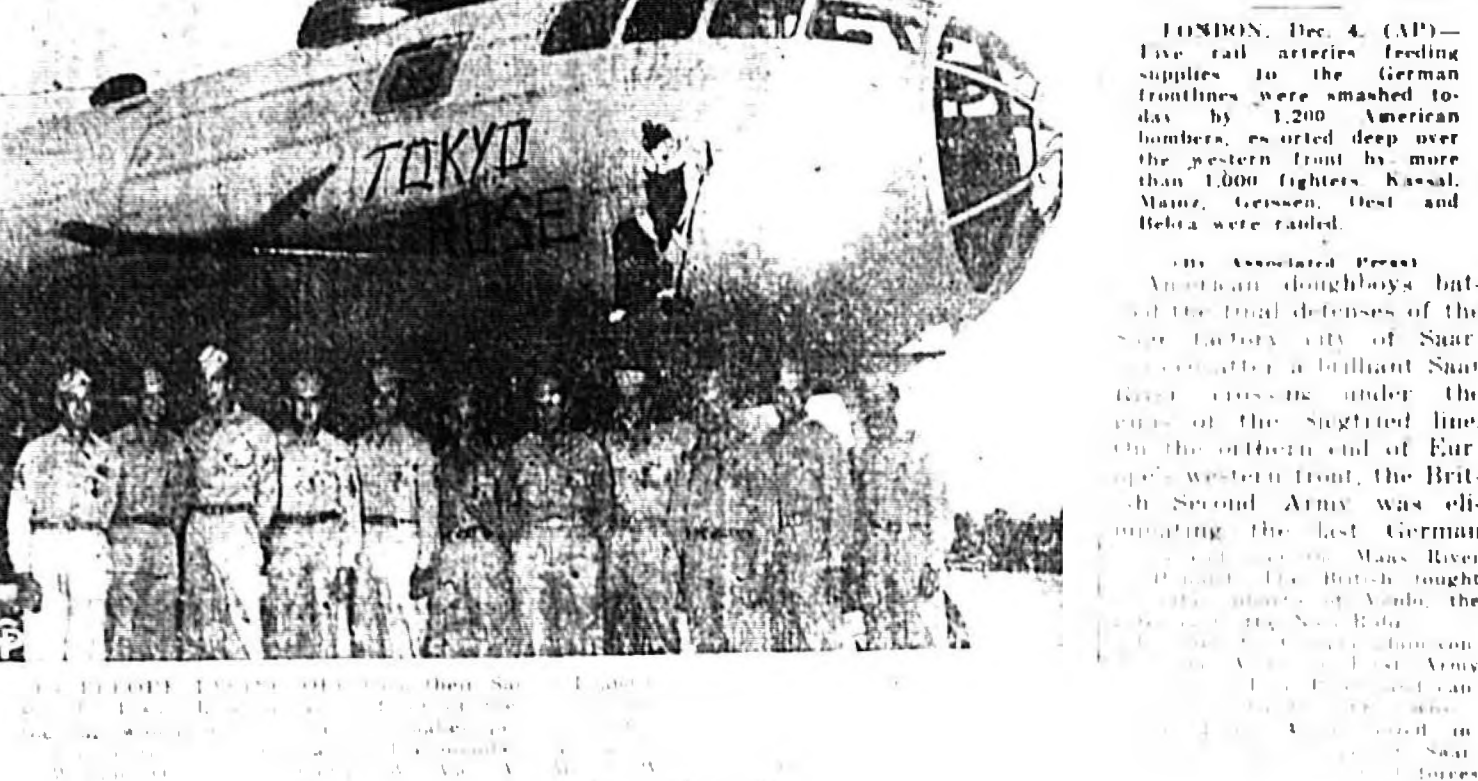
"It is our job to do what has never been done before; stop war—even preparation and training for war as we now think of it. While we shall always have boys who want to be policemen, we have our home police forces for them to serve on. I do not believe it is necessary to take a year or two of each boy's life and put him in the army to give him military training. Let's hope we do our job so well when we win the war that we can make out of it a peaceful world without constantly preparing for war," he concluded.

WHERE ARE THE CIGARETTES? NATION'S BUSINESS

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4. (AP)—Federal Trade Commission will investigate the cigarette shortage, chairman Wheeler (D-Mont) of the Senate Interstate Commerce Committee announced today.

Six government agencies in Washington can tell you all about the cigarette outlook—if you have the time. Commodity Credit Corporation manages the crop control program, which still restricts tobacco production to a fixed quota for each farm, places a "floor" under primary-market prices, and withdraws offerings from the market periodically to sustain this predetermined floor.

War Food Administration allocates the free crop to the various tobacco processors and manufacturers. War Production Board allocates the amount of machinery available to tobacco factories.

War Labor Board fixes wages in relation to competing industries in all controlled labor areas. Foreign Economic Administration fixes lend-lease tobacco allocations for overseas shipments.

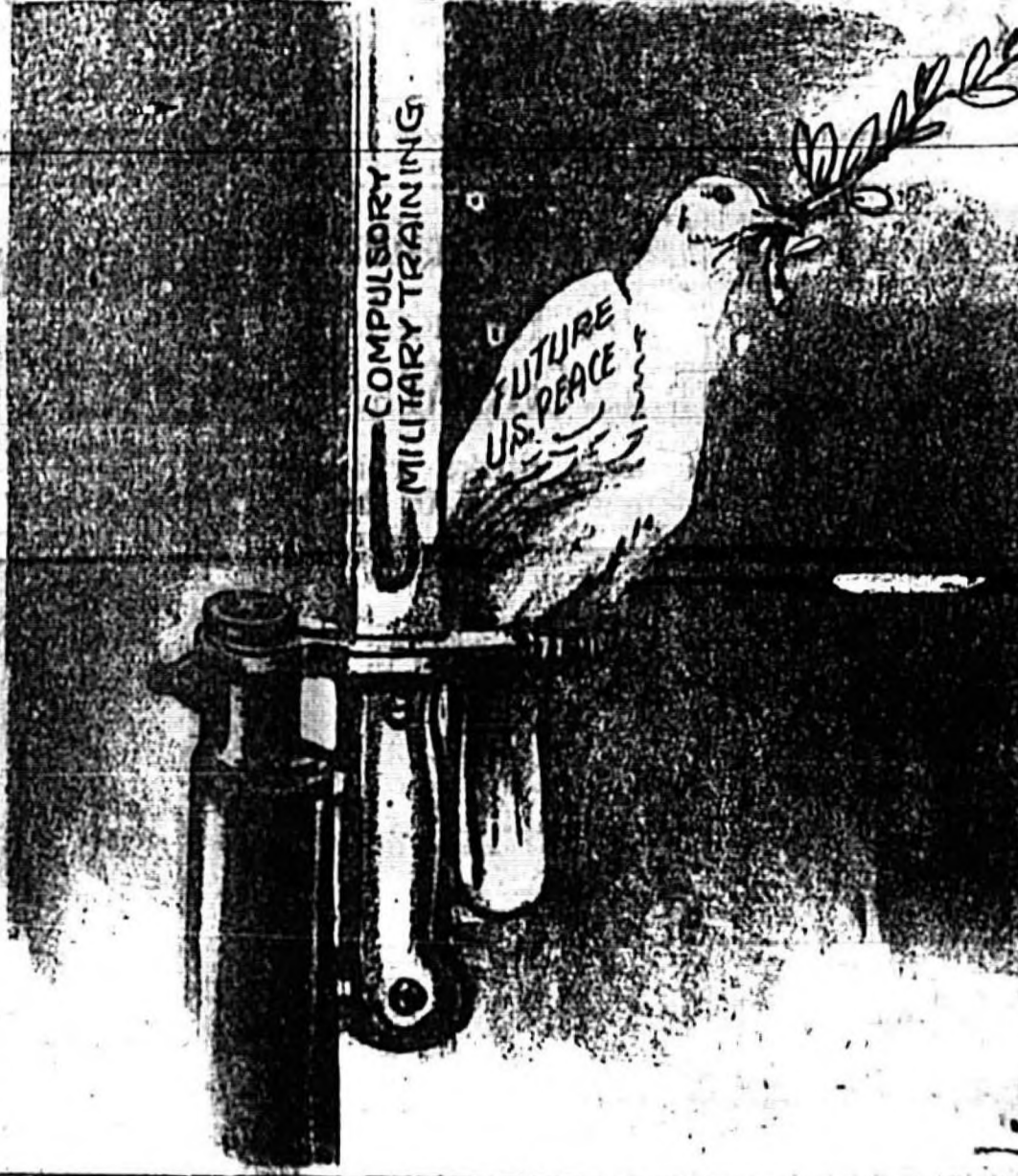
Meanwhile Office of Price Administration fixes the price of the cigarette, the cigar and pipe tobacco all the way from manufacturer to smoker.

When you have gone through all these scattered agencies of control, you will find that, although we could not get fully caught up in our tobacco needs before 1947, we limited unlimited production this year, the crop controls still are effective for the 1946 crop, and CGO still is planning to withdraw 400,000,000 pounds of stock from the market in the new year.

If this policy is adhered to, total tobacco available for all purposes in the new crop year will be barely 1,000,000,000 pounds, or approximately 500,000,000 pounds less than estimated consumption, including military and naval needs.

By the end of the 1946 crop year, next June, the accumulated U. S. tobacco deficiency according to the best available estimates will be about 200,000,000 pounds. Because of the growing need for tobacco supplies during 1947, in the face of increasing wartime demand, cigarette manufacturers are the nation's factory...

WHO PROVIDED EMPLOYMENT RAILWAY AGE

There is no subject on which there is greater need of popular education, says Railway Age, than that of employment, how much of it there was in the past, who provided it, how it was provided, and what can and should be done to provide enough of it in future.

There was great unemployment just before and when President Roosevelt came to power in 1933. Certain policies, including advances in wages and prices, reduction of hours of work, and huge government spending, which were adopted on the initiative of his administration, were intended and are claimed to have had the effect of remedying unemployment. Therefore, continuance and expansion of such policies are being advocated by New Deal politicians and labor leaders as essential to the prevention of great unemployment after the war.

All those who take this position either disregard or ignore the fact of the nation's economic history previous to 1933. There were no government policies, and especially no government spending, expressly to stimulate employment before 1933.

In the decade 1900-1909, inclusive, unemployment averaged 1,107,000, or 3.3 per cent of the normal labor force. In the seven years 1910-1916, inclusive, preceding our participation in World War I, unemployment averaged 1,250,000, or 3.2 per cent of the labor force.

The decade 1930-1939, inclusive, included three years under President Hoover and seven under President Roosevelt. Total government expenditures increased from an annual average of \$9,349 million in the decade ending with 1929 to an average of \$14,434 million in the decade ending with 1939, and in the seven years under Roosevelt averaged \$15,850 million. And yet unemployment in this decade averaged 8,468,000, or 16.6 per cent of the labor force, and in the seven years of it under Roosevelt averaged 9,030,000, or 17.3 per cent of the labor force.

Who provided employment averaging 97.2 per cent of the labor force in the thirty years ending with 1929, and by what means was it provided? Obviously, virtually all of it was provided by private enterprise by the usual methods of "private enterprise" for during those three decades private enterprise and employment were but slightly affected by government interference or spending. The day after the advent of the New Deal, however, caused large unemployment. New Deal policies were in effect throughout the years 1933-1940, inclusive, when government expenditures increased from \$11,463 million in 1933 to \$18,049 million in 1940. Why, then, did the nation so completely fail to recover that in the three years unemployment averaged 9,855,000? Let somebody who believes that private enterprise without the fetters and government spending of the New Deal cannot provide adequate employment in future explain why during the thirty-two consecutive years 1900-1931, inclusive, there was less unemployment in every year than there was in the New Deal in every year of the eight years 1933-1940, inclusive, excepting 1937.

Will the nation, in an effort to provide adequate employment after the present war, return to the policies under which, excepting for brief periods, adequate employment always was provided until the advent of the New Deal; or will it rely for "full employment" upon New Deal policies under which until the war there was no unemployment? Can employment be made "indispensable" by New Deal policies, or will it be in complete disregard of the entire economic history of the United States?

Price Administrator Chester Bowles says that cigarette rationing is not contemplated by OPA. Retail controls of the type currently applied to shoes, sugar and various foods are "completely impractical" for cigarettes, he points out.

In cigars, the quality deterioration has been less marked, but only because new products could be priced under OPA regulation on the basis of actual production costs. The result has been establishment of some 500 new cigar factories, all of them producing new products based on current costs.

Meanwhile, many of the old, established brands, forced to operate under 1942 ceilings, were largely driven out of production by steadily advancing costs for both tobacco and labor, plus increased federal excise taxes.

This situation was alleviated, in part, by an amendment to MFR 200, effective November 9, 1944, which allowed an increase of 15 cents on the pre-war 5-cent cigar.

Poorly adjusted price ceilings for all grades and types of tobacco products have been a second major factor contributing to the growing shortage in all parts of the country. On the whole, prices for these products have been frozen at the 1942 level; but raw tobacco prices have increased in many areas (except producing section markets) a special type or grade, as much as 50 per cent.

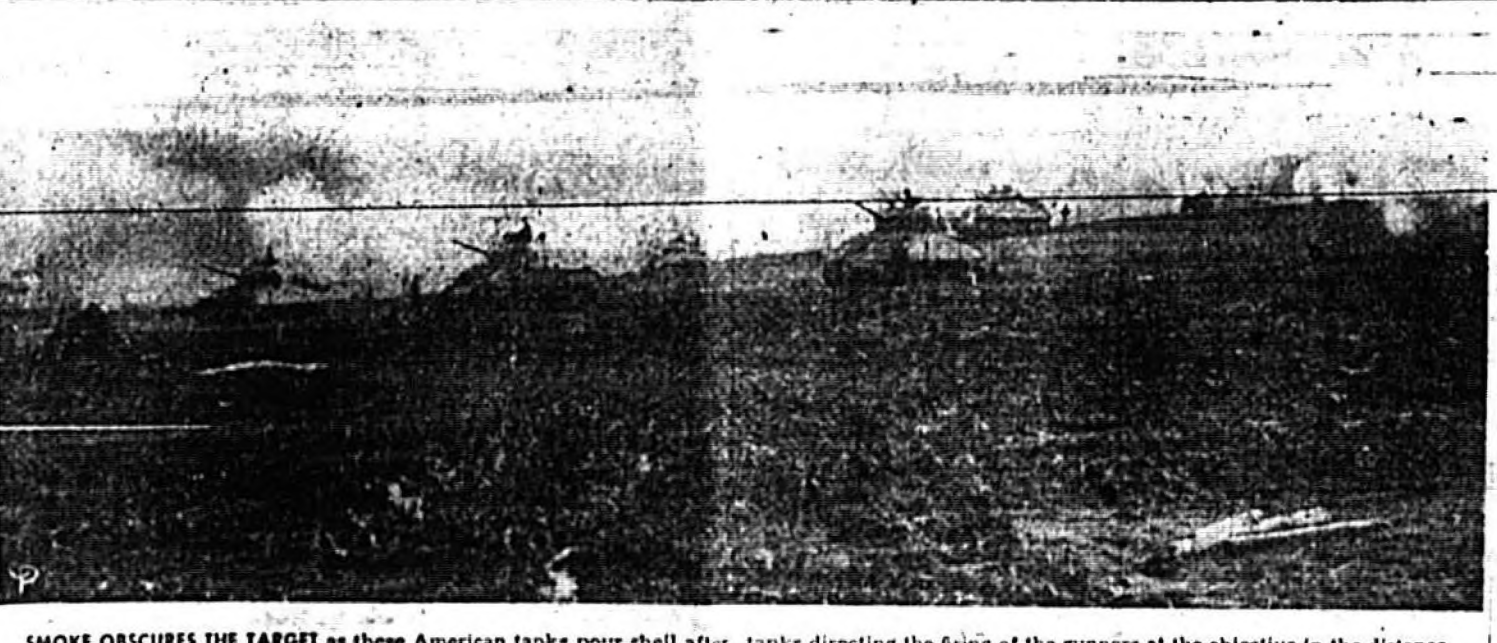
