## SITUATION IN PALESTINE IS STILL SERIOUS

**FLASHES ARE REPORTED BETWEEN BRITISH AND ARAB TRIBESMEN IN VARIOUS LOCALITIES**

**JERUSALEM, Sept. 6—(INS)** — The situation throughout Palestine remained grave today, with clashes being reported between British troops and nomadic Arab bands in various localities.

Heavy losses have been suffered by both sides in the fighting between British forces and a band of Palestine Arabs at Gaza, 90 miles south west of Jerusalem. The fighting is continuing. Additional British troops have been rushed to the spot to stem the advancing hordes which are being reinforced by tribesmen from the Sinai Peninsula.

The Gaza engagement threatens to develop into the worst battle of the entire conflict. According to reports the fighting has assumed a genuine warlike tone, with air planes and armored cars aiding the British forces.

Outbreaks were also reported in the vicinity of Beersheba where British detachments are engaged with mounted Arab tribesmen. Fourteen Arabs were reported killed when the British repulsed an attack at Beersheba. At Nabi, five Arab tribesmen were killed and 20 wounded by British forces.

Airplane squadrons are active over the plains between Nabi and Beersheba, 10 miles north of here. The casualties are probably much heavier than the official reports indicate.

British cavalry also inflicted heavy casualties upon Arab forces attacking Beersheba although fierce fighting took place, short distance to the east, were reported unconfirmed, with the recurrence of active fighting.

The losses sustained by British forces in Gaza are reported to be heavy, since the military is in full control of the situation in hand.

**CLEMENCEAU SHOWS HUMAN DISPOSITION IN AIDING SICK GIRL**

**SAINT VINCENT-SUR-JARD, France, Sept. 6—(INS)** — French Premier Georges Clemenceau, battling in politics for his gains in the adoption of "The Tigris," defied his critics with gentle words when he gave the services of his personal physician to a poor, sick peasant girl.

Clemenceau himself is in poor health, but this is not the result of any organic illness but rather from old age and continuous exertion in the face of adverse fortune and "dark things" away.

"The Tigris" has been taking a paternal interest in the peasant girl—10-year-old Martine Reault—ever since he learned of her illness and the inability of her family to give her proper medical care. Almost every day he sent his servant nine miles to the village of Oignies, where the girl's parents live to learn her condition.

Finally Clemenceau decided to call on Paris Dr. Desjardins, his own doctor and the physician who treated Marshal Foch. Together they went to the girl's bedside. She was lying in a bed covered with coarse bed clothing and was weak and wasting away.

Dr. Desjardins made a diagnosis of appendicitis. He said that incision and drainage were needed to carry out this in time.

**FISHING WITH GILL NETS IS PROHIBITED**

Fishing with gill nets is prohibited under state laws, according to word received today by A. J. Guenther, deputy game warden, from C. C. Woodward, state game commissioner, in Tallahassee. Only the regular sealing net with a four inch mesh is permissible, Mr. Guenther added.

Sound a warning to all fishermen, Mr. Guenther expressed the hope that they would comply with the law in all of its provisions. He said that after a reasonable time had elapsed he would begin making arrests for this violation.

### "Shadow Fiend" Is Refused Clemency

**ATLANTA, Sept. 6—(INS)** — Governor L. G. Hardman today refused clemency for Alvin K. Karpis, "shadow fiend," accused of attacking a score of Atlanta women in a residential section here. Karpis was saved from the electric chair temporarily today by a habeas corpus writ granted at Madison, Ga., but was to have been executed today.
