# Relief supplies pour in By Llane Edixon

SANFORD - Local organizations are now collecting goods in Sanford for Hurricane Katrina victims, including what officials called an overwhelming response for law enforcement officers in Mississippi.

During the first week of the aftermath



of the hurricane most organizations were collecting only monetary donations, and still are,

because they do not have the means to transport the goods to the Gulf States. Now, organizations such as the United Methodist Committee on Relief, are asking citizens to donate needed supplies.

Saturday, Sept. 10, from 8:30 a.m. to 12 p.m., the United Methodist Women in the Hands and Feet of Christ Taskforce will be collecting supplies for kits, putting the kits together, and collecting monetary donations to cover shipping costs of the kits. The cost to ship per kit is \$2. Each kit costs about \$12 to put together.

Each kit should contain the following: Terry cloth hand towel, wash cloth, full sized wrapped bar of bath soap, nail clippers or metal nail file, large comb pocket-sized), individually (not wrapped toothbrush, full sized toothpaste, and six Band-Aids.

# **NAACP** awaits answers in teen's death

SANFORD — Officials with the NAACP wonder why a six-week investigation into the shooting death of a black teenager by two white security guards has not been completed. The Seminole County Branch of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People asked State Attorney Norm Wolfinger on Aug. 25 to bring charges against two security guards who shot and killed Travares McGill July 16. Wolfinger said he cannot make any decision on charging two security guards in the shooting because he has not received the report from investigators still working on the case.

## Paw Park Place more than just washing Chihuahuas

SANFORD - An innovative park for dogs prompted the idea of opening a selfservice dog wash across the street that works similarly to one for a car. Anyone who visits Paw Park Place, however, will see much more than a place to clean the family pet.

Mike Knipfer was a major player in getting the city of Sanford to create the Paw Park on Fourth Street and State Road 17-92. When he saw some land for sale across the street, he saw the opportunity for a dog-friendly, fun place. After visiting dog washes in several states, he envisioned something much more unique.

"There are other dog washes but none as elaborate as this," said Christine Winkelman, general manager. She also owns two dogs.

The business has four dog washes, each with a waist-high bathtub with doghouse decorations.

Each wash station comes equipped with shampoo and warm water. The purchase of a bath includes the use of dryers at the dog wash stations, brush, and towels. Long-haired dogs can be taken into a dry cleaning room if necessary at no extra charge.

According to Winkelman, the public reception of Paw Park Place has been very positive. "We already have a lot of regulars that

come every weekend and when their dogs come in, they already know to jump into the tub," Winkelman said. "It has turned into a family outing with the kids



Many packs recycle their old uniforms. Nelson did say he was looking for uniforms from the last few years, not antique uniforms that some people collect.


"Even if it has patches on it, that's OK, we'll take them off and use them," Nelson said. If they collect too many, other packs need uniforms as well, he added.



## Holocaust Memorial will honor civil rights heroes

MAITLAND The Holocaust Memorial Resource and Education Center of Florida, Inc. in Maltland, is asking individuals and organizations in Central Florida for their help in creating a special community-wide project.

reports.

Sanford Police spokeswoman Cleo Cohen confirmed the case is still under investigation, but would not say when it would wrap up. A call to the Florida Department of Law Enforcement was not returned.

The two guards — Bryan P. Ansley, 28, and William P. Swofford, 26 - approached the car driven by McGill. McGill reportedly backed up and hit one of his exiting passengers breaking the passenger's leg. According to police, he drove toward the security guards who opened fire. Two bullets hit McGill.

"We want to see justice pre-vail," said Clayton, president of the Seminole County chapter of the NAACP. "We want to let the process run."

He requested a meeting with Wolfinger, but one has

#### not been scheduled. When asked about why McGill was at the Country Lakes Apartments at 3:10 in the morning, Clayton said that is irrelevant to the case.

"It would have been one thing if (McGill) was committing a crime, but the only thing he was doing was drop-ping off the kid," Clayton said. He said the idea that McGill drove straight toward the two guards may not be accurate from what he understands.

Clayton was asked what charges the guards ought to face.

"At this point we're leav-ing it up to the state attorney," Clayton said. "The minimum charge would be manslaughter, but we'll leave that up to the state attorney."

NAACP has asked for a judicial inquiry as well. Wolfinger said he was not clear on what that meant, but Clayton wants a judge to look at the facts of the case.

According to police reports, both Swofford and Ansley have been arrested in the past. Ansley was arrested in May 2004 and charged with battery when his girlfriend said he hit her in the face.

Paula Maria Cabrales said she and Ansley had been out drinking. She wanted him to pull over so she could vomit, but he would not. She said Ansley struck her several times during the ensuing argument.

Swofford was charged with throwing a deadly missile into an unoccupied building, attempted burglary and criminal mischief in July 1998. According to an arrest report,

witnesses said Swofford threw a trailer hitch through the window of a discount auto store in Sanford to see how long it would take for the police to arrive. Swofford said the witness was lying, but he could not recall where he had been on the morning in question.

According to Clayton, the guards appeared to be dressed like police officers when they worked as security guards at the apartment complex.

Sheriff's Office was looking for Johnson after he failed to appear for a court date for burglary, grand theft and weapons possession by a convicted felon.

Near New Smyrna Beach, off of Interstate 4, Johnson realized he was being followed. He reportedly flashed a handgun to officers when

deputies tried to stop him by boxing him in. As Johnson drove off,

Volusia County deputies, who also helped in the pursuit, tried to deploy stop sticks. Johnson was able to avoid the stop sticks, and then drove into the community of Lake Helen.

Johnson wrecked into a vehicle in Lake Helen, and the occupants of the other vehicle were evacuated from the scene, so law enforcement could surround Johnson's vehicle.

SWAT was called in and when they entered the vehicle, the suspect, Johnson, was discovered dead, from what appeared to be a self-inflicted gunshot wound.

An autopsy will be done to establish the official cause of death.

Mississippi rescue tests FWC officers' ingenuity

Ingenuity was the challenge Thursday during a rescue by Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) officers and members of the Mississippi Marine Patrol and the Florida National Guard.

According to FWC Officer Andy Maltais from the Jacksonville Field Office, the rescue involved a 500-pound storm victim, a National Guard "deuce-and-a-half" (a 2.5-ton truck) and lots of manpower.

"We began our water pairol with the Mississippi Marine Patrol at about 9 a.m., going through bayous and choked-off waterways. We saw a flare, but because of the conditions, we couldn't reach the people who had fired it off," Maltais said.

"There was a buildozer clearing the road in the area and we managed to get up to the location by sighting smoke from a small fire. When we got there, we found two men on an inshore shrimp boat back up in a small canal," he said.

Officers found the boat in Bratts Bayou off the Jordan **River near Henderson Point.** This bayou is between Gulfport, Miss., and Bay St. Louis, La.

Other FWC officers on the scene were Officers Tony Wright, Craig Maguire, Brad **Givens and Investigator Paul** Graham, all from the Jacksonville Field Office.

"George Reed was in the boat. He weighed about 500 pounds and was not ambulatory. He was in bad shape. He was conscious and extremely glad to see us," Maltais said "The big problem we faced was how to get him to a med-ical facility."

Emergency services had reached the area but were unable to transport Reed.

"Our helicopter flew over but also was unable to rescue the man," Maltais said. "We ended up getting a deuce-and-a-half from the Florida National Guard back there. We conand some four-by-four lumber. We maneuvered Mr. Reed onto the litter and got lum into the truck. He was then transported to a hospital."

Maltals said a younger man who was with Reed (officers did not get his name), was the one who had fired off the flare.

"These two men had banded together, found this shrimp boat and rode out the storm," Maltais said. "The younger man had lost his wife and son and wanted help trying to locate them. We walked through the destroyed subdivision, looking for other sur-vivors. We didn't find his family, but we did locate the owner of the shrimp boat who was amazed his boat and these two men had made it through the storm."

According to Maltals, the devastation of the area is unbelievable.

We were in a subdivision of about 100 houses. There was nothing left. Three-story houses have been reduced to sticks," he said. "The storm surge here must have been tremendous. You can see where the bark was blasted off the trees from the surge. I can't begin to describe the scene or the smell. There are carcasses of dead fish and other animals littening the area. There's nothing left." Maltais told of another sur-

vival story. "There was a group of four Vietnamese shrimpers who wanted to save their boat and decided to

ride out the storm in it. It got so bad that they ended up climbing a 90-foot pine tree and lashing themselves at about 60 feet. They managed to ride out the storm," Maitais said. "I was amazed. I saw the rope burns on their bodies and then saw the tree .....It looked like an apple core. If the wind had been much more fierce, they wouldn't have made it." Maltais said the shrimp boat made it through the storm also. Living conditions for FWC's

nel in the rescue operation have been described as "primitive.

Maltais laughed, saying, "That's putting it in a good light. We're living out of our trucks. However, our morale is great. In fact, my squad has just volunteered to stay here for another week."

The squad consists of Lt. Gary Klein, officers Harold Barry, Givens, Maltais, Wright, Maguire and Graham. Capt. John Burton, from the Crystal River Field Office, is leading the detail.

"I worked the detail in Pensacola after Hurricane Ivan last year. But this is even worse," Maltais said. "I'm just glad to be here to be able to help out."



After compiling last week's column regarding boxing, 1 looked up the various weight divisions. I was sur-prised at how many there are. Listing them from the heaviest on down, we have the following, with the maxi-mum weight listed in parenthesis. These could be different as the weight restrictions are different depending on which country sponsors the event. Actually, there are three official boxing organi-zations, the World Boxing Association (WBA), the World Boxing Council (WBC) and the International Boxing Federation (IBF) also known as the U.S. Boxing Association from 1983 to 1984).

Only boxers associated with one of these organizations is declared as a "champion". There are other organizations, but not officially sanctioned on a world-wide basis.

Now, for a look at the classes and weights: Heavyweight (no weight limit); Cruiserweight (182

pounds); Light Heavyweight (175 pounds); Super Middleweight (168 pounds); World Middleweight (158 pounds); Super Welterweight (154 pounds); World Welterweight (145 pounds); Super Lightweight (140 pounds); World Lightweight (133-135 pounds); Super Featherweight (130 pounds); World Featherweight (126 pounds); Super Bantamweight (122 pounds); World Bantamweight (118 pounds); Super Flyweight (115 pounds); World Flyweight (112 pounds); Light Flyweight (108 pounds); and Minimumweight (105 pounds).

over 50 Heavyweight Champions we have had since 1885, only seven were not listed as Nationality USA. But in looking at the Minimumweight class, also known as "strawweight", not a single boxer was from the USA. Most all of them were from Far Eastern nations such as Japan, Thailand, and Korea.

To secure a permit, applicants must submit payment for an alligator trapping license and two alligator-hide validation tags, or provide proof of a valid alligator trapping license (must be valid through Oct. 8) plus pay the fee for two hide validation tags. No other hunting licenses are required.

The cost for a resident alligator trapping license and hide validation tags is \$272, and nonresidents pay \$1,022. For each alligator taken, the hunter must complete and send in an alligator harvest report form to the FWC. Data gathered from these forms enable FWC biologists to monitor population trends and impacts on the annual harvest.

A resident or nonresident alligator trapping agent license also is available to consumers for \$52. This license allows the holder to assist a trapper in taking alligators but only in the pres-ence of the permitted trapper. All persons seek-ing a harvest permit must be at least 18 years old by Sept. 1, and only one harvest permit per person will be issued.


