Weed and Seed

VOLUSIA COUNTY - U.S. Senator Bob Graham has announced the Department of Justice's award of its latest grant under Operation Weed and Seed. The money, \$175,000 is to be given to Volusia County. The program is to prevent, control, and reduce violent crime, drug abuse and gang activity in targeted neighborhoods.

The "weeding" is done by law enforcement and prosecutors who weed out criminals involved in violent crimes and drug abuse. The "seeding" brings prevention, intervention, treatment and neighborhood revitalization.

Seven nabbed in Winter Springs drug raid

WINTER SPRINGS - Seven persons were arrested as the result of a drug raid Thursday night at a Winter Springs home. Only one person was inside the residence at the time of the raid, but officers had only to wait for others to pull into the driveway to make additional arrests.

Officers from the Seminole County CCIB (City/County Investigative Bureau) conducted the search warrant at 7:15 p.m., at 442 Alderwood Court in Winter Springs. Deputies said a search of the home uncovered 400 grams of pot, packaged and ready for selling, hidden in a closet.

As officers conducted the search, two U-Haul trucks reportedly pulled up, and officers

searched both of the vehicles, uncovering 600 marijuana plants and a variety of growing supplies. One of the trucks is also said to have contained powder cocaine, a small amount of cannabis and prescription pills.

As officers continued to search the two rental trucks, another vehicle pulled up, occupied by four men. The searching for evidence then

expanded to the car, in which officers said they found a 20 pound ball of cannabis concealed in gift wrapping paper.

Each of the seven men was subsequently placed under arrest for various charges including cultivation of cannabis, possession of cannabis with intent to distribute, possession of cocaine, and others.

The seven were identified as

Michael McKova, 38, the resident of the home; Greg Anthony Ferstman, 27, and Paul Juan Madsen, 34, the drivers of the U-Haul trucks; and the four men in the car, Manuel Acevedo, 28, Jose Manuel Martinez, 30, Darren Hunter Doney, 29, and Christopher Spreight Wrenn, 24. No addresses were immediately made available by the sheriff's office.

Construction worker injured in 30-foot fall

LAKE MARY - A man working on a new gymnasium plummeted 30 feet from scaffolding Thursday afternoon at the Seminole Family YMCA in Lake Mary. The man identified as 38-year old Melvin Walker is currently in stable condition at the Sanford branch of Orlando Regional Medical Center.

Walker is presently in the intensive Care Unit with lacerations, broken ribs, a broken shoulder and bruised lungs, according to hospital officials. No surgery was required. Sarah Johnson, spokeswoman for YMCA, said that Walker is a construction worker for a subcontractor to Emmett Sapp, a general contractor out of

Fruitland Park. The accident occurred around 11:15 a.m. when Walker fell from the platform he had been working on. He had lost his footing on an unsupported piece of sheet metal. Walker broke his fall while going down. Jacobson said that he had fallen on his side. CPR was performed on site, and he was then airlifted to ORMC.

The Seminole Family YMCA, located at 665 Longwood-Lake Mary Road, is going through a million dollar renovation. Walker was working on the brand new gym that the YMCA is building when the accident occurred. The Occupational Safety and Health Administration is conducting an investigation into the accident.

Tears in the Peanut Gallery for Buffalo Bob

There's no joy today in Doodyville - "Buffalo Bob" has been taken away, and a million or more kids are crying from the Peanut Gallery.

"Buffalo Bob" Smith, the good and gracious host of the early television favorite, *The Howdy Doody Show*, died Thursday in North Carolina. He was 80-years-old but surely young at heart. Smith marveled in his later years that he was fortunate enough to live two lives and to be able to share them with so many people.

"I've been twice blessed and more," he said during a visit to the Orlando area in 1995. He was touring the country at the time - meeting and entertaining the grandchildren of children he once thrilled.

Years after he was one of television's pioneers with his puppets on *The Howdy Doody Show*, Smith was asked by some students at the University of Pennsylvania to bring Howdy to the school and do a show.

"I thought they were putting me on," Smith said. Obviously they weren't. And Smith found that the second time around with Howdy was as good as the first. America needed to laugh and sing - yes, it was once again *"Howdy Doody Time."*

In 1947, Smith went on TV with freckled-faced Howdy and his friends - Clarabell the clown, Princess Summerfall Wintersprings, Dilly Dally, Flintheart T. Bluster, and Flubdub. Clarabell and the princess were real people, the others puppets. One of those who played Clarabell was Bob Keeshan, later to become TV's Captain Kangaroo.

The baby boom generation grew up with the show, proudly singing along the Howdy Doody

song after Smith, the cowboy suited host, would shout out to the studio's Peanut Gallery, "What time is it?"

"It's Howdy Doody time, it's Howdy Doody Time...let's give a rousing cheer, 'Cause Howdy Doody's here."

"You don't forget it, Patricia Gehri of Longwood said, "Years later you remember the characters and the show. It was part of growing up."

Columnist Bob Greene wrote that the *Howdy Doody Show* "may have been the most important cultural landmark for my generation."

The show ran from 1947 to 1960 - more than 2,500 productions. "No one knows how hard we worked," Smith said when he visited the Orlando area for an appearance at a nostalgia and toys show. He signed autographs and chatted with hundreds of Doody kids now in their 50's.

Smith brought Howdy to the show but it was not the original, he said. The original is at the Smithsonian Institute, another was at his home. "I've been traveling with Double and Triple Doody," he said. He once lived in Buffalo and bor-

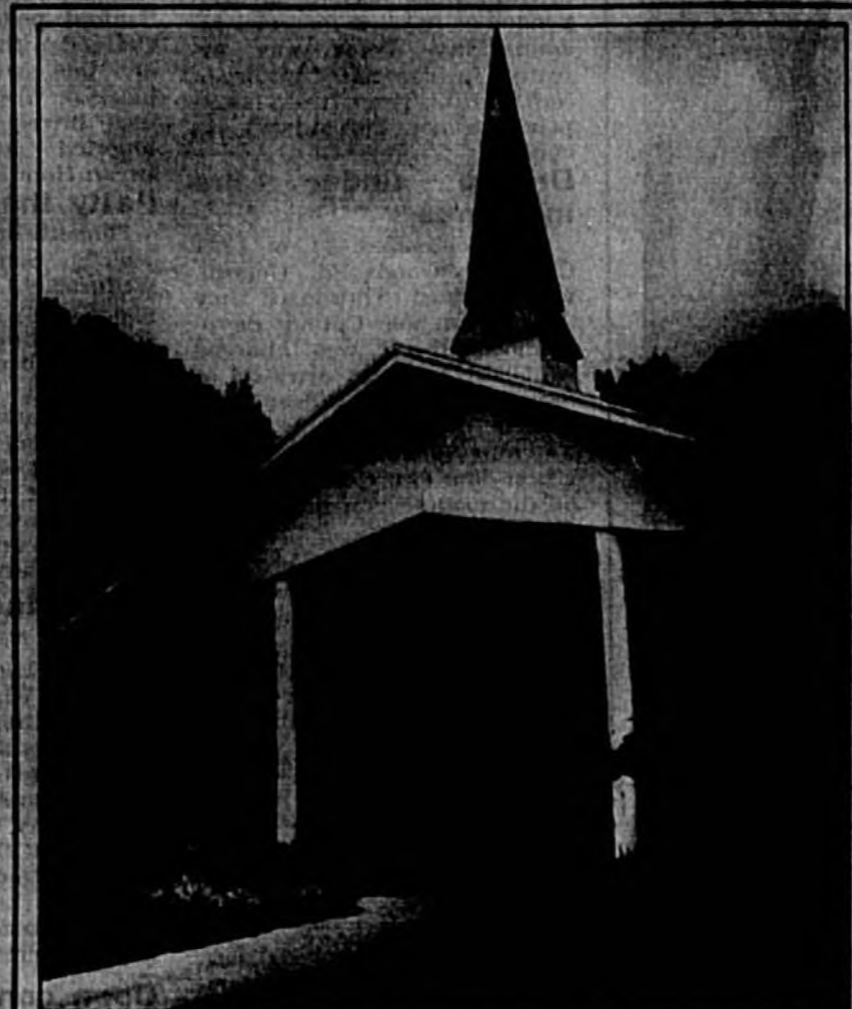

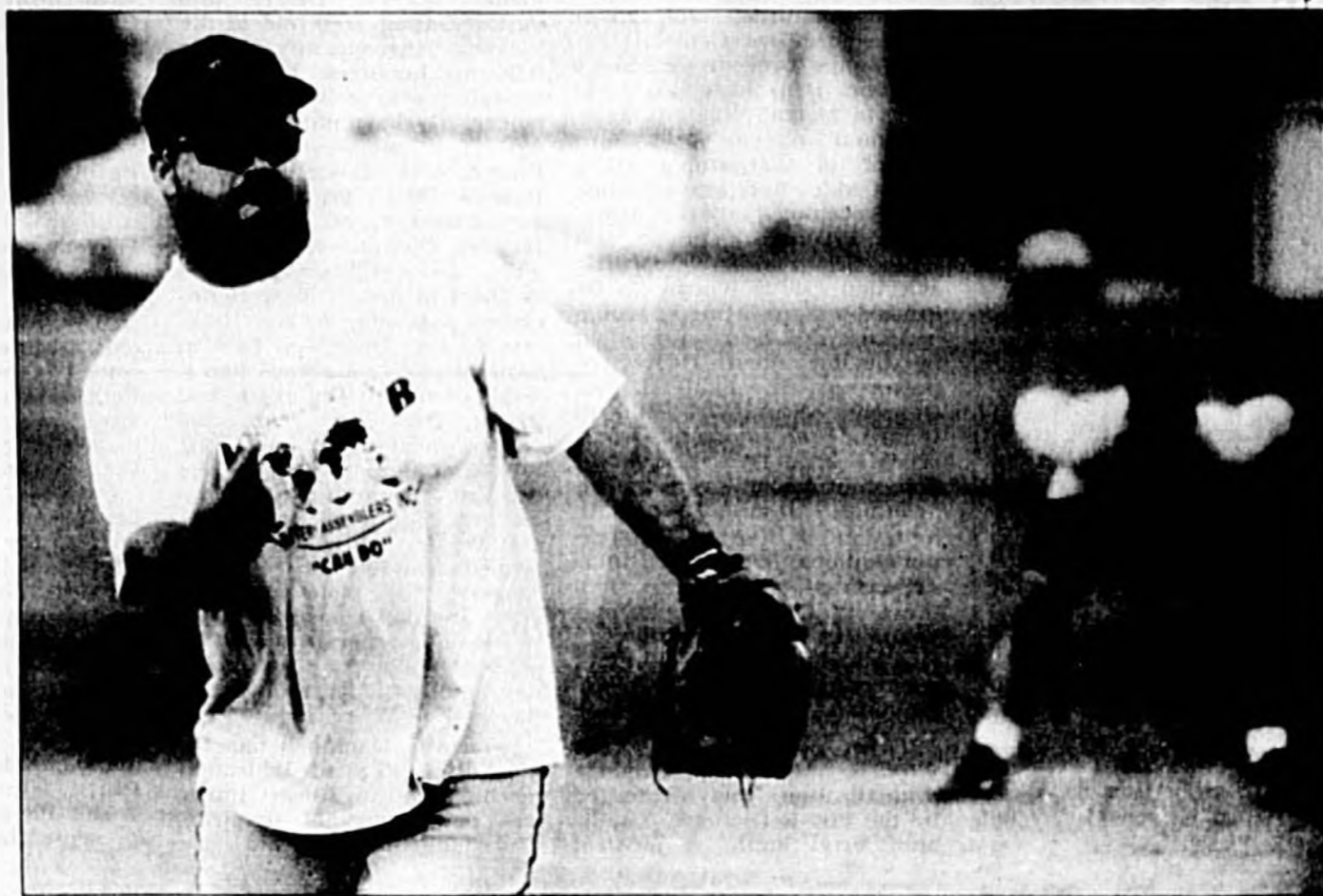
He had a pretty good day. His batting wasn't up to his full potential, but Rock did make one heck of a catch at the wall to save a homer.

Painful ear-popping in planes

DEAR DR. GOTT: When I travel by air, my ears bother me tremendously. For several days thereafter, my ears are painful and I cannot hear well. I've tried drinking extra fluids and using chewing gum. Is there any help for me?

DEAR READER: When we ascend in an airplane, we pass from near sea level to an area where the external air pressure is much reduced, even in a pressurized cabin. During ascent, air leaves the middle ear chamber through vents called the Eustachian tubes. This enables the pressure to equalize between the middle ear and the cabin. Usually, this causes no problem. Our ears pop and that's it.

On the descent, however, the situation is reversed. As atmospheric pressure builds, the air presses against the ear drums and the Eustachian tubes. As it enters the middle ear chambers, our ears pop and we again equalize the pressure.

The hitch is that it's much more difficult for the air to enter the middle ear than it is for the pressure to escape. If, for example, a traveler has allergies, congestion or a cold, the Eustachian tubes may be swollen shut and air cannot enter them. This leads to the well-known symptoms of pain and hearing loss that will, however, slowly dissipate once we have been on the ground for several days.

Thus, the easiest way to prevent this unpleasant condition, called "baro-otitis," is to facilitate the passage of air through the Eustachian tubes.

Yawning and swallowing hard — and frequently — will often solve the problem. So you need to have water or juice in hand when you descend. Or, you may have to anticipate the problem by using antihistamines or nasal sprays before flying. Finally, the Valsalva maneuver may help. Close your mouth, pinch your nose and strain. This causes a buildup of pressure in your middle ears that may open the Eustachian tubes and allow equalization to take place.

Remember that if you wait too long, pressure equalization becomes far more difficult. Start your maneuvers as soon as the aircraft begins to lose altitude and keep at the process every few seconds if your ears continue to feel blocked.

Should these suggestions fail to solve your problem, obtain an exam by an otolaryngologist.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I have been diagnosed with a low potassium level, for which I have been prescribed a mineral supplement. However, my doctor won't tell me why this happened. Is age a factor? What have I done to cause it? My only medicines are calcium, vitamins, garlic, aspirin and Maxzide.

take it regularly may have to take potassium supplements as well.

Age by itself is not a cause of potassium deficiency, nor is it the result of any wrongdoing on your part — assuming, of course, that you are not on a dangerous diet that is potassium-free (no fruit or fresh vegetables).

WIN AT BRIDGE

The sure line is best

By Phillip Alder

Here is another deal from the European Mixed Championships. This is from the team event, and surprisingly the declarer went down in three trump although there was a guaranteed line of play. Can you spot it? West leads the club seven, playing fourth highest from good suits and second highest from bad.

In North America, after South opens one diamond instead of one heart, perhaps the final contract would be in diamonds. As the cards lie, six diamonds would make. And even if three no-trump were reached, West might well lead a heart, letting the contract get home. Here, though, when South ruid one no-trump to show a minimum balanced hand, North wasn't thinking about a diamond slam. He settled for

the unscientific three no-trump.

After winning with her club ace, declarer played out three rounds of spades. This gave East the opportunity to switch to the heart three. West took declarer's 10 with his king, returned the heart five to his partner's queen, and another heart gave the defenders five tricks: one spade and four hearts.

South's heart holding is a guaranteed stopper only if West attacks the suit. So, declarer should win with the club ace, cash the spade ace, play a club to the dummy, and run the spade jack.

Here, the finesse wins and South has nine tricks: three spades, one diamond and five clubs. But suppose the finesse loses. As the defenders cannot cash four heart tricks, West does best to switch to a diamond. However, South rises with dummy's ace, runs the clubs, discarding his blocking spade king, and finishes the spades, again collecting nine tricks.
