Oviedo High School graduate Jason Watts was indicted for on two counts of second-degree manslaughter and one count of wanton endangerment by a Pulaski, Ky. grand jury Wednesday.

The charges stem from a truck crash in November that killed two men. Watts, 21, a former University of Kentucky football player, was legally drunk and driving the truck in which the two men were passengers.

Watts faces 10 years imprisonment for each of the manslaughter counts and one to five years for the wanton endangerment count.

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Longwood narrows list to five for city post

LONGWOOD - The City Commission could be selecting a new city administrator as early as Friday.

Commissioners will interview five finalists vying for the post, which was vacated in September when former city administrator W. Shelton Smith was asked to resign after a vote of no confidence. Greg Manning has been acting city administrator.

Manning, who served as the city's police chief for 21 years, was called out of retirement from his Shorter, Ala. home to fill the temporary position.

Manning said he plans to go back home Dec. 22. However, if the city needs him in the interim, Manning said he will return for a few days after the holidays.

There were 56 applicants for the job which pays between \$65,000 and \$78,000. Those numbers are negotiable, however, Manning said.

"The search process is going pretty good," he said. Commissioners will interview the candidates Friday afternoon and a special public meeting will be held at 8 p.m. where a final decision could possibly be made, he said. The meeting will be held at the Longwood Civic League Women's Club, 135/150 W. Church Ave.

The finalists are:
Fritz A. Behring. Behring is currently city manager of Fort Meade. He also served for six years as city administrator

of Central City, Neb. Behring holds a master's degree in public administration and a bachelor's degree from the University of South Dakota.

John J. Drago. Drago, a resident of Casselberry, is assistant to the city manager of Winter Springs. He also served as city administrator of Okeechobee, and town manager of Golden Beach. He holds a master's degree and bachelor's degree in management from Georgia College.

Thomas W. Frame. Frame is currently city manager of Sebastian. He also served as county administrator in Charlotte County. He holds a bachelor's degree in geography from University of South Florida.

Robert S. McClary. McClary is currently director of economic development in Park Hills, Mo. He also served as city manager of Sebastian, city administrator

Kennedy eager for extended career

SEMINOLE COUNTY - At 48, Orlando Police Chief Bill Kennedy says he is eager for a new challenge. That's why he is retiring from that agency to begin an executive position with the Seminole County Sheriff's Office.

"I'm too young to retire and not to work," Kennedy said Wednesday.

On Feb. 1, Kennedy will become the director of metro services for the Sheriff's Office. He said that after spending most of his life in the Orlando area, he will move to Seminole County.

"That's important," he said. "I strongly believe that law enforcement officers should reside in the city or the county where they are employed. This gives them a more personal

sense of being in the community."

Kennedy joined the OPD when he was 21 and retired with 27 years service. He said that he had "maxed out" in the pension program for that agency and will receive about \$80,000 a year when he leaves the department on Dec. 27. Jerry Demings will be the new OPD chief.

"My retirement is good for the OPD and for Jerry Demings," Kennedy said. "I believe it is the right thing for Jerry to come in. He will be a good chief."

Kennedy said that he intended to retire at the OPD at the end of the year but that he did not know until recently weeks where he would next work. "Three months ago Sheriff Eslinger and I casually talked about his agency."

Suspect in random shooting is in jail

SANFORD - Occupants in two vehicles exchanged approximately 15-20 shots in a drive-by shooting Wednesday in Sanford, police said.

The vehicles exchanged fire at the intersection of Fifth Street and Olive Avenue at 8:45 p.m., police said. As bystanders fled, a black female, who is under 18, was shot in the left leg by a stray bullet. She is recovering in fair condition at Central Florida Regional Hospital.

Witnesses described the two vehicles involved in the shooting incident.

Marlon D. Young, 24, who was stopped by Seminole County deputies for a traffic offense, was driving the 1989 burgundy Mercury involved in the shooting, tag number 2CN51F. The suspect is being held in the John E. Polk Correctional facility. The Sanford Police Department is impounding and investigating the car.

Police are searching for a truck that was also involved in the shooting. Police say it was possibly turquoise.

"The investigation is ongoing," acting chief Ray Bronson said. "This is a horrible incident."

Police search for suspected rapist

SANFORD - A woman was able to fight an attempted rapist who forced his way into her apartment with a knife late Wednesday night in Sanford, police said.

According to Ray Bronson, acting police chief for the Sanford Police Department, the woman was approached outside in the Stonebrook Apartments complex by a black man wearing a mask.

Police said the suspect was

carrying a knife. Bronson said the man forced the woman into her apartment and forced her to undress. He then attempted to rape her, police said.

According to police, the woman, who was alone in the apartment fought her attacker. She was later found by her boyfriend at 1 a.m. Thursday lying unconscious. Her boyfriend called 911.

"We're investigating the case," Bronson said. "The best description we have of the assailant is he was a black man wearing a mask."

College offers baby nest eggs

OVIDO - Seminole Community College is sponsoring a full two-year Baby Nest Egg Scholarship to the baby born closest to the time of the groundbreaking of their Oviedo Campus today, so long as the family resides within certain zip codes.

The scholarship will be awarded to one baby, within any of the zip codes 32765, 32766, 32732, 32708, or 32762. The groundbreaking is scheduled for 2 p.m. today on Old Lockwood Road, near State Road 434. Should a multiple birth be the closest in time, the children may share the scholarship, which may only be used at SCC.

The scholarship is being sponsored by Helen Von Dolterien-Fournier, in conjunction with the Seminole Commu-

nity College Foundation. To enter the contest, call the SCC Foundation at (407) 328-2030 on or before Dec. 14, at 10 a.m. The winner will be announced at graduation Dec. 15.

"We're trying to draw attention to the need to plan for education," Von Dolterien-Fournier said. "As a financial planner, I see so many parents who are unable to afford to pay for their child's education. The education inflation rate is seven percent."

Rich Sloan, executive director of the Oviedo Chamber of Commerce, said pairing the scholarship with the groundbreaking demonstrates the importance the Oviedo community places on education.

"As the baby grows, so will the Oviedo community," Sloan said. "This is symbolic of the bright and shining future the Oviedo community has."

Winning in life is important

SANFORD - Where do you draw the line between winning and losing and the importance between the two?

For what it's worth, and I'd like to hear as much and as many opinions as possible from anyone who wants to respond, here's my opinion.

Winning, while it may not be everything, is important.

How you play the game factors into the equation, but sports is a part of life for a lot of people and, in life, you have winners and losers.

Sports teaches lessons for kids. It builds character, that's true, but it also teaches the importance of winning whether the Pollyannas like it or not.

When kids reach the adult world and are up for a job, it doesn't matter if they put up a good fight during the interview.

It matters if they got the job or not. Winning or losing.

In college, a kid can work as hard as he wants on a term paper, but it still matters at the end if he was better than the rest of the class.

Does the lowest rated student at the Harvard Law School get the same job as the top rated student?

Life, without being too crass, is about winning and losing.

Now, if a 10-year-old on a baseball team doesn't have a winning season, obviously that doesn't make him a loser.

If a kid doesn't make the all-star team, that doesn't doom him to a life on the streets. I had a chance to have a chat with Tom Kelly of the Sanford Recreation Department Wednesday and he told me a really great anecdote.

Seems a kid playing for a recreation basketball league was on a team that was getting clobbered every week. His coach kept telling him that losing built character.

The kid said that it was about time to help the other teams build some character. It's pretty funny, but it also raises some questions about recreational sports.

How important is winning? I've coached youth basketball and lacrosse for several years in three different states. As a sportswriter who covers youth athletics as part of his beat, I see a lot of different behaviors and hear a lot about people's thoughts on winning and losing in the recreation programs.

If you watch youth athletics in Seminole County, you see some absolutely awful things once in awhile. Parents screaming at coaches and umpires, kids crying after a game... they are all a part of Seminole County and sports throughout the country.

But the bottom line is that winning is important. Sportsmanship is a great quality, but, in the real world, do you want someone working for you who is a good loser, a good sport, or someone willing to work to be the best?

A lot of people are going to disagree with these opinions. And certainly the loutish parents who scream at teenage umpires and push their kids to tears deserve some serious medical help.

But to tell kids that it doesn't matter if you win or lose sends a bad message.

It makes for a great slogan, but, if sports is a way to prepare a child for life, then certainly saying it's okay to lose, as long as it's fun, is to say that losing in life is okay.

Dr. Spock would disagree. Winning might not be everything, but it's a heck of a lot better than losing.

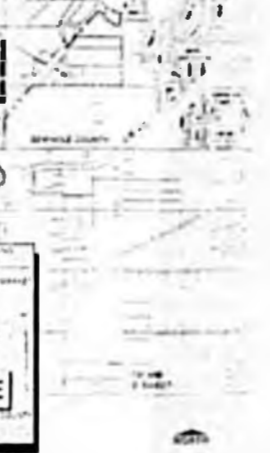

But the score was only 6-4 five minutes later after the locals missed several easy shots under the basket and also made several bad passes.

All-America candidate Daria Kudrivytsava, the No. 4 scorer in the nation, then got the Raiders rolling, hitting a pair of three-pointers from far beyond the stripe, and SCC looked like it was going to run away and hide, building a lead of over 10 points.

But the turnovers returned and the Hawks started to creep back into the game, cutting the lead to four points, 30-26, with a little over a minute left in the first half.

Kudrivytsava, who finished the first half with 15 points, again came to the rescue, scoring six straight points before intermission to give the Raiders a 36-26 lead.

SCC got off to a fast start in the second half as Kudrivytsava hit a "three" and Raimesoalo, who had 11 first half points, followed with two more three-pointers and the hosts were on their way to their 10th win of the season.

Hillsborough was not ready to give up, however, and kept hustling and stayed in the game behind 15 second half points from Gemma Collins before the Raiders's defensive pressure and offensive precision on the fast break finally put the game on ice with three minutes left and SCC head coach Ken Patrick was able to clear his bench.

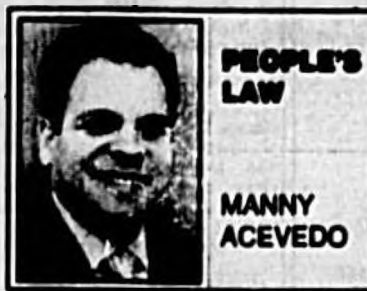

How property restrictions are established

PART I OF 2 PARTS

Most subdivisions in Florida contain restrictions on what an owner can do with his or her property. These restrictions are designed to enable the developer to attract a particular type of buyer during the initial selling phase, to maintain a general building scheme, and to maintain a certain level of "quality" throughout the development. This article will discuss how these restrictions are usually established, who may enforce them, and the three requirements to enforcement.

Restrictions on property are usually established when a property is originally sold. With the sale of the property the developer will usually "include" a Declaration of Covenants, Conditions, and Restrictions or similarly titled document in this declaration the developer may include restrictions on what the property owner may do with his or her property such as what color the home may be painted,

whether the owner may install a basketball hoop, and even who may live in the subdivision. These restrictions are known in the law as restrictive covenants.

Naturally, restrictive covenants may not be adverse to any statutory or constitutional provisions such as the Fair Housing Amendments Act or the Equal Protection Clause of the Fourteenth Amendment to the U.S. Constitution. However, restrictive covenants which are not adverse to any statutory or constitutional provisions are generally enforced by the courts.

When restrictive covenants are not adverse to any statutory or constitutional provisions, they may be enforced by the developer or grantor of the land as well as by any subsequent buyer or grantee. More commonly, however, the developer will provide, in the Declaration of Covenants, Conditions, and Restrictions, that the restrictive covenants will be enforced by a homeowner's association. This is because a homeowner's association may enforce restrictions more efficiently and cost-effectively and avoids having one or a few neighbors from having to constantly "police" the neighborhood.

However, before a homeowner's association or grantee may enforce a restrictive covenant, the homeowner's association or other grantee must comply with three requirements. First of all, the alleged violator must receive notice of the existence of the restriction prior to enforcement of the restriction, whether that notice be express,

actual, implied actual, or constructive. Second, the homeowner's association or grantee must provide a reasonable demand for compliance with the restriction after the breach has occurred. And third, the alleged violator must be afforded compliance with any applicable procedural due process considerations which require notice of the commencement of the litigation and an opportunity to be heard in court as provided for in the U.S. and Florida Constitutions.

The law allows for the placement of restrictions on what an owner can do with his or her property. However, as briefly noted above, there are limits to the restrictions, limits to who may enforce them, and rights that must be afforded to an alleged violator before he or she is ordered to remedy the violation or pay damages. Next week we will further discuss the requirements to enforcement of a restrictive covenant.

latter versions are more common in smokers. The lesions must be monitored; if they grow or change, biopsy is required. Patients with oral leukoplakia must discontinue tobacco products. The cause of genital leukoplakia is unknown, and there are no preventive measures.

DEAR DR. GOTT: What can you tell me about anaphylaxis? I have all the symptoms, even the drop in blood pressure. I feel lightheaded and have no energy several times a day. This has been going on for years.

DEAR READER: Anaphylaxis is a severe, acute and sometimes fatal reaction to a foreign substance. It can occur from food, vaccines, chemicals, drugs or insect venom, and it appears within seconds or minutes.

In its mildest form, anaphylaxis causes redness, itching, swelling, lung spasms and a fall in blood pressure. In its severest form, it rapidly leads to unconsciousness, shock and cardiac arrest.

The condition is usually treated with injections of epinephrine, followed by antihistamines or cortisone, which reverse the body's acute allergic response.

Anaphylaxis is never a chronic condition. I'm afraid that you'll have to consider other causes for your loss of energy and drop in blood pressure. You might be anemic or experiencing a reaction to certain medications, for example. Check with your doctor.

DEAR DR. GOTT: My son in law says that if an alcoholic abstains completely from drinking, he won't live long because his system relies on alcohol and has lost the ability to process food. Fortunately, this is not my problem. Is it true?

DEAR READER: Your son in law's viewpoint is absurd at best, dangerous at worst. The reverse is true. If an alcoholic does NOT abstain, he will eventually suffer serious mental and physical complications. Alcohol is poison for anyone. For an alcoholic, it is a one-way ticket to court or the mortuary. Alcoholism is a disease that can be treated only by abstinence. By the way, does your son in law drink a good deal? His irrational rationalization seems very much to me like "alcoholic thinking."

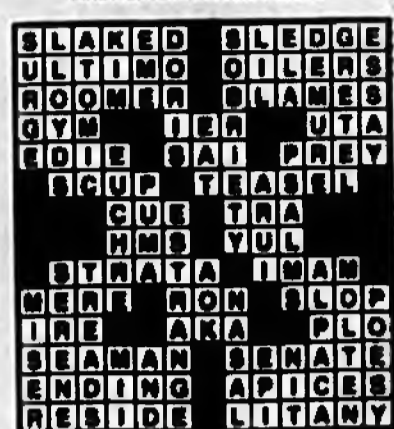

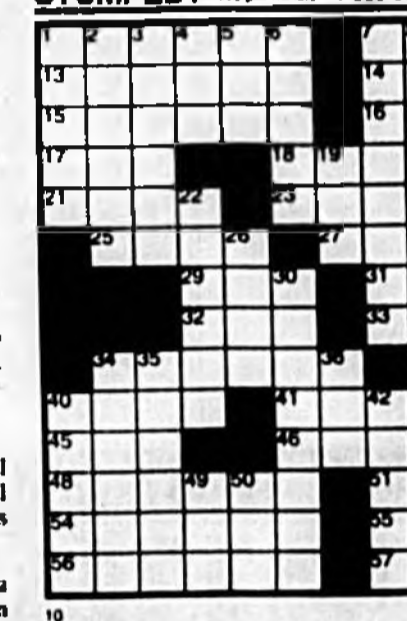

WIN AT BRIDGE

Keep going low

By Phillip Alder

Lewis Carroll wrote, "I'm very brave generally," he went on in a low voice: "only today I happen to have a headache."

For some strange reason, this made me think of gangs who "bravely" beat up unfortunate victims. Yet when you get one of them on his own, outnumbered, he becomes more yellow than a bunch of bananas.

At the bridge table, it helps to know how to defend yourself. (And it is even better if your partner knows the moves too.) To test yourself, look only at the West and North hands. Against three no-trump, you lead the spade six: four, jack, king. Declarer plays a low club from his hand. How do you defend?

Perhaps you think North's three no-trump was an overbid. But it pays to

be aggressive in bidding game. Also, it isn't such a bad contract. Finally, true, you can make five clubs with this layout. Yet that is never easy to bid with limited high-card content and no singletons or voids.

From trick one, West knows that South has the spade ace. So, after establishing his suit, West needs an entry to cash those winners. The only candidate is the club king. Ergo, West must play second hand low at trick two. Is this dangerous? No, because if South had the club ace, he would have played the ace and another club. For all South knows, East has the singleton king.

After East wins with the club ace, he returns his second spade, which defeats the contract.

Note that if South ducks at trick one, East must switch to diamonds. And if declarer starts clubs from the dummy, East must go up with the ace — an interesting dichotomy, if that is the word I need.
