

Proposed Air Force Hike May Double Plane Mishaps

WASHINGTON, Jan. 26. (AP)

An item not mentioned in the administration's air program of 10,000 planes and 20,000 new pilots is that such progress is offset with death.

This is not merely a problem in vital statistics but a problem in public reaction. In the total aviation nations this is a simple matter. The death reports never are published, even in local papers, so the death toll of the expanded foreign air preparations and the disconcerts the local population, nor disturbs other nations.

Reports from Germany say that the death toll of the new air program is enormous. Training of thousands of pilots annually is a costly process both in planes and pilots. Reports speaking here are that Germany has several times as many pilots as trained as we have, making death rates correspondingly high.

But when this country begins stepping up its pilot population, the day by day report of accidents and deaths will be in the papers, on the radio and published vital statistics.

On Dec. 1 there were 22,813 commercially licensed pilots in the United States, an accumulation of several years of training. This is an increase from 17,397 a year ago, incidentally marking probably the biggest year's increase in trained pilots in the country's history. The 1938 total was 15,769.

There are approximately 5,000 military pilots, a few of whom are listed among the holders of commercial licenses.

Now along comes the plan to train 20,000 college men on wings this year, virtually doubling the present number holding commercial licenses. And as the training schedules increase the number of planes in service must also increase. The department of commerce lists 9,721 licensed airplanes in the country, while army and navy aircraft add approximately 4,000 more.

Such an increase in pilot training plus the projected increase of the army air strength to as much as 10,000 planes, may double the toll-taking accidents.

The army and navy withhold cumulative figures of fatalities among military fliers but the total of deaths in major disasters involving military aircraft, not including air and dust accidents, makes an impressive figure each year.

Deaths among non-military pilots, co-pilots and students totaled 165 during 1935, 159 in 1936 and 177 in 1937. The 1938 figure is not yet compiled. Passenger fatalities are not included, since they will not figure appreciably in the expanded air program.

Air accidents, even comparatively small ones, are spectacular affairs and react on the public

Healthy Cheek Color Is Again In Vogue

Stark-white faces with blood-red lips are no longer in vogue. Once again, it's smart to look healthy. And the most effective way to achieve that effect is to rouge a little additional color to your cheeks.

Choose your rouge to conform to the rest of your natural coloring. If you're blonde don't make it too heavy or too dark. If you're a red-head stick to rouges with a touch of orange in them. (Auburn-haired girls can wear slightly darker rouge with less orange.) Brunettes can go in for the more exotic violet-reds.

Paste rouge, most women find, lasts longer than cake rouge. It should be mixed with a bit of face cream and applied from the palm of the hand after the powder is patted on. It may then be retouched with powder rouge.

Many make-up experts advise placing rouge where the natural coloring shows up when you blink. Sometimes, however, you may improve on the color scheme by nature gave you by a little camouflaging, remembering that rouge placed high tends to lengthen the face; placed low or far out, it seems to add width.

One beauty specialist advises placing some rouge close to the eyes to bring out their brilliance. You should not wear rouge when you're having your photograph taken. What the mirror shows as an innocent re-touching job shows up on the film all too often as a great big black smudge.

Cutting Down On Food Is Good For Figure And Budget

It's good for the figure as well as the budget to start cutting down on food when the holidays are over. You should eat enough to keep up your vitality, but not too much.

A long walk every day, regardless of the weather, won't be a bad idea, and you ought to drink at least eight glasses of water a day.

A good starter is to drink the juice of a lemon squeezed into a tumbler-sized glass of hot water as soon as you get up.

Your breakfast should be adequate, but carefully chosen. For instance, doubles in fruits will give rest to the day's first meal.

Try a combination of sweetened prune and pineapple juice, or half a grapefruit and a glass of orange juice, or fruit sauces, slightly sweetened and a generous glass of cranberry, apple or prune juice.

Follow the fruits with eggs and toast (lightly buttered). Omit cereal with sugar and cream for a while. If you must have cream and sugar in your coffee, use them sparingly.

To satisfy that old demon, be-tween-meals appetite, reach for a glass of buttermilk, sweet milk, unsweetened fruit juices or a fresh apple or pear. Between-meal

snacks really are necessary during this cutting down period.
For lunch you can have a large bowl of soup. If it's a thick cream soup, forgo crackers but you can have a few of them or some toast if the soup is the clear or vegetable. A big salad is a must. Have it fruit or vegetable with French dressing. Tuna can stand a small amount of boiled salad dressing. For the beverage, select buttermilk, milk or tea with lemon.

For dinner, you really need not feel cramped. You can eat almost anything, except, of course, rich heavy desserts. But do not indulge in seconds.

Lean meats, fish and fowl are preferred to the fat meats. Vegetables lightly seasoned are better than those hidden under rich sauces. You can even have a little jam on your bread or gravy on your potatoes. Better chow, lettuce bread or potatoes. One or the other is enough.

Since salads contain valuable toning up ingredients and are very filling add one also to the dinner menu. A large green salad is best. Or sliced tomatoes and cucumbers are refreshing.

British Cabinet In Shake-up As New Crisis Is Feared

Shifts Made By Chamberlain In Effort To Strengthen Defense Of Empire

Rebels Continue Drive In Spain Hitler Is Expected To Give Colonial Ambitions Of Nazi

British Prime Minister Chamberlain shook up the cabinet today amid rumblings of a new German Italian "squeeze play" on France and Britain and the Spanish insurgents' almost unrestrained victory drive.

With anxious Europe's attention on England, Chamberlain was expected to make an important speech tonight, adopting a stiff attitude but again appealing for peace.

The cabinet changes were listed at putting a new drive in ministries of defense and agriculture, both vital to Britain's ability to wage a war.

Admiral of the fleet, Lord Chatfield, key figure in Britain's vast naval rearmament, was brought into the cabinet as minister for co-ordination of defense.

He succeeded Sir Thomas Inskip, who remained a cabinet minister, taking the dominions portfolio which Malcolm MacDonald had held along with the secretaryship of colonies.

President's WPA Request Defeated By Senate Vote

Conservatives Win As Cut In Relief Fund Is Given Approval

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28.—(AP)—By the dramatic margin of a single vote, the Senate rebelled yesterday at President Roosevelt's spending policies and joined the house in ordering a \$150,000,000 cut in work-relief appropriations.

It voted, 47 to 46, to provide \$725,000,000 to finance WPA from Feb. 7 to June 30, instead of the \$875,000,000 requested by the President—the dismayed surprise of administration leaders, who had waged a hard, week-long fight to sustain the bill.

The Senate's economy bloc, consisting of almost the entire Republican membership and 20 some Democrats, was jubilant at winning the first battle of the session, and the first test of strength on this issue since the November elections.

The result was a guarantee that the \$725,000,000 appropriation will be in the bill when it is sent to the White House. Since the House, too, approved that figure, it cannot, under congressional rules, be changed in the House-Senate conference which presumably will be called to deal with changes made by the Senate.

The vote came after a week of such parliamentary jockeying and careful nose-counting as the Senate has not seen since the Supreme Court reorganization bill. It was a week which saw vastly more work done in cloakrooms, corridors and senatorial offices than on the Senate floor.

For, from the outset, it was apparent that the vote would be unusually close and leaders of the fight acted accordingly. So tense did the struggle become, in fact, that the Administration leadership refused to provide a pair for one economy bloc member, Senator Chavez, Democrat, New Mexico, who was at home and unable to vote.

Order Withdrawn Staying Miami Recall Election

Terrell Opens Way For Holding Vote In Miami Fight

TALLAHASSEE, Jan. 28.—(AP)—Chief Justice Glenn Terrell today withdrew an order staying a recall election for three Miami city officials.

His decision opened the way for holding the vote unless attorneys for the officials obtain a stay order from a justice of the United States Supreme Court. The Florida Supreme Court late last year ordered the recall election to proceed, then Mayor Robert R. Williams and Commissioners John S. DuBose and Ralph H. Ferguson obtained from Justice Terrell a 60-day stay order to allow them to appeal to the U. S. Supreme Court.

Withdrawal of the order, said Terrell, shows no disrespect of the U. S. Supreme Court since that tribunal can hear the case anyway if it decides to do so. Terrell said apparently there is no federal question involved in the case.

Pants Pressers Cannot Serve Term In Miami

Court Refuses Plea To Move Prisoners Serving 30-Day Contempt Sentence

TALLAHASSEE, Jan. 28.—(AP)—The Florida Supreme Court today refused to allow transfer of three Miami laundromats, serving jail terms for contempt, from this city to Miami. The men were sent to jail here because they refused to obey the Supreme Court order upholding the right of the State Laundry Board to fix prices in the Miami area.

Council for A. E. Lichtenstein, S. J. Heiman and Warren Cash asked that their clients be removed because the winter climate here caused them to have bad colds and might seriously impair their health.

They promised, if the transfer was allowed, not to seek release from the 30-day sentences through Federal Judge Alexander Akerman at Tampa.

Such action before Akerman now is prevented because the jail here is not in the Tampa judge's jurisdiction. Akerman has held the law unconstitutional.

Health Insurance Proposal Results In Controversy

Doctors Contend They Are Qualified To Supervise Program

By MORGAN M. BEATTY WASHINGTON, Jan. 28.—(AP)—Who should sponsor medical insurance for the millions—Uncle Sam or the nation's organized doctors?

That's the real issue behind the medical headlines so often seen on the nation's front pages these days.

Through the American Medical Association, the doctors argue they are qualified by experience to organize and supervise medical insurance for the public. They insist government in medicine will lead to a politicians' quest for votes instead of adequate medical care for the needy. And they charge that a governmental system would set up an undemocratic bureaucracy and a wasteful and costly tax collection.

On the other hand, the medical minds in four great federal departments are sure that federal and state governments jointly should take over medical insurance.

Cone Will Not Extend Deadline
