

Regardless of whether or not you think the 32 cents per cra'e minimum price-fixing law is the proper approach to the solution of the problems of the grapefruit grower, you must admit that only if he complies 100 percent with the program which has been adopted and refuses absolutely under any consideration to sell for less than 32 cents a crate is there any hope whatever for the success of the plan.

And so we join heartily in the recommendation of the Florida Citrus Commission that growers every where in this state be urged to stand firm on this minimum price

this state be urged to stand firm on this minimum price and not allow themselves to be stampeded into chiseling on their neighbors. It must be understood by all of them hat if one starts cutting the price, then another will, and before you know it the whole price structure will fall.

Personally we would like to see this price-fixing plan given every opportunity to succeed. If there is anything to such economics, if there is any way to get around the aw of supply and demand, we for one would like to know that we believe that every farmer and every citrus t, and we believe that every farmer and every citrus frower in the state would like to know it. If this mini-num price law works for the grapefruit grower, it ought

If it doesn't work, then we will have to 'ry something else, but the only way to find out is to give it a good honest trial. #### . U. S. Outpost In The Pacific

The island of Guam which you have been reading about so much lately in connection with United States rearmament plans, is but a tlny spot in the Pacific, 1500 miles from Tokio, and annexed by this country during the war with Spain in 1898. It is now proposed to spend about \$5,000,000 on this island for dredging the harbor, building breakwaters, airplane hangars and barracks.

"Guam is 210 miles in area", says the New York Herald Tribune, "shaped vaguely like a lopsided dumbbell, ruggedly mountainous in the southern lobe but with plenty of room for airfields on the lower, more level ground of the northern one. It has one large harbor with good depths; this, however, is cluttered with coral rocks, and the seas come over the reef which forms one side, hence the necessity for dredging and breakwaters. Guam stands roughly in the center of the far flung chains of Japanesecontrolled islets which lie like a diaphanous curtain between Hawaii and the Philippines; and, small as it is, it quacious. 




