State looks into race rhetoric

SANFORD — A state agency that investigates racial discrimination and tension is holding talks with city leaders regarding the possibility of mediating racial tension in Sanford.

Sanford Mayor Larry Dale and Commissioner Velma Williams both said that they have been contacted by the state's Commission on Human Relations regarding the possibility of mediating racial tension in the city.

"I told them when they called me I was glad they were coming," Dale said.

Agency tight-lipped about who initiated requested investigation

"I wish they would come. We have some elements of hostility who are trying to get people excited."

Ed Dixon, assistant director of race and government relations for the agency planned to meet with Dale on Thursday, but the appointment was cancelled because of travel problems. Although another appointment has not been rescheduled, Dale said he welcomes

"I'm not witnessing a lot of tension,"

Dale said, "I think people are trying to
whip it up. I don't think we're in danger
of whipping up a fire."

Dixon is the director of a unit formed to assist communities by providing mediation, discussions and conflict resolution strategies. He could not be reached for comment.

"Our goal is to provide a variety of techniques to address any breakdowns in community relations when we're invited," said Virginia Newton, a spokes-

woman for the Commission.

Agency officials did not confirm who initiated contact with them. The Commission of Human Relations normally does not disclose their visits to the public. An official with the commission said she did not know how the visit became public knowledge.

Neighbors want officer back

SANFORD — The representative from a neighborhood watch organization says that the demotion of Sanford's highest ranking black police officer for violation of department policy has decreased the safety of his neighborhood.

An Internal Affairs investigation found Lt. Willie Harden acted improperly during an incident when an officer drawing her weapon in the department's training room. Internal Affairs also found Harden violated procedures during a child abduction investigation.

As a result of the findings, the 16-year veteran was demot-

ed to the rank of Sergeant, and received 40 hours suspension without pay. He is appealing the disciplinary action, according to a department spokeswoman.

Richard Middleton, 65, of 1406 Belaire Blvd. in Sanford, a member of a newly forming neighborhood watch group, said that Harden's presence in See Officer, Page 2A

Lake Mary man arrested for child porn

Nickless faces 10 counts of possession

A Lake Mary man was arrested Thursday after child pornography was discovered on a computer he dropped off in Longwood to be repaired.

Mike Nickless, 48, of 323 Leslie Lane, was arrested on 10 counts of possessing child pornography after a technician for the Orlando Computer Exchange found lewd pictures of children on Nickless' computer hard drive, Lake Mary detective P.A. Skinner said in a police

The technician told authorities, in October 1999, he had installed a new hard drive in Nickless' computer that only contained retail software.

On Jan. 10, Nickless dropped off the same computer at the Longwood business. While working on it, Small stated he found a file which contained a graphic picture of a child.

Authorities discovered several more files containing photos that depicted small children in sexual acts or lewd positions, according to Skinner. The computer was seized by investigators and was secured into evidence at the

Lake Mary Police Department.
Thursday evening, authorities arrived at Nickless' residence, and the suspect stated he knew the pictures were on his comput-

Nickless told police he downloaded the files from the Internet at sites that specified "teen photos." He also stated "he likes to look at pictures and that at times, he tried to stop."

After Nickless gave authorities consent to search his home, a number of items, including computers, computer accessories, Zip® drives, floppy disks, and videotapes were seized.

Nickless was taken to John E. Polk Correctional Facility, where he is being held without bond until he goes before a judge, which was scheduled for today.

According to Lake Mary authorities, the investigation into Nickless is continuing, and there are several other charges relating to child pornography pending against him.

Ostrich deal goes foul

An Apopka man is reporting that he is the victim of fraud and larceny in regard to an investment he made in ostrich-

The victim, 33-year-old Harry Holan, told Seminole County sheriff's deputies he invested \$40,000 to purchase 27 ostriches.

The birds were supposed to be used for meat once they matured. Each bird was supposed to have a different serial number, as was reflected on the bill of sale, the police report

Holan said on Sunday he tried to contact Gary Hughes, 40, the man who was in charge of keeping the ostriches. There was no answer from Hughes, the report said.

Upon further investigation, Holan believes Hughes sold the ostriches and has fled the state. Hughes apparently listed the Oviedo area as an address, the report said.

Holan believes Hughes marketed the same birds to a dozen different investors, who also may be victims. He also believes Hughes made up different serial numbers for the same birds.

There are 12 other investors who also purchased birds, the report said.

Investigators said Hughes has closed his current business, USA Ostrich Inc., and cut all ties the area. He has possibly moved to Colorado, according to the police report.

The case has been forwarded to the white-collar crimes section of the State Attorney's Office.



"When he was in charge he got the job done for us," Middleton said. "How he did it, I have no idea, but he got results. Now, we're starting over again."

The neighborhood around Belaire Boulevard is made up primarily of elderly people who can fall prey to vandals and thieves without a vigilant police presence. Middleton said that since Harden's recent demotion, he is concerned about whether the patrols will be maintained.

"He made sure there were police officers in our area," Middleton said. "You could see them, you could hear them. I'm hurting for all of our neighbors and myself. I'm mad for him. It just seems like this demotion is awful harsh treatment."

Police Chief Brian Tooley declined to comment regarding the disciplinary action, in order to ensure Harden's right of

The Internal Affairs report indicates that on Oct. 27, Harden, Officer Darlene

Ladoczky and Officer Robert Shull were in the department's training room, standing within three to four feet of each other. Harden was making comments to Ladoczky to demonstrate how she drew her weapon on a call that day involving a mentally ill person, the report said.

Ladoczky drew her weapon and pointed it in the direction of Shull's head, then holstered her weapon realizing she had made a mistake, the report said.

Harden took Ladoczky and Shull into the break area of the police department and counseled Ladoczky that what she had done was wrong and to not let it happen again. He told them that the incident would

end there. Harden did not document the incident nor did he advise Ladoczky's supervisors. He did not advise anyone in his chain

For her actions in the training room, Ladoczky received a written reprimand.

On Nov. 11, two weeks after the training room incident, Harden was walking with his children from Hamilton Elementary School to his police vehicle when Officer Jordan Beckner approached and informed him of that an elementary-aged child had reported an attempted abduction, according to an internal affairs investiga-

tion by the department. Beckner informed Harden he had called in the complaint. Harden then left the school to take his own children home, telling Beckner he would return.

However, Harden did not return to the school, located at 8th Street and Scott Avenue. He also did not inform the police communications center of any of his activities during the incident, the internal affairs investigation concluded.

Construction of new school entrances set for this summer

SANFORD — New entrances are being designed for both the middle school and Seminole High School, with construction scheduled to begin this summer.

Seminole High School's new entrance is being designed to connect Ridgewood Avenue on the south side of the campus with Live Oak Boulevard. It is scheduled to be complete in August of 2000.

Combined with the school's main entrance on the north side of the campus at Ridgewood Avenue, Seminole High School will have two locations for parents to drop off students.

"I wish we had this the last 20 years," said Sanford City Commissioner Whitey Eckstein, who is a social studies teacher at Seminole High School.

Meanwhile, The new Millennium Middle School campus, being built to enhance the school's Fine Arts and Communications magnet program and relieve overcrowding, is expected to be complete by November of 2000. The cost of building the new campus is \$17.3 million.

Features at the new campus will include a Performing Arts Center with a 550 seat auditorium, a dance studio, an area for the orchestra and band, and foreign language laboratories.

Millennium Middle School has a student population of 1,225 and is located at 21 Lakeview Drive in Sanford. The new campus is being constructed adjacent to the current campus.

The school currently only has one entrance on the north side of the campus along Georgia Avenue.

Renovations to the intersection of Georgia Avenue and Santa Barbara Avenue are being designed, and expected to be complete in August of 2000 at an

estimated cost of \$200,000 in school board funding. The improvements are

designed to improve the alignment of the roads and visibility at the intersection of Georgia and Santa Barbara avenues.

"This has always been a bad intersection," said Dianne Kramer, director of facilities and planning for the school-district. This is going to realign it so Georgia Avenue will be a straight shot into the school. It will improve the intersection."

A second entrance to Millennium Middle School is also being designed, connecting the new campus with Live Oak Boulevard. The cost to the school board of constructing the new entrance is estimated at \$127,000.

"This will improve the traffic pattern into our school," said Millennium Middle School principal Walt Griffin.

Sidewalks are also being designed to run along Live Oak Boulevard within the 14-acre Master's Cove Property, which is located just west of the Seminole High School baseball field and owned by the school board.

In the meantime, the new Seminole High School entrance connecting Ridgewood Avenue to Live Oak boulevard will relieve the school's congested current main entrance on the north side of the campus along Ridgewood Avenue.

Seminole High School has a student population of 2,378. Parents and students at the school have long complained about overcrowding of the main

The cost of constructing the high school's new entrance is estimated at \$185,000. The Seminole County School Board has not yet decided which of the two entrances will be the school's main entrance next school year.

"If you have ever tried to exit the school after a football game

you know that we need a new entrance," said Seminole High School Principal Karen Coleman.

The main entranceway will also receive minor repairs to ease congestion, particularly in the area of the school's new community swimming pool, Construction on the pool is

scheduled to be finished in early February, said pool supervisor Tony Ackerson. City officials are expected to

hook-up the pool heater and complete a retention pond this week.

The landscaping, sodding and irrigation is expected to be complete in two weeks.

In addition, the city is looking into installing additional fencing and security monitoring systems for the pool as a precaution against vandalism.

The pool will be used for practices, swim meets, and as a place to teach swimming safety. In addition, the pool will double as a community swimming pool, when not in use by Seminole

The proposed pool hours for public use are Monday through Friday, 5 p.m. to 9 p.m., Saturday 9 a.m. to 9 p.m., and Sunday 12 p.m. to 6 p.m. The City Commission has not approved

High School.

the proposed hours. The pool could be open additional hours for the public when swimming season and water polo season are not in session,

and during school breaks. Swimming season lasts from

Aug. 1 to mid-November. Water Polo season lasts from Jan. 24 to mid-April, Ackerson said.

Sanford, Seminole County and the school-district are sharing the costs of constructing a \$1 million pool at Seminole High School. Sanford is paying \$500,000 toward construction of the pool, while the county and school board are splitting the remaining \$500,000 for construc-

Officer Rodriguez, with whom I spoke, informed me that one should always assume the gun is loaded, and a shell does remain in the chamber when the magazine is removed — unless it, too, is removed. That's an important warning for inexperienced gun owners.

Medical doctors believe individualized breast cancer treatment might soon become a reality

Technology being developed today will individualize breast cancer treatment in the future, an improvement over the current blanket approach, says Dr. C. Kent Osborne, director of the **Breast Center at Baylor College** of Medicine.

"In the next 10 years, I think we will see a major change in the way we approach breast cancer. We're beginning to be able to identify the molecular fingerprint of each patient's individual tumor," Osborne, who was also co-director of the recent San Antonio Breast Cancer Symposium, said.

The annual conference, attended by more than 3,000 specialists from 52 countries, gives scientists and physicians of all disciplines an opportunity to exchange information and the latest in research.

Breast cancer death rates have declined on average 1.7 percent per year since 1989,

according to the National Cancer Institute.

Each breast cancer is different, Osborne said. As researchers become able to learn more about the genetic makeup of each tumor, they will be better able to target the problem

areas for treatment. Osborne notes that scientists have been investigating one. gene at a time, such as the estrogen receptor and the HER-2 oncogene.

Therapies have been developed and are constantly being updated to deal with known genetic alterations that cause breast cancer.

"In the near future, because of new technologies that are now being perfected, we might be able to measure many thousands of genes in a patient's tumor at the same time. So, instead of looking for three or four or five things, we'll be able to look at thousands,' he said.

This type of information will lead to improvement in prevention strategies, earlier diagnosis

and treatment of the disease. The declines in the mortality rates from breast cancer in the past 10 years can be attributed to the ch

emotherapy and drug therapies that began in the early 1970s, Osborne said.

"In the next couple of years, we'll see further reductions as the benefits of widespread mammograms start to play a role," he said.

Mammograms did not become a routine part of health care until the mid-to-late-1980s.

Osborne said lifestyle changes and the expanded use of prevention drugs from studies now in progress will lead to even fewer deaths in the following few years.

The individualized approach to breast cancer treatment will add to the decline.
