One brave survivor goes home today

ORLANDO - On what was probably her last day at the hospital, Ashley Ann Himes bravely smiled, dabbed on some big girl lipstick and threw kisses to her aunt.

Her brown eyes were trying to dance. She wanted to go outside, to feel the warmth of the sun and breathe in some fresh

At noontime Monday, 5-year-old Ashley got her wish.

Snug in a bed made into a magic red sled with wheels, she was taken outside Arnold Palmer Hospital for Children and Women. "Are you cold?" Ashley was asked.

"I'm fine," she answered. One week ago, Ashley Ann Himes miracu-

Tears mark retirement for Oviedo girls' basketball coach

OVIEDO - Throughout his sometimes tumultuous, usually successful four-year tenure as the Oviedo girls' basketball coach, Tom Bieri was known for his emotional style of coaching. He yelled, laughed, pushed

and sometimes ended up horizontal as he rallied his girls to a four-year winning run.

Sunday, though the emotions changed. Bieri cried as he announced

his retirement after the Lions' season ending basketball-banquet. His weren't the only tears in the Oviedo cafeteria. Bieri created a huge legacy

after only four years at the Oviedo helm, which he took after seven years at Bishop Moore. As coach of the Lions, Bieri led them to a 76-41 record. Prior to Bieri's hiring, the Lions had gone 18-52 in the previous three seasons.

It was his second rebuilding job. Prior to taking over at Bishop Moore, the team had won one game in four sea-

sons. It took Bieri two years to build a winning record and. while he coached varsity, he started a junior varsity pro-gram that won 53 straight during his tenure.

Bieri retired due to his duties with the Orlando Magic where he runs the team's Junior Magic program and basketball clinics. During the past season at Oviedo, Bieri said he found his duties with the Magic harmful to his health, but more importantly, they were affecting his ability See Coach, Page 3A

Winter Springs assesses city's storm damage

WINTER SPRINGS - At the Feb. 23 city council meeting. Commissioner Eddie Martinez, followed by the rest of the commission, commended the city's police, fire and public works departments for acting so swiftly in helping residents through the difficult period following the tornadoes that hit Central Florida early Monday.

The city did sustain some damage from the storms:

*Total damage exceed \$345,000 to structures. Dollar damages to repair buildings and all other costs due to the storm have not been tabulated yet.

"The major areas affected was in the "Highlands" Subdivision area on 434. The areas most affected was in the Sheoha Boulevard section.

*Eight homes received damages exceeding \$10,000. *Eighty-two structures were damaged by the storm: homes,

condo's and apartments.

*Included in private damage was roof damage, tile damage, trees crashing through homes and a chimney falling off of a

On the subject of neighbor helping neighbor, Bob Beck the Winter Springs Fire Dept. Training Chief said, "as we came across people in the area while doing our inspections, we constantly heard people saying that they were OK and that they checked on their neighbors to make sure that they were all right. All in all, it doesn't look like we got a direct hit."

Volunteers, assistance abundant for victims of tornado damage

SANFORD - For many, recovery from the Feb. 23 tornadoes which struck Central Florida will take years. Most of the work during the first eight days following the storm has involved cleanup of debris. A few, with less damage, have begun repairing homes which were damaged but not destroyed.

In the Sanford/Seminole County area, officials say volunteers have shown up in record numbers. Emergency Operations Incident Commander Fire Chief Terry Schenk, said, as of 5 p.m. Saturday, over 250 volunteers had been turned away, with more on Sunday,

We have had a wide range of community members from Boy Scouts and Sheriff's Youth Deputies to senior citizens," Schenk said. "Their support has been vital."

Most of the work over this past weekend was the collection of debris from the affected areas. Schenk said, "While we do have a great deal of debris to collect, we have also made it a priority to ensure the safety of the volunteers."

Sheriff Don Eslinger agreed. Volunteer and staff safety is paramount to the continued success of these efforts," he said. Rain showers Saturday forced officials to send many volunteers home, but they were able to return Sunday and continue their work.

Church holds memorial for tornado victims

SANFORD - Though hundreds of voices were lifted to Heaven in thanksgiving for both the lives of those who had been killed in last week's tornado in Sanford and for those who have dedicated their time and resources to helping the survivors, a pall hung over the assembled crowd at the First Baptist Church in Sanford on Sunday evening.

The memorial service for the dozen victims of the weather disaster drew nearly 300 participants, including more than three dozen law enforcement and fire rescue officers from across the county. Red Cross volunteers in their work vests huddled together, heads bowed in prayer. Community helpers, eyes watery from lack of sleep and the reality of the situation, came to show their support and to be comforted by the words.

A few survivors, in donated clothes, carrying their belongings in backpacks, were also among those in the congregation.

Many dabbed their eyes as representatives of the Sanford Ministers Fellowship spoke of the losses suffered by the community and of the great strength which had been gained by the tragedy.

"We are here to express our sorrow and our solidarity," Dr. Wayne Harvey, pastor of the First Baptist Church, said. "As time passes we need to keep working together as brothers and sisters.

The pastor said the ministerial community had, and would continue to make itself available for those who needed guidance in coping with the tragedy that had ripped the community apart.

Sister Thelma Mike led the congregation in prayer asking for divine guidance in finding relief from the hurt and pain

caused by the tornado.

UB. Heal Love Strengthen as we go from day to day," she prayed.

Judge Carmine Bravo told the crowd he and his wife had struggled to make sense of the tragedy that had caught the community so off guard. He said they turned to the Bible for comfort and had prayed to God to try to find out what it all meant.

"In Acts 2, we are reminded that we do not know the day the Master will return," he said. We have to always be prepared."

The church was appointed simply with a single flower arrangement placed on gold cloth in front of the podium at center stage. A color guard made up of members of the Seminole County Sheriff's Office and the Sanford Police Department placed the flags of

the city, the state and the nation on the stage with solemn

A single candle, lit as the Rev. Jeff Krall of the Family Worship Center read the names of the 12 who died in Sanford the week before, burned under a yellow spotlight so that each of the victims could be remembered by the community one last time.

The 30-member choir in blue-trimmed white robes led the assembly through three verses of "Amazing Grace" and Because He Lives I Can Face Tomorrow." Joy for those who had been taken to the next life and great celebration for those who had been spared was evident in the cheers of "Amen" following the singing of the hymns.

Adding to the comforting words, Rev. Tom Tkachuk of

Grace Fellowship noted that the Bible promises to help ease the pain for those who feel the loss.

We have always known that these disasters happen somewhere else to someone else," he said. But the Beatitudes holds the promise that blessed are those who mourn for they will be comforted.*

The Sanford and Seminole County community has grown stronger and more united as a result of the tragedy, he added.

The Rev. Elljah Richardson expressed sorrow that it had taken such devastation to bring the community together. but Joy that so many had come together to help out those in need.

A collection taken during the service brought in nearly \$3,000 to help those who are still in need of assistance.

> toll from the tornadoes to 41. The body has now been positively identified as that of Joel F. "Lucky" Heaton, 53, reported missing after a tornado swept his travel trailer into the St. Johns River from a fish camp on State Road 46 at approximately 1 a.m. on Feb.

Originally, two persons were reported missing. The first,

Freddie Padgett, was spotted by helicopter two hours after the tornado struck, clinging to a boat in the middle of the river. He was rescued by Volusia County Fire Service officers.

The search for Heaton continued with sheriffs office divers, boats, helicopters, patrol units and investigators from Volusia and Seminole County as well as the Florida Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission. According to Volusia Sheriff

Bob Vogel, at approximately 11:30 Sunday morning, the owner of Gator Landing Riverside Grill in Sanford spotted the body floating in

the river. He was on a large pontoon boat conducting a tour at the time.

Marine units from both Volusia and Seminole County were in the area and responded to the scene along with Investigator Greg Kunkle of the Volusia County Major Unit. The body Case reportedly was clothed in blue jeans but no identification was immediately located.

Monday, Volusia County medical examiners obtained fingerprints from the body which were used to provide a positive identity. The specific cause of death was not immediately released by the investigators.







Will Lake Mary firefighters, cops get a brand new home?

LAKE MARY - Lake Mary has been contemplating a re-placement building for its police and fire departments for a considerable length of time. Now, according to City Manager John Litton, the project appears to be heading toward reality.

When It became obvious that the present police and fire station facilities at 235 Rinehart Road were insufficient, several concepts were brought forward. One of the most-often discussed involved creating a new police department and refurbishing the present fire department building. After an extensive evaluation of the ideas however, it was determined that the buildings did not meet federal requirements for such uses, and the cost according to Litton, went higher and higher until it became

in population, businesses and industry, more and more police and fire fighting equipment has been and continues to be needed, calling for more storage room at both police and fire facilities than ever before.

At this week's city commission meeting, a request is to be made to purchase a speed monitoring trailer for the police department, which would be required to be housed at the station when not in use.

The most recent new unit received by the fire department is the 1,500 gallon pumper truck, a large piece of equipment for such limited space.

Fire Lieutenant Salsbury said the department also has no room for supply storage. "And when there isn't enough room for chairs for everyone in the dayroom, you know we are crowded," he responded.

Now, pending approval from the city commission, Litton said the latest idea is to create two buildings, one for each department, on property on the west side of Rinehart Road, adjacent to the Stemens Telecommunications facility.

That's what we have been looking into most recently," Litton said, and I believe it may receive support.

The Lake Mary City Commission has scheduled a work seasion to discuss the proposal for this Thursday afternoon, beginning at 5:30, prior to the regular commission meeting.

At that time, T. Gray Frazier, who has provided the city with a number of municipal structure plans and concepts in the past, will make a presentation.

The work session will be held in the commission chamber of city hall, 100 N. Country Club

Subterranean termites most destructive

seen swarming during daylight hours mainly from January through May. Termites are separated into three basic groups: drywood termites, dampwood termites, and subterranean termites. By subterranean termites are the most destructive group.

Winged termites: Normally, termites live inside the wood or nest in the ground and do not have wings. In the spring, winged termites are found swarming in what is called a nuptial flight. Mating occurs during these flights, and new colonies are formed. The presence of winged termites inside your house is probably an indication of wood infestation in your home, but they can also come from outside sources. Termites are attracted to light and many times their bodies and wings are found on window sills. Front wing vein patterns are used for identification.

Identification: Termites are not the only insects that fly in large quantities during this

time of the year. Ants and some types of bees also have nuptial flights, and they can be easily confused with termites. An easy way to identify a termite from an ant, a wasp or a bee, is by looking at the wings of the insect. Ants, wasps, and bees have 4 clear wings, the two front wings are bigger than the hind wings. Ants and bees have a "wasp waist". Termites have 4 clear wings of equal size and their bodies do not have the "wasp waist" characteristic of ants and bees. Subterranean and drywood termites require completely different methods of control, therefore, it is important to identify them correctly. If you are not sure, bring a sample to the Cooperative Extension Service, we will identify them for you.

termites: Subterranean These termites need to nest in the soil in order to survive.

They are by far the most common kind of termite found in Florida. Their tunnels made of mud can be seen along the surface of foundations and damaged wood, with galleries following the grain of wood. Cracks in concrete iounda: tions, concrete slab floors, and places where pipes and utilities go through the slab, are common avenues of entry for subterranean termites your house.

Drywood termites: These termites nest exclusively in wood and do not need contact with the soil. They remain hidden within the wood or other material on which they feed, so they are seldom seen. Their galleries or tunnels in the wood cut across the grain of the wood and destroy both spring wood and the harder summer growth. Their droppings are in the form of hard dry pellets, which can be seen falling from the affected wood, and can be easily identified with the aid of a hand lens.

Drywood termite control: If the damage is detected early, the colony can be controlled by removing and replacing the damaged wood or by the application of an insecticide. If the damage is too extensive for local treatment, it may be neces-

sary to tent and fumigate the entire building. Fumigation can only be done by a licensed pest control operator. Methyl bromide and sulfuryl fluoride are used by the chemical companies to control this pest.

Subterranean termite control: Prevention is most important. When houses are built in Florida, the surrounding area is treated to control termites. But they may eventually reach your house and must be controlled chemically. Professional pest control companies should be called to do this job.

The Sentricon System: Recently, a new termite control method has been introduced in the market. The method utilizes a slow-acting and nonrepellent toxic substance that is incorporated into a balt, the chemical interferes with the molting process which is necessary for the insects to grow. The produce known as hexaslumuron was evaluated by University of Florida researchers found it to be effective in controlling large colonies of subterranean termites. This insect growth regulator is environmentally friendly because it will control only one kind of insect with a specific chemical that will not harm men or the

Get help for problem drinkers

DEAR DR. GOTT: My husband, who is 47 years old, drinks between four and eight cans of beer a day. Some days, he does not drink at all; on others, he clearly exceeds his limit. Is this pattern harmful to his health?

DEAR READER: Without a doubt. As I have written before, the average adult cannot physically tolerate more than 4 ounces of spirits - or the equivalent in wine or beer - a day, without risking serious medical complications including liver and heart disease. Your husband averages a sixpack a day, an amount that is clearly excessive. Thus, over time, he will

probably suffer unpleasant consequences from his habit. But that is not the whole story.

As most recovering alcoholics know, it's not so much a question of the QUANTITY one consumes. Rather, the PATTERN of drinking is the key element in the diagnosis of alcoholism. An alcoholic need drink only once a year, but if he gets blotto, that's alcoholism.

Normal people can take or leave alcohol. It's no big deal and they don't pay it a second thought. On the other hand, the alcoholic NEEDS to drink; one is never enough, and daily consumption is the rule.

Despite the brevity of your description, I strongly auspect that your husband has crossed the line: At best, he is a problem drinker; at worst, an alcoholic. (Only he can make that distinction after treatment and counselling.) I believe that you should share your concerns with him - even show him my reply to your question. I am certain that he could be helped by going to a meeting of Alcoholica Anonymous, as you could be by attending Al-Anon, a "sister" group for people whose loved ones abuse alcohol. Or, as an alternative, consider involving your family physician. who can advise you and your husband and bring to bear the available resources in your community.

response, you correctly advised a reader that folic acid supplements would not lower his cholesterol level. Do you think that the reader was confused? Perhaps he wanted to lower his level of homocysteine, since this substance has been implicated as a cause of premature arteriosclerosis and heart disease.

DR. GOTT PETER

DEAR READER: Quite possibly. There's a lot of interest now in homocysteine. And, as you pointed out, high levels are associated with heart disease. Folic acid supplements appear to reduce homocysteine in the bloodstream. Whether this therapy will someday become the standard is still a question. Nonetheless, your point was well-taken.
