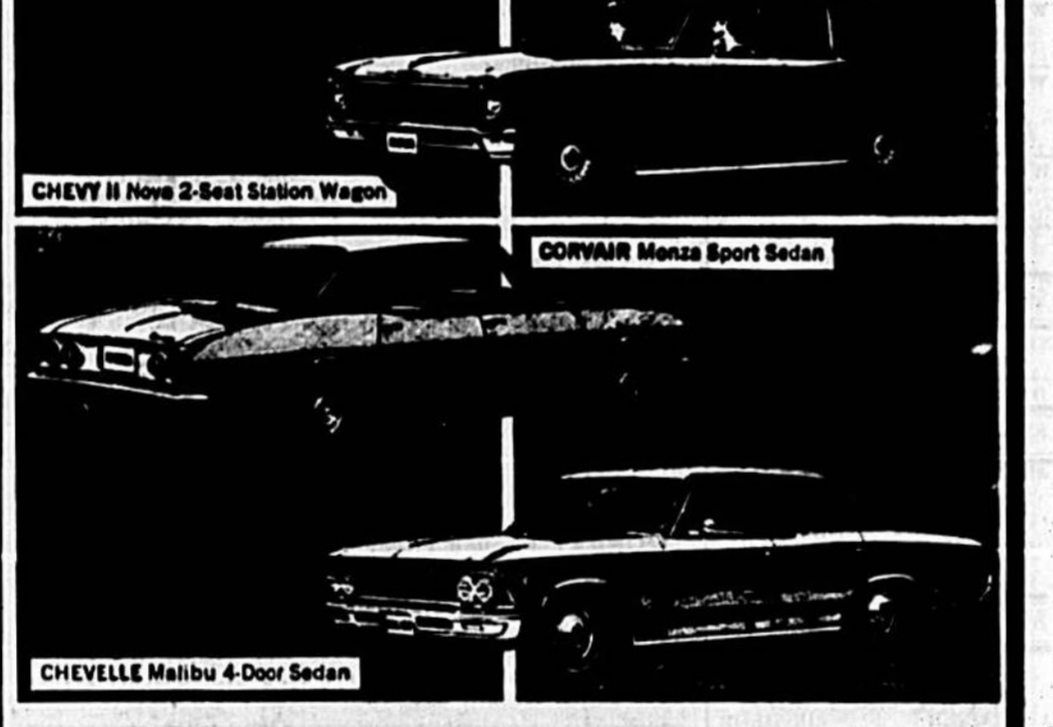

We don't hear much about the "middle class" any more. There was a time when critics of society took pleasure in attacking the middle class as the repository of political virtues, the fountainhead of anti-fascism, the fortress of capitalism and progress.

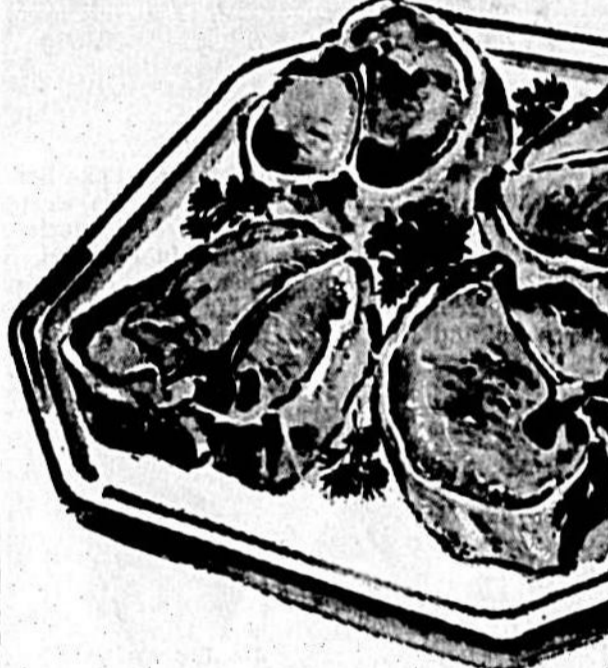

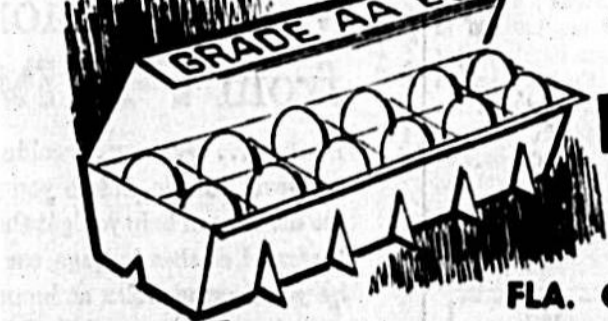

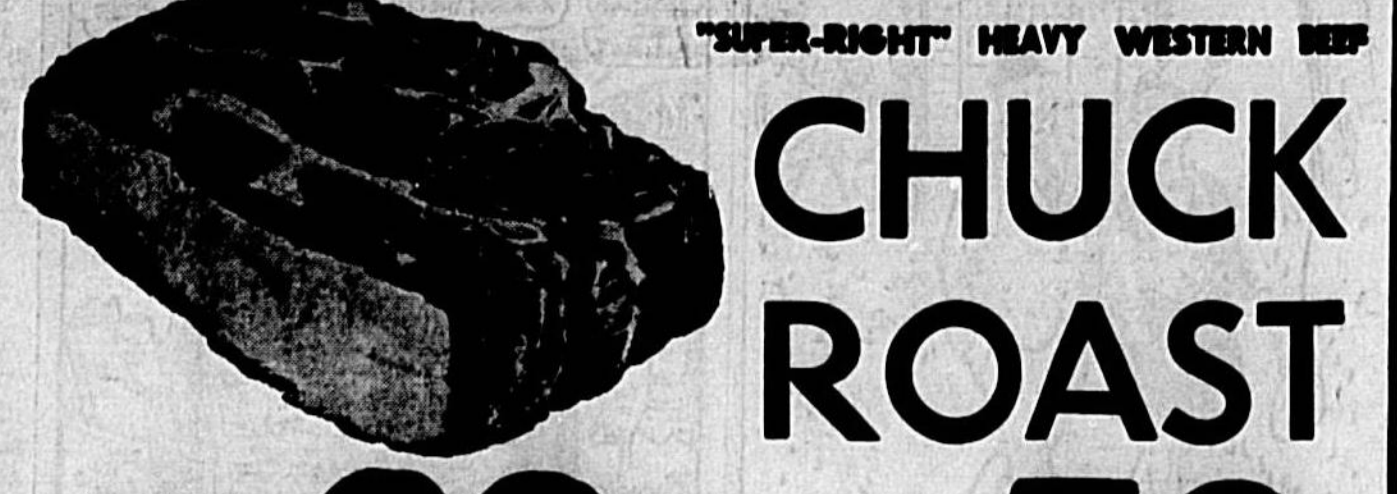
