11 KNOWN DEAD IN HOTEL FIRE AT LANSING

Kerns Building Guttled By Early Morning Blaze Which May Prove Fatal To 40

LANSING, Mich., Dec. 11.—(A.P.)—An early morning fire in zero weather turned the Kerns Hotel into a death trap today and with 11 known dead, police and firemen predicted the number of fatalities might reach forty. Their escape cut off by flames, many guests jumped from upper windows, some to the street and others into the Grand River which flows at the rear of the hotel.

A score or more of the guests were state legislators here for a special session.

Five of the known dead were drowned. Five others died of injuries suffered in leaping to street.

Fleeing witnesses told of stumbling over the body of David Monroe, assistant hotel manager, who apparently died of suffocation or injuries.

The incomplete list of injured at hospitals, some of whom are not expected to recover, stood at 27.

No complete list of the missing could be compiled because hotel records, including the register, apparently were destroyed. Police and firemen, however, said they believed the hotel ruins still blazing, fitfully and too hot to permit an investigation, contained probably 20 bodies, and (Continued on Page Two)

Otis Curry Drowns In Lake Butler At Dunedin Sunday

Otis Curry, young pitcher who starred as a member of the Sanford Club in the Central Florida Baseball League during 1935, was drowned accidentally in Lake Butler near Dunedin Sunday afternoon.

Young Curry, 26 years of age, sank to his death after a stubborn battle against cold and exhaustion. With him went E. H. Marston, 58, Dunedin merchant, and his son, Clarence Marston, 25.

They were thrown into the water when their boat overturned as its occupants attempted to change seats. They clung to the slippery keel for two hours or more before releasing their holds and slipping to death before the horrified eyes of a fourth member of the party, Gail Wallace, 25, of Dunedin.

Wallace said that they dropped off one by one in the cold water. He could not recall which man disappeared first. Wallace clung to the boat for three hours before his yells for help were heard by Leo Patras, fishing camp proprietor on the east shore of the lake. Wallace was brought to shore at about 7:00 o'clock Sunday night.

The bodies were found at about midnight, Marston and his son clinging together. Curry found a few feet away.

Curry is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. S. W. Curry, and five brothers, William, Bryant, Wylie, Ariel and Oren, all of Dunedin. He was well known in Sanford and Central Florida.

Dr. Dafoe, 'Country Doctor' Who Brought Quintuplets Into World, Visits New York

NEW YORK, Dec. 11.—Dr. Allan Roy Dafoe, the country doctor from the north woods of Canada who brought the Dionne quintuplets into the world, arrived yesterday on his first visit to civilization in many years.

The grey-haired little doctor accented with a calm smile the formalities of a New York welcome as he was shepherded out of the station by a squad of towering policemen who made him seem even smaller than he is.

The first thing he did, after reaching his hotel, was to take a Staten Island ferryboat and have a look at New York's skyline from the water. The second was to stroll in the subway, clinging to a strap even though the seat in front of him was empty.

He is going to spend the week here, in Washington, and at Johns Hopkins Hospital in Baltimore, & he plans to return to Calcutta, Ont., next Friday or Saturday.

While in New York, he wants to see "all the things we don't have up North," the Empire State Building, the elevated, the zoo, and "maybe a night club."

Dr. Dafoe said the quintuplets are "all doing well, though it's pretty cold up there."

"They're well babies and happy babies," he said. "Pretty, too. They're really handsome."

"They have increased their total weight from 9 pounds and 12 ounces a week after birth to 38 or 39 pounds. They are about normal weight now. They can raise themselves and wiggle around now, they have quite a lot of hair," (Continued on Page Three)

BABSON CITES 12 CITRUS INDUSTRY TRUTHS' ABOUT DEADLOCK ENDS U. S. BUSINESS BY AGREEMENT

JACKSONVILLE, Dec. 11.—Roger W. Babson, noted business statistician, in an address here last night before the Jacksonville chamber of commerce, cited 12 "truths about today's business" to show that prosperity is improving. He said all that is needed now is to Washington "to attend to its own business of running an honest and efficient government, and quit meddling up more with business until business has adjusted itself to the revolutionary change already put into effect."

His 12 signs indicating prosperity is returning were given as follows:

"Had business and financial nations were consistently being cleaned up. Private and corporate debts are being rapidly reduced. The debts are being cleaned for a return of good business as soon as political and labor leaders come to their senses.

"More money is available for expansion today than ever before in the history of this country. Some base for a great period of inflation.

"Total inventories have been steadily declining during the past 12 months. Any marked business pickup might easily cause a sharp rise in prices and retailers for more merchandise.

"An analysis of department store sales shows that the unit or quantity sales is increasing more rapidly than the dollar volume compared with a year ago.

"In October, 1934, 43 major companies declared dividends against back accumulations compared with only 18 of such companies declaring such dividends in October, 1932. A similar increase took place in the total number of dividend increases.

Statistician Thinks Government Should Quit Its Meddling

Early inauguration of market control now seems certain.

TALLAHASSEE, Dec. 11.—(A.P.)—Early inauguration of market control in Florida appears likely yesterday as Roger W. Babson reported in Jacksonville a "substantial agreement" between groups in the citrus industry was reached in a four-hour conference here.

Armed with the understanding, the content of which was not announced, the governor hurried to Washington to present it to the Federal Department of Agriculture, which proposed the marketing control agreement. He is due in Washington at noon today.

The understanding was summed up as an agreement in principle of the citrus marketing control committee. For weeks the Florida Citrus Exchange and the Citrus Growers' Clearing House Association have been at odds over selection of the committee membership, while they have agreed upon the desirability of marketing control.

For four hours yesterday, eight representatives of the citrus industry met around a conference table with Babson, acting as mediator, to discuss a compromise of a marketing control plan, and the citrus marketing situation. As the meeting ended, the governor made the announcement yesterday.

Ships Reach Crippled Jap Boat Near Azores

JOHNSON SAYS ROOSEVELT NRA IS DEAD ASKS FOR AID AS A DODO IN CRIME WAR

Johnson said that the NRA had been a "total failure" and that he had resigned because he had "lost faith in the NRA."

The forecast of temperatures suddenly falling today is said to be due to the generally rapid movement of a high pressure area from the West, causing decidedly colder weather.

Weather Bureau at Jack says that a slight thaw of snow which melted last night will be about five degrees above the normal for this time of year.

tion for the country is ahead of a year ago; while domestic power consumption is running at the highest figure of all time.

"Failures continue at a very low level. This is further evidence that the bad situations are being rapidly eliminated. Mortgage foreclosures are at the lowest levels for years.

"Collections are distinctly improving. In fact, housewives are paying up their back bills instead of buying a large amount of merchandise. When these back bills are paid up, a jump in the retail business should take place.

"Even if hard to believe, statistics show that labor troubles are dropping off sharply; although those strikes that do occur are receiving far more publicity in the newspapers.
