Land deal investigated

TALLAHASSEE — A controversial land deal completed by the city in 1988 is under investigation by the Leon County Sheriff's office, state authorities and the FBI, said several city officials.

The deal for 3,000 acres near the airport in Wakulla County was negotiated between the U.S. Forest Service, and the city, which swapped some other property to get the land.

Authorities said Jim Crews, then a Leon County Commissioner and now the husband of Tallahassee Mayor Dorothy Inman, accepted a commission on the land deal while also working with the non-profit Trust for Public Land.

Crews has since resigned from the trust, which prohibits such commissions. City officials who were in office in 1988 said Thursday they had been interviewed by investigators about the land deal. But they declined to elaborate.

Investigators also declined to discuss the inquiry.

Mack wants baseball now

ST. PETERSBURG — U.S. Sen. Connie Mack of Florida said he would not wait until next year for Major League Baseball to award a franchise to Florida.

Earlier this week, National League expansion chairman Douglas Danforth, who chairs the Pittsburgh Pirates, said it would be at least 1991 before any league expansion would be announced.

But Mack said Thursday he hopes to pressure baseball commissioner Fay Vincent to speed up the timetable. Mack and Vincent are set to meet Tuesday.

St. Petersburg, which recently opened a new domed stadium, and Miami are considered likely candidates for a Major League Baseball team.

Cop killer executed

Faulty chair sends fire, smoke cloud from inmate's head

STARKE — A faulty electric chair component shot out flames around convicted killer Jesse Tafero's head as he was executed early Friday for the 1976 slayings of two police officers at a highway rest stop.

Three surges of electricity were sent through Tafero's body, the first at 7:07 a.m. EDT and the last at about 7:10 a.m. EDT. Each time, flame erupted from a headpiece and a cloud of smoke rose to the ceiling.

Ashes fell to the prisoner's shirt as he was pronounced dead at 7:13 a.m. EDT.

A replacement sponge in a headpiece caused the flames, said Florida State Prison spokesman Bob Memaster, who added he had never before seen flames during an electrocution.

"It appears unusual. That amount of smoke is unusual," Memaster said.

After the first two jolts, Tafero's chest moved, and he appeared to continue breathing. But Memaster said that prison physician Dr. Frank Kilgo believed Tafero was dead within seconds of the first jolt and said there was no indication he felt pain.

"There was a fault in the headpiece. ... It was not (human) tissue that was burning. It was the headpiece," Memaster said. "There was some arcing in the headpiece itself. We believe he was dead after the first few seconds. I believe he was unconscious from the moment (electricity) hit him."

In Florida executions, electricity passes from a wire into a sponge filled with saline solution that is placed directly on the head, Memaster said.

"It was the sponge. They had put the first new

sponge in there since 1979. It was not an appropriate sponge," he said. "It was the sponge causing the fire."

Tafero, 43, with his head shaven and his eyes covered by a black mask, smiled briefly as he was strapped into the electric chair at Florida State Prison and had electrodes attached to his head and lower right leg.

Tafero, whose final request for a stay late Thursday was denied by the U.S. Supreme Court, devoted his last words to criticizing the system that led to his death.

"Well, I'd like to say that the death penalty as applied in the state is very arbitrary and capricious," Tafero said. "For instance, this morning I filed two motions in court. It seems the federal court judge and circuit court judge have just ignored my petitions. They were not heard by any court in the state of Florida."

"I think it's very unfair. I think it's time that everyone woke up to see that the same laws that can go against crime can go against you."

Seminole County Counselor of the Year helps mold the lives of Sanford students

SANFORD — Ed Wilson, a guidance counselor at Seminole High School, has been named Counselor of the Year by his peers in Seminole County.

Born to migrant workers and raised in Seminole County, Wilson wanted to be a social worker when he was young, but decided he had to pursue a career as a teacher.

"Being a migrant child I knew the pitfalls facing many students," he noted. "I wanted to be able to help."

A graduate of Oviedo Elementary School and Crooms High School, Wilson worked his way through college at a variety of jobs. He earned his bachelors degree in social studies from Bethune-Cookman College and a masters degree in counseling from Hampton College in Hampton, Virginia.

"It was hard work getting through college," he admitted, but added that his parents had always taught him to stick with a project once he had begun.

"They always taught me to set my mind to a job and do it all the way through," he said.

He said despite the fact he had to work to earn his tuition, it took "the normal four years" to finish college.

Wilson began his teaching career 32 years ago at Midway Elementary School teaching all subjects in the eighth grade.

"Back then," he said, "elementary school was first through eighth grade and the teachers taught them everything."

In 1962, Wilson moved on to Crooms High School where he

Jail guard jailed

SANFORD — A Seminole County jail guard is behind bars today and unemployed, following his arrest last night for allegedly supplying federal prisoners at the jail with narcotics, food and alcoholic beverages.

Gerald Newton Bartel, 29, of 729 St. John's River Drive, Sanford, who has been a Seminole jail guard for two years, was arrested at his home at about 6:15 p.m. Thursday night.

He is charged with possession of cocaine and marijuana with intent to distribute, conspiracy to introduce controlled substances into the jail, and six counts of introduction of contraband into the jail.

Boulevard beautification nears reality

LAKE MARY — Beautification of Lake Mary Boulevard, after years of brainstorming, study and debate, is one step closer to reality.

The Lake Mary city commission last night selected Canin Associates, an Orlando urban and environmental landscape architectural firm, to begin contract negotiations for the landscaping of Lake Mary Boulevard.

Canin Associates and the firm of Glattig, Lopez, Kercher, Anglin, Inc., both made presentations last night before the Lake Mary City Commission. They had been selected as the top two choices out of ten responses, following a call for sealed proposals on the project made in January of this year.

The Seminole County commission delegated the ranking process to the Lake Mary commission. Seminole County Planning Director Tony VanderWorp assisted in the review of proposals and in the narrowing process that determined the final two proposals.

Once the contracts are approved

Animal control director calls it quits

SANFORD — Ronald Lefebvre has become the latest person to pass through the revolving door at the director's office of the Seminole County Animal Control Division.

Lefebvre, after only 18 months on the job, resigned suddenly yesterday afternoon after receiving a critical job evaluation by Public Safety Director Gary Kaiser.

Lefebvre becomes the fourth director to leave the division since 1986. He said Kaiser "ushered" him out of the office after he submitted his resignation at 3:30 p.m. Lefebvre said he will leave central Florida and return to Davie, which is near Fort Lauderdale.

"I think it was personalities a lot," Lefebvre said today. "It was all his way or nothing. He once told me animal control is his airline. In my resignation letter I put a little dig in there. I said 'Well I guess you were right, and the plane lands May 11, 1990, and I'm getting off.'"

Kaiser declined to comment Thursday, saying he did

not want to discuss personnel matters.

Lefebvre, who has an easy-going personality and a non-confrontational management style, and Kaiser, who management style has been described by others as militaristic, had clashed.

Lefebvre said after Animal Control was placed under Public Safety last December, Kaiser made decisions without consulting him or chief animal control officer (ACO) Tom LaCross. He said a vacant ACO position was eliminated and replaced with another dispatcher without their consultation.

Lefebvre said when Kaiser asked him to prepare a public complaint handling policy, he prepared one that required himself to address the problem as division director. He said Kaiser replaced the procedure with one that directed complaints to the Public Safety Department instead.

In a scathing March 29 job evaluation on file in the county Employee Relations Department, Kaiser criticized Lefebvre's "laissez-faire" management style and gave him four below-acceptable marks on a seven item

Russell drug trafficking trial delayed as pleas negotiated

TAMPA — A Sanford man and his father had their Tampa hearing on trafficking charges delayed for a second time Thursday.

Joe Thomas Russell, 50, of Osteen and his son Jeffrey Thomas Russell, 34, of Sanford, and three co-defendants, are rescheduled to appear May 17 in U.S. District Court in Tampa, giving attorneys time to hammer out a plea agreement.

The trial had been postponed from early March, because of un-

availability of one defense lawyer. U.S. District Judge Elizabeth Kovachevich asked defense attorneys and federal prosecutors to step up their efforts to avoid taking the case to trial.

Facing charges of smuggling 628 pounds of marijuana into Sanford along with the Russells are Charles Lester Berry of Osteen; Gary Brickey of Dunnellon; and Antonio Laskott of Sanford, who is in jail on unrelated charges.

Also indicted in the June 1988 arrest were Isaac Villanueva and

Edgar Sanchez, both fugitives, and Debra Carol Aldinger, who has requested a re-arraignment hearing.

Ray LaPorte, Joe Russell's Tampa attorney, declined to comment on the case. However, Berry's attorney, Joel Dick, confirmed that he has met with federal prosecutors, but would not reveal the terms of a possible plea agreement.

U.S. Assistant Attorney Whitney Schmidt could not be reached for comment.

"All I can say is that the judge wanted us to continue to work with

the prosecution in order to resolve the case before it comes to trial," Dick said. "I really can't discuss anything right now because it could derail the negotiations."

The Russells were arrested by U.S. Customs agents and local lawmen June 7, 1988, when lawmen alleged they were waiting for an airplane delivering a load of marijuana at a remote strip at the Sanford Airport, east of Sanford.

Lawmen intercepted the plane and the Russells were arrested nearby.

Shuttle scientist cleared for flight

CAPE CANAVERAL — A civilian astronomer set to blast off aboard the shuttle Columbia May 17 was declared fit for flight Thursday, ending concern he might be bumped from the mission because of an unspecified medical problem.

Columbia and a seven-member crew — a post-Challenger record — are tentatively scheduled to take off at 12:45 a.m. EDT May 17 to kick off a long-awaited flight to study high-energy astronomical targets in an ongoing U.S. drive to explore the universe from space.

With launch processing in high gear, shuttle program chief Robert Crippen announced last week that astronomer Samuel Durrance, assigned to the crew in 1984, had developed an unspecified "medical condition" that could force NASA to bar him from the mission.

Durrance's backup, astronomer Kenneth Nordstreck, replaced his colleague last Saturday during a critical dress-rehearsal countdown at the launch pad, fueling speculation that Durrance would be bumped from the flight after more than six years of training.

But NASA spokesman Jeff Carr said Thursday Durrance had been cleared for launch.

Arson blamed for school fire

PENSACOLA — A fire blamed on arson at a middle school Thursday morning prompted Escambia County officials to close the school for the day and send more than 700 students home.

There were no injuries but the fire caused an estimated \$20,000 to \$25,000 damage to Brownsville Middle School, said Skl Gowitzke, a fire investigator with the Escambia County Sheriff's Department.

Gowitzke said officials have determined the fire was "intentionally set," but declined to say what was used to start the blaze. "Right now we're not releasing that," he said.

The fire was apparently set in the back of the school auditorium's stage. The fire was described as minor, but it caused a lot of smoke in the school. The students were evacuated, then sent home.

Bunny, bunny, who's got the bunny?

ORLANDO — Police said Thursday they suspect an animal rights group of stealing nine rabbits from a research laboratory.

The nine albino rabbits, valued at \$25 each, were stolen either Thursday morning or Wednesday night from Dawson Research Corp., said police Lt. Bill Long.

The burglars forced their way into the building, painted graffiti on inside and outside walls and removed the rabbits from their cages, said Long.

One of the spraypainted messages read, "ALF is war," a reference to the Animal Liberation Front.

Long said police took fingerprints but had identified no specific suspects.

Animal rights activists recently demonstrated outside the laboratory, claiming it was performing painful experiments on rabbits.

Father \$28,000 behind in child support

TAMPA — One of the state's 10 most wanted "deadbeat" dads was ordered Thursday to come up with more than \$28,000 in unpaid child support or spend 166 days in jail, state officials said.

Dennis Diaz, 39, was arrested in Los Angeles in March after state officials and local law enforcement personnel tracked him down on the basis of an anonymous tip to the state's child support hotline.

Diaz, a chiropractic consultant who was divorced from his wife in 1984, was one of ten delinquent dads singled out for publicity in November as part of a statewide effort to step up enforcement of child support orders.

Robert L. Johnson, who heads the Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services' child support enforcement office, said the ten-most-wanted program is responsible in part for the department's improved collection rate.

Cops put torch to marijuana cache

MILTON — The Panhandle county that for two years has led the state in the number of marijuana plants found and destroyed has seen another \$2-million-worth of the plants put to the torch, deputies said Thursday.

About 1,900 marijuana plants were found Wednesday on two parcels of land in northern part of the rural county in the Chumuckla area. There were no arrests.

A recent report from the Florida Department of Law Enforcement said Santa Rosa County led the state last year in the number of marijuana plants found and destroyed.

The county was far and away the leader, though some other north Florida counties also reported large numbers of marijuana plants destroyed last year, authorities said.

Santa Rosa County destroyed 8,701 plants in 1989, while the next highest number was in Polk County, with 4,383 plants found and destroyed.

Lake Mary agrees to purchase park

LAKE MARY — The Lake Mary City Commission last night agreed to go ahead with the purchase of approximately 35 acres of land between Country Club Road and Timacuan, but not before several questions from individual commissioners and the general public were satisfied.

The proposal to purchase the property was eventually approved unanimously by the commission.

The property, generally located to the northwest and across Country Club Road from the Grace United Methodist Church in the northern part of Lake Mary, will be used as an "active" park, that is, a park that will include a number of baseball and softball diamonds, tennis courts, and soccer or multi-purpose fields. Following a minor adjustment in the boundaries of the site several months ago, the city called for a review of the original appraisal of the property and found minor changes in the value, all to the city's advantage. As a result, the owner of the property, Timacuan

Golf and Country Club, offered the 35 acres, appraised at over \$1.5 million, to the city for \$700,000.

Each of the commissioners voiced approval of the project, though there was some concern over whether or not the money might be needed for other, more pressing needs. One such need was brought to light earlier during the same meeting, when City Attorney Ned Julian reported he had heard that "Florida Power Corporation was prepared to go to the mat," in its fight with the city over Lake Mary's requirement that the company bury its power lines along Lake Mary Boulevard.

Commissioner David Mealar questioned whether action should be delayed on purchasing the property until it is known if the money might be needed to finance the city's defense in the matter. In response, Commissioner George Duryea said he favored purchasing the park property.

"We need that recreation area more than we need buried cables," Duryea said.

Downtown apartment plan draws protest

SANFORD — The Planning and Zoning Commission last night turned down a request to develop an apartment complex in an area zoned commercial after several residents from surrounding neighborhoods poured into the city commission chambers to protest the motion.

The property at the southwest corner of Second Street and Elm Avenue contained a single family residence and a garage apartment in an area that has been zoned for special commercial use.

The commission voted unanimously to deny the request by Franklin Investment Group.

The single family residences as we can in that area," said Laura Strachila, a resident of the downtown historic district and president of the Sanford Historic Trust. "It's very close to the downtown business district and I don't think this going to help it."

Strachila was one of five people who spoke, but at least 20 people responded to Commissioner John Morris' call for a show of hands to determine the number there for the apartment issue.

Ken Stickler, representing the Franklin Investment Group told the commissioners that he intended to renovate and improve the building for multi-family residence.

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Republicans offer \$4.7 billion road package

TALLAHASSEE — House Republicans offered a \$4.7-billion transportation plan that they said meets objections raised by Gov. Bob Martinez when he vetoed an earlier transportation package.

The GOP plan raises as much money as the bill vetoed by the governor Wednesday, but it lacks the statewide 4-cent gasoline tax increase to which Martinez objected.

Instead, the GOP plan would permit county-wide gas-tax increases of up to 4 cents per gallon by referendum or a vote of the local commission.

There was no immediate response from Democratic leaders,

including House Speaker Tom Gustafson. But Gustafson said Wednesday that the governor's veto would kill chances for any transportation pact this year.

However, House Republican leader Dale Patchett and aides to the governor said they wanted to keep negotiations open.

"We're willing to work with Mr. Gustafson if he's willing to work with us," Patchett said at a news conference. "His policy was vetoed. Ours is the only game left in town."

"I think before this session's out, you'll see a transportation bill passed," said Brian Ballard, a top aide to the governor.

The Republican plan retains the increased motor-vehicle fees outlined in the House-Senate bill.

Peril in Peru

Peru is a struggling young democracy on the verge of collapse. Its principal threat is a hopelessly mismanaged economy that has depressed living standards alarmingly during the last five years. The economic chaos is exacerbated by a growing communist insurgency and a boom in narcotics trafficking. The Upper Huallaga Valley in northeastern Peru is the source of coca leaf for half of the world's cocaine.

Lima is in urgent need of assistance, both economic and military. But the Pentagon's sudden plan to establish a U.S. military training base in the Upper Huallaga to combat drug smugglers and guerrillas alike raises a bevy of red flags. Although the American operation may be sound, some hard questions should be answered before it is carried out.

For starters, is there broad-based support in Peru, both within the government and among ordinary citizens, for even a limited U.S. military presence in the country?

Under the Pentagon's \$35 million plan, an unspecified number of the Army's Special Forces personnel would train Peruvian soldiers at the new base in the heart of the coca-growing region. Six Peruvian battalions, about 5,500 soldiers, would be instructed in jungle warfare and other tactics. Their mission would be to counter drug traffickers and the brutal rebel movement known as Sendero Luminoso, Spanish for Shining Path.

In recent years these two groups have formed an unholy alliance: The senderistas provide armed protection for coca traffickers in exchange for a cut of the profits from the drug trade. The insurgents use the Andean highlands surrounding the Upper Huallaga River as their principal staging area. But they control large sections of Peru by terrorizing impoverished peasants and government officials; recently, they have been increasingly active in Lima as well, dynamiting electricity pylons and blacking out the city.

Consequently, the Peruvian military command is eager for Washington to supply military advisers and equipment to assist in the counterinsurgency campaign. The frontrunner in Peru's presidential contest, Alberto Fujimori, says he would oppose direct participation by Americans in the fighting, although he supports the limited U.S. training role outlined thus far.

Still, there is mounting concern among many Latin Americans that stepped up U.S. military involvement in the region as part of the drug war would compromise their national sovereignty. Before committing military personnel of any kind, the Bush administration should weigh the possibility that the action might actually boost support for the senderistas by triggering an anti-American backlash.

The second major issue that must be studied carefully by the White House is the level of support in this country for U.S. participation in Peru's battle against narcotics traffickers and guerrillas.

Disclosure of the Pentagon's plans prompted reflexive cries in some quarters that it would lead to another Vietnam-style military quagmire. There appears to have been very little consultation with Congress, much less a public debate on the merits and risks of the operation. Without solid backing on Capitol Hill and among U.S. voters, the administration's Andean strategy is likely to falter with the first American casualty in the Upper Huallaga.

Americana in the culture contest

The elusive search for a new emphasis for American post-Cold War foreign policy need not be so elusive. It is as close as a dollar bill.

To review the bidding, as described in this space earlier:

In large part due to modern communications, democracy is winning the world series. The global contest will not concern whether, but what kind of, democratic values will be influential.

Today, America is No. 1, more powerful than ever, the uni-power. In the future, the No. 1 country will be the one that is most successful in shaping the global democratic culture.

Only the American democratic culture has legs. Only Americans have the sense of mission — and gall — to engage in benign, but energetic, global cultural advocacy. Hence, the doctrine of "neo-manifest destiny" to help form a world that is user-friendly to American values.

If communications of values is the key, how do we get fully engaged? How to assure that American concepts of (for example) pluralism, capitalism, upward mobility, individualism and opportunity, become better understood?

There are things that government can do.

There are conditions that government can only encourage. Here are a few examples, big and small:

Our government communication policy is penny-wise-pound-foolish. Because of budget

restrictures, the Voice of America (VOA) recently had to consider cutting language services. Ridiculous.

Some budget-cutters say we should cancel a new American short-wave transmitter, now under construction in Israel, designed to carry VOA and Radio Liberty into the Moslem areas of the USSR. It's said the Soviets are no longer our adversaries. Maybe. But won't the uni-power (us) still have something to say to the Moslems of Central Asia, when Moslems are the fastest growing, and most volatile, segment of the global population?



The global contest will not concern whether, but what kind of, democratic values will be influential.

Most Americana, luckily, is spread by non-governmental means. But shouldn't the government, if possible, encourage such enterprises?

All commerce is not equal. The export of widgets is important. But more important is that American television programs and movies have fair access in other countries, that the English language spreads, that it is easier for tourists, teachers and students to come to America.

The global entertainment business is largely American. Yet, television programs and movies are not included in the General Agreement on Trade and Tariffs (GATT). That makes it difficult for us to keep foreign markets open and fair. But one reason entertainment is GATT-less is that Congress is under domestic pressure to keep the American maritime industry un-GATTed. That gives foreigners a case to keep entertainment out of the GATT negotiations. GATT it? In the modern world, box-office beats boats.

America is the No. 1 tourist draw. People aren't coming here just to see the Grand Canyon. Tourists absorb a sense of the American experience and take it home. Yet, of the free countries, we have the most stringent visa requirements. Other nations subsidize hostels so that young foreigners can visit. We don't.

Census dogfight only beginning

WASHINGTON — Entire towns were missed in the first sweep of the 1990 Census. Huge housing complexes received only one questionnaire. But long after those gaffes are forgotten, the political dogfight over the numbers will rage, because the Census is more than just a count to satisfy a statistician's curiosity. It is the tool used by Democrats and Republicans to dole out political favors and apportion power.

Nobody claims that the Census counts every last American. The debate behind the scenes is whether the Census Bureau should make educated guesses — statistical adjustments — to get closer to the truth. The debate is as old as the Census itself. When George Washington heard the tally from the 1790 Census, he was concerned that America didn't look as populous as he wanted England to think it was. The issue has now become so divisive that more than 50 lawsuits were filed after the 1980 Census by cities and groups claiming they had been undercounted. One group of cities, assuming the worst, sued in advance of the 1990 Census demanding a statistical adjustment for the uncounted masses. Here are the two cold facts that make that adjustment so controversial. More than \$50 billion in federal aid that goes to states and cities annually is based on population. More importantly, the undercounted are usually low-income and minority groups in the inner cities — traditionally Democrats. Not surprisingly, the Republican administration would rather not go out of its way to make sure those people get their names on the Census list.

Rep. Charles Schumer, D-N.Y., told us that if the Bush administration doesn't make an adjustment it will be hurting the people least able to help themselves. "Urban areas and poor people will lose both representation in Congress and billions of federal dollars," he said.

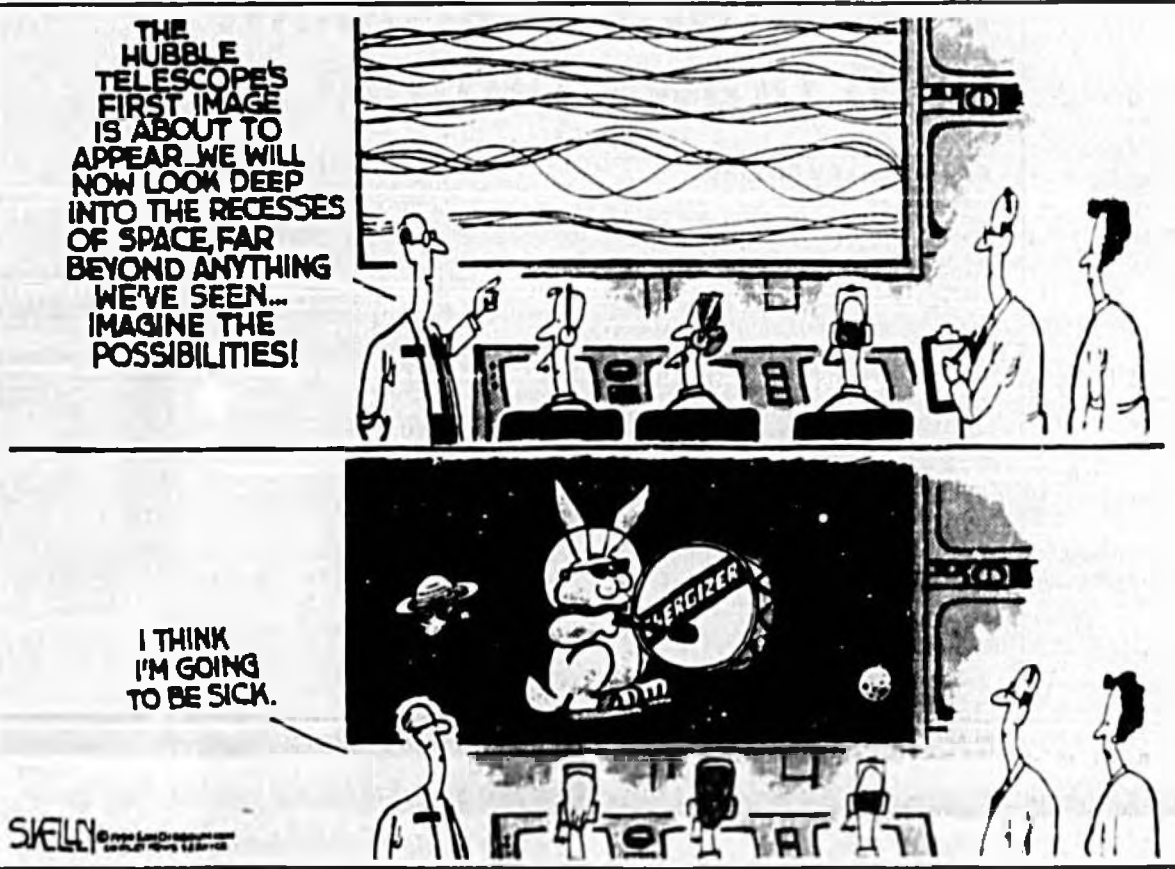
The conscientious statisticians at the Census Bureau ran a test in 1986 to find out how well their counting procedures worked. They found that they had missed 9 percent of the people in East Los Angeles, a poor area. The statisticians reached the logical conclusion that the 1990 numbers should be adjusted to count the uncountables. But the politicians at the Census Bureau's parent agency, the Commerce Department, would have none of it and declared there would be no adjustment. "The whole atmosphere at the Census Bureau changed," one former top bureau official told our associate Jim Lynch. The Census workers were discouraged by the intrusion of politics into their professionalism.

It was clear that the decision was made with a strong nudge from the Republican Party. Census sources told us there were long faces at the Republican National Committee whenever a Census official was summoned to brief the party on the impact of a numbers adjustment. As an obligatory gesture, the Commerce Department issued regulations for a possible adjustment in 1990, but the regulations make an adjustment almost impossible.

That suits the Republicans just fine. An internal memo from the Republican Research Committee, written by Reps. William Thomas, R-Calif., and Vin Weber, R-Minn., expressed the party's paranoia: "Statistical adjustment could entail cooking the books for political purposes. If the 1990 Census is adjusted, we can expect the majority party in Congress (Democrats) to dictate conditions for adjusting future censuses."

Brennan shames liberalism

WASHINGTON — How silly can a Supreme Court opinion be? William Brennan, working on the frontiers of absurdity in his dissent concerning child pornography, advances this principle of liberal jurisprudence regarding First Amendment law: The Court's constitutional duty is to assume that public officials — and, inferentially, the public — are nincompoops.

Ohio, like 18 other states, has a law criminalizing the possession of pornography featuring children under 18. Recently, the Court ruled, 6-3, that Ohio's law is constitutional. This ruling detonated Brennan, who said Ohio may be criminalizing family snapshots of children playing in the bathtub and billboard advertisements of Coppertone suntan lotion showing a little girl's bottom partially exposed by a dog pulling down the girl's bathing suit.

Ohio's statute criminalizes possession of material that portrays anyone under 18 "in a state of nudity" in a way that constitutes "lewd exhibition" or "a graphic focus on the genitals." The law exempts material possessed by the child's parents, or used for legitimate scientific, artistic or educational purposes.

An Ohio man was convicted of possession of four "sexually explicit" photographs of an adolescent male. The Ohio man said his conviction was inconsistent with a 1969 Court ruling. In 1969, the Court overturned a Georgia statute that criminalized the mere possession, even in the privacy of the home, of obscene films. The Court said the films at issue were indeed obscene and that their production and sale could have been prohibited constitutionally. However, the Court said the "broad power to regulate obscenity" does not extend to mere private possession.

But in the Ohio case, Justice White, joined by Rehnquist, Blackmun, O'Connor, Scalia and Kennedy, said Ohio's law dealing with child pornography is not fatally flawed, as Georgia's law was, by a "paternalistic" concern with controlling private thoughts. Rather, Ohio's purpose is to protect children by destroying "at all levels in the distribution chain" the market for the exploitative uses of children. Furthermore, a ban on possession of child pornography encourages the destruction of material that haunts the victims of abuse for years. And research indicates that "pedophiles use child pornography to seduce other children into sexual activity."

But Brennan (joined by Marshall and Stevens) was unmoved. He launched into his familiar kinds of arguments — who knows what "lewd" means, and woe to Coppertone, and hide grandpa's snapshots of the kids in the bathtub and (really) if Michelangelo's "David" depicts an adolescent, Michelangelo is a criminal in Ohio.

Well, now I regret the necessity of noting

here the raw details that follow. However, the folly of Brennan's liberal argument cannot be understood unless we descend from airy abstraction to the facts of the matter, as noted in the Court's ruling. Enough minced words about "sexually explicit" photographs. The photographs showed, among other things, a 14-year-old boy "with his legs over his head and his anus exposed" and "lying down with a plastic object which appears to be inserted in his anus."

These photographs are the "discourse" (Brennan's word) over which Brennan would throw constitutional protection. So, against 19 states' attempts to break the "distribution chain" of such stuff by fighting demand as well as supply, Brennan wields one or two (it's unclear which) irrationalist theories. One theory is that reason is incapable of arriving at defensible, non-arbitrary definitions of "lewd" and similar terms. The other theory is that Americans are so tenuously attached to reason that, entrusted with laws like Ohio's, they will unleash police raids on families' snapshots of babies on bearskin rugs.

Gracious, if the meaning of words like "lewd" are as slippery and fuzzy as Brennan says, how can there be reasonable, predictable enforcement of law against, say, "fraudulent" advertising or "negligent" behavior? And if Americans are, as Brennan evidently thinks, weirdly given to confusing family snapshots with pornography, if Americans are that nonsensical, what hope is there for democracy — the point of the First Amendment — anyway?

Such liberals are saved from absurdity by the virtue (in this case) of insincerity. They find the English language perfectly serviceable for complex legislation when it serves their ends.

Today the liberal position on the First Amendment is an intellectual pretzel. Liberals favor limits on political spending which, the Court concludes, is speech. So political speech — the core concern of the First Amendment — can be rationed by government. But possession of child pornography is a form of "discourse" that should be constitutionally beyond the reach of government.

tomorrow.

Tafero was the 22nd person executed in Florida and the nation's 124th since the Supreme Court lifted its ban on capital punishment in 1978. His execution came exactly one year after Florida's last execution, when Aubrey Adams was put to death.

Some 39 witnesses, including nine journalists and several law enforcement officers, were present when Tafero died. No relatives were present.

About a dozen anti-death penalty protesters held a candlelight vigil at the prison gates, some carrying signs with slogans such as "The death penalty brings out the killer in each of us." A handful of capital punishment supporters also were at the prison.

Tafero ate about half of his last meal of scrambled eggs, fried pepperoni, toasted Italian bread, two tomatoes, steamed broccoli, asparagus tips, fresh strawberry shortcake with real whipped cream, whole milk and hot tea, Memaster said.

At about 3 a.m. EDT Friday, he spoke by telephone to his girlfriend, Sonia Jacobs, one of his co-defendants, who is serving a life term at a women's prison in Broward County for the same

crime. He also spoke by telephone to his and Jacobs' daughter, Christina Tafero, 15, who lives with guardians in New York.

The 11th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in Atlanta and U.S. District Judge Lenore Nesbitt refused earlier Thursday to grant Tafero a stay, rejecting claims that mitigating circumstances were not considered by the trial jury that recommended the death penalty.

"Mr. Lefebvre has difficulty with decision making, planning and assigning, and discipline," Kaiser wrote. "An attitude of 'I'm not responsible' seems to permeate the administrative function of the division," he continued.

County personnel files show Lefebvre was placed on a 30-day probation following the report and told if he failed to improve in several management skills, he would be terminated. Lefebvre said Kaiser originally demanded his resignation, but later dropped that demand when he refused. Lefebvre appealed the evaluation, but Acting County Manager Bob McMillan upheld Kaiser on April 24.

In a follow-up evaluation April 30, Kaiser wrote Lefebvre that he had begun to issue employee policy bulletins as required but

still lacked in other areas, including providing statistical information to support division budget requests, review of flexible work hours for animal control officers streamlining paperwork and other areas.

Lefebvre said the large amount of paperwork demanded by Kaiser prevented many of the projects from being completed. Lefebvre said he prepared a streamlined report over a year ago that was not begun because he was told by county budget officials the county didn't have money to pay for it. It was recently approved, Lefebvre said.

Kaiser had given Lefebvre an additional 30 days, until June 29, to complete the objectives.

Prior to being under the Public Safety Department, the Animal Control Division has been under the county manager's office and the Health and Human Services Department.

A U.S. Postal Inspector dressed as a mail carrier delivered that package and the second package also addressed to Bartel's house. Bartel signed for and accepted both, Eslinger said.

CCIB agents moved in and arrested Bartel in connection with the first package. Agents opened the second package, and Eslinger said they found 11 grams of marijuana, about 6 grams of powder cocaine and a \$100 bill.

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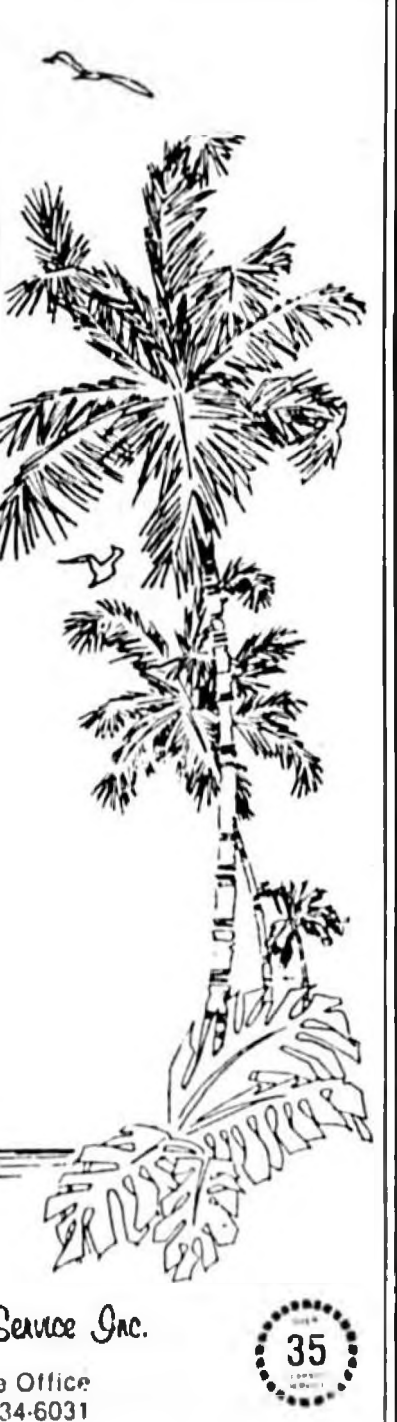

for landscaping. Lake Mary will be responsible for the first phase, which deals with improvements from Interstate 4, east to Country Club Road. Seminole County will be responsible for the project's second phase, which will continue the project further east to U.S. Highway 17-92.

In the Canin Associates presentation before the City Commission last night, Brian Davis gave a review of current and previous projects the firm has undertaken, including landscape design for 4,000 acres at Hunter's Creek in Orlando, the south terminal at Orlando International Airport, and the beautification of a portion of John Young Parkway.

During the final portion of the presentation, Davis displayed artists' conceptions of what Lake

Mary Boulevard could become, depending on the extent to which the City would go to develop the total plan. These included specially street paving, bikeways and pedestrian paths winding through a double row of crape myrtle and live oak trees, power lines hidden under sidewalks, modernistic traffic lights and signs and a tree-studded median area.

Although the contract will include only the first phase, Canin representatives estimated beautification of Lake Mary Boulevard from I-4 to U.S. 17-92 will cost about \$1.2 million.

Lake Mary City Manager John Litton and the city planning staff will soon begin negotiating sessions with Canin Associates. If an agreement is not finalized with Canin, the firm of Glatting, Lopez, Kercher, Anglin, Inc. will be considered.

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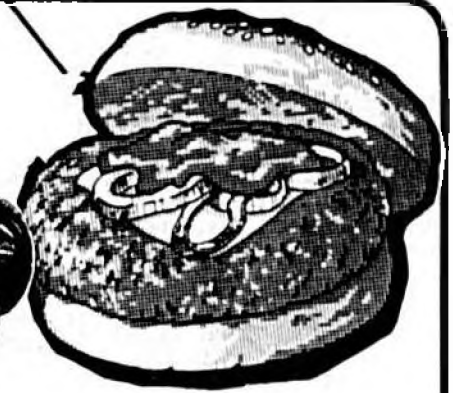
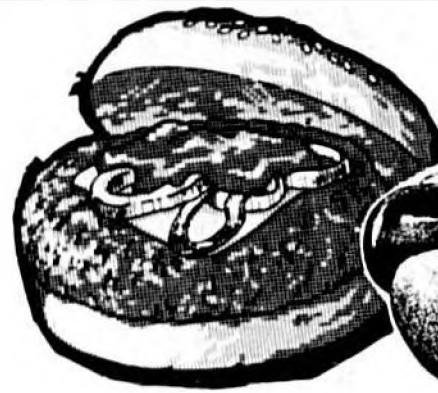
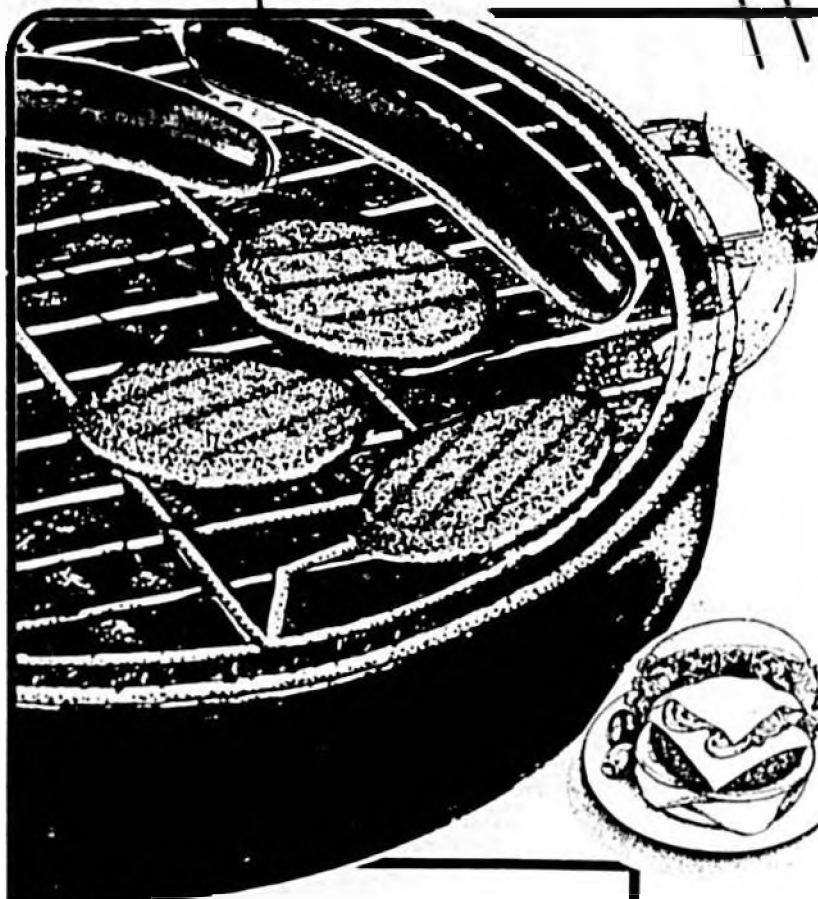

Tribe sweeps region

Seminole qualifies 16 for Class 3A state track meet

GAINESVILLE — Seminole High School came away with both the boys' and girls' team championships at the 3A-Region II track meet at the University of Florida on Thursday night, qualifying 16 athletes for next Friday's Class 3A state meet.

The Seminole boys scored 73 points, easily outdistancing second-place Gainesville-Buchholz (47). It went the same way in the girls' standings, Seminole scoring 61 as Ocala-Vanguard and Buchholz finished in a tie for second at 35.

"We qualified 10 people for state in all the events we thought they would qualify in," said Seminole boys' coach Ken Brauman. "There

was one additional state qualifier that we didn't expect, Tommy Hampton in the discus.

"It was a good meet. We thought we could score over 60 points and we scored over 70. We got three from the discus that we didn't expect."

While winning the team title, the Tribe grabbed a pair of individual championships, Carlo White winning the shot put with a toss of 58-9 and Robert Moore taking first in the triple jump with a leap of 47-11 1/2. Moore also combined with Henry Williams, George Frison and Joseph Murphy to win the 440 relay in 41.9.

Moore was Seminole's high-point scorer, picking up points for finishing second both in the shot put (52-4 1/2) and the long jump

(23-3 3/4). Williams also scored a few points, placing second in the triple jump (45-8), fourth in the 100-meter dash (11.1) and fourth in the 220-yard dash (22.1).

Maurice Thomas scored in two events for Seminole, placing second in the 120 high hurdles (14.8) and fourth in the 330 intermediate hurdles (38.3). Dalvin Davis came in third in the 880-yard run (1:58.0), Frison was third in the 220-yard dash (22.0) and Hampton came in fourth in the discus (141.6).

Willie McCloud was fifth in the shot put (49-4), good enough to score Seminole a couple team points but not quite good enough to qualify for the state meet. In all, 34 of Seminole's 73 team points came in the field events.

Finally, the Tribe was fourth in the mile relay, Eric Walker, Eldonte Stile, Davis and Murphy running a combined 3:23.2. That time might have been better had a Buchholz

runner not bumped Davis off the track during the third leg of the relay.

"Their runner knocked Dalvin off track," said Brauman. "Buchholz finished first, but they were disqualified. Then the Buchholz coach, who was the meet director, got together with the judges, decided it wasn't a foul and reinstated Buchholz."

For Coach Nate Perkins and the Seminole girls, Thursday night's results put them right where they want to be to make a run at a fifth consecutive state championship.

"We're going to work on technique this week, coming out of blocks and making handoffs on relays," said Perkins, in his first season as head coach of the girls' squad. "We could score 36 or 37 points at the state meet and that should win the state championship."

"We feel we can get 20-25 points at the state meet next week. And when you can score that many at the state meet, you are going to finish in the top five. Luck determines where you finish from there."

Also qualifying for state from Lyman is Kevin Padgett, who trailed Mitchell across the finish line in the two-mile.

Lake Brantley also made a good showing in the boys' meet with a seventh-place finish. The Patriots qualified three individuals for the state meet: Matthew Kaiser (third in the pole vault), John Feola (fourth in the mile run) and Matt Jewell (fourth in the 880-yard run).

Lake Mary finished eighth in the boys and will also send three to the state meet. Qualifying were Robert Robertson (second in the mile), Tyrone Gibson (fourth in the triple jump) and David Lewis (fourth in the 2-mile).

Also qualifying in the boys was Michael Goins from Oviedo, who

(19-4) is at Plantation-South Plantation (16-9).

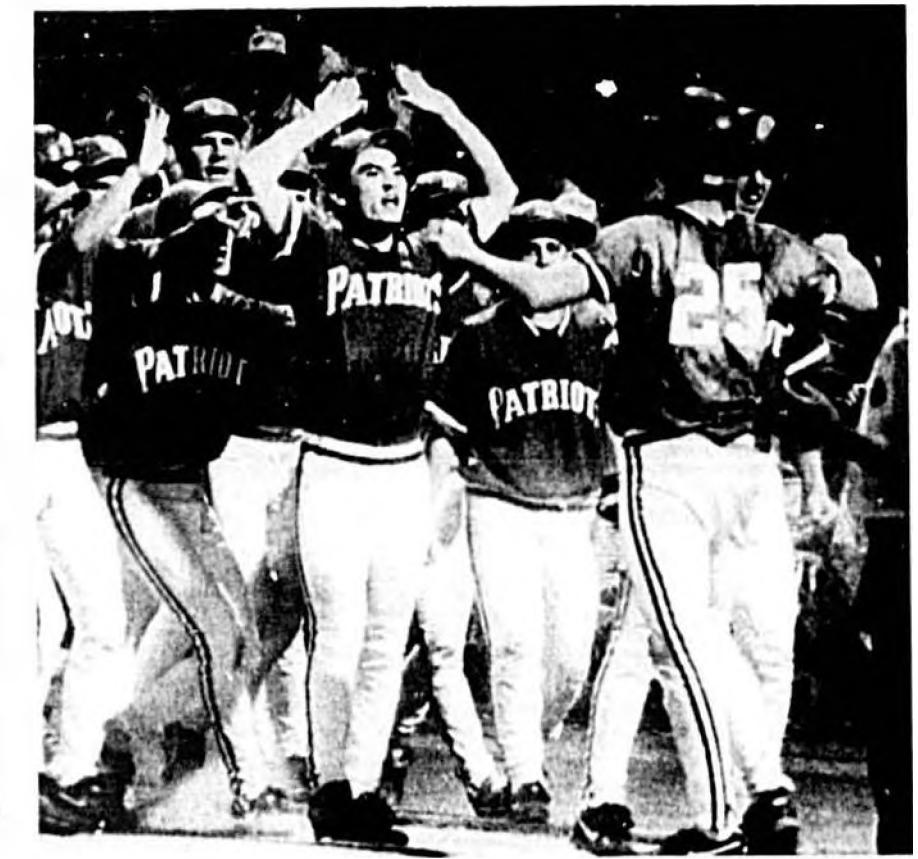
Lake Brantley and Wolfson met in the same game with the same championship on the line last year, the Patriots posting an 8-3 victory.

Legalizing drugs is moral thing to do

Can a moral case be made for legalizing drugs?

The Rev. John Clifton Marquis, writing in the current issue of "U.S. Catholic," thinks so.

Surprisingly, a fair number of readers, given his article before publication, often agreed with him and took sharp exception to the steele on law enforcement being pursued by the Bush administration and National Drug Control Policy Director William Bennett.

"Drug laws are a moral issue," Marquis wrote. "Fifty years of drug legislation have produced the exact opposite effect of what those laws intended: The laws have created a tantalizing profitable economic structure for marketing drugs."

"When law does not promote the common good, but in fact causes it to deteriorate, the law itself becomes bad and must be changed," he added.

For Marquis, the moral principle that should be at work in an ethical approach to the drug problem "is very old and very sure. Pick the lesser of two evils."

"Drug abuse is bad," he said. "It is a potent evil to the person abusing drugs and to everyone connected with him or her. But drug abuse is a problem that church and society can tackle and, in many cases, cure or control."

But he said the greed associated with drug dealing — "a much more subtle evil" — is "the evil that must be erased. Current drug laws — idolatrous 'false gods' to Marquis — create the greed and make the drug trade incredibly lucrative."

"Moral leaders have no alternative but to choose between authentic morality, which

produces good, and cosmetic morality, which merely looks good," he said. "Drug laws look good. But the tragic flaw of cosmetic morality, like all other forms of cosmetics, is that it produces no changes of substance."

In a survey accompanying Marquis' article, 81 percent said they thought the United States was losing the drug war, 70 percent said money spent enforcing drug laws could be more effectively spent on drug education and rehabilitation and 62 percent agreed that greed is a greater danger to society than drug abuse.

But only 44 percent said legalizing drugs would lower the crime rate and 54 percent said the ends, reducing violent crime, were not justified by the means — legalizing drugs. But a substantial minority, 36 percent, felt Marquis was on target.

Readers were also asked what they would do if they had Bennett's job for a day.

Vincent Farrell, Canaan, Conn., said he would "take the drug problem out of a 'military game-plan' mind set and ... look at the loss of humanity that is building every day."

But Lucy Walsh, Kirkwood, Mo., would do just the opposite: "Call out the armed forces for a real war — ring the borders by land, sea and sky — for three-month, 24-hour-a-day duty. ... Ninety days of dead-serious supply-cutting will be a very good and strong deterrent."

Patrick Zabrocki, Glendive, Mont., would call off the drug war "and have a day where we as a nation could look at ourselves. ... We can only end drug abuse through education and rehabilitation. To blame others and not accept responsibility for our problems falls short of even cosmetic morality."

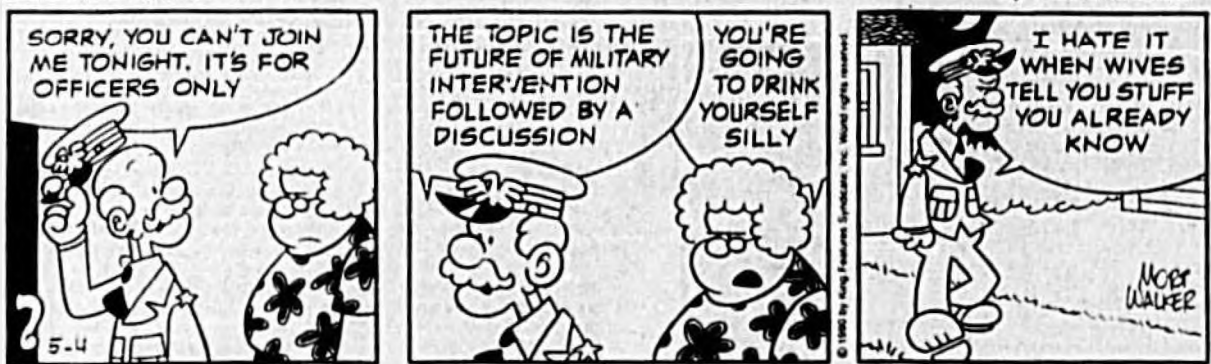

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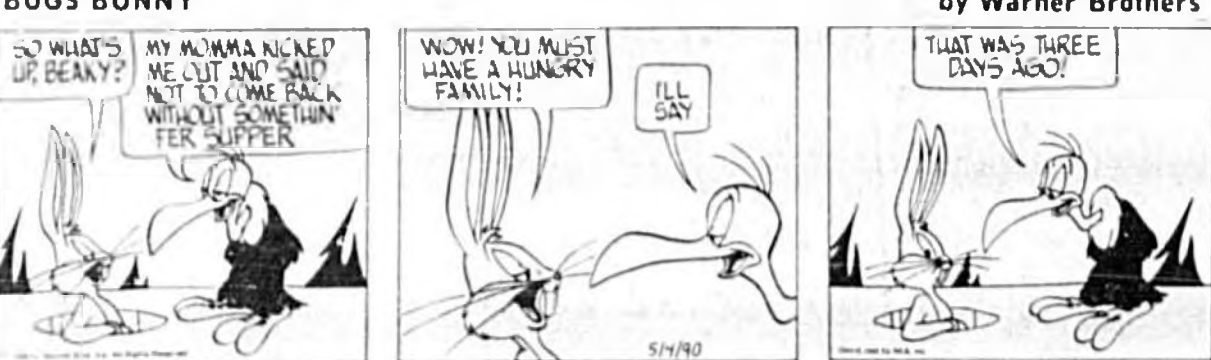

Polio vaccine carries a very small risk

DEAR DR. GOTT: A couple of babies in our family will have to be vaccinated for polio in the near future. I recently read an article about a father who contracted polio from his newly vaccinated daughter. The 22-year-old father's attorney states, "You can catch the virus from changing diapers or kissing the baby for a period of 30 days to six weeks following vaccination. This has been documented by scientists, but barely mentioned to the public." Please print your ideas on this.

DEAR READER: Oral polio vaccine contains attenuated polio viruses, microorganisms that have been treated to abolish their virulence so, when swallowed, they cause immunity instead of disease.

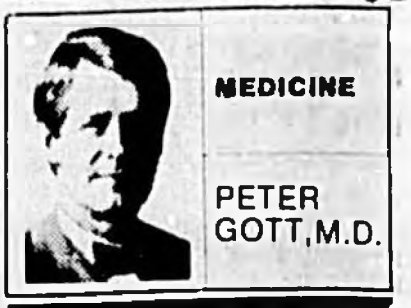
Millions of children have successfully received the oral polio vaccine. However, now and then, the vaccine appears to cause polio. Interestingly, each year for the past 11 years, 11 people have caught polio from the vaccine. About a third of these patients were vaccine recipients, a third were parents of the recipients and a third were other adults close to the recipients.

In these few cases, some virulent viruses eluded the attenuation process and produced disease. The viruses passed through the vaccinated children to cause infection in the unimmunized adults.

The attorney you quote is correct. All vaccines and medications have predictable side effects and complications. However, it's only fair to point out that, given the enormous benefit of polio vaccine, the risk is infinitesimal. Despite care in manufacturing the vaccine, a few viruses survive the process and can cause disease in susceptible individuals. All the adults who contracted vaccine-related polio were themselves unvaccinated.

Before your babies receive polio vaccine, I recommend you

share your concerns with the pediatrician — and if you have not already been vaccinated against polio, I urge you to do so. Although no vaccine is 100 percent safe, the benefits of immunizing our children against this debilitating disease far outweigh the exceedingly rare risks.

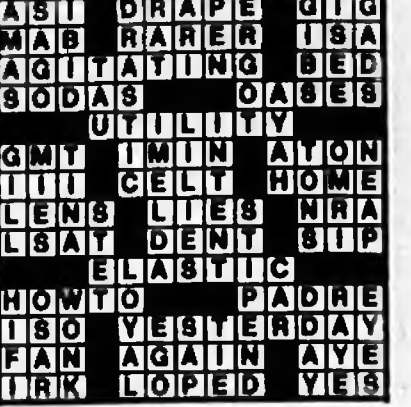

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WIN AT BRIDGE

By James Jacoby

East had sparse values for coming in with a two-spade overall between two bidding opponents, but the bid might guide the defense against North-South's final contract. Meanwhile, if two spades were doubled, North-South might not collect more than the value of a vulnerable game. After South did arrive at four hearts, should the lead of the king of spades result in setting the contract? You be the judge. Three rounds of spades were led, and declarer ruffed with the 10 of hearts. West could see the Q-9-6-3 of hearts turning into two defensive tricks, so he discarded a diamond. Declarer played ace of hearts, getting the bad news. He realized his only chance for success was in reducing his trump length to West's and

executing an endplay. So he played A-K and ruffed a club. West followed to the third round of clubs with the queen. Declarer now tried to cash three diamond tricks, but West ruffed the third diamond and got off lead with the 10 of clubs. The key to declarer's choice of the proper play at the finish lies in what defender West will naturally be thinking when he discards on the third spade. It would not make any sense for West to discard from a four-card suit. Instead he will surely be chucking from his three-card holding, in this case a diamond. So declarer should play A-K of diamonds and ruff the fourth club. West will follow. Then the queen of diamonds is played. West has to ruff and lead away from the queen of hearts, and declarer takes 10 tricks.

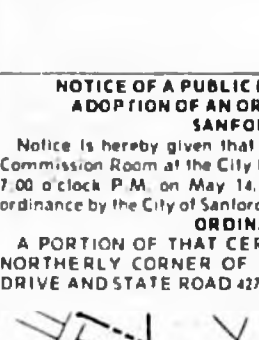

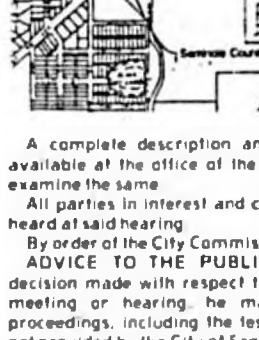
