A fire alarm goes off, the fire department responds quickly, but there is no fire and no one to blame for the false alarm. Altogether, these combinations of circumstances cause considerable ill will between entities involved.

According to administrative assistant to County Commission Rodney Layer, there have been considerable problems with the fire alarm system installed in the new courthouse. The alarm sounds at any hour of the day or night without there being a fire.

"Since the alarm system is hooked up with the Sanford Fire Department, they responded and were upset to find that it was a false alarm. This is not because they were looking for a fire, but these alarms and the necessary preparations required to answer them are costly," he said.

Laver said that the system designed by the architect's engineers was apparently done four years ago. At that time the best equipment was in the form of ionization type heads. Since that design period however, companies have changed from the ionization head to a smoke release type because the ionization head apparently was not perfected adequately to meet the varying conditions for normal use.

Layer was authorized by the Board to request the architects reevaluate the fire alarm system and replace the existing heads with the more efficient smoke release heads at no cost to the county.

Data Processing

In solking about the number of dollars necessary to run the data processing center, Tunney Johnson told the Board, "you should consider the increased collections and

decreased payments once the system is operating." According to Johnson it is possible, that if the school board participates in the program with the county, it could mean \$40 to \$50 thousand per year; and \$15,000 from the City of Sanford, plus an additional \$40 to \$50,000 from the hospital, which is about half what they currently spend.

"However, these entities are not interested in making any commitments until the system is in operation," Johnson said. "It is even possible that Seminole Junior College will wish to participate," he added. Last week and again this week, the Commission suggested a committee of several data processing experts be formed to study and evaluate the prospectus as presented by Johnson.

Johnson told the Board that unless the committee knows data processing and county government operation as well, there will be no more additional information procured than he has already presented. The issues of flexibility of the program, quicker im-

plementation of the process and the uncovering of possible hidden costs were areas which require further study, according to the Board. Johnson was given authority to continue his research and

Layer was instructed to present names for consideration for work on the voluntary advisory committee Johnson concluded, "If this committee does their job properly, their efforts will support my report to you."

The problem lies in the fact that two employees who worked in the County Judges office until it was abolished at the end of December, were taken into the office of the States Attorney. Editorial Comment Crime Is Dominating Americans' Minds

The National Conference on Criminal Justice should review a recent Gallup Poll to appreciate fully how crime has come to dominate the minds of residents of American

The Gallup survey shows that the majority of city dwellers regard crime as the No. problem in their communities, and their fear of it is growing. One out of three Americans living in the central area of a major city has been the victim of a break-in, mugging, theft or act of vandalism in the past year. Many of the victims did not report the crimes - presumably out of fear, a sense of futility or a desire to avoid getting involved with their own police.

While official crime statistics may be showing that the rate of increase of serious crime has tapered off since the 1960s, the Gallup sampling of opinion shows to what an extent the common criminal is victimizing our society. Attorney General Richard Kleindienst declares that he sees an end in sight to the major menace of organized crime, thanks to the broadened law enforcement powers stemming from the Uniform Crime Act of 1968. However, there is far less optimism toward the problem of the individual criminal prowling city neighborhoods.

A study commission has provided the conference with a long list of recommendations for reform in law enforcement and judicial procedures at the state and local level. The aim is to increase the certainty that the guilty will be punished for their crimes and that efforts to rehabilitate them will succeed.

Some recommendations of the 100-member study group clearly point to that end. It urges an end to plea bargaining that reduces the severity of a charge in exchange for an admission of guilt. It urges a streamlining of procedures to assure

and trial in felony cases. Such reforms would certainly enhance the credibility of criminal laws by assuring that punishment is swift and sure. However the recommendation that 25 years be the maximum prison term for any offense except murder, and that prisons give way to "residential treatment homes" concentrating on rehabilitation, would seem to work in precisely the opposite direction.

The task of the conference is to get punish ment and rehabilitation into proper balance in our law enforcement and penal policies. It is hard to escape the conclusion that plea bargaining, the abuse of appeals procedures, quick parole and placing too much faith in unproven techniques of rehabilitation are literally taking the teeth out of our criminal laws. The streets and homes of urban America will only become safe when the teeth are put back in.

Admiral Sharp Sees Weak Spots

SAN DIEGO, Calif. - The Vietnam peace agreement probably is as good as the United States could hammer out under the circumstances, but certainly isn't what the administration would like to have achieved, says Adm. Ulysses S. Grant Sharp, USN, Ret.

A weak spot in the accord is the absence of a firm North Vietnamese commitment to remove all its 145,000 troops from South Vietnam, warns the man who from 1964 to 1968 was commander-in-chief of U.S. forces in the Pacific. "I was pleased to note a provision that would ban the infiltration of Communist troops and war supplies into South

Vietnam," Sharp said in an interview. "But how can an international supervisory force of less than 1,200 make a thorough enough check to be sure the North Vietnamese don't continue to send troops and supplies south? "We have been trying since 1965 to halt the flow of Communist troops and arms south along the Ho Chi Minh Trail and couldn't do it. Moreover, half the supervisory force

Press Liberty—Then And Now

Freedom of the press, an issue which somehow manages to range from the front page to the courts to the jail cell has been linked to the First Amendment in the Bill of Rights. Indeed, that amendment is the cornerstone upon which the structure of today's press freedom

The names of Bill Farr, Peter Bridge, John Lawrence and Earl Caldwell are well known to readers,

for each of them, in varying manner and degree, has run head-on into a situation which would restrain that press freedom, or destroy it. Their cases all rest on interpretation of the aforementioned First Amendment, on what im-

munity it provides and how that immunity shall be exercised. Perhaps one thing that gets Americans so excited about threatened muzzling of the press is that freedom of the press is so peculiarly an American right. None of our enemies around the globe

tolerate such a thing, and it is even denied or circumscribed by various nations whom we regard as allies. In other words, it's something sort of unique in this land of ours. But its problems are nothing new.

More than half a century before our Constitution was drawn up, let alone amended, and four decades before we declared our independence from England, a fellow named John Peter Zenger laid his freedom on the line to claim freedom for the press.

Ethnic Selfhood Grows in America

One of the ideas which emerged is that people of ethnic origin, Italian, Polish, whatever, are seizing upon the fact more strongly in order to compensate for the terrible rootlessness of life in this nation. They need some sense of real attachment, it is suggested, and this is the most visible thing to grasp. It has of course been argued for years that the "disap-

pearance" of ethnic awareness was always more imagined than real, that the elements in the great American melting pot never truly melted. That may well be so, but it seems just as plain that the visibility of ethnic identity had diminished. And that lent credence to sociologists. who had forecast that assimilation of people here of diverse national origins was simply a matter of time.

Do ethnic groups today dwell freshly upon their backgrounds to regain lost feelings of "belonging," and sharper identity? There is no way to quarrel with the scholars who say the answer is yes, since there are no available exhaustive researchers to disprove the notion. Yet some observers of the evident resurgence think other factors

In a nation where blacks are finding and stressing their identity and pushing the causes and goals of black people, using the same standard. spent hours in the booth reading the new ethnic emphasis may be seen in part as a defense. Here it may be hard to distinguish between the real and the artificial. For some white ethnics, it could be simply a throwing up of strategic barriers to declare their own separateness and draw attention to themselves as peoples 'neglected' while other minorities are being championed.

For other ethnics, resurgence may have a deeper meaning, though still one related to the new focus on blacks. If there is value in stressing one's special identity and background, as blacks are now doing to cries of encouragement from many quarters, then not to dwell upon one's specialness (in this case, ethnic) might suggest shame over it instead of pride. So, some of what we are seeing may be a genuine reassertion of pride in background.

The trouble with all this, in both its American and its world aspect, is that it underscores division among peoples, rather than desperately needed harmony and accommodation. It is narrowly tribal in instinct, potentially destructive of efforts to resolve the inevitable conflicts among men in at least a passable way.

At the leading edge of separatism are always the militants who deliberately overstate the case for identity and attachment and then march off to man the barricades against the adversary. The Democratic party in 1972 had no intent to establish minority quotas for participation in its widened processes. Militants drove it to that corner. And where does the stress on special identity leave millions of Americans with inescapably mixed heritage? My own is French-English-Scotch-Irish-German, I haven't been able to find my group. If I and countless others like me are to find identity and attachment, we're going to need other means. But exactly what, in this new world of



The theory is that the "small boys" will see that the "big boys" are practicing price restraint. and come to believe the government's price and wage controls are effective and that the administration men must have some real clout (or the "big boys" wouldn't

By the above logic, however, it is clear that if control of these few thousand major firms does not succeed, or if the success is mushy. Phase III will fall flat. Therefore it is wise at this time to determine what power Mr. Nixon has over the nation's major industrialists and their marketing organizations.

Basically, Mr. Nixon has four weapons: · The bulk of these super companies depend directly or indirectly and rather heavily on government contracts. either military or civilian. Here then is a very strong pressure point if Mr. Nixon's men have the will to carry

 The big companies are especially vulnerable to repeated checks of their books, their operations, their methods of setting prices and to investigations of collusion. They are so few in number the government can afford this repetitive checking.

A Continental Casualty spokesman said that "we have no intention of paying claims for 'back-alley' acupuncture treatments. What we are talking about are those procedures done by a licensed practitioner as a specific medical procedure." Denenberg said that was what he was talking about. too, and that when it was used by a licensed practiioner there was no reason

why acupuncture shouldn't be covered. That position has now been strengthened by the Internal Revenue Service, which has just ruled that the cost of acupuncture, used by licensed practitioner, is a deductible medical expense.

The medical profession itself was highly skeptical of the needle twirling when accounts of its use first began to appear in medical jour nals a few years ago. The skepticism began to dissolve after visits to China b American doctors, including some highly distinguished members of the profession, who witnessed acupuncture in hospitals there and reported that they could scarcely credit what they saw, but had to believe their


