New On Docket: Law Technician

"Since medicine has made such good use of paraprofessionals to free doctors from unnecessary routine and to provide better services to patients, why doesn't the legal profession do the same?"

A — Technically qualified legal assistants are still as rare as the case that comes to trial quickly but change is on the docket.

For the past several years, some of the profession's leading lawyers, jurists and associations have been pleading for wholesale reorganization of legal services to include the employment of properly trained and supervised nonprofessional specialists.

Among advocates of change is the American Bar Association which last year appointed a special committee to study the availability of legal services. The committee, headed by F. William McCapin, recommended that formalized training programs in legal technology be established by the (junior college system in cooperation with local and state bar associations. It is expected that the program will be expanded to its hours, teaching lives in St. Louis, Mo., what is believed to be the first college program to train legal technicians began there this fall.

Pilot project: Before registering students, Meramec Community College, a campus of the area's Junior College District, worked with the St. Louis Bar Association to create a Citizens Advisory Committee to study feasibility and plan curriculum. The committee surveyed the local legal community, and its chairman, David G. Lupo, told us that results indicated area law firms could absorb almost 400 full-time legal technicians within the next three years at an average starting salary of \$450 a month. Lupo speculates that technicians' earnings would increase rapidly as the value of their services were proven.

The specialized legal courses are taught in the evening by a corporate attorney, Earle J. Niederbruck. The majority of the initial 38 students are women over 35, many of whom have worked in a law office. Niederbruck thinks additional recent high school graduates may choose to enroll as the program becomes better known.

Come On Now! Vote On Nov. 4th! Beat Apathy!

Are you planning to vote on the educational referendum at the polls Nov. 4? If not, "You'll be sorry!" For this amendment to the new constitution is essential to authorize the selling of bonds to raise money for construction at vocational-technical schools, junior colleges and universities.

Again the answer is simple. They're afraid of voter apathy. This is the only opponent. But it is a very tricky one to handle. That is why the wide-awake long range planning committee of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce, Tom McDonald, chairman, held a meeting to be sure that no stone is left unturned to arouse voters and bring the vote out.

Stone-turners were Dr. Earl Weldon, president of our own Seminole Junior College and George King of Florida Technological University. The hard fact for Seminole Countians is that this amendment must be passed to allow the young and vigorous college to keep construction going which must be done to meet minimal needs.

Reduced to dollars and cents, Dr. Weldon pointed out that at least \$1 million would be spent on the permanent campus from the bond receipts. How great the need is in both the college and FTU is obvious when the projections for student enrollment at the former in 1981 is 6,000 and the latter is 28,000 are considered.

Transit Flop!

One of the nation's most interesting experiments with a luxury mass transit service is on the verge of becoming a flop. This is discouraging to those who had hoped such experiments would catch on.

For the past year there has been under way in Flint, Mich., an experiment which featured air-conditioned buses that pick passengers up at their front doors and take them to work.

Passengers have reacted to this approach by staying away from the buses in droves, according to The Wall Street Journal. On many of their runs the luxury buses are virtually empty and are losing money at the rate of \$200 a day each.

The trial run is expected to cost nearly \$2 million, most of which came from the federal government. Transportation experts were eager to prove that commuters would forsake their cars for convenient and comfortable public transit.

What it appears to prove is that confirmed automobile addicts will find almost any excuse to drive to work in their own cars, unwilling to part with them for even the length of time it takes to drive to work and back.

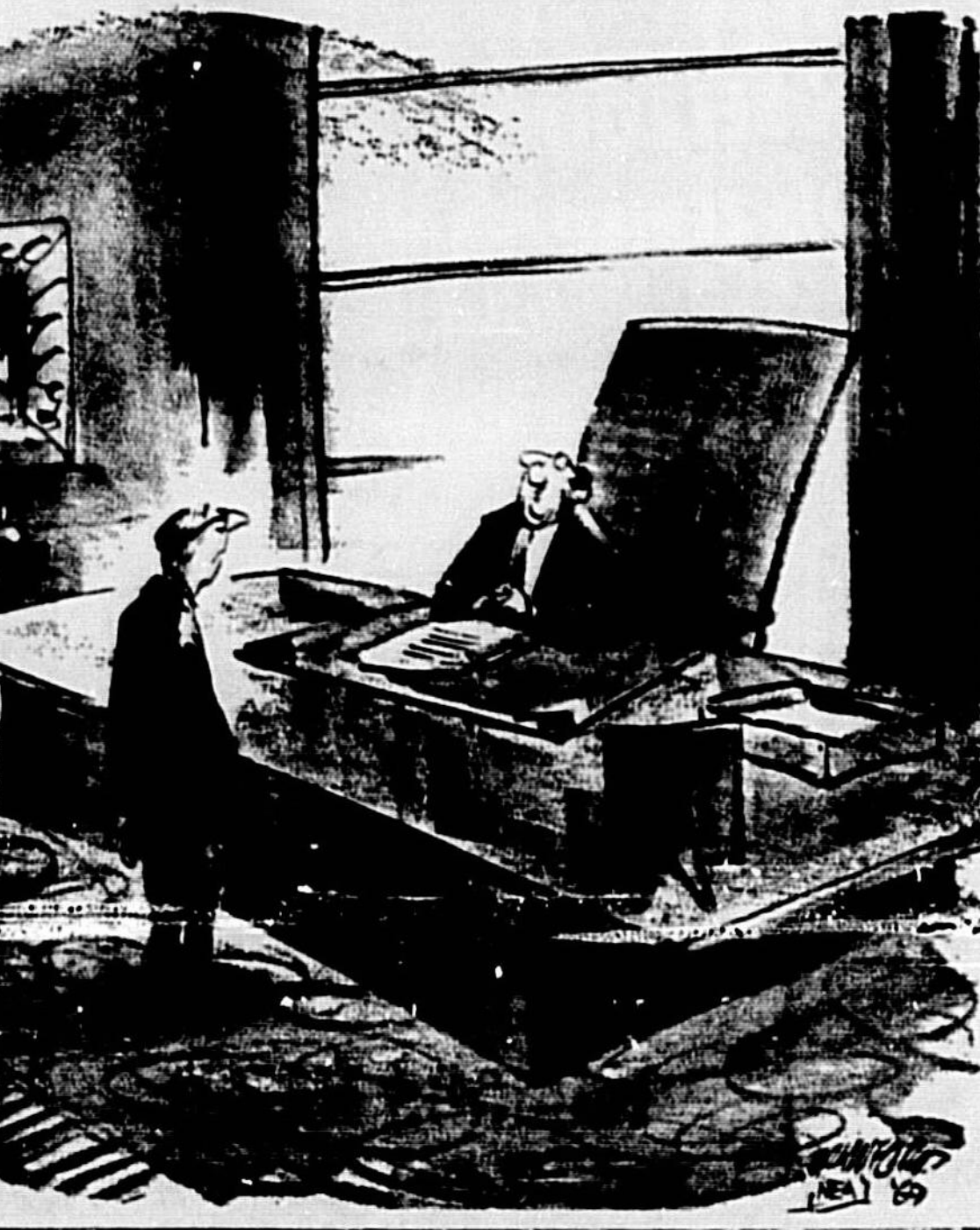

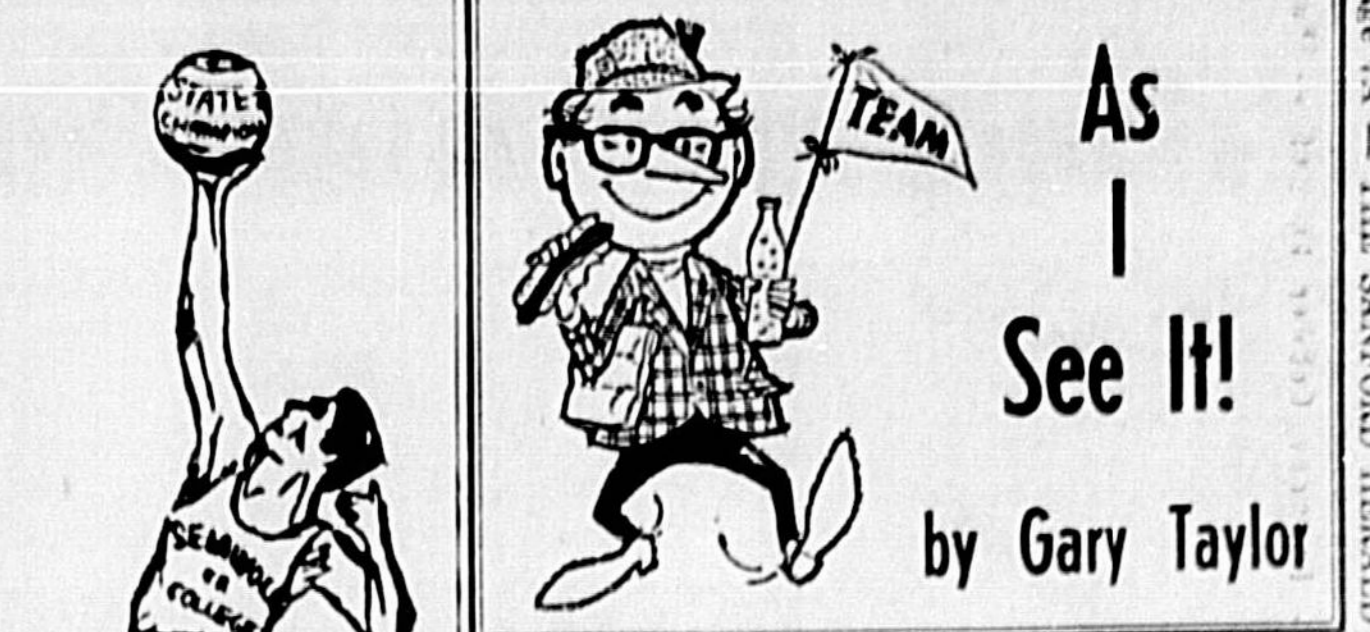

ATLANTA, Ga. (AP) — The Southeastern Conference heads into its most crucial football weekend of the 1989 season when its three undefeated giants — none ranked better than fourth in the league in preseason forecasts — tackle dangerous foes.

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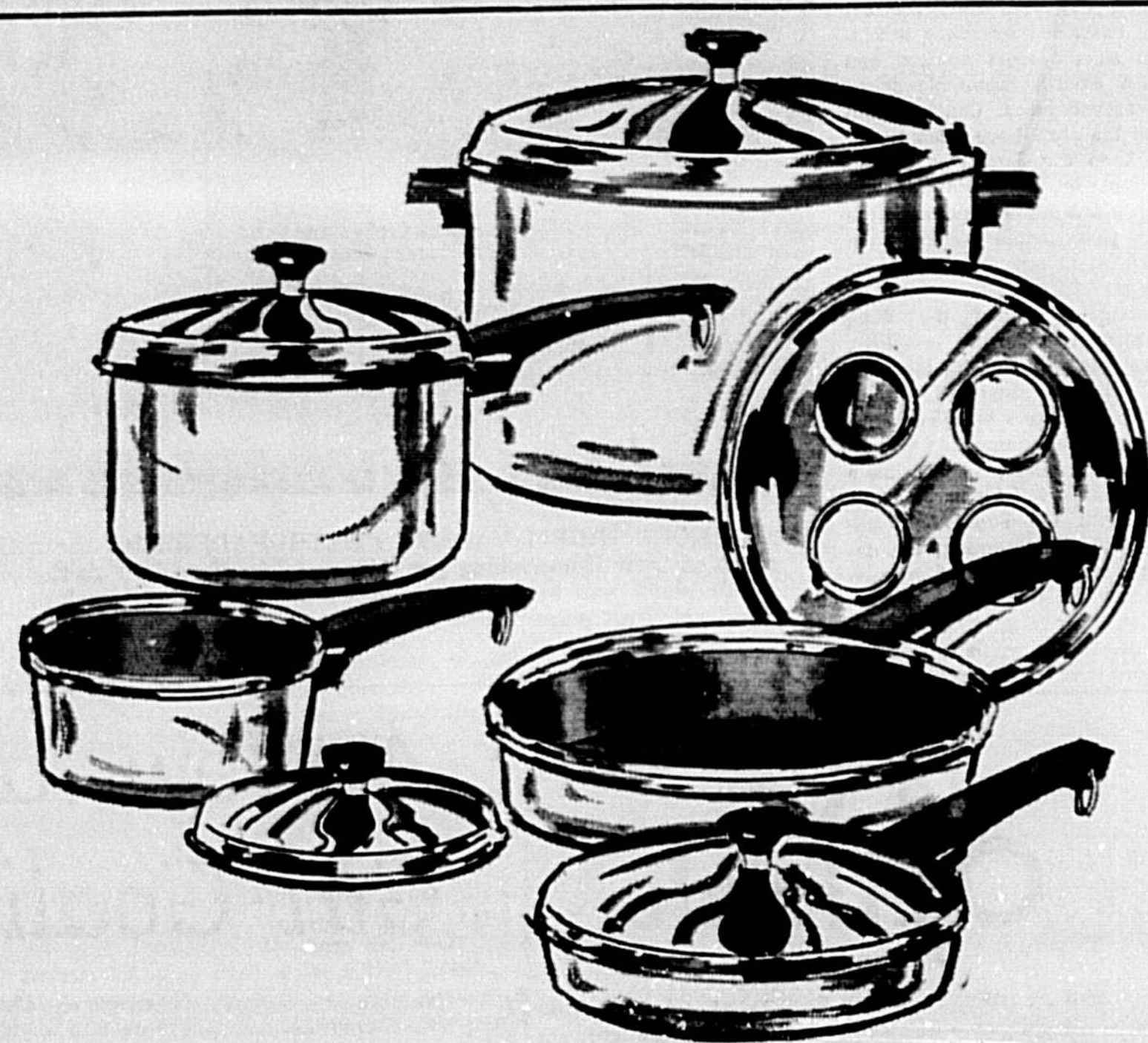
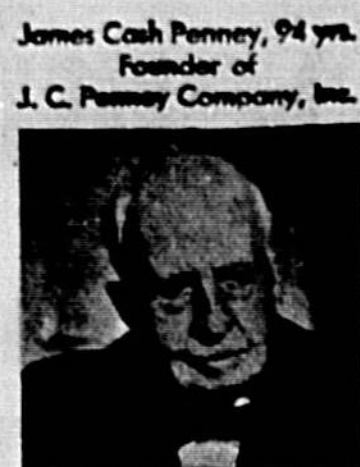

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GI Casualty Toll In War Climbs To 102 In Week

SAIGON (AP) — The total of Americans killed last week in combat in Vietnam climbed to 102 a weekly toll, exceeding 100 for the first time in five weeks, the U.S. Command announced today.
The increased toll, 24 higher than the total reported for the week before, reflected a slight increase in ground fighting in the northwest of Saigon, including one battle in which 10 Americans were killed.
Enemy casualties also increased sharply, to 2,533 as compared with 1,624 reported last Thursday. The Saigon government said it had been held for nearly eight months. He told newsmen

Egypt says it approves of Lebanese proposals for peace with the Arab guerrillas, has agreed to mediate and has invited Egyptian Chief Yasser Arafat to Cairo for peace talks.
Hassan Sabry el Kholy, a special representative of President Gamal Abdel Nasser, said the Lebanese government had agreed to negotiate to give Palestinian guerrillas "freedom of action within the country provided this does not contradict with Lebanon's security and sovereignty." The statement was distributed Wednesday night by Egypt's official Middle East News Agency.
El Kholy's statement said Egyptian representatives reached agreement with the Lebanese delegation headed by Army Chief of Staff Francis Boustany on a basis of proposals submitted by Gen. Boustany.
The Egyptian statement gave no indication of what these proposals were. But there has been speculation the Beirut government would agree to let the guerrillas alone if they confined themselves to the arid, sparsely populated area in southeast Lebanon which they have been using as a base for raids on Israel.
The Lebanese hope that with such an arrangement, Israeli retaliatory air and artillery attacks would be confined to this guerrilla area and that the rest of the country could go about business as usual.
It was not clear whether Arafat, head of the Palestine Liberation Organization, had agreed to join the talks. Arafat was in Damascus.

Court: Desegregate Now

WASHINGTON (AP) — In the 14 years since the Supreme Court ordered public schools desegregated "with all deliberate speed," many had asked, "until when?"
The court has answered: "Now."
"Continued operation of segregated schools under a standard of allowing all deliberate speed for desegregation is no longer constitutionally permissible," the court said Wednesday.
"Under explicit holdings of this court the obligation of every school district is to terminate dual school systems at once and to operate one and thereafter only unit systems."
The court ruled unanimously May 17, 1968 that racial segregation in public schools was unconstitutional.
Realizing the problems that could arise from overruling a system that had been required by law in 17 states and sanctioned by law in four others, the court pondered for a year before giving any guidelines for implementation.

FP & L Power Continues To Flow

MIAMI (AP)—Although electrical power continued to flow through the lines of strike-ridden Florida Power and Light Co., picketers say the nonunion workers making it possible may be running low on juice.
"They look like they've been dragged through a cyclone," said a union spokesman.
"We've been working long, hard hours with 12 hours on, 12 hours off and even longer shifts," said a company man.
The walkout by the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers (IBEW) entered its 11th day today with no time set for restarting settlement talks.
As the 2,000 union members walked picket lines, a matching number of supervisory personnel attempted to continue electrical service to three million Floridians.
"I don't think they're keeping up as well as they should," said H. Niles of the IBEW, "but if they say they are, we'll just have to take their word for it. They've been lucky."
