Stassen Used Wrong Word In Jibe, He States

Says He Agrees With Ike As To McCarthy

WASHINGTON (AP)—Mutual Security Director Harold G. Stassen today has thoroughly agreed with President Eisenhower's position on the controversial efforts by Sen. McCarthy to curb free world trade with Communist nations.

Talking to White House news men after a Cabinet meeting Stassen said in reply to a question that specifically he agrees with Eisenhower that it would have been better for him to have used the word "infringe" instead of saying the Wisconsin senator had "undermined" government policy.

Stassen told McCarthy's government operations subcommittee on Monday that McCarthy had undermined government efforts to shut off trade with Communist nations. The subcommittee has been getting pledges from Greek ship owners not to trade with Red China and North Korea.

Eisenhower said at his news conference yesterday he personally did not believe McCarthy had undermined government policy, but he emphasized that the right to negotiate agreements in that field rests completely and absolutely with the President.

Stassen said today he is "happy" about what he termed the outcome of the controversy.

Elsewhere in Washington, Mrs. Clara Boothe Luce, the new ambassador to Italy, had a talk with President Eisenhower today, and said he urged her to work hard toward "drawing the Italian people and all of the people of Western Europe closer to us in friendship."

Mrs. Luce called the White House to pay her respects before leaving for Italy on her new assignment. She will sail April 11 aboard the liner Andrea Doria for Genoa.

Our pioneer forefathers found a land so rich in natural resources that it did not seem possible that they could be exhausted. Forests were cut down in toto with no thought of replacement, thus destroying the watersheds and wild life, as well as a fortune in lumber. Land was overgrazed and prairie land planted to wheat. As the land was depleted all they had to do in those early years was to move on. We are learning to do better now, but in many instances it is too late.

There are arid deserts beyond reclaiming that once were richly

green. We have man-made dust bowls, water shortages and depletion of forests. Some species of wild life has become extinct. One notable example of this is the passenger pigeon which once was so plentiful that flocks in migration darkened the skies. Now there is not a single one. What happened to them? They were shot. There were so many. Who would ever have thought they could all be destroyed?

A few years ago the passenger pigeon was threatened with the extermination of the beautiful egret which was being slaughtered in inhuman fashion for the sake of its wedding plumage. Through the efforts of the Audubon Society this practice has been outlawed and the bird is once again seen in numbers. How-

ever, the egret, ibis, herons and other wading birds now face other hazards.

In spraying mosquito infested waters, for instance, much of the small life, shrimp, crayfish, hermit crabs, etc., on which they feed is poisoned. Also much land is drained for farming which, having proved unsuitable for that purpose, is abandoned. The birds cannot return for it is now dry and useless. do them good to see a sunrise once
in a while, particularly on Easter
morning.

Governor Talmadge of Georgia
has set a good example to aspiring
politicians who want to get along
in the world. He has refused a pay
hike of \$5,360 which was actually
voted him by the Legislature. He
is now getting \$12,000 a year, and
a vast majority of the people who
hired him don't make that much.
If they can get along on less than
that, he figures, he doesn't need
the pay hike.

Opinions are a dime a dozen on
the Sanford Industrial Board, what
its duties are and how it should
operate. And almost nobody agrees
with anybody else, it seems to us.
However, if Sanford is going to
make the kind of progress it should
in the industrial world some basis
of agreement is going to have to
be found. You can't make headway
with everyone pulling every which-
away.

The Legislature will be asked for
another \$100,000 to spend this
summer on advertising to help
overcome the usual summer slump.
To some it seems like just another
increase in their tax bill, but if it
succeeds in bringing in more people
to buy more gasoline, cigarettes
and what have you on which state
taxes are levied, then it would
mean more state revenue and less
need for additional taxes on you.

Congratulations to Gene Tucker
upon his election as president of
the Florida State Bank. Only 36
years of age, he is a little on the
youngish side as bank presidents
go, but he has been working in
banks ever since he was 17 years
of age and was recently voted San-
ford's "outstanding young man" by
a Jaycee committee composed of
non-Jaycees. We are glad to see
younger men coming to the fore
and assuming greater responsibil-
ities in running the town and vari-
ous business institutions, and doing
a good job.

We are glad to see the Chamber
of Commerce making plans to ex-
pand its activities in the county
areas. Many of the county towns
seem to feel with some justification
that Sanford and Sanford organiza-
tions do not take them into con-
sideration enough when mapping
out their various programs. But we
know from our own experience that
it is not the intention or the desire.
It may happen sometimes inad-
vertently. But most Sanford people
realize that we cannot get along
without the county towns and want
to cooperate with them in every
possible way.

Whether or not there was an

The Coming Session

The coming legislative session which has its opening
day next Tuesday is going to be worth watching and is like-
ly to develop some red hot issues and rough and tumble bat-
tles if Tuesday night's meeting in Sanford's Court House is any
criterion on which to base such a judgement.

Then there seemed to be considerable difference of
opinion over such relatively non-controversial matters as
whether to sink the taxpayer and where to hit him. What is
going to happen when some of the really red hot issues like
opening the welfare rolls to the public or creating the office
of metropolitan government, makes one glad that he is not a long
suffering legislator.

Florida is fortunate in having as Governor a mild man-
nered man who is well known for his ability to get warring
factions to work together and will pour more oil on troubled
waters than most, and Florida is also fortunate, since the
Governor has not been well, that he has a brother in John
McCarty who is well able to represent him in the legislative
halls and act as assistant governor.

How to give the school teachers of Florida a \$560 a
year pay increase without increasing taxes, how to give the
schools of higher education the money they want and at the
same time build a great new medical center, how to increase
the facilities of the State mental hospital, the various cor-
rectional institutions, and put up some more buildings in
Tallahassee without bankrupting the state is also quite a
problem.

Florida's highways alone are enough to keep the legis-
lators busy for 60 days if they are going to eliminate the
bottle necks, traffic jams and "death valleys" which are
now a menace to the life and limb of every man who drives.
The proposed toll turnpike alone is going to cost someone
about \$250,000,000 to build.

Some additional money is going to have to be found.
And the sources most frequently heard as possibilities are
another one cent tax on gasoline and an increase in the tax
on dog tracks. The former will be enormously unpopular;
the latter will be equally as difficult to put over. The session
may wind up with an expansion of the sales tax.

But whatever happens, you can be sure it will be a
lively session, and we are inclined to believe that when it is
over the public as well as the legislators themselves will be
glad it doesn't last any longer than 60 days.

William Howard Taft, son of Senate majority leader
Robert A. Taft and grandson of the President of the United
States for whom he is named, is the new United States
Ambassador to Ireland. Young Taft, who decided after study
at Yale that he would not follow the traditional family
profession of law, has made a name for himself in the academic
field and has particularly distinguished himself in scholar-
ship in the field of Irish culture.

The new Ambassador won his appointment without any
active help from his father, Senator Taft, while quite
pleased at his son's appointment, has always been careful
to avoid seeking favors for members of his own family.

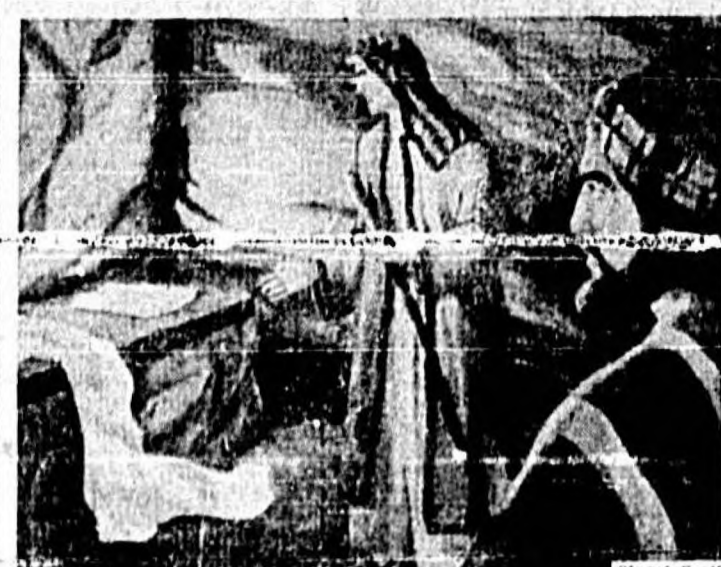
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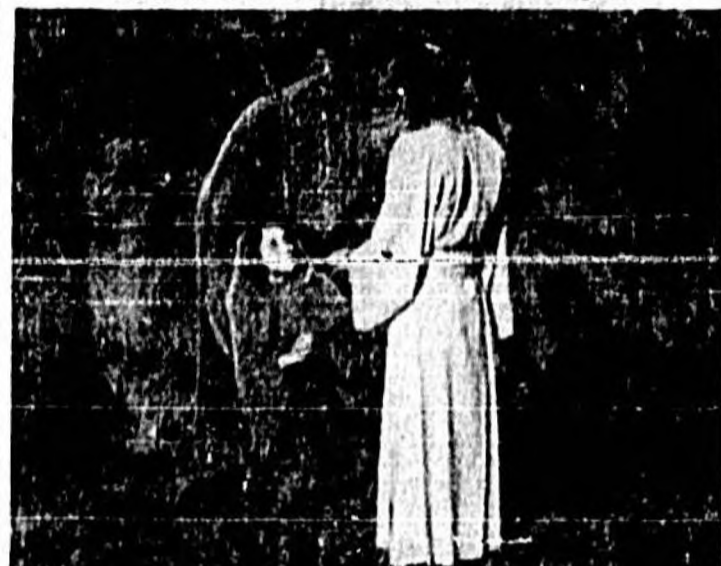

Reds Present Plan Of Returning More Men Than Expected

Quick Exchange Suggested By UN Body

By ROBERT H. TUCKMAN
SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—United Nations liaison officers Monday proposed a quick exchange of sick and wounded seven days after agreement is reached on procedure and the Communists offered a plan which might return far more Allied prisoners than expected.

The U. N. Command at the first meeting of liaison officers at Panmunjom announced they were ready to return prisoners at the rate of 500 a day.

The number of prisoners on both sides who would be returned was not known. But U. N. Command officers wondered if the Communists were offering to exchange those prisoners who are so slightly disabled that they would be ineligible for repatriation now under the Geneva Convention.

The Communist liaison group said it was prepared to repatriate all sick and injured prisoners of war entitled to be directly repatriated or accommodated in a neutral country under the Geneva rules.

These rules provide that sick or wounded prisoners who might be able to return to the fighting within a year would be "accommodated" in a neutral country.

What the Communists seemed to be saying was that they also were willing to surrender the slightly injured or ill. Or they might be in a position to offer a neutral nation as a sanctuary for some of the sick and wounded, which might form a stumbling block to any quick action.

The Allied plan for speedy exchange of prisoners was part of a nine-point program handed the Communists at Monday's session at Panmunjom. Allied officers said "distinct progress" was made and the Communists were "very objective."

Adenauer Arrives Bringing Words Of Gratitude From German People

NEW YORK (AP)—West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer declared on his arrival here today that America's leadership has given Germany a new conception of national standard of conduct.

The 72-year-old German leader, who has spent the last 10 months in a round of important conferences with President Eisenhower and other government officials, said he has brought with him the "best wishes" of the German people for the United States.

Expressing gratitude for America's "help and kindness" to Germany, he said: "Very rarely in our history has a victorious people stretched out a helpful hand to the vanquished, as you have done."

This sympathy and generosity, he said, "has raised the spirit of the German people and has given it confidence again."

What seems especially important to me, this has convinced the German people that in the life of nations, force and realism are not the only motive powers.

Adenauer said that America's recognition of the obligations imposed by its power and wealth would be "recorded with golden letters" in the "history of our time which contains so many dark pages."

The chancellor's remarks were read from a prepared statement. Asked what effects he thought the Soviet Union's "peace drive" might mean to his country, he said: "The Soviet Union is not a friend of the Atlantic defense community."

"On my return from Washington I will be wiser than I am now and then I will assess all your positions."

Adenauer, who goes to Washington for 13 days, said he plans visits at universities here and in Chicago and plans to fly to the West Coast "to get some idea of the magnitude of your country."

At the Waldorf Astoria Hotel where he is stopping here, a German flag flew alongside the American standard for the first time in more than a decade.

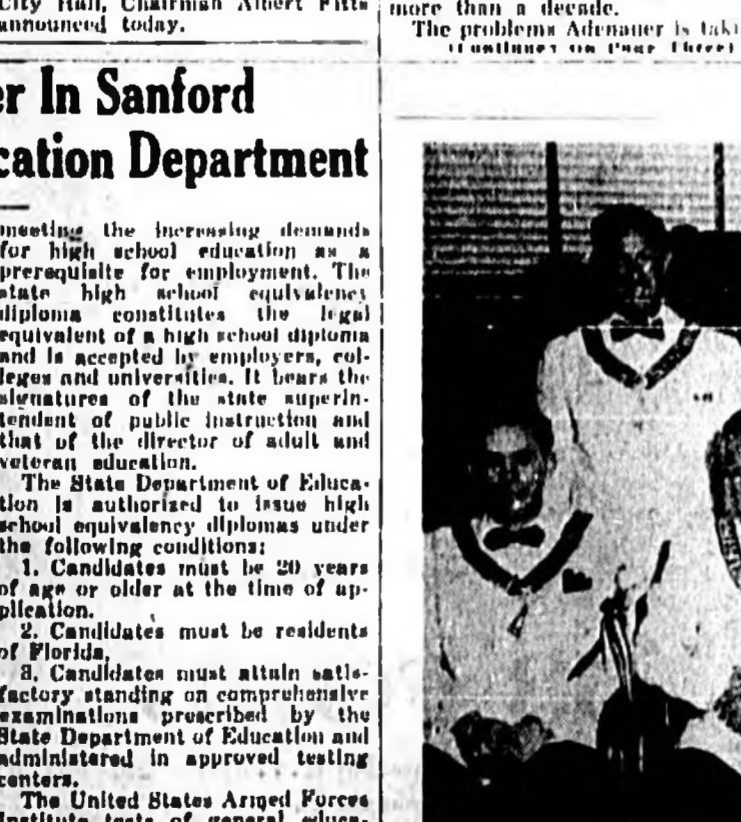
Both Mr. Phillips and Mr. Watkins were arrested on charges of careless and negligent driving.
