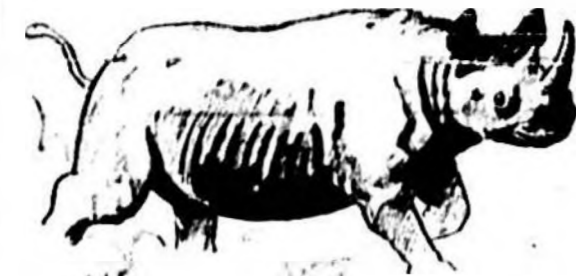

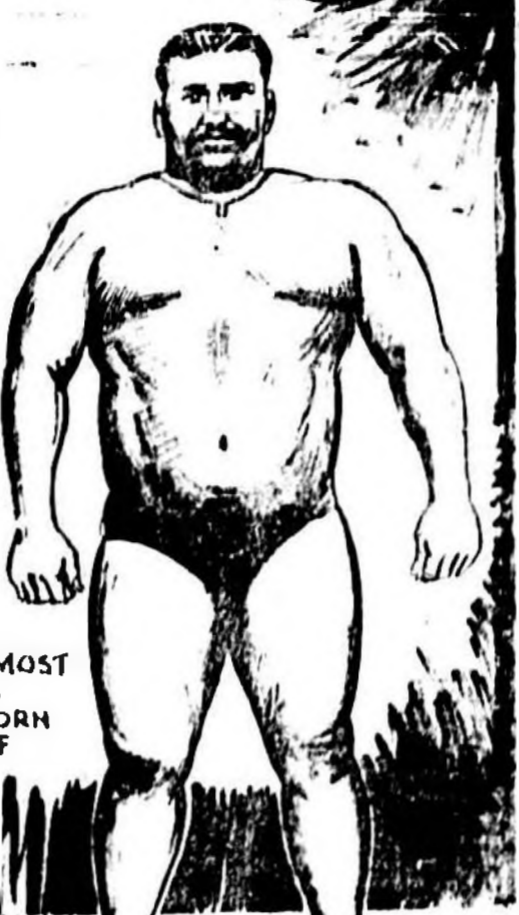

This is a great winter for tourists to come to Florida. With practically all the rest of the country snowbound, including California, Florida is enjoying the balmy winter in years.

Remember the good old days when a 200 yard rifle range was going some. Now the Army asks Congress for a 3,000 mile target range stretching clear across the country. It will cost not less than 200 million dollars and be used for guided missiles. We move fast nowadays.

The State Cabinet has trimmed 20 million dollars off of early budget estimates but still leaves 70 million dollars in additional expenditures which will have to be made up by new taxes if the Legislature sees fit to approve them.

Another medical discovery and tribute to free enterprise is reported in the press of the nation. A new drug called dramamine was used with such success on a shipload of GIs that Johns Hopkins Hospital says that seasickness definitely can be now prevented or cured.

The increasing number of robberies in Sanford and throughout the state may indicate a trend toward crime and lawlessness which usually follows in the wake of great wars, or it may be merely the usual flock of gamblers, bandits and bums, who always accompany legitimate tourists to Florida during the winter months.

Those who thought that Governor Warren was talking like a Yankee when he said what he did about the Ku Klux Klan need now to consider the latest statement by Governor Thurmond of South Carolina, Dixiecrat candidate for president against President Truman.

Seminole County schools will cost the taxpayers \$714,000 this year for operating expenses alone. Of this amount the State contributes nearly half, or about \$329,000; the rest, or \$384,000 comes from the county taxpayers.

To undertake a neck-breaking task and then to learn that nothing has been gained is a disappointment to anybody. The experience has befallen Prof. George G. Cameron of the University of Michigan, who has just issued the first report of his expedition to Mount Behistun in Iran.

Some had already been copied and interpreted. Contained in three languages, Elamitic, Old Persian and Babylonian they gave the first clue to the reading of the ancient writings of the Near East.

Now Dr. Cameron has been attacking the inscriptions with modern climbing apparatus. What does he find? Simply that the new inscriptions are mere repetitions of those already known.

This is like risking life to get some secret document, only to find that it is a carbon copy of something already in the files.

Freeing The Cities

This may be a free country, but this freedom is possessed only in part by our cities, says the American Municipal Association. A study issued by the Association says that only twenty-two states provide in their constitutions for home rule by cities.

California, Colorado, Oregon and Texas are the banner home rule states of the nation. These states let the cities strictly alone, without trying to control their slightest movements.

What happens in states without city home rule? The local community must run to the legislature for authority every time it wants to create a new ward or levy a new tax.

It could not be said that there is a one-man campaign against neckties, for the movement has numerous active members.

THE WORLD TODAY

The London Daily Mail—one of the world's prominent newspapers—says the lineup between Eastern and Western Europe is hardening.

It is, of course, apparent that the lineup of the two blocs is hardening. The Western nations are quite openly discussing a powerful North Atlantic Alliance, and are otherwise consolidating their positions.

On the Soviet side there is no disposition to advertise. However the German press reports (through the Russians) are conducting extensive troop movements in their zone of Germany and are staging combined air and submarine maneuvers in the western Baltic.

The Neue Zeitung, official German paper of the American military government, also says it has learned from refugee reports that the Russians are constructing huge new military installations in the Baltic republics with "remarkable haste."

These are but a few of the numerous operations—political, economic, military—being carried out by both sides. The situation is explosive.

However, the consensus of close observers is that war isn't inevitable. Obviously it could develop—but not necessarily.

The preparations being made by both sides strike me as being in large degree precautionary. The West is fearful of an assault by the Communist bloc, but I'll bet a bit that Moscow also is scared.

Actually there is no nation which is prepared to wage war today. The United States is in a much better position than any other but even she isn't set for action.

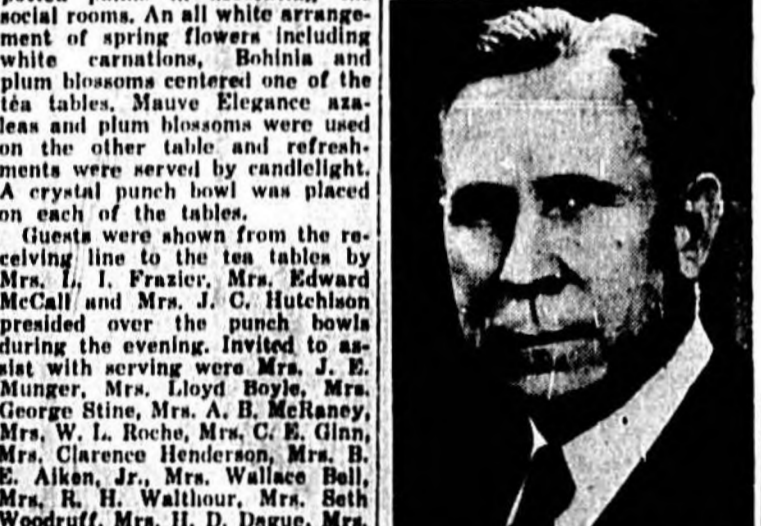

### Motor Scooters Are Subject To Florida's Responsibility Law

## Flood Threats Increase For Western U.S.

### Warm Weather Takes Chill Off Plains, But Flood Dangers Threaten Thousands

By Associated Press  
Warmer weather took some of the chill off the northern Rockies and Northwest Plains today, but it increased flood and snowslide dangers.

Temperatures rose as much as 30 degrees in some areas as mountainous snows and flood waters isolated several communities and stranded thousands of persons.

It was colder today from the Mississippi River westward, but the nation generally had clear skies, except for some rain in the Pacific Northwest and southern Texas and light snow in upper North Dakota, Northern New England and Northern Michigan.

Flood and fuel shortages in some of the snowbound Wyoming towns became more acute. The misery of small families mounted. At least a dozen small towns and several ranches in the Elko, Nev., area were surrounded. Residents declared an informal "staff of emergency," and private and army pilots flew food into the area.

Flood waters in Pysht Valley on the Olympic Peninsula isolated a dozen small towns in Washington communities. Several other towns were threatened. Snow slides roared into Pacific Northwest mountain towns. (Continued on Page Eight)

## Alabama Sheriff Denies Beating Negro Prisoners

### Officers Are Said To Have Violated Civil Rights Laws

MOBILE, Ala., Feb. 17 (AP)—A key defense witness denied a federal court civil rights trial today a government claim that he participated in and witnessed beatings of south Alabama negroes.

M. E. Walker, investigator for the Alabama Alcoholic Beverage Control Board, was the first witness called up by the defense at trial of Clarke County Sheriff Jenkins Angus Hill and Deputy Willie Ray Harrell.

The two officers are charged with violating civil rights of nine negroes by depriving them of privileges guaranteed by the 14th amendment to the U. S. Constitution.

One of the negroes, Robert Gordon, testified yesterday that Walker and Harrell struck him on the back 25 or 30 times while questioning him about operating a moonshine still.

Today, Walker denied that he had mistreated Gordon, and said he had never witnessed any mistreatment.

Pointing to five of the nine negroes in the courtroom, Defense Attorney Sam Johnston, Sr., asked Walker if he knew them, and if he would believe them on oath.

"No sir, I would not," Walker replied.

## U.S. Spy Trial Secrecy Eased Under Orders

### Klecka, First Defendant, Is Given Term Of 20 Years By Military Court

Munich, Germany, Feb. 17 (AP)—The U. S. Army, partially lifting a heavy veil of secrecy from a spy trial, today publicly sentenced Fronteek Klecka, 31-year-old worker on the Orient Express, to 20 years at hard labor.

The eight-man U. S. military commission, ordered by Gen. Louis D. Clay to relax its secrecy, made known the name of the first defendant and invited the press to hear the verdict—but it did not reveal the specific charge against Klecka.

Neither would it disclose any details of the testimony taken in the past two days behind locked doors. The proceedings concern a Czechoslovak spy ring case.

But Brig. General John L. McKee, head of the military commission hearing the case, refused to reveal Klecka's nationality. The 20 years arrested last November on charges of spying for Czechoslovakia were of several nationalities.

His name was disclosed on Army orders from Frankfurt. The military commission also was ordered to announce the verdict when the trial is finished.

Only two of the five trials were to be conducted in secret. Taylor's order to the commission said:

"With respect to the two cases being tried by your commission in closed session you are authorized to reveal to the press the names of the accused. You are further authorized to announce the findings and sentence in open court. All other cases will be in open court unless otherwise directed by this headquarters."

Clay, in ordering an investigation, said "I want those trials to be open unless completely convinced that secrecy is absolutely necessary for the protection of U. S. security or the safety of innocent individuals."

## Bulgarians Get Law To Terminate Church Missions

### Feb. 15 Is Set As Time For Trial Of 15 Protestants

SOFIA, Bulg., Feb. 17 (AP)—The Bulgarian Parliament received today a bill which would require all foreign religious missions in Bulgaria to close within a month. Their property would be confiscated.

The measure, which declares that "all citizens of the peoples Republic of Bulgaria are ensured freedom of conscious and religion," was introduced by Foreign Minister Vasil Kolarov only a few hours after the government announced that Feb. 25 has been fixed for the trial of 15 protestant leaders. They are accused of treason, espionage and black market money dealings.

Kolarov's proposal would make the Greek Orthodox Church, the "traditional" and "only people's democratic church" in Bulgaria, it would bar from the clergy and church office non-citizens of Bulgaria and would give the Foreign Minister tight control over international connections of clergymen of church officers.

ESSEN, Germany, Feb. 17 (AP)—Ruhr industrialists see West Germany, with its hard-working population of 46,000,000, as a wide open field for American private investment.

The men who run the smoky collieries and clanging steel mills of this vital territory dream of an economic junior partnership with the United States.

You hear no echo among them of Moscow's charge that Wall Street has begun the "colonization" of their fatherland.

They say West Germany must strive to convince the United States of peaceful and profitable opportunities here, so that American investors in the future will put as much as \$2,000,000,000 into modernizing German industries.

Difficulties imposed by Western Allied suspicion and distrust are conceded. But the industrialists regard the polarization of the world between the United States and Soviet Russia as West Germany's ultimate salvation.

## Business Lull Is Said To Be Economic Burp

### Desperate Control Measures May Be Harmful, Economist Says In Congress

WASHINGTON, Feb. 17 (AP)—A Brookings Institution economist told Congress today that the business lull is not an economic "burp" but a belly ache. He said it probably does not call for force-feeding measures by the government.

A. D. H. Kaplan testified before the joint Economic Committee, now weighing President Truman's broad economic control program, that "desperate" federal measures may be more harmful than helpful. The Brookings Institution is a privately financed research organization.

Turning to the nursery for its business analogy, Kaplan observed: "I think the baby has been taking the bottle very fast since the war. You can't keep crowding milk into a baby. There is a time for letting the baby burp."

When a committee member suggested it is hard to tell when the "burp" is a sign of a "belly lull," Kaplan said the government itself frightened business out of the 1938 recession by "desperate" measures to preserve the 1933 prosperity.

"The government made a good provision that prosperity resulted last year," Kaplan said. "So it turned loose all its machinery and made the production come true."

"We created relief programs, food rehabilitation, student relief, the urban conservation corps, the Civil Works Administration and the self liquidating RFC."

"Perhaps largely as a result of such publicity, production went down 36 per cent in the twelve months after the 1937 peak. I am (Continued on Page Eight)

## Florida Tax Hunt Must Start For \$25 Millions A Year Or More

TALLAHASSEE, Feb. 17 (AP)—The Florida tax hunt can start now for \$25 million a year or more.

The Cabinet actually completed work on its biennial budget recommendations to the Legislature yesterday and announced it had cut in half a \$100,000,000 general fund deficit that was in the book when it started.

There will be a review of all budgets Tuesday before they are sent to the press, but it stands now. The Cabinet has trimmed about \$200 million off requests for the general fund, which was cut to \$180,000,000.

That leaves a budget of about \$204,000,000 and only an estimated \$154,000,000 in receipts to meet it during the 1939-40 years.

There is one suggestion from Governor Warren written on the Cabinet's records, the money should be raised.

The \$204,000,000 budget includes nothing for state debt, which will cost \$20,000,000 a year, only \$24,000,000 for public schools that cost \$40,000,000 more, \$15,000,000 for institutions of higher learning and they could get less than \$25,000,000 and a few thirds of the operating costs of the universities.

It is the only budget in which the deficit is not covered by even mentioned. The monthly long-term debt is now over \$40 million, and for the next five years it has been allowed to grow to \$100 million.
