Resignation Of Morgenthau Is Given Truman

Justice Roberts Also Resigns In Surprise Step Ending 15-Year Term On High Court

WASHINGTON, 6 (AP)— After 11 years as secretary of the treasury, Henry Morgenthau, Jr., will leave office after President Truman returns from the Big Three meeting, beginning in about three weeks in Berlin. The President also has announced acceptance of the resignation of Supreme Court Justice Owen Roberts.

They told President Truman that they wanted to quit public life and go home. The President accepted the resignations with regret.

Morgenthau, in his letter, said: "When Franklin D. Roosevelt came to Washington, he asked me to come with him, stating that when he was through, we would go back to Dutchess county (N.Y.) together."

Morgenthau said he would leave after Truman returns from his forthcoming Big Three meeting with Marshal Stalin and Prime Minister Churchill in Berlin.

The President told of the resignations at his news conference, said he had a successor in mind for the treasury post but didn't say anything about it now.

Names mentioned in speculation were Fred M. Vinson, war mobilization director; John W. Snyder, federal loan administrator; George D. (Ga.) Clegg, chairman of the Senate foreign committee; and Walter J. Cummings, of Chicago, chairman of the board of the Continental Illinois National Bank and Trust company.

Before the news conference, the President announced another major resignation, that of Judge Thurman Arnold from the United States court of appeals, District of Columbia. Arnold, former justice of the Supreme Court, had wanted to enter private law practice and work for a "truly competitive" economy after the war.

Truman, in white and black overcoat suit and green necktie, opened the news conference with a wave of his marshal's baton, encrusted with gold and diamonds. It was presented to the President by Lt. Gen. Alexander Patch, commander of the Seventh army, who took Goering into custody.

Truman said the baton was worth perhaps \$40,000, that Goering wept when it was taken from him, and that it would be presented to the U.S. military museum at West Point, N.Y.

He quickly jumped into a series of announcements, starting with the appointments of Edward C.

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Summer Meetings For Law Makers May Be Permanent

HENDERSONVILLE, N.C., July 6. The North Carolina legislature may become an annual affair. Several members of the body, taking their cue from Judge Parker, have reported on similar conflicts held by the judges in the United States Circuit Court of Appeals have proposed that the legislators meet each year for the kind of training-school session they are holding now.

Judge Parker suggested that such meetings be held annually in order that the legislators may be able to do a better job at their regular sessions.

Referring to annual meetings held by the judges in his circuit, Judge Parker declared that these sessions have been of "inestimable value" in improving the administration of justice in this State. Begun 15 years ago, they have given both the judges and the people themselves a better understanding of the job before the courts, he said.

Judge Parker described this meeting of the colons as a school for legislators. It is the first such meeting ever held by a North Carolina Legislature. The body has no legislative power at this session; it is merely a training school.

Hopkins Is Named To Post In Garment Industry's Affairs

NEW YORK, July 6 (AP)— David Dubinsky, president of the International Ladies' Garment Workers' union, today Harry L. Hopkins, former special presidential adviser, had accepted the post of impartial chairman of the New York women's coat and suit industry.

Dubinsky said Hopkins was expected to assume the post after a rest of several weeks.

Hopkins, a slender, dapper New York Mayor James J. Farley, who was named to the post in 1940 and occupied it until June 30, 1945. It was reported at union offices that Hopkins' salary would be "in the neighborhood of \$30,000 a year."

Dubinsky said in a statement that as impartial chairman, Hopkins would oversee collection agreements covering 50,000 employees and 1,200 garment factories with an annual production output of \$500,000,000. Dubinsky said the production covered 80 percent of the coat and suit output for the nation.

He said the collective agreements in the industry were formed in 1910 when machinery for the settlement of labor-management differences was established under a "protocol of peace."

The protocol, he said, was signed by the National War Labor Board, and Maj. Gen. Edward J. Brooks, commanding general of the Fourth Service Command, Atlanta, Ga.

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Warning Is Issued To Car Owners Who Don't Have Stamps

JACKSONVILLE, July 6 (AP)— Penalties and possible prosecutions are promised for Florida car owners who do not immediately purchase \$5 use tax stamps which all automobiles are required to display.

"For a reasonable length of time we are merely requiring violators to furnish evidence of the purchase of their stamp and to place them on their cars," said John F. Fahn, Internal revenue collector.

"If violators do not comply, however, and we are forced to trace through the license bureau the ownership of cars which do not have use stamps displayed, such persons will face additional penalties and possible prosecution."

Fahn said he has been tagging cars Monday since the above statement was made.

"A large number of car owners probably have forgotten about the necessity of getting their tax stamp, or they may have mistakenly thought that the tax has been repealed," Fahn added.

TOKYO SOURCES ESTIMATE 11 THOUSAND ALLIED PLANES ARE PRESSING ATTACK

PACIFIC, July 6 (AP)— Startling evidence of American air might being hurled against Japan came today as Tokyo reported 50 U.S. planes made double strikes against the homeland for the third successive day.

Japanese sources estimated 11,000 Allied planes are pressing the attack against Japanese garrison was evacuated from Wake Island because of starvation, testifying to the effectiveness of an old sea blockade.

More than 120 square miles of Japanese industrial cities have been destroyed by superforts of the U.S. Fifth Air Force.

Purebred Breeding Herds Are Part Of Glades Experiment

CLEWISTON, Fla., July 6.—With establishment here of four registered, purebred breeding herds, one each of Sorthorn, Hereford, Aberdeen-Angus and Brahman, by the United States Sugar Corp., cattlemen for the first time can observe and study the development of the four most popular beef breeds under identical conditions.

The cattle are placed on a carefully arranged pasture subdivided into four equal parts, making possible observation of all four herds from one central location. "As far as we know, this is the first time in the United States that these four breeds have been brought together and are being raised at a single project. Controlled conditions applied equally to the four herds should provide comparative information of interest to the cattle industry, and particularly to the cattlemen of South Florida," Sidney L. Crochet, said.

Crochet, who is in charge of the cattle project, is assistant to Joe W. Moran, executive vice-president and general manager of the United States Sugar Corp. He has devoted more than a year-and-a-half to establishing the four herds, hand-picking the cattle to represent the best example of their breeds. The project is located one mile west of Clewiston on Highway 26.

"The pure-bred breeding herds represent only one part of our plan of the company's whole cattle project," Crochet said. "The other three phases consist of a small commercial herd; the grass fattening of feeder steers on improved pastures with supplemental feeding of molasses in troughs of feeder steers in dry-ports on the pastures; and the finishing agricultural by-products of the company."

The whole cattle project covers approximately 5,000 acres of improved pasture, which is being planted to such grasses as Tifton 35 and 99, Bahia, Digit, St. Augustine, Bahia, Digit, Dallas and Pensacola Bahia. Maximum and complete sod has not been obtained yet on the entire pasture, but once effected, the acreage will be capable of maintaining better than one head of cattle per acre unit the year around, present experience indicates.

Crochet said some of the aims of the corporation in maintaining the four purebred herds are:

- To demonstrate to Florida cattlemen that a good job can be done with any of the four leading breeds under improved total conditions.

2. To get some trace or indication of which of the four breeds are best adapted to Florida conditions once the cattle have been provided with improved range.

3. To play its part in the further development of the now great Florida cattle industry by making available registered herd stock of the four popular beef breeds which have been bred and raised under Florida conditions and which are fully acclimated.

4. To speed the up-grading of Florida's cattle so that a better quality of feeder steers will be available for the company's steer feeding program.

5. To demonstrate that coincidental with the up-grading of cattle, Florida can economically produce choice quality beef equal to the nation's best on Florida produced feeds.

The Sugar Company has issued an open and standing invitation to all cattlemen to visit the project at any time to observe the work that is being done and to follow the progress of the project so that any experience of the company may be translated to the benefit of their own herds.

Many cattlemen from the state already have visited and acclaimed the project. They point out that it combines the scientific approach used by the state and federal experiment stations with the added advantage of being conducted as a commercial operation on a commercial-sized basis.

Information developed by the project they say will have far-reaching results in speeding the improvement of cattle and placing Florida in a leading position in the nation as a beef producing state.


State Department Is After New Men For Foreign Posts

WASHINGTON, July 6 (AP)—The State Department announced it is looking for 1,000 new foreign service officers, most of whom it hopes to get from among men and women of the armed services and veterans of the present war.

With the July 1 reorganization of the country almost vastly expanded, the Department said that it had to discontinue recruiting new personnel after Pearl Harbor and is now convinced that "the most suitable talent to draw from is among the men and women who have fought to win the war, and, therefore, have a vital and personal interest in building a lasting peace."

Applications have been made with the armed services to give examinations to qualified applicants. G.I.'s in active service may pass the examination and get appointments will be given discharges, except in cases of military necessity. Applicants must be between 21 and 30 years old.



Don't stint on Food for Victory Plants

SINCE THE purpose of the Victory garden is to supplement war-time food supplies, don't make the mistake of stinting on plant food for Victory vegetables. The diet of plants consists of nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium, in combination with carbon, hydrogen and oxygen from the air.

If these food materials are supplied in proper quantities, Victory plants will do their own "cooking" and digesting of them.

The accompanying Garden Graph shows how the three components of a complete plant food or fertilizer are utilized by plants. A broccoli plant is used for this demonstration because it has a sturdy stalk, heavy foliage and the edible top is really a cluster of flowers.

Nitrogen is used largely by a plant for leaf growth. It also

Rumor has it that Henry Wallace has lately become a friend of "business" and somewhat of a conservative. But this isn't anything to be surprised at. The great liberal Justice Hugo Black used to be a Ku Klux Klan member before political considerations persuaded him to change his color.

It is a strange and distressing quirk among our military leaders that they allow captive enemy generals and other officers of high rank to become prisoners of war and "kept on a large country estate," or lodged in some "historical castle." It seems to us that an ordinary prisoner of war barracks would be plenty good enough for the Nazi "gold brats" which was in great part responsible for the agonies inflicted on other peoples of the world.

The Fourth of July celebration is over and it is safe to say that the usual quota of fatalities was filled, a fact which should make us all realize that cessation of war will not put an end to heartaches and broken bodies which are so much a part of the civilian scene. The accident toll in this country, especially during holidays, is deplorable and the worst predictions for the future are none too bright. When the war is over and gasoline, tires and cars plentiful and new super highways built we can expect an avalanche of tragedies arising out of the average American's propensity for being careless when he is behind the wheel of an automobile.

It would be a great thing for Sanford if plans could be made now for an architectural "tree lifting" job in anticipation of the day when building materials will be plentiful, workers available and property owners in the mood to expand and refurbish their buildings. The employment of an ability, taste and imagination might be regulated now to draw up plans for the business section calling for a harmonious pattern which eventually would make this city a dwelling place of beauty similar to its business area is concerned. A great philosopher once said: "The best things are those most useful, the best art is that which serves the greatest number, in which we are all interested."

A Great Speech

Every American should read in full the speech of Senator Vandenberg June 29, supporting, in the Senate, the World Charter. It is one of the most powerful and most eloquent utterances ever heard in Congress. It is far superior in every respect, to the preceding speech of Senator Connally, who formally presented the document to the Senate, because Connally, while an able man, is merely a speaker, Vandenberg is an orator.

The Michigan Senator's address was full of memorable phrases, such as these:

The aggressor who breaks this contract will stand in naked infamy before the embattled conscience of an outraged world . . . To ignore this realism in our peace plans would be to wander in a wishful dream . . . We would desert our own ideals if we would permit our desire for the unattainable to blind us to the wisdom of embracing the boon which is at hand . . . History is writing with a ringing pen and we must accommodate its pace . . . If America is to assume the morale leadership of a better world in which we have fought our way to glorious eminence, we can scarcely be content to be among the last who care or are to speak when this United Nations roll is called . . . America has everything to lose and nothing to gain by declining this continued fraternity with the United Nations in behalf of the dearest dreams of mankind.

Freezing At Home

Cornell University has just published a 15-page booklet by Nancy K. Masterman, called "Using the Home Freezer." It is a report of studies made by the Cornell research committee on food processing and storing for consumption when forehand provision took nothing from other people's food.

Ninety-eight questionnaires were analyzed of which 55 per cent were from farms, the other 45 per cent divided evenly among villages, suburbs and cities. The average family represented was about five persons. In a Peter Pan to observe that more meat and poultry were frozen than vegetables, more beef than any other kind of meat.

Some who replied that home freezers were a waste of money, some do not, but all lay stress on the advantage of having food at hand when needed. It enables the housewife to store seasonal food for out-of-season use, saves time for women who work and helps in any emergency. One woman said that freezing was easier for her than canning, since the men did all the work!

It seems certain that more home freezing will be done after the war, both on farms where large units are needed and in tiny city apartments where one refrigerator takes care of current purchases and of freezing for future needs.

Sterile Dictatorship

A dispatch from Germany reports, "Apache dominate ruined Brunswick." The survivors of this German city, like those of other parts of the conquered Reich, give the appearance of not being interested in anything. They go about listless and without purpose.

And why not? Listlessness and lack of purpose are exactly the characteristics to be expected of a people which had an absolute and most exacting dictatorship imposed from over its heads. For many years they have had their thinking done for them. Their aims and ideals, if such a word can be applied to Nazi objectives, had been given them ready made. They had been the tools of a philosophy handed down from above.

Now they are lost and it isn't surprising. It will be one of the great social experiments of all time to see how to what degree a new and acceptable set of ideas and aims can germinate in the human soil of Germany.

It has long been recognized that dictators don't encourage or allow the rise of any heirs to power. Not so much thought has been given to the fact that they destroy any succession of new or different ideas or aims to take the place of those that fall. The people have not only lost their credo of abject obedience, they have lost the power to originate anything to take its place.

Long Struggle Of Mine Sweepers Is Told By Admiralty

LONDON, July 6, (AP)—The story of the long, unpublished struggle of British mine sweepers during the German war, during which they swept up a total of 16,000 mines has been disclosed by the British Admiralty.

The cost of this silent and grim battle was heavy—237 sweepers being lost. Of these 99 fell victim to mining, 68 to attacks from the air.

Germany's mine laying, which on the night of May 1, 1941, was greater than a fortnight before the German assault in France, blocked four British and three French ports—Sunderland, Hartlepool, Middlebrough, Blyth, Dunkirk, Calais and Boulogne—had at the outbreak of war to be countered.

Grisly Experiment In Murder Found In Camp Near Munich

Austria Children and adults were sent to the station from all parts of Germany by the Nazi Ministry of the Interior and by the Bavarian Provincial Government, records showed.

The "patients" were used as guinea pigs in "research" into scientific starvation and by the administration of drugs. After their deaths, frequently induced by injections, the bodies were cremated.

Two public health officers of the Munich Military Government, Major Marvin Linick of New York City and Capt. Loyd Murphy of Memphis, Tenn., uncovered the "murder plant."

They reported it housed 1,578 men, women and children on June 30, and a branch of the experimental station at nearby Isen had another 168—all in various stages of malnutrition.

A statement issued here said all the institution's papers were burned prior to the officers' arrival and there was no way of knowing the total number of persons "treated" at the Kaufbeuren





Warsaw Regime Is Recognized Jointly By U. S., Britain

WASHINGTON, July 6 (UPI)—The United States and Britain jointly recognized the reconstituted Warsaw government of Poland tonight, cutting across the London exile regime with which they have dealt throughout the war.

In both London and Washington, however, it was emphasized in the announcement that the setting up of the expanded Warsaw administration constituted only a "step" in fulfillment of the Yalta Big Three agreements.

President Truman announced American acceptance of the Warsaw government, and said "we recognize" the Yalta agreement in full and thereby confirmed the Crimean plan for free elections.

The President and Adm. William D. Leahy, chief of staff, have been named ambassadors and will proceed to Warsaw "as soon as possible." The British announcement laid stress on "full agreement with the United States government" in recognizing the "Polish provisional government of national unity" it said an ambassador will be dispatched from London shortly.

Leahy was appointed last September as ambassador to the London Polish government, but never went to London, apparently in expectation of soon a shift. He came today to the U.S. Embassy. Previously, he was ambassador to Colombia.

The Crimea agreement by President Roosevelt, Prime Minister Churchill and Premier Stalin called for broadening the base of the Moscow-sponsored Warsaw group, to take in other democratic Polish elements, and for free elections to be held later. Diplomatic comment both here and in the British capital has laid emphasis on the elections, and the circumstances under which they are held, as the finally important step in letting the Poles work out their own democratic government.

Stanislaw Mikolajczyk, then leader of the London Polish government, has been included in the new Warsaw set-up as vice premier. The new government was finally worked out after long negotiations which all but stalled over Soviet objections to taking in any representatives of the London group. The Russian areas of 16 Polish underground leaders whom Moscow accused of subversive activities behind the Red Army lines, further complicated the negotiations.

Large Number Of German Prisoners Held In Florida

ATLANTA, Ga., July 6.—(UPI)—Approximately 8,000 German prisoners of war are now at bases and camps in Florida and are assigned to work needed to release the manpower shortage in agriculture, timber and industry under private contractors at Army installations for maintenance and repair. Major General Edward H. Bowes commanding General Fourth Army, Atlanta, has announced. U.S. prison camps for private contractors only when civilian labor is unobtainable and a Army installation to release American soldiers for other duties or jobs for which civilian workers cannot be found, the western visitors are paid at a rate of \$1.25 a day and are supplied with sharply restricted lists of items available. Civilian workers under private contract are paid for labor demands and in Florida, having worked in the citrus fruit harvest and processing, they are now engaged in various other kinds of more difficult, unskilled, untrained labor and in installations.

In Florida prisoners are held at the following camps, the number and assignments varying in accordance with seasonal needs or work load requirements:

Belle Glade, 210, food crops; Bell Haven, 400; Camp Blanding,

280, citrus; Weston, 280, citrus; Welch, Citrus and citrus products; Winter Haven, 300, citrus products; White Springs, 200, citrus; Woodwood, Winter Haven, 275, agriculture; Fort Meade, 1,000, post maintenance; MacDill Field, 300, post maintenance; Orlando, 2,000, AAF tactical Center, 600, post maintenance; Orlando area, 1,500, Telogis, 700, lumber; Venice, 200, post



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
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Air Force GMCs Complete Million Mile Mission
