

5th Army GP's Suggest Coat Of Arms Showing Mud, Mules And Kesselring

ROME—The other day a GI suggested the 5th Army adopt a coat of arms showing a mountain rampart on a field of mud. Such a shield, with possibly a pack mule tossed into one corner and in the other the leering face of Albert Kesselring, field marshal of the German armies in Italy until the end, might come near to telling the story of men, mud and mountains—and the rugged warriors of the 5th.

For 20 months and two bitter winters, over nearly 600 miles—yard by yard from Salerno to Switzerland and Austria—they fought through the pick of the Nazi armies led by a field marshal who may go down in the books as one of military history's masters of defensive warfare.

And when the shooting stopped the 5th was the first army ever

to have conquered Italy from the south.

All the way it has been a rough and rugged outfit. The 34th Division, for instance, has been at war since the Algiers landings in 1942—celebrated its 50th day of combat in the line April 16. Its men believe that is more than any other outfit in Uncle Sam's armed forces—Army, Navy or Marines.

Months of training followed the organization of the army Dec. 1, 1942. On Sept. 5, 1943, it left for Salerno.

Italy's bowing out of the war didn't soften the Italian beaches. At Salerno and Paestum, the 5th went ashore in the shadow of mountains from which the enemy poured murderous fire.

But reinforcements came. And inch by inch, the 5th dug its way toward Naples, 35 miles away.

By Oct. 6 there were close to

20,000 casualties for the 5th, more than 12,000 of them Americans. Casualties were particularly heavy in the crossings of the Volturno, which curls through this area like spaghetti in a bowl. It was crossed so often that doughnut used to grin ruefully when they reached other streams far northward months later and remark "Wadda ya know?" The Volturno again?

There was a dash to beat the weather to the German winter line, hinged at Cassino.

When the 5th finally reached the Rapido early in 1944 the 36th tried to cross below Cassino and ran into the enemy's prepared fields of fire.

The men had to pull back, leaving the Rapido virtually running blood.

The same day Jan. 21, 1944, saw the Anzio beachhead landing where Nero once lolled in a marble palace. The landing was so easy the men were open-mouthed with wonder, but Kesselring quickly recoiled.

For four months, hour by hour, week by week, the Luftwaffe made living in the open a career and the enemy entrenched in the hills threw thousands of shells.

Months later when one of the huge railroad cuts was against the 5th at Anzio was captured at Civitavecchia far to the north, one soldier began heaving stones at the 50-foot wall.

"I've been waiting a long time to throw rocks at you," he muttered. "You're the best case of insomnia a guy ever had."

Meanwhile on the main front a Rapido crossing was made north of Cassino. The 34th Division did the job and despite the latter fatigue from the steady combat, it came within an ace of being long on the Cassino battle right there.

The men got to the outer edge of the hilltop where they took half the town in fighting that was so close they could often hear the Germans moving around in the next room when they stopped for the night. But the limit of human endurance was reached. The infantry was withdrawn and the town flattened by the air force.

When the British 5th Army finally took Cassino after the 5th cleared the mountains, they took five days to get to what the 11th almost did alone.

The 5th stopped by the German winter line for three and a half months, mounting 100 truckloads of clothing and just to keep warm and after couldn't get it.

Finally, May 11, under a 2,000-gun artillery preparation that "changed the face of nature" as one artillery officer put it, the 5th leaped off from Cassino to the north.

The 8th Division, the first World War II Selective service outfit in overseas combat, broke the Gustav line at Santa Maria. Fantastic and risky, named the "Blue Devils" by the Berlin radio because of a blue shoulder patch.

The American advance broke was made and a junction with the moon armies came two days later in the Pontine marshes.

The American advance through Rome as the enemy fled, bewildered, more than 100 miles before Kesselring pulled his men together again.

The 14th Division, which didn't have time in Rome even to buy souvenirs, dashed nearly 50 miles in four days to take the supply post of Civitavecchia.

With the crossing of the Arno, there was another race against winter when the 5th plowed into the Gothic line. After an artillery preparation so heavy it tore the side of Mt. Altuzzo, the 8th cracked the line itself and the 91st took Pula Pass.

The 8th for the 31st day the enemy off mountain after mountain. Casualties were heavier than at Cassino. Monte Grande was the autumn's closest approach to Highway Nine into Bologna. Like the 34th at Cassino, the 8th needed just one fresh regiment to finish the job, but didn't get it.

During six months in the snow and cold of the Apennines with the highways in miserable condition, and through the bitter patrol fights, the Italian campaign became the forgotten front despite the almost daily toll of lives.

It was here that Gen. Lathan K. Truscott, Jr., took command of the 5th and Kesselring went to the western front for the Germans. Gen. Truscott replaced Gen. Mark W. Clark.

The 10th Mountain Division, including some of the world's finest ski jumpers and mountain climbers, went into action at Monte Belvedere in the winter's biggest advance for the 5th Army. April 16, 1945, the front exploded under a 15,000-round artillery avalanche, in four days

Britain's General Election July 5th Has Many Aspects

LONDON—The British general election on July 5 will be a fight between Conservatives and Socialists, or labor against capital, but it may boil down to a contest between Churchillites and anti-Churchillites.

However, the parliamentary election system, which permits thousands of Britons to vote twice some by proxy, and imposes unusual restrictions on candidates, is a process that still is an enigma to the average American.

Candidates for the House of Commons may run for office in any district they choose, and frequently seek the support of voters who never heard of them.

The voter must be a British subject, at least 21 years old, and hold a national registration card. He may be placed on one or several registers—civilian residence, business premises, university or armed service.

Those on a civilian and business registers may vote twice if registered in different constituencies; universities send their own members to Parliament, so if an alumnus the Briton may vote from that register. In no case is he permitted more than two votes.

Dated July 26
There is a delay of three weeks in announcing the results of the election because of the necessity of collecting the service vote from all parts of the world. (This time it will be July 26.)

In the Conservative Party there is no such thing as a caucus or primary. Anyone can "stand" for Parliament if he conforms to the electoral law, but the party will not recognize candidates not adopted by local associations.

Nominations require only the signatures of 10 electors, plus a \$600 fee which the candidate forfeits if he fails to get a certain percentage of the vote in 10 years. Members of Parliament receive \$2,400 annually.

Asset: Churchill
The Conservatives who like the nickname "Tories," which was introduced in 1673, go into the first general election in 10 years with an outstanding political asset—Winston Churchill—and there is no doubt they will do their best to capitalize it.

Both the Socialists (Laborites) and the Liberals would have preferred an election in the fall when some of Churchill's war-time popularity might be dimmed.

The Labor Party of Clement Attlee, deputy Prime Minister in the coalition government, also has influential leaders. There are Ernest Bevin, coalition minister of labor, and Herbert Morrison, former home secretary and minister of home security, as well as Attlee.

The Conservatives held 359 of 615 seats in the Parliament which was dissolved June 15. Laborites had 165 seats. The Liberal

Party of Sir Archibald Sinclair, secretary for air in the old government, held 23 seats and the National Liberals, supporting Churchill, 19. There were 25 independents.

Sinclair's Liberals stood with Laborites in refusing to continue the coalition government until the end of the war with Japan, which brought on Churchill's resignation.

Liberal: Beveridge
One of the most vocal and well known of the Liberals is Sir William Beveridge, author of the famous Beveridge Plan for social security.

The Conservatives have not issued their party manifesto, but in a 12-point policy for peace they have come out for "the fullest opportunity for individual initiative and removal of wartime controls as the necessity for them disappears."

Churchill has put the party's program in three words: "Food, work, homes."

The Laborites stand for public ownership of mines, railroads and all forms of inland transport, of the iron and steel industry and the Bank of England. Later they propose to nationalize land.

the 5th broke out of the Apennines into the Po Valley and the next day barged into Bologna. When the Po was crossed a German army had died on the plain before the river. The Nazis still had enough ammunition in bunkers hollowed out of the Alps to fight for three years, but no guns to shoot it from.

Around Milan, Genoa and Turin fell to Partisan action and the 5th Army troops marched in. A disheartening prospect of more mountain warfare, this time in the Alps, lay ahead, but the Germans had enough. They surrendered May 2.

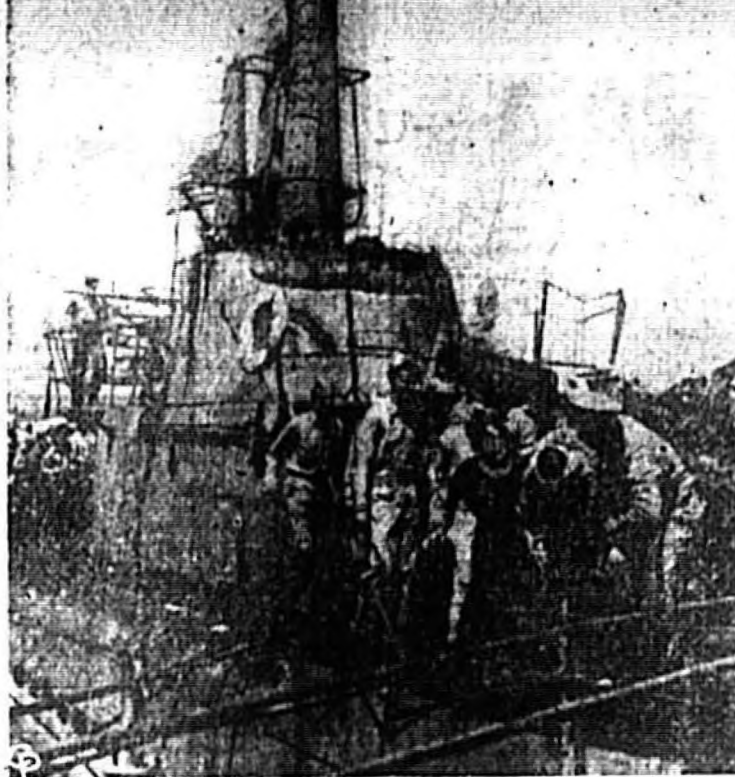

Purebred Breeding Herds Are Part Of Glades Experiment

CLEWISTON, Fla., July 6.—With establishment here of four registered, purebred breeding herds, one each of Sorghum, Hereford, Aberdeen-Angus and Brahman, by the United States Sugar Corp., cattlemen for the first time can observe and study the development of the most popular beef breeds under identical conditions.

The cattle are placed on a carefully arranged pasture subdivided into four equal parts, making possible observation of all four herds from one central location. "As far as we know, this is the first time in the United States that these four breeds have been brought together and are being raised as a single project. Controlled conditions applied equally to the four herds should provide comparative information of interest to the cattle industry, and particularly to the cattlemen of South Florida," Sidney L. Crochet, said.

Crochet, who is in charge of the cattle project, is assistant to J. W. Moran, executive vice-president and general manager of the United States Sugar Corp. He has devoted more than a year-and-a-half to establishing the four herds, hand-picking the cattle to represent the best examples of their breeds. The project is located one mile west of Clewiston on Highway 26.

"The pure-bred breeding herds represent only one of the four phases of the company's whole cattle project," Crochet said. "The three other phases consist of a small commercial herd; the fattening of feeder steers on improved pastures with supplemental feeding of molasses in troughs of feeder steers in dry-dots on the pastures; and the finishing agricultural by-products of the company."

The whole cattle project covers approximately 5,000 acres of improved pasture, which is being planted to such grasses as Tifton 35 and 39, carpet Para St Augustine, Bahia, Digit, Dallas and Pensacola Bahia. Maximum and complete sod has not been obtained yet on the entire pasture, but once effected, the acreage will be capable of maintaining better than one head of cattle per acre unit the year around, present experience indicates.

Crochet said some of the aims of the corporation in maintaining the four purebred herds are: 1. To demonstrate to Florida cattlemen that a good job can be done with any of the four leading breeds under improved local conditions.

2. To get some trace or indication of which of the four breeds are best adapted to Florida conditions once the cattle have been provided with improved range.

3. To play its part in the further development of the now great Florida cattle industry by making available registered seed stock of the four popular beef breeds which have been bred and raised under Florida conditions and which are fully acclimated.

4. To speed the up-grading of Florida's cattle so that a better quality of feeder steers will be available for the company's steers feeding program.

To demonstrate that coincidental with the up-grading of cattle, Florida can economically produce choice quality beef equal to the nation's best on Florida produced feeds.

The Sugar Company has issued an open and standing invitation to all cattlemen to visit the project at any time to observe the work that is being done and to follow the progress of the project so that any experience of the company may be translated to the benefit of their own herds.

Many of the state's leading cattlemen already have visited and acclaimed the project. They point out that it combines the scientific approach used by the state and federal experiment stations with the added advantage of being conducted as a commercial operation on a commercial-sized basis.

Information developed by the project, they say, will have far-reaching results in speeding the improvement of cattle and placing Florida in a leading position in the nation as a beef producing state.

State Department Is After New Men For Foreign Posts

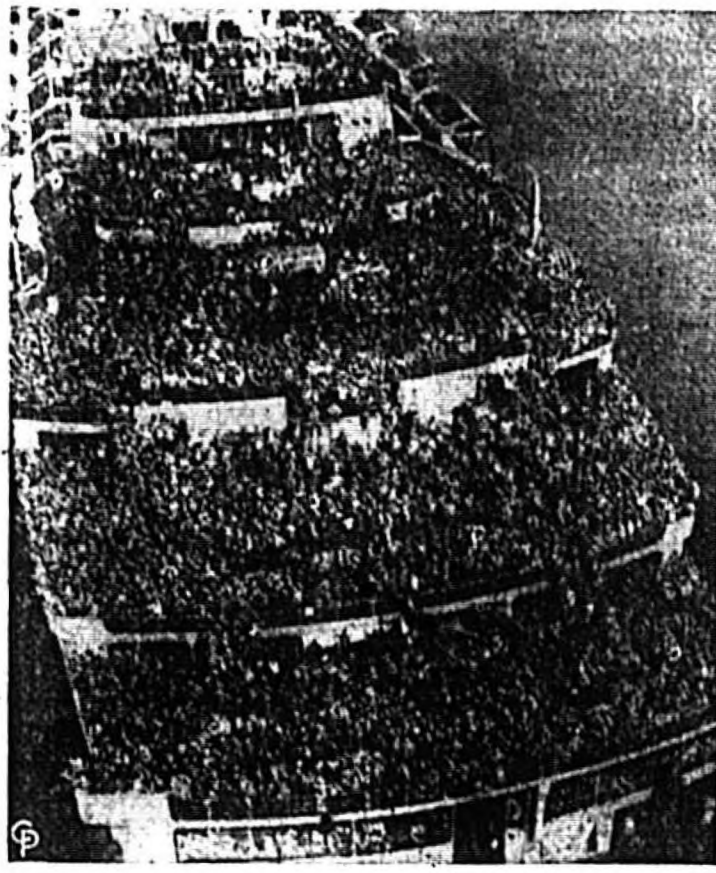

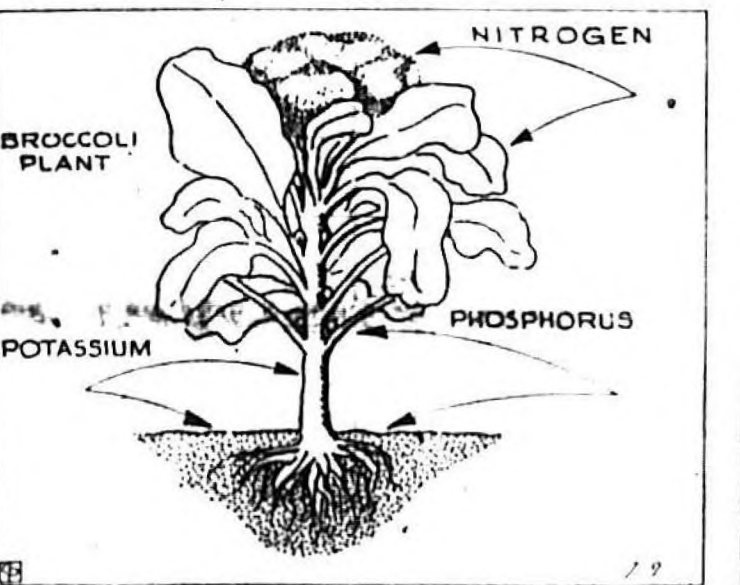

Don't Stint on Food for Victory Plants

By DEAN HALLIDAY
Revised by Central Press Association

SINCE THE purpose of the Victory garden is to supplement war-time food supplies, don't make the mistake of stinting on plant food for Victory vegetables.

The diet of plants consists of nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium, in combination with carbon, hydrogen and oxygen from the air.

If these food materials are supplied in proper quantities, Victory plants will do their own "cooking" and digesting of them.

The accompanying Garden-Graph shows how the three components of a commercial plant food or fertilizer are utilized by plants. A broccoli plant is used for this demonstration because it has a sturdy stalk, heavy foliage and the edible top is really a cluster of flowers.

Nitrogen is used largely by a plant for leaf growth. It also stimulates the growth of the flowers put out by the plant. Too much nitrogen in the diet of Victory vegetables, however, can make a plant put forth too much foliage and delay formation of the flowers or edible portion.

Phosphorus stimulates root development, strengthens stems and in general speeds up maturity of the plant. Potassium plays an even larger part in root growth and development of the stem structure of plants. Yellow areas between the veins of leaves is often an indication that the plant is lacking in sufficient potassium.

Proper use of a commercial fertilizer will improve the health and increase the productivity of your Victory vegetables. The numerals on a bag of fertilizer indicate the percentages of nitrogen, phosphate and potassium.

Freezing At Home

Ninety-eight questionnaires were analyzed of which 75 per cent were from farms, the other 25 per cent from inland family represented was about two persons.

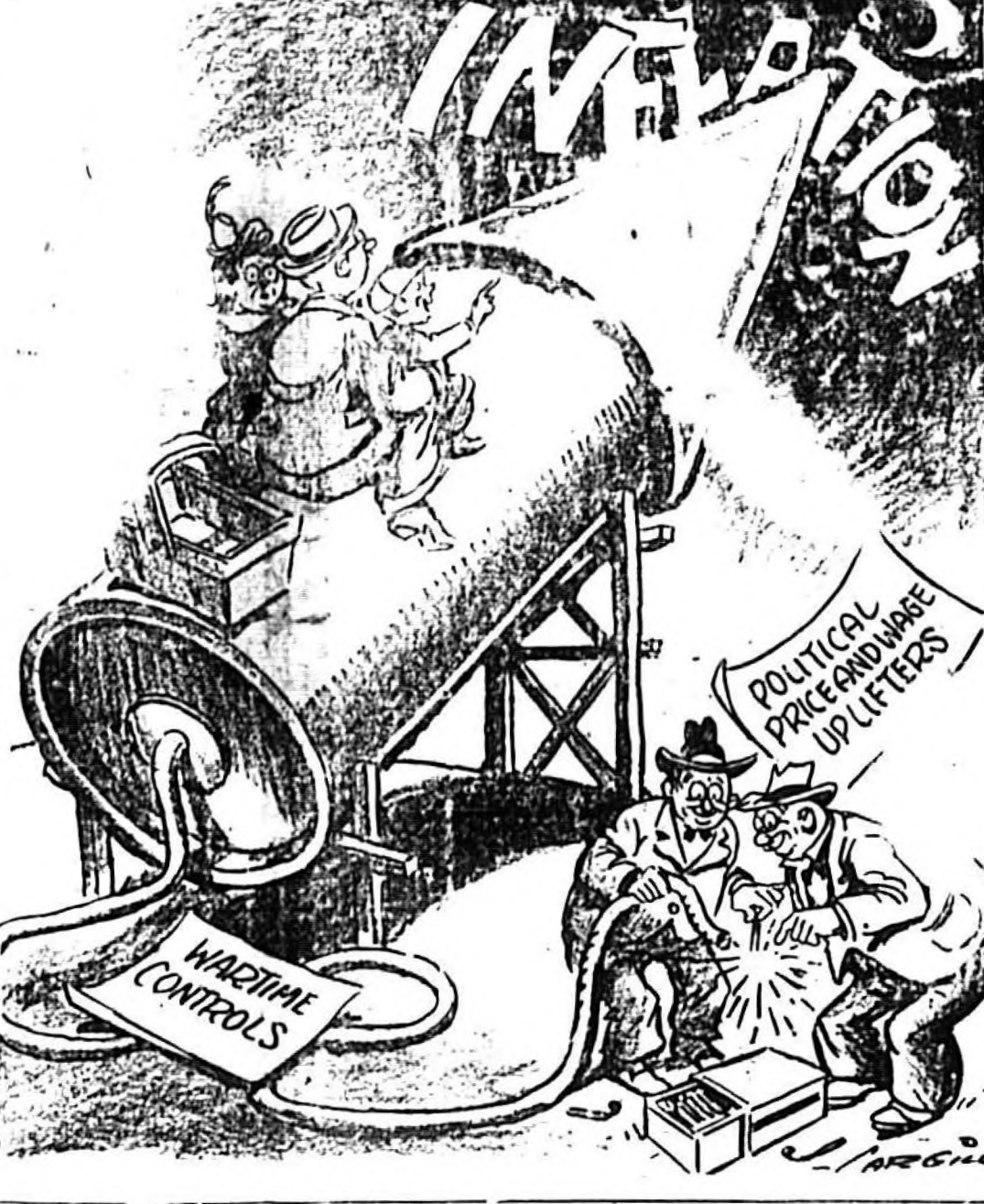

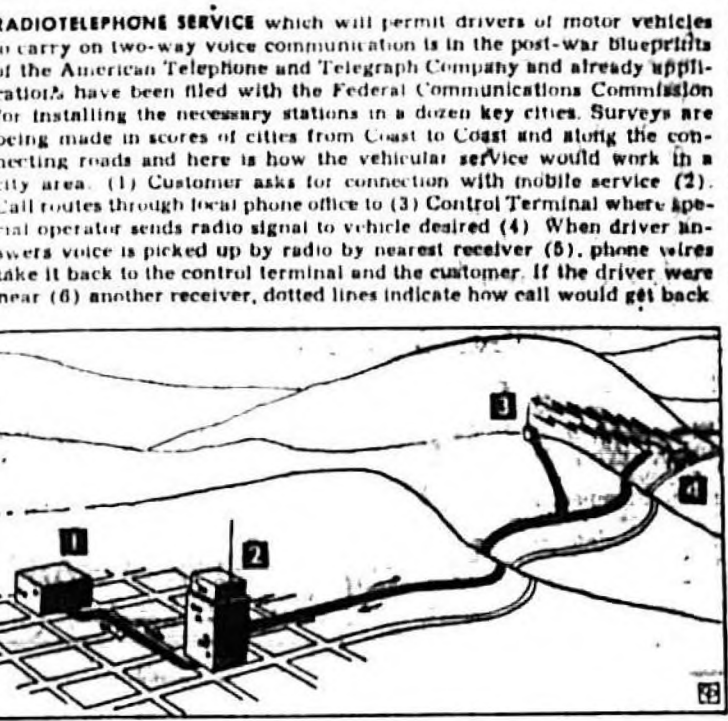
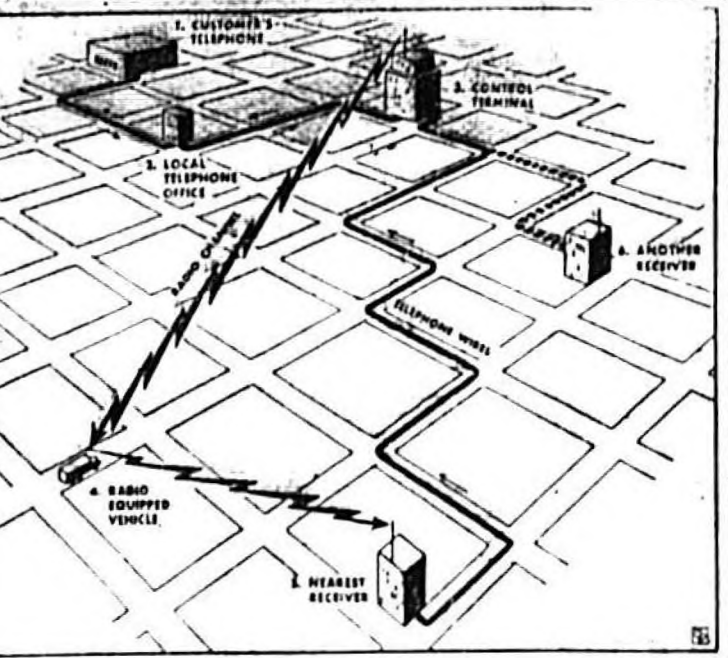

Warsaw Regime Is Recognized Jointly By U. S., Britain

WASHINGTON, July 6, (AP)—The United States and Britain jointly recognized the reconstituted Warsaw government of Poland tonight, cutting off the London exile regime with which they have dealt throughout the war.

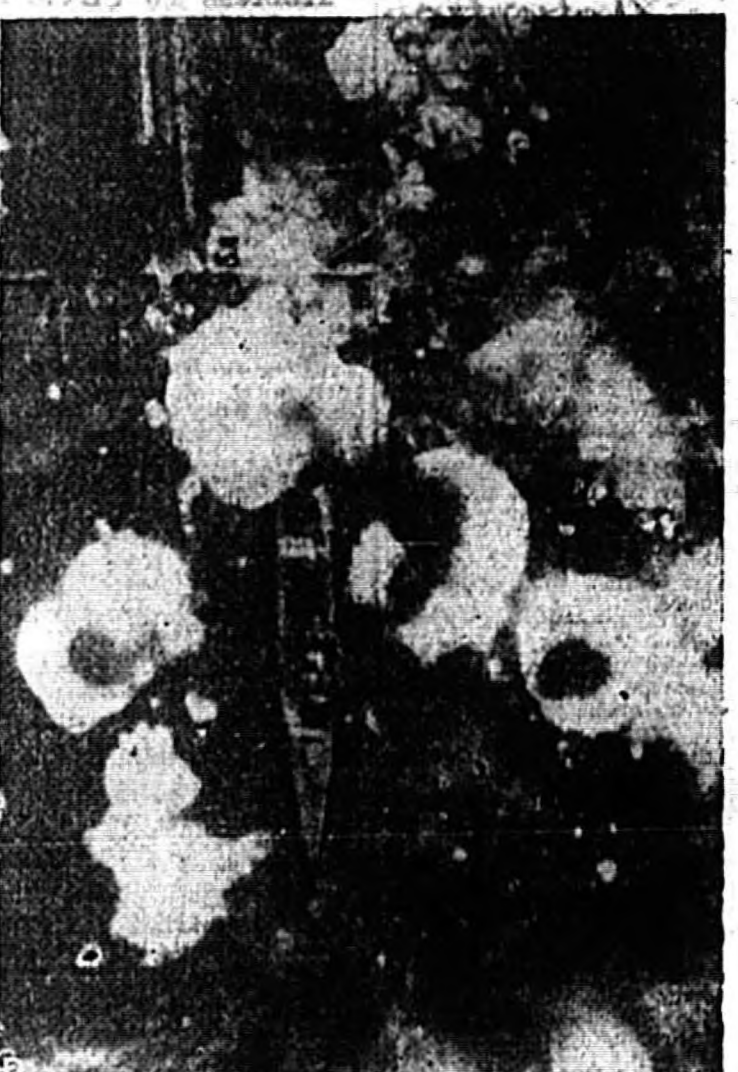
In both London and Washington, however, it was emphasized in the announcements that the setting up of the expanded Warsaw administration constituted only a "step" in fulfillment of the Yalta Big Three agreement. President Truman, announcing American acceptance of the Warsaw government, said it had "recognized" the Yalta agreement in full and thereby confirmed the Crimean plan for free elections.

The President said to his press that he has been named ambassador and "will proceed to Warsaw as soon as possible." The British announcement had stressed on "full agreement with the United States government" in recognizing the "Polish provisional government of national unity," it said an ambassador will be designated from London shortly.

Lane was appointed in September as ambassador to the London Poles government, but never went to London, apparent in expectation of such a shift as came today. In Washington previously he was ambassador to Colombia.

The Crimean agreement by President Roosevelt, Prime Minister Churchill and Premier Stalin called for broadening the base of the Moscow-sponsored Warsaw group, to take in other democratic Polish elements, and for free elections to be held later. Diplomatic comment both here and in the British capital has had emphasis on the elections, and the circumstances under which they are held, as the final important step in letting the Poles work out their own democratic course.

Stankiewicz, Mikolajczyk, leader of the London Poles government has been included in the new Warsaw set-up as vice premier. The new government was finally worked out after long negotiations which all but stalled over Soviet objections to taking in any representatives of the London group. The Russian arrest of 16 Polish underground leaders whom Moscow accused of supporting activities behind the Red army lines, further complicated the negotiations.

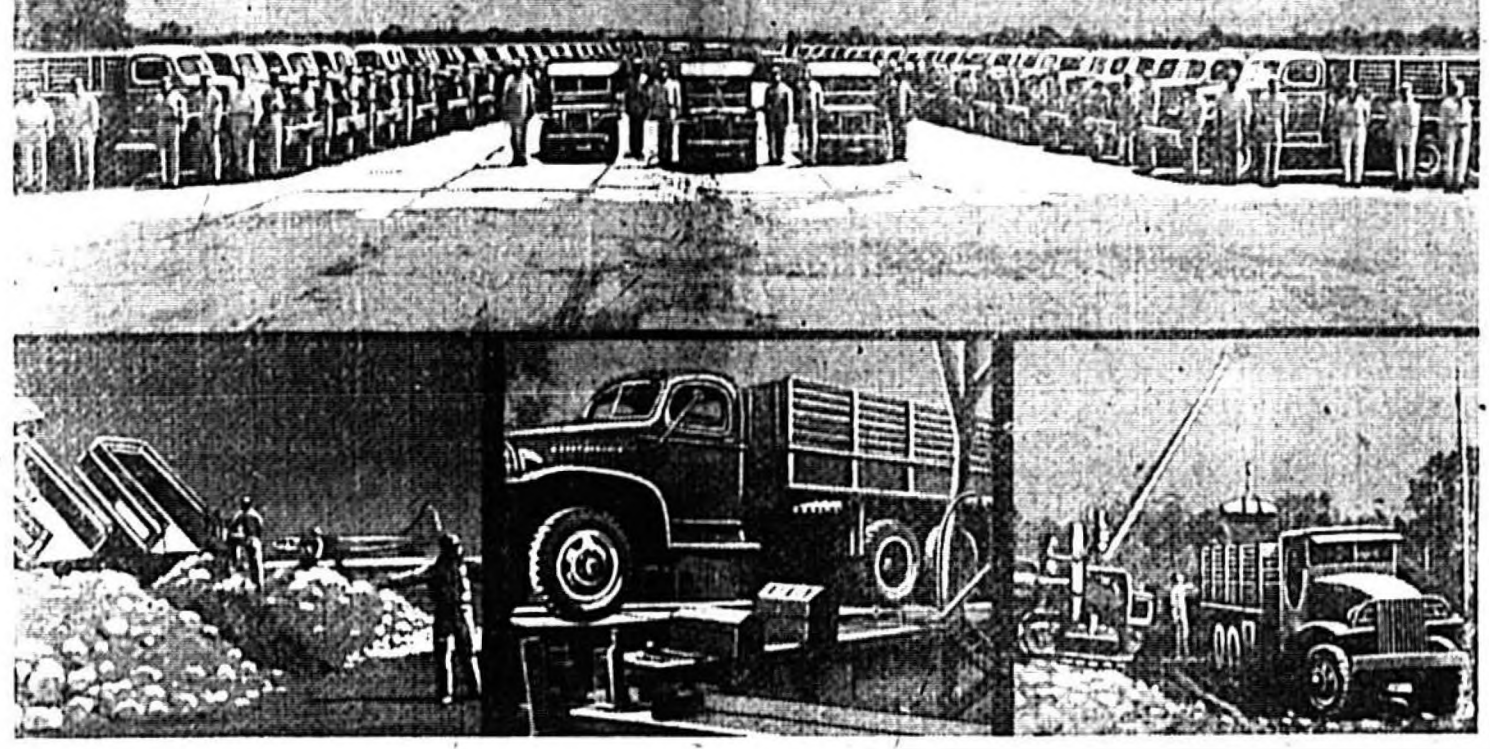
