## Industry Board Set; Plan Mass Program To Entice Business

The Sanford Industrial Board, at its organizational meeting last night, elected Jeno Paulucci chairman and immediately went to work mapping out a massive program to entice industry to the Sanford area.

Named vice chairman was A. K. Shoemaker Jr., while Lee Moore was elected secretary-treasurer.

Paulucci will serve a four-year term as member of the board while Shoemaker will serve two years and Moore, three years. Other members of the board and terms they will serve are: Ernest Southward, one year; Howard Hodges, three years; Harold Slama and Howard McNulty, four years each. Slama was the only member of the newly created board not present.

The commission agreed to go after light industry on a controlled basis but would not close the door on "any Frankenstein" of a major industry. They cited the need for diversification and the importance of capitalizing on distribution network, especially the proposed port authority.

The commission agreed to go after tourist industries and stressed the importance of a freight air depot at the Naval Air Station once the base is phased out. McNulty emphasized the board should not overlook the possibility of tax advantages to entice industry here and board members went on record for setting up joint meeting with both the Chamber of Commerce Industrial Committee and other Chamber officials.

"We want to complement this vital organization," Paulucci said. Commission members also appointed Southward, Hodges and McNulty to screen eight applicants for the manager's job. The board plans to get an "experienced, high-type" person to ramrod industry here.

Indications are that \$15,000 will be budgeted to the commission for the remainder of the year but board members stressed that for a full year's work even \$30,000 may not be enough to "get the proper man."

Members agreed to meet the second and fourth Monday of every month. At the start of the meeting, City Commissioners met with the board and expressed confidence in them. We picked the right men for the job and it was done unanimously," Mayor Joe Baker said.

The board was established earlier in the month to get industry for Sanford and its environs.

## State Probing Raceway Bribe?

Volusia County at DeLand Tuesday passed any action in its probe of a report by Clyde Hart, Samsula rancher, that he had bribed legislators in 1961 and 1963 but "feels there is sufficient evidence to warrant an investigation" by the state.

The grand jurors, pointing out they had insufficient jurisdiction in the state, recommended that copies of the investigation be forwarded to the governor, attorney general and federal authorities.

Hart, former president of Seminole Raceway at Casselberry (now Seminole Downs), charged he bribed legislators to favor racing legislation.

Former Reps. Gordon Frederick and Mack N. Cleveland Jr. were named as having received \$12,500 each. Frederick countered he received the amount for attorney fees.

Organizational meeting has been announced by Robert Carnie, director of the Sanford Male Chorus, and Mrs. Irene Brown, spokesman for the ladies. The chorus will meet at the Sanford Woman's Club, 309 Oak Avenue.

## NAS Sailor Indicted On Murder Count

Volusia County grand jury returned a true bill charging first degree murder Tuesday afternoon against a Sanford sailor, Delfin M. Feris, 33.

Feris is said to have confessed to stabbing to death another Sanford sailor, Bobby Ray Riser.

Feris also is charged with assault with intent to murder his wife, Mildred Annette Feris, 28.

## 'Black Speck' Discussed At Annual Field Day

Reports on progress of research conducted at Sanford and Zellwood in an effort to determine the origin of "black speck" and other cabbage diseases were given by authorities at the annual field day conducted at the Central Florida Experiment Station Tuesday.

The field day was held in co-operation with the Florida Agricultural Extension Service and was attended by persons all over the Central Florida area.

"Black speck," a disease of cabbage which many times does not show up until after the vegetable has been harvested and shipped to market, has brought financial disaster to several farmers of the area.

Just recently a whole shipment of cabbage was returned to a local grower when "black speck" evidenced itself when the vegetable arrived at market in Chicago.

"Black speck" appears as small black spots often in clusters on leaves anywhere throughout the head. It may appear only after several days in cool storage, usually progresses in appearance and severity with time up to two or three weeks after harvest.

Results of experiments to determine the nature of black speck have been conducted at the local stations. It has been determined a relation may exist between the levels of copper in the soil and the incidence of black speck.

Reports were heard from Dr. John Darby, plant pathologist and head; Dr. J. C. Walker, Agricultural Extension consultant; Dr. Paul H. Williams, University of Wisconsin; B. F. Whitner, assistant horticulturist; Dr. G. L. Greene, assistant entomologist; Dr. P. J. Westgate, horticulturist; Dr. R. B. Forster, assistant soils chemist; Dr. H. L. Kibben, assistant nematologist and Dr. W. T. Scudler, associate horticulturist.

A tour of the experimental plots was also made.

A tutorial program acts on the assumption that the economically deprived and culturally separated child's learning problems are predominantly environmental and can be altered by intelligent efforts on the part of a tutor.

### Eastbrook Wins \$50,000 Loan For Swim Pool

Eastbrook Pool Association, Inc., has announced approval of a \$50,000 federal loan applied for through the Farmers Home Administration to aid in construction of a six-acre recreation complex in Eastbrook subdivision in Southeast Seminole County.

Confirmation was received this week from Sen. George Smathers and Sen. Spencer L. Holland, as well as Raymond McCough, area supervisor of FHA.

When completed, cost of the project is expected to total \$200,000. Construction will get underway with the signing of the 40-year loan and the first stage, including a swimming pool, bathhouse and artificial field is expected to be completed in operation by June.

The Junior Olympic 1-shaped pool will be 75 by 82 feet. Other plans call for a kiddie pool, snackbar, tennis, shuffleboard and basketball courts, and a picnic area. The site has been donated by the Eastbrook developers and is located off Eastbrook Boulevard on Tourney Avenue.

The Eastbrook Pool Association has 175 members at present and is limited to 500 families. Members include residents of Eastbrook, Tanglewood, Georgetown Estates, Goldenrod, and adjacent rural areas.

Officers of the association are Maurice Shands, president; Robert Garrick, first vice president; Brad Lyon, second vice president; William E. Arhmann, treasurer, and Mrs. Anita McGinnis, secretary. Other members of the board of directors include Gerald McGinnis, George Waters and A. L. Reed. Engineer for the project is A. E. O'Neal and Shands serves as consultant.

### Russia Would Buy U. S. Sub

WASHINGTON (AP)—A U. S. built research submarine which the Soviet Union wants to buy is being used by the U. S. Navy and will be fitted with cameras next week.

The midget sub, which carries two men and can descend 2,000 feet, is built by the Electric Boat Division of General Dynamics Corp. at Groton, Conn. It was spotted by Soviet submarines when it was on display in Frankfurt, Germany, last year.

A General Dynamics spokesman said the Soviet Academy of Sciences wrote the company asking if it might purchase the 24-foot long sub.

He said the letter was a "dark secret" within the company until it was forwarded to the State Department's Munitions Control Board.

A department spokesman said he was not aware any action had been taken on the letter. The company spokesman said he understood the Soviet inquiry was "under discussion."

Especially the ship could be eligible for sale if it has no military application.

General Dynamics describes the tiny craft as being equipped with "advanced navigation and tracking systems" and says the vessel has mechanical hands which are used for accepting samples from the ocean floor.

The company says the U. S. Navy is chartering the sub named Star III, for research work off Key West and that it will be fitted with television cameras at the Washington Navy Yard.

Cost of the small submarine would be in the region of \$300,000.

But a company spokesman said the Soviets thought \$300,000 would be more appropriate.

Rusk Satisfied

### VFW Auxiliary To Aid Women Of Vietnam

Veterans of Foreign Wars Auxiliary has adopted "Sewing for Survival," a self-help program for Vietnamese women. It was reported at February meeting of February 1967, through letter from State President Mrs. Hannah Handy.

The national president, Mrs. Geneva White, has made an intensive survey to find a program that would help family life and aid the economy of the Vietnamese people. The sewing program has been approved by American authorities and is in line with needs specified by the Vietnamese Veterans Legion, under the general title aid program. Sewing machines will be shipped through CARE, the letter advised.

The local unit voted a donation of \$10 toward the project. A sum of \$10 was donated to the Enterprise School Safety Patrol for its trip to Washington, D. C. in April.

In other reports, it was noted the auxiliaries are the second largest contributors to Radio Free Europe, having given a total of \$12,814.

### Special Election Upsets Calendar For Legislature

TALLAHASSEE (AP)—A survey of Florida legislators indicates that special elections have brought to a near halt preparations for the April 4 regular session and may force its extension beyond the regular 40 days.

Committee hearings and work sessions are being cancelled almost daily. Hearings on local legislative bills have been said up in most cases.

Try to reach your legislators and you'll find that more than likely he is on the campaign trail and won't be able to give you his attention until past six short days before the session.

Senate Rules Committee Chairman Tom Whitaker said in an interview with the Associated Press that special elections "have had a serious impact. It's brought committee work to a standstill."

Many of the more than 50 House and Senate committees, activated last year as part of the first "head start" legislature, "have stalled operations completely."

Whitaker says members of the Hillsborough delegation are attempting to squeeze in hearings on some 100 proposed local bills, but "it's problematical how many we'll get to."

"It's going to bring havoc," predicts Rep. Lywood Arnold of Jacksonville, where recommendations for the complete reorganization of local government has placed an especially heavy burden on lawmakers.

Rep. Bob Allgood of Orlando says the Roads and Highways Committee of which he is a member got through a page and a half of a five-page outline before campaigning began on "local government."

"It certainly is going to result in prolongation of the regular session," claims Rep. Dick Pettigrew of Miami. He said campaigning "is completely diverting our energies from getting ready for the session."

While Brevard County legislators have completed hearings on local bills, says Sen. Elizabeth Johnson of Cocoa Beach, the busy campaigning isn't giving lawmakers an opportunity to test the "pulse of the people" on controversial proposals.

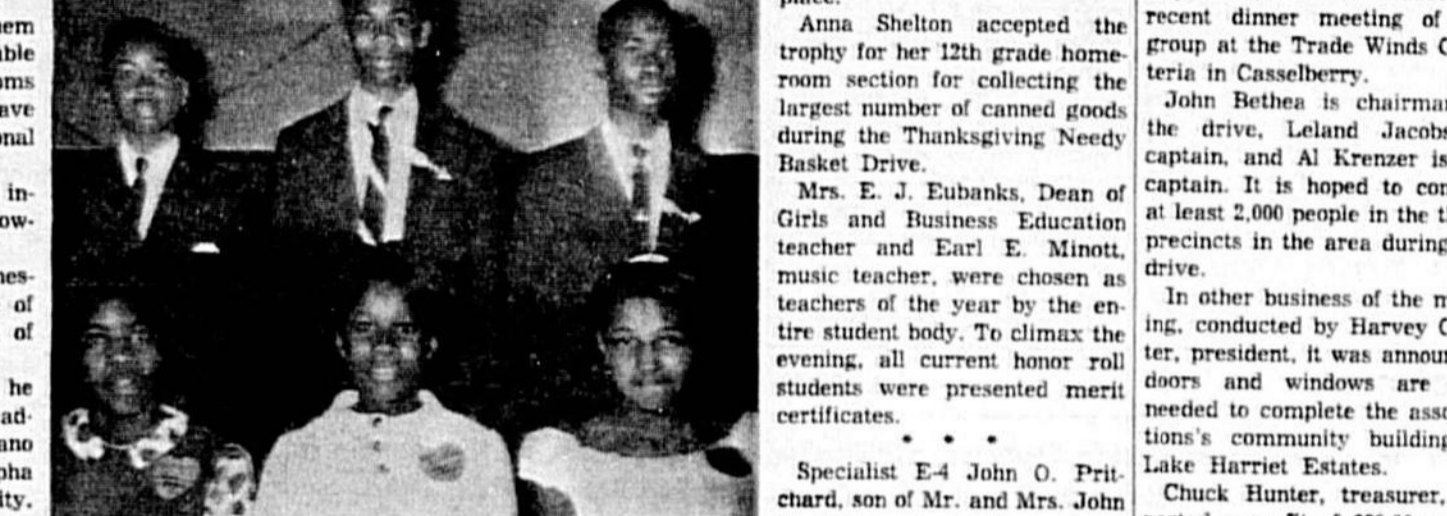

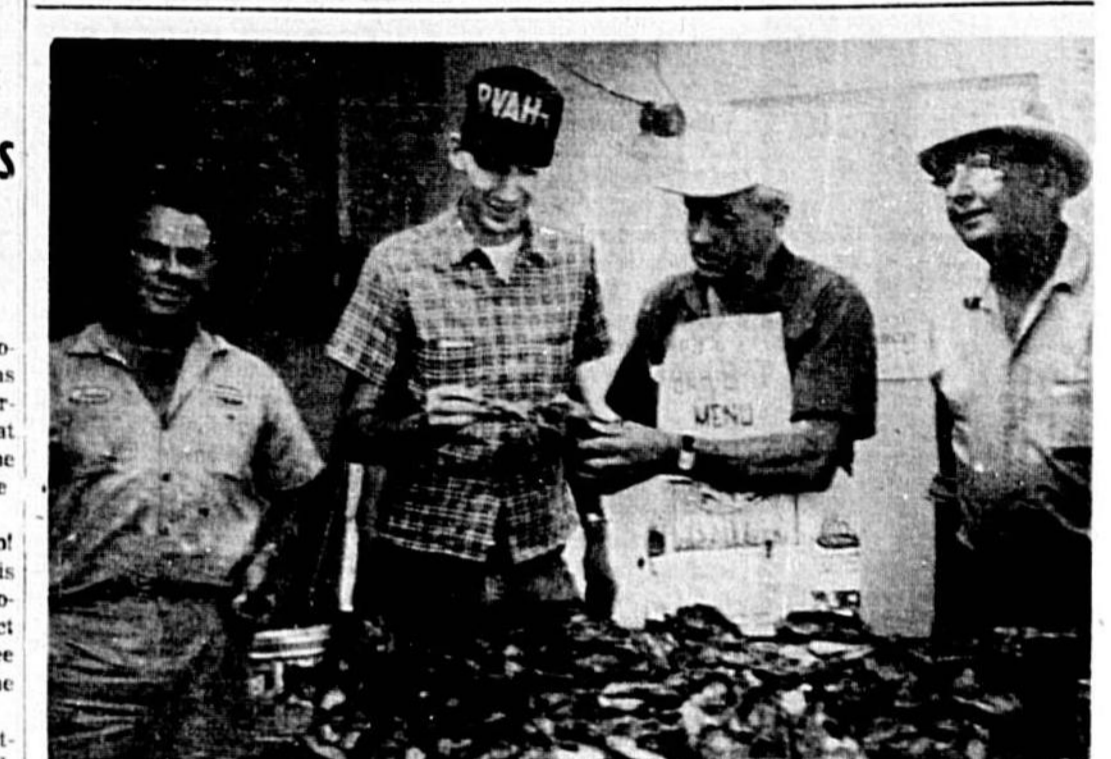

**PENNY'S CORNER**

The casserole is the cook's best friend. With a change in one or two ingredients, the addition of a few herbs or seasonings, you can make any casserole recipe your very own.

Here are a few tricks to remember:

1. A good topping makes any casserole taste better, look prettier. Try the toppings. Try crushed corn flakes, crushed potato chips, buttered bread crumbs or cheese noodles. Now you can buy herb-seasoned Croutets... just like croutons, only better.
2. Remember that with a covered casserole, the liquid will be thinner if you bake it uncovered. If you want a thick, creamy liquid, don't remove the cover. If you don't have a lid to fit your casserole, use foil.
3. If you need to add more liquid during the cooking, always heat the liquid first. Don't add water. That just dilutes the flavor. Use stock, such as bouillon or chicken broth, or wine.

4. Experiment with herbs in casseroles. Use a pinch of basil or marjoram and a bay leaf when you make a meat casserole. A pinch of thyme or tarragon is especially good with chicken casseroles.

5. Keep in mind that 1 can of either tomato, mushroom, cream of celery or cream of chicken soup mixed with 1 cup water and 1 cup raw rice makes a good starting point for any number of economical casseroles. Mix these ingredients together. Then add other chicken parts, left over roast, chunks of stew beef or lamb. There is no need to brown the meat. Cook the casserole uncovered. The meat browns as it bakes. Allow 1 1/2 hours or 3 1/2 degrees.

Remember that you can relax with a casserole. Once it is in the oven, you can sit down and enjoy the good-time hours, knowing there will be no flurry of last minute preparations. All you have to do is relax. Use stock, such as bouillon or chicken broth, or wine.

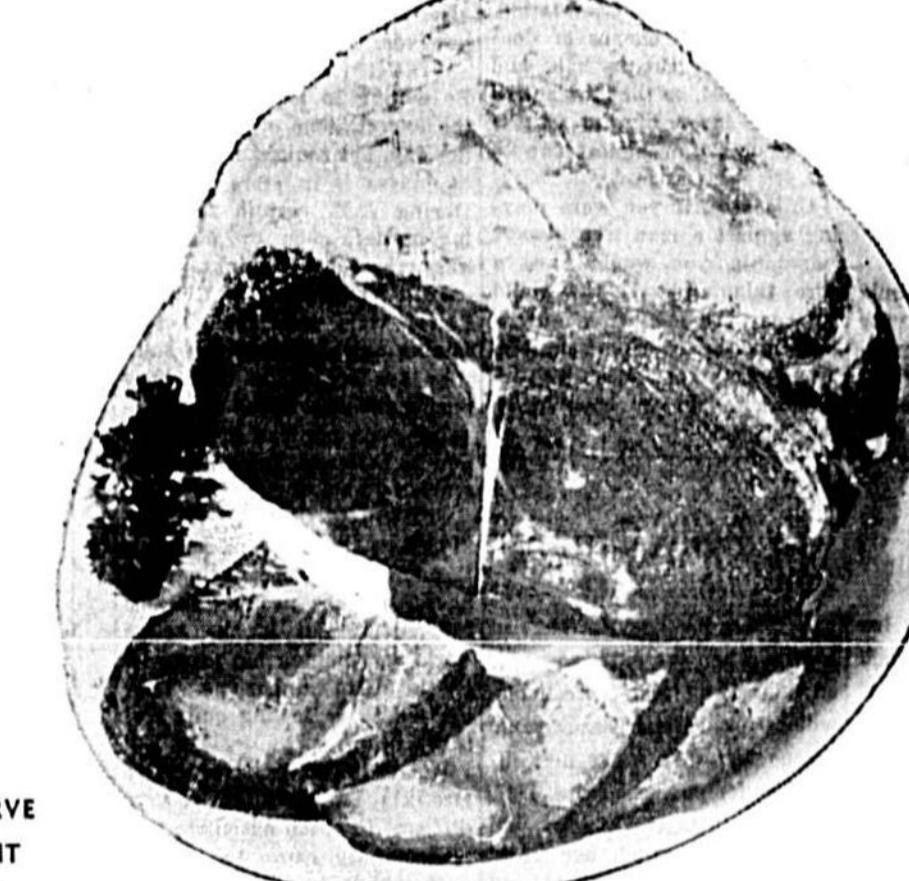
