## House Passes Guard Bill By Big Majority

**Vote 342-33 To Mobilize Guardsmen For Year Of Active Army Service Gives Roosevelt Greater Power**

**Monroe Doctrine Has Teeth Put In It Through Passage**

**WASHINGTON, Aug. 16**—The House yesterday, by a vote of 312 to 33, passed legislation empowering President Roosevelt to mobilize 360,000 National Guardsmen and army reservists for a year of active military service anywhere in this hemisphere.

The bill—an initial step toward quickly increasing the size of the nation's standing army to 500,000—went back to the Senate for conference on House amendments.

War Department officials planned to call up 220,000 guardsmen before Jan. 1, adding these to the present army enlisted strength of 280,000. Brig. Gen. William E. Shedd, assistant Army chief of staff, said Tuesday the Army intended to start mustering guardsmen Sept. 15, calling up 55,000 others who had been summoned Oct. 15, Nov. 15 and Dec. 1.

Voting for the bill were 215 Democrats, 124 Republicans, two Progressives and one Farmer-Laborite. Against it were 27 Republicans, five Democrats and one American Laborite.

Passage came after the House rejected, 207 to 40, a motion that the bill be amended to permit any guardsmen or reservists from the 12 states of the Atlantic seaboard within 30 days after being summoned into service with the armed forces.

Senate proponents of the bill argued it was necessary to approve the measure "to give encouragement to Hitler." They pleaded for passage on grounds that world conditions made it urgently necessary to increase the size of the army.

The Senate—now knee deep in debate on another major defense policy, the Burke-Wadsworth reversion bill—approved the Guard measure last week by a vote of 75 to 10.

All over the case, when the militia bill came up in the Upper Chamber, the battle in the house centered on efforts to restrict use of the Guardsmen to the United States and its possessions. The Senate defeated such a proposal by one vote.

A similar amendment introduced in the house by Representative William J. Miller, Republican of Connecticut, was rejected 110 to 10, after bitter debate.

"Thus, Roosevelt, who had a strong majority in the militia bill, remained resolute to retain over-servicemen, move toward the Western Hemisphere," he said. "He took that chance. He was right."

Miller, however, was unable to induce his colleagues to accept his amendment in the Senate.

## Bradshaw Says All-Star Game Will Be Here

**Coleman And Higgins Represent Fans In Request To Have Sanford Get Tilt**

"If the people of Sanford want the All-Star game, they deserve first crack at it," Charles S. Bradshaw, president of the Sanford Seminoles, said today in answer to a letter by Mayor Walter S. Coleman and Edward Higgins, secretary of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce, requesting and insisting that the game be played here.

"The Sanford fans have been very loyal, especially during the past two weeks when the team has been playing under pressure and under all the moral support they could get," said Mr. Bradshaw.

"I hate to disappoint Orlando, but as long as Sanford fans express a desire for the game, they will get it," the Seminoles' president said. "I was delighted to see such a large following over at Deland. When the boys have the enthusiastic support of the fans, they play better ball."

Orlando, according to rumors that Sanford did not want the game this year, said it desired to have the game played there. Because of the larger seating space at Tinker Field, officials of the Florida State League were said to have approved the change.

Mr. Coleman and Mr. Higgins praised Bradshaw in their letter saying, "We appreciate what you have done for the City of Sanford, both from a recreational standpoint as well as from the point of view of individual publicity obtained for the City by your teams, and want to publicly extend to you our thanks for the splendid work you have done."

The President then said that he had another item of news on which he also would make a direct, quotable statement, which was: "The United States government is carrying on conversations with the government of the British empire with regard to the acquisition of naval and air bases by the United States with special reference to the Panama Canal."

The Chief Executive made the announcement at his press conference but cautioned reporters repeatedly not to tie it up with any speculation about the release of American destroyers to Great Britain.
