# Seminole County Law Wars

### Free legal experts offended when commissioners hired Shutts & Bowen.

SEMINOLE COUNTY - Seminole County Deputy Attorney Louie Groot says that had the American Center for Law and Justice stayed the course, it would have been the "lead" legal team in the county's litigation with the adult entertainment industry. The ACLJ, a public interest law firm

which donates its services, helped the county draft its new adult entertainment ordinance and was prepared to defend it if challenged.

Instead, the county has paid \$200,000 to Shutts & Bowen, a law firm from Orlando, to litigate against a couple of strip clubs which unlawfully opened last year.

A spokesman for the ACLJ said Monday that the hiring of Shutts & Bowen was

among the reasons why its firm withdrew its offer to help the county. "We are experts in this area of expertise and we are free of charge," said Gene Kapp of the ACLJ.

In September, the ACLJ returned an unopened box of pleadings to the county and informed the county's attorneys that it was out of the effort.

# Topic: Lakefront development

SANFORD - The Watertown Master Plan Steering Committee will continue discussing lakefront development this Wednesday afternoon, the 50th formal meeting of the organization since its formulation several years ago.

A continuation of discussions held at the February meeting are expected to high light this month's meetings,

including ongoing reports regarding the proposed hotel/conference center at Fort Mellon Park.

In February, a report on the proposal was presented by member Jerry Mills who gave examples of the three major elements currently being taken under consideration. The first is an apartment/condominium tower, the second consists of a 12 story hotel attached to a conference center, and the third element is 30,000 square

feet of retail space.

Mills said plans call for the civic center and chamber of commerce buildings to remain at present. He said the ball fields in the park however, will be relocated to Chase Park whether the development project continues or not.

In other reports, Mills said plans call for the park to be lighted, have a walk-around and a fountain. The proposed boardwalk and beach is expected to take considerably

more time because of permitting and may be the last parts of the project to get under way.

Another update and status report is expected at this week's meeting.

Other projects being closely monitored by the steering committee which are also scheduled to have updates at the meeting include the plan to increase the Seminole County Courthouse facility, rehabilitation of the seawall and resolu-

### Subdivision considered

HEATHROW - The Seminole County Development Review Board will consider a 90 lot subdivision during its meeting on Wednesday, March 25. The 28.25 acre subdivision, requested by Centex Homes, is located at the north end of Heathrow Boulevard, east of the proposed Heathrow Middle School. Also at the meeting, a site plan approval has been requested for a new 47,192 square foot Winn Dixie Marketplace at the northwest corner of McCulloch Road and Lockwood Boulevard in south Seminole County.

The meeting is scheduled to begin at 1:30 p.m. at the County Services Building, 1101 E. First Street in Sanford.

### Altamonte meeting

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS - The Altamonte Springs City Commission will meet tonight. Items scheduled for public hearing include several pertaining to a change in the city's franchise regarding cable television.

Also on the agenda is a request to award \$45,756 for the construction of picnic shelters in various city parks and an emergency ordinance prohibiting boating on Lake Orienta.

# Lake Mary, airport board to voice concerns over noise

LAKE MARY - Although it is located several miles to the west, portions of Lake Mary are under the glide path of aircraft approaching the Orlando-Sanford Airport from the west. As such, many residents believe the flights present a noise problem, and have been attempting to take steps to reduce the noise levels.

In order to continue an ongoing dialogue with progress and plans being made regarding this matter, a joint meeting will be held this Thursday afternoon between the Lake Mary City Commission and Sanford Aviation Authority. The meeting is billed as a work session.

The agenda for the work session was compiled late last week. It indicates that most of the items listed for discussion directly concern the aviation noise problem.

One of the announced plans previously made by the airport to reduce noise over the Lake Mary area is the establishment of an ILS (Instrument Landing System) from the east rather than the west, where the only

ILS system is presently in use. The system is used by aircraft approaching the airport in instrument weather, required to approach on instruments rather than line of sight.

Airport Director Steve Cooke says the proposal for an ILS from the east has been forwarded by the Aviation Authority to the FAA for approval.

Most of the wind over this area of Seminole County approaches from the east. As lighter aircraft generally approach a field against the wind, it is also a factor which plays a part in planes circling over Lake Mary. This matter is also scheduled for discussion, questioning if, in cases where there is only a light wind, this may allow aircraft to approach from another direction.

As of this past week, the following items are listed on the work session agenda for discussion:

- \* Airport Authority's structure and its relationship with the FAA (Federal Aviation Authority) with a report from ComAir.
- \* Responsibilities of the San-

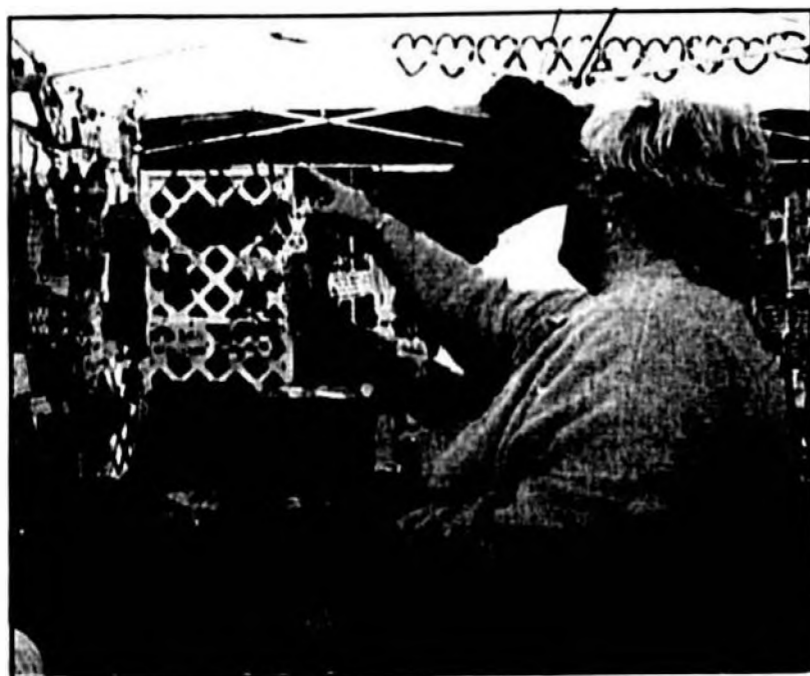

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# A perfect day for Longwood crafts festival

LONGWOOD - If the city commission was going to order a weekend to be featured in a Longwood postcard, this past one would have been it.

More than 200 artisans and crafters crowded into 10-square-foot areas along Church and Wilma streets and in other nearby nooks and crannies to celebrate spring with the Longwood Founders Day art festival.

There was not a cloud in the sky and a cool breeze whispering through the trees, tickling wind chimes and ensuring that no one even broke a sweat.

"This is absolutely perfect," said Maritza Mann who attended the craft show for the first time on Saturday. "I've been to the fall craft show every year since I moved to this area 10 years ago, but I

never knew there was a spring show too."

Mann said she liked the spring show better than the one which takes place the weekend before Thanksgiving because "it's calmer and more laid back." The fall show has a feeling of pre-holiday anxiety, she said, that isn't a part of the spring show.

The third annual event drew steady crowds both Saturday and Sunday.

"I thought it was a very nice festival," said Commissioner Annemarte Vacca. "I enjoyed it."

David Gross said he was surprised at the numbers of people who came to the show. He said he figured the shoppers would save their money for the upcoming Winter Park Art Festival.

"Shows you what I know," Gross said. "I just didn't figure that many people would come to Longwood."

Bob Lomax, one of the organizers of the event, said the festival is starting to gain popularity. As of this time, there is a core group of 50 to 60 artists who signed on to do the spring event. For the fall show, which has been going on for 21 years, there is a waiting list of people who want to take part.

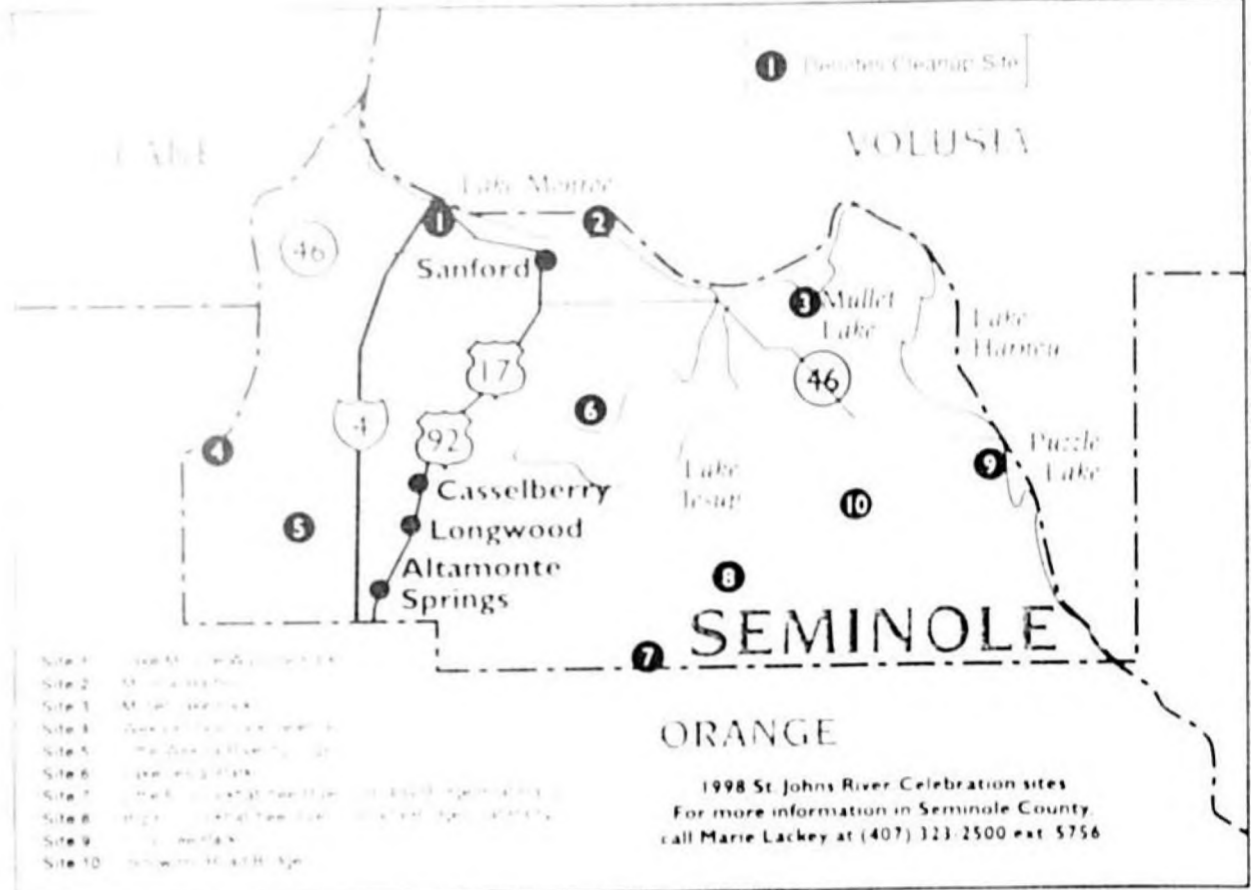

# New manatee brochure now available

The new manatee protection tips brochure is available for divers, swimmers and boaters.

The Florida Department of Natural Resources has been providing information regarding the availability of manatee protection tips. The department is currently reviewing the schedule for these tips and will provide further information in the near future.

Manatees are migratory animals and travel with the change in seasons. During the summer months, manatees can be found as far north as Virginia and the Carolinas. However, as the weather turns colder manatees begin to travel south to warm water sources in Florida such as freshwater springs and power plant effluents. In spite of their size, manatees have very little body fat. These factors may account for their susceptibility to cold water. Water temperatures below 70 degrees usually cause manatees to move into these warm water refuge areas.

Humans, too, flock to many of these warm water refuge areas in the winter to view manatees gathered there. This can be life threatening to the gentle animals. If manatees become accustomed to being around people, it can alter their behavior in the wild, says Patti Thompson, SMC Staff Biologist. This can cause them to lose their natural fear of boats and humans, and make them susceptible to potential harm. Pursuing a manatee while diving, swimming or boating may inadvertently separate a mother and calf, or drive manatees away from a warm water refuge they need for their very survival in the winter.



level is punishable by a fine of up to \$100,000 and/or one year in prison. Any one convicted of violating the state law faces a possible maximum fine of \$500 and/or imprisonment for up to 60 days. The State of Florida can also pursue prosecution under federal law.

Even more important than breaking the law, human interactions with manatees can cause harm, says Thompson. Manatees can be observed without violating the provisions of these laws. You actually have the most to gain by remaining at a distance when you spot a manatee. By quietly observing them, you will get a rare opportunity to see their natural behavior.

West Indian manatees are listed as endangered by the U.S.F.W.S. It is estimated that there are about 2,000 manatees left in the United States. Approximately 43% of all manatee mortalities since 1970 have been attributed to human-related activity, where cause of death could be determined.

The new brochure features a Manatee Q & A section and lists Manatee No-Nos. It also gives the following manatee protection tips to divers, swimmers and boaters: Do not enter designated manatee sanctuaries for any reason. Look but don't disturb. Observe manatees from the surface of the water and at a distance. Avoid excessive noise and splashing. Use snorkel gear when attempting to watch manatees. The sound of scuba gear may cause them to leave the area. Resist the urge to feed manatees or give them water.

Call 1-800-DEAL-IMP (1-800-432-5467) or "IMP" or use VHF Channel 16 on your marine radio if you see an injured, dead, tagged or orphaned manatee, or if you see a manatee being harassed.

her. Cortman also said the ACLJ did not find the sites east of Orlando-Sanford Airport to be desirable for relocation of adult clubs and was not pleased that the county did not enact a public nudity ordinance.

There is an effort by citizens of the county to make the county ban totally mad dancing. The Rev. Mark George from Casselberry is collecting 10,000 signatures to be turned over to Supervisor of Elections Sandra Gourd. The push is to make the board take action of get the matter to the public for a vote.

The debate continues to sizzle at hearings by the board and prompted Groot to send a three-page letter of clarification to the ACLJ.

Groot wrote to Cortman that in July and August last year he had developed a "proposed scenario whereby the ACLJ could have essentially become the lead counsel in the county's efforts."

Groot also wrote that he was surprised in September when Cortman returned unopened the box of pleading files relative to the adult use litigation. Groot said that he felt the legal team (county, ACLJ and Shuttis & Bowen) had "worked effectively and efficiently" during the drafting of the ordinance, the litigation and early implementation of the ordinance.

"I had advised you that the legal issues were being so crystallized that the ACLJ would be in the position of being the lead on the legal team (and that was why all of the pleadings were sent to you)."

Groot said it is possible that communications occurred between the county commissioners and the ACLJ that prompted the ACLJ's departure. "We were, of course, not involved in such discussions," Groot wrote, "but the referencers to such discussions set forth positions that you and the ACLJ certainly did not take during the time period we worked together as a legal team."

In closing, Groot asked Cortman to take the time to address the matters in his letter. "I have attempted to fairly and accurately describe the events. If you believe I am wrong, please tell me so."

# Death row inmate wants execution delayed

JALAHASSEE — Death row inmate Judy Buonoano wants a delay in her scheduled execution. Oral arguments are tentatively scheduled to be heard this Wednesday in connection with the execution presently scheduled for March 30.

The woman has been sentenced to death in Florida's electric chair for murdering her husband, Sergeant James E. Goodyear in 1971 in Orange County.

According to the State Supreme Court since her conviction, Buonoano has filed three separate appeals, with a fourth one

expected to be consolidated with the others.

Buonoano was previously tried and convicted of separate but related crimes in Escambia and Santa Rosa counties, including the 1980 murder of her son Michael Goodyear.

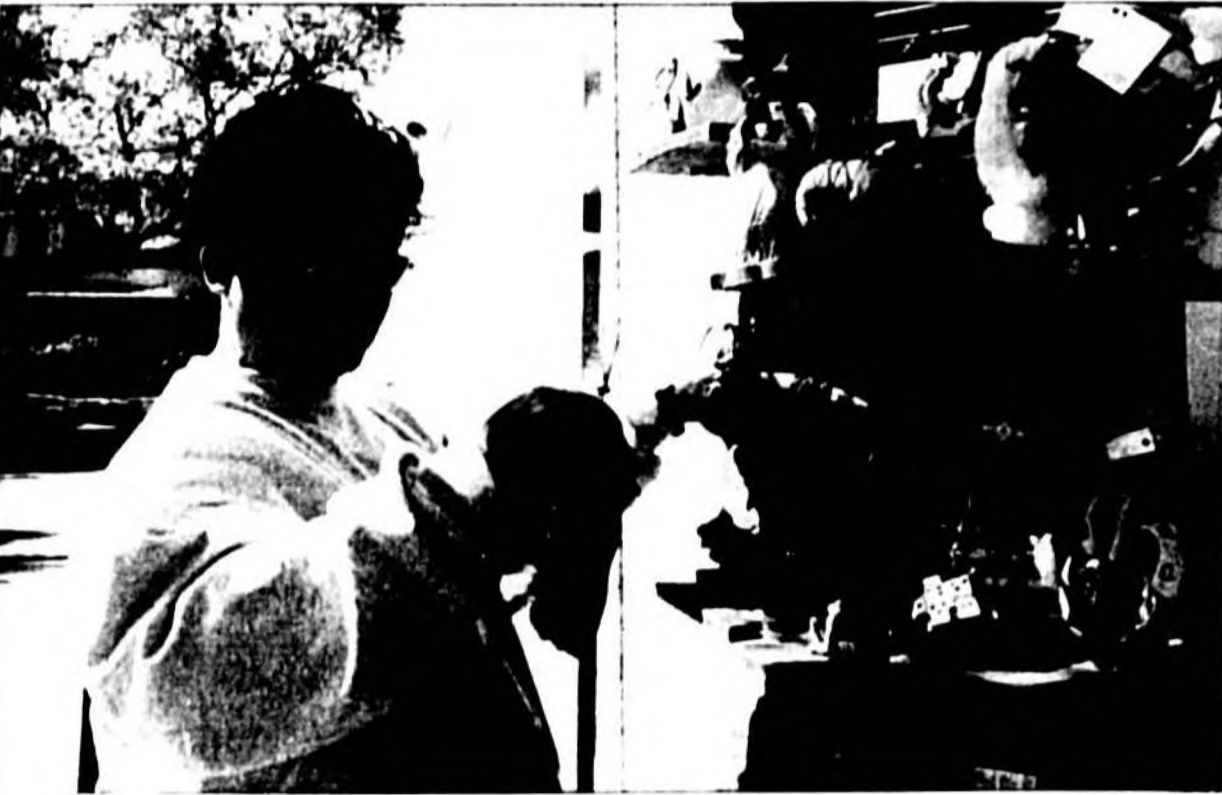
The court says her appeals claim that her execution should be delayed so her counsel can review more than 40,000 pages of federal documents regarding the reliability of FBI forensic tests and so she can continue public records investigations of materials held by officials in Escambia and Santa Rosa counties.

The arguments before the court is considered as an "Out Of Calendar" case be-

cause of the rapidly approaching date of the execution. As such, it could be completed from this week's presently scheduled hearing.

Buonoano's execution has been set for 7:01 a.m. on March 30. It is possible executions tentatively scheduled for the remainder of this month, Gerald Starnes, is executed at 7 a.m. on March 28; Joe Jones at 7 a.m. on March 23 and Donna Boneta at 7:01 a.m. on March 17.

Craig Waters, director of public administration with the Supreme Court, said pending executions inevitably result in last minute appeals to the court, so the present dates are subject to changes.

# A special T for you and me

SANFORD - For the last six years Nelda McNeill has enjoyed creating decorative T-shirts. During the first three years of that time McNeill would use time as a private duty nurse, while her patient was sleeping, to cut out designs needed for the next project.

"I buy material by the yard," she said. "I wash and iron the material and the shirt to get the sizing out. That is a must. I put Wonder Under on the back of the material and cut out the design I want. Then I pull off the Wonder Under and press the design with a wet cloth on to the shirt. Later I seal it with 'tulip' paint. I usually use gold or silver."

McNeill added that her shirts are each very unique. All are personalized and special order. No two are alike and all are done by hand.

She shared that many times she makes shirts and delivers to such large companies as Barnett Bank, BellSouth and other organizations. Often, she and other crafters will attend craft shows together in front of stores such as Wal-Mart or K-Mart. On one occasion McNeill and friends had 20 crafters together in front of a Wal-Mart. Sometimes the group will charge a \$15 fee per table per day and give that money to a charity. McNeill gives frequently to "Mrs. Russell's Children." She said, "She helps atypical children."

Participating in craft shows has become a way of life to McNeill. She has been as close as Upala Community Church to senior centers, a winery in Clermont, Kissimmee, Lake Eola, Oviedo, a hospital near Lake Underhill, schools such as Highland Preparatory and Tampa.

Fees for tables to display crafts range in cost from \$75 at Tampa's craft show, \$10 to \$20 for Kissimmee, to \$125 at Lake Eola. McNeill laughed as she said, "It's sure not cheap sometimes. But I know what

the people like to buy so that helps. People in Oviedo like horse shirts. Churches seem to like animals. I only charge from \$18 to \$22 for each shirt. I put a piece of tissue between each shirt and put them in a transparent sleeve. I'm really a perfectionist. I have a lot of people buy one shirt and come back again for a second, third or fourth shirt. I stay away from ribbons and lace though. That's really someone else's idea. I have my own style."

Designs such as horses, pigs, cows, fish, cats, hearts, frogs, birdhouses and USA pa-

triotic prints are some of the favorites and best-sellers, according to McNeill. She is also firm about only buying "high quality shirts such as Hanes, Fruit of the Loom or Jersey."

She concluded by saying, "I go where I am invited or by word of mouth. I don't use patterns, just my own creativity. I do like to make a lot for my family and friends for gifts, too."

McNeill has been a member of Orlando Christian Center for 15 years. She has one son, David.

## Law: Women can make abusers pay in court

DEAR ABBY: You have recently been printing items with regard to domestic violence. Although it is not widely known, a new federal law dealing with this issue became effective in late 1996. It is known as the "Violence Against Women Act."

It allows a lawsuit for money damages to be brought against an abuser as a civil rights action, if the abuse was a gender-motivated crime and the crime was felonious in nature. This is important because usually in actions for damages, the individual collecting the damages must pay her own attorney's fee. In civil rights litigation, the opposing party must pay your fees.

A (MALE) DIVORCE LAWYER IN FLORIDA

DEAR COUNSELOR: Bless you for taking the time to alert my readers to the existence of the federal Violence Against Women Act. I was not aware of it - and I'm sure it will be news to many people.

Steps are being taken on so many fronts to battle this scourge. Read on:

DEAR ABBY: Greetings from the great state of New Mexico. As you stated in your column, domestic violence can occur in any family at any level of our society. And it must be dealt with by an equally broad spectrum of the population.

You asked the pertinent question, "Why is he using violence?" As was pointed out in a previous letter, violence begets violence. It is a continuing message our society sends to all of its children through television shows and movies that use violence, often murder, as the solution to problems.

Until we can change the vision of violence presented as entertainment to our children, there are shorter-term steps we can take as a community to end domestic violence. In New Mexico (in which 46 percent of all female homicides are the result of domestic violence), our Legislature has taken steps to protect the victims. It passed a bill that makes stalking a crime. The Legislature has also passed laws that prohibit insurance companies from discriminating against women who

have been treated for domestic abuse, and that allow women to file for protective orders in the court without paying a fee.

These new laws exist because of the dedicated lobbying efforts of the Violence Against Women Task Force, a group of concerned professionals that I formed to address domestic violence and sexual assault in New Mexico. More important, the laws would not have been possible without the participants who shared their own stories - many painful to relive - to make us aware of the shortcomings and gaps in the system.

I hope our experience in New Mexico encourages other communities to unite against a common enemy and take action against domestic violence.

## Tips for growing plants indoors

Plants grown indoors are often referred to as "houseplants." But the plants we use indoors usually lack sufficient light and humidity to grow well. This is because the environment in many homes is not conducive to growing plants. These adverse growing conditions are often a problem to the homeowner who needs to learn how to select plants to fit the growing conditions in the home. Here are some tips for growing plants indoors.

**Light:** Plants differ greatly in their light intensity requirements. Plants with highly colored leaves, such as coleus and croton, and flowering plants and succulents grow best when placed in an area where they receive full sunlight. Others like ferns, philodendrons, and many other foliage plants grow well with indirect light. Artificial lighting can be used to supplement or replace natural light. Plants always turn their foliage and flowers toward the light. So, it is necessary to give a half turn to your plants once

a week to keep their growth balance.

**Temperature:** A day temperature of 65 degrees to 75 degrees F, and approximately 10 degrees F lower at night, is satisfactory for most plants. The 10 degree drop at night enables plants to build new tissues. Plants grown in continuously high temperatures often become spindly and less resistant to disease and insect attack. Temperatures below 50 degrees F for extended periods may cause permanent damage to many plants. Wilting often results, followed by yellowing of leaves, and then leaf drop. Avoid placing plants in hot or cold spots.

**Humidity:** Most plants grow best at a relative humidity of 40 to 60 percent. Unfortunately, the average humidity in most homes is well below 40 percent, especially during winter months when heating systems are operating. When the surrounding air is dry, plants will often lose water from leaf tissues at a faster rate than can be absorbed through the

root system. When this occurs, leaf tips become brown and flowering plants may lose flower buds. Humidity levels in the home can be increased by installing an inexpensive humidifier. Humidity in the vicinity of plants can be improved by placing potted plants on a two or three inch bed of wet gravel. Water evaporating from the gravel increases the humidity around plants. The bottom of the plant pot should never be in or under the water, since this will cause a waterlogged soil which may result in root damage.

**Air Circulation:** Good air circulation is necessary to the well being of plants, but plants should be placed in draft-free locations. Areas where cross currents of air occur are not considered good for plants.

**Watering:** When the soil remains saturated, root systems are unable to function properly because of lack of oxygen in the soil. Most indoor plants die of overwatering than any other cause. Most plants should be watered when the potting mixture becomes dry to the touch and not watered on a regular schedule. The best way to determine when to water is to stick your finger into the mix up to the first joint; if it is dry at the finger tip, you need to water. Apply water from the top until it runs out of the bottom of the pot, this method of

watering will wash excess salts out of the pot. Do not allow the pot to stand in water too long, always empty the drip saucer. Watering constantly from the bottom of the container with the use of a saucer or tray brings nutrient salts to the soil surface. An excess of these salts may accumulate in the upper soil layer in four to six weeks and this can result in burning of the plant tissues. It is a good practice, therefore, to water thoroughly from the top once a month to leach excess salts out of the pot.

**Fertilization:** Indoor plants do not need as much fertilizer as greenhouse plants. Also, rapid new growth is often undesirable, as plants may out-grow their containers. As a general rule, actively growing plants should be fertilized every 2 or 3 months. During winter or low light conditions, plants should be fertilized less often. Fertilizers are available in many forms: water soluble powders and pellets, liquids, tablets, sticks, and time release pellets. The liquid and water soluble powders and pellets are diluted in water as directed and poured on the growing medium. The tablets, sticks, and time release pellets are designed to release nutrients gradually and evenly over a given period of time, these types of fertilizers are being used more frequently for fertilizing houseplants.

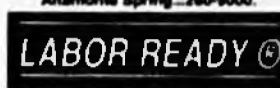

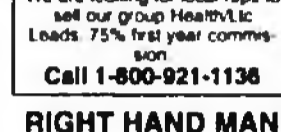

Is there a remedy for foot odor?

DEAR DR. GOTT, I have terrible foot odor, despite the use of over-the-counter remedies. What can I do to alleviate this affliction?

DEAR READER: Judging from the mail I receive, foot odor is an extremely common problem. I hope that the following comments will serve as a useful primer for people with this unpleasant condition.

Because most cases of foot odor can be traced to bacteria on the skin (notably, corynebacteria and micrococci), the usual odor-fighting measures — such as activated charcoal shoe inserts and foot powders — are ineffective. Bacteria grow best in warm, moist, dark environments; thus, the feet inside shoes provide an ideal medium for such bacterial growth, which is often enhanced by the simultaneous presence of chronic yeast infection of the normal outer layer of dead skin.

With this in mind, you might first try some helpful home remedies.

— Go barefoot when you can, or wear sandals. This will expose your feet to light and air, both of which discourage bacterial reproduction.

— When you wear shoes, use cotton socks that are absorbent and change them frequently. Never wear shoes without socks, and try to limit your footwear to shoes that "breathe" or are well-ventilated. Shoes that have a noticeable odor should be discarded, if practical — or, at the very least, cycled and dried before each use. Alternate shoes, and don't wear the same pair for more than 24 hours at a time.

— Scrub your feet thoroughly with anti-bacterial soap every day, and make sure that they're well dried after bathing. (A blowdryer will help.)

— If your feet sweat excessively, apply an underarm anti-perspirant (containing aluminum salts) for a day or two. Spray formulas are the easiest to apply.

— Sweating and odor can frequently be controlled by soaking your feet daily in black tea. Brew two tea bags in a pint of boiling water for 15 minutes, then add the brew to 2 quarts of cool water and soak for 20 to 30 minutes. You may see noticeable improvement within two weeks.

— The application of benzoyl peroxide (5 percent or 10 percent gel) daily will also reduce the number of bacteria on the feet.

If these methods fail, you should see your doctor for prescription drugs. For example, Drysol will substantially reduce foot moisture when applied overnight for about a week, thereafter, applications one to three times weekly should suffice. Additional measures include erythromycin 2 percent lotion or clindamycin 1 percent solution applied morning and night.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I have been told that I cannot eat grapefruit anymore because I take Premarin. But I love grapefruit.

DEAR READER: You can eat grapefruit and take the female hormone Premarin; just don't consume the two at the same sitting. Substances in grapefruit can interfere with the normal metabolism of many prescription drugs. However, if the fruit and the medicine are taken an hour or more apart, no harm results.

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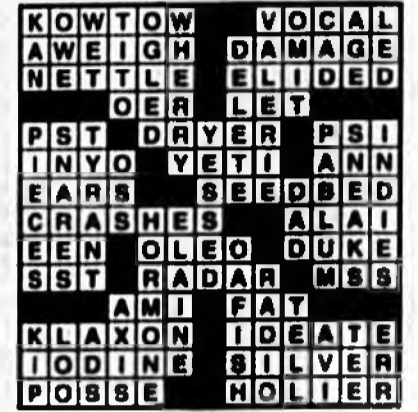

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WIN AT BRIDGE

A tournament troublemaker

Some deals swing vast numbers of points on the play or position of just one card. My particular dislike is a slam on a finesse. If you are vulnerable, usually 26 international match-points (IMPs) are at stake: either 13 in (if the finesse wins) or 13 away (if it loses). This deal was even more expensive, with 30 IMPs on the line. It occurred during the match between India and Poland in last year's Bermuda Bowl.

Please don't ask about the Polish bidding — it was the plot that gave us this story.

Sitting West was Santanu Ghose. Which suit did his partner's double ask him to lead? As clubs was the unbid

suit and the most likely lead, that suit could be discounted. Was East void of hearts? Or did he have the ace-king (or ace-queen) of diamonds?

After what felt like at least a lifetime to East, Santanu led a heart — groan! With this lucky distribution, declarer took all 13 tricks: six spades, three hearts and four clubs (with the aid of the finesse and break). South's diamond losers went on dummy's top hearts. The score? Plus 1860 to Poland.

What happened at the other table? Well, the Indians stopped in four spades. There, Cezary Balicki (West) found the diamond lead. Adam Zmudzinski (East) took three tricks in the suit, then led his last diamond, which promoted a trump trick for the defense: one down! That gave Poland 18 IMPs, whereas if Santanu had led a diamond, India would have gained 12 (being plus 800 and minus 100).
