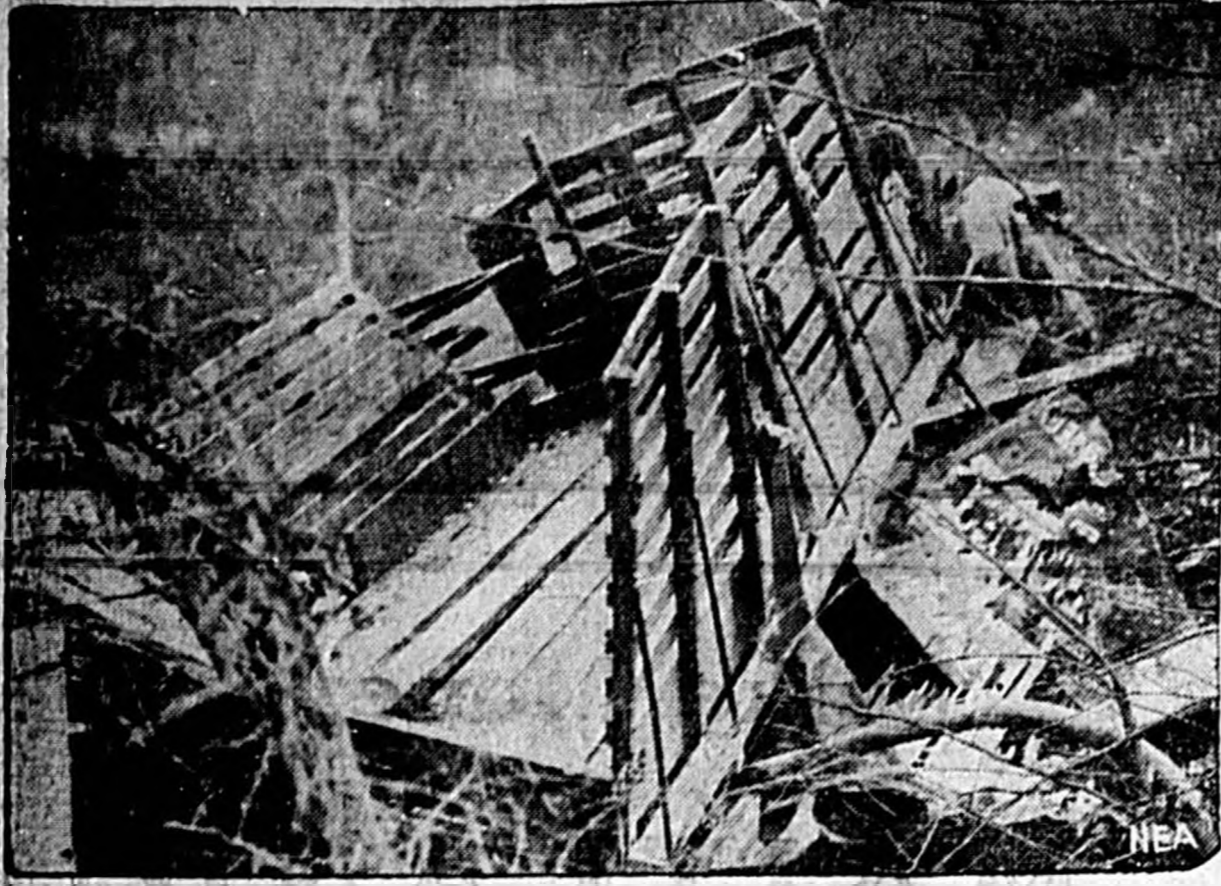


2 Die, 35 Hurt as Truck Is Wrecked

MIAMI EXTENSION IS ABANDONED BY SEABOARD ROAD

Action Follows Refusal Of Property Owners to Stand By Their Pledges to Give Rights of Way to City

WEST PALM BEACH, Nov. 17. (AP)—Refusal of property owners to stand by their pledges to S. Davies Warfield, president of the Seaboard Air Line Railroad, to give the road rights of way into Miami resulted in declaration today by B. X. Stanley, vice president of the Seaboard Air Line Railroad that the Miami extension has been abandoned by the road.

Should property owners later decide to adhere to their promises of rights of way, Stanley said, the road is prepared to begin construction within four days.

Announcement of a similar nature was made several days ago by S. Davies Warfield, but the subsequent statement of Mr. Stanley is far more vigorous as it positively announces abandonment of the project unless the rights of way are given.

Mr. Stanley's statement was made at 9 o'clock this morning following a conference with West Palm Beach property owners and officials. He asserted that if rights of way are not forthcoming he will seek to publish names of those property owners who refuse rights of way thereby halting construction.

He has been convicted of murder in the first degree. Sentence will be pronounced and death mandatory issued.

He has been indicted but not tried for the kidnapping for \$1,000 ransom and murder Sept. 4, of six year old Mary Daly and has confessed his responsibility.

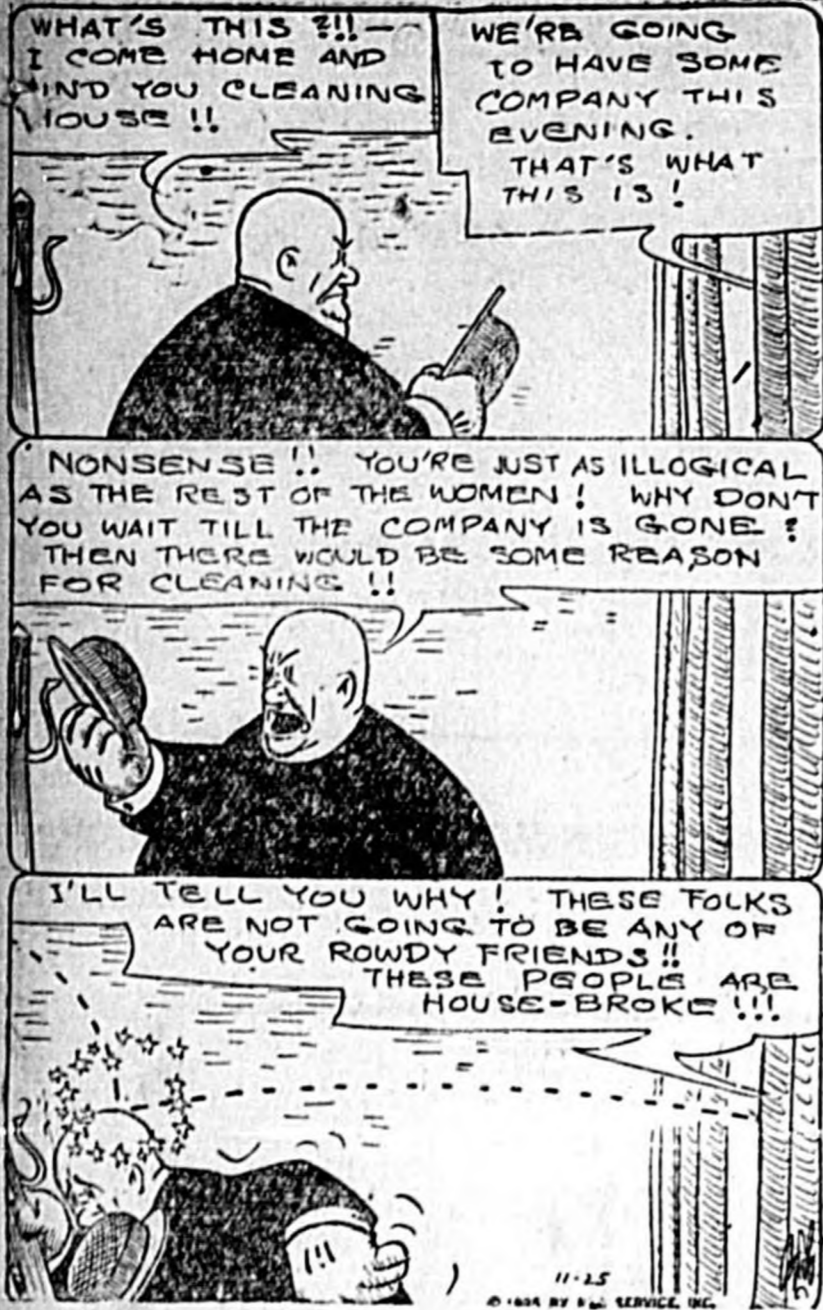

Do most of your early Christmas shopping early, but buy your Christmas cards even earlier. Some women, who have personal cards made from special designs, begin negotiations in June or July, and if you want to have your name engraved on cards for Christmas then you ought to give your order early in the autumn if you want to avoid confusion and delay later on. Some of the engravers offer a discount for all such work ordered before the first of October—in an effort to relieve the last-minute rush to some extent.

Even if you get cards without engraving you should buy them now if you want to be sure of a wide assortment. ALLEGED SLAYER IS ARRESTED BY KENTUCKY POLICE

Meanwhile Killings in Two Other Eastern Kentucky Counties Are Being Investigated By County Officials

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Nov. 19.—(AP)—Dave Steele, charged with the murder of Sheriff Joe Morgan, which precipitated feudist outbreak at Hyden, Leslie county, Saturday, necessitating sending troops there, was under arrest today and authorities of two other eastern Kentucky counties were investigating slayings in their respective jurisdictions.

Dispatches from Frankfort Wednesday night stated that Adj. Gen. Kehoe had received a wire from Capt. James A. Wooten, commanding the detachment of 21 guardsmen sent to Hyden from Hazard over horseback trails, that he had placed Steele in custody and that the tense situation, caused by the arming of 200 partisans of the dead man and his alleged slayer, had quieted. At the same time advices from Whitesburg and Cynthiana told of the slaying of Ison Caudill, 20, Breathitt county mountaineer, and James B. Sturgeon in the Elk Creek and Broadwell district.

Relatives and friends of Morgan and Steele, both prominent, held a peace conference at Hyden Wednesday night in an effort to stall lawlessness by the rougher element of Leslie county, who were using the slaying as the basis for a pitched battle.

Caudill died in a hospital at Blackeye, Ky., from wounds inflicted by Polly Engle, 16 year old daughter of a widow he is alleged to have shot down while on a moonshiners' rampage in the Elk Creek district near the Letcher-Perry Junction. The girl used an old rifle and two shots took effect. Sturgeon, who was shot by Ray Claypool, who claims self defense, was struck twice at short range with a shotgun.

of the Navy personally. STATE TREASURY SHOWS DECREASE OVER SEPTEMBER

Balance On Hand At Close Of October Is \$300,000 Less Than On September 30; Large Disbursements Made

TALLAHASSEE, Nov. 19.—(AP)—The balance in the Florida State Treasury on Oct. 31 was nearly \$300,000 less than that of Sept. 30, according to the monthly statement of disbursements, receipts and balances, issued here.

On Oct. 31, the balance shows \$4,245,662.29 in the treasury as compared with \$4,523,813.97 at the end of September, the statement says.

Notably among the month's receipts was that of the State Road License-Gas, which brought \$520,447.49 into the treasury. Of that amount, however, \$485,979.78 was disbursed.

The total in receipts for October was \$4,808,800.58, while the disbursements amounted to \$3,036,962.25, or nearly \$300,000 more in disbursements than receipts, which accounts for the decrease in the balance on hand for October, although an increase was shown in the balance for September.

Following is a list of some of the larger disbursements:

General revenue, \$428,660.45; drainage tax fund \$125,536.90; drainage bond fund, \$191,285.69; principal state school, \$261,839.70; state road license-gas, \$485,979.78; state federal aid road, \$193,163.23; and suspense account, \$895,479.77.

The larger receipts included those on the state road tax fund, amounting to \$1,070,798.28; general revenue, \$433,961.71; drainage bond fund \$123,425.83; principal state school, \$119,153.87; state road license-gas, \$520,447.49; and county road license fund gas, \$173,482.49.

Shippers Ask Relief From Rail Embargoes

MOBILE, Ala., Nov. 19.—(AP)—Shippers of freight by rail and water today asked the railroads to release the embargoes on freight moving from this city to south Florida points.

Both the Louisville and Nashville and Southern have declared embargoes, the former using the permit system for moving cars, while local officials of the latter line said that permits from that line would be issued at an early date.

"One Armed" Wolfe Is Guilty Of Murder

MUNCIE, Ind., Nov. 19.—(AP)—Judge Clarence Darrh in the Delaware court Wednesday night pronounced the verdict of a jury, which found Charles (One Arm) Wolfe guilty of murder in the first degree in connection with the slaying of Ben Hance, a farmer, on Aug. 14, fixing his sentence at life imprisonment.

Hance and his wife were slain last August when they were beaten on a country road near here. Before he died, Hance identified Wolfe and George (Dutch) Anderson as his assailants. It was assumed at the time that their motive was to retaliate against Hance for information he was alleged to have given the authorities which led to the arrest of Gerald Chapman, pal of Anderson, in Muncie, earlier in the year.

Wolfe broke completely down when the court read to him the verdict of the jury. His head found his hands, while elbows rested on his knees, and he said to his mother, seated beside him: "Mother, I'm not guilty." Judge Darrh did not indicate when sentence would be pronounced.

HOUSE DELAYS ACTION ON NEW BUILDING BILL

Committee Wants More Time To Consider Measures For Money To Erect Buildings At The State Prison Farm

Thirty-Three Local Measures Presented

Duval And Hillsborough Representatives Have Number Of Bills For Introduction

TALLAHASSEE, Nov. 19.—(AP)—General legislation relating to appropriations for new buildings at the state prison farm at Raiford and for the new public building in Tallahassee to house overcrowded state departments was postponed at the opening of the house this morning when the committee asked for an extension of time to consider the measures.

These two general measures, introduced after Governor John W. Martin's special message was read in the house yesterday. Each carried an application of \$300,000 and a third general measure, for funds to pay salaries and traveling expenses of circuit judges and district attorneys during parts of the years 1925, 1926, 1927, not provided for in the regular 1925 session were referred to the committee with exception. They will probably report back, later today.

Thirty-three local bills were introduced and placed on the calendar. Included in them were several bills granting further powers to the city of Jacksonville. One bill by Speaker Milam and Representative Waybright of Duval, provided for additional fire equipment, while another bill by the same author would abolish the present form of municipal government in Jacksonville and create in its stead a commission form.

A bill to authorize the city of Jacksonville to acquire, construct and operate radio broadcasting stations, aeroplane fields, and stadiums, to rent or lease same, or to charge an admission fee to

each was introduced by Milam and Waybright, representatives. Another bill was introduced to amend certain sections of chapter eight, 277 laws of Florida, relating to the act authorizing pensions for employees of the city of Jacksonville.

Authority to pass ordinances to prohibit blocking of street crossings by railroad trains in the city of Tampa for more than five minutes at a time or for more than an aggregate of 15 minutes in a period of an hour was introduced by Representative Whittaker of Hillsboro.

Other bills introduced by Representative Whittaker relating to the city of Tampa, included measures authorizing the city to extend its limits to include the municipalities of Sulphur Springs, Park and Port Tampa and providing a referendum on some; empowering the city to compel railroads operating in the city, on notice of not less than six months, to elevate their tracks so as to permit vehicles including street cars, to operate beneath them; authorizing the city to issue improvement bonds not exceeding an amount of \$200,000 without a vote of the people.

Four general measures passed. Four general measures have been passed by the house and were to be reported back to the senate for final action in that body and three measures carrying appropriations were to be entered today.

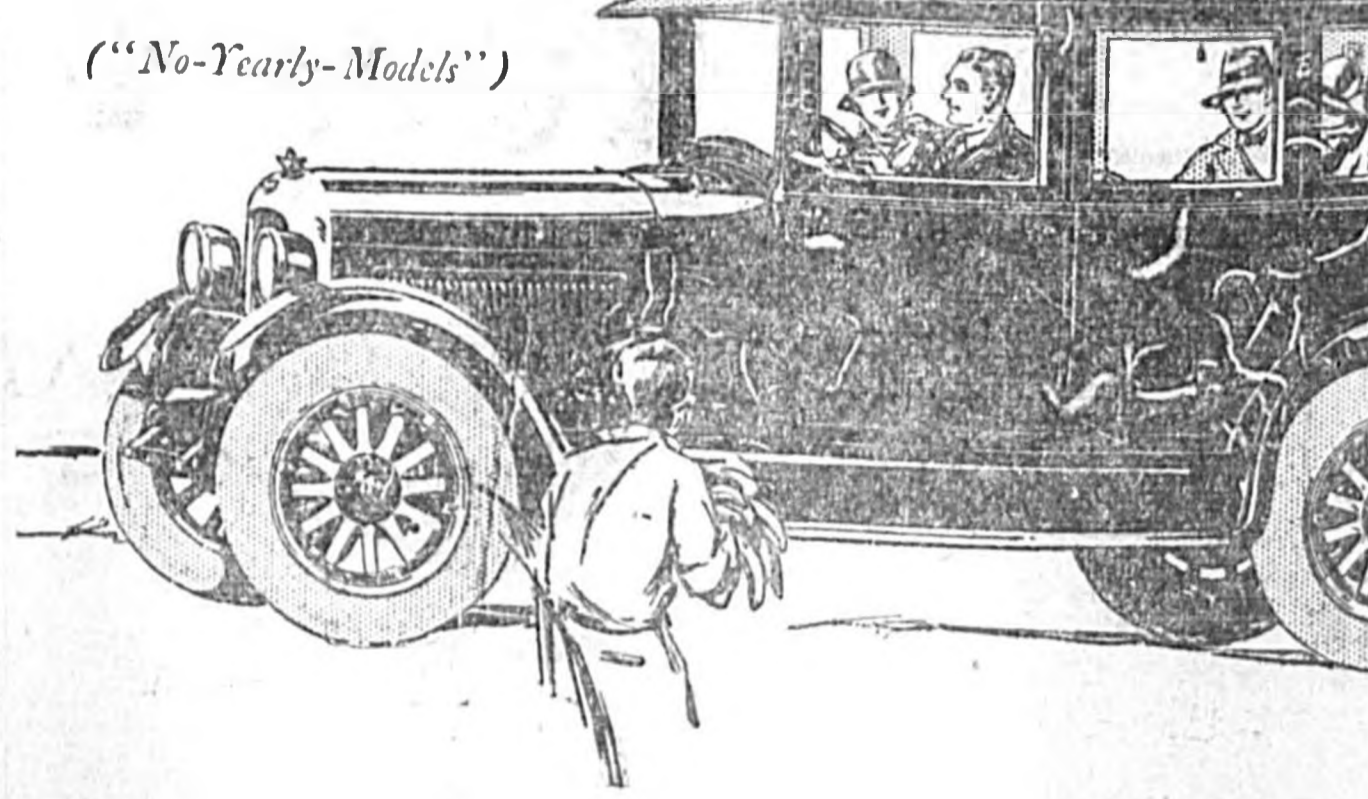

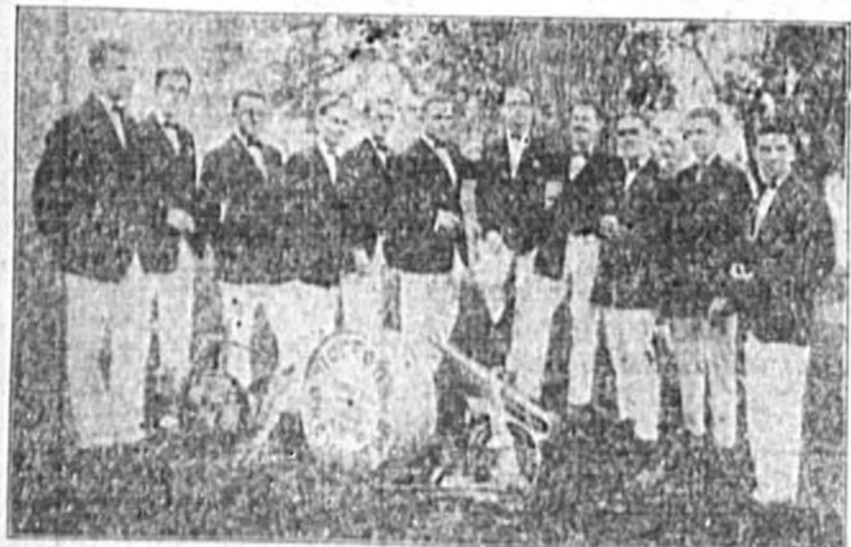

FLOURNOY KICKS WAY TO FAME AS TULANE PLAYER

Greenback Star Has Made An Enviably Record That Compares Favorably With Punting of Thurman, Scarborough

NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 18.—(AP)—Flournoy of Tulane, who has kicked his way to glory everlastingly in Southern football this season, seems to have won the right to quite properly ask two other great southern football players to move over and make room for him in the South's hall of fame for punters. Records indicate that every decade a sensational booter comes out of the South. In 1905 Scarborough of Sewanee showed the way. In 1915 Thurman of Virginia had no equal, and in 1925 Flournoy can swap kicks with any in the business.

Punts on a football field seem longer when estimated with the naked eye than when the relented tape is applied. And dusting off records in the dim football past may fail to discount the enthusiasm of exciting moments but there seems to be little to choose between the performance of these three heroes of the strong foot. Certain it is that except for the trio many have sent the ball 60 and even 70 yards on its way with an occasional reference of 75 yard successes when a friendly wind of hard field was present to lend a hand.

Thurman was big all over and played guard, Flournoy is tall and rangy and plays half-back, Scarborough was not big but was heavy in the feet. Flournoy's average this year unofficial and certainly not guaranteed to the foot nor inch, has been placed at 48 yards.

Thurman was credited with a 50-yard average in 1915 and only slightly less the following year. Scarborough played three year at Sewanee and averaged more than 46 yards for his college career.

Southpaw Golfer Switches To Right And Wins Tourney

BIARRITZ, Nov. 2.—(AP)—Arnaud Massey, who at the age of 48 has just captured the "open" golf championship of France from a field including some of the best players in England, started his golfing career as a southpaw. He switched over to the right when informed that "no left hander had even won the championship of Great Britain."

Massey was born here in Biarritz and in the summer of 1890 went to work as a caddy on the local golf links, where he is now the "pro." An English banker, for whom young Arnaud carried the clubs, noticed the boy's excellent dispositions for the game and asked him if he would like to take up golf in earnest and learn the game from the best professors in the world. Young Massey left for Scotland within 24 hours. "Hoot mon," exclaimed Sandy Herd, who was the first player to take an interest in the young Frenchman, as the Scotchman saw him swinging his club from the port side. "No golf player ever won the championship of these Isles playing left handed." Massey immediately began hitting the ball from the right side and made wonderful and rapid improvement. He remained in Scotland six years.

In 1907 he won the World's championship at Hoylake. His nearest competitor was Sandy Herd.

SERVICE TEAMS TO BATTLE FOR COOLIDGE'S CUP

Washington To Be Scene Of Gridiron Fight Between Army And Marine Elevens

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—(AP) Here in the National capital at the Griffith Stadium, there will be enacted on Saturday, Nov. 21, a grim gridiron battle between the Army and the Marine Corps, for the President's cup to settle the National Inter-service football champion of 1925.

The Army is the defender and the Marine Corps the challenger. The former won the President's cup and the title last year, in a game against the Navy, taking the whole works with it to Fort Benning, Ga., the home of the Infantry school. The Marines overwhelmed the scouting fleet of the Navy at Norfolk on Armistice day, submerging the Admiralty under a 44 to 0 score. By virtue of the victory the sea-soldiers earned the right to engage the Army.

Secretary of War Davis has come out with the statement that this game is the big service game for the enlisted men. That is true, for the clash involves the national championship between the three

services—the Army, Navy and Marine Corps. Here will assemble a great galaxy of celebrities, cabinet members, ambassadors, generals, admirals and possibly President Coolidge himself, who is the donor of the cup.

President Neutral
In this contest the President will have to be neutral, though. He is commander-in-chief of both services and equally a fan of the Army and the Marine Corps. So he will judiciously leave the rooting to the Secretaries of War and Navy.

The Army team is truly representative of the hundred thousand real soldier team. By the terms of the agreement between the contestants and the wishes of the President only one officer will be allowed to play on either team at any one time. The Marine Corps teams is likewise representative of the "leadthecks," and this Quantico squad expects to hold its own against the Army. As a matter of fact, Jack Keady, the Marines' coach, feels certain of winning.

The Fort Benning players have a backfield who will swoop around the Marine Corps' end like comets, say the Army men. The assertion is nearer the truth than an uninformed citizen would credit. They have Smythe and McQuarrie, two former West Pointers to run back

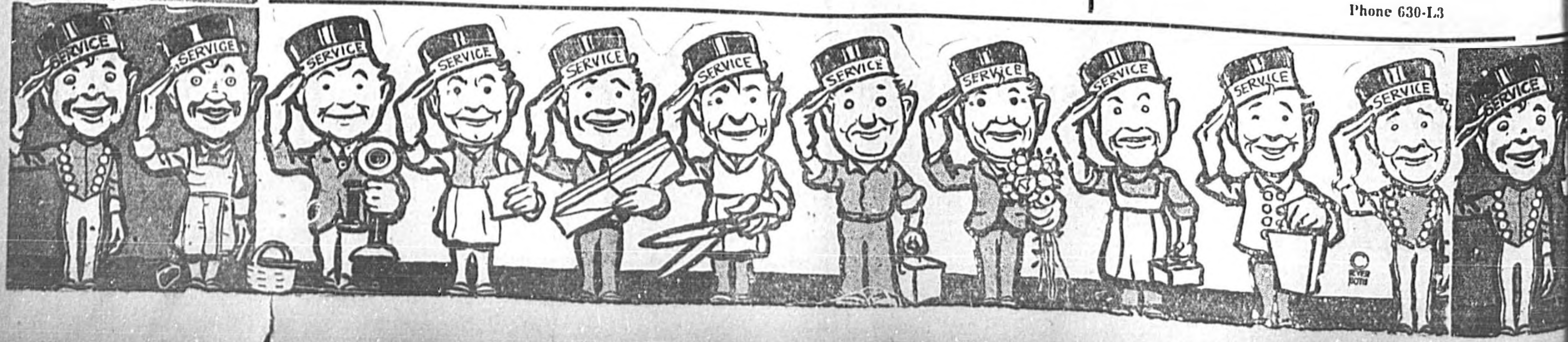

STEWART'S WASHINGTON LETTER

By CHARLES P. STEWART

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—(P)—Something I said in print recently concerning motorists' troubles in Washington fretted Traffic Director Eldridge so that he dropped in, with blood in his eye, to see me about it.

"No doubt you've been pinched yourself," he accused. "That's what makes you so uppity."

"Mr. Eldridge," I assured him, "out of this country's entire grown-up population I'm one of about half a dozen who never owned or drove an automobile. His expressed changed from annoyance to deep wonder. 'You don't say!' he exclaimed. 'I didn't know we had one of 'em here in the capital. I'll notify the Smithsonian Institution—anthropological division. Dr. Hrdlicka'll be wild about you.'"

"You see," the director explained, all his anger lost now in curiosity, "we have to bear down pretty hard on traffic law violators or there'd be a massacre."

"All the state roundabout have automobile registration regulations which make it hard to dispose of stolen cars. But in the District of Columbia we have none. Consequently, the minute a machine's swiped anywhere in our vicinity, it's rushed into the District to be disposed of, and it sells for a song generally."

"The result is that more totally irresponsible people own automobiles in Washington than any city in the United States, for its size. They'd race right through the Capitol, knock down the Washington Monument and park in the Lincoln Memorial if we didn't keep a tight rein on 'em."

Then I broached to the traffic director my great scheme for a Pedestrians' League of America. "What we pedestrians need," I argued, "is organization. The motorists have it. When their rights are involved they have a big association, with high-priced lawyers, a legislative lobby and barrels of money, to fight for them."

"But the individual pedestrian

is just a poor, lone, downtrodden pedestrian. He wouldn't be so safe to kick, cuff, browbeat, knock down and run over if he belonged to a powerful league, sworn to defend him."

"There couldn't," objected Eldridge, "be such a thing as a 'powerful' pedestrians' league. There aren't enough of them to form a quorum, let alone a league, with any punch behind it."

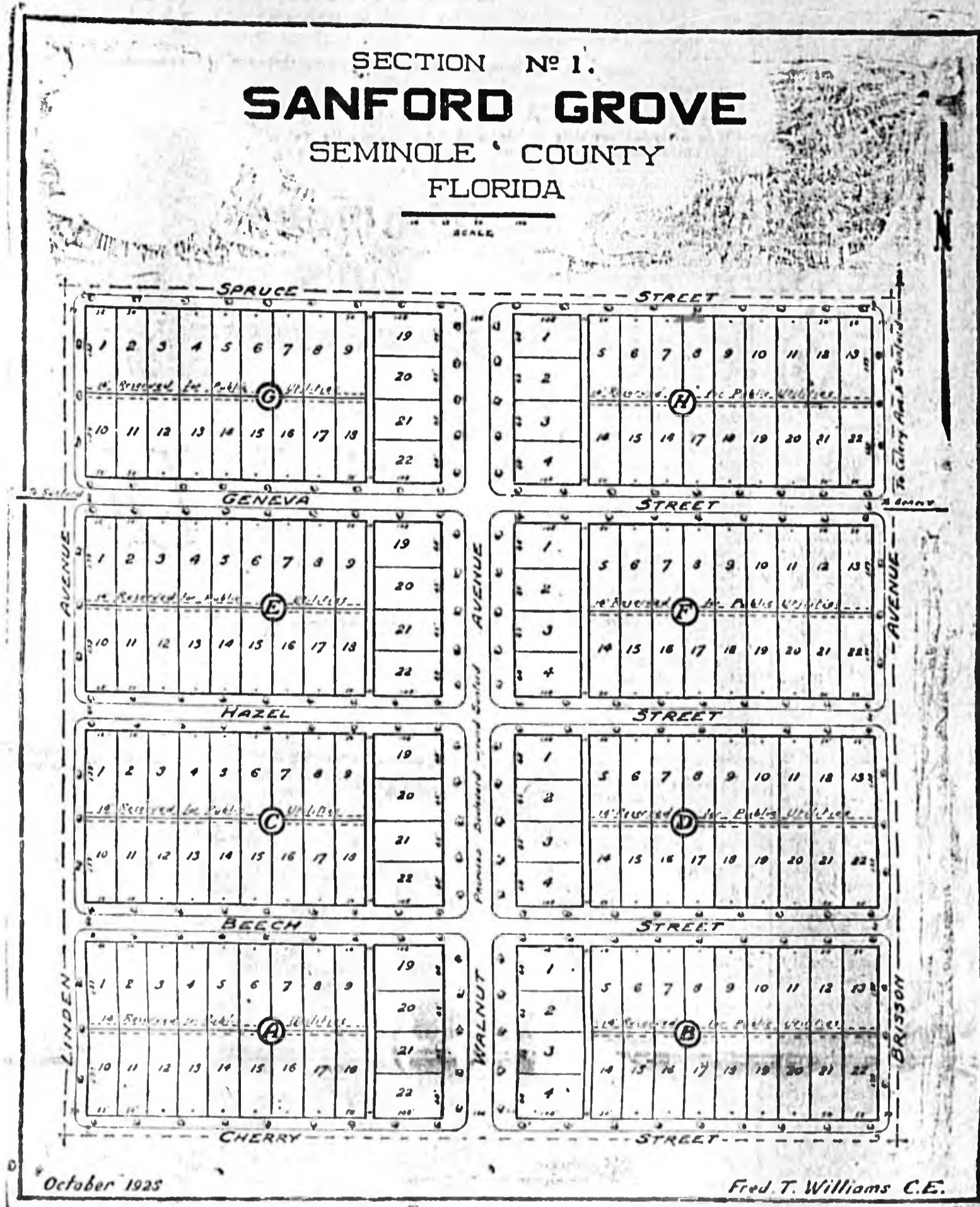
