Weather Is Good To Florida Crops

ORLANDO, Nov. 8.—(AP)—Weather conditions in Florida for the second half of October and early November were generally good for crop growth and field operations.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture experiment station made this report in its survey as of Nov. 1, commenting also that crop conditions in Texas were good but that a wide range of weather in California, ranging from light to killing frosts unusually early, damaged most tender crops to some extent.

For Florida, the report said that counts and heavy rains Oct. 24-25 which drowned most fields of early tomatoes, destroyed many seed beds and generally beneficial, the report went on, with scattered light frosts in northern Florida causing only slight damage. Principal effect, it said, was a slowing down of harvesting of snap beans and cucumbers being frosted.

In North Florida, harvesting of early snap beans, cucumbers and squash is about over, however, while in Central Florida harvesting of early snaps is about over, too, although late plantings will provide some volume until late November if weather permits.

Scattered harvesting of tomatoes has started but it will be beyond mid-November before the volume becomes heavy.

(Continued From Page One) will try: (1) To get agreement from the joint chiefs of staff that all military contracts will be placed on the basis of quality, cost and time competition without regard to the geographical location of industries.

(2) To arrange a public meeting in Washington, D. C., in early January to get public opinion behind the move.

The report cites numerous instances of orders, and even whole plants, being shifted inland and southward, and of pressure for others to take the same direction. The study concentrates on aircraft.

8 YEAR OLD SLAIN

NORFOLK, Va., Nov. 8.—(AP)—A 37-year-old man was arrested today in the death of six-year-old Shirley Murray, who was found unconscious and lying in a wood near the Norfolk naval base.

The Federal Bureau of Investigation announced that Lawrence Augustine Markham, a resident of wartime housing project Broad Creek Village here, has been charged with the murder. The FBI stepped into the case because the child was found on federal property.

Shirley, whose head had been battered, died of fractured skull last night a few hours after she was found.

DETROIT, Nov. 8.—(AP)—A frightened 18-year-old youth told police today that he and a prison guard fired the shots that killed George Schmidt, McComb county truck farmer.

William Roddy, 18, said his gun went off by mistake during the holding attempt last Saturday. Detective Erwin Schink reported.

Roddy declared that Jack Roberts, 18, another of the four youths held in the shooting, fired first.

The .22 caliber pistols used in the shooting were stolen from a hardware store, Roddy said.

GAME COMMISSION

TALLAHASSEE, Nov. 8.—(AP)—The State Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission is going to apply for membership in the Florida merit system.

Commissioner Cecil Webb of Tampa, who suggested the plan, said the merit system for employees would help to rid the commission of "political pressure."

NEGROES PLANT LUPINE

LAKE CITY, Fla.—Many Columbia County negro farmers are growing blue lupine cover crops on their land this season, according to McKinley Jeffers, negro farm agent.

New York Election

(Continued From Page One) outpouring of about 5,500,000 appeared almost certain before the polls close at 7 P. M.

Warm, sunny weather helped to lure the electorate out early.

The surge reflected the keen interest throughout the state and nation in the contest between Senator Dulles, who pegged his campaign on a denunciation of a large part of the "Fair Deal," and former governor Lehman, who warmly espoused most of Mr. Truman's program.

From one-third to one-half of the registered voters had gone to the polls by noon in Buffalo, Rochester, Syracuse, Utica, Schenectady, Troy, Binghamton, Albany, Oswego, Ogdensburg and Salamanca. All are in Republican upstate, but the Democrats claim great strength in most of these communities.

In Democratic-controlled New York City a spot check of Manhattan and Bronx voting indicated about 40 per cent of those registered had voted.

The percentage was higher in some thickly populated areas, notably Harlem, Washington Heights, Greenwich Village and the entire east side.

In Albany, a Democratic stronghold, about 40 per cent of the voters had pulled levers by 12:30 P. M.

Long lines formed at polling places in many cities but the balloting was orderly.

Mayoral elections in 40 cities, including New York, helped swell the vote volume.

These contests shared locally interest with the Dulles-Lehman duel, the winner of which will serve the remaining year of the term of New Dealer Robert F. Wagner. The latter resigned last June and Governor Thomas E. Dewey appointed Dulles, foreign affairs expert, to the seat. The interim appointment expires Dec. 1.

The outcome of the election is certain to be interpreted as a victory or a defeat for the Democratic national administration.

Lehman, four times governor of the Empire State, ardently championed the "Fair Deal."

Dulles, famed foreign affairs authority, denounced a large chunk of Mr. Truman's domestic program.

National leaders of both major parties were watching all contests for signs of which way the political winds are blowing for the 1950 general congressional elections.

In Boston, the prestige and influence of Secretary of Labor Maurice Tobin became involved at the last minute in the mayoralty election.

Tobin, a former Boston mayor and Massachusetts governor, publicly threw his support behind City Clerk John H. Hayes, Hayes is trying to oust Mayor James M. Curley who is running for his fifth term.

New Jersey voters turned out in large numbers to choose between Republican Governor Alfred E. Driscoll and State Senator Elmer H. Wene as the state's next governor.

First reports from 15 of the state's 21 counties showed the voting as heavier than usual in ten counties and normal in four.

Driscoll, lauded as possible presidential timber for 1952, was rated in pre-election forecasts a close favorite over Wene, former Democratic congressman and a nationally-known baby chick raiser.

Rural Common Sense

PROPERLY TRAINED YOUTH WILL PROTECT AMERICA'S IDEALS AND WAY OF LIFE

In a recent address to Florida county and home demonstration agents and other Agricultural Extension Service workers, Dr. Book Campbell, president of Florida State University, emphasized proper training and guidance for the youth of today. His ideas are well worth the consideration of all.

As continued success of American agriculture is dependent on the thin layer of top-soil left in this country, so does one thin generation—the youth of today—stand between American civilization and "almost any kind of subversive organization or government that you might think of," Dr. Campbell explained.

Therefore, the educator pointed out, it is necessary for America to conserve and guide her youth as well as conserve her top-soil. Dr. Campbell called for renewed emphasis on such "old fashioned" American ideals as hard work frugally, and price in accomplishment to maintain and strengthen the American Way of Life.

Young people have heard some ideas contrary to these practically all their lives, "and it is not so simple to convince many of them that the world is in great danger," he explained.

As a result of comparatively recent developments, many feel that someone who works hard, puts a

little aside for rainy day, and adhere this country great is showing a great deal of intelligence, but, Dr. Campbell asserted such things mark him who practices them as a good citizen, as a good American. "The nation that is profitably and happily at work has never gone wrong," he declared.

The educator pointed out that the task of training and guiding young people is a difficult one, but it can be done by one who believes in American ideals and strives earnestly to pass them to others. Dr. Campbell referred to communism as a great danger to America, but he stressed the idea that the younger people of today, trained properly, will prove to be a great bulwark against such subversive ideas.

Mints To Housewives

PLAID POINTERS
Plaids, so popular in the fashion picture this fall, present a few special problems in home dress making, clothing specialists of the U. S. Department of Agriculture and the Iowa Extension Service agree.

When choosing a pattern to make up in plaid, look for simple lines and little decorative detail. The plaid itself offers enough decoration so that fancy extra touches are not needed, and the fewer the pattern pieces, the less the difficulty of matching the design when putting the garment together.

If the material must be shrunk before making up, take care to hang it straight in drying and to hold ends and selvages even in pressing so that the weave runs straight and true.

The easier way to make the plaid match is to check the notches when laying out pattern pieces, making sure that a notch on the sleeve for example, comes at the same place in the plaid as the corresponding notch in the armhole. You save time and cut pieces with less error and on single rather than double material, except for those pieces which must be cut on a fold of goods.
