

Safety In Air Travel

There is some indication that the shock of the recent air accident at Washington, D. C., in which 55 persons were killed, may be sufficient to stir up action leading toward better regulations for the protection of passenger aircraft from other air traffic.

The passenger safety record of American commercial. airlines is excellent, but perhaps it could be still better. Mid-air collisions between commercial and other craft would certainly seem to be preventable. The airlines themselves are subject to a complicated body of stringent regulations as to the condition of their equipment, the preparation, schedaling and operation of flights, the training of pilots and the information provided to them, and similar factors.

Much less control of this kind is exercised over private aircraft and over military craft by civil authorities, in cases where military craft use civillan airports or flight routes. Some aviation authorities are of the opinion that the regulations governing traffic movement at airports and along scheduled routes need a complete everhauling.

There have been other shocking accidents which aroused flurries of intent to find and eliminate basic faults. In many cases these have been nothing more than flurries. Investigations and studies prompted by the Washington accident should be pursued at least long enough to learn whether anything further can be done, in the way of regulation, to improve air travel safety.

Impending Battle

The general inclination is to hall with gratification and relief the action taken by the Congress of Industrial Organization to clear left-wing unions and leaders from its ranks. There has been much concern over the apparently gathering strength of Communist sympathizers in some unions, and much fear that this strength would be used to attack the American way of life.

But the actual accomplishment of the purge will not be easy, and the flows to be swung in the impending battle may sometimes be sustained by the general public, as well as by the unions involved. The expelled unions can be expected to fight with every means at their disposal to retain their membership, and the strength that goes with it. The C. I. O. appears bent on raiding the membership of the expelled unions wherever possible. Under the circumstances it is hard to see how a new wave of jurisdictional disputes can be avoided.

The C. I. O. hopes for a strengthened labor movement, with heightened prestige. The people hope for a union leadership which will have a more sympathetic view toward the general public good than would be the case under the effects of Communist influence.

Weather Is Good To Florida Crops

ORLANDO, Nov. 8—(P)—
Weather conditions in Florida for
the second half of October and
early November were senerally
good for crop growth and field

The U.S. Department of Agriculture experiment station made this report in its survey as of Nov. 1, commenting also that crop conditions in Texas were good but that a wide range of weather in California, rang-ing from light to killing frosts ing from light to killing frosts unusually early, damaged most tender crops to some extent.

For Florida, the report said Dade county had heavy rains Oct. 24-25 which drowned most fields of early tomatoes, destroyed many seed beds and generally beneficial, the report went out. beneficial, the report went on, with scattered light fronts in northern Florida causing only slight damage. Principal effect, it said, was a slowing down of harvesting with an occasional field of snap beans and cueum-bers being frosted.

In North Florida, harvesting of early snap beans, cucumbers and squash is about over, howand signal and the sever, while in Central Florida harvesting of early anaps is about over, too, although late plantings will provide some volume until late November if

Scattered harvesting of tomatoes has started but it will be beyond mid-November before the volume becomes heavy.
