Demonstration staged at County Services, picket line resumes today
County firefighters hot about low pay

SANFORD - In a show of unity, more than 60 Seminole County firefighters picketed the county services building Tuesday over fair wages.

Citing a statewide pay study conducted in 1997 by the Florida Professional Firefighters, Dick Criswell, president of Local 3254, said Seminole County ranks 82nd in pay out of 134 reporting departments in the state.

The firefighters' union and the county have been negotiating a pay increase since June when they nearly reached an agreement. However, firefighters have been without a contract for almost nine years.

The county currently has an offer on the table with a starting pay increase of \$21,607 to \$36,000, which is being reviewed by union officials. In addition, there is a proposed across-the-board hike ranging from \$2,000 to \$4,303.

Despite the proposed offer, Criswell, a lieutenant who has served in the county's fire department for 24 years, said that not all firefighters would see an equitable increase in their paychecks.

"It's just not appropriate," Criswell said. "We wanted a flat \$4,000 across the board increase, but the county refused that."

With about 200 people in the fire department, Criswell said the county continues to lose some of its best firefighters to neighboring Orange County and Orlando because the pay there is

higher. On Monday, he said, 20 Seminole County firefighters took the entrance test in Orlando.

"Why should the citizens accept second best," he said.

Leonard Jacobs, an off-duty firefighter who has worked in the department for 3 1/2 years, marched on the picket line. Like many of his co-firefighters Jacobs said he lives in Volusia County because he can't afford Seminole on his pay. He also holds a second job to help ends meet.

Little boy lost in after school bus mix-up

SANFORD - What started as the first day of school for a 5-year-old boy on Monday, turned into a nightmare for his family when for nearly four hours after school dismissal, they did not know of his whereabouts. The boy's father, who suffered a heart attack after the incident, remains hospitalized in stable condition.

Jonathon Rummel, a first-time student at Hamilton Elementary School, boarded School Bus 108 at the end of the school day but did not get off at his stop off of Sanford Avenue, said his father, Bert Rummel from his hospital bed on Tuesday. He said he drove around the area checking all the bus stops.

Fam Rummel, Jonathon's mother, said she notified school office personnel of the situation and was told at about 5 p.m. that her son had not gotten off at his stop and was still on the bus. Rummel said she understood from the school office that Jonathon would be dropped off near the family residence. However, by about 6 p.m., there was no sign of Jonathon and no communication by the school to his family, Rummel said. She then filed a missing person report with the Sanford Police Department.

Henley: Light rail is way off track

LONGWOOD - At 11:15 Tuesday, a northbound CSX freight train created a nasty five-minute traffic snarl along State Road 434 and County Road 437. A rig on 437 was stuck half way onto 434 on an semi-shoulder right turn.

The predicament was precisely what a group of area politicians was protesting. "What," asked Carlton Henley, "is going to happen if we ever

ally get a light rail system? Do we have traffic back up like this all day long?"

Henley, who is running for a Seminole County Commissioner's seat in District 4, is making it perfectly clear that he is against light rail. His cost to taxpayers, the dangers it presents and the added congestion it will cause.

At an on-track briefing Tuesday, Henley was joined by County Commissioner Grant Maloy and fellow commission candidates Bob West. He distributed an overview, paid political postcard that pictured a "Lite Rail" train squashing a taxpayer on front and campaign literature on the back.

"Win Adams wants a train but at what cost to the taxpayers?" Henley asks on the campaign ad. Henley answers: Construction costs will exceed 1.3 billion. Each additional 1 cent on sales tax will cost families \$230 per year. Ridership will not pay for operating expenses. Taxpayers will pay 75 percent or \$17.4 million per year.

Henley contends, too, that a train will force traffic slow to stop at peak times every 3 1/2 minutes for 3 hours and 51 minutes per day.

He further argues that these trains can't stop for emergency fire, ambulance and police vehicles.

"Light rail is impractical," Henley said. "The right approach to gridlock is to expedite a comprehensive road plan, to lower tolls on the GreenWay, to secure funding for completion of the Beltway, plan a high occupancy vehicle (H.O.V.) lane on I-4," he said.

"The biggest worry I have is that a light rail system would stop our emergency vehicles."

"Light rail is little more than a plan by government bureaucrats and political artists to force you out of your cars and onto a train," Maloy said. He said the expenses were too great and that most people want to be in cars. "America

Tourist money

SEMINOLE COUNTY - The amount of money received through tourism tax collections in Seminole County continues to be higher than original projections, indicating a better-than-expected influx of tourists.

According to Tourism Development Director Jack West, for the month of June, with \$110,000 projected, the actual amount was \$130,075, a 19 percent increase. Compared to June of last year, the increase was 28 percent. Then for this same year, since Oct. 1, 1997, the total amount received through tourist taxes from lodgings and other entities, amounted to \$1,207,308, a 20 percent increase over the past year.

Lake Mary is dotting the i's, crossing the t's
Paperwork glitch hampers private school development

LAKE MARY - It wasn't as easy as first thought. In 1997, the Lake Mary City Local Planning Agency (LPA) approved a small scale future land use amendment to permit a private school to be developed on Rural Lane, next to the city's sports complex.

After a specified time, the matter was brought before the city commission for adoption, which was accomplished in March of this year. Now, a discovered flaw in the paperwork is coming before the

city school. Learning Unlimited, originally planned to open a portion of its operations this fall. Several issues came to the forefront however, which prevented the opening as planned. Substantial efforts are now being made to ensure that the school

can open in the fall of 1999.

The school is planned to accommodate grades K through 12. The student body is expected to number approximately 350 by the opening with an increase projected. The site would also accommodate a lighted football field and running track.

One of the major problems now is that a strip of land, 25 feet wide and 400 feet long, included in the site plan, was not included in the small scale amendment which had been approved in March. In addition to the change in the legal description for the property, the city's Commissioner's Plan will also require

changes. These amendments will be reviewed by the city's planning commission. The city of Lake Mary City Commission, scheduled at 7 p.m. in the commission chamber at Lake Mary City Hall, 140 N. County Club, will

attached to the ordinance.

The next step was for the city to determine how an official legal description in a land use amendment can be changed. This Thursday night, the matter hopefully will be resolved with a corrective amendment to the small scale future land use amendment scheduled for first reading and public hearing.

Pending approval at first reading, and pending no last minute changes are found necessary, the second reading and final approval could be scheduled as early as the annual commission meeting of the city, Aug. 26th.

The meeting of the planning commission is scheduled for this Thursday's meeting of the Lake Mary City Commission, beginning at 7 p.m. in the commission chamber at Lake Mary City Hall, 140 N. County Club, 2A.

Credit union bill clears

WASHINGTON - The House of Representatives Tuesday approved Senate amendments to the Credit Union Membership Access Act, effectively clearing the bill for the president's signature.

The bill basically will overturn the Supreme Court decision prohibiting credit unions from expanding beyond their original membership base. It amends current law to allow credit unions to have multiple common-bond memberships under certain circumstances.

Congresswoman Corrine Brown, (Florida, 3rd Dist.) made the announcement. "As the first member of Congress from Florida to sponsor and support the Credit Union Membership Access Act, I am very pleased about the passage. This is very important to my constituents, many of whom depend dearly on the affordable financial services offered by credit unions," she said.

Continuing, she commented, "I am very proud to support something that means so much to so many people, and thank the credit unions for their hard work in bringing this issue to the nation's attention."

While Brown's major district includes the Jacksonville area, she represents southeast and central portions of the state.

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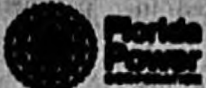
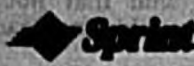

school administration but no one picked up the phone and all I got was voice mail," she said. "We had no idea where Jonathon was."

Rummel said she was informed by a friend, who works as a teacher in the county, that Jonathon had been located at the school by two custodians who had subsequently called Nan Parker, the school principal. Rummel picked up Jonathon at about 7 p.m. and drove him home.

"We were told that Jonathon had been driven back to school and left in the after school program, which ends at 6 p.m.," Pam Rummel said. Parker said the school followed proper procedure and

Jonathon was never left unsupervised. After Bert Rummel hugged his son, the 41-year-old father, who has a heart condition, began experiencing chest pains. He was transported by ambulance to a nearby hospital where he remains after suffering a heart attack.

"I guess the stress and the emotion of the day was too much," he said. "I saw him and I got emotional."

He said the situation proved serious enough that he has consulted with his attorney because of the school's unsatisfactory response to his son's situation.

"They endangered my son," he said. "All they need to do is admit they were wrong, but instead they are trying to trick out and put the blame on us."

Pam Rummel said her son now is afraid to go to school and ride a bus and she is withdrawing him from Hamilton Elementary today.

"This could have been handled better," she said. "They took short cuts and now they're trying to cover their butts."

likes cars, this isn't Europe," he said. "We don't live in a little village, we're spread out."

Commissioner Win Adams, the incumbent in District 4, said today that he fears "Mr. Henley has sucked on too many fumes from I-4." Adams said that he has supported mass transit but is not about

to write a blank check out to anyone.

Adams said he would like Henley to tell the people on Red Bug Road, Howell Branch and Range Line Road what they think about having their back yards and fences torn out for four, six or eight-lane highways?

Other traffic clogged areas such as Atlanta are of great concern to Adams, who says

that pollution from cars has caused air quality to deteriorate so quickly that the Environmental Protection Agency had to curtail road building. Atlanta, some believe, is becoming the next Los Angeles.

Adams said there is a simple solution to the traffic snarls and emergency vehicle fears Henley has. "Bridges - we construct bridges at any busy intersections," he said. "My suggestion is that Mr. Henley apply the same accuracy and honesty to his campaign as he did his high school civics classes."

It is evident that ex-Lyman High School principal Henley and Adams are on opposite sides of the track in the tight rail debate. Election day is September 1.

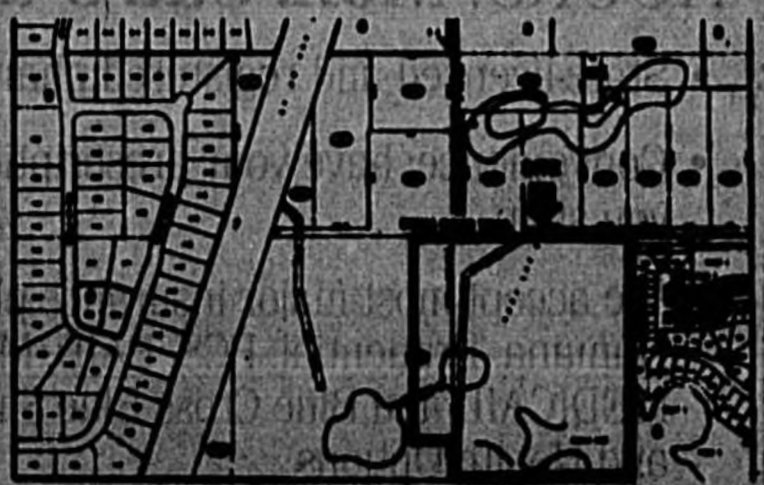

"I just want to be able to support my family on my pay from the fire department," Jacobs said. "With two jobs I have no time to see my family."

There is no doubt that an increase is needed, Fire Chief Terry Schenk said from his office. The parties are still in negotiations but the final offer by the county, which is on the table, is still unclear, he said.

Neither County Manager Gary Kaiser nor Commission Chairman Randy Morris was available this morning for comment.

"We are interested in seeing firefighters get an increase and I can understand their frustration," Schenk said. "We want our people compensated fairly and we don't want to lose firefighters."

Firefighters planned to continue the demonstration this morning.

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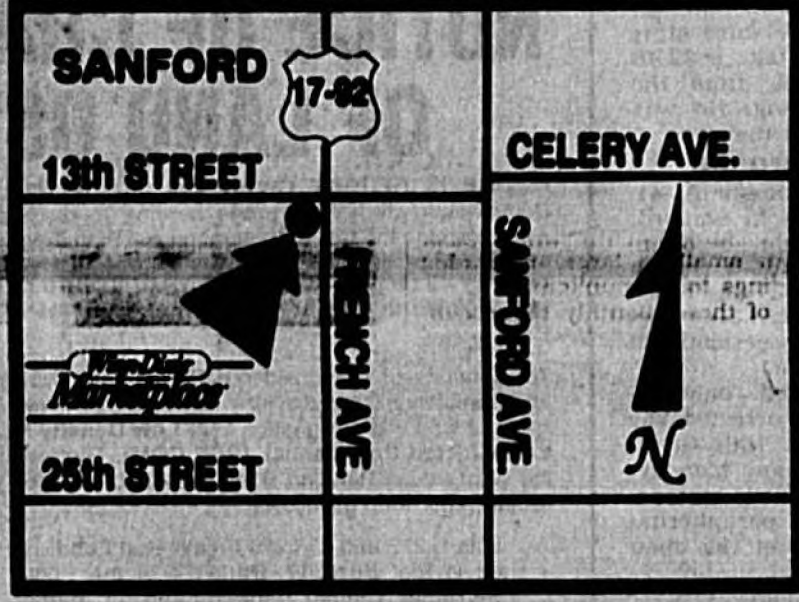
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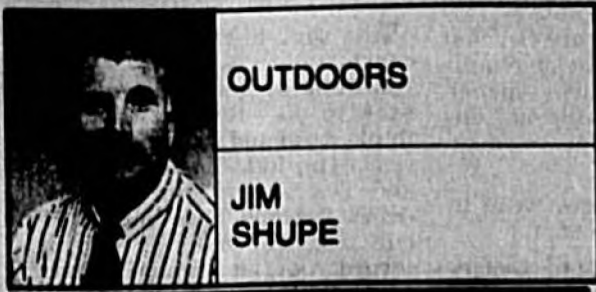

Florida -- Big Bass Capital of the World

SANFORD - Florida is on the fast track to regain its title as "Big Bass Capital of the World." Prior to...and following World War II...anglers visited the Sunshine State in droves to catch trophy-sized largemouth bass.

From the 1920s through the late-1970s, Florida was "The Place" to connect with wallhangers weighing anywhere from eight to 14 pounds.

Because of expeditious human encroachment and an angler habit of keeping trophy fish, coupled with increasing environmental and ecological woes, the average size of big bass caught statewide declined, even though the overall number of fish being caught may have remained relatively stable.

Probably nothing chronicles the recent decline, fall, and reoccurrence of sizable fish more than the "On The Bass Beat" column which appears monthly in Florida Sports Magazine.

Although this column began in 1984, it wasn't until the August, 1987, issue that a "Tournament Results" section was inaugurated in which bass fish, ranging from small to large, forwarded their monthly standings to the publication.

About two-thirds of these monthly reports include a "Big Bass" category, in addition to who won first, second and third place, etc.

From August, 1987, through July, 1997 (10 years exactly), "On The Bass Beat" reported on an estimated 3,000 tournaments, of which 1,948 recorded "big bass" catches.

During the last five months of 1987, the big bass average for 53 tournaments was 5.37 pounds. This median rose slightly the following year to 5.86 pounds in 140 events, followed by 5.85 pounds (188 tournaments) in 1989, and 5.43 pounds in 1990 for 194 episodes.

Several fisheries biologists, who also had been monitoring catches, became alarmed when, in 1991, the average size of big bass fell statewide. Bass Beat recorded a dip to 4.58 pounds in 188 tournaments that year.

Some significant management changes were adopted by Florida's Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission (GFC) in 1992 when the average fell to what is probably an all-time low of 3.99 pounds in 197 recorded competitions. They daily bass bag limit was then reduced from 10 fish per day down to five, and the minimum legal size in most areas of the state was upped from 12 to 14 inches.

Such additional measures such as slot limits, a stricture on the number of fish (one) that could be kept measuring more than 22 inches in length, plus a husky expansion in the number of anglers who routinely and moralistically release their catches, all combined to arrest the startling downhill slide.

Florida Sportsman figures indicated a tenuous increase to 4.86 pounds (168 events) in 1993, followed by a further boost in 1994 to 5.16 pounds for 174 recorded tournaments.

Another slight rise to 5.55 pounds (183 meets) was indicated in 1995.

A meaningful change occurred in 1996, when, in 233 events, the average size in the big bass grouping jumped to a decade-high 6.06 pounds. Then, through July, 1997, the mean size bounded to 7.02 pounds in 232 tournaments, an incredible accession of more than 3 pounds per fish over the 1992 figure.

If more proof is needed that the GFC's 1992 decision to manage Florida's bass fishery for "quality instead of quantity" is paying off, we have only to look at the numbers of trophy-sized bass that were caught in just the first seven months of this year, compared to the entire 12-month period of 1992.

In '92, "On The Bass Beat" recorded but two fish weighing on the plus side of 10 pounds, plus one fish at nine pounds and change.

Through July of 1997, the monthly column had already registered 36 eight pounders, 28 nine pounders, 17 at over 10 pounds, four weighing 11 pounds, and, finally, five lunkers scaling more than 12 pounds. In other words, 90 trophies in seven months (1997), as opposed to a scant three over eight pounds and no 10 pounders in all of 1992!

Is this an improvement, or what? As more management plans and procedures are implemented by the GFC through the year 2000, Florida anglers can again anticipate enjoying the best bass fishing the world has to offer.

In many cases, the dessert is the one part of the meal that is remembered for years after visiting the restaurant. It can be the richest chocolate mousse or baked Alaska you've ever had that brings the restaurant to mind. The fact is many of the greatest restaurants are known as much for their dessert as any other menu selections.

I must admit these recipes have become the single greatest "souvenir" I could possibly have acquired on my travels.

The following recipes are a few samples of the desserts offered at some of the great restaurants in our country. So throw away the calorie counter and enjoy the best of the best.

Brennan's (New Orleans) Bananas Foster
4 ripe bananas peeled, cut in half and slit length-wise
1/2 cup melted butter
1/2 cup light brown sugar (packed firmly)
1/4 cup dark rum
1/4 cup light rum
1/4 cup banana liqueur
1/8 tsp. Cinnamon

Vanilla Ice Cream Sweet Whipped Cream
In a saucepan, melt butter and stir in brown sugar until completely dissolved. Place bananas in pan and cook until quite tender, turning over once while cooking, about 3 minutes each side. Turn down heat and sprinkle bananas with cinnamon. Pour rum and liqueur and ignite. While flaming, spoon liquid over banana slices. When flame goes out serve immediately with sauce, a scoop of good quality vanilla ice cream and sweet whipped cream. This recipe will serve 4.

Four Seasons (New York) Four Seasons Flan
This recipe is one of the elegant desserts offered at one of the most elegant restaurants in the world.

Shell:
2 lbs. sugar
3 lbs. almond paste
3/4 cup flour
1/4 cup melted butter
1 egg white
1/2 tsp. fine grated lemon peel
Grease and lightly flour round 8" layer cake pan. Using a mixer combine ingredients and blend until smooth. Evenly press mixture into bottom and sides of pan. Refrigerate for at least 1 hour. Preheat oven to



325 degrees and bake chilled shell for approximately 45 minutes or until golden brown. Allow to cool completely then very carefully remove shell from pan.

Filling:
1 pkg. vanilla pudding (not instant)
1 tsp. vanilla extra
1 vanilla bean, split and scrap out seeds
Ladyfingers, split in 1/2
1 oz. Kirsch

Make pudding according to directions. Stir in vanilla bean and extract. Chill completely, with waxed paper or parchment over surface to avoid drying.

Glass:
1/2 cup smooth (no chunks of fruit) apricot jam or preserve
1 oz. Apricot Brandy

1/3 cup each raspberries, blueberries, strawberries, cut in half
1/3 cup ripe bananas cut into 1/2" slices

In a saucepan heat preserves and brandy until liquefied. Carefully spread 1/2 of pudding mix into shell. Arrange ladyfinger halves over surface. Sprinkle Kirsch over ladyfingers. Spread remaining pudding into shell. Pour glaze over top and arrange fruit slices in lines across top of Flan. Refrigerate for at least 1 hour prior to serving.

Pontchartrain Hotel New Orleans) Pontchartrain's Crepe Soufflé

Crepes:
1 cup all purpose flour, sifted twice
2 eggs
1 cup milk
1 tbs. vanilla extract
1 tbs. melted butter
Mix all ingredients together until very smooth. Lightly grease a small sauté pan. Heat to high temperature. Pour thin layer of mix into pan and cook approximately 1 minute on each side. Remove and place on rack to cool. Continue until all batter is used.

Filling:
3 egg whites (save yolks for sauce)
1 cup confectioner sugar
3/4 tsp. orange rind
1/4 tsp. each vanilla and almond extract

In a chilled bowl, using an electric mixer, whip egg whites. Gradually adding sugar until stiff peaks are formed. Mix in rind and extracts. Place 2 tbs. of filling onto center of each crepe. Fold crepe over and place in shallow baking dish. Preheat oven to 450 degrees and bake for five minutes.

Sauce:
3 beaten egg yolks
1/2 cup each milk and white sugar
1/4 cup heavy cream
1/4 cup dark rum

1/4 tsp. Mace
Using a double boiler or on very low heat slowly whisk in milk, sugar, cream and Mace. Continue whisking until thickened. Remove from heat and whisk in rum. Pour a small amount of sauce on each crepe and serve.

San Francisco's Magic Pan Strawberry Crepes

Crepes:
Use the same recipe as Pontchartrain's crepes from above and allow to cool completely.

Filling:
2 pints strawberries, washed and sliced thin
1/2 cup light brown sugar
1 cup sour cream
1 cup sweet whipped cream
Confectioners sugar and whole berries for garnish
Gently stir together sugar, sour cream, berry slices and whip cream. Fill center of crepe and fold over. Sprinkle with powdered sugar and place whole strawberries around each crepe. Serve immediately while cold.

Tip of the Week
For best results when whipping cream or egg whites use a very clean bowl. Place bowl in an ice bath and allow to chill completely. Make very sure inside of mixing bowl is very clean and dry. Any oil, soap residue, yolk in your whites will cause the egg whites to fail to whip up. Any impurities of a warm bowl will not allow cream to whip firmly. In addition always use the freshest best quality eggs or cream for whipping.
