Demonstration staged at County Services, picket line resumes today

County firefighters hot about low pay

By Marie Coom HERALD STAFF WRITER

SANFORD - In a show of unity, more than 60 Seminole County firefighters picketed the county services building Tuesday over fair

wages.

Citing a statewide pay study conducted in 1997 by the Florida Professional Firefighters. Dick Criswell, president of Local 3254, said Seminole County ranks 82nd in pay out of 134 reporting departments in the state.

The firefighters' union and the county have been negotiating a pay increase since June when they nearly reached an agreement. However, firefighters have been without a contract for almost nine years.

The county currently has an offer on the table with a starting pay increase of \$21,607 to \$26,000, which is being reviewed by union officials. In addition, there is a proposed across-the-board hike ranging from \$2,000 to \$4,393.

Despite the proposed offer, Criswell, a lieutonant who has served in the county's fire department for 24 years, said that not all fire-fighters would see an equitable increase in their paychecks.

"It's just not appropriate," Criswell said. "We wanted a flat \$4,000 across the board increase, but the county refused that."

With about 200 people in the fire department, Criswell said the county continues to lose some of its best firefighters to neighboring Orange County and Orlando because the pay there is

Florida Big Bass Capital of the World

SANFORD Florida is on the fast track to regain its title as "Big Bass Capital of the World."

Prior to...and following World War II...anglers visited the Sunshine State in droves to catch

trophy-sized largemouth bass.

From the 1920s through the late-1970s, Flor-ida was "The Place" to connect with wallhangers

weighing anywhere from eight to 14 pounds.

Because of expeditious human encroachment and an angler habit of keeping trophy fish, coupled with increasing environmental and ecological woes, the average size of big base caught statewide declined, even though the overall number of fish being caught may have remained relatively atable.

Probably nothing chronicles the recent decline, fall, and reoccurrence of stable fish more than the "On The Bass Beat" column which appears monthly in Florida Sports Magazine.

Although this column began in 1984, it wasn't intil the August, 1987, issue that a Tournament section was inaugurated in which base ranging from small to large, forwarded onthly standings to mis-publication.

From August, 1967, through July, 1997 (10 years exactly), "On The Base Beat" reported on

an estimated 3,000 tournaments, of which 1,94 recorded "big base" catches.

During the last five months of 1987, the b base average for 53 tournaments was 5.37 pounds. This median rose slightly the following year to 5.85 pounds in 140 events, followed by 5.85 pounds (186 tournaments) in 1989, and 5.42 pounds in 1980 for 194 averages.

Several fisheries biologists, who also had been monitoring catches, became alarmed when, in 1981, the average size of big bass fell statewide. Bass Beat recorded a dip to 4.56 pounds in 188 tournaments that year.

Some significant management changes were adopted by Florida's Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission (GFC) in 1992 when the average fell to what is probably an all-time low of 3.90 pounds in 197 recorded competitions. They daily bass bag limit was then reduced from 10 fish per day down to five, and the minimum legal size in most areas of the state was upped from 12 to 14 inches.

Such additional measures such as alot limits, a stricture on the number of fish (one) that could be kept measuring more than 22 inches in length, plus a husky expansion in the number of anglers who routinely and moralistically release their catches, all combined to arrest the startling downhill slide.

Florida Sportaman figures indicated a tenuous increase to 4.05 pounds (168 events) in 1993, followed by a further boost in 1994 to 5.16 pounds for 174 recorded tournaments.

Another slight rise to 5.55 pounds (183 meets) was indicated in 1995.

A meaningful change occurred in 1996, when, in 233 events, the average size in the big base grouping jumped to a decade-high 6.05 pounds. then, through July, 1997, the mean size bounded to 7.02 pounds in 232 tournaments, an incredible accession of more than 3 pounds per fish over the 1992 figure.

If more proof is needed that the GPC's 1992 decision to manage Florida's base fishery for "quality instead of quantity" is paying of, we have only to look at the numbers of trophy-sized base that were caught in just the first seven months of this year, compared to the entire 12-month period of 1992.

In '92, 'On The Base Best' recorded but two fish weighing on the plus side of 10 pounds, plus one fish at mine pounds and change.

Through July of 1997, the monthly column had already registered 35 eight pounders, 28 nine pounders, 17 at over 10 pounds, four weighing 11 pounds, and, finally, five lunkers scaling more than 12 pounds, in other words, 90 trophies in seven months (1997), as opposed to a scant three over eight pounds and no 10 pounders in all of 1992!

Is this an improvement, or what?

How effective are zinc lozenges?

DEAR DR. GOTT: Please comment on the use of sinc lozenges to treat the common cold.

DEAR READER: Of all the affiletions that affect human beings, the common cold is probably the most ubiquitous — and most benign.
Nonetheless, the stuffy nose, malaise,
itchy eyes, cough, and low-grade fever
are truly unpleasant. No wonder, then,
that people have been actively engaged in finding a substance that could ameliorate these troublesome symptoms. One such substance is zinc.

The question is: Does zinc palliate the common cold? The answer is: Unfortunately, no.

Early studies of this mineral - as with vitamin C and vitamin A showed that zinc does enhance immunity. How is unknown. Some investiga-tors believe that zinc inhibits viral "docking" to the lining of the respira-tory tract; in essence, the viruses are prevented from adhering to the cells lining the respiratory tree. Other the-ories include anti-inflammatory effects and immune enhancement. None of these theories have been validated. In fact, several reports — including one in the June 24, 1998 issue of the Journal of the American Medical Association — clearly prove that zinc plays no role whatsoever in treating established cold symptoms.

Nevertheless, zinc does play an important role in children's health, particularly in developing countries where zinc deficiencies are common.
On the other hand, too much zinc can
be toxic to the immune system of a replete person.

Consequently, most authorities dis-courage the use of zinc in treating the common cold. At present, despite the miracles of modern medicine, the cold-sufferer is left with the classic medical response: Take two aspirin (or two Tylenol, for a child) and call me in the morning.

DEAR DR. GOTT: A friend of mine has been using insulin, in conjunction with weight training, to achieve better muscle development. Is this practice harmful?



Here is another deal from the high-stake game at the TGR Bridge Club in London. Look only at the North hand. After two passes, your partner opens two spades, strong. What would you respond? Traditionally, a jump raise from two

respond?
Traditionally, a jump raise from two to four shows at least four decent trumps but denies a side-suit control: no ace, king, void or singleton. So, North should raise to three spades, a positive response with trump support. (Agreed, a positive response normally shows at least eight points, so starting with two no-trump, the negative reply, isn't wrong. But that hand is worth eight points: seven in high cards and at least one for the doubleton diamond.)

Now South made a good bid: five

Seven species len't happiers — head-cally, it needs trumps 3-2. Then, after drawing trumps and cashing the five diamond winners, declarer can ruff both his club losers in the dummy. However, with the trumps 3-1, South eventually went one down.

What were the financial ramifica-tions? Well, as the stake was about \$1.53 a point, if North-South had stopped in six spades, each would have wen some \$1000, instead of los-ing \$00. Crasy!
