Toxic fumes kill worker

CHICAGO - One man died and another was critically injured Thursday night when they were overcome by fumes while stripping floors in the Dirksen Federal Building, fire officials

A third man, a security guard in the building, was in fair condition at Northwestern Memorial Hospital after he was stricken while attempting to save the two men, officials said.

The dead worker was identified as Randy While, late 20s, of Chicago. The second worker was identified as Vincent Brewer, late 30s, of Chicago, who was in critical condition at a local hospital. The guard was identified as Adam Barnes, 37, of Chicago.

Fire destroys historic bridge

PHILIPPI, W.Va. - A passing car touched off leaking gasoline from a tanker Thursday night. igniting a blaze that gutted the historic covered bridge in this town where Union and Confederate forces clashed for the first time on land in the Civil War.

Fire crews from Philippi and Belington sped to the two-lane span in a frantic effort to spare the historical bridge, but it was largely gone in a matter of nilnutes.

"It burned fast," said police dispatcher J.R. Carman, a fireman who was among the first to reach the scene. "There's not much left of it. The south end is all that is left standing.

Carman said a tanker, owned by J.D. Hinkle & Sons, had just finished unloading some fuel at a nearby store about 150 feet away, and apparently some gas spilled onto the bridge.

'Significant' gas deposit found

PENSACOLA - A "potentially significant discovery" of natural gas has been found in a well in the Gulf of Mexico, some 25 miles from the coast of northwest Florida. officials from Chevron USA Inc.

said Thursday. The well is one of only two off the Panhandle coast that the Department of Interior's Minerals Management Service has determined "capable of producing in paying quantities." The determination was made nearly a year

Chevron said a second well will be drilled to confirm the discovery.

"In the Destin Dome Block 56, Chevron made a potentially signifleant discovery of hydrocarbons," sald company spokesman Jonathan Lifa of Baton Rouge. He said the analysis indicated the presence of natural gas.

The block is leased jointly by Chevron, Conoco Inc. and Murphy Oil Co., Life said. The core sample came from a well in 180 feet of water, and was drilled to a depth of 22,572 feet.



Geneva plans incorporation

SANFORD - Geneva residents don't want the future of their community decided by outsiders and they intend to do something about it, the president of Geneva-Citizens Association told state

legislators yesterday. In a public meeting of state legislators representing Seminole County, Lee Voorhees petitioned for help to incorporate the niral community as a city.

Voorhees told the delegation that Geneva would like to control growth, development and zoning of the 125 square nitles of the com-

Geneva would be an incorporated body politic, he proposed, but without offering services already provided residents by Seminole County.

which was founded more than 100 years ago, will be drafting documents for the legislators to take to Tallahassee within the next three weeks. The group will draft a bill calling for a referendum of Geneva voters to decide the incorporation issue. A charter for Geneva will be drafted by the group and presented at the next delegation meeting Feb. 22 at Casselberry City Hall.

Members of the state delegation did not express enthusiasm about

Efforts to incorporate by the Geneva association gained momentum last year after the city of Sanford purchased a 2,200 acre tract in the community. The city purchased the land to divert treated sewage dumping from Lake Monroe to a land spread near Lake Jesup.

Since the purchase, the city has offered to donate parcels of the land to the federal government for a prison and a Veterans Administration medical center.

The desire for some form of self-determination has been based on a whole host of things throughout the years." Voorhees said. "It came to a head with the 2,200 acres.

Sanford City Commissioner A. A. McClanahan delended the city land purchase. He outlined for the delegation events leading to the purchase — an order from Florida Department of Environmental regulations to end dumping into Lake Monroe and the failure to acquire an alternative dumping site at Yankee

There are about 30,000 taxpayers who have a vested interest in those 2,200 acres." McClanahan said. "That, by far, exceeds the 2.800" residents of Geneva.

Airport gets carrier service certification

SANFORD - Federal Aviation Administration officials Wednesday certified Sanford Regional Airport for can ler service.

FAA inspectors from Atlanta checked airport security, safety areas and operating procedures Wednesday before tertification was granted.

Mack LaZenby, aviation director of the airport. said expansion of the airport needs to be completed before carrier and cargo services can land. "All the pieces have to fit together first," he said.

Renovation of the airport terminal and construction of roadways and hangars are underway in preparation for expanded services. The terminal should be completed by March, LaZenhy said.

LaZenby petitioned area legislators yesterday to support an application for locating a U.S. Customs office at the airport needed for landing flights from Canada and the Bahamas. Before the customs application can continue, LaZenby said, it must be endorsed by Governor Bob Martinez

Late last year, Canadian Airlines expressed interest in shifting 27 flights weekly from Orlando International Airport to the Sanford facility. British Airways and American Trans-Air have also talked with the airport authority about landing flights at Sanford Regional Airport.

LaZenby said Sanford Regional Airport would be "a reliever" - not a competitor - of Orlando International Airport.

In December, the city of Sanford entered an agreement to lease the airport a crash rescue unit until one can be purchased by the airport authority.

New manufacturing plant to be built in Sanford

SANFORD - The planning and zoning commission last night approved plans for a light manufacturing plant, and rubber-stamped plans for a county juvenile justice center.

The commission voted unanimously to approve site plans for Hernon Manufacturing, a manufacturer of gasket materials. The plant, to be located at 121 Tech Dr. in a light industrial

zone, will be 13,500 square feet of warehouse space and 3,000 square feet of office space.

Site plans for the Seminole County Juvenile justice center were unanimously approved. The county development review board approved plans for the center Dec. 29.

Construction of the center, which began two weeks ago, will cost \$712,980. The facility will house a courtroom, Judges chambers, and offices for the state attorney, public defender and clerk

Commissioner John Morris asked if the facility is needed. Commissioner Leon Brooks Jr. responded, "Hopefully, it will expedite the system and make it more efficient."

Commissioner Thomas Speers said the new

facility would help protect privacy of juvenile offenders and their families. "It's a courtroom for kids so they don't have to come downtown and be seen," the former state attorney and public

Discovery heads for launch pad

CAPE CANAVERAL - The space shuttle Discovery was slowly hauled to the launch pad Friday in a delayed pre-dawn move that sets the stage for an unprecedented on-the-pad turbopump repair job before blastoff in mid March.

Discovery, carried by a massive crawlertransporter, began the six-hour 4.2-mile trip to launch pad 39B at 6 a.m. EST - five days late because of bad weather and a series of minor technical problems, including last-minute trouble early Friday that delayed the start of rollout by some two hours.

The goal of the 28th shuttle mission is the launch of NASA's third \$100 million Tracking and Data Relay Satellite, an orbital communications station that will be placed in Discovery's 60-foot cargo bay Saturday

Discovery's blastoff, originally scheduled for Feb. 23, was delayed Thursday to mid March to give engineers time to replace three suspect high-pressure main engine turbopumps in an unprecedented repair job.

The replacement work is scheduled to start Sunday but under a best-case launch processing flow at the pad. Discovery will not be ready for take off until at least March 10, and that schedule does not include any contingency time to handle unexpected problems. Historically, shuttle workers lose about a day

a week at the launch pad because of minor technical snags, a prospect that is not enhanced by the fact that engineers have no prior experience replacing exygen turbopumps with the shuttle in a vertical position. The delay puts the space agency under

tremendous pressure because if Discovery is not oil the pad by around March 18, a high-priority mission to launch the Magellan Venus radar mapper April 28 could be delayed. Because of the positions of Earth and Venus

NASA must get the shuttle Atlantis and its interplanetary payload into space between April 28 and May 23 to avoid a two-year launch delay - not a pleasant prospect for a \$530 million project that already has been grounded for three years by the 1986 Challenger disaster

For that reason, NASA managers still could decide to postpone Discovery's intesion if more problems cause additional launch delays.

Kidnapped boy found; arrests made

MIAMI - An epileptic 9-month-old boy was found after and well 17 hours after he was kidnapped from his Little Havana home and police arrested three suspects Thursday.

The baby's parents - Dr. Luis Cruz and his wife, Claribel said the baby was fine after his ordeal, although he apparently had not been given the epilepsy medication he requires twice a

"Our baby's fine, thank God," Claribel Cruz said. "It's been a terrible day. We prayed to the Lord and he answered us.

The suspects, all from Miami, were identified as Luis Fernandez, 38, Rene Herrara, 42, and Jose Raul Ludena, 27. All were charged with kidnapping and armed robbery in the abduction of Luis Cruz, Jr.

They were questioned by detectives in the city police department Thursday afternoon and were taken to the Dade County Jail, a spokesman said.

Luis Cruz Jr. was kidnapped at 11 a.m. Wednesday and found alone near a trash can at Bryant Park in southwest Miami at 4 a.m. Thursday after the parents received a phone call from the kidnapper, police said. The suspects were arrested about an hour later.

50-foot ban at polling places overthrown

TALLAHASSEE - The Florida Supreme Court Thursday upheld a state law restricting access by news reporters and photographers to polling rooms, but struck down provisions preventing non-voters from coming within 50 feet of voting

The unanimous opinion says it is "a legitimate exercise of the state's police power" to prevent reporters, photographers or other non-voters from entering rooms where balloting is actually taking place.

However, provisions of the law banning non-voters from coming within 50 feet of a building where balloting is taking place was too broadly written to pass constitutional muster, the court ruled.

'The state's unsubstantiated concern of potential disturbance is not sufficient to overcome the chilling effect on First Amendment rights. Thus, we hold that portion of the lawl ... is overbroad in violation of the first amendment of the United States Constitution," the court said.

The court noted the 50-foot corridor might include public sidewalks, streets, parks, schools and community halls and churches traditionally associated with the right of free speech.

The case was brought in 1986 by the Fort Myers News-Press after a photographer was ejected while trying to take a picture of Frank Mann, a candidate for lieutenant governor, casting his

NAACP fights Cocoa development

ORLANDO - NAACP Legal Defense Fund attorneys have filed a federal lawsuit against the city of Cocoa, claiming proposed downtown commercial development would violate the civil rights of 550 black residents.

"They haven't made any secret of their intention to demolish this neighborhood. That's what makes it such a strong case, said Penda Hair, a Washington attorney helping with the suit.

City Councilman Noah "Sonny" Butt Jr. said a key to the city's future lies in the 58 acres at the core of the dispute in downtown Cocoa. Butt has been one of the city officials promoting the development since last year.

FORT LAUDERDALE - The Belgian government has waived diplomatic immunity for a homosexual embassy employee charged with murriering two south Florida men after he was jilted by his lover in Washington, officials said Thursday.

In return, U.S. prosecutors have agreed not to seek the death penalty against Rudy Van Den Borre, 25, if he is convicted of first-degree murder. He is the first person with diplomatic Immunity to be charged with murder in the United States, said Richard Gookin, associate chief of protocol for the U.S. State

The significance is the Belgians have seen fit to allow justice to take its course in the United States in a case where the alleged offender was previously covered by full criminal immunity," he said.

Mark van Bellinghen, a spokesman for the Belgian embassy in Washington, said "The death penalty was the key issue."

WASHINGTON - The Florida congressional delegation asked the Bush administration Thursday for a permanent ban on oil and gas exploration and drilling along the state's Gulf Coast, the Florida Keys and the Straits of Florida.

In a letter to Interior Secretary-designate Manuel Lujan. the state's two senators and 19 representatives asked the Bush administration to keep the region out of a future five-year oil and gas leasing plan.

The area the congressmen want excluded also involves a wide stretch of water extending between 26 and 25 degrees north latitude into the eastern NASA flight clearance zone off Cape Canaveral.

The Atlantic coast was not included in the plan, but lawmakers said there was no industries.

interest in oil or gas drilling in that region.

The current Outer Continental Shelf 5-Year Leasing Program included "some of the most environmentally sensitive habitats in Florida." the letter said, but those areas were temporarily removed by a one-year moratorium passed last year. That moratorium expirez Cct. 1.

LONGWOOD - Seminole County sheriff's deputies have two new cases of women being confronted and bound with flexcuffs in their homes during robberies. They continue to probe allegations by two Winter Springs teenage girls who said they were confronted in a similar manner on Jan. 25.

In the Winter Springs case, as in the rural Longwood incident that occurred at about noon Wednesday, two intruders identifled themselves as police after foreing entry to the victims'

Sheriff's Capt. Roy Hughey said today that although in a recent Winter Park case the robbers didn't claim to be police, investigators believe they are the same suspects as in the other

Hughey warned that these men are only posing as police, and they identify themselves as police after having forced entry. Legitimate police, he said, do not operate in the manner described. All police have identification cards with their photographs. and a badge is not considered adequate identification.

In recent weeks in Seminole County, in another type of fake police scam, three women have given money to men who have as police who had arrested their husbands

In the Winter Park case, at 7 p.m. Thursday two men forced Sorrento Apartments Rural. The robbers did not identify themselves as police, as they did in the other cases, but they did bind the victim with flexcuffs, just like the other women were.

The intruders pushed past the woman after she answered her door. One pointed a revolver at her head and put his hand over her mouth. He put her in the living room, bound her and covered her head with a jacket-Her apartment was ransacked ported

In the rural Longwood case, the victim said the two robbers visited her house on Tuesday, asked about a car her husband had for sale and said they would return at 5 p.m. that day. Instead, she told deputies, they returned at about noon the following day and pushed past her to enter her house. They flashed badges and said they were police. When she asked for a closer look at the badges, she said, the older suspect, who appeared to be about 35 or 40, brandished a pistol and asked if It was proof enough that he is a police officer.

That suspect took the victim to the living room and held her at gunpoint while the second man, who is about 25-year-old with a pock-marked face, went into the bedroom and came out to say he had found a safe, deputies reported.

The victim was put into a bathroom and bound with flexcuffs. The older suspect fondled her and made sexual threats. She feared she was going to be raped or killed, but the younger suspect intervened and moved her to the kitchen, deputies said.

Remembering Reagan

Ronald Reagan saw his presidency as a Hollywood drama: He came to the White House with the country in trouble double-digit inflation, a weak defense, a population depressed by the nation's apparent inability to deal with its own problems a hero riding into a despairing town to rally the population. He leaves office with the nation's prestige revitalized, with inflation under control, with the economy enjoying unprecedented prosperity and with national confidence restored. It's a drama with a happy ending.

There is truth in the picture. The world seems a stabler place, in danger less, perhaps, from its fratricidal conflicts than from its collective assaults on its own environment. If much of that is due to good luck - to the coming of Mibhail Gorbachev and the exhaustion of the Soviet Union - and much to defense and energy policies put in place by (but never credited to) Jimmy Carter, much was also the result of Reagan's willingness to scize the opportunities. In the end, the need to bring the drama to a happy outcome was more important to him than ideological purity.

At the same time, much of Reagan's success was bought at enormous cost, not only in a national debt and annual deficit that shut down the chance for significant restoration of the public infrastructure, but in the illusions that the drama created. Part of the confidence that Reagan restored rests on his success in diverting attention away from the difficult problems the country did not - and still does not - want to face. To make the happy ending, a lot of elements had to be left out - the poor, the homeless and, in large part, the young on the one hand and corruption, exploitation and morality on the other. Either his successor or events almost certainly will shatter that reverie.


What's not yet certain is how much history will discount the drama — that, too, many depend on luck. Will the story be the revitalization of confidence and optimism, or will it be the deficit-rooted reduction of the nation's ability to act and, because of its reduced circumstances relative to other major nations, its declining influence in the world?

The confidence itself often rests on the most insecure foundation — not so much on what we have done or believe we can do as a people, let alone on what collectively we now know we must do, as on the drama itself.

When a sunny leader tells us that it's morning in America, it's hard not to feel sunny with him. That quality in him has done more than ever seemed possible eight years ago.

Ron Brown: leader or lemming?

"L-word" stands for: lemming.

Professional politicians are usually the most accommodating of people. A little pressure often gets a lot of results. After the 1988 election, public pressure was on the Democratic party. Other candidates having withdrawn, the DNC is about to elect Ron Brown as its new chairman Brown is an articulate, black super-lawyer. He formerly worked for very-liberal Sen. Ted Kennedy. In 1988 he managed hyper-liberal Jesse Jackson's convention campaign and

From the outset Brown's campaign was about liberalism, Jacksonism and, unfortunately, race. Brown claims he's his own man and should not be regarded as Jackson's man, or a liberal, or a black. But it was Brown's liberal campaign that helped raise the race issue, making the hardball case that a

moderates took a dive. They had a strong candidate in former House Budget Chairman Jim Jones. But, as usual, moderate support was too little and too late. Who wants to fight about race with Jesse?

Many Americans are wondering whether Democrats have learned anything from the 1988 election. The message from the DNC is clear: Stop bothering us, we've got some serious wading to do and, yummy, the water is over our

Does it matter? The case has been made that the DNC is a collection of 400 politicians, many of them nonentities and nerds, barely elected in weird ways engendered by now-archaic McGovern reforms, representing no one, doing next to nothing, ignored by all. Partly true.

The media maw is bigger than ever. Television consumes political personalities with gusto. The party without a sitting president needs a spokesman. On many days to come, Democrat Ron Brown will be it.

Brown will be dueling with a Republican counterpart. Lee Atwater, who is a colorful. quotable, conservative white Southerner from the Reagan wing of the party.

Sununu on the administration

WASHINGTON — White House Chief of Staff John H. Sununu was just finishing up an anecdote illustrating how "the very loose approach the president wants to take" is shaping "a much more open structure" of White House decision-making, when George Bush made the point for him. The door to the chief of staff's office opened last Friday and, unannounced, Bush walked in on the interview in progress.

'You going over to this thing?" he asked, referring to the awearing in of Secretary of State James A. Baker Ill. "Yes," Sununu said. "Do you want to go now?" "Finish up what you're doing," Bush said, "and pick me up when you're ready."

In three decades of White House Interviews, this is the first time I can recall a President walking to the office of an aide, rather than having the aide summoned to the Oval Office. It illustrated the tone of openness and access the fledgling Bush administration set in its

For the press, it's meant frequent and lengthy news conferences with Bush, Sununu and others in the high command. For members of Congress, especially the opposition Democrats, it's meant not just substantive formal meetings but social events in the White House residential quarters, including gitmpses of the new first family's bedrooms.

Internally, 11's meant that Sununu has for now shucked off the snort temper and arrogance he often displayed in his old job as governor of New Hampshire, Instead, he has emphasized the impatience with bureaucracy that comes naturally to the hands-on manager accustomed to dealing with a pocket-sized government.

Sununu suggested that the scene I had just witnessed indicated why he was optimistic about being able to "reduce the bureaucracy and paperwork in the White House. I tell the staff, 'If you've got a problem, don't write a five-page memo. Come ask. And if I can't answer it...I'll go in and ask him (Bush) and for the most part, you'll get your answer within two hours.

"That's wonderful, if it survives the first big bump," I said, voicing the skepticism with which Washington views such assertions.

He replied: "It's easier to survive the big bumps with a system that is flexible than one that is rigid. A rigid system tends to be brittle. A flexible system can handle the give and take. People will pull together much better if the communication has been taking place on a personal level than in a more distant, formalized way.

There were no big bumps in the early days, just a couple of gaffes involving Cabinet members who are personal favorites of the

President. Secretary of the Treasury Nicholas

Brady set off one by letting members of Congress know that he was considering recommending a fee on savings accounts as a way of financing the savings and loan ballout. And Dr. Louis Sullivan, the appointee to head the Department of Health and Human Services, aroused the auspicions of conservatives by again intimating that his private views on abortion may be more permissive



It illustrated a tone of openness

than the President's. It took some quick scrambling to nudge Sullivan back into line, and to make it clear that Brady had not yet sold Bush on his S&L plan. But in neither case was there a White House crackdown.

Talking about the congressional leaks that embarassed the two Cabinet members, Sununu sald: "You have to expect that when you talk to people early, and that's going to happen again and again...The President hopes, and everyone here hopes, it will not inhibit a continued willingness...to go up and consult as early as possible (with members of Congress)." Sununu's studied nonchalance is un-

derstandable, since the damage done to Bush in the Sullivan and Brady affairs was neither serious nor long-lasting.

Heavier weather is just ahead, however, when the bad news in the Bush budget is conveyed in advance to the key players on Capitol Hill. "We're going to prepare people for some of the tough things we have to propose (to reduce the deficit)." Sununu said, "and there will be selective disclosures, what you call leaks in this town...There will always be somebody to say we're not planning to put enough money into this or that, and we know we'll have to live through the flurry. There's no way to avoid it, except by not having consultation, and consultation is going to be a hallmark of this administration.

Old hands in Washington will nod wisely and say that if this policy of openness continues to provide raw material for anti-Bush sharpshooters, the iron curtain will come down around this White House as it has around others.

Quayle focuses next on El Salvador

CARACAS, Venezuela - Vice President Dan Quayle faced the toughest part of his three-day Latin American trip Friday with a scheduled stop in El Salvador. where the United States is searching for ways to solidify

Quayle's planned stopover in the tiny Central American nation signaled the importance El-Salvador holds for the U.S. government, which recently has seen the struggling country fall into a deepening quagmire of political and economic problems. Judge steps down after allegations

HARTFORD, Conn. - A Superior Court Judge, under fire for a 1986 drunken driving arrest and questions about his subsequent use of alcohol, dropped his bid Thursday for mappointment to the Connecticut bench.

Gov. William A. O'Neill, who had nominated Richard C. Noren for a second eight-year term on the state's trial court, withdrew the nomination at the judge's request. Noren's term expires Feb. 11.

Noren said in a letter to the governor he was dropping his bid for reappointment "with a heavy heart," but in recognition of the criticism he had come under in legislative proceedings en his confirmation.

The Legislature's Judiciary Committee Wednesday night had delayed for a second time a vote on whether to recommend Noren's confirmation by the House and Senate after new questions arose about his use of alcohol.

Committee members produced a letter from a Woodstock woman who claimed Noren was seen drunk in a restaurant in that town on two occasions. Noren denied the allegations in testimony before the committee, but the panel said it wanted to obtain affidavits from witnesses at the restaurant before voting on the nomination.

Princess sees Big Apple's rags, riches

NEW YORK - Britain's Princess Diana lived an American version of a Tale of Two Cities, meeting homeless families on Manhattan's Lower East Side and then racing up Fifth Avenue to the world's fanciest toy store.

Diana also attended a Weish opera company's New York premier and a gala black-tie dinner on Wall Street Thursday. Her visit was to end Friday after a morning visit with children suffering from AIDS at Harlem Hospital.

Boisterous crowds met the 27-year-old princess's every step Thursday, including cheering spectators eager to catch a royal glimpse and hostile, placard-carrying activists railing against British rule in Northern Ireland.

Resplendent in a white slipper-satin evening dress with a long-sleeved bolero etched with silver beadings, the wife of Britain's future monarch, Prince Charles, had a royal box seat at the Brooklyn Academy of Music for the Welsh National Opera s New York premier of Verdi's "Falstaff."

Kirk reported considering governor race

BOSTON - Paul Kirk, the outgoing chairman of the Democratic National Committee, is seriously considering entering the race for Massachusetts governor in 1990. The Boston Globe reported Friday.

Kirk, 51, has told associates that he has been approached by members of the Massachusetts business community and asked to consider entering the race to succeed Gov. Michael Dukakia. the Globe said, citing unnamed sources.

Kirk, who was born in Newton and owns a home in the Cape Cod community of Marston Hills, could not immediately be reached for comment. A spokeswoman for the DNC said Kirk. who has headed the party for the past four years, was traveling in Hawaii after attending a conference there.

Dukakis, his party's presidential nominee in 1988, announced last month he would not seek re-election next year to a fourth term as governor.

Several other political leaders, however, have emerged as likely favorites if they enter the race in the heavily Democratic state, including Lt. Gov. Evelyn Murphy, former attorney general Frank Bellotti and Rep. Joseph Kennedy.

WASHINGTON - Voting to kill a proposed 51 percent raise for lawmakers, the Senate tossed the politically sensitive issue to the House, where Speaker Jim get the (51 percent) salary in-Wright is fighting to rescue a less generous increase.

The recommendation of a presidential commission that the salaries of members of Congress. judges, and senior executive branch officials be raised from \$89,500 to \$135,000 was defeated in the Senate on a 95.5 vote Thursday night.

But the pay increase will go into effect anyway if the House just discusses it and does not

act, which is a strong possibility. Senators said the 51 percent increase is unjustified at a time of budget deficits and possible cutbacks in popular accial programs - complaints that are certainly reflected in the heavy bags of mail being deposited in their offices.

But critics such as consumer activist Ralph Nader say the Senate vote, and Wright's efforts to scale the increase down to 30 percent, amount to political posturing.

This is because the recommendation of a 51 percent pay raise will go into effect at 12:01 a.m. EST Wednesday unless both the Senate and House vote it down. And Wright, in response to the confidential appeals of his colleagues, has declined to schedule the question for a vote.

Instead, he has called for the House members to consider a 30 percent increase in their salary. - from \$89,500 to \$116,300 coupled with reforms of rules restricting their ability to earn

But If that 30 percent pay increase is accepted, it is unlikely the Senate will accept it.

Plane crash in Burma kills 26

RANGOON, Burma — A Burma Airways Corp. airliner crashed into a military base moments after takeoff early Friday, killing 26 of the 29 people aboard, officials and government radio said.

Another four people were injured on the ground, official Rangoon radio said.

The Fokker F-27 Friendship aircraft had just taken off at 7:41 a.m. when it clipped a 15-foot-tail tree near Rangoon's Mingladon Airport, swerved left and plowed through trees and electric lines in front of a non-commissioned officers' mess at

an air force base, the radio said.

Twenty-six people abourd the plane were killed and three were injured, the radio said. Earlier, airline officials said all aboard were killed.

Two Japanese ship accidents kill one

TOKYO — A Japanese ferry carrying 18 people smashed into a waterbreak in western Japan, killing one passenger and injuring 16 others, and a Japanese fishing boat caught fire in the sea northwest of New Zealand, leaving 16 fishermen missing, maritime officials said Friday.

The Maritime Safety Agency said the 87-ton ferry Midorikaze rammed into the waterbreak at Tsuna Port on Awaji Island in Japan's Inland Sea about 6:40 p.m. Thursday.

Kumiko Shudo, a 17-year-old girl from Oita, southern Japan, was killed in the accident, agency officials said. Sixteen people, two of them crew members, were injured, the officials said.

Less than 90 minutes later, a 299-ton Japanese tuna fishing boat caught fire in the Tasman Sea about 480 miles northwest of New Zealand, the officials said. All 16 crewmen aboard apparently abandoned the ship in rafts.

A search by six nearby Japanese fishing vessels falled to find the crewmen, the officials said.

Bomb explodes near Hirohito site

TOKYO — A bomb exploded Friday in a religious shrine less than a mile from where the late Emperor Pirohito's funeral will be, and police said leftists opposed to Japan's emperor system were suspected of planting it.

No one was injured in the explosion at about 4 a.m. at the Togo Shrine in central Tokyo, said a spokesman for the Metropolitan Police Agency.

The bomb damaged the ceiling and shattered all the windows at the shrine, which opens daily to the public at 6:30 a.m., police said. An adjacent wood tea house was partially burned.

The shrine is about half a mile from the Shinjuku Gyoen park where the state funeral for Hirohito will be Feb. 24.

Supplies airlifted to flood refugees

MANILA, Philippines — Relief supplies were airlifted Friday to some 200,000 refugees from devastating floods caused by monsoon rains that have killed 60 people in the central island of Samar, authorities said.

In Oras town in Eastern Samar province, 350 miles southeast of Manila, rescuers dug through a mountainside in search of 17 people missing and feared dead when landslides buried their homes.

Monsoon rains, spawned by a lingering tropical depression and a cold front from north Asia, continued Friday and officials feared floods ravaging the nation's third largest island were widening.

Ulster leaders plan for new government

BELFAST. Northern Ireland — Opposing political parties have held secret talks aimed at instituting a new form of government in their troubled province after 20 years of British rule, several Northern Ireland politicians confirmed Thursday.

Members of four main political parties confirmed a British Broadcasting Corp. report that they have negotiated secretly for four months with the support of the British and Irish governments.

The parties involved in the talks were the predominantly Roman Catholic Social Democratic Labor Party, and the two mostly Protestant parties, the Democratic Unionist Party and the Ulster Unionist Party. The Northern Ireland Alliance Party, with members of both religions, was also involved.

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Paraguay undergoes coup

Rebel general seizes control, 20 dead in heavy fighting, president arrested

ASUNCION, Paraguay — Rebei Gen. Andres Rodriguez, vowing to restore democracy to Paraguay after more than three decades, declared Friday his forces have control of the country and arrested President Alfredo Stroessner.

"The unanimous backing of the armed forces and the people in general have made it possible for the re-establishment of the tranquility and well being of this, our dear Paraguay," Rodriguez declared on several

radio stations

He added that "General Strocsener has submitted" and isingood health.

Rodriguez Indicated Sirocssner was under a form of house arrest but was "enjoying all his human rights in a residence of the 1st Army Corps."

country ended Friday after most military commanders Joined the coup by Rodriguez, commander of the 1st Army Corps who promised to bring democracy to a nation that has been under rigid right-wing rule for nearly 35 years.

Military and political sources said several close allies of Stroessner were also arrested Friday including the president's private secretary Mario Benitez.

Stroessner has ruled the California-sized landlocked nation of 4 million people tucked between Bolivia, Brazil and

Argentina for nearly 35 years.

Rodriguez said he led his troops against forces loyal to Stroessner to bring "democratization to Paraguay."

The Roman Catholic Church-run Radio Caritas said the shooting broke out about 9:45 p.m. Thursday local time (8:45 p.m. EST), and the tide of battle quickly shifted in Rodriguez's favor.

Early Friday morning Rodriguez received the backing of two powerful generals, giving him the support of two of Paraguay's three corps. Soon after, officers of the small navy and national police officials also said they had joined the Rodriguez insurrection

Jamaican troops patrol riot scene

KINGSTON, Jamaica — Jamaican troops and police patrolled a tense provincial city. Thursday to halt pre-election street fighting between party gunmen that has left at least two people dead and several houses firebombed this week.

Hundreds of soldiers and police earrying automatic weapons flooded into Spanish Town, about 15 miles west of Kingston, to stop clashes be-

tween supporters of the ruling Jamaica Labor Party and the opposition People's National Party.

The troops, reinforced by army helicopters hovering overhead, dismantied street barricades of tires and debris set after by party supporters after a woman was wounded by partisan gunmen about 4 a.m., police said.

Details of the shooting were sketchy, and police refused to reveal the political parties involved. The city was calm by late afternoon, with schools and stores open.

In violence late Wednesday, a house owned by a Labor supporter was burned to the ground in a gasoline-bomb attack by a PNP gang, neighbors said.

The fighting in partycontrolled neighborhoods was the worst since Prime Minister Edward Seaga announced Jan. 15 that next Thursday would be the date for long-awaited general elections in the Caribbean island nation.



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

A discussion about God

Speakers strove to help listeners understand god

Since moving to Altamonte Springs from Ligonier, Pa., three years ago, Ligonier Ministries has been behind no event as central to humanity as its January conference, One Holy

Nearly 4,000 people from 45 states and four foreign countries came to learn more about the attributes of God. Holiness, faithfulness, compassion. jeolousy, righteousness and immutability were among the characteristics considered Jan. 19-21, at Orlando's First Baptist Church.

"Our desire for this conference was to enlarge people's un-derstanding of who God is," said Bob Ingram, Ligonier's vicepresident of adult education and conference director. "We want people to understand that a God who is so big can bend down and meet all our needs."

R.C. Sproul, chairman of Ligonier, said that we live in a time when the character of God is in eclipse. That it is essential for us to focus on His character because "it changes us.

Over the course of the threeday event, Sproul, Chuck Swindoll, J.I. Packer and Steve Brown espoused essentials concerning God's character. Not that any teacher or person attending this conference felt adequate in themselves to plumb the depths of God's riches.

"God relates to us as a parent relates to a child," said Gregory Bailey of Hopewell, Va. "Infants take a lifetime to learn and explore the world given to them by their parents. This is how it is with God.

"It will take a lifetime to know Him. There's just so much to

Perhaps no one was better

equipped to teach to the average person than Chuck Swindoll, writer and senior pastor of the Evangelical Free Church in Fullerton, Calit.

Sproul considers Swindoll host of the talk show Insight for Living aired on WTLN-FM - as strong a proponent of Biblical practicalities as there is in Christianity today.

"It's one thing to learn about God. It's another to let him invade your life," said Swindoll during the opening session. "This conference is not just about information. It's about transformation."

Weaving humor and seriousness together, Swindoll utilized word pictures that punctuated each of his points concerning compromise and faithfulness: A frog slowly boiled to death in his high-school physics class; a stress diet ruined by just one cookie; the erosion of a piece of land he and his grandfather fished at during childhood days; one of his own children undergoing an eye operation that appeared unsuccessful at first and left Swindoll wondering

"where was God?" "There isn't a person listening that can't identify with compromise," Swindoll said. "The decay begins from within. It's so slight, so insignificant. Just one

"Yet, in our darkest moments, there's always the flashing reminder that God is faithful. His compassions never, never, never fail. His faithfulness is greater than my compromise, greater than my sin.

"I don't care how far away you are from God. God never moves. He is faithful in His love and concern for you.

As the conference came to a close. Swindoll spoke about God's compassion.

"I live my life surprised, amazed at God's abundant mercy and love," said Swindoll. 54. "To think that I can come to a place like this and talk. My kids still can't believe it."

The audience laughs. It subsides as he builds to a climax with this thought.

"There's something comforting about God's mercy and loving kindness," Swindoll says. "I need grace and mercy every day of my life and so do you.

"It's in the mercy of God that we find hope."

Methodists return back to the basics

United Methodists are bluntly being told they need to "return to the basics" if they want to end their seemingly endless membership slide and what some believe is an erosion of the identity of the once-proud denomination.

"The United Methodist Church needs to go back to basics, to the fundamentals of our faith," the Rev. John Ed Mathison, Montgomery, Ala., told a recent three-day meeting of the church's Council on Evangelism. "We are here to make disciples for Jesus Christ."

There may be no more apt symbol of mainline Protestantism than the 9.1 millionmember United Methodist Church, the nation's second largest Protestant denomination.

During the 1940s and 1950s. the so-called "mainline" churches - denominations like the Methodist, Episcopal, Lutheran, Presbyterian, Disciples and United Church of Christ all benefitted from the post-war boom in religion and enjoyed a surge in membership as they spread into the burgeoning suburbs.

"We need a clearer statement and a more intentional effort at including ... commitments (to the faith) in mission activities." said Tal Oden, Altus, Okla., a layman who heads the new

Celebrities draw attention to Scientology

Last October's wedding of Elvis Presley's daughter Lisa Marie to rock guitarist Danny Keough put the Church of Scientology in the spotlight once

The couple were married in the chapel of the church's Celebrity Center in Hollywood. It was a small gathering of friends and a few relatives including the bride's mother, actress Priscilla Presiey, who, like the newlyweds, is a member of the Scientology church. The honeymooners took a

cruise to the Caribbean aboard the church's own lavishly appointed ship "Firewinds"

Scientology has attracted many names in the entertainment world besides mother and daughter Presley - such as Karen Black, Sonny Bono, John Travolta and Chick Corea But the church, founded by L. Ron Hubbard in the 1950s, owen its notoriety more to its running dispute with the U.S. government which began over the church's claim to tax exemption.

The government has contended that Scientology is not a church. True, it doesn't resemble your average church in its philosophy. But it does hold Sunday services at its 600

churches and missions throughout the world. Conducting regular public services is one condition of church tax exemption.

Scientology's ministers don't go to seminary to prepare for ordination. God isn't mentioned. but then God isn't mentioned at Buddhist services or some Unitarian services either.

After the U.S. government first challenged Scientology's right to tax exemption, the Food and Drug Administration attacked what it said was the church's claim that it cured sickness.

In retaliation. Scientology began attacks of its own against certain government agencies. exposing what it called "dirty tricks" and violations of people's civil rights. Several Scientologists were convicted of such

things as theft and conspiracy against the government.

in its promotional literature, the Church of Scientology still refers to its 1964 expose of "U.S. Army experiments in which passengers at crowded airports and bus terminals in major U.S. cities were secretly sprayed with infectious bacteria."

The brochure carries a photostat of a UPI story out of Washington, D.C. which reads, "Army agents secretly sprayed passengers at Washington's National Airport and a city bus terminal with bacteria to test how a smallpox epidemic might be started by enemy forces.

While the Church of Scientology likes to think of itself as a watchdog of individual liberty, most of its followers have been attracted by its "applied religious philosophy," which is said to rid people of deep, hidden tensions standing in the way of health and success.

Many Scientologista undergo a form of counseling known as auditing. The student of Scientology holds two tin cans which are connected to a batteryoperated instrument equipped with a gauge and a wiggling

As the auditor begins a line of TERPRISE ASSN.

questioning, any inner tensions or emotions are transmitted by the bands through the cans to the meter, making the needle jump. As each trauma is discovered, the auditor probes for details. The event is then discussed until the student no longer reacts to it emotionally and there is no further movement of the needle.

Auditing sessions can be expensive. So can the lifeimprovement courses the church offers. These are the main sources of the church's income along with the sales of Hubbard's books.

DEAR READER: Milroy's disease (idiopathic lymphedema) is, indeed, an unusual condition; it is awelling of one or both legs. due to the presence of excessive lymph fluid in the tissues.

Lymph is the clear liquid that makes up the "water" in blisters. It is composed of the fluid portion of blood and contains protein and a few white blood cells. Most people are surprised to learn of the existence of a second circulation, in addition to blood, within the body. But, in fact, there is normally such a circulatory pattern called the lymphatic system and it plays an important role in health and immunity.

Lymph fluid is an "ultra filtrate" of blood, meaning that liquid squeezes through the thin walls of capillary blood vessels and enters its own delicate channels. It flows toward the heart, pausing at intervals to be cleansed by lymph nodes that act as fliters. Eventually, the lymph fluid empties into a large vessel (the thoracle duct) that carries lymph back to the heart, where it is mixed with blood and recirculates.

Any blockage or swelling in the system will impede the flow of lymph. For instance, lymph nodes that are diseased may interfere with the return of lymph to the heert. Similarly, if lymph glands are surgically removed, the now of lymph fluid will be blocked. Also, diseases of the lymph channels themselves can prevent free flow of the fluid. Under these circumstances, the increased pressure of the lymph causes pooling of fluid; edema (excess tissue fluid) will result.

For the sake of completeness, I should add that edema can result from causes other than disorders in the lymphatic
