### Faculty Members Of FTU Honored

Five members of the Florida Technological University faculty have been chosen to appear in the 1971 edition of "Outstanding Educators of America," a national honors publication for educators. Dr. George F. Schrader, chairman of the department of industrial engineering and management systems; Dr. Ronald Evans, chairman of the department of mechanical engineering; Dr. David L. Block, assistant dean of the college of engineering; Dr. David Hernandez, chairman of the teaching analysis program in the college of education; and Dr. Graeme Baker, chairman of the chemistry department, are the five men chosen for the honor from FTU. They were nominated by school administrators. Dr. Schrader is a native of Illinois, and received his Ph.D. at the University of Illinois. He came to FTU in 1968 from the University of Nebraska, where he had been serving as professor of mechanical engineering. He was the national vice president of the American Institute of Industrial Engineers in 1964-65. He lives with his family at 2018 Keweenaw Trail, Casselberry. Dr. Evans is also in the college of engineering at FTU and has been on the faculty since 1968. A native of Missouri, Dr. Evans received his Ph.D. at Arizona State University and had some of his work presented to the U.S. Congress in March of 1968. He resides in Winter Park. Dr. Block, of the department of mechanical engineering at FTU since 1968, and has been at FTU since 1968. He came to FTU from working in the aerospace field. He is relatively young to hold such a position, having just turned 32. He received his Ph.D. from Virginia Polytechnic Institute in 1966 in Engineering Mechanics. Dr. Hernandez came to FTU in January of 1968 from serving as the director of the Tampa component of the Southeastern Education Laboratory. He was also at one time the director of the Project Headstart in Tampa. He received his chairmanship in April of 1970, after serving as acting chairman since 1968. He received his Ed.D. from Florida State University. He lives in Matland. The chairman of the chemistry department, Dr. Baker, of Orlando, has served in that capacity since 1968. He came to FTU after serving as a professor at Montana State University, where he also received his Ph.D. in 1959.

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## 17 Win Cuts In Taxing Assessments Adjustments Board Concludes Hearings On 119 Complaints

Following hearings which began on Aug. 16, the Seminole County Board of Tax Adjustments concluded that 17 of the 119 appeals protesting the 1971 tax assessments, all but 17 were upheld by the board. Of the 17, twelve homeowners were successful in obtaining a reduction in their assessments by as much as \$3,390. According to Tax Assessor D. Guy Allen, many of the adjustments to the homeowners came as a result of small mechanical errors in the data processing of the 48,000 assessments prepared by his office. The board met three nights a week and was comprised of two representatives of the County School Board, Mrs. Jean Bryant and Dr. Stuart Colpepper, and County Commissioner Edward Yarbrough. Al Davis and John Kimbrough, County Attorney, and old Johnson served as an ex-officio member and the office of the tax assessor was represented. According to Allen, the number of appeals heard each night varied from two to 29. Many human interest incidents evolved from the hearings. Allen said that one of the most common errors was that persons appearing said that they were on hand to protest their taxes, where as it should have been the assessments. Another complaint cited by Allen was the fact that homeowners protested assessments because they were not afforded fire or police protection and live upon dirt roads. Since both the School Board and County Commission were represented, Allen quipped that they seemed to feel they had a "captive audience." However, Allen said the Board of Tax Adjustments is not the proper entity in which to register these complaints. Each person appealing was granted 10 minutes to speak and one South Seminole resident utilized this time to request a lowering of the assessment since she did not have good water. The resident had even requested that County Sanitarian Val Robbins test the water. Another resident of the Tanglewood area protested because his child is housed by the school, he said, was instrumental in the child's failure in school. Therefore, he was enrolling the child in a parochial school this term and requested an assessment reduction. Allen said that the complainant's total "excess" was \$100 last year, and it was costing \$800 for enrollment in the parochial school. Therefore, Dr. Colpepper gave the tongue-in-cheek remark that the citizen was actually getting "two for the price of one" in the public school system.

## Mobile Home Operation Planned HLH Plant Is Sold For \$450,000

The long-closed H. L. Hunt building and 154 acres of land on Sanford Avenue have been sold by Hunt to a Chattanooga (Tennessee) conglomerate of 11 corporations, which plans immediate occupancy and conversion of the former catering factory into a mobile home building operation. Purchase price paid by TUFTCO was approximately \$450,000 for the existing plant and land. An additional 18-month option for 15.4 more acres of adjacent property also was taken for a planned expansion into modular home building, in a new facility to be constructed later. The purchase was completed Thursday afternoon and the final papers signed transferring the property to TUFTCO, according to Jack Frost, TUFTCO president, who spoke by telephone from his Tennessee office. Frost, in conversation with The Herald, said TUFTCO is a manufacturer which includes in its various operations production equipment, carpets, modular and mobile homes. TUFTCO plans to begin production of mobile homes in the Sanford location in "about eight weeks" Frost said. He estimated an initial employment of 75-100 workers, who will have to be trained, within 90 days. "By mid-1972, we should be employing 400 persons," Frost added. TUFTCO owns two mobile home plants at Winfield, Ala. and markets the units under Winchester Homes, Inc., Frost said. Two TUFTCO officials will be in Sanford Tuesday to begin laying out the 117,000-square-foot plant for mobile home making. The president added he would be in Sanford Thursday or Friday of next week. Winchester Mobile Homes are sold through dealers and, according to Frost, "We plan to move some of our homes to Sanford within the next seven to ten days to allow people to see what we plan to produce."

Florida dealers of Winchester Homes also will be brought to visit the Sanford plant after production starts, it was revealed. Equipment also will be brought to Sanford from Alabama and plans are underway to construct other equipment right on the spot in Sanford, Frost added. The executive paid the highest regards for the efforts made by John Krider, Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce manager, to locate TUFTCO in Sanford. "Krider is a terrific salesman for Sanford. His services were invaluable," Frost said. Krider said he intended to consult with the local employment office to begin immediately interviews for hiring of employees.

### Food Agents Remove Questionable Soup

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP)—Florida appears to have received only a small amount of a possibly tainted batch of Cambodia's "vegetarian soup," health officials reported Thursday after two days intensive checking. Inspectors removed 136 cans from independent food stores in Miami, 20 from a Clearwater market and 13 from two Pensacola stores. All carried the code number 14CT-7B1X on the top or bottom of the can, said agricultural and health. This is the number of the shipment which the U.S. Food and Drug Administration says may be tainted with lethal bacteria. An intensive check of 13 Northwest Florida counties produced no further reports of soup from the shipment beyond the 15 cans at Pensacola. Retailers in that area often buy from wholesalers in Alabama, one of nine states where the company said the suspect batch was shipped. A person could avoid the deadly botulism poisoning, said microbiologist Hugh Baker of the State Division of Health, by boiling, even tainted soup for 10 minutes. He said the organic poison grows only in sealed containers free of oxygen.

A New York man was killed and his wife paralyzed earlier this year when they contracted botulism, a deadly food poisoning, after eating soup. ### Bank Bid Accepted For Land

LONGWOOD — Acceptance of the bid of South Seminole Bank to finance the acquisition of property to be used as a sewage treatment plant site was announced Thursday by the City Council by Chairman E. E. Williamson. The bid submitted by the bank was interest rate of four per cent annually over a five-year period. The First National Bank of Matland submitted a bid of 12 1/2 per cent. The Matland Bank's first bid was an offer to hold a mortgage on the land as collateral. A second letter, however, agreed to use water revenue as collateral. The South Seminole Bank, which holds a city loan for water systems improvements, agreed to add \$100,000 new loan to the old with an increase in collateral, leaving the property free. Williamson and Councilman Eugene Jaques looked horses over the water with James Innes, the low bidder, and awarded the business while Williamson didn't want to take our money to Orange County. In addition, Williamson doubted if the city could plead the water revenue twice. "And I don't like the Matland Bank's suggestion we transfer all our accounts there," Williamson said. First vote on motion by Williamson to accept South Seminole Bank was Williamson "yes," Jaques "no" and both Councilmen Sandra Thompson and Agnes Weber abstaining. Councilman B. L. Helms was absent from the meeting.

### Sanford Officials 'Get The Message'

Sanford city officials "got the message" first hand Thursday afternoon after a tour of some 10 apartment units operated by the Sanford Housing Authority. Arranged by Rev. Joseph Smith, member of Sanford Tenants Joint Council, the city delegation headed by Mayor Lee Moore, Commissioner Gordon Meyer and City Manager W. E. Knowles entered many of the same apartments visited earlier by The Herald, for which conditions were described both pictorially and by word. Moore said "things are in bad shape" and he was particularly concerned over the condition of several roofs which had been leaking for some time. The tour was set up by Rev. Smith and Rev. J. C. Connelly after the two ministers talked with Mayor Moore and the city manager earlier this week. A threatened rent strike by tenants of the city's four federally-funded projects was postponed earlier in the week after city officials agreed to visit for themselves. The conditions mentioned by tenants in asking the City Commission to remove the five white Sanford Housing Authority board members and replace them with five blacks, since 80 per cent of the tenants are black. The delegation met with Rev. Smith at the minister's church before the tour and related new developments in the procedure for removal of housing board members. Moore advised that research has discovered that housing board members may be removed by the mayor with approval of the city commission, if ineffective is proved. However, the mayor stressed that authority members must be allowed the right of an attorney to contest charges brought by tenants. Previously, it was thought that the only way a housing authority board member could be removed was by the governor, and this was explained to the tenants at a commission meeting two weeks ago by W. C. Hutchison, city attorney. Rev. Smith and other black leaders accompanied city officials on the tour and pointed out the lack of painting, dangerous walks overgrown and side-shocking electric stoves and refrigerators that do not function also were noted during the tour. Moore said he would set up a meeting with housing authority officials to discuss the situation next week. Rev. Smith said he would consult with other tenant council members regarding the information relative to removing housing authority members.

"Be not anxious." (Scripture: Luke 12:22-31.)

It is clear that God neither feeds us nor clothes us that we feed and clothe ourselves and one another if we do not, so we starve or freeze. So we argue with obvious truth.

What, then, does Jesus mean, do not be anxious when I come up against a brick wall and can see no place to go and no way out. Does God realize what it means to go to the hospital when something has gone wrong that I can't fix at home? When something is happening to me that is beyond all knowledge that is beyond me. Here where I give myself to strangers to care for. Here I can't do what is most important to me make me live. I've always been able to handle money, but here I realize that we are creatures and not a god. We think we realize that we are not going to ever be in a position which consciously that we are creatures and not a god. 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# Bank Holding Merger

T. E. Tucker, president of First Florida Bancorporation, and Frank Smathers Jr., chairman of the board of United Bancshares of Florida, Inc., jointly announced today that negotiations are in progress with respect to a possible merger of the two registered bank holding companies.

## 1 Killed, Six Hurt In Traffic Mishap

One person is dead and another in serious condition following a three-car accident on SR 436 south of Casselberry yesterday afternoon. Raymond Edson White, 16, of 7732 Grevillea Drive, Orlando, was killed in the accident.

The death car, a 1966 Chevy II driven by Daniel Gary Sullivan, 23, of Orlando, was attempting to pass a 1969 Dodge Dart Swinger, driven by David Randall Sweat, 19, also of Orlando. The Chevy II ran off the road and came back on striking the right front of the Dodge, causing both drivers to lose control of their vehicles.

The Dodge rolled over twice and came to rest in the median. All five occupants of the death car were thrown out and the car rolled 1 1/2 times into the path of the third vehicle involved. The car came to a stop with the deceased underneath.

Robert J. Berry, 49, of Maitland, his wife, Etta Mae, 43, and a daughter, Karen 12, were not injured as Berry cut to the right and went into a ditch to avoid contact with the death car. Damage to Berry's Dodge Charger was estimated at \$500.

Sullivan is in the intensive care unit of Florida Hospital in "serious" condition. Julia Pearce, 15, also a passenger in the death car, is in "satisfactory" condition. Nick White, 18, brother of the deceased, and Delbert Wallace, 20, also were passengers in the Chevy II and were treated and released at Florida Hospital. Sweat and one of his passengers, Eric Sands, 18, of Orlando, were not injured, while another passenger, Lee Brockel 19, suffered minor injuries.

A witness told authorities that the two cars apparently were drag racing or attempting to drag race at the time of the accident. Both cars were "totaled."

Troopers Robert Lovering and C. L. (Tommy) Tomlinson are investigating the accident. According to Tomlinson, both Sullivan and Sweat have been charged with reckless driving.

## Agrees Road Work Needed Lake Looks On SR 46

Second step toward improving and ultimately four-laning State Road 46 between U. S. 441 at Mount Dora on the west and U. S. 1 at Mims on the east is being considered by Lake County and the Florida Department of Transportation at the instigation of Sidney Vihlen Jr., Seminole County Commissioner.

The proposal was reviewed in a discussion between Vihlen and J. M. Hoskinson, chairman of the Lake County Commission, both of whom are members of the East Central Florida Regional Planning Council.

Lake County does not have a four-lane right-of-way plan for SR 46 in its five-year program. The first step is about to be realized . . . in Seminole County. The DOT is evaluating the low bid of \$26,629 by J. W.

75 on the west and Interstate 95 on the east. Stenstrom's committee met last year ago with Lake County commissioners and other Lake County civic leaders at Mount Dora. At that time, Stenstrom said today, the Lake County people expressed interest.

Vihlen today quoted Hoskinson that he favors improving SR 46 now between U. S. 441 and the Wekiva River. Hoskinson was quoted further he believes all the Lake commissioners will agree and will seek to place the project in its 1971-72 fiscal budget.

C. A. (Bill) Benedict DeLand district engineer for DOT, was quoted by Vihlen that a maintenance project for that stretch of road is ready for contract. It will include patching, some widening and straightening a couple sharp curves.

Benedict also was quoted by Vihlen that the Lake overall project should be going to coincide with the Seminole building plan, which should be completed within the next six months.

Vihlen shortly will call on the Sanford Chamber, DOT and Lake County officials for a meeting to discuss the inclusion of four-lane right-of-way for Lake's SR 46 project in its five-year program. Benedict and Hoskinson were agreed "now is the time to act" in the matter of obtaining right-of-way.

Vihlen said also he is considering broaching to Orange County that it build a stretch of road connecting the "road to nowhere" with the "bridge to nowhere."

State Road 43 proceeds south from SR 46 in Lake County and stops at the Orange County line. It has no outlets except at SR

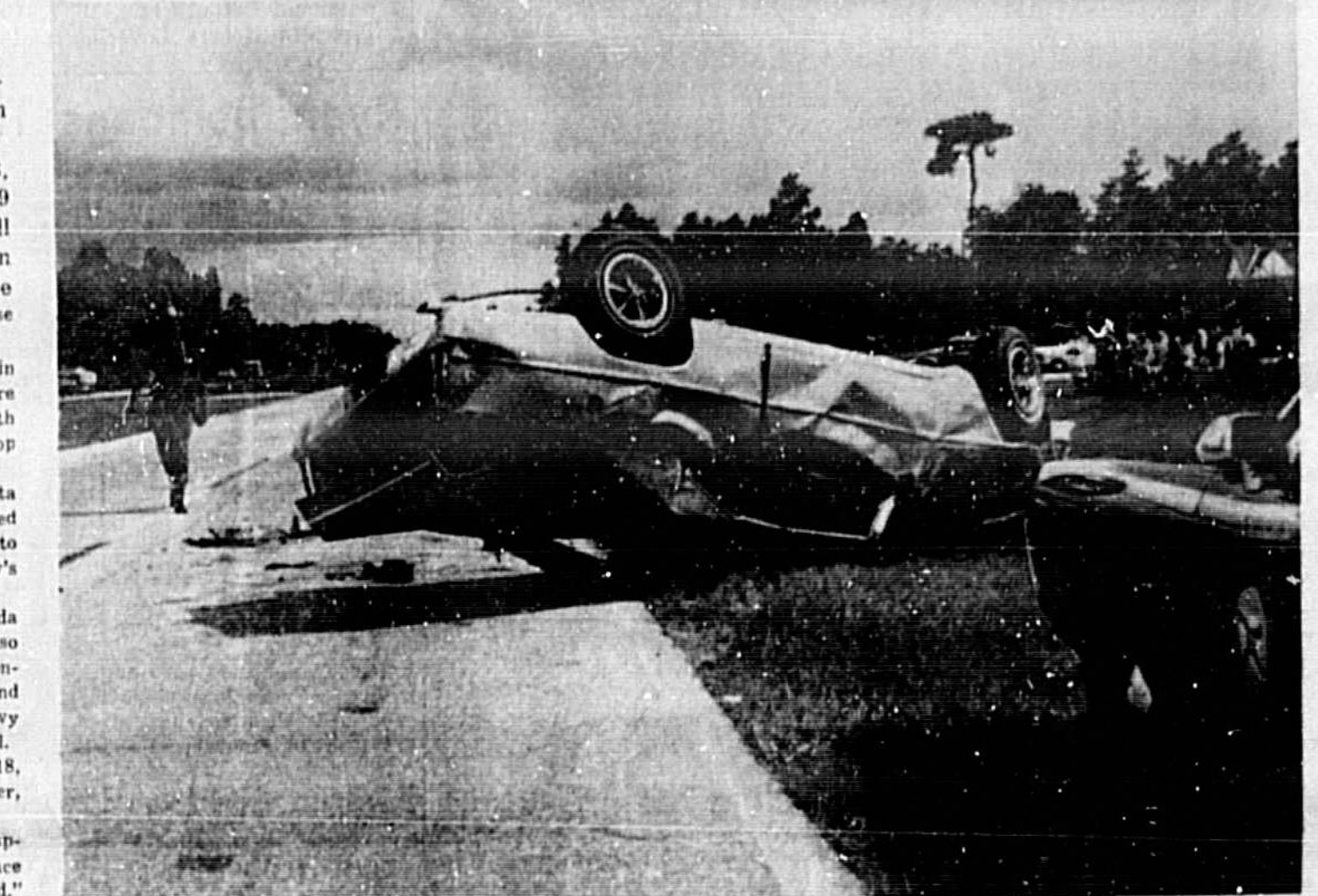
46 and it has no homes facing it. The "bridge to nowhere" crosses the Wekiva River in southwest Seminole, at the Orange County line, but there is no connecting road in Orange County.

Benedict explained some years ago that Orange County reeling in supplying funds for building a connecting road.

## Burglary Hamper Proposed

Through the cooperation of the Police and Sheriff's departments with SISTER, Inc., of Sanford, "Operation Identification" will become a reality in Seminole.

"Operation Identification" was first brought to public attention by the March issue of "Better Homes and Gardens" and was publicized in August Reader's Digest and more recently in "Parade".

This program is reputedly an effective method of drastically reducing the number of thefts by breaking and entering.

According to Reader's Digest, "Thousands of households are in more than 40 California communities have been dramatically reducing burglaries through a simple idea which not only discourages, theft, but aids police in identifying and recovering stolen property."

"This is accomplished by having driver's license numbers engraved on valuables most frequently stolen from homes — items such as TV sets, radios, hi-fi's, tape recorders, cameras, tools, jewelry, musical instruments, bicycles, and many others which can be decided by the individual.

"If stolen, these items are really too "hot" to handle because the license can readily be used by authorities to trace the owner. Each home owner places a small blue and yellow sticker on his front door which notifies would-be thieves of these facts.

"Since "Operation Identification" began in Monterey Park (population 50,000), in 1963, only six burglaries have occurred there among the participants and only one license engraved object has been stolen.

The city's unlicensed residents have suffered more than 1,000 burglaries!"

Because Florida license numbers change each year, SISTER has proposed that automobile owners have their license numbers engraved on their license plates.
