

Cage Athlete Signs For More Than \$60,000

George Mikan Also Writes Way Into Legal Profession

CHICAGO, May 1, 1940.—When young George Mikan autographed a \$60,000 contract to play professional basketball for the Chicago American Gears of the National Basketball League, he also signed himself into a future in the legal profession.

All Mikan has to do to pocket the \$60,000 is play basketball for five years with the Gears.

But as soon as he gets his law degree from De Paul University—next summer—he'll go into the legal department of the American Gear Manufacturing Company. His unannounced salary for that work will add to his income.

"I may want to do a little basketball coaching on the side just to keep in touch with the game when I go over the hill as a professional player," he said recently after winning the most valuable player award in the world professional championship tournament here. "The law profession will come first, though."

Big Mike, who never played high school basketball and was turned down by Notre Dame as "too awkward" to play, was the first rookie in the pro ranks ever to win the most valuable award in the world tournament. He set a new tournament scoring record of 100 points as the Gears finished third in the 14-team meet.

He turned pro after he finished an intercollegiate career at De Paul during which he won almost every honor available to a college player, including the rating of "all-time All-American" of the Helms Foundation, Los Angeles organization that rates college cage stars.

With it all, this six-foot, ten-inch giant has remained completely modest, and probably has no peer among the "big boys" of the game as a team player. While setting one scoring record after another, he was asked "why don't you shoot more?" His answer: "I don't care if I ever score so long as we win. I'll pass to any player cutting toward the basket if I think he has a better chance to score than I'd have."

Mikan's professors at De Paul have complete faith in his future in the legal profession. He's almost an "A" student despite the time he lost from his classes and lectures because of basketball. He is "quick on the trigger" in classroom debates, an excellent speaker, and his industry is unusual.

During the recent world tournament, he was taking mid-term examinations.

"But he came down here in the afternoon to help me coach the freshmen," Ray Meyer, his De Paul coach said.

Mikan says he may play baseball again this summer. As a pitcher for an amateur team in Joliet, Ill., his home town, he had a strikeout average of almost 11 per game last year, but passed up tryout offers with major league teams.

"Don't worry, he'll do all right where he is without professional baseball," Meyer avers.

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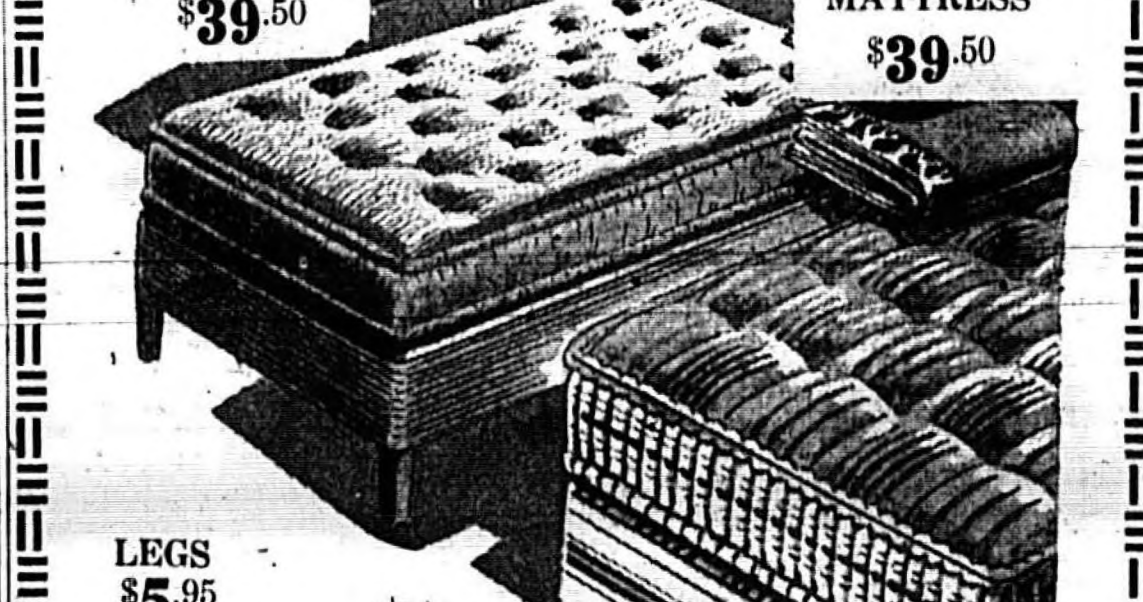

Railroad Strike Is Seen As Probable As Parley Fails

No Hope Is Held For Settlement Of Coal Strike This Week; Byrd Hits Royalties

CHICAGO, May 2, (AP)—Hopes that railroad operators and the Engineers and Trainmen's Brotherhoods would be able to settle their differences by mutual agreement received a setback today.

The two big operating brotherhoods, which have called a strike for May 18, walked out of a conference with the operators this morning.

The president of the trainmen, A. F. Whitney, said that the brotherhood delegates left the meeting after about 15 minutes because the operators offered nothing substantial. Whitney said that the brotherhood negotiations will discuss the situation further with the operators, but will not meet with the operators again unless they make a substantial offer.

The brotherhoods have issued the strike call after rejecting the recommendations of a presidential fact-finding board.

In Washington indications mounted that John L. Lewis has ruled out the possibility of an early settlement in the strike of his 400,000 soft coal miners. Observers pointed out that in calling his 250-man policy committee to Washington for a conference next Tuesday, Lewis showed that he did not expect a strike settlement by that time.

He may have summoned the committee, however, to hear a report on progress or to make up problems connected with the opening of contract parleys for 75,000 hard coal miners. In any event, Lewis apparently does not expect the soft coal strike to end within the next five days.

In Atlantic City, United States Senator Harry Byrd said the nation was headed for another catastrophe if the soft coal strike continues for two more weeks. The Virginia democrat told the 34th annual meeting of the United States Chamber of Commerce that John L. Lewis was trying to collect an annual royalty of \$60,000,000.

Byrd said he did not believe that our business economy can operate by paying royalties to labor leaders such as United Mine Workers Chief Lewis and James Petrillo, head of the Musicians' Federation.

Holland Predicts Lead In 57 Of 67 Counties In State

DAYTONA BEACH, May 2, (AP)—Spessard L. Holland, former governor and candidate for the United States Senate, held a news conference today for an afternoon address at Macclenny, Baker County seat. And a night address at Jacksonville. After speaking last night at a rally here at the Daytona Beach ball-club.

Stating he "is not given to making predictions," Holland flatly said last night he expects to win the Democratic nomination for the United States Senate in the first primary election Tuesday if the people go to the polls, basing his forecast on the leadership in his campaign, the voluntary organization and active support given him.

"When the votes are counted, I believe you will find that I shall be leading in 57 of the state's 67 counties," he said. "Mark that down and see if I am not right. I have just completed a tour of west Florida, and I think you shall find that I will be leading in 13 of those 18 counties. I carried ten of them when I ran for governor."

Holland also declared that, as United States Senator, he would be representing "the special interests" of all the people of Florida, just as he did while Governor. Two speakers for candidates for the United States Senate who preceded him on the platform, disclaimed they were representing "special interests" of the people who were helped during his administration as governor. Holland told the audience he estimated at about 2,500 are the aged, blind and the dependent children, school teachers and schools and the taxpayers generally.

The rally held under sponsorship of the Volusia County Young Democrats, the second in a series of three rallies, was preceded by a free fish fry, at which several thousands of pounds of fish were served. The rally was opened by Richard Beach, president of the Volusia County Young Democrats, and Sheriff Alex D. Littlefield at Volusia, presided as master of ceremonies.

Conservation Of Power In Effect Today

Illinois Commerce Commission Takes Action Because Of Critical Coal Supply

CHICAGO, May 2, (AP)—A drastic power conservation order is in effect in Chicago and about 1500 other Illinois cities. The Illinois Commerce Commission ordered the reduction of electric current to protect public health and safety during the critical shortage of soft coal.

The commission directive apparently means that about two-thirds of Illinois will have no movies after 6:00 P. M. and no shows in legitimate theaters or sporting events at night.

A weekly total of 24 hours electric power will be permitted for manufacturers and industrial users operating Monday through Friday. Commercial users may operate from 2:00 to 6:00 P. M. Monday through Saturday.

The order bans the lighting of show windows and signs, car heating and interior lighting in each of minimum requirements.

Establishments essential to public health and safety and protection of property and transportation facilities will not be affected. Domestic users are asked not to use any more electricity than necessary.

The electric companies are empowered to cut off service from firms or persons who won't cooperate.

The commission chairman, C. D. Biggs, estimates the week's saving in coal will total 17,000 tons from commercial and industrial users alone.

Syrian Cabinet Of Premier Jabris Reveals Platform

DAMASCUS, Syria, May 2 (AP)—The new Syrian cabinet under Premier Badshah Jabris has announced a platform which includes condemnation of the British-American Palestine inquiry report. The statement of policy by the new Government promises unlimited Syrian support of Palestine in fighting Zionism.

The cabinet also proposes compulsory military service for Syria and the consolidation of the state police, gendarmerie, and desert corps under the Ministry of Defense.

The new government's program calls for close relations with all Arab states, strong support for the Arab League and help to Arab states to achieve their independence.

The cabinet also pledged cooperation with the United Nations and friendly relations with the United States, Britain and the Soviet Union.

Phillip Kronen Is Discharged by Navy

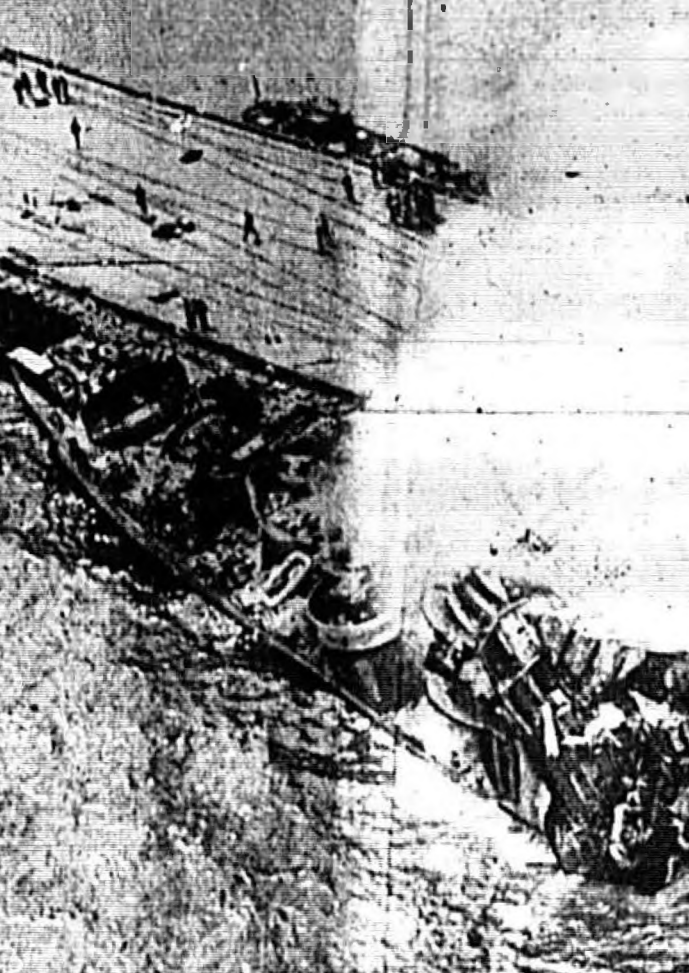

Blaze Discovered At 2:30 A. M. By Passing Taxi Driver
Fire of undetermined origin which was first noticed by a passing taxi driver on First Street at 2:30 o'clock this morning, destroyed the building and contents of the Seminole Feed Company on North Elm Avenue and only prompt action by firemen prevented its spread to a much larger pile, hay, poultry feed and fertilizer was unburned.

The fire was well underway when the firemen arrived, according to Fire Chief Mack Cleveland, and six lines of hose, including two 2 1/2 inch lines from pumps and two 1 1/2 inch lines were directed at the blaze. The iron roof of the building collapsed and the metal covered sides buckled from the intense heat. A 1939 Dodge one and half ton truck, parked in a garage in the rear of the building, was completely destroyed, including six tires.

Two of them brand new. One fire crew remained until 6:00 A. M., the other until 10:00 o'clock. J. N. McCaskill, manager of the plant, termed it and its contents a complete loss, and while much wire, poultry, hay, poultry feed and fertilizer was unburned, the building, which was insured with contents, fronted 50 feet on Elm Avenue, next to the Crown Paper Company, and was 105 feet in depth. Some part of the east end of the building was saved, and office records were not lost.

Only recently a carload of hay and a carload of fertilizer were received, said Mr. McCaskill. There was a lot of dried citrus pulp for cattle feeding on hand, but there was less than a carload of poultry feed stored. The plant had been closed for the half holiday on Wednesday noon.

Chief Cleveland pointed out this morning that the fire could have been caused by spontaneous combustion in grass or damp hay or from fertilizer, with its nitrate of soda content. No estimate has yet been made of the loss. Sills on ventilator openings on the Chase Building were burned and the flames could easily have spread to the flooring had they not been checked.

22 Maine Chance Farm Horses Are Destroyed In Arlington Park Fire

CHICAGO, May 2, (AP)—Fire today swept through a stable at the Arlington Park race track in Chicago and destroyed 22 horses belonging to the Maine Chance Farm owned by Mrs. Elizabeth Graham.

Six horses of the Maine Chance stable are Louisville, Ky. for Saturday's running of the Kentucky Derby. Seven other horses belonging to Mrs. Graham were saved from the fire included the three-year-old filly Beau Gay named last year as the champion two-year-old of the nation. Another horse saved was War Date who won three stake races in the Chicago area last summer. Others led to safety were Night Life, Jean Miracle and Harvey's Pal, Esteemed One and Blue Fantasy. The latter, a two-year-old hal-

lister of Beau Gay was badly burned.

In addition to the loss of the 22 race horses, two stable ponies died in the flames.

Assistant trainer Joe Luddy said the Maine Chance barn at Arlington Park was a mass of flames when he awakened. He said that several of the stable hands escaped from the fire in their night clothes but immediately began to lead the horses from the blazing barn. Luddy said some of the horses broke loose and ran back into the flames.

A spokesman at the Arlington Park track estimated that the 22 horses that died in the fire were worth about \$500,000. There were no other horses stabled in the vicinity of Mrs. Graham's barn for Arlington Park is not in operation at the present time.

Virtual Ultimatum Delivered Threatening Uprising If Jews Are Admitted

JERUSALEM, May 2 (AP)—An Arab official announced that the powerful Arab high committee today delivered to Britain a letter which he says is the next thing to an ultimatum. The spokesman asserts that the note rejects the Anglo-American recommendations on Palestine.

He declares that the Arabs now will prepare all means for defense in order to resist what he calls the national struggle. The spokesman is Ahmed Shukairy, director of the Arab office in Jerusalem. In effect, he said the letter to Britain threatens an Arab uprising similar to those of 1936 to 1939.

Earlier today Arab leaders announced plans for a mass resistance to the Anglo-British recommendation that 100,000 Jews be allowed to enter Palestine. A committee has been set up to consider a possible Arab disobedience strike.

The Arab committee also named an emergency committee to study plans for a possible Arab uprising similar to those of 1936 to 1939.

A second resolution said there might be some definite action on this in the next 48 hours. He said he did not know who would take the initiative in bringing the Palestine dispute before the council. But he indicated it might come either from one of the Arab states in the United Nations or from some member of the Security Council.

That is why there is not likely to be built in Sanford soon the swimming pool for which money has already been provided, or any similar projects, much to the dissatisfaction of the people. In Daytona the other night the City Commission rejected bids of \$214,025 for a new athletic stadium. They had planned to spend about \$125,000.

Further indicating its determination to hold the line against inflation, the OPA announces a price increase on General Motors automobiles, ranging from \$16 to \$90 in order to compensate for recent wage increases, something which President Truman and others said wouldn't be necessary. Some day the public is going to learn that wage increases which produce price increases benefit no one.

If you want to know why no system of dictatorship, whether fascist or communist, will ever work in this country, just go out to the ball park, almost any night, but particularly when Sanford is playing Orlando. There is a man in the stands who doesn't think he could play a water game than any man on the field, and certainly he could do a better job of umpiring. And when it is more, he doesn't mind saying so. Yet, he takes the seat and stooches him, but you could never get him to "Hell, Umpire!"

Crumbs Of Bread

We wonder if the United States is doing all that it can and should do to help prevent starvation throughout the world. We are, of course, being asked to contribute the crumbs from our table, a slice of bread, a can of peas so poorly canned that we do not care to eat it ourselves, a few dollars in coin of the realm which of course no one can eat; but there is no reason whatever to believe that any or all of this program will save a single person from starvation.

In almost every country in Europe, throughout virtually all of the Middle East, in India, in China, in Japan, in the Philippines, millions of people are famished, trying vainly to live on food which is leaving them so emaciated that they are falling victims to disease, and so depressed that their minds and personalities are becoming warped and bitter.

This is not a problem of the next few months only or one which will not appear again next winter and the year after that. Secretary Anderson of the Department of Agriculture reports that it will take five years for the food situation in Europe to get back to normal, that even in this country food shortages will continue well into 1948 and that even greater food sacrifices must be demanded of the people of the United States if mass starvation is to be prevented throughout the world.

Yet with all this evidence before us, what is being done about it? Secretary Patterson reveals that a special investigating committee found late last year that "forced issues" of unneeded commodities such as sugar and flour in regional depots was so great that at one Army post 14 solid carloads, or 16,800 cases, of rancid butter resulted at a time when the civilian population was doing without, at another a half million pounds of flour deteriorated so badly it became infested with weevils.

While the coal strike is allowed to drag itself along into its second month, factories for supplying farmers with agricultural implements are forced to close for lack of fuel. At a time when everyone should be working as hard as he can to help make and distribute the necessities of life throughout the world, factories close because of limited profits, workmen strike over a difference of a cent or two an hour in a wage controversy, farmers hold their wheat in silos awaiting a higher price.

Americans with money burning holes in their pockets are pleading with contractors to get going while they wander aimlessly from one lumber yard to another looking for supplies. Housewives scan grocery shelves in vain for standard brands, spend their mornings going from one store to another looking for a bottle of white Karo for the baby, or a box of Chips.

America could clothe and feed the world if everyone would go to work, and at a profit to itself. America could truly provide "the more abundant life" for all, just as it was during the war the "Arsenal of Democracy," but for the time being it seems to have gone mad on accumulating money and having nothing for which to spend it.

We are still trying to solve our problems by "share the work" methods, by plowing under every third row, when what we need now is "full steam ahead."

"Russian Roulette"

Have you ever seen a game of "Russian Roulette" in a wild west movie? It works like this: You leave one bullet in a pistol, spin the cylinder, then fire at your head. If no bullet comes out, you have "won" the game. But luck was not with an 18-year-old high school student in Oklahoma City when he played the game Tuesday night. The youth, Robert Bruce Jewett, died of a gunshot wound after he sent a bullet into his temple while showing a girl friend how to play "Russian Roulette."

According to a detective, the girl—13-year-old Sue Paden—said the boy was showing her how to use a revolver he had with him. He unloaded it and put all but one bullet in his pocket.

The detective quotes the girl as saying Jewett put one bullet back into the pistol, spun the cylinder, pointed the gun across the room and pulled the trigger. Nothing happened. He then repeated the trick. This time, he put it up to his head and pulled the trigger.

The gun went off.

WHAT A PITY and a comment on us-the-people it is that the lowest form of journalism should be the most successful in getting itself attended! Employed in extra measure when political campaigns are on, it exists all the time—this business of writing what purports to be news but is so selective and slanted that it makes points for or against this or that person or side. Drew Pearson, Walter Winchell, The Chicago Tribune, The Chicago Sun, Time Magazine, go in for it with great success and so do many lesser writers and newspapers, but it is low, nevertheless. It is one thing, and a fine one, to take a stand, but it is another and very different one to pretend to be telling the news but really to be prostituting the news. A man like Westbrook Pegler takes sides even more violently than Winchell and Pearson do, true, and may be as often wrong, but the difference is that Pegler doesn't pretend to be reporting. He is frankly telling you what he thinks about the news. Similarly, on the left, a magazine like the New Republic takes sides in every line, but it is openly a magazine of opinion. Everybody understands that when reading it. There is no pretense of objectively factual reporting. —John Tappie Graves

Tough Beard And Wife Always Lead To Heated Razors

By CATHERINE PARKER AP Newsfeatures ROCHESTER, N. Y. — Now it's a hot safety razor which the inventor claims will melt the whiskers and scrape the cheek clean with a blade heated to a 140-degree temperature. M. M. Gravin, a man with a tough beard, produced the new razor after three years of experimentation.

The first electrically heated model had a handle made of a sawed-off broomstick drilled and wired, but the latest is shock-proof and waterproof, and has an air-cooling system all its own. The principle is "very simple," Gravin declares. "When the razor heats to 140 degrees the molecules at the cutting edge of the blade are set into vibration and that makes the blade cut sharper and smoother," he says. "The action of the heat in the blade heats abrasions, and soothes the skin. No hot towels, no hot water, no fuss."

Wife Suggested It. Responsible for the invention goes to his wife and the barber who refused to shave the Gravin with a second time. "My wife said a hot razor couldn't be invented," he explains. "That burned me up. I made up my mind to lick the problem."

The barbers refused his patronage, he says, because "my beard was so tough it would actually dull the razor edge."

Forced to do the job himself, Gravin found a blade dipped in hot water made the task easier. He decided a razor which would remain hot throughout the shaving time would be even better, and he set about designing one.

Gravin patented his invention about two years ago, but the wartime steel shortage prevented production.

Now, with orders piled up for 300,000 razors, a Newark, N. J. plant (Cords, Ltd.) is beginning work on manufacture, planning to turn out 2,000 razors a day. Gravin plans eventually to build his own plant at Rochester.

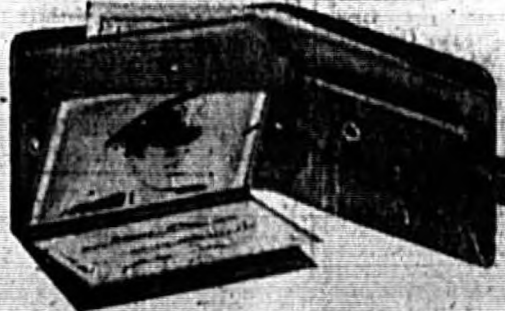

CLEVELAND, Apr. 30. (AP)—Who'll win the 1946 National Open and what will the running score be?

Genial Mal McLaren, greenkeeper at Canterbury Golf Club, where the chopping will take place June 12, 14 and 15, doesn't guess the answer to either question, but will make you bet this way:

"You pick three fellows out of the field, I'll take the rest of them."

Although he won't go out on a limb, Mal says the most popular figure is 284, four under par and a matter of four 7s for the 72 holes. The guessing ranges all the way from 275 up to 286.

When Sarazen Beat Little
In the 1946 open at Canterbury Lawson Little and Gene Sarazen wound up in a 287 deadlock, with Little shooting a 70 and Sarazen a 73 in the playoff.

Par is too weak at Canterbury. This 7,000-yard course, over hill and dale, "narrow" in many spots, well guarded by nature and golf architects, has no individual holes taken apart or set on fire—not even by Byron Nelson, Ben Hogan, Sammy Snead or anyone else.

Only 32 sub-par rounds were recorded in the 1946 Open. There were only 23 par rounds with 201 rounds over par. On individual holes the contestants went over par 2,557 times. Par was hit on 4,623 occasions, with 783 birdies and 18 eagles.

The shortest hole is 170 yards and the longest, the gargantuan No. 16, is pegged as 615 yards. McLaren says no changes—

making it difficult to get a good lie for those important booming shots. In a stiff headwind, this contestants.

No. 17 is the 230-yard par three on which Walter Hagen whacked a No. 1 iron to the pin for a birdie that broke Olin Dutra's heart in the 1932 Western. The plateau green slopes away sharply on both sides and at the front. Any straying in the tee shot will practically guarantee a 4 or more.

The home hole, 441 yards, is uphill all the way, within an out-of-bounds on the right and a big cherry tree and trap about 150 yards from the green on the left. 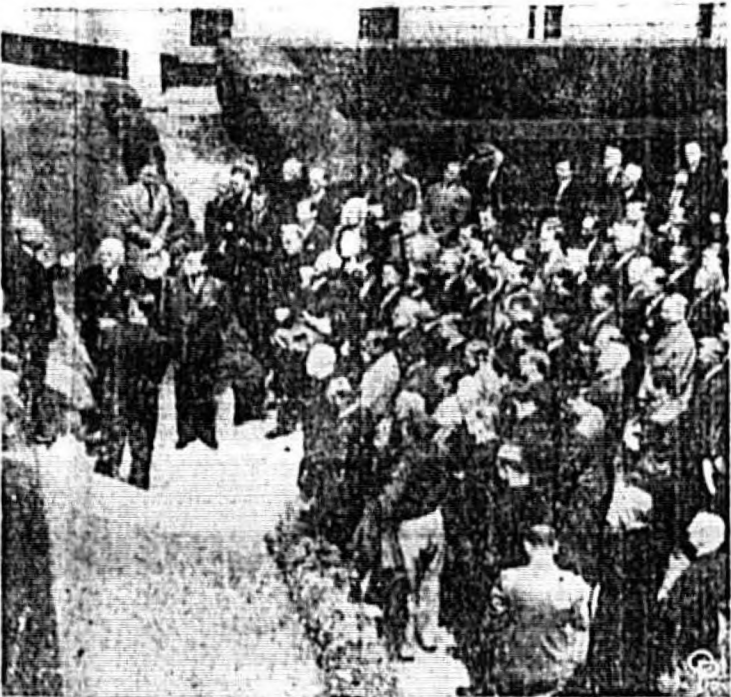
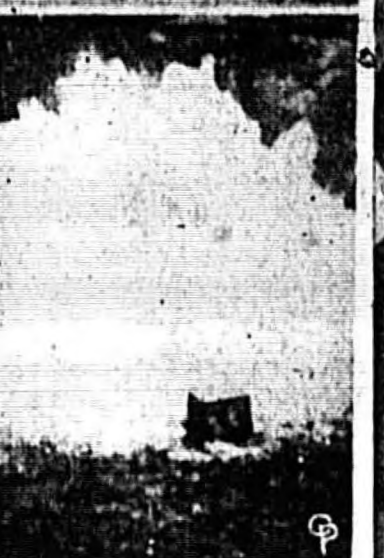

Lleras Camargo Insures Honest Colombian Poll

BOGOTA — Youthful President Alberto Lleras Camargo has planted a new concept of partisan politics in Colombia by making the national administration strictly neutral in the current presidential campaign.

In Colombia the traditional strife between the Liberal and Conservative parties makes the Hatfield-McCoy feud a lovers' quarrel by comparison. Hence, the presidential affirmation of neutrality ranks as one of the most important developments in the country's political history.

In his determination to divorce government from politics, the president decreed that no government official or employee may participate in the presidential campaign. One of the first to discover the president's sincerity was his brother, Felipe, fired from a government job for mixing in politics.

Scores Moral Victory
Although long identified with the Liberals, Lleras Camargo holds the conviction that the national administration represents the entire nation rather than the political party in power. He has given guarantees that the government would use all its powers to ensure honest elections May 5. He warned his own party as well as the opposition that fraud and violence in elections endanger democracy's survival and that no one elected under those conditions would be able to govern Colombia during the next four years.

Few Colombian presidents have enjoyed as widespread support as has President Lleras Camargo. His removal of the government from the current campaign has raised his stature to the extent that he would be a sure winner if he were eligible to run for election this year.

New In Line for 1950
Under Colombian law a president may not occupy the office for consecutive terms. Lleras Camargo thus remains the Liberals' logical candidate in 1950.

At 33 Lleras Camargo is the youngest chief executive in the nation's history. He stepped into the presidency from the office of foreign minister, following the resignation of President Alfonso Lopez last August.

For many years Lleras Camargo fought his political battles from an editor's chair. He was director of the Bogota daily, El Liberal. At the Chapultepec conference he won international attention as head of the Colombian delegation.

German Gold Is Untouched In World Bank

 BASLE, Switzerland — A large sum of German money which the Allies have so far been unable to touch is on deposit in the Bank of International Settlements in Basle.

The bank's general secretary, Raffaele Pilotti, refuses to say how much German gold and assets the bank now holds and Allied diplomats said they haven't yet been able to find out.

However, figures published in the bank's annual report indicate that it has as a very minimum \$50,000,000 belonging to Germany and probably considerably more in accounts which the report does not specify according to countries.

The bank holds a special, though somewhat precarious international position, under the 1930 Hague agreement which set it up to facilitate World War I reparations payments. It is immune from freezing regulations and outside officials interpret its charter as exempting it from being liable to confiscation of funds for reparations in the new peace settlement.

Japan was an active member of the bank, The First National Bank of New York City is the American member.

Allied diplomats say the bank will have to be dissolved eventually because its functions are in a large part duplicated by the new Bretton Woods fund. They predict a tough international wrangle when liquidation begins.

At the last counting, the bank's gold holdings alone were about \$31,700,000.

Its president, during the war, was Thomas H. McKittrick, an American, but the most influential of its directors was Walter Funk, Nazi finance minister on trial at Nuremberg. Funk was able to vote the shares of Austria, Danzig and other occupied lands. Apparently these shares, as well as the accounts of Latvia, Lithuania and Estonia have been sitting untouched. Russia was not a member, and it remains to be seen whether the Soviet Union will claim the assets of the Baltic States.

Finland Looks Better Today Than She Did After Treaty With Soviet

 HELSINKI, Finland today looks better than it did a year ago when the armistice with Russia was only a few months old. Shop windows then bearded up now gleam with glass. Empty shelves are not so numerous in the capital's biggest department store, Stockmanns, though the merchandise is largely wooden products.

Travelers from Stockholm still must cross the icy Gulf of Bothnia to Turku by boat, because the Russian control commission will not allow airline traffic between the Swedish and Finnish capitals.

But Turku-to-Helsinki trains run on schedule and travel time has been cut from eight to six hours since I last made the trip in March, 1945. Only one train goes each way daily, but it has a diner, a luxury in Finland. Only people of means can afford travel, and their attitude toward Russia is unchanged—distant and fearful. But they are also stubborn. They still feel they can have their comfortable capitalism again.

A Finnish inventor was returning from a business trip to Sweden. He had invented a seamless paper box that could be molded into almost any shape. He preferred to produce it outside his native land rather than where its advantages might benefit the Soviet Union.

There is almost no industry in Finland. Politically the nation is guided by acting President Juho K. Paasikivi, wartime advocate of peace with Russia. "We must keep the confidence of our great neighbor to the east," though a product of conservatism and former bar president, he accepts the idea that Finland is a small nation in the Russian sphere of influence.

This will be Finland's most difficult year with respect to reparations. In eight years she must pay the Soviet \$300,000,000 in goods. In addition she must restore to 1946 restitution deliveries, all goods Finnish troops took from Russian areas they occupied during the war. This means Finland must deliver goods valued at over \$50,000,000 this year—and so far,

Kurds Still Cocky And Vigorous After 4,000 Troubled Years In World

By CLARKE BEACH
 WASHINGTON — The Kurds still cocky and vigorous after 4,000 troubled years on one of the stormiest crossroads of the world, have proclaimed an independent Kurdish state in northern Iraq where Russian occupation forces have caused international controversy.

Warlike and virile nomads, the Kurds ever since the dawn of history have been resisting conquerors or building up empires themselves.

They are the real aristocracy of the human race, with pure Aryan blood (in the scientific not the Nazi sense) in their veins and with names that are older than Babylon. Among their ancestors were some of the greatest men of the ancient world. Their family portraits are carved in rock on high mountain cliffs southwest of the Caspian Sea, where they have held their landed estates for thousands of years.

Cover a Wide Area
 The general area they inhabit is called Kurdistan. The name also is applied specifically to provinces in northern Iran and easternmost Turkey. They are scattered through the Zagros mountains, south of Mount Ararat, where the Bible says Noah's ark came to rest, and their home land extends through the border regions of Turkey, Iran and Iraq. About 125,000 of them are mixed among the Armenians on Russia's southern border.

Kurdish population estimates range from 1,500,000 to 1,500,000. It is generally agreed that about half the Kurds live in Turkey. Some authorities say there are less than 1,000,000 in Iran and possibly about 500,000 in Iraq.

Living in tents of black goat's hair, most of them migrate with their flock of goats and fat-tailed sheep to high mountains in the summer and the valleys in winter. Those who have settled in villages live in one or two-room houses built of sun-dried mud brick or rough stones set in mud plaster. They raise wheat, barley, rice, tobacco, cotton, grapes and various fruits.

Warlike Traits Prevail
 The Kurds are continually warring among themselves, raiding their neighbors or robbing caravans and trucks. Christian and perpetually feuding, they have seldom been united for any prolonged time. They once formed a brief union under Shah-Arman, Kurdish king of the Armenians; and she is up to schedule.

Inflation threatens because of their resistance, which has led all but the poorest Kurds to the black market, but the potato crop has been good and there is enough wheat.

Building Tile Gets Shot When Production Slows

 NEW YORK — A good job for a craftsman was to be made when the shooting tile that is, if he gets a shot nowadays, whatever production threatens to slow.

Famed St. Paul's Cathedral, luckily unharmed by Nazi missiles, is surrounded by many ruins, the result of enemy attacks carried out early in the war.

Hope For Settling Pending Peace Treaties Fading Rapidly At Paris

United States, Britain, France And Soviet Union Deadlocked Over Numerous Vital Issues At Conference Of Ministers

PARIS, May 3 (AP)—The foreign ministers of Britain, France, Russia and the United States are at loggerhead over so many issues that hope for settling any of the pending European peace treaties is fading rapidly. The only hope of a provision that might avert a collapse on some unexpected occasions from Russia.

The United States, also, is standing pat on various important points. A request for a revision of present-day armistice terms from Secretary of State James Byrnes has been interpreted as indicating a continued deadlock over treaty terms.

Byrnes is asking for armistice provisions that might insure greater stability abroad, but some of these have bumped into solid opposition from Great Britain.

Russia has taken an equally firm stand against the American plan for a four-power mutual assistance pact to keep Germany from re-arming for at least 25 years.

Informal discussions were reported yesterday—in the hope of clearing the atmosphere. The results have been termed no more decisive than the formal sessions. Russia is continuing to demand reparations from Italy.

In fact of an American plea to take Italian ability to pay into consideration first.

McAniff, today's agenda was topped by a proposal to revise the Italian-Yugoslav border. The Italian premier—Alcide De Gasperi—arrived in Paris and was expected to appear before the ministers. Yugoslavians had two deputy prime ministers and a foreign minister ready to state that nation's case.

In spite of the difficulties being encountered—however brilliant, American and French delegates are clinging to a faint hope that the conference itself may be saved from breaking up as a failure.

Demonstration Marks Opening Of Arab Strike

Three Thousand Hurl Stones At British Troops Defending Gates To Jerusalem

JERUSALEM, May 3. (AP)—British troops armed with tanks and armored cars have gone into action in the flare-up of Arab violence in Palestine. The Arabs, who began a general strike in protest against Jewish immigration, battled the Tommies for two hours. They rioted and hurled stones until they were finally quelled by six armored cars, two tanks and ten troop carriers.

JERUSALEM, May 3. (AP)—A demonstration by 3,000 Arabs in Jerusalem has marked the opening of a general Arab strike throughout Palestine. The 3,000 Arabs hurled stones at British troops in a demonstration at the historic Damascus gate. The British troops, about 100 strong, stood ready with many guns to prevent the Arabs from entering the old city of Jerusalem through the gate.

The Arab demonstration began in front of the Mosque El-Aksa. The Arabs, who are being led by a general address by the trustees for the Arab higher committee, Jamal Fatah, and Husseini. He strenuously criticized the recommendations that 100,000 more Jews be admitted to Palestine.

The general strike in all Palestine was called by the Arab higher committee.

The committee said Arabs will proceed to organize national forces and prepare an appeal for defense in order to resume the operations of the state.

British Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin is said to be inquiring about how much help the United States will give Britain in administering the Palestine mandate. However, the United States is supposed to be feeling that responsibility in the matter should be assumed by the United Nations.

In New York, a spokesman for one delegation to the UN Security Council said the matter might easily be presented to the council on grounds that the Palestine situation threatens peace in the Middle East.
