

Answers Given To Main Selective Service Questions

WASHINGTON, Apr. 23. (W. P. A.)—The main questions asked by the public concerning the selective service law are being answered by the War Relocation Authority.

Nearly all local boards deferred all married men before the war, but now a great many of the boards are deferring only those who have dependents.

Before June 15 probably will be a general practice not to defer married men if there are no children and if the wife is or can be self-supporting.

Who are dependents?

They may be a wife, divorced wife, child, parent, grandparent, brother, sister, a physically or mentally handicapped person or some person under 18 who is depending on the registrant's earnings for support.

An unborn, adopted or illegitimate child is a dependent.

The healthy son, daughter, brother or sister over 18 can be claimed as a dependent.

Can the registration claim be deferred if the dependent was acquired after registration?

Only if he proves he did not undertake the support of the dependent so that he could avoid military service. General Hersey, director of selective service, has advised: "Those who seek to avoid duty with the armed forces by marriages of convenience will get little sympathy from the selective service system."

Is it likely that men with dependents will be inducted later?

A bill is pending in congress which would provide limited compensation for dependents of inducted men; men who did not contribute toward the support of dependents more than Congress allowed them would not be deferred.

Are all persons working in a war industry deferred?

No. Only those employed in a "critical occupation" or a job which can be filled only by a man with special training and skill. Nor can all men holding "critical occupations" be deferred—only those who cannot be replaced without a serious loss of effectiveness in the plant. There must be a shortage of such men.

Selective service urges increased employment of women, older men and young men who are not physically 100 percent fit.

Should war industries refuse to hire men who are liable for induction?

No. Selective service officials urge that there be no discrimination against prospective inductees in the matter of hiring. It is not unlawful hiring them to fill critical positions unless they have special skills which either are essential to the war effort or are in short supply.

Are any deferments permanent?

Only those expressly stipulated in the selective service act. Occupational or dependency deferments are on a six-month basis. The reason for deferment cannot be changed. The board may renew the deferment for six-month periods.

Who is expressly deferred under the act?

Ministers and theological students and certain officials, including government and labor ministers, include Christian Science preachers, Salvation Army commissioned officers, lay brothers of the Catholic church, a Jewish rabbi who is the spiritual leader of his congregation, commissioned officers in the Volunteers of America, Lutheran Christian devotional teachers and certain officials of the Mormon church.

May anyone engaged in civilian work be deferred on occupational grounds?

Yes, if he is a necessary man to work essential to continuance of civilian activities which support the war effort. These include some activities which provide food, clothing, shelter, safety and other necessities of daily life.

Are farmers deferred?

Yes, on the same basis as other industries which support the war effort. Local boards are advised to consult the county war committee which act in cooperation with the agricultural department, which information on deferments is of great importance to the war effort.

What are the deferred rates?

Deferred service has remained at 10 percent since the war effort began. It is the duty of the board to insure that the number of deferred men does not exceed 10 percent of the total number of registrants.

The directors, meeting at West Palm Beach throughout the afternoon, learned that both Cocoa and Fort Lauderdale might raise enough money to keep going.

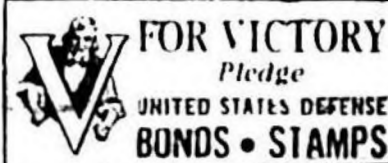

NAVY GETS SANFORD AIRPORT

Five Million Will Be Spent By Navy; Between 1,200 And 1,500 Cadets, 150 Officers To Be Stationed At Base

"It Is Biggest Thing That Has Happened To Sanford", City Officials Declare

"It's the biggest thing that ever happened to Sanford", is the consensus of city officials this morning concerning the designation of the new Municipal Airport by the United States Navy as a Naval training base.

It has been announced that \$5,000,000 will be spent here by the Navy and possibly a greater expenditure later. This figure that does not include the payroll at the base, in which Mayor W. C. Hill has estimated that between 1,200 and 1,500 enlisted cadets will be stationed here with an officer corps of 150, plus a large number of civilian workers.

The City Commission, presided over by Mayor W. C. Hill, and the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce and Secretary Edward Higgins, and Yolie A. Williams, chairman of the aviation committee of that organization, have been busy this morning in trying to "sell" the field to the Navy and all were jubilant upon hearing of the Navy's acceptance of the base.

Official statements have not been released concerning the number of men to be sent here, and the size of the payroll at the base is not known, but Sanford merchants are preparing for "boom" business here.

"This will make Sanford", one merchant stated. "There are bound to be many men at the base, and a large payroll. I look for greater prosperity than ever before for Sanford business men." Similar statements could be heard throughout the city this morning.

City Will Receive Priority Rating, All Merchants And Tradesmen To Get Benefits

A personnel of between 1,200 and 1,500 enlisted men and 150 officers will be located at the Sanford airport which has been taken over as a training station by the Navy, Mayor W. C. Hill declared this morning. It is expected also that a large group of civilian workers will be used at the base.

"Many of these men will have wives and families," the Mayor added, "and of course, all will have a definite and regular income, and the family men will require houses and apartments. This should benefit practically every landlord, grocer, clothing, dry cleaner, druggist, farmer, in fact, every business and profession in this community. It should give everyone an additional market for his wares. All tradesmen, such as carpenters, plumbers, electricians, painters, etc., should benefit from work on this project."

The great expenditure the Navy will make here is a very substantial return on our investment of \$5,000,000, and the huge amount of \$5,000,000 cannot be expended here without practically every business and every individual benefiting either directly or indirectly from it.

"The Air Base" will bring Sanford to life materially, but the best purpose it can render, is to train men to emulate the gallant example of the defenders of Bataan, peninsular, where American men and boys fought and died for the people of America, and all other peace-loving people of the world who are being oppressed or threatened by ruthless dictators. Two of the first and most important things which they need are training for, are planes and trained fighters," the mayor concluded.

Males Between 45 And 65 Will Register Monday

2,000 Are Expected To Sign At Schools In Seminole County

About 2,000 of an estimated 219,000 male residents in the state between the ages of 45 and 65 will register Monday at various schools throughout Seminole county, F. H. Carter, clerk of the local Draft Board, announced today.

Registration will occur at all schools between 7:00 A.M. and 9:00 P.M. with teachers acting as registrars. School children will have a holiday. The purpose of the registration of the older group is to obtain the classification of all males as to their skills and aptitudes for war production work, which is said to be urgently needed in order to compile a comprehensive inventory of the nation's manpower for vital production work.

Mr. Higgins said that it is "very gratifying to find that the efforts of the Chamber of Commerce, with the co-operation of the city, extending over a period of 18 months, has been rewarded by having the Municipal Air Base selected by the Navy for development. Mr. Higgins stated this is just the beginning—that there will be a lot of work for the people of Sanford to do. The matter of housing will be presented to the Licensing Authority with the request for Sanford to be placed in a defense area. There is sewerage to be extended, water to be supplied and roads to be built. The details will require the same persistent follow-up that was necessary to develop the airport project."

Trade Users Can Fill Out Ration Applications Now

Trade users, consisting of retailers, wholesalers, institutions and restaurants, who all users of sugar outside of homes who will register at the armory on Apr. 23-29 for purchasing certificates to buy sugar, may write or telephone A. B. Peterson, secretary of the Rationing Board, for necessary registration blanks, which may be filled out and returned in advance of the registration in order to expedite the process, it was announced yesterday.

Japanese Are But 100 Miles From Mandalay

The Japanese are within 100 miles of the important Burma city of Mandalay in the deepest penetration of any of the three major northward thrusts of the Japanese. A British communiqué said new attacks are developing in the Tangmyi area, and the Burmese tactics, proved here with plane-supported tanks and hard-driving fresh infantry, have forced the Chinese to fall back from Loday on the west side of the Burma defense line while the British withdrew from Tangmyi on the east.

U. S. Plane Lands In Russia After Raid, Crew Interned

The Associated Press—Russia today announced a United States bomber which was shot down last Saturday in the last few days of heavy fighting. The Germans claimed a number of successful advances on the front, while reports reached London that considerable Finnish reinforcements have moved south to bolster the sagging Nazi divisions in the Kholm sector.

Field To Be Used As Training Base By U. S. Pilots

Sanford's new airport will be taken over by the United States Navy for use as a Naval Operational Training Base, Representative Joe Hendricks informed the Sanford Herald last night, following Secretary of the Navy Knox's approval of the project, and an expenditure of \$5,000,000 on the base is contemplated to begin with.

At present, two runways, 4,000 feet in length and 100 feet wide, are being surfaced on the original WPA contract, and it has been reported that the runways will be increased to 6,000 feet long and 300 feet wide, and two additional 6,000 feet runways will be built. Hangars will be built for the Naval pilots who will train here; hangars will be constructed to house the large bombers and lighter planes and a fence will surround the site which now consists of 500 acres.

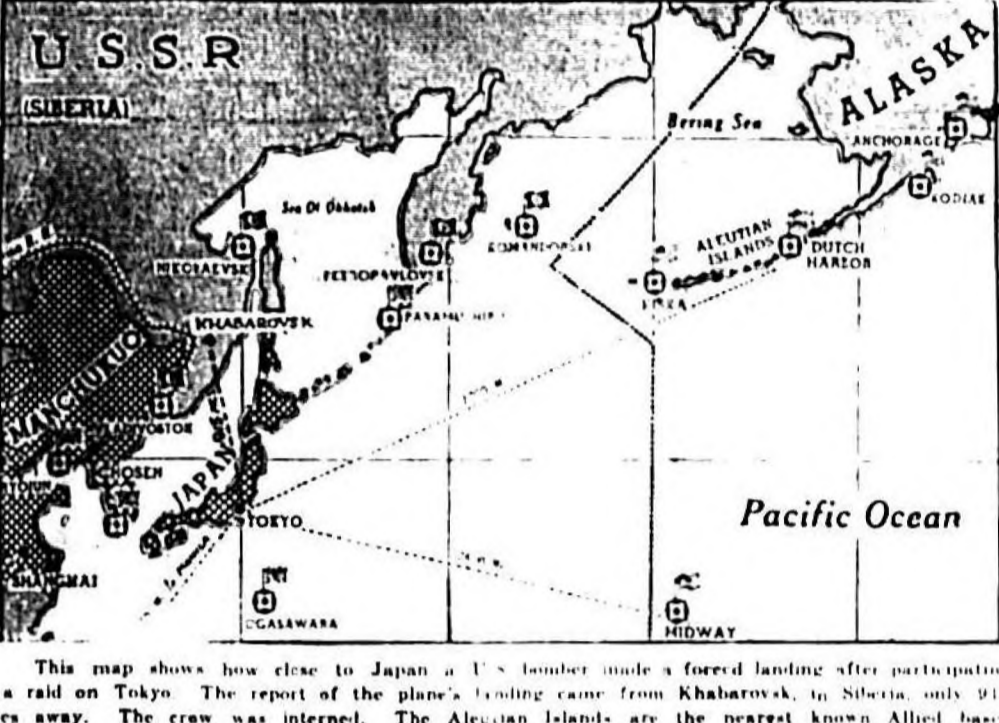
