An unborn, adopted or illegiti-

mate child is rated a dependent.

No healthy son, daughter, brother

or sister over 18 can be claim-

ed as a dependent.

Can the registration claim de-

ferred if the dependent was ac-

quired after registration?

Only if he proves he did not

make the support of the de-

pendent so the board could avoid

mandatory service. General Hershey,

head of selective service, has

warned: "Those who seek to avoid

duty with the armed forces by

marriages of convenience will get

little sympathy from the selec-

tive service system."

Is it likely that men with de-

pendents will be inducted later?

A bill is pending in congress

which would provide limited com-

missions for dependents of in-

duced men; men who did not con-

tribute toward the support of de-

pendents more than Congress al-

lotted them would not be de-

ferred.

Are all persons working in a

war industry deferred?

No. Only those employed in a

critical occupation at a job which

cannot fill only by persons with

special training and skill. Nor

are all men holding "critical oc-

cupations" deferred — only those

who cannot be replaced without

a serious loss of effec-

tiveness in the plant. There must

be a shortage of such men.

Selective service urges increased

employment of women, older

men and young men who are not

physically 100 percent perfect.

Should war industries refuse to

hire men who are liable for induc-

tion?

No. Selective service officials

urge that there be no discrimina-

tion against prospective inductees

in the matter of hiring; but it

reserves against hiring them to

fill certain positions until they

possess the skills which other

available workers do not possess.

Are any deferments permanent?

Only those expressly stipulated

in the selective service act. Oc-

casionally some deferments

are on a six-month basis.

Is the reason for deferment con-

tinuous, however, the board may

renew the deferment for six

more months?

Yes, if he is a necessary man

# NAVY GETS SANFORD AIRPORT

## Five Million Will Be Spent By Navy; Between 1,200 And 1,500 Cadets, 150 Officers To Be Stationed At Base

"It Is Biggest Thing That Has Happened To Sanford," City Officials Declare

City Will Receive Priority Rating, All Merchants And Tradesmen To Get Benefits

"It's the biggest thing that ever happened to Sanford," is the consensus of City officials this morning concerning the designation of the new Municipal Airport by the United States Navy as a Naval training base.

It has been announced that \$500,000 will be spent here by the Navy and possibly a greater expenditure later. This figure does not include the payroll at the base, in which Mayor W. G. Hill has estimated that between 1,200 and 1,500 enlisted cadets will be stationed, with an officers' corps of 150, plus a large number of civilian workers will be used at the base.

"Many of these men will have wives and families," the Mayor added, "and, of course, all will require beds and regular income, and the family men will require food and clothing. This should result practically every landlord, grocer, clothier, dry cleaner, druggist, farmer, in fact, every business and profession in this community. It should give everyone an additional market for the wares. All tradesmen, such as carpenters, plumbers, electricians, painters, etc., should benefit from work on this project."

The City Commission, presided over by Mayor W. C. Hill, and the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce and Secretary Edward Higgins, and Volle A. Williams, chairman of the aviation committee of that organization, have spent much time and effort in trying to "sell" the field to the Navy, and all were jubilant upon learning of the Navy's acceptance of the site.

Official statements have not been released concerning the number of men to be sent here, and the size of the payroll at the base is not known, but Sanford merchants are preparing for "busy" days.

### Males Between 45 And 65 Will Register Monday

#### 2,000 Are Expected To Sign At Schools In Seminole County

About 2,000 of an estimated 219,000 male residents in the state between the ages of 45 and 65 will register Monday at various schools throughout Seminole County. E. B. Carter, clerk of the local Draft Board, announced today.

Registration will occur at all schools between 7:00 A.M. and 9:00 P.M. with teachers acting as registrars. School children will be excused. The purpose of orientation, committed to the older group is to obtain the classification of all males as to their skills and aptitudes for war production work, which is said to be urgently needed in order to compile a comprehensive inventory of the nation's manpower for vital production work.

Mr. Carter emphasized that registrations may be made at the most convenient schools to individuals and that no one is to sign at the draft office. "We are prepared for the job, in fact, I expect that the registration will work out smoothly," Mr. Carter added.

The registration will include every male citizen and every male alien resident, other than persons exempted by the Selective Training and Service Act who had attained the 45th anniversary of his birth on or before Feb. 16, 1942, and has not attained the 65th anniversary of his birth on or before April 27, 1942.

Those men who register Monday will be pointed out as not liable for military service under the law. They will be given certificates of registration which they must have in their personal possession at all times and produce at the request of authorized persons. Later they will be required to fill out an occupational questionnaire, detailing their civilian qualifications and skills but that will be for the purpose of obtaining information only.

Registrants will be asked to answer questions asked by the registrar for notation on the registration card. It is important that the registrant describe his place of residence in detail and give full particulars as to the address at which he will be sure to receive mail or other communications.

Anyone unavoidably away from home tomorrow may register at the most convenient registration place, but all registrants are urged to make every effort to register with their own local boards to avoid possible confusion in the future.

### U. S. Plane Lands In Russia After Raid, Crew Interned

After four days of heavy fighting, the Germans claimed a number of successes advances in the southern front, with troops reaching London that considerable reinforcements have moved south to bolster the sagging Nazi division in the Kholm sector.

### Field To Be Used As Training Base By U. S. Pilots

Sanford's new airport will be taken over by the United States Navy for use as a Naval Operational Training Base, Representative Joe Hendricks informed The Sanford Herald last night, following Secretary of the Navy Knox's approval of the project, and an expenditure of \$1,000,000 on the base is contemplated to begin with.

There will be installations made at the huge site, located south off Gandy Avenue, and personnel will be stationed there, but details are considered military information and were not disclosed. The Army Air Base at Orlando started with less than \$1 million. This will give you an idea of the magnitude of the project," Mr. Hendricks declared.

At present, two runways, 4,000 feet in length and 100 feet wide, are being surfaced on the original WPA contract, and it has been reported that the runways will be increased to 6,000 feet long and 300 feet wide and two additional 6,000 feet runways will be built. Barracks will be built for the Naval pilots who will train here, hangars will be constructed to house the huge bombers and lighter planes, and a fence will surround

the site, which now consists of 800 acres. City Engineers Fred J. Williams stated this morning that the project is expected to be increased to 1,500 acres.

The Navy will be in charge of the work to be done at the field, including the construction of the base, but the 4,000 feet stretches now facing completion by the Hubbard Construction Company of Orlando. It is expected the Navy will accept bids on this work and will let out the construction.

The Hubbard company is expected to finish laying the limestone base and the asphalt runways in about six weeks. Then

the 1,500 feet of 100' each of asphalt will be laid with the idea that an increase in the width would be desired at a later date, and the base of the stretch would be widened to an additional 200 feet, it is reported. The company also is paving the entrance road and taxi strips.

Mayor W. C. Hill today revealed that the airport represents an investment by the City of \$200,000 up to April 1, for the purchase of the 800 acres. The improvements have been made to the site as a heating, draining and cooling through a WPA grant.

Mayor Hill added that the field will be given to the Navy by the city for the sum of \$1. The Navy is to keep the site for the duration of the war or longer as they use it, then it is to be deeded back to the City for the same financial consideration.

Should additional land be required in the future, the city will make the annual payment to the Navy for its use.

\$60,000 to begin "WIDE." There will be no actual combat details but it cannot disclose military information. The Army Air Base at Orlando started with less than \$1,000,000. This will give you an idea of the magnitude of the project."

Airports in five other Florida cities also were designated as training bases, along with the Sanford field. According to Mr. Hendricks, they are Daytona Beach, Melbourne, DeLand, Lake City and Vero Beach. In addition, location of centers at St. Augustine and Palatka is being considered, it was stated.

The designation of the local airport was made yesterday after the United States Senate accepted the House amendments and sent to the White House yesterday legislation authorizing \$800,000,000 new Naval shore facilities. Previously the Senate had voted a \$1,000,000,000 authorization.

The sum in this bill will be allocated approximately as follows, with authority vested in the Navy:
