## Route Of Christmas Parade Is Revealed By Marshall, Group

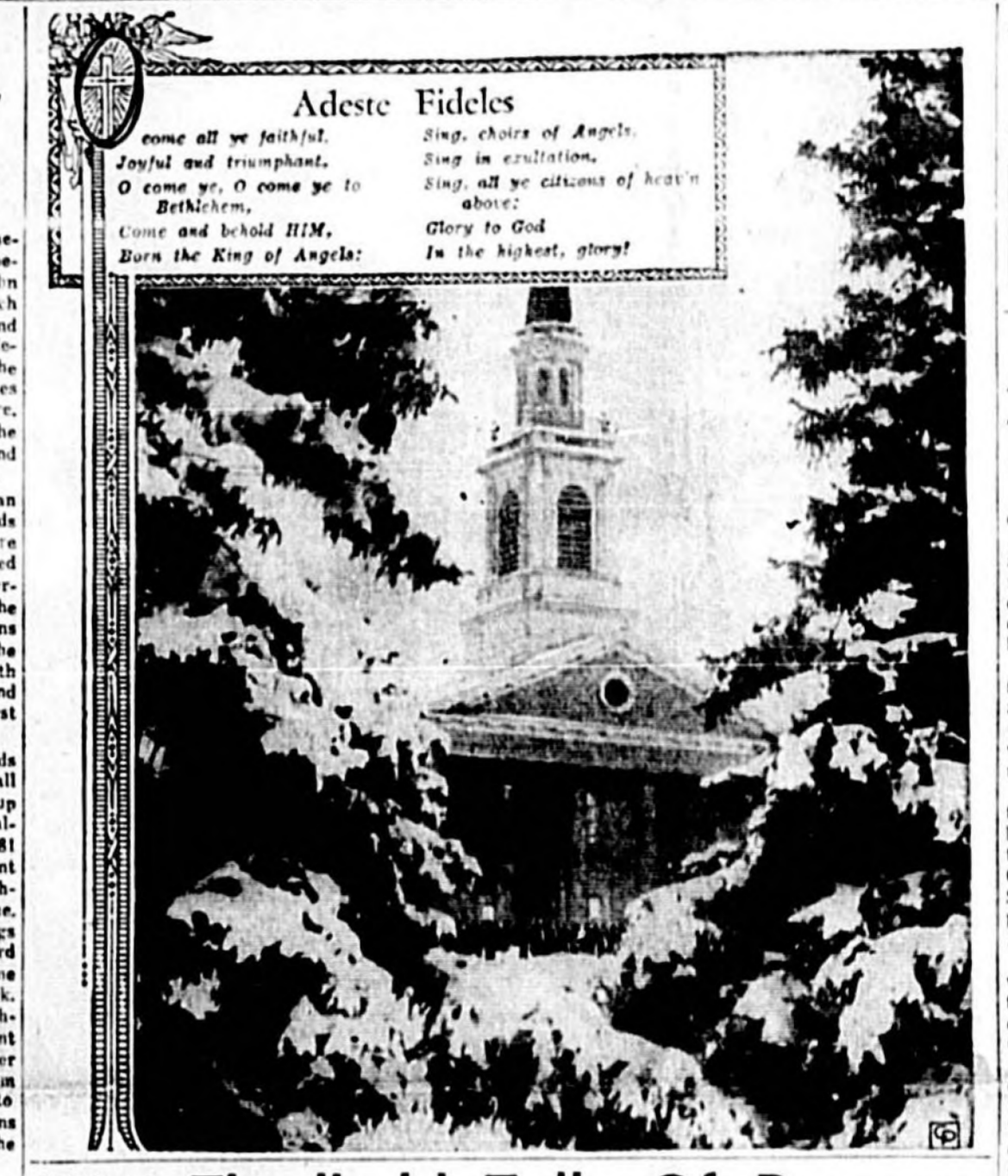
News of the 1955 Christmas parade was announced today by Parade Committee.

Parade said that since Santa Claus has sent word that he will arrive in Sanford at the appointed time, the parade will move off from First and Sanford streets at 11:30 next Wednesday afternoon.

The route of the parade will be as follows: Beginning at First and Sanford Ave., the parade will move west on First St. to Oak Ave. From there, he said, the line of march will be south along Oak St. to Fourth St., east on Fourth St. to Second St., and then north on Second St. to Second St. All bands will march west on Second St. to Magnolia Ave. and under consideration of Seminole High School Band Director Ernest Cowley there will be a band concert at First St. and Magnolia Ave. He said each band will move to play a carol or Christmas song and then be dismissed.

During the entire band concert, said Parole, First St. will be closed and the area between First St. and Second on Magnolia will be blocked off.

Parade Chairman Ed Hunt has opposed to all activities in the parade that will be held on First St. at the intersection of Magnolia Ave. He said that the three judges, the Christmas Parade Chairman, President of the Merchants Association, President of the Jaycees, the Mayor and the City Manager will all have seats on the platform.

## Miss Threlkeld Tells Of Progress

Pointing up the progress that education has made in the past 10 years, Miss Threlkeld, of the State Department of Education in Tallahassee, spoke before members of the Pilot Club at their dinner meeting held in the Yacht Club Tuesday night.

Miss Threlkeld praised the work that is being done in the Sanford Vocational School which comes under the Trade and Industrial Education Program. It is set up primarily, she said, to enable people to find jobs or to improve or advance in employment they are already in.

The latest innovation in the school training program, stated Miss Threlkeld, is the Cooperative Occupation Program wherein the student registers while still in a junior and is trained for the particular field he or she specifies. Then, when they reach the senior class, they are placed in offices for on-the-job training a few hours a day in order to fit them for the full time position upon graduation from high school.

"It takes a broad educational background," said Miss Threlkeld, "to fit a person into the atmosphere of the working world." She said that 85% of persons who are released from jobs are let go, not because of their inability to do the job but because they were unable to get along with people.

In closing Miss Threlkeld quoted, "Education is what we have left after we have forgotten everything we have learned."

### Names Are Not Released Officials 'Mum' On Replacement

Sheriff J. L. Hobbs of Seminole County, one of his deputies and two other men were arrested yesterday on federal warrants charging a moonshining conspiracy.

U. S. Atty. James L. Gullmarin said at Tampa, Hobbs is accused of taking protection money from Seminole County moonshiners operators and with being in the illicit liquor business.

Gov. Collins said he will suspend the sheriff.

Hobbs, M. and Deputy A. E. Evans, M. were arrested before U. S. Commissioner James R. Boyd and released on \$1000 bond each.

James Smith, M. a Lake Morton Negro, was released on \$2000 bond.

Jerry Martin, M. Sanford Negro was released when he was unable to post \$1000 bond.

It was reported two others, a former employee of the State Forestry Department and a Negro, also were being sought. Their names were not available.

Indictments returned at Tampa Tuesday contain more than a dozen specifications and named Leonard E. Long and Jeffrey Long, brothers, as bootleggers who the district attorney's office said will testify for the government.

The specification in the indictment is that on Jan. 15, 1953, Hobbs, M. and Evans, M. conspired to sell and distribute moonshine in Seminole County.

Another spec. Martin collected \$100 on Oct. 15, 1953 from Ross Stewart for the privilege of selling illegal whiskey for a week at the R. C. Beer garden in Seminole County.

The indictment also says Hobbs collected \$100 on Oct. 15, 1953 from the Longs for the privilege of operating a distillery for a month, collected \$100 from the Longs on Oct. 15, 1953 and \$100 on Jan. 15, 1954 for the privilege of operating a still.

It says Hobbs and Evans delivered the gallons of illegal whiskey from the county jail in Smith at the River Moon on Robertson just west of Sanford.

Martin is accused of selling five gallons of whiskey to Ross Stewart on Oct. 15, 1953 and collecting \$100 from Stewart.

My staff joins me in wishing all of you the joys and blessings of a happy Thanksgiving in the spirit of the First Thanksgiving Proclamation:

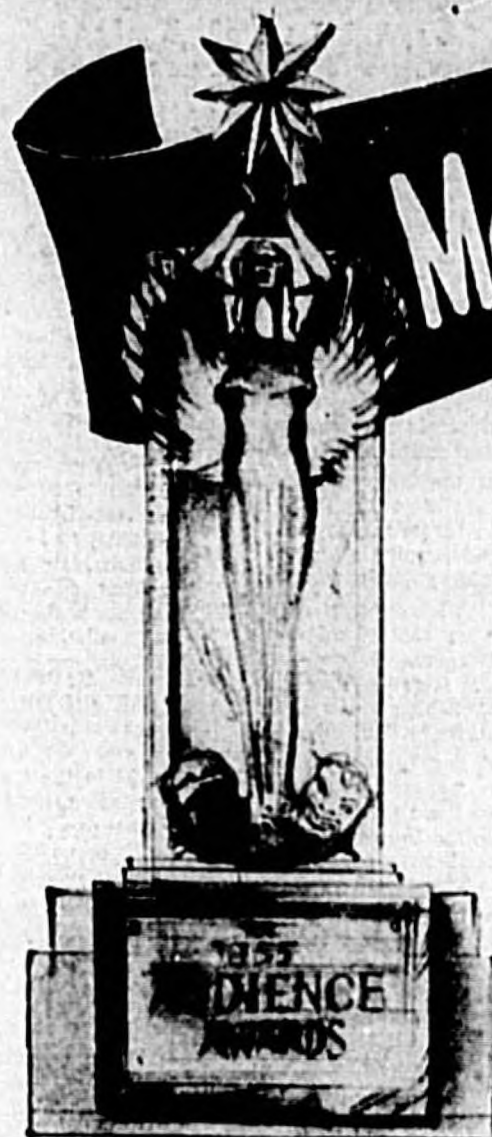
"Whereas, James Bradford, Governor of this group of people, do announce the season of prayer and thanksgiving to Almighty God.

# Meaning Of Thanksgiving Can Be Explained In Many Ways

The meaning of Thanksgiving can be explained many ways. We are thankful of all that is good about us, and for the memory of our forebears who left the spirit of Thanksgiving imbedded in the hearts and souls of mankind here in our broad land of the free. Thankful for a democracy, a government so endowed by our Constitution that the people who live under it can breathe, and speak, and write as true Americans.

However, the truer meaning of Thanksgiving is involved in the words of our religious leaders who give us the deeper explanations that speak of the words many of us overlook as we celebrate another national observance.

Rev. W. P. Brooks Jr., of the First Baptist Church in Sanford explains Thanksgiving this way:

"In the attitude of real thanksgiving at least three things are involved: our intellect—our emotions, and our will. Surely our intellect is involved. In the 103 Psalm we are exhorted, 'Not to forget all of His benefits.' Martin Luther is commenting upon that verse says that while we cannot remember them all—we are asked not to forget them all. We are told that the word think and the word thank come from the same root word—to be thankful is but to be thoughtful. Also our emotions are involved—we are stirred in our hearts as we consider God's goodness and mercy to us. 'Bless the Lord O my soul and all that is within me bless His holy name'—that is the attitude of our deep emotions. But true gratitude should involve our wills also. 'What shall I render unto the Lord for all of His benefits toward me?' We shall try to do something about it. We shall translate thanksgiving

into thanksgiving—and shall seek ever to have the attitude of being grateful to the degree that we seek ever to do the will of God."

Rev. Fred Ensminger, of the Little Brown Church on the Hill, (Congregational Christian), explains Thanksgiving this way:

On this serene and happy day Americans find themselves echoing the immortal words of Paul in Athens on Mars' Hill as recorded in Acts 17:24-25, 28 — "God that made the world and all things therein, seeing that He is Lord of heaven and earth, dwelleth not in temples made with hands; neither is worshipped with men's hands, although He needed anything, seeing that HE GIVETH TO ALL LIFE, AND BREATH, AND ALL THINGS;" "FOR IN HIM WE LIVE AND MOVE AND HAVE OUR BEING".

The outgoing life of God is one of His significant attributes. He is not self-contained, self-centered. HE GAVE, HE GIVES, continually, and to mere finite and failing creatures.

And what does He give us day by day and year by year? LIFE, existence, self-consciousness, the power to see, reflect, analyze, to any human life with its Source or to throw it away. He GIVES each soul His own very essence—the Divine life.

HE GIVES BREATH—the inhalations and exhalations of our lungs—Minute by minute, day and night as long as each lives. He gives opportunity. We breathe NOW.

HE GIVES ALL THINGS—essentials; he they comforts, benefits, blessings. All originate in Him.

They thanked God for the preservation of their lives but more they thanked Him for His own benevolent being and that they were His children, living the life he had meant for them and receiving LIFE and BREATH and ALL THINGS.

Thanksgiving Day is a day for solemn thought and prayer. We are thankful that there is a special day for us to "express ourselves" for the bountiful blessings of a great nation. But, better yet would be the daily expression of thanks for the blessings heaped upon us in America. The "Thanksgiving Day" theme should be extended throughout the year.

### Stevenson Says Americans Lucky

WASHINGTON (AP)—Adlai Stevenson, without saying so, put the finger on the No. 1 problem facing the Democrats in trying to persuade the voters to throw the Republicans out in 1956.

"America," he said in a speech Saturday night "is well and strong above all nations in all times. We are the luckiest people in the world and we know it."

It is the case, the voters might ask why should they take a chance on changing administration in next November's election? Stevenson's reasons seemed to add up to this: "We can do everything better."

He was very vague on how. That can't be held against him at this time. This was his first speech after announcing he wanted to be president. It was just a general outline of what he'll say later.

It was also pretty much the outline of what the Democratic party will be saying. There were no surprises. It was pretty much along the lines on which the Democrats already have indicated they will attack the Republicans.

It was just enough of an outline to show there are no fundamental differences between the two parties and that the differences which do

exist are matters of degree more than of kind.

Stevenson attacked the Eisenhower administration's farm program. On this subject he seems unusually keen and, if he has a solution, he has kept it to himself.

He was critical of the administration's foreign policy but did not indicate specifically what was wrong with it except to complain there was too much tough talk and backing away from it.

And—there was no surprise about this—he accused the Republicans of being the party of "special interests," meaning it was too cozy toward big business. This has been a steady complaint of the Democrats for generations.

Stevenson complained — or seemed to be complaining — that this country was not giving enough foreign aid to nations outside the Communist bloc.

It is hard to see how the Democrats could logically call for a ban on foreign aid if the gov-

### Too Late To Classify

 Art Lippert knew what he was talking about when he said "People are funny." Not only are they funny, they are pretty dumb.

While most citizens know the name of the boss who pays them, only a few of them know the names of the folks they pay.

A recent consumer research survey made in a large American city asked a few simple questions that one would assume any high school student could answer. Those questions included doctors, lawyers, business executives, housewives, laborers, teachers and even college professors: didn't know the answers.

Fifteen per cent of those questioned could not tell the name of the mayor of their city. Seventy per cent could not name the members of the city council. Fifty per cent didn't know what a balanced budget was. Sixty per cent didn't have the slightest idea what an improvement bond was.

Only a handful knew what ad valorem taxes were. Excise tax was almost a mystery. A good percent had heard of sales tax but did not know how much it was or whether it was levied by federal, state or city, or all three. Most folks knew there was some sort of a tax on gasoline but guessed that it was anywhere from 1c to 10c.

Only one person out of 10 could name even one of their state senators or representatives. Less than one out of 10 knew who their United States senator was. Governors and sheriffs got a better rating. Thirty-three per cent knew the name of their sheriff and their state governor.

What kind of a batting average would you have if someone stepped up to you and asked you to name the Governor of Florida and members of his Cabinet? Could you name the men or women who represent you in your state legislature? Do you know who represents you in Washington? What about your Chief of Police, your Sheriff, your local Judge?

Even folks who vote for this or that candidate don't know who they voted for a week after election or what office he holds. They don't

Part 6  
 (2) To pass and enforce Ordinances for the preservation of the property of said City and to preserve order on the same either within or without its limits.

(4) To borrow money for current expenses, provided any amount borrowed shall not exceed any amount equal to twenty-five per cent of the revenue derived from taxation during the next preceding fiscal year.

(5) To regulate, perform and furnish all public services and to own and acquire by purchase or by eminent domain, public utilities, public docks, wharves and boat basins; to acquire, establish, own and operate, as a public utility, water works, and to provide the City and its inhabitants thereof with water; to acquire, own, establish, maintain and operate, as a public utility, gas works, and to furnish the City and its inhabitants thereof with commercial gas; to acquire, own, establish, operate and maintain as a public utility, electric plants, and to furnish the City and its inhabitants with electricity; to acquire, own, establish, operate and maintain as a public utility, sewerage disposal plants, and to provide the City and its inhabitants with the facilities thereof; to acquire, own, establish, operate and maintain as a public utility, bus lines, and to provide the facilities thereof to the City and its inhabitants and to such others as have occasion to use the same; to acquire, own, establish, operate and maintain as a public utility, boat basins, and to provide the facilities thereof to the City and its inhabitants and to such others as have occasion to use the same; to acquire, own, establish, operate and maintain as a public utility any other or further facility or business which the City Commission shall consider necessary or proper.

(7) To grant the corporations or private individuals franchises and privileges in said municipality.

(8) To license, control, tax, regulate, or to prohibit traffic and sales upon the streets, sidewalks and public places within the territory or any part of any street, sidewalk and public place, and to license, regulate, suppress and prohibit hawkers, peddlers, vendors and beggars upon such streets, sidewalks and public places, and upon any part thereof, and to place upon any license issued hereunder such limitations as the City Commission shall deem advisable.

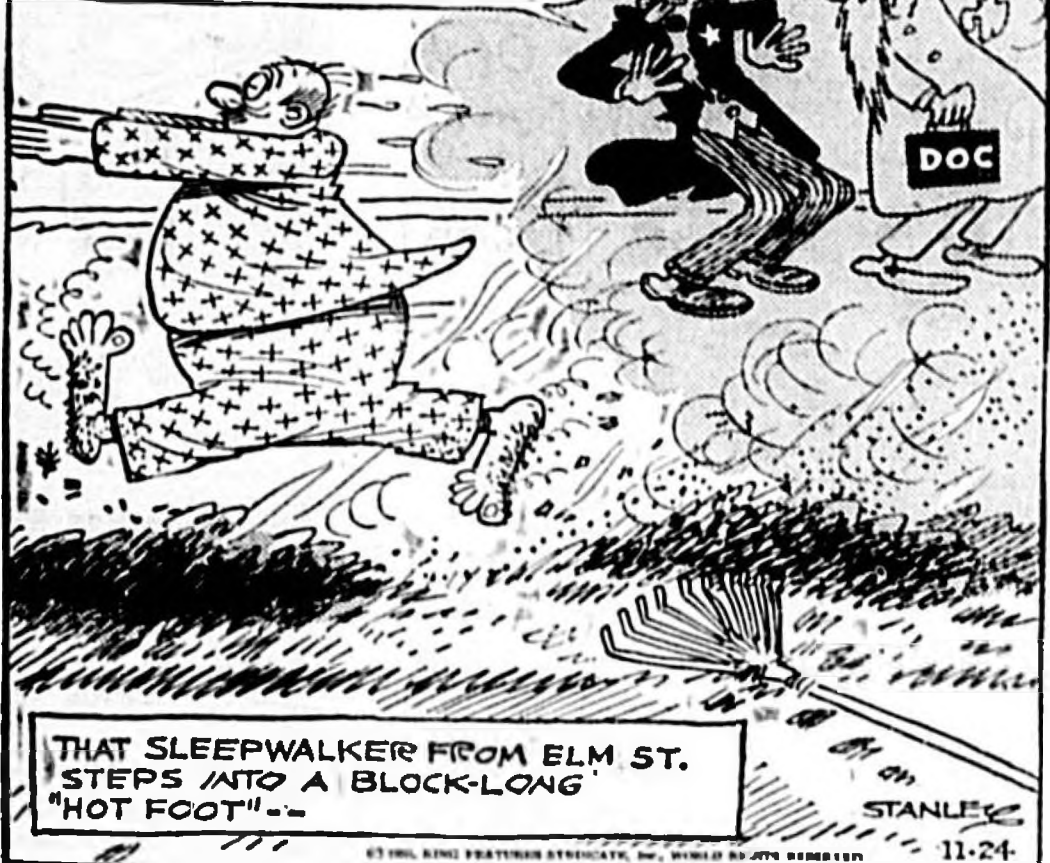

**First Thanksgiving Recreation Day Not Religious One**

You may have heard differently, but the first Thanksgiving was not observed by either the Plymouth Pilgrim or the Boston Puritan. Nor was it a day of religious observance; it was a day of recreation. "However, the turkey has always been traditional in the American celebration," says Dr. Allen C. Morris, English professor and folklore expert at the University of Florida. In early American history Governor Bradford of Massachusetts specified that during the autumn "There was great store of wild turkeys," so early settlers fared well. Days set a set for Thanksgiving were known in Europe before the Reformation. Some maintain that Thanksgiving was suggested by the Hebrew Feast of the Tabernacles, and that its origin goes back to the time when men first began to understand their dependence on a Higher Power. It was a popular festival among the Dutch in the ten years the Pilgrims lived in Holland. Dr. Morris said, "The Puritans were not all serious-minded, joy-killing people." In an account of the first Ameri-

can Thanksgiving week there is no record of any special religious service during the time of feasting and merry-making. The governor sent four men fowling and they killed enough meat to last the colonists and Chief Massasoit and 50 warriors for a week of recreational activities. "Thus hunting, a popular sport at Thanksgiving time, is a tradition stemming from this practice," explained Dr. Morris. "Did you know the modern Halloween stunt, trick or treat, was once a part of the Thanksgiving activity?" he asked. It was a custom in many eastern cities for children to dress in old clothes, wear masks, and parade the streets blessing tin horns. They went from house to house with baskets asking for gifts of fruits or vegetables. The early Thanksgivings were not always set on Thursday. No particular season was chosen; it has been celebrated in August, January, December, and October. During the American Revolution the day became national. In 1863 President Lincoln recommended annual Thanksgiving days and since the Civil War the practice has assumed the regularity of official routine and has been regarded as a national institution. President Franklin D. Roosevelt declared the official celebration to be the last Thursday in Novem-

ber. Today it is observed by church services, feasting, games, and general festivity. Thanksgiving has been regarded as one of the greatest home festivals and a day of family reunion when the people eat turkey, and Indian pudding, pumpkin pie. "Many funny stories are told of the early Thanksgiving Days," concluded Dr. Morris. "Once the town of Colchester calmly ignored the governor's appointed day and observed their own festival a week late in order to allow time for the arrival of a hoghead of molasses for pies."

A communique from the Middle Eastern kingdom's information department denied specifically reports that (1) King Saud had sought a meeting with Soviet representatives to discuss an arm deal, (2) the Arabian government is sending a delegation to visit Czechoslovakian arms factories, and (3) Soviet President Klement Voroshilov offered arms in his message congratulating King Saud on the anniversary of his accession.
