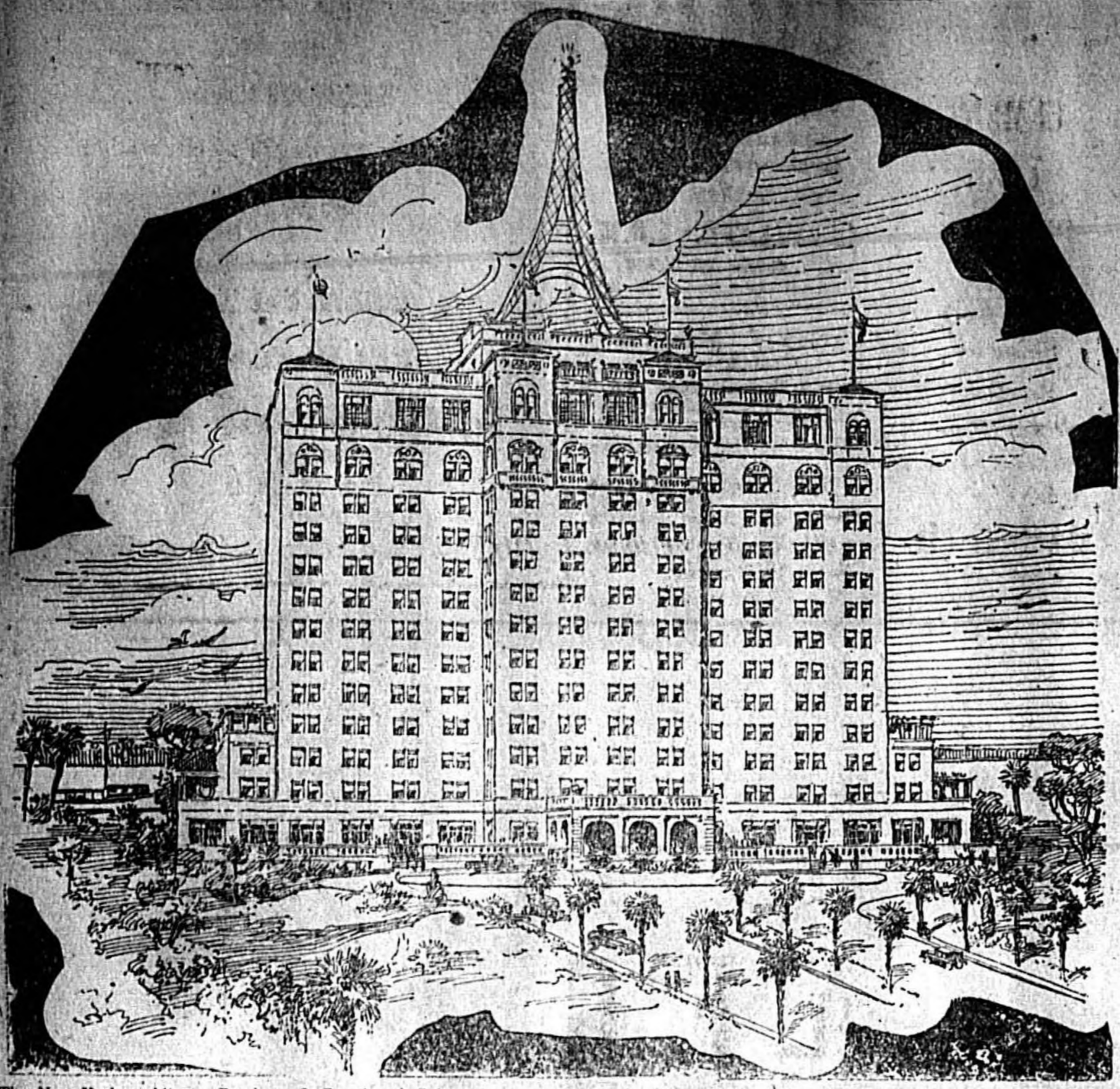

\$2,000,000 Fleetwood Hotel Will Be Erected At Daytona Shores



The New York architects, Beacham, LaGrand and Gaines, have completed all plans and specifications for the 15-story steel Fleetwood Hotel Commodore J. Opening prices, which ranged from half cent decline to 3/4 cent advance. May new, 1.76 to 1.76 1/2 and July 1.53 to 1.53 1/2 were followed by a rise all around with May touching 1.78 and July 1.54 1/2.

It is intended to rouse the red flag, the red hymn was sung to the tune of 'Maryland, My Maryland,' caused the communists to stand here-headed in exasperation. All English socialists, however, do not like the song. George Bernard Shaw, who is sympathetic with almost everything Russian, says it sounds like a dirge to a dying cat.

"If Russia's the land you're yearning for,
"It's freedom of the kind you're burning for,
"Why! good luck and take your hook!
"Get your ticket from Mister Cook!"

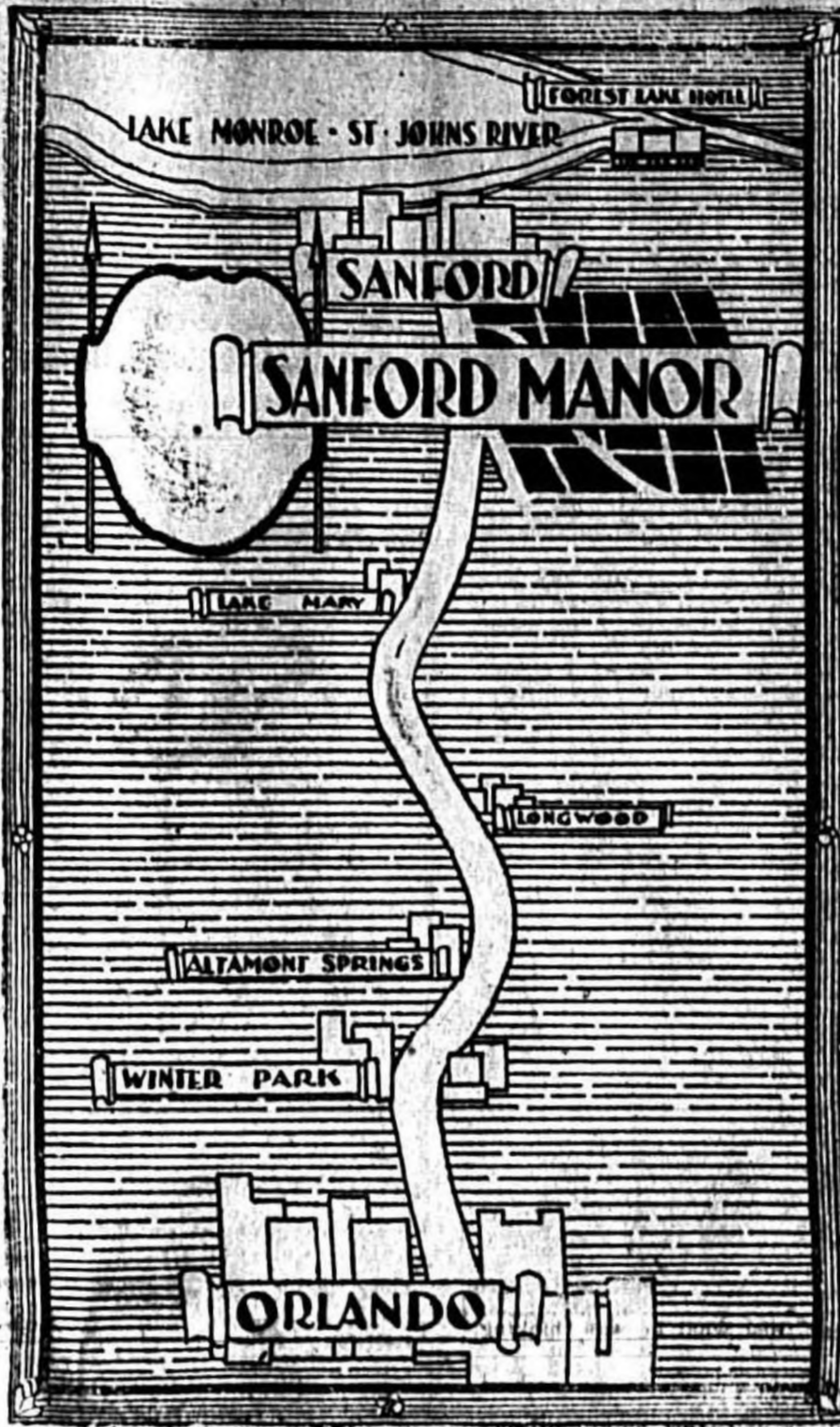

EUROPEAN TRACK STARS WILL FACE BEST IN COUNTRY

Houben, Paulen, Goodwin and Hoff will compete in the Annual New York Contests on Thursday of This Week

NEW YORK, Feb. 1.—(AP)—Four European track and field athletes, great in their homeland, will face a select field of Americans in the annual Millrose A. A. games here next Thursday night.

Track observers say that too much must not be expected from them. American enthusiasts are inclined to regard all invading European stars as comparable to Paavo Nurmi of Finland, but observers say it must be remembered that Nurmi is the outstanding athlete of the 1924 Olympics at Paris, winner of four competitions in three of which he bettered the existing Olympic figures. He proved himself a super-runner.

Victories in a world meet went only part way toward demonstrating the exceptional ability of Paavo. Last winter he came to the United States, in a few short weeks accustomed himself to the methods of running, and he won all but three of the numerous events he entered.

Hubert Houben of Germany, first of the 1925 invaders to enter indoor competition here, won a heat of the 40 yard dash in Boston last night, but in the finals he was left behind. Houben is not an Olympic champion for his country was not welcomed at the game of 1924, but he gained prestige by defeating Charley Paddock and Loren Murchison when the Americans were engaged in a tour of the world. This was a feat worthy of any Olympic performer.

Houben will be among the starters in the Millrose games Thursday at Madison Square Garden and the other foreigners will be Adrian Paulen of Holland, a middle distance man; Gordon Goodwin, Great Britain's greatest walker, and Charley Hoff, the pole vaulting record man from Norway.

Hoff, who for some weeks has been training at Dartmouth College, is expected to prove the bright star of the foreign constellation. Americans who have seen him in practice at Hanover, predict that he will do 14 feet with the pole on Monday, to improve upon his own world mark.

This youngster, however, does not confine himself to the vault. He is an capable middle distance runner and in the Olympic 300 meters placed second in two trial heats.

In the Millrose program, Hoff will vault against Ed Knourek of the Illinois A. C., Emerson Morton of Georgetown, Fred Sturdy of Yale and others and in a six hundred yard run will meet Paulen, Al Helfrich, John "Sonny" Waters of Harvard and Johnny Gibson of Fordham. He also will appear on a foreign relay team.

Houben again will encounter the man he defeated overseas, Loren Murchison, along with Delbert Hubbard and Frayn Hussey, sprints of 40 and 60 yards having been arranged for the stars.

Goodwin placed second to Ugo Frigerio of Italy in the 10,000 meters walk at the Olympics, but Willie Plant, American champion, did not participate in the games.

Frigerio was beaten several times by Plant in the United States last winter. Therefore, Goodwin's

UNUSUAL RECORD IN BASKETBALL MADE BY TULANE

Greenback Game Team Leads The Southern Conference In Points Scored And In Number Scored Against It

NEW ORLEANS, Feb. 1.—(AP)—In 11 Southern Conference basketball games, Tulane University has compiled the unusual record of leading the conference in points scored against members and at the same time suffering the greatest number of points scored against it.

With a double victory over Auburn, the Tulane Greenbacks ran their string of points up to 363. However, in winning seven games against four defeats the runner-up in the last conference tournament has seen opponents count 521 points. Tulane is the only team in the circuit with either assets or liabilities over 300.

Maryland, with four straight conference victories, continues to show the way in percentage, followed by Virginia and North Carolina with two and one victory, respectively, both the Tarheels and the Cavaliers having a clean slate at this stage of the race.

Auburn, after winning its first game was driven out of the select undefeated class by Tulane, giving the University of Mississippi a chance to move up a peg. "Old Miss" lost its opening game to Louisiana State but since then has compiled a record of five straight victories.

With examinations in progress at a number of institutions there will be a lull in the basketball storm for some of the favored contestants but all will return to the court in time to place themselves on edge for the Conference tournament opening in Atlanta February 25. Only 16 of the 22 Southern members will be permitted to shoot at the important baskets in the tournament. Rectifying records for the tournament will be based on performances in eight games against conference opponents. Should less than sixteen teams look right games, the best 16 on the basis of season's play would be elected. Indications are, however, that more than sixteen will play eight games or more.

Georgia, Georgia Tech and Tulane have already played eight games or more and "Old Miss" has turned out seven.

Hollywood, Cal., Feb. 1.—(AP)—Search for the American folk song, which has brought into relief the negro spiritual and songs of the frontier, has gained aid from an unexpected source—the commonly called silent drama.

Composition of the musical score for a western play sent researchers on a hunt for old songs of the Overland stage and folk singers. They were rewarded by several quaint songs and also the music of the call played by express riders to warn of their approach to a remote station.

Most of the songs of stage coach days have a rhythm that reminds one of the bitter known "Lone Prairie" of the cowboy. Virtually all of them have a story to tell. Such a one is that of Joe Bowers who, the song tells, came to California to win a stake that he might marry a girl in Pike county, Missouri, only to return to find her the wife of a red-headed butcher. The song, with a lilt that almost sings itself, opens:

"My name is Joe Bowers,
I have a brother, Ike,
I come from old Missouri,
Come all the way from Pike,
I'll tell you how I came there
And how I came to roam
And leave my poor old mammy
So far away from home."
And so it runs through manyanzas.

Another sings in a tuneful, haunting strain of a thrifty old Indian woman of Albuquerque, known as old Bobby Cox. Only one stanza is now remembered:

"Old Bobby Cox,
Star-wano, come and antec,

She lived in Albuquerque
In a 'dobe shanty.

And had feathers on her legs.
And peddled beets and cucumbers
And hard-boiled eggs."

BERLIN LETTER

BERLIN, Feb. 1.—(AP)—One of every five hundred persons in Germany, it is estimated, is on the Federal government's payroll. While taxes have increased 250 percent since the war, despite the fact that the country is virtually free of public debt for reparation obligations, the number of federal job holders has increased at such a pace that several newspapers are demanding a house cleaning. The finance ministry, charged with the collection of more than a score of federal taxes, alone employs 73,200 persons and spent \$100,000,000 annually, or more than the total income tax receipts of the state of Prussia in 1918. One in every 850 inhabitants draws a pay check from the finance ministry.

Under American administration the cost of collecting and allotting 1,000,000,000 marks reparation payments is one fourteenth of one percent. The German government spends nearly six percent to collect 7,680,000 marks revenue.

One in every 2,500 persons enjoys the title "Minister," having served at one time in federal or state cabinets under the republic, which is little more than seven years old.

General Hans von Seeckt, chief of staff of the Reichswehr, has been promoted to the rank of colonel general by President von Hindenburg in recognition of his services in building up an effective post-war army within the limits of the Versailles treaty.

A colonel general in the German army is ranked only by a field marshal, of which there are five, including the president. They retain their titles from the old regime. The organization of the new Reichswehr does not provide for field marshals.

Starting the second year of the war as a colonel, General von Seeckt, distinguished himself as von Mackensen's chief of staff

and was promoted to major general, winning also the Pour Le Merite medal. The German successes in the Balkans were largely attributed to General von Seeckt and won him further promotion.

The problem of what to do with innumerable castles which, by purchase or annexation, have fallen into the hands of German states and cities, has been solved in an unusual way by the Bavarian town of Kumbach, famous for its beer.

The 600 year-old castle on the heights of Plassenburgh is being used as an insane asylum for men. Plassenburgh is one of the most beautiful and historic of German castles. Built in the fourteenth century it was the residence of Count von Brandenburg-Kulmbach until 1398 and later of Prince Christian of Bavaria.

around these, and racks placed along the sidewalks. Many an artist writes his name in chalk on the asphalt opposite his exhibition. Another speech that was highly applauded the first night was one the ex-soldier made to a woman who had been a devoted nurse throughout the war. "What you sincerely call 'your duty accomplished' was only the physical pleasure of being in con-

tact with young men."

The Comedie Francaise is going back to the system of government chosen for it by Napoleon during the disastrous Russian campaign of 1812 when he found time to sign a decree instituting a committee of six to oversee the affairs of the house of Moliere. This committee was increased in 1919 to nine members with three substitutes by the ministers of public works, M. Laferre. The present minister has decided to revert to the Napoleonic committee of six.

One argument in favor of the change is that the 32 members of the comedie Francaise do not need 12 representatives. The opposition says that the change is undemocratic and will result in the repression of new ideas.

Bull fighting is well established in France, had a successful year in 1925, and is likely to have an even better one in 1926, delegates to the French bull-fighters' convention at Toulouse unanimously agreed. Mayor Billieres of Toulouse, who welcomed the bull-fighters, assured them that "the sport of bull-fighting is certain of our sympathy in the south and is supported by taste and tradition." Luis Frezz, Mexican matador replied to the mayor's speech, declaring that it was not the fault of the bull-fighters if reproaches were made against the sport, which was, like all sports, subject to the inroads of the gambler and the sharp-shooter.

ORLANDO, Fla., Feb. 1.—(AP)—The Orlando Sentinel today quotes Sir Richard Wintrey, member of the English parliament, and secretary of the board of agriculture during the administration of Lloyd George, as saying that the painted lips, low and high cut dresses, flesh colored hose and harum-scarum flapper ways of the American women have placed them in the lot with the half-cast of the African savages.

Sir Wintrey, who is secretary of the European division of the World Brotherhood Federation and a publisher of several newspapers and a world wide traveler, according to the Sentinel, is going through Florida "to find out what it is all about."

"I want to find out about the agreement," the Sentinel quotes the member of parliament. "It all depends on the agreement. Some one agrees to keep an orange yard for five years for nothing." "I would not live here for half

the world. You are half-civilized. You live in shacks that we would not keep our horses in. Your roads are terrible but you are learning. You have lots to learn yet."

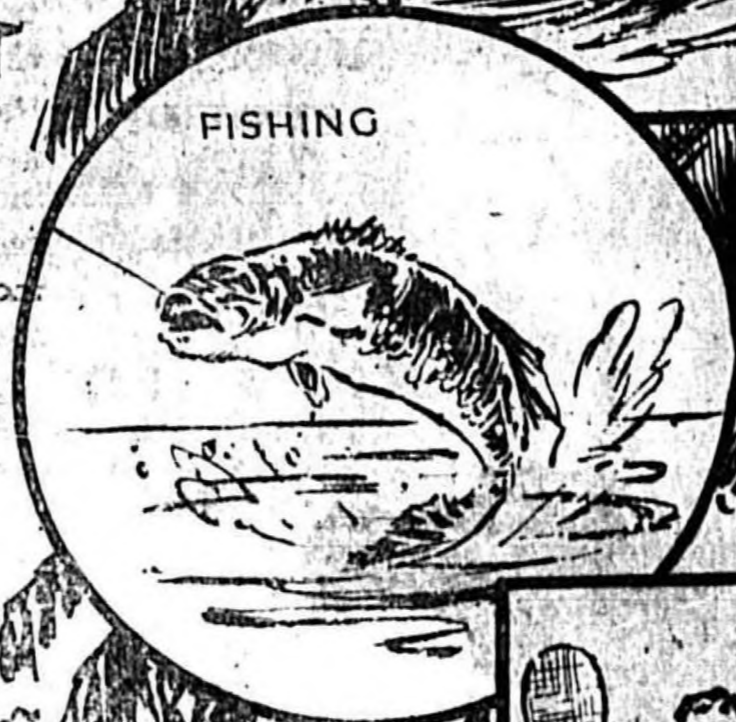

Chicago Bank Find It was Victim of Embezzlement Plot

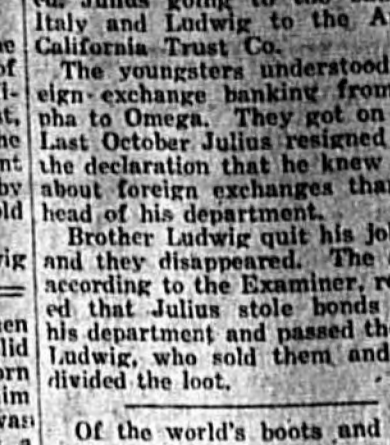
CHICAGO, Jan. 30.—(AP)—The Examiner today says the Bank of Italy here, one of the largest financial institutions in the West, has just discovered that it was the victim of a \$100,000 embezzlement plot last October, perpetrated by two unfortunate boys from the old country.

The boys, Julius and Ludwig Busch, who came here from Australia in January, 1924, are gone—have been gone nearly four months and the bank doesn't know where they presented references from Austrian bankers. They were hired by Julius going to the bank of Italy and Ludwig to the Anglo-California Trust Co.

The youngsters understood foreign exchange banking from Alpha to Omega. They got on well. Last October Julius resigned with the declaration that he knew more about foreign exchanges than the head of his department.

Brother Ludwig quit his job too, and they disappeared. The audit, according to the Examiner, revealed that Julius stole bonds from his department and passed them to Ludwig, who sold them and then divided the loot.
