ATHENS, Greece (UPI)—President Eisenhower carried his world peace crusade from the 80-degree heat of New Delhi to wintry Iran and on into rain-swept Greece today with renewed pledges of U. S. aid and praise for the courage of small nations resisting communism.

The President's jet airliner landed at Athens airport at 4:34 p. m. (9:34 a. m. e.s.t.) from Tehran where, in a 5 1/2 hour stop, he conferred with Shah Mohammed Reza Pahlavi and addressed the Iranian Parliament.

What Made Titan Fizzle? That's What Space Officials Would Like To Know

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (UPI)—Missilemen today studied telemetry data and movies in an attempt to learn what caused Saturday's second straight blow-up of a Titan intercontinental ballistic missile.

It was not determined immediately whether the explosion, which ripped through the missile before it could rise one inch from its pad, would affect the launching schedule for two other Titans now at the Cape.

A two million dollar rocket and several months of work went up in the boiling ball of liquid flame and dense smoke that engulfed the Titan and its tall tower a split-second after the 300,000-pound-thrust booster engine ignited.

A column of smoke spurted high into the sky, giving the scene a nuclear explosion-like appearance. The missile itself became fire and rubble and the pad and tower, particularly the wiring, were burned extensively.

No one inside the heavily-shielded blockhouse 800 feet away was injured.

This missile was the first of the Titan series to attempt a launch since Aug. 14, when a test rocket was prematurely launched and fell back to its stand to explode. There apparently was no connection between the two accidents.

The Titan is designed as America's biggest war rocket. Plans

also call for making the operational version's booster the second stage for the Saturn super booster now under development.

Aaron, Mathews Pace NL Batters

NEW YORK (UPI)—Outfielder Hank Aaron and third baseman Ed Mathews of the Milwaukee Braves won the top batting honors of 1959 in the National League.

Aaron won the second batting title of his career with a .355 mark, led in hits with 223 and became the seventh player in the circuit's history to total 400 bases in one season while Mathews hit 46 home runs to take his second championship in that department.

Shortstop Ernie Banks of the Chicago Cubs won the third leg of the triple crown by hitting in 143 runs. He was tied with Mathews with 45 homers each at the end of the regular season but the Milwaukee star hit a 40th homer in the second game of the Braves' playoff with the Los Angeles Dodgers.

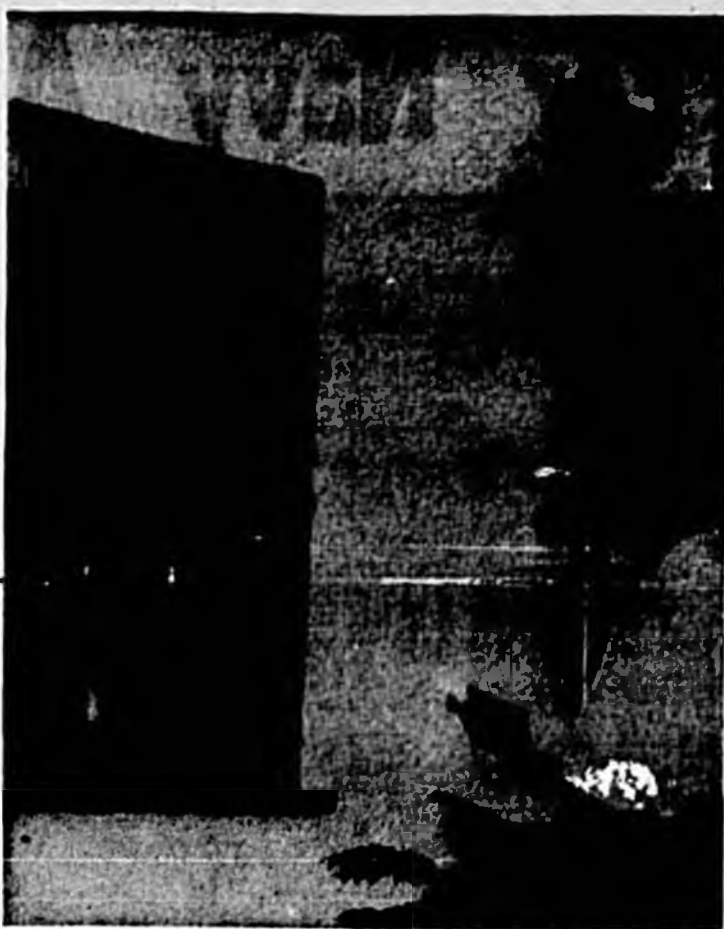

Demos Set Strategy In Coping With Republican Peace Issue

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Democrats appeared today to have settled on a strategy for meeting the "peace issue" which has them jittery about the 1960 presidential campaign.

Statements by party leaders in the past week indicated they hope to deal with the problem by arguing that the Eisenhower administration has jeopardized peace hopes by accepting "second place" in competition with Russia.

The "peace issue" is a term used by both parties to describe the administration's new willingness to negotiate with Russia and President Eisenhower's well-publicized good will travels abroad.

The Democratic strategy was emphasized in a report by the party's Advisory Council and in speeches by two potential presidential nominees, Sens. Lyndon B. Johnson (Tex.) and John F. Kennedy (Mass.)

Other developments in the political field over the weekend included: —Sen. Mike Mansfield (D.Mont.) said any Democrat would have a "most difficult time" against either Vice President Richard M. Nixon or Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller in the presidential race next year.

Mansfield said in an interview the Republicans were gaining because of Eisenhower's increased personal activity in international

affairs and the "race becomes tougher with each passing week" for the Democrats.

—GOP National Chairman Thurston B. Morton said it was "within the realm of possibility" that Rockefeller would accept second place to Nixon on the Republican ticket. Morton said on a TV program that Nixon was far ahead of Rockefeller among party field workers but that "an awful lot could happen" before next July's convention.

—Rep. Leslie C. Areeda (R.Ill.) predicted in a statement that Nixon would walk away with the nomination. He said Nixon would be nominated on the first ballot at the Chicago convention and then beat the Democratic candidate.

Belafonte TV Show Proves Exciting Success

NEW YORK (UPI) — The art of Harry Belafonte, as it now is called, occupies a unique role in show business. Whether it's an outdoor stadium, the Waldorf Astoria or a simpatico espresso joint in Rome, he packs 'em in.

The rich, poor and in-between apparently find in his spirituals, folk songs and novelty numbers some form of therapy.

Thursday night's hour-long CBS-TV special, "Tonight With Belafonte" demonstrated why. Each number was carefully polished to a rich finish. The hour offered — besides more music — more simplicity, less affectation, much power and even passion.

There was no preaching, no bouts with Hebrew, Spanish, Italian, calypso or jazz tunes, however interesting and colorful they might be. This hour was reserved for a wide range of the songs of the Negro people: Work songs, love songs, spirituals and children's game songs. And this diet was seasoned with rousing choral and dance numbers. Belafonte also introduced to network TV audiences the little-known folk singer, Odetta. Today this woman must be regarded as a star.

The mood of the show was a dynamic one as Belafonte and his handpicked production aides — director Norman Jewison, choreographer Walter Nicks, set designer Gary Smith, set decorator Ted Ralph and lighting director Stan Alper — joined to provide clean, imaginative backgrounds for the up-beat and down-beat songs. The settings for the spirituals and the "folkie" number were especially effective. I suppose you can call it a "message musical" in its way. I got the message.

"Of all the missed chances of the war, this one probably was the most tragic and the most executable," wrote Civil War historian Bruce Catton of the so-called "Crater Fiasco" of July, 1864.

Playhouse 90 on CBS-TV presented the story of this fiasco in a vivid drama by David Shaw, "The Tunnel." The teleplay included in one way or another every known aspect of this intriguing attempt to breach Confederate lines before Petersburg, Va. by exploding dynamite in a mine underneath them.

Technically speaking, the trench scenes and the final actions in the crater were television triumphs. They seemed to come right out of the Matthew Brady pictures, thanks to Delbert Mann's direction. The only reservation I have is that Richard Boone and Rip Torn, the

stars of the show, became too talky during that extraordinary climactic scene.

Next week — The Battle of New Orleans.

Another CBS-TV special Thursday night was called "Christmas At The Circus" and originated in Miami Beach, Fla., with James Arness and Dennis Weaver as hosts. Circuses still do not lend themselves to TV coverage too well, but this show did as well as possible. Even though Santa Claus didn't show up, I won't knock this one. After all, any show that pre-empt's the Betty Hutton show can't be all bad.

The Channel Swim: Charles Laughton and French singer-actor Yves Montand join NBC-TV's Dinah Shore show on Sunday, Dec. 20. Leland Hayward's CBS-TV special, The Fabulous Fifties, with Tex Harrison, Jackie Gleason, Henry Fonda and other "really big stars," has been lengthened to a full two hours, instead of 90 minutes. The show is scheduled for Sunday, Jan. 31. Fifi D'Orsay, the "oolala girl" of the 20s, has a part in "Castaways," the Adventures in Paradise episode on ABC-TV for Monday, Jan. 4. Eddie Cantor and English singer Frankie Vaughan will join Mori Sahl in the NBC-TV special, The Future Lies Ahead, on Friday, Jan. 22. Mel Tormé joins Pat Boone in song on Pat's ABC-TV show Thursday, Jan. 7.

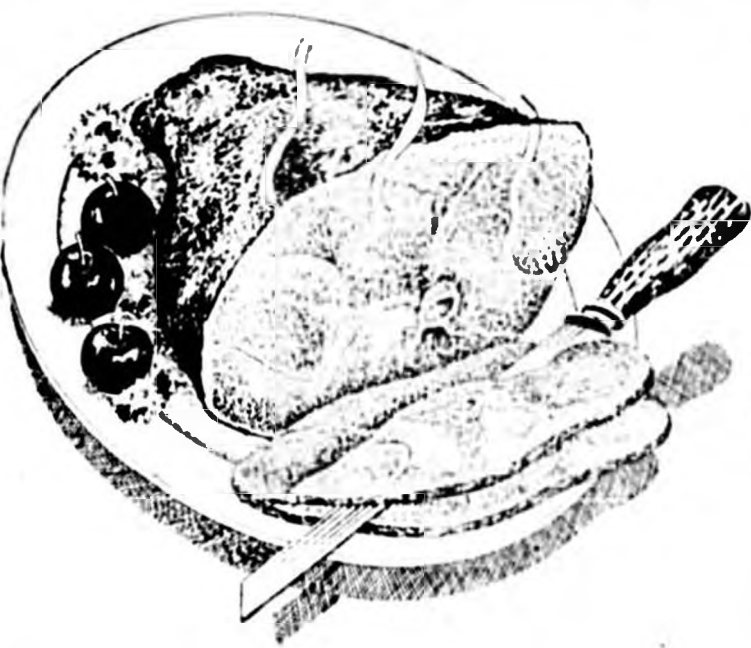

GOP Future Appears Bright For 1960

WASHINGTON (UPI) — There is acknowledgement in unexpected places that the Republican Party has a bright prospect of electing a president next year.

For example, consider a recent speech in Newark, (N.J.), by Samuel H. Beer, chairman of the department of government of Harvard University. Beer also is the new national chairman of Americans for Democratic Action.

Beer recalled the Democratic congressional triumph of 1958 and cited the political fact that there are more Democrats than Republicans voters. He added:

"The election of 1958 was a massive vote of 'no confidence' in the conservative Republican administration. Now, a year later, many well-informed people are doubting out loud that the Democrats can win the presidency next year... despite the fact that the leading Republican candidate is one of the best-hated political figures in the United States."

Most of Beer's speech was devoted to a bare-knuckled attack on Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson (D-Tex.). He fingered Johnson as the man who was frustrating the left wing elements of the Democratic party in their effort to enact a legislative program. The speech itself points up exactly why most Republicans and some Democrats believe a Republican will be elected president in 1960.

Republican prospects are bright because the Democratic party is angrily divided. Whatever the political hate may be for Vice President Richard M. Nixon, it is no

Spacemen Need Road Maps Too

PHILADELPHIA (UPI) — The space traveler of the future will find the road map no different from the tourist of today. He will need a road map.

If he takes a wrong turn, he might wind up in orbit around the sun for all eternity instead of reaching his destination, such as the planet Venus.

Scientists in the Missile and Space Vehicle Department of the General Electric Corp. already are working on road maps for space pilots. A map charting the way to Venus has been completed for the Air Force's Wright Air Development Center.

The map is drawn on graph paper in the form of gracefully curving lines. It shows more live an exercise in algebra than a conventional road map.

Numbers along the bottom of the graph give possible dates for launching a manned or unmanned space ship to Venus. Numbers up the side represent the time the vehicle will be traveling.

To find the way to Venus you have to determine a date for blast off and how long you can stay in space. The "road map" then gives you a velocity vector. The velocity vector means much the same to an astronaut as a route number means to a motorist. It tells him the direction he must go, and also gives him his speed.

WASHINGTON — King Vidor, who has the Hollywood publicity boys digging for a word ten times as big as "colossal" came by this way on route to Gettysburg on what was to be a secret mission.

This producer of some of the greatest movie spectacles in the last 40 years in studying the battlefield with one thing in mind: to provide the epic of all epics, "The Battle of Gettysburg."

If you think some of our Washington bureaucrats think big, you ought to meet this guy. But to look at him, he's a disappointment.

He was a few minutes late for dinner downtown and any minute I expected his entrance on a wave of ruffles and flourishes. From what I had heard about him—and, especially, that big sized first name—I expected to find a massive man of rapidity wearing a gold crown.

Instead, he strolled in sort of self-consciously and took the far seat, at the edge of the dining room. He's afraid of crowds. Afraid, this man who feels he must amass 3,000 people around him in making movies like "War and Peace," "Duel in the Sun" and other like "Northwest Passage" and "Stella Dallas."

The name "King" is real and not the product of a Hollywood idea man. It was his uncle's middle name. Vidor, a Hungarian, started his career in 1918. That was the year he bundled his bride in a Model T Ford in Galveston, Tex., and headed for California.

Now they're comparing him with Cecil B. DeMille.

Vidor refuses to remember his age, or his wife's, or the ages of his three children. That way, he thinks, he can keep thinking young—and big.

The biggest thing he thought up was the production of "Solomon and Sheba," which will cost more than \$6 million. As it turns out, Lloyds of London... about \$1 million of it.

That's how much it cost United Artists to reshoot the film after Tyrone Power died of a heart attack. They recast the movie with Yul Brynner.

The odds against anything like a leading man dying in the middle of a major film production were so great that the policy cost United Artists a mere \$15,000. (Since then, the insurance rate has gone up.)

Vidor admitted something about the movie, and he did it reluctantly. That is that Tyrone Power actually appears in some sequences, although all the audience will see will be the back of his head for a few seconds at a time.

The biggest idea this shy, square-faced big thinker came up with in filming "Solomon and Sheba" was to use 75-millimeter cameras which shoot pictures on negatives twice the standard width.

It comes out something like Cinemascope, and at one time Vidor was editing 12 sound tracks simultaneously, several of which had three stereophonic speakers.

He said it was enough to drive a man crazy. And the next minute he was talking about making the Gettysburg movie and using nearly double that many sound tracks.

Herter Seeks To Avert Showdown

PARIS (UPI) — Secretary of State Christian Herter assured NATO today that American defense forces will remain in Europe at present strength at least until the end of 1961.

But he and Undersecretary of State Douglas Dillon told France and the other Allies the United States expects them to start passing their fair share of the Western defense burden, according to informal sources.

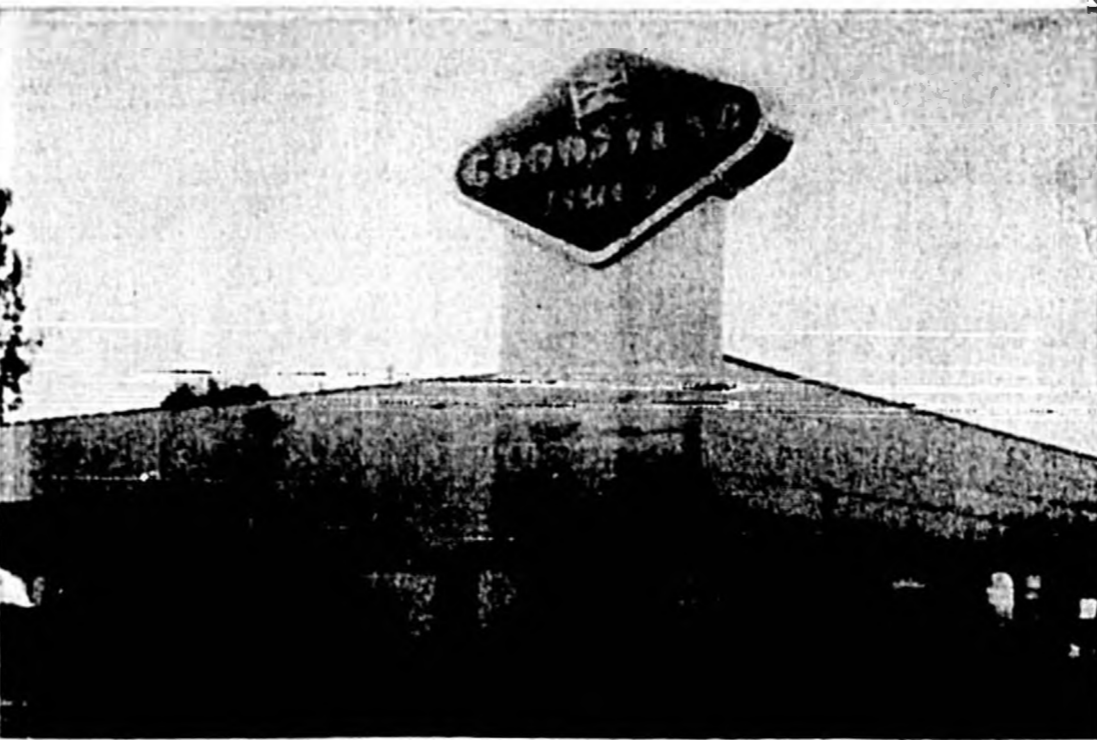
Herter was moving in on a major NATO squabble before the

family spat could mar the forthcoming Western summit meeting starting here next week. Some U. S. officials had accused America's 11 NATO Allies of falling behind in supporting the alliance.

The battle began when Gen. Nathan F. Twining, chairman of the U. S. Joint Chiefs of Staff, told a secret meeting of NATO military chiefs Thursday that some nations, notably France, were weakening the alliance by failing to meet their military commitments.

France, deeply hurt, let it be understood she took a "grave view" of the charges. President Charles DeGaulle flew back to Paris today from a meeting of French community nations in Africa and was expected to join in the fracas.

Herter scheduled meetings today with British Foreign Secretary Selwyn Lloyd and other NATO leaders on the eve of the annual meeting of NATO foreign ministers which starts Tuesday.

Ike's African Tour May Force Khrushchev To Visit Area Soon

Expect Russia's Khrushchev to pay a visit to Africa next year, perhaps even before an East-West summit meeting, President Eisenhower's tour of uncommitted Asian nations is making a real impact on the Communist world, Britain's Prime Minister Harold Macmillan is going to Africa in January, Khrushchev is likely to try to counter these allied moves. He already has been invited to Guinea and may stop over in Liberia for the presidential inauguration.

Western diplomats believe Red

China is jealous of Russia's stepped up aid to needy countries outside the Communist bloc. The Soviet Union has contributed substantially to the Peiping economy over the past few years but the hungry giant wants more. According to the reports, Red China is particularly upset at the money Russia is pouring into the United Arab Republic to help build the Aswan high dam. To all appearances, the Russians are ignoring Peiping's gripes.

The Western summit meeting in Paris next week may be somewhat of a flop. Because of inability to agree on joint policy at lower levels, allied preparations have broken down. All that's now expected to be decided is a date, place and tentative agenda for the eventual summit meeting with the Russians. There definitely will have to be a subsequent Western get-together at the top level to iron out a united policy before the meeting with Khrushchev.

At least one high official in the Nationalist Chinese government is in favor of American newsmen going to Red China. This marks a drastic switch since the Formosa regime has been strongly opposed to such a move on the grounds it might be the first step toward diplomatic recognition. But this high official feels that American newsmen in Peiping might make Americans in general more aware of the oppressive nature of the Peiping Regime and thus more sympathetic to Chiang Kai-shek.

The decks thus were cleared for a replay of last year's famous "sudden death" overtime won by the Colts, 30-24, at Yankee Stadium. The teams have two weeks to prepare for this year's showdown in Baltimore, Dec. 27.

A total of 313,330 fans turned out for the final week end of the regular season, raising the league's season attendance to a new mark of 3,331,444. The old mark of 3,000,124 was set in 1958. The Cleveland Browns defeated the Philadelphia Eagles, 20-21, the Chicago Bears beat the Detroit Lions, 25-14, the Green Bay Packers routed the San Francisco Forty-Niners, 30-14, and the Pittsburgh Steelers scored a 35-20 victory over the Chicago Cardinals in Sunday's other windup games.

The Giants became the first NFL team to win 10 games in a season since 1963 when they rallied from a 10-7 halftime deficit at Washington, D.C.

The Colts trailed going into the final period, 20-24, Saturday but

Unitas' third touchdown pass of the game put them in front and they added two clinching pointers in a 21-point fourth-period burst.

Jimmy Brown scored two touchdowns on short bursts and gained 132 yards in 33 carries as the Browns tied the Eagles for second place in the Eastern Division.




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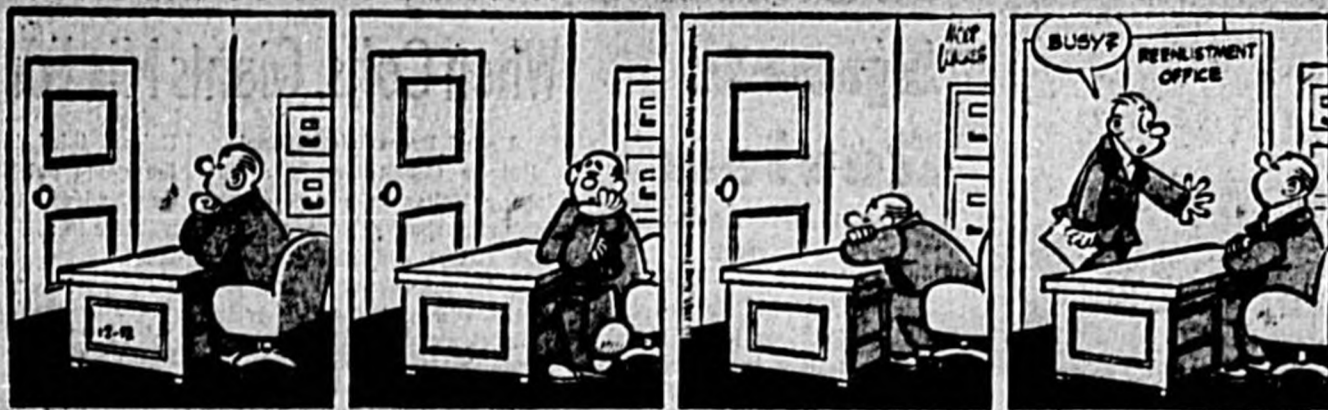


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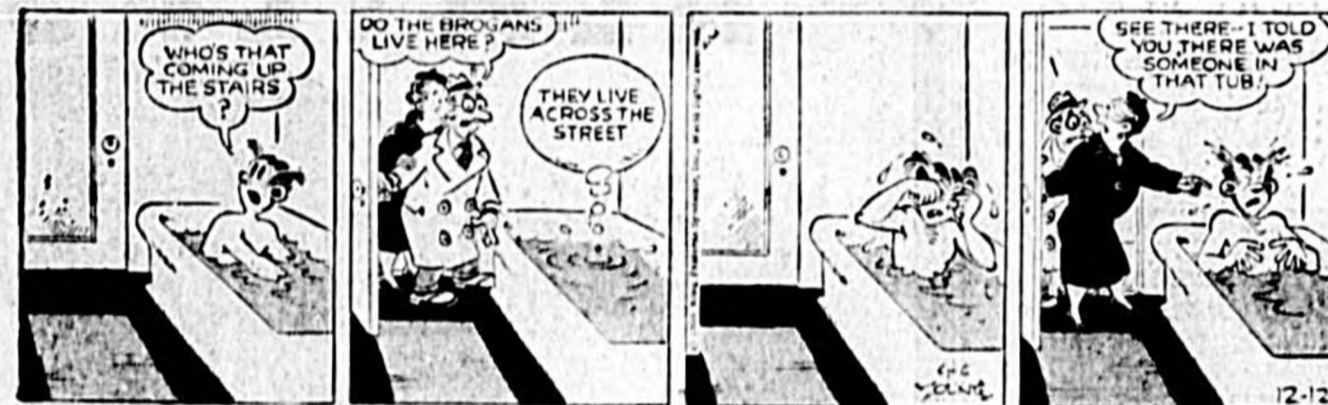
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
