The proposed commission would supervise the screening and return to their homes of all prisoners. It was an obvious attempt to surmount refusal of the Communists. to accept the results of screening by the unified command which has shown thousands of Reds unwilling

to go home.

It may be that the first step toward producing a vaccine which would offer immunity against poliomyelitis may have been taken by a scientist who succeeded in growing a pollo virus in chicken eggs. He has made several experiments with

The following expression of pinion concerning Proposed Constitutional Amendment No. 2 which would increase the number of Supreme Court Justices from 7 to 10 was released this week by former Attorney General J. Tom Watson, as a matter of public information. The Amendment to be voted on

n November to our State Constitution, proposing the increase of the number of Judges on the State Supreme Court from the present to 10, is a dangerous departure n its non-adherence to our established system of three separate branches of government, each in-dependent of the other, and none encroaching upon the field of op-eration of the other; these three being the Executive, the Judicial and the Legislative branches; as well as proposing a Suprema Court, the cost of whose conduct and maintenance will far exceed necasities, and will give no proposition of actions. portionate increase of service of This proposed Amendment will make an executive out of the Chief Justice, with respect to the State wide judiciary, and practically puts the Chief Justice in the category of Judicial boss over State Courts. Practically the only strict ludicial performance that he will be able to render under the proposed Amendment, would be through the influence he wields as

such hoss. This Amendment will give the Chief Supreme Justice the authority to reach down into the local Courts with an influence that have not heretofore existed, and which those trial court Judges have not heretofore had to recognize; and sooner or later such influence will, to some extent, subsidize the Independence of the trial court judici-

This Amendment will also permit two Judges to he the State's last word in the rendition of judicial decision; which seems ridicu-lous, in view of the great differ-ences of opinion so prevalent in legal decisions.



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
